



## BoA postpones acting upon proposed golf cart regs

Salado aldermen postponed amending the current Golf Cart Ordinance to require that driver's license and age requirement for operators of golf cart on public streets.

Like many municipalities in Texas, the Village of Salado allows the operation of golf carts on roads with posted speed limits of 35 mph or less, but implements requirements that meet the state standards in most respects.

Local regulations, however, differ from municipality to municipality.

Salado's most recent ordinance, a surprisingly short document of just five pages amended in 2014 to include utility vehicles, is very brief in its regulation of these vehicles, stating simply on page 3:

"A. Operation on Public Streets: The Village hereby allows the operation of Golf Carts and Utility Vehicles on Public Streets in accordance with state law.

"B. Prohibition: It shall be a violation of the law for any person to operate a Golf Cart or Utility Vehicle on Public Streets contrary to this Ordinance."

The ordinance defines a golf cart as the following: "A motor vehicle designed by the manufacturer primarily for transporting persons on a golf course, as defined by the Texas Transportation Code."

It defines a Utility Vehi-

cle as this: "A motor vehicle that is not a golf cart or lawn mower, equipped with side-by-side seating for the use of the operator and a passenger, designed to propel itself with at least four tires in contact with the ground, designed by manufacturers for off-highway use only and designed by the manufacturer primarily for utility work and not for recreational purposes."

The Ordinance refers to Transportation Code 551.404, which authorizes municipalities to allow for the operation of golf carts on its public roadways with these requirements:

"(1) is in the corporate boundaries of the municipality; and

"(2) has a posted speed limit of not more than 35 miles per hour.

Section 551.404 requires that golf cart or utility vehicles must have the following equipment: headlights, tail-lights, reflectors, parking brake and mirrors. Other sections require a slow-moving vehicle emblem.

State law allows the operations of golf carts on public roads under these limited circumstances:

551.403(a)

"(1) in a master planned community:

"(2) on a public or private beach; or

"(3) on a public highway for which the posted speed limit is not more than 35 miles per hour, if the golf cart is operated:

"(A) during the daytime; and

"(B) not more than two

miles from the location where the golf cart is usually parked and for transportation to or from a golf course."

At issue in Salado is the amendment to the current ordinance requiring a driver's license and minimum age of 16.

Whether a driver's license is a requirement for the operation of a golf cart on a public road or not depends upon who is interpreting the law.

For example, the City of Rockport is clear in its interpretations of the Transportation Code. Citing Sec. 502.001(18) golf carts are considered motor vehicles. Citing Sec. 521.021, an operator must hold a driver's license to operate a motor vehicle on a state highway. Citing 541.302(5) a highway is defined as "the width between the boundary lines of a publicly maintained way any part of which is open to the public for vehicular travel."

"Therefore a driver's license is required to operate a motor vehicle on any public roadway," according to the City of Rockport's "What You Need to Know About Golf Carts and Neighborhood Electric Vehicles."

The City of Bastrop requires permits to be issued for the operation of golf carts on its roadways. Part of that process requires the name, address and driver's license number of the applicant/operator.

## Leave 'em alone!

As the white tail deer population in Salado increases, more and more residents are stumbling upon fawns that are bedded down under bushes and hidden away.

They may think the fawn has been abandoned, but this is most likely not the case, according to Ryan Schoeneberg, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department deer disease/urban deer program specialist.

According to Schoeneberg, 99 percent of fawns that are left alone have a parent close by.

He recommends that you don't touch or move the deer because putting a human scent on it can make it easier for predators to target.

In a fact sheet on white-tailed deer published by the Connecticut Agricultural

Experiment Station and Department of Forestry and Horticulture, Dr. Scott C. Williams states that "Newborn fawns spend most of their time bedded down, laying very still, making it harder for predators to find them. A fawn's scent glands are not yet fully developed, so its mother will leave the fawn alone for many hours at a time for a few weeks so her scent does not rub off on it. She will return every few hours to nurse and move the fawn to a new bedding area. A doe seldom strays more than 100 yards from its fawn, always wary of predators."

According to the fact sheet, signs of an abandoned fawn include these:

- The fawn wandering around crying or bleating.
- The fawn has spent more

than ten hours in the same spot.

