



Two injured in robbery, shooting at Cedar Valley

The Bell County Sheriff's Department responded to the 15000 block of Cedar Valley Road west of Salado at approximately 11:18 p.m. Nov. 11 in reference to a 911 call reporting two victims with gunshot wounds.

Deputies responded and discovered a male victim (35

years of age) and female victim (49 years of age).

Both victims suffered gunshot wounds and were transported to the hospital.

The male victim is currently in stable condition and the female's condition is currently considered serious but not critical.

At this time the incident appears to have been a robbery. There have been no arrests at this time and an investigation is on going.

Local man honors service of vets buried at West Salado Cemetery

On a dreary, wet Veterans Day, Salado resident Willie Starnes placed small American flags at the graves of a dozen veterans buried in the West Salado Cemetery.

"We should never forget their service," he says.

He should know about service, having served more than three decades in the U.S. Army, retiring as a Chief Warrant Officer 5, the highest warrant officer rank.

Starnes wants to honor the service of those buried in the cemetery as well as the history of the cemetery itself. If you would like to help in the effort to maintain the cemetery, contact Starnes at starneswe@mygrande.net or call him at 254-247-2805.

The newest grave at West Salado Cemetery holds the remains of Ernest Wilkinson, who for many years, maintained the cemetery

According to a *Salado Village Voice* article by Chris McGregor from the early 2000s, "A cursory glance around Salado shows that not much remains of the African-American culture that helped clear and settle the village many generations ago. A fact that is either unknown or conveniently forgotten, the history of the black community in Salado stretches back as far as that of the whites."

Largely scattered by the time the Depression hit, at one point the number of blacks residing in Salado totalled between 150 and 200, a population only slightly less than that of the whites, and this stoic little cemetery seems to be one of the few remaining threads of their legacy.

West Salado Cemetery, tucked behind Fairway Sports Vehicles and Country Boy's off of West Village Road, has been in private hands since 1991.

The late Ernest Wilkinson purchased the property almost 30 years ago. He decided it to his daughter Linda Sue Seawood in 2004, according to Bell County tax records.

He was buried there last week.

According to McGregor's *Salado Village Voice* article:

"The one and four-fifths acre plot was originally deeded in 1879 by Colonel E.S.C. Robertson to the freedmen of Salado. In a diary entry dated Christmas day 1875, Robertson writes, "Went up after dinner to see John Sanders f.m.c. (freed man of color) about hiring a cook and wash woman. Will let me know tomorrow. The freed men want a piece of land for a school house and church-have promised it to

them."

It would be another four years before the freedmen and women got their land. Common tradition tell us that the land was donated to the black community in town by Robertson, however there are other, more quietly whispered rumors that suggest otherwise, that the black community had raised the funds amongst themselves to purchase the land. The fact that four years had taken place between the time the land was promised and the time the land was deeded does cause pause. However, it is also commonly held that Colonel Robertson was a kind and benevolent man who treated all his neighbors, both white and black, with respect, so the particulars might never be resolved.

"In any case, the land was deeded on the first day of the year, 1879, for the aforementioned use of school, church and graveyard purposes. Another persistent little rumor that cannot be verified, that the purchased land had been used as a burial site in antebellum times, is almost certainly true. In fact, the oldest legible headstone in the graveyard, that of Jozie Fulbright, is dated 1877, two years before the land was deeded. This suggests that the land had been used for burial for some time prior. The oldest area of the cemetery, the northwest corner, is home to many simple, unmarked stones, whose origins are unknown. But it is not unsafe to assume that these markers are contemporaneous with, or predate the Fulbright grave, given that slaves lacked the means of producing ornate headstones, and often times, as Ernest Wilkinson explained,

they used whatever was at hand, which was generally a large stone, to mark a location of burial. Some unfortunate, anonymous souls never received a marker. According to Wilkinson, this practice continued into the 20th century.

