Tourism launches marketing effort

Salado Tourism recently signed a year-long contract for the lease of two digital billboards, spending uncommitted advertising dollars from the 2018 fiscal year for the \$900 per month expense.

Tourism has Salado contracted for southbound billboards in McClennan County and in Williamson County (Jarrell) for \$450 each per month.

Tourism director Chadley Hollas told members of the Tourism Advisory Board at their Sept. 27 meeting that the rotating billboard ads could be updated in real time to reflect upcoming events and to partner with local businesses that are producing their own events, such as the upcoming Salado Bourbon Excursion at Alexander's Distillery and Inn on the Creek and the upcoming Barton House Wine & Food Experience.

The Tourism department is developing a process and policy for the advertising partnership for the digital billboards. The Tourism office will work with local businesses in scheduling and planning the partnered ads.

Other billboard ads in the rotation schedule will include branding images to bring Salado as a destination to people's minds.

"The goal is not to get them to pull off the highway right now," he said, but to think about Salado as a weekend or weekday getaway.

The digital billboards each have six slots per minute with 10 seconds each during that minute. The digital ads could be the same each time or combinations, depending upon the adver-

"This gives us the opportunity to change the billboards," Hollas said, "whereas static billboards are very costly to change."

"For the first time ever, tourism has the ability to in real time update a variety of billboard campaigns with the strategic purpose of

promoting the Salado brand and encouraging overnight stays," said Will Lowery, chairman of the Tourism Advisory board that has met weekly with Tourism Director Chadley Hollas for the past three months to develop a marketing and advertising

In addition to the billboard advertising, Salado Tourism will spend \$70,000 for marketing and advertising in the 2019 fiscal year, including a \$25,000 contract with AJR Media for electronic media work that began in August and continues through August 2019.

The contract with AJR Media is for \$8,000 for behavioral, contextual, channel specific, site remarketing (Display website advertising); \$10,000 for native website advertising for two articles that include image, copy and logo and \$7,000 for Facebook and Instagram advertising.

Tourism is also contracting with Breaking Record Media for updating and posting to its own social media channels.

The Tourism department will launch a Visit Salado smart phone app as well as the launch of a new tourism website visitsaladotexas.com in the coming weeks.

The Visit Salado app will work across Android and iOS systems. It will provide wayfinding via a completely customized map.


All tourism associated business will have the opportunity to be part of the 'Visit Salado App' platform, and existing members of the Salado Chamber of Commerce will automatically have their basic business information within the app.

The \$70,000 marketing and advertising expense is a third of the total Hotel Occupancy Tax budget of \$217,000 approved by aldermen in September. The budget increases occupancy taxes from \$160,000 to \$210,000.

It anticipates \$100,851 in personnel expenses, \$24,588 for lease expenses and \$70,000 for marketing.

P&Z approves requests in HD

Salado Planning & Zoning Commission took less than 15 minutes to approve two requests by property owners in the Historic District on Oct. 3.

The commission approved a request by Tyler Fletcher at 945 N. Main St. to add on to the residential portion of his building. The addition will be cedar with a metal roof to match the existing structure. Windows and doors will be selected from the applicant's supply of "antique" doors and windows.

The commission also approved a request by Barrow Brewing Co. to place an auxiliary building on the northeast portion of their property.

Barrow Brewing Co. is asking to place an auxiliary building on the northeast portion of their property. The owners, Graydon and KD Hill, provided specifications of the pre-built building from the manufacturer.

Permission for any new construction, signs, additions to buildings, auxiliary buildings or demolitions in the Historic District must be given by the P&Z Commission before building or sign permits can be issued.

P&Z alternate GeorgeAnn Valentine resigned her position before the Sept. 25 meeting and no new alternate has been appointed to the board..

The P&Z commission also heard a short announcement from village administrator on zoning of recreational properties in the Village to reflect the recommendations set forth in the Village Comprehensive

The P&Z Commission will hold a public hearing 4 p.m. Oct. 23 for a conditional use permit to allow for the use of metal siding on a residential building on property zoned Single Family Residential (SF-7) located at 2919 Chisholm Trail in Salado.

Upon recommendation of the P&Z Commission, the Village Board of Aldermen will also hold a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 1 at the Municipal Building.

Irrational exuberance?

The Markets

The stock market, as represented by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), nosed down to 2885.57 closing the first week of the fourth quarter down 0.97 percent. It has struggled to rise to the record it set in mid-September or to do much better than where it was in late January but seems to hit a wall each time. To provide some context, the record high SPX close on January 26 was 2872.87, meaning that last week the SPX was only 0.44 percent higher than it was in the first month of the year. It is easy to read or hear the news that the market is at or near a record high level and miss the fact that it hasn't risen much at all this year. The Index remains up a very respectable 13 percent from this time last year.