- The fawn is unresponsive or lethargic.
- The fawn has obvious injuries.
- You see evidence of a

dead doe in the area.

## Village to regulate mobile food trucks

Salado aldermen will consider the regulation of mobile food vehicles at its June 21 meeting after conducting the first reading of the Mobile Food Truck ordinance at its June 7 meeting.

Currently mobile food trucks are regulated under the itinerant vendor ordinance.

Aldermen voted in favor of the proposed Mobile Food Vehicle ordinance at its first reading with only alderman Michael Coggin voting against.

The ordinance will put in place a single permit form for Mobile Food Vendors.

The permit will include the following:

- Name of the business, its owners, physical and mailing address of business, phone, applicants photo ID.
- Description of the type of vehicle and photo of vehicle.
- Proof of state of Texas Sales Tax and Use permit.
- Address of property where food sales will occur, along with written permission from property owner.
- Site plan showing location of vehicle, parking and dining areas for customers.
- If located at one property for more than 2 hours at a time, an agreement from business owner within 150 feet allowing employees to

have use of flushable restrooms (or other facilities as approved by the Village Administrator) during hours of operation.

- A listing of all food items to be sold in the Mobile Food Vehicle.

- Certification that the vehicle to be used is properly licensed and registered by the State of Texas.

- A valid certificate issued by the Bell County Health Department.

- Certification that all employees who will be working in the Mobile Food Vehicle have valid food handler certificates.

- A certificate of insurance providing general liability insurance listing the Village of Salado as additionally insured. (A Mobile Food Vehicle permit shall be issued only for the explicit time period covered by the effective dates of the general liability insurance policy.)

The proposed ordinance will be amended before the second reading to require proof of local sales tax payments to the Village of Salado for the time periods in which sales are made in Salado for annual renewals of the permit.

The proposed eight-page ordinance includes a section of 21 rules and regulations for mobile food vendors.

The annual permit will be \$100, pro-rated to \$50 for those received after June 1.

## Count your chickens

### BoA set to adopt regulations on fowl

Salado aldermen will seek to regulate the keeping of chickens on residential properties within the Village and approved the first reading of the so-called Chicken Ordinance at its June 7 meeting.

The second reading and final approval of the ordinance is scheduled for aldermen's June 21 meeting.

No public input was given on the proposed ordinance, which is similar to other regulatory measures in neigh-

boring central Texas cities.

The ordinance will allow up to six chickens, but no roosters, on properties of one acre or less within the Village. It allows chickens to be kept on properties that are zoned Single-Family Residential District/Single-Family Home (SF-7), Single-Family Estate Residential District (SF-21), Single-Family Attached Residential District/Condos and Townhomes (SFA), or Single-Family Residential-Patio Home District (SF-PH).

Properties of more than one acre may have up to 12

chickens.

The proposed Chicken requires a \$25 annual permit. The permit requires a site plan showing the placement of a shelter for the chickens.

Enclosures must be located at least 20 feet from property lines of adjacent properties and at least 50 feet from any adjacent property's residential structure unless the subject property owner also owns the adjacent property. Such enclosures may be placed closer to an adjacent property line than the specified setback amounts, if the subject property owner also

owns the adjacent property.

Enclosures must be constructed and kept in good repair to prevent rats, mice and other rodents from being harbored in them. Feed and other items should be "protected so as to prevent rats, mice, or other rodents from gaining access to or coming into contact with them," according to the proposed ordinance.

It further requires that chickens be restricted to the fenced rear yard of properties.

## SSA warns: Medicare hospital fund could run dry in 8 years

Our dearly beloved S&P 500 Stock Index finished at 2779.03 up a very respectable 1.62 percent for the week. That raises the gain for this year so far to 3.94 percent and a far more impressive 14.28 percent for 52 weeks (one year). Two factors converged on Friday to provide the positive number. First, a general consensus arose that the trade war rhetoric was just that and no more. The "street" has it that the President will pull back from the brink and a destructive economic gunfight will not start between the U.S. and the rest of the world. The other positive was a sudden realization that oil was in shorter supply than had been previously thought and the price was likely to rise. That equates to increased potential earnings across the energy sector and triggered higher stock prices.