Also said to be buried on the grounds of the West Salado Cemetery is a man named Mtesa Unection, a former slave who followed his master to Texas after the Confederate surrender at Appomattox, who is a story all his own. According to the book, *Tales of Old Salado*, by E.M. Hutchens, Unection worked on the grist mills and over the years his hands "became inlaid with minute steel splinters," eventually becoming magnetized, and on several occasions, he was called to the College to demonstrate the principals of magnetics to students in natural philosophy class. Also said to have enormous physical strength, Unection "carried in his arms up the stairway the College chapel's first organ," according to Hutchens. Sadly, it will likely never be known where this character was laid to rest.

Ernest Wilkinson, who for many years was the caretaker of West Salado Cemetery, now lays in the same sacred ground as his grandfather.

His grandfather, the patriarch of his family, Finn Wilkinson, was a native born Texas slave who became free after the Civil War. His master was one Melville Wilkinson, who is said to have donated land after the war to all of his slaves. This again, is a matter of debate, but however he obtained his land, Finn settled in Salado

SISD requests annexation into village for sewer

Salado ISD has petitioned the Village of Salado to annex its 150+ acres of property into the corporate limits. Aldermen will consider the annexation request at its regular meeting at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 15.

Salado ISD Trustees voted unanimously Nov. 12 to request annexation with Dr. Kim Bird, Darrell Street, Jeff Kelley, Troy Smith, Dr. Bobbie Ann White and Jim Hodgins voting in favor. Nate Self was absent.

The request by the district is to annex the 102.778 acres on Williams Road where the current Salado High School and future Salado Middle School are located as well as the tracts of land on Thomas Arnold, West Village Road and Salado School Road that include Thomas Arnold Elementary, Salado Junior

High, the transportation barn, ag barn, 18+ program and athletic fields.

The school district is seeking annexation in order to obtain wastewater service from the Village. The Village adopted a policy of requiring annexation into the Village before wastewater services can be provided to a property.

If the Village votes to accept the annexation request, staff will then begin to prepare a service plan for the area as well as scheduling two public hearings on the matter to annex the properties.

The Village will not collect the Sewer Impact Fees for connecting the newly annexed properties once the school district ties into the sewer collection system.

However, the school district will pay the cost for extending the collection system to the properties them-

selves.

The district will also pay the monthly sewer bills once the Village completes the collection system and treatment plant and begins to tie in customers.

The Village will set the sewer rates in January, according to Village Administrator Don Ferguson.

State law allows 90 days for the annexation process to be completed.

Staff is preparing three draft inter-local agreements between the school district and the Village concerning wastewater services and the proposed annexation.

One of the agreements relates to the SISD funding the cost of extending wastewater service to the subject properties while the other two agreements relate to building permit fees for future development and additional police services.



Data indicate U.S. economy running at unsustainable rate

The Markets

Despite headlines to the contrary, the S&P 500 Index (SPX) turned in another winning week, rising 2.13 percent to 2781.01. That rise puts it up just over 4 percent year-to-date and 7.7 percent from a year ago. The market jumped largely to its current level at the open on November 7 as soon as the news was announced that the election results put the Democrats in charge of the House and the Republicans remained in control of the Senate. Contrary to what many thought, the outcome was not as important as the fact that the campaigning was over. An interesting report was that investors and traders were pleased with the change of parties in the House because the chances of further tax cuts and the resulting increase in the national debt were likely to be on hold for at least the next two years. There is some evidence that the Treasury's increased borrowing is beginning to drive rates up whether or not the Fed raises them.

U.S. crude oil officially entered a bear market, down more than 20 percent from its October high point, turning in its longest losing streak in more than 30 years to close at \$59.87. Despite the drop, it is still up nearly 10 percent from a year ago. A combination of increased output from Saudi Arabia and from U.S. fracking appears to have more than offset the Iranian oil embargo imposed by the United States.

