Early voting very low

SISD election set May 5

Four candidates seek election to two full three year terms on the Salado Independent School District board of trustees May 5. The polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 5 at the Salado Civic Center.

With only one day left in early voting, 173 people had cast ballots in the election of candidates.

Candidates appear on the ballot in the following order: Jackie Burson, Lisa McQueen, Carse Williams and Frank Carlson.

Jackie Burson

Jackie Burson is a native of Bell County, growing up in the Salado area, where he attended school through the ninth grade before transferring to Belton from which he graduated high school.

The father of Megan, a junior at Salado High, and Junie, a sixth grader at Salado Intermediate, Burson has been married for 20 years to Janet.

Burson has worked as an installation and repair technician for 18-1/2 years with Sprint telephone company. Prior to working with Sprint, Burson has been the manager of a local ranch, worked in roofing and with Goodnight Homes. His wife Janet works in the accounting department of Scott & White.

He has been active with his children in raising show animals. He has been involved in the Salado Youth Fair Boosters, Salado 4-H and Salado Future Farmers of America. He served one term as a director of the Bell County Youth Fair.

Burson said he is running for the board because "if you're going to have children involved in things, the parents should be involved as well. I felt that it is time for me to serve in the capacity of the school board."

"I'm for all of the youngsters who go to our school, not just a select group of them."

"I can look at situations and try to do what is best for all of the children here," he added. "I don't have any axes to grind with anything and I am open minded about the school."

Burson said the role of a school board member is four-fold: "adopt the budget and set the tax rate, hire and fire the superintendent, set policies and communicate with the community. That's it," he said. "No board member has any authority outside of a convened board meeting. A board member should not be involved in the daily operations of the school because the final authority rests with the board."

Lisa McQueen

Lisa McQueen moved to Salado with her husband Al and daughter Sara Sebti two years from Harker Heights, Her daughter is in the fifth grade at Salado Intermediate School.

McQueen teaches Spanish and Cultural Anthropology at Central Texas College, where she has taught for 14 years.

She holds a B.A. in international studies from Juniata College in Pennsylvania. McQueen has an M.A. in foreign languages and linguistics from West Virginia University and is working toward a doctorate in Cultural Anthropol-

During her undergraduate course work, McQueen studied abroad at Barcelona She also studied French for six months in France while working on her degree.

Al, her husband of four years, is a licensed professional counselor who works with elderly in nursing home situations.

McQueen said that she considers a school trustee to be "an important position for the community and I would like to serve in that capacity. The school board has a lot of input and important advice to give. I have a keen interest in the policies of our school district and the impact they have on our children and the community as a whole."

McQueen says her work in a community college gives her a unique perspective as a school trustee. "I see all kinds of people, from kids coming right out of high school to older students who are returning to college after a long absence. From that, I know that education is the key to making opportunities available."

Part of her job at CTC is teaching courses online, which she says would be useful in helping Salado schools develop curriculum that teaches "the skills students need to pursue

First Baptist Church and marker dedication May 6

Abraham Lincoln was President. The Civil War was in its third year. Texas was under the Confederate Flag, and Sam Houston, the Governor of Texas, had recently been replaced for his refusal to take the oath of loyalty to the Confederacy. On May 25, of that turbulent year, a group of eleven men and women met in the Chapel of Salado College for the purpose of organizing a church. The church was named Salado Baptist Church of Christ. It was later renamed First Baptist Church of Salado.

The present congregation invites you to join them Sunday, May 6, 2001 at 2 p.m. for the dedication of a historical marker commemorating the devoted men and women who struggled to begin the congregation of like-believers in their small, frontier village.

Church records state that the purpose for organizing the Baptist church was so the people could "better honor God and serve their community".

Throughout its one hundred thirty-seven year history, the congregation has grown in membership from ts original eleven members to approximately 900 members. Not only has the congregation grown in membership, it has grown the ways in which it serves the community. The strongest of these ministries is the Sunday School which reaches over three hundred-fifty people each Sunday. The church also has a vibrant Men's and

Women's Ministry which provides fellowship and Bible study to the men and women of the church and community. The church's dynamic Youth Ministry offers a variety of activities to educate and train the children and young people.

