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BoA adds Private Recreation Zoning District over P&Z recommendation

Salado aldermen voted unanimously at their Dec. 6 meeting to add two new zoning district designations to the Zoning Ordinance, Public Facility and Private Recreation, and to list the land uses that are permitted by right or allowed by Conditional Use Permit within those districts.

The vote to add the Zoning District designation of Private Recreation to the zoning ordinance came over the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission against the designation and Land Uses.

The P&Z Commission voted in November on a motion to recommend against the new Zoning District designation Private Recreation. Commissioners Susan Terry, Ronnie Tynes and K.D. Hill supported the motion against the designation and Larry Roberson and Tom McMahan opposed the motion.

Prior to the vote on the Private Recreation Zoning District, aldermen conducted a public hearing Dec. 6 at which three citizens spoke: Bryan Fritch, a Mill Creek resident, Ron Gravette and Billy Helm, representatives of the owners' group of Mill Creek Country Club.

"To not change the zoning of the Mill Creek Golf Course to recreational (something should have been done years ago) would be a thumb in the eye of every property owner who bought or built in this area partly because of the golf course," Fritch said.

"The only reason I can see to leaving the residential zoning in place is to facilitate the sale of golf course property to housing developers or for the ownership group to develop it themselves," he added.

Gravette called the proposed Zoning District designation a "ludicrous designa-

He added that if the Village applies that designation to Mill Creek golf course it is "a semi-seizure of our property." The zoning designation could lower the value of the property if it were ap-

plied to the golf course area. The golf course is currently zoned Single Family residential. Under that designation, golf course is one of the land uses allowed in the current Zoning Ordinance with a Conditional Use Permit. Mill Creek golf course was in operation before the incorporation of Salado.

P&Z voted against the Private Recreation designation "with considerable discussion... The commission felt this would be onerous."

"Over-riding the P&Z will be very important in any zoning challenge" if the Village pursues zoning the golf course as Private Recre-

During discussion on the matter, Village administrator told aldermen that staff "very well could be coming forward with zoning action not just on this property but

other property as well."

"The city has the ability to zone property as it sees the need," Ferguson said. Property owners can petition to have their zoning changed.

"Something comes back to haunt us," Helm said. "The real deal is that this is private property. We should have the right to do what we want to with the property."

Alderman Michael Mc-Dougal said that the development of the golf course property into residential lots would affect the value of properties around the golf course. "Turning it into housing would be a travesty," he said.

McDougal gave the motion to follow the administration recommendation on creating the Private Recreation Zoning District designation. Andy Jackson gave the second. Aldermen Frank Coachman and Michael Coggin joined McDougal and Jackson in voting in fa-

The following uses are permitted by right for Private Recreation Zoning Districts: 1. Amusement Services (Indoors), Country Club (Private), Dinner Theatre, Driving Range, Golf Course (Miniature), Golf Course (Private), Health Club (Physical Fitness), Membership Sports, Museum, Park (Private or Public), Swimming Pool (Commercial), Tennis Court (Private/not lighted), Theater (non-motion picture), Antenna (Non-commercial), Church/Place of Worship, Civic Club, Fire Station, Fraternal Organization, Lodge, or Union, Franchised Private Utility (not listed) and Membership

Amusement Services (Indoors) is a land use that is prohibited in Single Family Residential. It is permitted by right in the Private Recreation Zoning District. It is defined in the Zoning Ordinance as "Amusement Services (Indoors): An amusement enterprise that is wholly enclosed within a building which is treated acoustically so that noise generated by the enterprise is not perceptible at the bounding property line, and that provides activities, services and instruction for the entertainment of customers or members, but not including amusement arcades. Uses may include, but are not limited to, the following: bowling alley, ice skating rink, martial arts club, racquetball or handball club, indoor tennis courts or club, indoor swimming pool or scuba diving facility, and other similar types of uses."

The aldermen, Mayor, village administrator, P&Z commissioners Roberson and McMahan and Fritch received certified letters that were mailed the day following the vote informing them that if they were members that their memberships had been revoked and that they were not allowed on any of the private property owned by MCCC, LC.