There is a factor in the market rise over the last year that may merit some serious attention. Fundamentally, stocks fall into categories measured by two characteristics. The first is size. There are large companies, mid-sized companies, and small companies represented in the U.S. stock markets, otherwise known as, "large-cap", "mid-cap", "small-cap". The second characteristic is based on whether the price of the stock of a company is based on the underlying value of its assets or alternatively, based on the anticipated future growth of the company's profits or "earnings." Over the long-term, value stocks have outperformed growth stocks, and smallcap value stocks have done the best of all.

Historically, at the tail end of a bull market, growth stocks tend to take off and

value stocks get left behind. That appears to be happening now. Unfortunately, those "growth" stocks have a historic tendency to come crashing back to reality with little or no notice while the value stocks tend to better hold on to their gains. To illustrate how upside down this market is, so far this year, the Dow Jones largecap growth index is up 13.5 percent while the historically best performing domestic stock index, the Dow Small Cap Value Index, is down 0.9 percent.

The last time this size and value inversion was this severe was in the late 1990s, described famously by Fed Chairman Greenspan as a time of "irrational exuberance." Two years later the bear market of 2000-2002 was in full swing as growth stocks gave up their gains, declining as much as 80 percent in two years. Is this a repeat of that? Only time will tell, but the similarities

are worth watching. The 10-year U.S. Treasury note closed on Friday yielding 3.230 percent, a dramatic rise in the past few weeks. Gold rose 0.88 percent to \$1,206.70 but is still down about 9 percent this year. Oil rose 0.99 percent to \$74.29 and is now up 42 percent from a year ago.

The Economy

The U.S. economy is on a tear, and from the market reaction this week, one that may be a bit over the top. The Labor Department announced on Friday that the U.S. unemployment rate fell

to 3.7 percent in September, the lowest rate since December of 1969. Wages are up 2.8 percent from last September and net employment has grown now for 96 months, the longest period since records have been kept. Ironically, it was the unemployment and labor reports that were given credit for the market declines.

Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell in a speech noted that we are seeing a "Remarkably positive set of economic circumstances." When asked how long this economic good news could continue, he replied, "...effectively indefinitely." Upon reading that quote, our alarm flags went up. One of the more reliable hallmarks of the late stages of an economic expansion or a bull market is when one hears or reads "this could go on forever" or words to that effect.

In a bit of news that illustrates to us why the trade balance is really a non-issue, the Chinese government announced it would be selling \$3 billion worth of dollar-denominated Chinese bonds. Note that this is not a sale of U.S. Treasury bonds, but new bonds (borrowing) by the Chinese government on which they are asking investors to purchase Chinese bonds using U.S. dollars and promises to pay the interest in dollars and then return the principal in dollars at maturity. The backing for the Chinese currency is primarily its dollar holdings.

Atticus Finch Was on the Wrong Side

It's time for "To Kill a Mockingbird" to give up its treasured place in American

The 1960 novel by Harper Lee was published to instant acclaim, has sold more than 30 million copies and is ubiquitous in high school curricula. The 1962 movie version, starring Gregory Peck, is a classic in itself and won three Academy

Awards. But nothing is forever, even for a book commonly called "timeless." Lee's novel is deeply out of sympathy with a moment when on college campuses, and in the culture more broadly, due process isn't what it used to be, when it is often thought to be a hateful act to insist that allegations of sexual misconduct be proven.

A refresher on the story: The setting is Depression-era Alabama. Smalltown lawyer Atticus Finch (played by Peck in the movie) is unpopular in town because he has decided to take on the defense of a black man named Tom Robinson who is accused of rape by a young white woman.

And this is where the story, in contemporary terms, goes off the rails. Atticus Finch didn't #BelieveAll-Women. He didn't take an accusation at face value. He defended an alleged rapist, vigorously and un-



remittingly, making use of every opportunity provided to him by the norms of the Anglo-American system of justice. He did it despite considerable social pressure to simply believe the accus-

In a gripping courtroom scene, Finch cross-examines Mayella Ewell, the 19-year-old daughter of an abusive drunk from a dirtpoor family who is Robinson's accuser. With all the vehemence and emotion she can muster, Ewell insists that Robinson attacked her at her house.

Without mercy, Finch takes apart her account. In contemporary internet argot, he "destroys" her. He brushes right by her tears. He doesn't care about her feelings, only the facts. He exposes contradictions in her story and shreds her credibility, especially with the dramatic revelation that Robinson doesn't have use of his left arm when he stands up at the defense table (he is alleged to have hit her with his left hand).

It is revealed that Ewell is lying. She had made an advance on Robinson and gotten caught by her vicious,

racist father. The charge of rape against Robinson was a cover story, although the bigoted jury convicts him anyway.