Speaking of oil, the American benchmark, West Texas Intermediate (WTI) hardly moved at all for the week, but mid-week it was headed down, dropping to about \$64 per barrel before rallying at the end of the week to \$65.56. In a departure from recent history, the other oil benchmark, Brent North Sea Crude, rose to \$76.34, creating an unusually large \$11 spread between the two prices, and a good boost to the stock market. Brent is now up over 18 percent for three months.

The benchmark 10-Year Treasury note closed at 2.949 percent, barely changed from last week, still indicating some worry about economic growth over the next decade. Gold finished the week at \$1,303.50, again fundamentally unmoved for the week,

but still down about 2.5 percent from three months ago.

### The Economy

The week of June 8, 2018, produced some interesting and apparently contradictory news releases. The Federal Reserve announced that as of the end of the first quarter, household wealth in the U.S. rose to a record level of over \$100 trillion with corporations holding another \$2.66 trillion on their balance sheets. At the same time, the federal debt held by the public was announced as having jumped 15.3 percent in the quarter as the spending increases and tax cuts took effect.

That good news about household net worth was released just two days after the Social Security Administration (SSA) warned that Social Security payments will exceed income this year, causing it to begin to liquidate the fund of special Treasury Securities it has been accumulating since the 1930s. In the interim years, Social Security has been funding part of the rest of the budget as it took in more money each year than it was paying out. That this reversal has arrived is no surprise, but that it did so three years earlier than expected is. The SSA also warned that the depletion of the trust fund will accelerate unless Congress acts and will be out of money in about 16 years (2034), a year earlier than was previously thought. At that point, presuming Congress does not amend the law, Social Security recipients would

receive a 25 percent cut in income. Consider too that the 2034 estimate assumes that we have no recessions between now and then; an assumption we consider to be unlikely.

In short, we Americans are collectively wealthier than we have been at any point in history, even when adjusted for inflation, but our retirement fund, upon which many Americans depend, just started down the hill to insolvency. From there, the news gets even more interesting. The SSA added the warning that the Medicare Hospital Insurance Fund will run dry in 2026, eight years from now! The problem is that there were only 2.8 workers paying into those funds for each recipient, down from 3.3 as recently as 2007. That date, too, was a year earlier than previous estimates.

In the report, the SSA noted that the plan to end the program offering young, undocumented workers relief from deportation combined with restrictions on legal immigration was an important factor in causing the funds to run dry earlier than previous projections. Without a significant increase in the number of workers or worker productivity, which has been growing very slowly, the U.S. economy is limed to about a 1.8 percent to 2 percent long-term growth rate. That is simply not fast enough growth to keep the funds solvent. The day of reckoning is coming but we Americans tend to wait for a crisis before we move.


Vehicle Inspection Test, Basic Vehicle Control Test, and Road Test

## Roseanne's Lunacy Tells Nothing About America

Valerie Jarrett, the former Obama aide targeted by Roseanne Barr, says the comedienne's train wreck should be a "teaching moment." And so it should -- about the poisonous kookery of Roseanne Barr.

Given the political freight piled atop the hit revival of her TV program, it was inevitable that Barr's spectacular Twitter flame-out would be interpreted as a portentous statement on Donald Trump's America.

Chris Hayes of MSNBC says that her "problem turned out to be that she far too authentically represented the actual worldview of a significant chunk of the Trump base." Activist Michaela Angela Davis said on CNN that Trump had enabled Barr -- a common theme on the left -- and then went all the way: Asked point-blank if all Trump voters are racist, she said, "Yes."

Nothing so perfectly encapsulates the dynamic of the Trump era than a TV show that was supposed to be a sympathetic portrayal of Trump supporters by liberal America leading -- once again -- to the ritualistic denunciation of Trump supporters by liberal America.

Barr is not a typical Trump voter just because she played one on TV. She

shares much more in common with a celebrity culture that never lacks for its share of nut jobs and toxic personalities, especially among comics. Her wild ramblings don't tell us anything about what Trump voters think, about the state of race relations in America, or about working-class culture. Her crackpot views are all her own.

