



Village begins update of its 14-year-old Comprehensive Plan

Salado's Comprehensive Plan committee began a paragraph by paragraph review of the 98 page document at their second meeting on Oct. 2.

The group, composed of alderman Frank Coachman and community members Jim Lassiter, Kim Bird, Ted Williamson, Melanie Kirchmeier, Cathy Sands and Larry Roberson, will meet weekly to update the 14-year-old document before it is presented to the board of aldermen.

A series of about 10 meetings are planned for Tuesdays at 5:30 p.m. with agendas posted 72 hours beforehand to meet open records law.

The group reviewed two parts of the document and made very few changes. Most of the changes will come from staff when they update the Land Use calculations and percentages and accompanying maps.

The Comprehensive Plan is a policy guide, but it is not a legal guide for city staff. It services two purposes: Part 1: The Foundation; Part 2: The Guiding Principles; Part 3: The Future Land Use Plan; Part 4: The Transportation Plan; Part 5: The Parks & Recreation Plan; Part 6: The Public Facilities Plan; Part 7: Historic Preservation Strategies; Part 8: Corridor Design Studies; Part 9: Community Livability Guidelines; Part 10: The Economic Development Plan.

While the Comprehensive Plan is not a legal guide, the other documents that stemmed from it, including

the Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Ordinance, Zoning Map, Sign Ordinance are legal documents for the Village.

Part 2: The Guiding Principles outlines eight principles:

1. Provide opportunities for coordinated, well-planned growth and development within the Village of Salado and its extra-territorial jurisdiction while maintaining and enhancing the Village's heritage and character;

2. Provide a balanced transportation system that is coordinated with existing roads and with plans for future growth; this system should be economical and responsive to environmental concerns.

3. Ensure that adequate parks and open spaces are provided as the Village continues to grow.

4. Ensure that the needs of existing and future residents and businesses within Salado are adequately served.

5. Ensure that the Village of Salado's past is preserved, maintained and honored when making decisions regarding the Village's future.

6. Ensure that a positive image of the Village of Salado is projected within its major corridors.

7. Ensure that as the Village of Salado experiences growth and development, its existing character and charm is maintained and enhanced.

8. Ensure that economic development opportunities are pursued in order to provide the Village with a solid fiscal outlook as future growth and development occurs.

P&Z considers property requests, discusses zoning private/public recreation

Salado Planning and Zoning Commission met on Oct. 3 to consider two requests from property owners and to discuss additional designations to the Zoning Ordinance. The meeting was called after the board failed to have a quorum on Sept. 25.

The meeting was held after press time for this print edition. P&Z members met at 4 p.m. Oct. 3 at the Municipal Building for the short agenda.

Tyler Fletcher at 945 N. Main St. is seeking permission to add on to the residential portion of his building. Fletcher provided three pages of drawings and paperwork for the addition, which will be cedar with a metal roof to match the existing structure. Windows and doors will be selected from the applicant's supply of "antique" doors and windows.

Barrow Brewing Co. is asking to place an auxiliary building on the northeast portion of their property.

Permission for any new construction, signs, additions to buildings, auxiliary buildings or demolitions in the Historic District must be given by the P&Z Commission before building or sign permits can be issued.

P&Z alternate GeorgeAnn Valentine resigned her position before the Sept. 25 meeting and no new alternate has been appointed to the board.

Village administrator Don Ferguson was scheduled to give a report on the zoning of recreational properties in the Village.

The Village has no Parks or Public Recreation Zoning Districts in the Zoning Ordinance.

However, in the Land Use section of the Zoning Ordinance, it has "Park And/OR Playground (Private or Public) as a Permitted Use for all six Residential Zoning Districts and all seven Non-Residential Zoning Districts.

The Zoning Ordinance allows for Golf Course Land Use under Conditional Permits in all Residential and Non-Residential Zoning District.

The ordinance defines Golf Course as "Golf Course (Public/Private): An area of twenty (20) acres or more improved with trees, greens, fairways, hazards, and which may include clubhouses."