Long-term indicators point toward pending economic downturn

fined by the Standard and Poor's 500 Stock Index (SPX) fell 4.6 percent this week closing at 2633.08. that puts it down 1.52 percent year-to-date and once more officially in a "correction" as it is down almost 11 percent from its late September high. Following the G-20 conference, during which President Trump and Chairman Xi seemed to reach a temporary truce in the escalating U.S.-China trade war, the market rallied, but then a series of tweets by the President suggested the truce was not real. That was followed by news that a senior Chinese executive was arrested at the Toronto airport for extradition to face charges in the U.S. Then the U.S. announced pending criminal charges against Chinese government employees accused of hacking. Taken together, the incidents have caused many investors to conclude that a full-fledged diplomatic and trade war is breaking out between the world's two largest economies. Such a "cold" war could be quite damaging for the world and the U.S. economic outlook, hurting corporate earnings, and raising the potential for a recession.



The U.S. Treasury benchmark 10-year note yield promptly declined to 2.86 percent, well below the 3.24 percent yield it hit early in December and only 2/100 of a percent higher than the 2-year note. The effectively "flat" yield curve generated its own set of worries as it is perilously close to an inversion. An inverted yield curve commonly suggests a recession is likely within 12-18 months. In an odd bit of good news, the price of West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude oil rose 3.02 percent for the week to \$52.28 but remained down over 22 percent for the trailing three months. Lower oil

The Economy

The big economic news on Friday was that U.S. unemployment held at 3.7 percent, the lowest number since 1969, but employers hired 155,000 new workers, down from a longer term moving average nearer 200,000. Year over year wage growth stood at 3.1 percent, the highest since 2009. Consumer spending held steady at near record levels but that drove the U.S. trade deficit in October to its highest level in ten years at \$55.5 billion. The record trade deficit was the result of three factors. First, the tax-cut this year left Americans with more money to spend than we have the capability of absorbing in the U.S. economy. Second, the tariffs have ironically raised the price of American-made goods more than imports. Third, the tariffs and counter-tariffs have cut deeply into American ex-

Private construction which many spending, consider an advance indicator of future economic growth, fell 0.3 percent in October, as real residential investment declined by 1.6 percent, The Commerce Department also revised August and September's residential investment down to negative numbers, putting the home investment figures down for the trailing three months.

In another area watched as a long-term indicator,

United States Factory orders, fell 2.1 percent in October after rising in August and September, with durable goods orders falling 4.3 percent. As we have suggested before, both commercial and personal buyers tend to increase purchases of long-life durable goods when they expect the economy to improve in the future and start to cut back on such purchases when they are anticipating a downturn.

Rumors abounded during the week that the Federal Reserve might slow their rate increases next year but it remained clear that another rate hike was coming this month. Even the optimists seemed to believe that we would see at least two quarter point increases in 2019. That would raise the overnight interest rate to around to at least 3 percent, a higher short-term rate than the current yield on the 10-year Treasury note. Such a condition would indeed be the dreaded yield-curve inversion, feared by investors as a harbinger of a future recession. If the inversion were to occur in mid-2019, the stage would be well set for the 2020 recession that many economists have been forecasting.

The cumulative effect of the data continues to suggest that the economy, both domestic and global, is coasting on momentum rather than accelerating with some leading indicators beginning to show weakness. At the same time, the concurrent and lagging indicators continue to proclaim that things are doing quite well in the short-term with the economy running at full or even more than full speed.

Sorry, You Can't Protect Mueller

Mitch McConnell just did our constitutional order an enormous favor by burying the so-called Robert Mueller protection bill, hopefully never to rise again.

There's been much harumphing about how Republicans are in the tank for President Donald Trump by not getting on board the bipartisan bill, but it is a singularly misbegotten piece of legislation.

Plan A, i.e., passing the thing, would have been hard enough. But its supporters apparently didn't think through a need for a Plan B or C: Trump would have vetoed the bill if it passed Congress, and if it somehow passed Congress with a veto-proof majority, the Supreme Court likely would have struck it down.

The push for the bill again shows how, to this point, Trump's main threat to our constitutional system has been catalyzing a hysterical opposition. That opposition is willing to throw overboard legal and constitutional niceties to thwart Trump.

Hence, much of the #resistance judging regarding Trump measures. And hence the astonishing spectacle of U.S. senators, sworn to uphold the Constitution, advancing a blatantly unconstitutional bill.

The president is the chief executive, and like it or not, Trump is president. "I

conceive that if any power whatsoever is in its nature executive," James Madison declared, "it is the power of appointing, overseeing and controlling those who execute the laws."

If the president can fire the attorney general (the illused Jeff Sessions attests that he can), he certainly can fire Mueller. The attorney general is a much more important position.