One of the most effective avenues for serving the community has been through the Child Development Center. The CDC was opened in 1992 for the purpose of providing day care for pre-school age children of working mothers as well as after-school care for older children. The center has the capacity of caring for 128 children. The child center, and the food pantry, which provides food for the needy on an on-going basis, enables the church to minister to the needs of families throughout the Salado

The historical marker, written in part, by Mary Belle Brown, one of Salado's local historians, and donated by Robert and Doris Dennman, long-time, active members of the church, reads as follows:

"A baptist revival was held on the banks of Salado Creek as early as 1854. By about 1860, members of area Baptist, Methodist, Prebysterian and Church of Christ denominations were meeting in an ecumenical house of worship. Each group held an all day service on successive Sundays."

"On May 25, 1864, eleven men and women organized the Salado Bap-

tist Church of Christ in The Chapel of Salado College. Charter members of this group, later renamed First Baptist Church of Salado, were James L. Smith, David Hair, Harvey Chamberlain, Nannie Reed, Nellis Wemott, Sarah Hanford, Rachel Austin, Eva Cockrill. Mary L. Cearnals, Nannie Wilkinson and Sallie Wilkinson."

A training union for young people soon followed. There were 19 additional members by June 1864 and 111 members by 1877. A two story church and Masonic Hall on the North Bank of Salado Creek near Main Street was erected in 1878 on land donated by Bell County Pioneer and church member O.T. Tyler. Two years later, an ecumenical tabernacle was erected behind the church.

tion sent missionaries C.Z. and Kate (Crawford) Taylor to Brazil in 1801. The Ladies' Aid Society, later the Women's Missionary Union and then the Women's Ministry, was organized in 1889. This work continued in the 20th Century, marked by the beginning of the ministry to Mary Hardin-Baylor College in nearby Belton in

1958. Notable members of the First Baptist Church of Salado include George W. Baines (the great grandfather of President Lyndon B. Johnson) who served as Pastor and was later President of Mary Hardin-Baylor. Others were educators at Salado College and beloved community members"

their education beyond high school."

She also understands the perspective that teachers bring to the school.

"A school board member must have a broad understanding of the needs, wants and desires of the community and the issues that come up before the board," she said.

CARSE WILLIAMS

Carse Williams completes his first term on the SISD Board of Trustees this year. He has served in several capacities on the board, including chair of the facilities committee secretary of the board.

He has also chaired the curriculum and technology committee (two years), during which the McLane Computer Lab was brought on-line. He served on the construction committee that oversaw the completion of the Salado Intermediate School campus.

Carse and wife Bobbi have lived in Salado for almost seven years, moving here from Round Rock, where he operated a vending company for 35

Carse and Bobbi have two sons and three grandchildren. Todd and Joanna lived here in Salado with Brooks, a fourth grader at Thomas Arnold, and Blake, a first grader here.

Todd is the principal of Tarver Intermediate School in Belton ISD.

Brad and Julie are the parents of Bailey, a four year old girl on whom Carse admittedly dotes.

Brad is the principal of Smithson Valley High School in Comal ISD.

Williams said that in his three years on the board, he has developed "a proven track record. I have never missed a called meeting of the board in the three years I have served. I have returned every phone call I have received from a parent or taxpayer. I may not have always given someone the answer they wanted, but I have given people answers to their ons of me."

"I am not influenced by any particular group," he added, "other than the students and taxpayers. On all but two occasions, I have voted my convictions." When prodded about those two occasions, Williams declined to answer on record.

Williams said that he thinks the district has improved in many areas during the three years he has served, most easily seen in technology.

"We are the envy of other schools in our use of technology," Williams said. In fact, there are some things we would like to do but can't because sur-

rounding schools cannot match us in technology. They can't do what we're doing."

An important part of technology is incorporating it into the curriculum of the school, Williams said, which is something the district is working on

Williams said that he is not satisfied with the academic performance of the district. "With our demographics, we should be an exemplary school district," he said, adding that the schools should strive to do more for average students. "We do plenty for gifted and talented kids and for special education kids, but sometimes we have a tendency to neglect the average kid."