Roseanne was a kook long before President Trump showed up. She maintained that Sept. 11 was "an inside Bush job." She used to call Israel a "Nazi state" and denounce "warmongering American rabbis," before turning around and calling Hillary Clinton "anti-Semitic" and Huma Abedin "a filthy Nazi whore."

Her subsequent explanations for her heinous Valerie Jarrett tweet should make it clear -- she thought Jarrett was a Saudi, or a maybe a Jewish Persian -- that this is fundamentally a story about an unhinged person advertising her lunacy on social media.

Of course, Trump gave his critics reason to associate him with Barr by calling

her to congratulate her on her show and eagerly trumpeting its success. Trump's boosterism was typical of him -- it's all about the ratings -- but also reflects an endemic weakness of the right. We have low regard for pop culture, but crave its validation. If it must come via a program that is a 1990s throwback reliant on a ticking time bomb of a star, so be it.

The genesis of the "Roseanne" revival was innocent and laudable enough. The president of Disney-ABC Television Group explained the show's inception after the 2016 election: "We looked at each other and said, 'There's a lot about the country we need to learn a lot more about, here on the coasts.'"

He was right. The appetite for the show, which partook of none of the toxicity of Roseanne's real-life personality, speaks of the hunger for more programming about Red America. Surely, there must be other vehicles for that -- assuming Hollywood doesn't internalize the critique of Roseanne Barr as a characteristic Trump voter.

The City of Aransas Pass also requires a golf cart license, according to its ordinance, and "Provide valid insurance certificate consisted with state standards for motor vehicles, and "Provide valid driver license."

The City of Buda, in a 2014 newsletter informing its citizenry of the new golf cart regulations, stated that "It is also a violation for a person to intentionally or knowingly allow an unlicensed person to operate a golf cart on a city street."

Buda further states: "Occupants shall remain seated and be three years of age or older (or in appropriate car seat)."

Most recently, the City of Wimberley -- where current Village Administrator Don Ferguson then served as City Manager -- in 2016 added new safety regulations for the operation of golf carts within its boundaries.

Those requirements, according to a July 28, 2016 news article in the News-Dispatch (Hays

County) by Bailey Buckingham are the following:

– Have a valid driver's license.

– Abide by all local and state traffic regulations.

– Use standard hand signals for turning during daylight.

– Not operate or park on sidewalks or hike/bike trails

– Not pull any object or person with golf cart/NEV

– Not exceed the seating capacity designed by the manufacturer

– Remain seated at all

times. Passengers can be issued a citation for not remaining in seat while vehicle is moving.

– Not have or permit a passenger younger than 4-years-old.

– Maintain financial responsibility as required in the Texas Transportation Code, Section 601.051 and

– Not intentionally or knowingly allow an unlicensed operator to operate the vehicle in violation of this ordinance and state law."





## Howard Payne Univ. offers accelerated masters program

Howard Payne University's School of Christian Studies offers its majors the opportunity to complete either a Master of Arts in Youth Ministry or a Master of Arts in Theology and Ministry one year after completing an undergraduate degree.

Students who have completed 75 hours of classes and have a 3.0 GPA are eligible to apply for entry to the accelerated master's program. In the accelerated program, students take 12 hours of graduate classes as a part of their undergraduate studies. These hours also count toward a 42-hour graduate degree.

Anna Lauren Jeffers is a graduate student in the program set to graduate in December 2018. She is currently serving at West University Baptist Church in Houston as the KidStuff preschool ministry director. Because of this position, she has been able to see how the program is benefitting her.

"I was able to take advantage of the opportunity to work towards my master's degree while also being surrounded and supported by professors who cared about me as a student, a person and a minister," said Jeffers. "I am able to be a better minister because of this investment."

The accelerated master's program was begun in 2012 to allow Christian studies majors to efficiently earn a graduate degree. At HPU, there is financial assistance available to graduate students in the School of Christian Studies.

"We offer a church match scholarship for grad students," said Dr. Gary Gramling, professor of Christian studies and director of graduate programs in the School of Christian Studies. "If a church gives \$100 per hour, HPU will match that."

He added that there is an additional benefit for students of the accelerated

program. Typically, graduate courses in the School of Christian Studies will include students who are currently serving as full-time ministers in churches.