In compelling Senate testimony, Yale law professor Akhil Amar explained the constitutional problems with the Mueller protection bill. One is that to be constitutional, the special counsel must be an inferior officer. Otherwise, he has to be confirmed by the Senate, which Mueller wasn't. And if he's an inferior officer, he can be fired.

The problem with the protection bill in terms of constitutional architecture also gets at the problem with the special counsel.

Yes, there's lots of criminal action in the Mueller probe -- the Paul Manafort trial, the various plea deals -- but current Justice Department guidance says that the president himself can't be indicted. That means

that all Mueller can do regarding the president directly is produce a report that may well instigate congressional action, up to and including an impeachment probe. This preliminary investigative work should be the work of Congress alone, without the help of someone nominally working for the president he's targeting.

Indeed, if you want investigations of the president that the president can't stop or have influence over, you have to run them out of Congress. With the Democratic takeover of the House, such congressional probes are on their way.

Trump has huffed and puffed about Mueller, yet cooperated -- in some instances, quite fulsomely -with his investigation. That could change at any time. But firing Mueller would lead to dire political consequences, and now fail to achieve its end of truly shutting him down. If cashiered, Mueller would presumably show up in January as the first witness before Rep. Jerry Nadler's Judiciary Committee and spill all he

That's probably all the protection Mueller needs, and certainly all the protection he can legitimately be afforded.

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Qualify for a Medicare Special **Enrollment Period? You Have Until Feb. 28 To Pick Your Plan**

Even though the Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug Plan Annual Election Period ended Dec. 7, some people with Medicare may still be eligible for what is known as a Special Enrollment Period, or SEP.

There are many reasons why Medicare beneficiaries may be eligible for a Special Election Period. Some SEPs have a fixed deadline, while others depend on the date you became eligible for the SEP.

Some people with Medicare qualify for an SEP that ends Feb. 28, 2019 be-

Their current plan did not renew in 2019 or their retirement benefits were discontinued as of Dec. 31, 2018. People whose current plans did not renew for 2019 should have been notified of these changes by their plan by Oct. 2, 2018.

Their 2018 plan received a 2.5 or below STAR quality rating for three consecutive years. STAR ratings judge the quality of plans in several categories, including preventive care, managing chronic conditions, member experience, member complaints and customer service. STAR ratings are based on a five-star scale and can change each year. STAR ratings for 2019

Medicare plans are available at www.Medicare.gov.

Even though beneficiaries in this category have until Feb. 28 to choose a plan, those who want coverage beyond original Medicare to start Jan. 1, 2019, must select a plan by Dec. 31, 2018.

When choosing a plan, Medicare beneficiaries should:

Learn the monthly costs of the plan (premium), costs to use the plan (deductibles and copayments), and the maximum you might have to pay in case of a serious health event (maximum out of pocket).

Learn about the doctor and hospital networks included in each plan.


If you take medication, it's important to know that Original Medicare does not cover most prescription drugs. Many Medicare Advantage plans include prescription drug coverage, or you can sign up for a standalone Part D Prescription Drug Plan. Be sure to check the estimated cost of your medication on each of these plan options.

St. John Lutheran Church, Bartlett celebrates 135 years

Five neighbors. dream.

The dream began in Germany. In 1875, the dream traveled to Texas.


It was a dream of faith and freedom, of journeying to a new home where all people would be free to worship according to their beliefs.

In 1880, the dream found a home, on a hill overlooking the still-nascent central Texas town of Bartlett.

It was a dream about a church.

And it was a dream about forming a fellowship of believers uniting to worship together and to work together, shaping their congregation and their community for the betterment of all. Creating a firm rock of faith for their families and their families' families to rely on as their source of strength in facing the challenges and the joys to come.

Captain John Bartlett, who just one year later co-founded the rural central Texas town of Bartlett

with Captain J.E. Pietzsch, Gus Norman, Emil Al- this dream realized brecht and John Janke to construct the first wooden school/church building on two acres of land donated for that purpose by Capt. Bartlett. Although the congregation's written records were destroyed when the parsonage burned in 1922, they were reconstructed by the Rev. Theodor Bogisch, who was leading the growing congregation at that time. The following men were listed as organizers of the congregation: Daniel Lange, Andrew Lindemann, Carl Lindemann, Gustav Steglich, F.A.W. Zschiesche and Gottlieb Zschiesche.

Their dream was first realized in Bartlett on December 16, 1883, when Texas Synod church records show that Pastor Immanuel Joseph Glatzle began conducting services at the site in November 1883. Born in Germany, educated in Switzerland, and ordained in Victoria, Texas, the Lutheran pastor formally organized the congregation of St. John Lutheran Church, Bartlett, Texas, on December 16, 1883.