"To Kill a Mockingbird" stands firmly for the proposition that an accusation can be false, that unpopular defendants presumed guilty must and should be defended, and that it is admirable and brave to withstand the crowd when it wants to cast aside the normal protections of justice.

Exactly what has made Atticus Finch such an honored figure in our culture would make him a very inconvenient man at many college campuses today, where charges of sexual misconduct are adjudicated without the accused being allowed to confront the accuser or make use of other key features of our system of justice. He didn't believe that someone being accused of something is enough to establish his wrongdoing.

Atticus Finch is not the man for this moment, but we need him, and his reasoned yet unshakable commitment to fairness and justice, more than ever.

I'm Not a Job Creator

Last year, Republicans unilaterally passed tax cuts that disproportionately benefited the wealthy and corporations. By giving tax cuts to wealthy Americans, particularly investors, Republicans claimed their tax bill would lead to substantial job and wage growth. Unsurprisingly, this has not happened. As an investor myself, I can tell you why: it's because I'm not a job creator.

For decades, conservatives have credited the investor class with job growth, but the truth is that they've done so simply to justify giving the wealthy a tax cut. The truth is that even though I am an investor, I'm no more a job creator than any other consumer. Our economy is 70% consumer driven, meaning that the vast majority of American jobs only exist because regular people go out and spend their money on things that they want and need, not because rich investors like me put our money in the stock market. When, as a consumer, I get in line to buy my iPhone I am as much a job creator as the person in front of me, regardless of the many millions I may have invested in

Some may argue that large employers like Apple could not exist, or employ

anyone, without investments from people like me, but that's not really true either. Companies like Apple only exist if consumers buy their goods and services. For example, if the next five iPhones models were terrible and everyone stopped buying Apple products, there is nothing investors could do to save it. The best they could do would be propping it up with more funds to hold off the inevitable collapse.

Despite what some might think about the stock market, an increase in Apple share prices does not mean more jobs have been created at the company, or that Apple has more working capital. Apple shares, like shares for any other company, becomes more valuable because the actual business (sales of iPhones, iPods, etc.) has grown. Apple's growing stock prices isn't the cause of its success, rather, it's the result. The consistent influx of cash from consumers is what has enabled it to grow to the size it is now. The same can be said for all companies. Customers, empowered

by a healthy economy in which they have the funds to consume products and services, create jobs. Regardless of what investors do or do not do, if customers do not buy their products a business will collapse and its workers

is invest money (albeit, strategically) in different funds, and company shares, hoping to see some return from it, I am not hiring anyone, and I am certainly not raising wages. I am but one part of our economic system, and not nearly the most important. I am simply trading investments with other investors, not building companies or creating jobs.

Despite this, Trump's administration is looking into giving investors like myself another tax cut, this time by indexing to inflation the cost basis used to calculate the capital gains rate. Doing so, along with pushing Tax Cuts 2.0, would be an economic disaster for the working class. Not only will it cost \$600 billion to make last year's tax cuts permanent, but indexing the capital gains rate to inflation is estimated to be another \$100 billion added to the deficit. None of these changes are in the working class's favor.

Polls have already proven last year's Tax Cuts and Jobs Act is more unpopular than it's ever been. This is because the truth that it was just a giveaway to the wealthy has been made clear by study after study. We cannot allow Republicans to campaign on the lie that the middle class is better off than they were last year, and we should not allow them

to pass further tax cuts that go straight to the top 1%. I didn't need a tax cut last year, and I won't create jobs if I'm given another one. If Congress wants to reward job creators, it should stop giving investors like me preferential treatment and start helping the real job creators in this country: the American people.







The Robinson Rockets found the answer to Salado's slot-T offense, holding the Eagles to 209 yards and no Eagle managed more than 100 yards on the ground as the Rockets won 27-7 to drop the Eagles to 3-3 and 1-1 in district on Oct. 5.

The Eagles won the coin toss to defer to the second half. The Rockets spread the Eagles defense out and used a variety of pass and run plays to get down the field. After a seven-play drive Robinson's Jordan Rogers scored up the middle from 10 yards out with 9:28 left in the 1st quarter. The Rocket missed the PAT to take a 6-0 lead.

The Eagles first series from offense started with a delay of game and started the game 1st &15 from their own 37 yard line. Salado would go 3 and out and Wrook Brown would punt the ball 41 yards to Robinson's 16 yard line.

The Eagles could not capitalize on the good field position, fumbling on the seventh play of the drive to Robinson.