FRANK CARLSON

Frank Carlson has served two years as the President of the Board of Trustees. He will complete his first three-year term on the board in May.

He and Cathy moved to Salado 11 years ago and have owned and operated Cathy's Boardwalk Cafe since 1994. They have two children: Amy, who will graduate from Salado this spring, and Frank, who is a junior at Salado.

During his term on the school board, Carlson said he thinks that "there is a vast improvement in the school in morale from top down. I believe there's trust in the superintendent that's she's doing a good job. If you look at the team of campus principals, I think that we won't have the turnover that we have had in the past. The people in place will continue a long term commitment to Salado."

Carlson said that achieving exemplary status is a goal for which he wants the school to continue to

A key component of achieving exemplary status is bringing up the scores of students who are economically advantaged or Hispanic, two sub-categories of student population in which Salado has scored below the requirement for recognized or exemplary status at the district-wide level.

"Robin has put in place a great program this year to bring the Spanish speaking parents of our students into the school. We are offering English as a Second Language classes

to adults for the first time," Carlson said, adding that the district has "a moral responsibility to help these parents help their children. I think we will see a dramatic improvement in our test scores from this."

Carlson added that the district is expanding the program to be a dual language course next year, which will "teach English to Spanish speakers and vice versa."

Carlson said that while he has been on the board, the district has reduced its student to teacher ratio from 25-1 to 17-1 in many classes, especially in the elementary school.

"This is one of the long range planning committee's goals," he said.







placing a rear-facing car seat in front of an airbag, and turning an infant-only car seat to face forward.

Emergency residents in Central Texas rank first in nation

For the second straight year, Central Texas has the top ranking emergency medicine residents in the

Doctors in the Darnell **Army Community Hospital** and Scott & White emergency medicine residency programs recently ranked first and second of 122 programs across the nation on the annual in training examination given by the American Board of Emergency Medicine. This is the third year in a row that both programs gave place in the top ten, since the emergency medicine program's inception in 1993.

The in training examination is administered by the American Board of Emergency Medicine to allow residents the opportunity to gauge their degree of preparedness for taking the written certification exami-

"This examination is the only means for program directors to judge how their program is doing in relation to others in the country," said Marco Coppola, D.O., FACEP, director, Scott & White emergency medicine residency program.

Coppola, who has been program director for three years, reintroduced a structured reading schedule, with weekly quizzes, as as a two month review.

"This outstanding accomplishment is attributed to the hard work of the residents combined with a little structure, encouragement and empowering them to do their best," Coppola

Coppola specifically stated the third year class

scored sixth in the country. up from 14th last year and the second year residents finished second. Notable performances include: Dr. Michael Cantu and Dr. David Fletcher, who scored at the 94th and 95th percentiles; Dr. John Gomez, who scored at the 97th percentile; and Dr. Rick Daniels, who scored in the 98th percentile for the second consecutive year.

The Scott & White senior staff physicians who work with the residents in the emergency department all hold faculty positions with The Texas A&M University System Health Science Center College of Medicine.

"Scott & White is an excellent atmosphere for learning, " said Coppola. "Our faculty is very learned and highly trained and we

are very accessible to the residents."

"The test scores are a reflection of individual high performances by the resident physicians, Dr. Coppola's efforts as program director, Dr. Stallard's efforts as assistant program director and the faculty's commitment to provide outstanding training. The program is clearly moving in the right direction," said Jerry Ray Baskerville, M.D. medical director and interim chairman, Scott & White department of emergency medicine.

"When patients from Central Texas come to the Scott & White department, they can rest assured that some of the top residents in the country are looking after them," Coppola said.

When to call 911...

Lights flashing. Sirens blaring. Emergency crews on the run. Comforting sights and sounds to those needing help.

But the time between the call to 911 and the arrival of an emergency team can seem like an eternity of fear and indecision when someone is ill or injured.

Minutes count in an emergency, and what people do before EMS arrives makes a significant difference to an injured or ill person, according to Kathy Perkins, chief of the Bureau of Emergency Management at the Texas Department of Health.

When you call 911, Perkins said, "you access the emergency care system and its personnel, available by telephone everywhere in Texas 24 hours a day. But until a trained team arrives, there are things people can do to help."