"When you are in this accelerated program, you are in classes with our other grad students, so you begin to build this great network of fellow students," said Dr. Gramling. "If you can make some lifelong friends in ministry, they will be a wonderful network of encouragement and support to you in the days to come."

Another important feature is the focus of the Christian studies faculty, staff and students.

"This is the part in the journey where students get to come and be prepared for what it is God is calling them to do," said Dr. Gramling. "We do not want you to major in Christian studies unless you sense God has put it in your heart to do that. That is a great thing for us though because we

get to welcome in men and women who feel called by God to a certain ministry vocation."

Jeffers noted the ways her classes in the accelerated program have taught her and encouraged growth.

"I learned valuable lessons in the classroom that challenged me to think deeper and grow in knowledge," she said. "I also learned equally important lessons out of the classroom about serving and loving people by watching the professors at HPU embody their teaching."

Applications are being accepted for the fall 2018 semester at Howard Payne University (www.hputx.edu/apply). HPU offers a variety of financial aid options, including scholarships for students from Brown County and surrounding counties. On June 6, Salado Church of Christ began a two-month summer speaker series for Wednesday evenings entitled, "Summer With the Disciplines."


The intent is to have a different spiritual discipline expounded on each week.

### CTAS Star Party June 16 at Overlook Park

The Central Texas Astronomical Society (CTAS) will host a public star party, 8:45 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. on June 16. The free event will be held at Overlook Park near the Stillhouse Hollow. CTAS members will provide telescopes for public viewing. Guests are welcome to bring their own telescopes or binoculars. In June, we are able to see in the north NGC 457 (The Owl Cluster) and NGC 663 in Cassiopeia as well as the Double Cluster in Perseus. More open clusters are becoming visible in the south-eastern sky as Ophiuchus rises. These include Melotte 186, NGC 6633 and IC 4665, all of which are easily visible in 50mm binoculars. Venus is still the evening star and is easily visible in the west even before the sun sets. Check [centexastronomy.org](http://centexastronomy.org) for directions to the site. If the event is canceled due to weather, a notice will be posted online by 5 p.m. Participants may want to bring a small flashlight (preferably with a red filter) to get around the parking lot and viewing area and a lawn chair to make viewing more comfortable.

## Capt. Halley returns from Civil War, builds new house on Main St. in 1869

RECAP: CAPT. ROBERT B. HALLEY AND HIS WIFE LYDIA MOVED TO TEXAS IN 1853, SETTLING NEAR SAN ANTONIO. IN 1855 THEY MOVED TO THE SALADO AREA, SETTLING IN A NEIGHBORHOOD OF WHAT IS NOW PRAIRIE DELL. IN 1859, HALLEY BOUGHT LOTS ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF SALADO CREEK, BUILT A LOG HOUSE, AND MOVED HIS FAMILY INTO THE VILLAGE OF SALADO. WITH THE OUTBREAK OF THE CIVIL WAR, HALLEY JOINED THE CONFEDERATE STATES ARMY IN NOVEMBER 1862 AND SERVED IN THE TEXAS CAVALRY UNTIL THE END OF THE WAR IN APRIL 1865.


By the time the Civil War was over, Capt. Halley had been gone from home for over three years.

When he returned home, he was ready to resume his pre-war life, but his wife had something else in mind. She was ready for a new house. Granddaughter Eugenia Halley Smith surmises, "That at this time Grandma went back to Arkansas and would not return until a house was built for her." Halley, being a smart wise man, responded to this situation by constructing a beautiful two-story plantation style house on the main street of Salado. Lydia returned to Salado and all was well.

Their new home became known as the Halley House and was noted for its symmetrical design and double porches, one above the other, on the front of the house facing Main Street. When the house was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1983, the architectural style of the house was given as Mid-19th Century Revival, and even though 1860 was given as the year of construction, Halley family records give 1869 as the year of construction.<sup>2</sup> The house was grand in its appearance and some said that in grace and style it was comparable to Col. E.S.C. Robertson's recently constructed plantation home.