The Rockets drove the length of the field, scoring on a 21 yard TD run from Brandon Pritchett on the seventh play of the drive. The PAT was good and with 5:45 left in the second quarter Robinson increased their







American Motors was formed in 1954 from the merger of Hudson Motors and Nash-Kelvinator. The deal was the largest corporate merger up to that point - worth \$197,793,366 - but was just one phase of a planned megamerger of Hudson, Nash, Studebaker, and Packard.

The combined company would cover all segments of the market, and their size and ability to share en-

gineering would amortize costs nicely; at least, that was the plan of Kelvinator's George Mason, whose company owned Nash.

The name "American Motors" originated with Mason, who started working on the plan just after World War II.

An analogous situation arises at the bridge table when a particular opponent threatens your chances of making the contract. In such a circumstance, you should do whatever you can to eliminate the threat.

Take this case where you are in three notrump and West leads a spade. You win East's jack with the queen, and it is obvious that the contract is ice-cold

if West has the king of diamonds. In that case, repeated finesses will overcome the king, and you will finish

But if you start out by attacking diamonds and East has the king, there is a real danger that a spade return will ultimately do you in. This could easily happen if West started with five or

by West, it is not difficult to find the appropriate countermeasure. So at trick two you lead the queen or jack of hearts instead of attacking diamonds. This play virtually eliminates all

If West has the ace and takes it, vou plan to duck his spade return and win the next one. Now when you take the diamond finesse, you are on safe ground. If the finesse loses, either East will not have a spade to lead (because West started with at least five of them), or East will have a spade to lead (because the spades were originally divided 4-4).

Similarly, if East has the ace of hearts and takes it, you duck his spade return before trying the diamond finesse. Either way, the contract is secured by leading a heart first, effectively disarming West by removing the pistol — the ace of hearts — from his possession before he has a chance to use it against you.



The gregarious Grackle

The natural world around us can, and should amaze us humans on a daily basis. Many of the columns that I write are about animals that the majority of people do not realize live in their own backyards. However, there is a species of bird that thrives in west Texas year-round, and is one that is probably very familiar to most people, and that avian species is the Great-tailed Grackle.

The Great-tailed Grack-le (Quiscalus mexicanus) is a distinctive species of bird that can be observed throughout Texas. Outside of this state, it occurs north to Kansas and west to central California. It also occurs south of the border to Central America. Only the most northernmost populations migrate during the colder winter months.

colder winter months.

With such a large yearround range, this species
could be considered to be
a habitat generalist. It apparently prefers areas that
have some form of a natural semi-permanent water
source, but human habitations with items such as
pools and lawn irrigations
obviously suffice. Its population densities have risen in
arid areas of the southwest
due to agricultural irrigation.

At first glance, Greattailed Grackles appear to be just another variety of black bird. However, upon closer inspection the subtle iridescent purple coloration on the head, neck, back, and underparts region really stand out against the black wings and lower body. The tail on males is quite long (hence the common name) is often described to be diamond-shaped in appearance. Males and females are sexually dimorphic, which means that they differ from each other in several morphological characteristics. Females differ from the males in that they are typically dark brown on the head, neck, back, and underparts rather than being adorned with the iridescence that males possess. Both species have gray legs and beaks. The bright yellow eyes are particularly noticeable on the darker colored males. Great-tailed Grackles are birds of moderate size, with body length of roughly eighteen inches and a wingspan of just over two feet.

This species of grackle is noisy and gregarious,
preferring to live in large
colonies of up to a hundred
individuals or more. This is
particularly true during the
winter months when several hundred Great-tailed
Grackles may congregate in
prime feeding areas. This
avian species is omnivorous, feeding on a large variety of small invertebrate



animals such as snails, insects, and arachnids as well as larger prey that have backbones including lizards, frogs, fish, and even smaller birds and their eggs. It will also feed on various fruits, seeds, and berries, and many times will steal these food items from other species of smaller birds.

Males are quite promiscuous during the spring breeding season. It is not uncommon for one male to mate with ten or more females in just a few days time. Further research now shows that females may just as promiscuous as the males are. Males will put on a tremendous show for the females; this show compromises of a dramatic display of raising the feathers on his back while strutting, vibrating, and singing. Once the female has selected a male, breeding takes place. In this species of bird, the female does the majority of

the reproductive work. She will build the nest out of various sticks, twigs, grasses and leaves, then will lay the three to four inch long oval, gray blue patterned with reddish blotches eggs. Incubation lasts about two weeks, and is done entirely by the female. Upon hatching, the young will remain in the nest for another three weeks, all the while being tended to and cared for by their mother. When it comes to taking flight, the youngsters are taught by, you guessed it, the female.

This species is common, and population studies have shown that its numbers are increasing. It is one of the few birds that many naturalists will consider to be pests, and many states will allow the removal of this species from gardens and other areas if it is determined to be a threat or a nuisance.