Recognizing an emergency is the first step in getting assistance for an ill or injured person. Most people consider auto crashes, severe chest pain, obvious broken bones and serious burns to be emergencies. But not all emergency situations are so apparent. Call 911 immediately if any of these conditions are present:

*Serious bleeding;

* Unconsciousness;

* Neck or spine injuries;

*Signs of heart attack including uncomfortable pressure or fullness in the chest or chest discomfort with light-headedness, fainting, sweating or shortness of breath;

- * Unexplained paralysis:
 - * Burns:
- * No indication of breathing;
 - * Choking;
 - * Broken bones: or
- * Head, chest or abdominal injuries.

Common sense and knowing the victim also are important to assessing an emergency. "Factors such as stressful events, a pre-existing medical condition or abnormal behavior may signal that a person is in an emergency situation." Perkins said.

How you make the 9-1-1 call also is important. Stay calm or have someone else make the call. Give the 9-1-1 dispatcher any information requested. This information usually includes the address or location of the emergency, your name and the telephone number at your location, name of the injured or ill person and information about the illness or injury

Stay on the phone with the dispatcher until you are told to hang up. Send someone to wait near the street or in the parking lot to direct the ambulance to the victim.

Do not move the injured or ill person unless the person is in immediate danger. Do not allow the person to eat or drink anything or to smoke. Keep the person calm and still.

"While we can be proud of the emergency medical services in Texas," Perkins said, "prevention is still the best way to avoid needing help." Safe, healthy lifestyle habits include: * Wearing seat belts and buckling children into child safety seats;

* Being sure that all children 12 and under ride in the back seat;

* Driving at safe speeds;

* Avoiding alcohol and drug use while driving;

* Keeping immunizations current;

* Eating right and exercising regularly;

* Keeping guns and poisons locked in a safe place.

Stop addiction or alcoholism by knowing the life cycle

Whether a person is genetically or brochemically predisposed to addiction or alcoholism is a controversy that has been debated for years within the scientific, medical and chemical dependency communities. One school of thought advocates the "disease concept," which embraces the notion that addiction is an inherited disease, and that the individual is permanently ill at a genetic level, even for those experiencing long periods of sobriety.

Another philosophy argues that addiction is a dual problem consisting of a physical and mental dependency on chemicals, compounded by a preexisting mental disorder (i.e. clinical depression, bipolar disorder, or some other mental illness), and that the mental disorder needs to be treated first as the primary cause of the addiction. A third philosophy subscribes to the idea that chemical dependency leads to "chemical imbalances" in the neurological system

The fact remains that there is scientific research to support all of these concepts, but that none of these theories are absolute.

Based on national averages we have a 16% to 20% recovery rate. The message is clear that we have a lot more to learn if we are to bring the national recovery rate to a more desirable level. There is a fourth school of thought, which has proven to be more accurate. It has to do with the life cycle of addiction. This data is universally applicable to addiction, no matter which hypothesis is used to explain the phenomenon of chemical dependency.

The life cycle of addiction begins with a problem, discomfort or some form of emotional or physical pain a person is experiencing. The person finds this very difficult to deal with.

Here is an individual who, like most people in our society, is basically good. He has encountered a problem or discomfort

that he does not have the ability to resolve. This could include problems such as difficulty "fitting in" as a child or teenager, anxiety due to peer pressure, identity problems or divorce as an adult. It could also include physical discomfort, such as a broken arm or a bad back. The person experiencing the discomfort has a real problem. He feels this problem is a major situation that persists and he can see no immediate resolution or relief from it.

We have all experienced this in our lives to a greater or lesser degree. The difference between which one of us becomes an addict and which one does not depends on whether or not, at the time of this

traumatic experience, we are subjected to pro-drug or alcohol influences via some sort of significant peer pressure when the problem is manifesting itself. The painkilling effects of drugs or alcohol becomes a solution to the discomfort because the person experiences relief from the negative feeling associated with the problem. As soon as the addict experiences relief from the discomfort, he inadvertently attaches value to the drug or drink, because it helped him feel better. Even though the relief is only temporary, it is adopted as a solution to the problem and this assigned value is the only reason the person ever uses drugs or drinks a second, third or

more times. At this point, it is just a matter of time before the person becomes fully addicted and loses the ability to control their

drug use.