Interest rates continued up as the U.S. 10-year Treasury note yield rose a tenth of a point to 3.182 percent, a quarter point higher than three months ago and 0.85 percent higher than a year ago. The good news is that the long end of the yield curve, the 20-year T-bond

also rose to 2.8 percent keeping the yield curve sloped in the right direction and suggesting more good times ahead. Gold continued its decline, down almost 2 percent for the week and 9 percent year-to-date, closing the week at \$1,208.60 (settlement price). The U.S. dollar (BUX) moved, as it often does, in the opposite direction, up 0.38 percent for the week and 5.37 percent year-to-date against world currencies. Meanwhile, the dollar remains up about 7 percent against the Chinese Yuan this year, rising nearly one percent for the week to nearly 7 Yuan to the dollar.

The Economy

The Federal Reserve Board left interest rates where they were but noted that the economy is operating at or near full capacity, signaling for another rate hike in December. The Fed's statement did not mention the recent stock market slump, suggesting the Board considered it a normal, minor correction. The Fed's concern appears to be that the effects of import tariffs are just now beginning to show up in producer price increases and may soon filter through to consumer prices. Producer prices rose 0.6 percent last month which translates to a 7.2 percent annualized increase. It is too soon to tell if that was a transitory increase or something more, but those increased prices will either be passed on to the consumer, causing inflation to accelerate, or

result in earnings declines. Only time will tell.

In a reverse of the U.S. administration's expectations, China announced this week that total exports for October are up 15.6 percent from a year ago. Even exports to the United States, where the trade-tariffs should have had the most effect, were up 13 percent. Ironically, what did drop was imports from the U.S., down 1.8 percent from last year. Those figures suggest that the consensus of economists was correct in their forecast that the tax-cut generated demand in the U.S. would more than offset any tariffs as U.S. businesses and consumers have more money to spend than there are goods and services made domestically and would wind up increasing imports.

According to the Wall Street Journal, U.S. companies are warning that tariffs and a labor shortage are increasing costs and will cut into profits next year unless they aggressively raise prices. In the short-term, those are symptoms of a high-growth economy as consumer demand appears poised to accelerate into the holidays. The University of Michigan on Friday said its consumer sentiment index remains extraordinarily high at 98.3. With wage growth at the highest in nearly ten years and the unemployment rate at a 49-year low, the Fed has good reason to continue to raise rates. All these data are classic economic indicators of an economy running at an unsustainable rate.

Urban America's vagrancy outrage

It's appropriate that the U.N. special rapporteur devoted to adequate housing has visited encampments in Mexico City, Buenos Aires, Mumbai -- and San Francisco, Oakland and Berkeley.

The homeless situation in those cities and others around the country is positively Third World, a blight that shows the persistence of human folly and misery, despite what we take to be our steady progress to greater enlightenment and prosperity.

San Francisco is a crown jewel of the new economy, and a sink of vagrancy. One of the more compelling pieces of reportage that The New York Times has run recently was on the dirtiest block in San Francisco, the 300 block of Hyde Street, blighted by discarded heroin needles and other filth.

In the 21st century, in the richest country on the planet, you would think that we would have figured out how to live without having to step around human feces. The experience of San Francisco says that, against all expectations, we haven't -- or at least we forgot how. In an article for the journal National Affairs, Stephen Eide of the Manhattan Institute recounted how we got here over the past 50 years. Cities wiped out or drastically diminished their skid rows, once a last-ditch hous-

ing recourse for men who had hit bottom. As urban renewal and regulations to improve the quality of housing eliminated these down-on-their-luck areas, the people who once lived there decamped to public places. We "deinstitutionalized" the mentally ill, too often a euphemism for dumping them onto the streets and into jails. About 20 to 30 percent of the homeless are mentally ill.

Meanwhile, the number of single-parent families drastically increased. Women only rarely lived on skid row, but poor families headed by single mothers are a large component of the homeless.

These large-scale trends have been met with a new, more permissive legal environment. The Supreme Court in 1972 made it more difficult for city police forces to hustle along vagrants, and subsequent free-speech jurisprudence has made outlawing panhandling tricky. Civil commitment of the mentally ill has become highly restricted. The American Civil Liberties Union is a great de facto friend of vagrancy.

Not that anything is easy in this area. The hard core of the homeless population is cut off from human relationships and finds the perverse freedom of the streets more appealing than the structure that would come with assistance. Many refuse help, either because they are too sick to make rational decisions or they don't want to deal with any rules.