The P&Z Commission will hold a public hearing 4 p.m. Oct. 23 for a conditional use permit to allow for the use of metal siding on a residential building on property zoned Single Family Residential (SF-7) located at 2919 Chisholm Trail in Salado, Bell County, Texas. Upon recommendation of the Planning & Zoning Commission, the Village Board of Aldermen will also hold a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 1 at the Municipal Building. Comments on this request from any member of the public may be presented in person, by mail (P.O. Box 219), or by email (clee@saladotx.gov). The public will be granted an opportunity to speak at the hearings. Additional information concerning the proposed action is available for review at the Village of Salado Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Road, Salado, Texas.

Feds raise short-term rates, will continue hikes in 2019

The Markets

Our dear old S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed over the week, and the quarter, at 2913.98 having lost 0.54 percent for the week. It is still up 8.99 percent year-to-date, and 15.66 percent for one year but those gains are fading as we draw nearer to the end of 2018. The stock market is up based on hopes for higher than expected earnings reports for the third quarter (which just ended). If those above-expected earnings do not materialize things could get rough.

The U.S. Treasury 10-year note yield climbed to 3.102 percent Wednesday before slipping back to 3.05 percent by the end of the day on Friday. With the two-year note at 2.96 percent, that leaves the yield curve flatter than it has been since 2007. 30-yr mortgage rates are up to an average of 4.74 percent from 3.38 percent last year and car loans are up a like amount to around 4 percent. Gold continued its slump, dropping 0.67 percent and is now down over 10 percent year-to-date at \$1,195.30. U.S. Oil headed in the opposite direction, up nearly 4 percent for the week to close at \$73.55 as North Sea Brent oil closed over \$80 per barrel.

The Economy

The Federal Reserve raised short-term interest rates again, targeting a range between 2 percent and 2.25 percent. More importantly, the Fed signaled that it planned to raise rates a quarter percent in December and at least three times next year. The cumulative increases would put the overnight interbank rate at

3.25 percent, higher than the current yield on the 10-year Treasury note. Unless longer-term rates rise significantly, we would then see the dreaded inverted interest rate curve. If longer-term rates rise, the cost of borrowing will dramatically increase, as will the cost of the national debt.

Year-over-year inflation as measured by the personal-consumption-expenditures price index (PCE) was up 2.2 percent in August, but wages and consumer expenditures were up 0.3 percent for an annualized rate of 3.6 percent. That spending increase was impressive but less than we saw in the second quarter. At the same time, and in its usual correlated fashion, forecasts for the third quarter GDP growth were uniformly below the 4.2 percent final estimate for the second quarter and ranged from a low of about 2.8 percent to a high of about 3.6 percent.

There were reasons for the high GDP number in the second quarter and for lower numbers now. First, there was a surge in exports as farmers in the second quarter rushed to get their crops out before the tariffs kicked in. Second, the tax law change generated a rush of investment in new equipment as it became immediately tax-deductible. Those elements have deteriorated in the third quarter and appear to be still dropping as we enter the fourth. In the second quarter housing building and sales initially surged, but then interest

rates rose, tariffs began to raise material costs and the labor shortage began to have an effect. House building and sales are now slowing. With the rise in the dollar, imports are cheaper, and the trade imbalance is getting more severe. Ironically, the tariffs are increasing imports and decreasing exports.

At the same time, it is important to note that expansions do not end without warning. September's Conference Board Index of Leading Economic Indicators increased 0.4 percent in August. That is not as much as it increased in earlier months, but as long as the index is headed up we have an historically high probability of at least six and likely twelve months ahead without a recession. The Conference Board's Chief Economist is predicting a 3 percent GDP growth for 2018 but dropping to 2.3 percent by the end of 2019. 2020 is still an unknown, but a consensus among economists has developed suggesting a recession in 2020 is a strong possibility.

In short, we continue to be in an economic expansion that is running at a higher than sustainable rate and will slow in the future and eventually terminate in a recession. The key is to not get carried away by the good news and be like the ant, setting aside reserves for the downturn in a few years and not like the grasshopper who consumed all he made in the good times.