Redistricting plan upsets conservative's "applecart," Hupp blames Democrats

Remember the raging debate between Democrats and Republicans last year about how best to count heads in the nation's required decennial census? Conservatives wanted an exact head count, while liberals leaned towards some sort of scientific extrapolation designed to add numbers through a formula that would take into account folks thought to be missed for one reason or another.

That howling eventually died down and the enumeration went forward house by house. The figures were collated by the Census Bureau and sent to the 50 States for the purpose of reapportioning congressional and state legislative districts.

The Texas numbers were then crunched and recrunched for weeks on end by both House and Senate redistricting committees. And finally, last week, out popped the current results that tentatively parcelled out the new boundaries for the 150 State House and 31 Senate seats.

REDISTRICTING PLAN BRINGS FORTH

The Congressional form of this musical-chairs-disarrangement has to wait until state lawmakers get their house in order which may be well into late fall.

GLOOM AND DOOM

Once the tentative districts were announced by leaders of the Texas Legislature last week the Four Horsemen of the Political Apocalypse - Doom, Despair, Rage and Blasphemy arrived on the scene.

Within seconds the State's copier machines began spitting out mostly Republican press releases blasting House Speaker Pete Laney, his redistricting committee henchmen, the world in general and Democrats in particular - all by lawmakers who saw their sinecures about to be disturbed.

This was especially true here in Central Texas and more to the exact point - from Salado's statehouse rep - Republican Suzanna Hupp whose proposed district would run from Lampasas to the Rio Grande while excluding Bell County completely!

Dianne White Delisi's district, that currently includes all of Temple plus bits and pieces of the county north and west of her hometown, had to be shocked when Temple was divided right down the middle of 31st Street with Scott and White Hospital placed in a brand new district.

HUPP UNHAPPY

Hupp quickly blasted the new plan as a "hack job" by Demos and went on to make a most unwise-political (code for "dumb") statement, to the effect that the folks she represents in central Texas have little or nothing in common with people in her proposed district along the border. If that district remains intact - she will have some tough explaining to do when she heads south for a campaign visit.

Fact is, nothing is set in concrete at this juncture of the legislative session. Debate and acrimony will have to be endured followed by handholding and arm twisting behind closed doors and even then it is doubtful that agreement will be reached any time soon.

However, should a miracle occur and the proposed districts slip by - conservatives can (and will) call on Governor Perry to veto the entire mess and send the matter to the Legislative Redistricting Board - composed of four Republi-

cans and one lone Democrat. Bet youcan guess how those lines will then be drawn.

BAD CALL BY THE SUPREMES

Tuesday, April 24, will long be remembered as the day a really bad decision was made by the U. S. Supreme Court. In a 5-4 vote, the supremes allowed as how it was within the limits of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution to arrest, handcuff and jail a person for a misdemeanor type crime that is punishable only by a fine, such as a traffic violation.

The case in point dealt with a Texas woman who was driving without a seatbelt. Kids in the vehicle were also without restraints plus the lady did not have proof of insurance with her.

She was arrested, handcuffed and hauled off to jail in front of her kids. Later, the woman was granted bail and still later, pleaded "ne-contest" and paid a fine.

Constitutional question was, and remains - does this violate the unreasonable search and seizure prohibition found in the Fourth Amendment? The high court said "No"! They did however note that the arresting officer used "poor judgement" and should have issued only a traffic citation.

What this decision actually does is add fuel to the police-abuse fire that is raging in parts of the nation.

It also makes more difficult the work of law enforcement officers who normally use good judgement and serve their communities well beyond the call of duty, day-in and day-out.

In this instance the high court made an error. An error that will have to be corrected on a continuing basis, by police officers at all levels, through the judicious use of common sense and balance when dealing with their fellow citizens.

Protecting mineral rights

Q: My parents are retired and use mineral and royalty interests to help meet their living expenses. Recently they received an unsolicited offer to purchase their interests. The offer said that the enclosed bank draft was theirs if they signed an attached legal document in front of a notary and returned it to the company. amount offered was a fraction of the value of the Fortunately I interests. stopped them from signing anything. What is being done to protect people from offers like these?