But the beginning wisdom is to consider the status quo intolerable, and resist the advocates who want to normalize panhandling and camping, and the associated drug abuse, petty crime and disorder. Houston has had success with a tough-love policy of more services, coupled with a crackdown on encampments and other public nuisances.

One of the advantages of modern society is that people don't have to live in public, or in squalor. That it is widely accepted in some of our greatest cities is an outrage of our age. It is deeply harmful to our civic life, and does no favors for the men and women living in parks and highway underpasses.

land, Finn settled in Salado and several generations of his descendants have been reared here as well. Finn was yet another interesting man whose unique life is rarely mentioned when the history of old Salado is discussed.

Standing six feet tall and possessing considerable intellect, Finn could read and write, unusual for a man of slave derivation. He was also a cowboy who participated in many drives, keeping the spirits of the other cowhands high with his affability and lighthearted sense of humor. Finn, however, never forgot slavery. He would take a turn to the serious when explaining to his children and grandchildren about "the peculiar institution" of slavery. He explained that one particularly diabolical and popular method employed by slave traders was to throw a feast a short distance from the ship. Shortly thereafter, another celebration would be thrown, this time a little

bit closer to the ship than the last. Finally, a third would be held, this time however, in the ship itself. Once safely on board, the ship would set sail with its unsuspecting passengers in tow, who were now trapped and resigned to their unenviable fate. Wilkinson's other grandfather, Finn Fullbright, was a stonemason whose mark of F.F. can still be read on some of the older headstones.

Once the land for the cemetery had been legally acquired, two churches and a school were erected, of which no traces remain. For such a small community, the presence of two churches is indicative of the importance religion played in the community. One church was Baptist, the other Methodist; however, no clear congregational lines were ever drawn, and most folks attended both regularly. The school served children grades one through six only, the high schoolers attending Harris

High School in Belton. Because, up until relatively recent history, central Texas was an overwhelmingly agriculture area, children did not attend school until early November, their hands being needed more for farming than scholarly pursuits.

During the 1920's, approximately 18 children attended the school, with teachers using textbooks donated from nearby Salado College. But again, no buildings remain.

Unfortunately, when times got tough in Salado, as happened in other communities, most of the black families moved off to the cities or other towns such as Taylorsville, where they sought better job opportunities and less discrimination. The South has a long memory, and the humiliation of the Civil War had yet to part itself from public consciousness, and Salado was no different.

The history of West Salado Cemetery is a testament to many things, among them a family's link with its past, and of the hard work done by a small group of Saladoans to bring an overlooked cemetery its rightful distinction.

trump bid, West decided — correctly, as it turned out — not to lead that suit, opting instead for the neutral lead of the ten of clubs.

The ten was covered by the jack, queen and king, leaving South with only eight sure tricks. Since it seemed likely that West had led a club from a combination that included the 10-9, South next led a club to dummy's eight. But when East produced the nine and returned the jack of spades, the roof caved in. When the dust settled, the contract was down two.

South certainly can't be criticized for assuming that West had the nine of clubs — the opening lead of an unsupported ten, especially against notrump, is highly unusual. Nevertheless, the fact remains that he could have guarded against the possibility that East held the nine.

His error came at trick one when, instead of mechanically covering the ten of clubs with the jack, he should have followed low. Then, after East also played low, he should have allowed the ten to hold the trick!

The advantage of this play is that if West has another club, whether it is the nine or not, an extra club trick is assured, while at the same time East can never gain the lead for the potential killing spade shift.

Only if West's ten of clubs is a singleton is the contract still in danger. But in that case, covering with the jack wouldn't solve the problem either.