Kavanaugh Assault Validates Trump

The attempted political assassination of Brett Kavanaugh is bad for the country, but good for a Trumpian attitude toward American politics.

The last-minute ambush validates key assumptions of Donald Trump's supporters that fueled his rise and buttress him in office, no matter how rocky the ride has been or will become. At least three premises have been underlined by tawdry events of the past weeks.

First, that good character is no defense. If you are John McCain, who genuinely tried to do the right thing and carefully cultivated a relationship with the media over decades, they will still call you a racist when you run against Barack Obama.

If you are Mitt Romney, an exceptionally earnest and decent man, they will make you into a heartless and despicable vulture capitalist, also for the offense of campaigning against Obama.

If you are Brett Kavanaugh, a respected member of the legal establishment who doesn't have a flyspeck on his record across decades of public service in Washington, they will come up with dubious accusations of wrongdoing from decades ago when you were a teenager.

Second, that the media is an unremitting political and

cultural adversary. In the Kavanaugh controversy, the press has been wholly on the other side, presuming his guilt and valorizing his accusers and their supporters, including Hawaii Sen. Mazie Hirono, whose most famous contribution to the debate was telling men to "shut up."

Third, that politics isn't just rough-and-tumble; it's red in tooth and claw. Process and norms are nice, but they go out the window as soon as something important is at stake, like a potential fifth vote on the Supreme Court to overturn Roe v. Wade.

Senate Democrats may delicately talk about the importance of norms and civility on Sunday shows, but watch how they act. They sat on an accusation throughout an extensive process of vetting and questioning a nominee, then declared it dispositive evidence against his confirmation when it leaked at the 11th hour. They delayed a hearing with Christine Blasey Ford long enough to allow time for the second accuser to be persuaded to come forward.

All of this plays into Trump's support. Surely, a reason that the president appealed to many Republicans in the first place, despite his extravagant personal failings, was that they had decided that virtuous men would get smeared and chewed up by the opposition's meat grinder, so why be a stickler for standards?

If Trump's attacks against the media are over-the-top and sometimes disgraceful, at least he understands the score.

He may not be a constitutionalist, but he will be faithful to his own side, and fiercely battle it out with his political opponents.

The logic of this dynamic is risky. It can be self-defeating, and lead down the road of supporting, say, a Roy Moore, a kooky candidate doomed even in red Alabama. It can be corrupting, if character and standards are no longer considered important. But the dark view of our politics that has driven the Trump phenomenon for three years now is impossible to gainsay. Who can watch the frenzied assault on Brett Kavanaugh and say that it's wrong?

The National Mounted Warfare Foundation is building a world-class museum in the heart of Texas next to Fort Hood to honor our mounted soldiers and to tell their untold story. The Austin Tinplate Trackers model railroad enthusiasts will have a display at the Salado Church of Christ Activities Center Oct. 6-7.

The display is free to the public and children will have the chance to operate the model trains (with assistance from the Tin-

plate Trackers, of course). The display will be open 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 6 and noon-4 p.m. Oct. 7.

The Tinplate Trackers of Austin, Texas is a 3-rail O-Gauge Model Train Club located in the Austin area. The club participates in a number of model railroad-ing activities and events in

Central Texas.

Membership is open to anyone having interest in Trains. Their website is constantly being updated so check back frequently.

The Tinplate Trackers are people who enjoy the operation of O-gauge tinsplate trains on modules that are basically standardized,

yet open to unlimited improvisation. The largest layout created by members was 40 feet by 60 feet.

Tinplate refers to toy trains and track — such as American Flyer, Marx and Lionel -- built before World War II, when they were actually made of metal. However, toy trains built today are mostly plastic but the tinplate rails still remain. Tinplate trains are larger than most scale model trains and are lots of fun.