A: My office has been receiving an increasing number of complaints about unsolicited offers similar to what you described: a letter with a bank draft attached and a legal document that includes the name of the property owner and the property.

With many of these offers, the language in the mailing is confusing enough that it is difficult to tell whether the offer is to lease the property or purchase it. In addition, the small amount of money offered makes it look like a lease agreement when it is not. Unfortunately, any people sign away their interest rights without realizing what they have done. In other cases, after the property owner has signed over rights to the property, the purchasing company refuses to honor the bank draft, instead sending a check for a much smaller amount. Even though the sellers won't agree to the new offer, the company refuses to transfer the royalty or mineral interest back to the owner.

In addition, by signing the legal documents, the property owner grants the purchasing company power of attorney with respect to the transfer.

While these unsolicited mailings are not limited



to Texans age 65 and over, the majority of those who respond are senior citizens. It is clear that these companies are targeting senior Texans.

The Texas Legislature, recognizing the potential for unwary mineral and royalty owners to be deceived, enacted a law in the hopes of providing some recourse.

According to the law, all mailed offers to purchase mineral or royalty property rights must contain the following statement in large print:

By executing and delivering this instrument, you are selling all or a portion of your mineral or royalty interest in (property name).

Anyone who sells rights to mineral or royalty interests in response to a mailed offer that does not contain this paragraph may we legal recourse.

If you receive an offer to purchase your property, you should receive a fair market appraisal of the property's worth. You should never agree to sell your investment without knowing its true value.

The State Bar of Texas provides a legal referral service that can help you find an attorney with relevant expertise. You can contact the State Bar at (800) 252-9690.

My office is tracking complaints about these types of offers. While we can't act or intervene on your behalf, we can take note of your complaint for possible enforcement actions. You can file a complaint with our office by calling (800)621-0508.

Voters will decide on 2 bond proposals

Salado ISD voters will decide on two bond propositions as the polls open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 5 at the Salado Civic Center.

The bond election includes two propositions totaling \$1.3 million.

On the ballot are Proposition A, which totals \$675,000, and Proposition B, which totals \$650,000.

According to Salado ISD Supt. Robin Battershell, the payout schedule on Proposition A will be 15 years and will increase property tax rate by 3.04¢ per \$100 evaluation.

Payment on Proposition B will be 15 years. It has been predicted to increase property taxes by 2.98¢ per \$100 evaluation.

Together, the Propositions will require a 6¢ per \$100 evaluation tax increase.

A voter can cast a ballot in favor of both Propositions, against both Propositions or in favor of only one Proposition.

Voters will decide two three-year positions on the Salado Independent School District board of trustees. The two positions are corrently filled by Frank Carlson and Carse Williams.

Carlson and Williams are seeking reelection.

Jackie Burson and Lisa McQueen also filed for the two at-large positions on the school board.



Ever wondered if you need a wastewater permit or maybe an air permit? Concerned about whether you're handling hazardous waste properly? Interested in finding out if there are less toxic-and cheaperalternatives to the substances you're now using in your business? Confused about how to find information on environmental rules? Maybe you need your own free environmental consultant for the day, on-site in your shop to point out problems and suggest ways to remedy them.

Sound too good to be true? Not with the Site Visit program offered by the Small Business and Local Government Assistance (SBLGA) section of Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC).

Since 1997, SBLGA's Site Visits have provided free, confidential help in identifying and resolving problems with environmental compliance.

The program helps increase your awareness. Many small businesses and local governments are

ecto

unaware of state and federal rules intended to minimize pollution (such as controlling paint and dry cleaning vapors and requiring special handling and disposal of certain hazardous materials).

The environmental consultant contracted SBLGA conducts the assessment and then reports to you any deficiencies in compliance, as well as recommended actions you can take to resolve those deficiencies or reduce or prevent pollution. Many of these options also can reduce your paperwork burden and save you

Facilities that have signed up for the program include auto body and repair shops, dry cleaners, metal finishers, printers, wood product manufacturers and finishers, local government fleet maintenance shops, and many

In fiscal year 2000, a total of 262 facilities took advantage of site visits, up from 225 the year before. Overall, about half were in compliance prior to the site visit; after the site visit, 92 percent were compliant. Common problems: no air permit or standard exemption or noncompliance with the permit or exemption; missing hazardous waste determinations and records; problems with hazardous waste containers and labeling; no storm water plans or permits; unauthorized wastewater discharges.