Eugenia Halley Smith wrote that the house was built in 1869 with lumber hauled from Cameron by wagon. She also wrote that, "One of the downstairs rooms was the parlor, the other my grandparents' bedroom. The two front rooms upstairs were the girls' rooms. The "L" room upstairs was the boys' room. The furniture for the house was bought in New Orleans and was left in the house when my grandmother moved from there, as it was too big for the house which she moved to."<sup>3</sup>

With a new house and a happy wife, Halley was

able to resume stock farming and continue as a leader of his community. Halley, being civic minded, was a petitioner for the Dispensation and Charter for the Salado Masonic Lodge, which received its charter on June 13, 1867.<sup>4</sup>

In 1872, Capt. Halley was elected Sheriff of Bell County.<sup>5</sup> During the years following the Civil War, law and order had not yet been firmly established in the frontier counties of Texas, including Bell County. Robbers, murderers, thieves, and ex-convicts found that the cedar brakes, and the brushy creek banks, and caves scattered throughout the county made excellent hide outs.

Capt. Halley and his deputies were diligent about their work and methodically brought many of these desperadoes to justice. At one time there were ten of these villains and gangsters in the old Bell County jail on N. Pearl Street in Belton. While Sheriff Halley was away on official business, at about 1:30 in the morning on May 25, 1874, a mob of vigilantes rode into town on horseback, proceeded directly to the jail, overpowered the guards, broke into the jail, and shot nine of the prisoners dead while they were still locked in their jail cells. The tenth man, Tyre Thompson, lay sick on a cot in an adjoining room and was overlooked by the mob.

One of the murdered prisoners, W. L. Coleman, from Coryell county, who was considered a wife-murderer, had been brought to the Bell County jail for safekeeping. Coleman was first arrested by citizens, who had tied him to a tree, and were about to roast him

alive, when he was rescued by the Sheriff and a posse. It seems as if the citizens were determined to make an example of Coleman. Some speculate that the shooting of the prisoners was related to the rumor that 18 horse thieves had been hung on the San Saba River near San Saba the night before.<sup>6</sup>

The shooting of the prisoners was of course an unlawful, regrettable act. But it did send a message - don't mess with Bell County.<sup>7</sup> Thompson later stood trial for horse-stealing and got a life sentence.<sup>8</sup>

October 4, 1875 was a memorable yet sad day for the Halley family. Capt. Halley died suddenly and quite unexpectedly. A Waco newspaper reported that Capt. R. B. Halley, Sheriff of Bell County, died at his residence in Salado, last Monday morning.<sup>9</sup> He was buried the next day at 11:00 a.m. Even though rain was falling, a large number of people assembled at his home and followed his remains to the grave site in the Salado Cemetery. The funeral rites were performed by the Masonic fraternity. As his bewildered children stood gazing into the grave of their father, the Masons marched around his grave singing their last farewell song. Tears flowed freely for his bereaved family and in tribute for the man who was so well-respected.

After her husband's burial, Lydia and her children returned to the big empty house on Main Street to resume their lives without a husband and father. Even though Halley's death had left a deep void, Lydia and the children pressed onward.

Lydia lived in the home

for 20 years after her husband's death. In 1927 at the age of 96, she was approved for a Confederate Widow's Pension.<sup>10</sup> She was living at 3709 Haynie Avenue in Dallas, Texas, having moved there in the fall of 1895 to make her home with daughters Emma and Mimmie. Mrs. Halley continued to own the family home in Salado until 1908 at which time it was sold. Lydia Ederington Halley entered into eternal rest on December 7, 1927 at the age of 96.<sup>11</sup> She was buried in the Oakland Cemetery in Dallas, Texas.

Former local historian, author, and personal friend of the Halleys, Felda Davis Shanklin once described Lydia's side of the family as "tall, large people with strong constitutions."<sup>12</sup> Perhaps it was Lydia Ederington Halley's strong constitution that enabled her to live on the Texas frontier when the state was young and unsettled. She married at age 19, bore eight children, became a widow at age 44, and outlived her husband by 53 years. There were five young children in the home when Halley rode off to serve in the Confederate Army. She reared these children as well as taking in boarders to support her family during her husband's almost four-year absence, and after his untimely death.

The Halley House seems to have been built with a strong constitution also. Almost 150 years after it was built, it stands today at its original location at 681 N. Main St., Salado, Texas next to the Salado Civic Center, commonly known as the red






The name of Shri D.V. Gore may not strike a responsive chord, but Mr. Gore has earned a niche in the Bridge Hall of Fame as the result of an unusual play he made in a tournament staged many years ago in Calcutta. The hand was published in the Indian Bridge World Magazine.