This Sunday, December joined with Elisha Allen, 16, 2018, the inheritors of of them descendants of their church founders, some still bearing the names of Janke, Lange, Lindemann, Steglich, and other early church members, will celebrate the 135th anniversary of this congregation of believers.

Still in use, the congregation's historic cemetery, situated behind the current sanctuary and parsonage buildings, was established in 1800 when two graves were placed, for Mrs. Peter (Rosina Margaretha Fleischmann) Limmer and the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Lindemann.

The current church building was constructed in 1931 and dedicated on Sunday, January 7, 1932, under the ministry of Rev. R. C. Albert, the congregation's first pastor to preach in English. The church basement was excavated during the months of July and August that year, using mules and scrapers.

The cornerstone was laid on September 6, 1931. As recorded in the Holland Progress newspaper of September 4, 1931:

The Rev. Theo Bogisch of Thorndale, who was pastor of the church for 13 years, will speak in German. His son, the Rev. S. A. Bogisch of Taylor, will speak in English. This young man was reared on the church grounds where the new church is being erected and it is very appropriate to have him take an important part in the ser-

The altar and baptismal font were moved from the old church.

The altar, dedicated on November 18, 1917, was purchased as a remembrance for the 400th anniversary of the Reformation. The font is believed to have been acquired at this time, a gift of the late W.R. Janke,

Longtime church member Benjamin Muehlhause purchased and dismantled the old wooden church building, in 1931 using the lumber to build his own home just a mile north of the church property.


The challenging financial times of the 1930's notwithstanding, the frugal German-ancestry ing families from Holland, Bartlett, and their rural neighbors worked to promptly pay off their indebtedness for the modern brick structure with a seating capacity of 600. The building they envisioned is a testament to the strong faith of these forebears who commissioned, built and fully paid for the building during the years of the Great Depression.

Leading the 10:30 anniversary worship service at the stately red-brick church located a mile north of Bartlett on Highway 95 will be Bishop Erik K.J. Gronberg, leader of the church's North Texas-Northern Louisiana (NT-NL) Synod. St. John's interim Pastor Becky Sogge will co-officiate.

A special feature of the services at St. John is always the music. Lutherans have long been known as "the singing church." The congregation's historic pipe organ, installed with 1,217 pipes in 1951, leads the congregation in hymns for every occasion, from the somber reflections of Lent to the joy-filled expectation of Advent, songs of faith during funeral services and, often, the exuberance of hymns composed by Martin Luther.

A major renovation of the organ is currently underway, with the congregation celebrating the Dedication of their new \$50,000 organ console on the afternoon of Sunday, January 20. Additional work, including long-needed work to replace aging components including all the 1951 leather padding -- will be the next step following efforts to raise the significant funds required for the extensive work.

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

The Fantastic Teeth Fan Club, sponsored by the Masonic Home and School of Texas (MHS), strives to prevent suffering from toothaches, reduce missed school days due to dental problems, and cut costs for dental treatment.

Last year, Texas Masonic lodges collaborated with MHS to distribute 134,570 Fantastic Teeth Fan Club dental kits and information to first graders in 1,689 schools across the state. than other children, with nearly 12 times more restricted-activity days due to dental issues than children from higher-income families. With more than 1.5 million Texas children living in poverty, there is a great need for preventive dental care.

Dental problems also directly affect success for children, with more than 51 million school hours lost each year to dental-related illness. Teachers have judged both classroom performance and classroom behavior to be significantly poorer among children in need of dental care. 

James Lowry Smith Family of Salado

Smiths charter members of First Baptist Church

PART IV (FINAL) IN A SERIES ON THE FAMILY OF JAMES LOWRY SMITH, AN EARLY PRINCIPAL OF SALADO COLLEGE AND A CHARTER MEMBER AND FARIY DEACON OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF SALADO.


The Smith family's last child, a boy named McHenry, was born in September of 1878. Despite a grueling schedule of work and school, the Smith family devoted time to church activities.

Jimmie recorded with pride that he attended the first evening service in Salado's new Baptist Church building in October of 1878 and also attended the first Sunday school class when that program was established. Jimmie was later tasked with taking attendance at Sunday school and was appointed church bell ringer. When she was old enough, Roxalee taught Sunday school and served on committees at church while Archie claimed that he owed his salvation to Major Penn, an evangelist who sometimes preached at Salado's First Baptist Church. James Lowry Smith was a charter member and one of the church's first deacons.6

The new church building was the pride of the community, and members celebrated a special Christmas in the new structure in 1878. According to Jimmie's journal, church members decided to display a Christmas tree for the first time. Jimmy Smith was one of a dozen committee members assigned the task of securing the tree. On Christmas Eve, James, who was home for the holidays from his teaching duties in Belton, joined Jimmie in decorating the interior of the church.