Although you are not obligated to follow up on the recommendations, if you correct all the compliance deficiencies identified during the site visit, you'll be eligible for the Compliance Commitment (C2) Partnership. If you qualify for the C2 Partnership, you'll get a certificate of recognition from the TNRCC, entitling you to a one-year exemption

from routine field inspections. In any event, all information from the site visit is kept confidential from any enforcement authority. The compliance assessment will not lead to an inspection nor will any citations be issued or penalties levied, regardless of whether corrections are

SBLGA provides the free site visits through a federal grant. The program is open to local governments and independently owned business with 100 or fewer employees.

Phonographs became popular household items in the early 1900s. A large, clunky wooden box topped by a metal or wooden horn was the most popular shape for the new music-making machines. The phonograph had to hold a record that was shaped like a disc or a cylinder. It had to be open so that the record could turn. The horn amplified the music. The strange looking device was tolerated because the idea of music on demand was so appealing.

A few of the early designers tried to hide the phonograph mechanism by making it to resemble another piece of furniture. One phonograph, made about 1910, was a forerunner of the jukebox. Twelve cylinders were kept inside the top of a round table in restaurant. A coin was

inserted, and one could select a song. The music played and could be heard through a small earphone on a flexible tube. A small, portable phonograph was housed in a box shaped like a stack of books. Another was put inside a box topped by a statue of Buddha.

The most unusual were the Lampaphone and Phonolamp. They were popular around 1920. One was a table lamp, the other a floor lamp. Each had electric light bulbs and a phonograph hidden beneath large, fringed parchment shades. One of these oddities is now worth about \$4,000.

To get candle wax off your antique table, use a hair dryer set on low heat. Melt the wax, then wipe it off.



recognize a fraud

The National Fraud Information Center offers the following tips and advise to help you recognize slamming, cramming and solicitation scams:

Slamming: when your phone service is changed from your regular provider to another company without your knowledge or consent. While long-distance service is the most common target of slamming, your local service may also be slammed if there is local competition in your area.

To slam you, all a crook needs is your business name and phone number. The fraudulent company then notifies your local phone company, which performs the switch in service provider.

Sometimes slammers create phony verifications. One ploy is to pose as your local or long-distance phone company and ask if you are satisfied with your service, if you want to take advantage of a new discount plan, or if you'd like to consolidate your telephone bills. Your "yes" answer is tape-recorded and used as proof that you agreed.

Cramming: when a vendor asks your phone company to bill you for voice mail, paging, internet access or other services that you never agreed to

To cram unauthorized charges onto your phone bill, all the crook needs is your business name and phone number. You might unwillingly provide that information, or it can easily be obtained from telephone directories and other lists.

Be careful when you fill out contest entry forms, product coupons or other promotional offers. Read the fine print to see if you are also agreeing to purchase services.

If a caller claims to be from your telephone company and asks questions about your service, offers a new service, or notifies you of a change in service, don't provide information or agree to anything immediately. Get the person's name and number and then call your phone company to confirm that the caller and the purpose for the call are legitimate.

Look at "junk mail" carefully before you dispose of it. If could be a "negative option" notice that you will be signed up for an optional service unless you contact the vendor to refuse it.

Don't return calls to numbers on your pager or answering machine that you don't recognize. You could be dialing a number that results in signing up for a service without real-

Scams: It's sometimes hard to tell if a sales pitch is legitimate or fraudulent. You can't judge it by the tone of someone's voice.

or how friendly or sincere the person seems.

Good salespeople are convincing, and so are crooks. But it's probably a

· You get a call or postcard from someone telling you you've won a prize and asking for payment to buy something, for processing and administrative fees, taxes or any other reason. Legitimate sweepstakes or prize offers don't ask for payment because it's illegal.

· The person says you have to take the offer immediately or you'll miss the opportunity. Legitimate companies don't pressure people to act without time to look into the