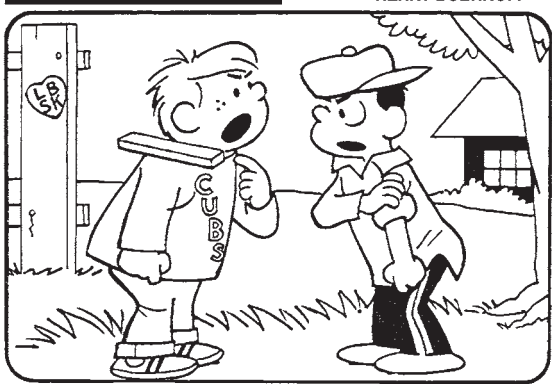

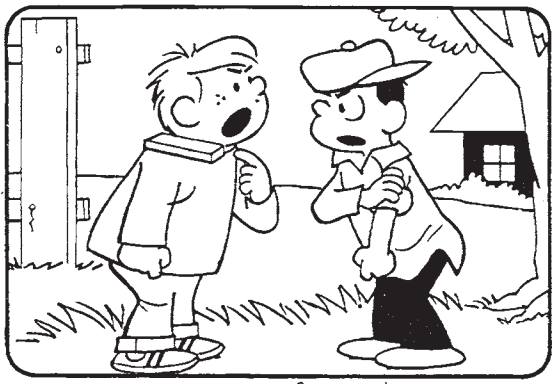

Many mammals are wary of man, and many times their presence is detected only by sounds or even from tracks. One such animal that has adapted to human conditions while rarely actually being seen is the Opossum.

The Virginia Opossum (*Didelphis virginiana*) has been observed throughout Texas, save for a few counties west of the Pecos River in the Trans-Pecos eco-region (Hudspeth, Culberson, and Reeves counties). These areas are too dry to maintain viable populations of this moisture-dependant mammal. Although it is more common in the wooded areas of east Texas, it also inhabits prairies and farmlands of the panhandle and Edwards Plateau regions. In the latter portions of this environment, it prefers to dwell among the dense vegetation along streams, rivers, cattle tanks, and any other permanent bodies of water. Many times, the five-toed tracks this animal leaves along the mud in these areas are what give away its presence.

Opossums, commonly referred to by many as simply 'possums, are medium sized mammals that are about the size of a small dog, with a total length of about two and 1/2 feet. Males are the larger species, with females achieving about seventy-five percent of this length. The tail is long (over fourteen inches), scaly in appearance, and is prehensile, meaning that it can be utilized as a fifth limb. The tail is bi-colored with the half closest to the body black, while the latter half is whitish. The background color of the coarse fur is generally gray, although a black color phase is also encountered, although this color morph is rather uncommon. The eyes are large, coal black, and centered toward the front of the skull. The ears are black, rather short, and almost leathery in appearance. Each foot has five toes on it.

They are exclusively nocturnal, coming out of their

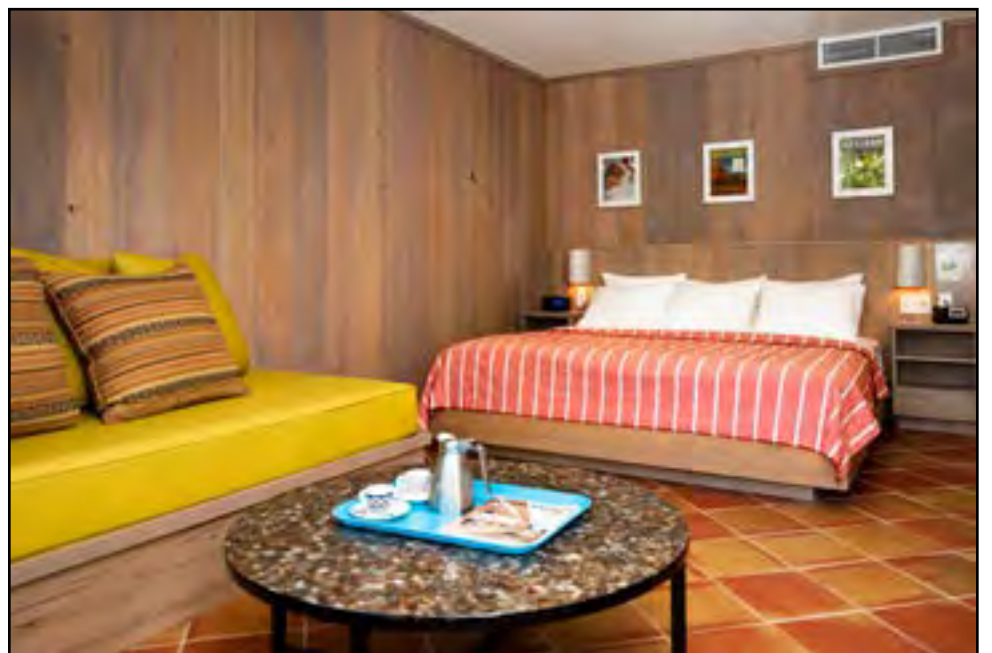
hiding places (woodpiles, hollow logs, rock piles, and the occasional attic) shortly after dark to forage for food. Opossums are omnivorous, meaning that they will feed on plant and animal materials. They will feed primarily on animal matter, with up to sixty-five percent of their diet being insects such as grasshoppers, beetles, bugs, and crickets, but they will also feed on other endothermic animals such as mice, rats, small rabbits, and birds. A very small percentage of their diet includes crustaceans, reptiles, fruits and berries.