A module is a unit, a short section of railroad, built to standard specifications so that it can be joined with other such units to form an oval layout. It is distinguished from a sectional layout, used by many clubs, which is made up of a number of units which assemble in only one way. The Tinplate Tracker modules, made in a few basic types, can be assembled in many different ways.

South ruffing with the ace of diamonds. Declarer next plays the king of trumps, on which East shows out. It is only trick three, but South already knows a great deal about the unseen hands. He knows that West started with exactly one spade and four diamonds, and also knows from the bidding that West has five or more hearts headed by the ace and most likely the jack.

At least 10 of West's cards are consequently known to be lodged in three suits, which is merely a different way of saying that West has at most three clubs. All declarer has to do now is to take advantage of this knowledge. He should realize that if he simply draws trumps and then plays a low heart to the queen, he will very likely lose two heart tricks and go down one.

To stop this from occurring, he should cash the A-K of clubs, then lead a low trump to the ten and ruff a club. This eliminates West's clubs.

South next draws West's last two trumps, reducing all hands to four cards, and plays the king of hearts. West, with only the A-J-9-8 of hearts left, must win with the ace and return a heart, allowing declarer to score the ten. If West doesn't take the first heart, he makes South's task even easier.







Removing dead trees threatens habitat for Eastern Bluebirds

The Eastern Bluebird (*Sialia sialis*) is one of three varieties of this genus that call Texas home, and its range in this state is by far more encompassing than the other two. Year-round, this species may be observed east of an imaginary line that extends from Wichita Falls to Corpus Christi eastward to the Atlantic Seaboard. Only during the winter season does it occur throughout the remainder of Texas, including the Panhandle, Trans-Pecos,

Edwards Plateau and south Texas. As a migratory species, these individuals spend their summers north of the Red River to southern Canada and eastward to the colonial states.

Adult males of this gregarious bird are quite conspicuous with their colorful adornment of bright indigo-blue upperparts, head, wings and tail. Couple that with a reddish-brown chin and throat along with a white belly and you can immediately see why it is referred to as one of the most attractive songbirds in North America. Females look like the males, differing only in having a gray coloration on the upperparts and the presence of a white eye ring. Juveniles are decorated with blue only on the tail and wings and have a brown breast with white half-circles. It is a small bird, with a body length of about 7 inches and a wingspan that can approach 13 inches.

Eastern Bluebirds are one of the most gregarious and yet many times unnoticed of all the avian species that oc-

cur in this area. The male's call sounds like a repetitive true-a-ly while the normal call is a pleasing chur-chur-lee chur-lee. It can often be seen darting from a low perch to the ground as it hops around in search of food items which include arthropods such as insects, spiders, earthworms and snails. It also will also feed on small frogs and even lizards. During the winter months, its diet changes to a primarily fruit and grain diet as it dines on berries and seeds. When flying, the flight pattern is easily recognizable as it is a straight path with shallow wing beats.

These birds typically prefer to live in large social groups during the non-breeding season. During the breeding season, they known to pair up with the male and female remaining monogamous during such time. The nest is constructed by the female and made from grass, pine needles and other debris. Typically, this nest is built in natural hollows in dead trees and stumps, as well as in aban-

doned woodpecker holes. The 2 to 7 eggs are small (roughly 3/4 inch x 1/2 inch) and are usually colored light blue or are all white. These eggs hatch in about two weeks after being incubated by the female, and both parents share the responsibility of care-giving to the helpless young until they leave the nest approximately three weeks after hatching. Up to three broods per year have been recorded.

This avian species can best be described as a lover of warm weather. Populations have been decimated in areas of the South following spells of severe cold. Additionally, many nesting sites have been eradicated by the cutting down of dead trees and even from other varieties of birds that will "bully" this species for a prime nesting area. Given all of that, the Eastern Bluebird can still be quite common in many areas, and people setting up bird boxes with predator guarding platforms has been a tremendous benefit throughout the areas where this species occurs. Attract and enjoy this species to your backyard feeders by utilizing commercial bluebird seed mixes as well as a peanut butter-cornmeal mixture.