In 1880 the Smith family faced the loss of a second child when baby McHenry became gravely ill with pneumonia in early February. Community support was in full force during times of crisis. Dr. Welborn Barton and his wife Louisa, who were also members of the Smith's church family, alternated nights sitting with the sick child in the Smith home. When little else could be done. Dr. Barton encouraged the family to sing together. Family and friends joined hands in a chorus of Shall We Meet Beyond the River. The situation grew worse but Julia, assisted by many neighbors, kept up the nightlong vigils until McHenry finally lost his battle for life on March 7. Despite their immense sorrow, the Smiths were fortunate that James was again working in Salado at the time of McHenry's illness and death. The school had needed an interim principal and James Smith had taken the year-long job. In the late stages of McHenry's life, James canceled classes so that he could spend critical time with his family. McHenry was buried beside his brother Eugene, the second Smith family member placed in Salado Cemetery.

It appears that after completing his stint as interim principal in 1880, James Smith retired, no longer able to withstand the rigors of travel. As with all families, changes came that were inevitable and bitter sweet. Second son Jimmie left home in 1882, first to attend a business college in Galveston, and later to take a job in Colorado City,



Texas, where he had accepted a bookkeeping job. The family gave him a party as a send-off in late August. Many friends came to wish Jimmie well that day. The Smith descendants have lovingly saved mementos from that event, including an autograph album that is filled with messages from young people with names that are common in Salado's history. Julia also penned a message to her son, addressing him as, "Jimmie, my Dear Boy."

May Heavens richest blessings attend you; and as you have from early childhood honored Father and Mother I feel assured the promise that your days may be long is yours, but remember soon life's spring-time will be over, and its autumn days will come: Happy then will be those workers who have sheaves to carry home.

It must have been a sad time for family, seeing the first child leave home. But a greater sorrow was on the horizon. On January 10, 1883, less than five months after the family saw their first child leave to begin his life as an adult, James Lowry Smith Sr. died. He was fifty-five. Smith's once Raven-black hair was still plentiful but streaked with grey, as was the scruffy beard that had replaced a well-manicured one of earlier days.

James Lowry Smith had been the consummate gentleman and a mentor to many. It is unnecessary for us to attempt to select additional words to honor his memory; a group of his students took up that task shortly after his death, commissioning this inscrip-

Rufus Burleson, President of Waco University (later merged with Baylor), who had known James as a student and a colleague at the school in Independence, wrote to the widowed Julia in Salado. Burleson was arranging a reunion of teachers and intended to pay a special tribute to his "noble and beloved" friend, James Lowry Smith.7

James L. Smith was buried in Salado Cemetery just steps from the graves of sons Eugene and McHenry. Julia Smith was only forty-four when widowed and left with six children and a busy farm. Twenty-fiveyear-old Archie, who did not marry until 1890, remained at home to help his mother. At the time of their father's death. Robert was 18, Forrest 15, Roxalee 13, Harriett 11, and youngest child Julia was 8.

Julia Smith remained in Salado for over a decade after her husband's death so that the children could finish school. Forrest was by far the most persistent student. After finishing his studies in Salado in June of 1887, he completed a course in Pharmacy followed by a two-year stint in the drug business in Salado. Forrest then returned to school, attending Sam Houston Normal Institute at Huntsville, graduating in 1892. He then returned to Bell County where he worked as Bell County Superintendent of Public Schools for two years before entering medical school, graduating from the University of Pennsylvania in 1900.

After graduating from Arnold High Thomas



Back in 1933, the Franklin Bridge Club of Philadelphia staged its annual team-of-four club championship. It was no world-shaking event: The winners, even if their names could be recalled, would stir no excitement. But one hand played was of a remarkable nature.

The bidding by the North-South pairs varied a great deal at the different tables, but nearly all of them arrived at six hearts, certainly a reasonable undertaking. Whenever West led his singleton diamond, declarer

invariably went down one.

The South hand progressed from table to table searching for a declarer who would make the slam, but it never encountered one. It was only in later analysis that the winning line of play was discovered.

Assume South wins the diamond lead with the ace, draws trumps and cashes the diamond king, learning that East has two diamond winners.