During the majority of the year, Opossums are solitary animals, only gathering together for short peri-

ods of time for the purpose of reproduction. Females are in heat only for one month, and the mating period is actually limited to a thirty-six hour window. Typically, there are two litters produced per year (one in February and one in June), with each litter numbering between five and twenty young. The gestation period is exceptionally short, taking only eleven days from conception to birth. Newborn Opossums are very small, being about the size of a honey bee and weighing only one-fifth of a gram. The young are totally blind, practically helpless, and almost fetus-like in appearance. Despite this, they will crawl unaided into

the mother's marsupium, or external pouch. This pouch makes the Opossum unique from all other mammals in the United States, no other mammal has such an apparatus. Immediately after reaching this pouch, the young will firmly attach itself to a nipple. Here it will remain for the next two months, secure and able to feed at will.

The life span on this interesting creature of the night is relatively short, sometimes spanning only two years from birth to natural death. Natural predators include coyotes, foxes, and owls, and many are found dead along highways. It is occasionally harvested for its pelt, although the value of its fur is astonishingly low. Populations in Texas are quite stable, largely due to its ability to adapt to human structures.

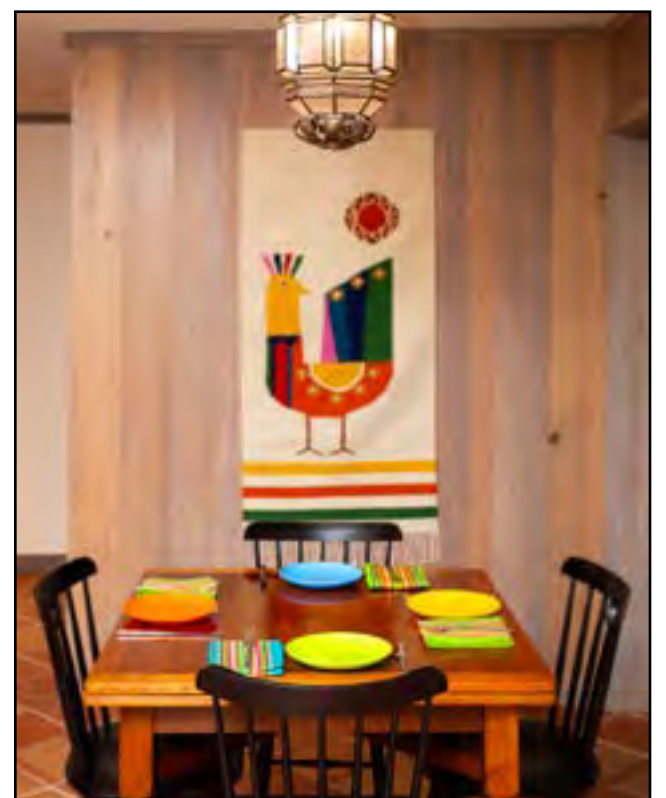