Gore was East, defending against four hearts. West led the ace of clubs, a very fortunate choice for his side, and then shifted to a trump. Declarer won the trick in dummy and returned a spade, losing the nine to West's ten.

West led another trump, and it was on this trick that Gore made his extraordinary play: He discarded the ace of

As a result, South had to go down one, as there was no way for him to avoid losing


two more spade tricks. When he next led another spade from dummy, West won with the jack, removed dummy's last trump and eventually scored the setting trick with the king of spades.

To appreciate the effect of Gore's play, let's suppose he had made the more prosaic discard of a diamond or a club on the second trump lead.

In that case, Gore would have been forced to win the next spade lead with the ace. Regardless of what he then returned, South would be able to ruff a spade in dummy and so make the contract.


Gore realized that the ace of spades was a liability as long as it remained in his hand, and he therefore got rid of it in a hurry. He knew from declarer's first spade play that his partner was practically certain to have either the K-J-10 or K-Q-10, since declarer would surely have played a higher spade than the nine if he had held the K-Q, K-J or Q-J.

# White-lined Sphinx Moths love nectar

As an avid nature-lover, it always surprises me when I am making an observation of an animal only to find out that it is in actuality something totally different. However, I am not too embarrassed to admit this has happened a few times when I have been watching what I thought to be a hummingbird was in fact, a large species of nectar-feeding moth. This species has fooled many folks though; so much so that it is often referred to as the “hummingbird moth”.

The White-lined Sphinx Moth (*Hyles lineata*) is one of the larger and most commonly observed moths that inhabit west Texas. It can be observed throughout the entire state as well as throughout the continental United States, southern Canada and northern Mexico. It thrives in areas with nectar-rich plants such as willows, mimosas, and four o'clocks. Due to the fact that many of these plants are utilized in landscaping projects, this moth species is often seen in close proximity to households.

The White-lined Sphinx Moth is a colorfully marked species that many people find quite attractive. The forewings are dark brown

and have a light tan front edge as well as a wider tan stripe that runs diagonal from the body almost to the tip of the wing. The veins on the wing are highlighted with white, giving this species its common name. The hindwing has a bright pink stripe that is bordered by dark brown stripes on either side. The head and thorax are brown with a series of white lines while the abdomen is tan with a white stripe down the middle that separates a series of black dots. Adults of this species attain a maximum wingspan of just over 3 inches.

White-lined Sphinx Moths, like other butterfly and moth species, undergo a four-stage life cycle that can be described as nothing short of miraculous. In the beginning stage, their life begins as an egg, which hatches after a few short days into the next stage. Upon hatching, the larvae are known as caterpillars, and at this stage, the growth rate is highly accelerated. Sphinx Moth caterpillars are typically lime-green and are adorned with a series of

black-bordered yellow or orange dots on either side of the back. There is also a smaller row of black spots just above the legs as well as a pointed horn on the backside. Caterpillars can eat twice their body weight in a single day, and as such, they literally grow out of their skins, and they shed their outer layer of skin up to five times (known as molting) before they enter the next stage of their life cycle. After the caterpillar finds a spot in which it feels is secure, typically underground in loose soil, it will pupate as it forms a protective shell about it known as a chrysalis. Inside of this shell, the larvae changes into the moth that it will soon become. After two or three weeks, the adult will emerge from this shell with its wings intact, although they are crumpled into small balls on the sides of the body. The moth will then pump a clear fluid into the veins of their wings, causing them to expand much the same way a stick can reinforce a kite.

Upon reaching maturity, the White-lined Sphinx Moth will immediately begin searching for food, water and a mate. After mating, the males will continue their search for other receptive females, while the

females will begin to look for a site suitable to lay eggs so a brand-new life cycle can begin.

Looking for this species is not usually very difficult. It prefers to feed at dusk and dawn, but occasional-

ly it will be active during the middle of the day. The adults are attracted to plants that bear nectar, so landscaping your yard with mimosa, willow, petunias and honeysuckle should bring this fabulous species to you.