The outlook may seem hopeless, but let's say our heroic declarer next plays the A-2 of spades. When West follows low, South finesses the ten! This hurdle surmounted, declarer then leads dummy's king of clubs and, after East plays

low, discards the king of spades on it! These spectacular maneuvers lead to a very satisfying denouement. West can do no better than win the club with the ace, but whichever black suit he returns, the contract is firmly on ice. Dummy wins, and declarer disposes of his two diamond losers on the

The hand demonstrates once again that ingenuity in bridge has no bounds. However, it would be a harsh critic who berated himself for missing the play shown, and, in fact, not one South cut his throat that night.

But the fact remains that in theory, every declarer should have adopted this method of play, since it offered the only real chance to make the contract.

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

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

The Green Toad is the smallest true toad in Texas

Generally speaking, we live in a society where "bigger is better". We have the biggest houses, have the biggest televisions, drive the biggest vehicles, and drink the largest drinks. However, there is a species of toad that thrives here in west Texas that bucks that trend.

The Green Toad (Bufo debilis) is one of nine species of "true" toads that live in Texas, and it can be quite common where it occurs. It can be observed statewide, excluding the eastern quarter of the state and a small area in the northeastern corner of the Panhandle. It also occurs in the adjacent states of Oklahoma and New Mexico, but only as far south as the state of Nuevo Leon, Mexico.



to semi-arid grassy areas that are associated with permanent to semi-permanent streams, creeks, rivers, and ponds. In fact, it is more dependent on this type of moisturized habitat than any other west Texas toad species.

The Green Toad is a flattened amphibian that has dry, wart-covered skin. It is the smallest toad species that inhabits this state, with adult females (the larger sex) attaining a total body length of just under two inches. Adult males of only one inch have been observed chorusing. The background coloration can be described as a grassy green, and there is little variabilitv in this bright little toad. The back is peppered with small black dots that make the green coloration appear that much brighter. The belly coloration is off-white in coloration and occasionally has small dark spots. The paratoid glands are the large "bumps" immediately behind each eye, and in this species, they are elongated and extend down onto the sides of the neck. Each toe on the hind feet end in a sharp black point, and there are two sharp tubercles on each hind foot.

Green Toads, like other amphibian species, live a dual-life. In fact, the word amphibian itself means "double-life". When the spring and summer rains begin, males of this species will congregate at shallow pools to begin to attract a mate. This attraction consists of calling in a nasally buzz. Their call has been likened to that of certain insects such as cicadas.

Once a male successfully attracts a mate, they engage in the process of externally fertilizing the eggs. This process is known as amplexus. During this time, a male will wrap his forelegs around a receptive female and as she lays her eggs, he will fertilize each individual one as it exits the female's body. Unlike other toad species where thousands of eggs may be laid each breeding session, this toad only lays mere hundreds at a time.

The life cycle of the Green Toad continues as the

fertilized eggs hatch into tiny, dark tadpoles. These tadpoles are often referred to as "pollywogs". They are fish-like in appearance, and they obtain their oxygen from the water through gills. Within a day or two after hatching, they begin a miraculous metamorphosis where their lungs begin to develop, while at the same time, back legs begin to form on their bodies. Within the next day or two from then, front legs begin to appear, the tail begins to shrink, the lungs continue to develop, and the back

legs become larger. This process continues for about a week after hatching, when the tiny toadlets have completed their change, looking like tiny replicas of the adults, thus beginning their "second" life.

This species is highly nocturnal, and it feeds on small invertebrate animals such as spiders and insects. In the opinion of many, it is arguably one of the world's most beautiful toad species and unquestionably the most colorful one of west Texas.

JL Smith School in Salado in 1892,

Hattie attended Baylor Female College in Belton (now the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor) where she studied art and music. The descendants have retained the receipt for her tuition and board for one semester totally \$165.35.

By the late 1890s Julia Smith's children were grown and educated, and she was free to look at other options for her life. She was in good health and not yet fifty years old. Roxalee and Frank Andrews had moved to Houston where they ned a mansion in an exclusive neighborhood. The house was large enough to accommodate Julia as well as youngest daughters Hattie and Julia who still lived with their mother, so the Andrews welcomed them. Frank was enormously successful as an attorney and was a generous man. The move to Houston by Julia, Hattie and the younger Julia, left Archie as the last remaining Smith family member in Salado.

James and Julia Smith would almost certainly have considered the children they raised as their greatest legacy. As adults, most of the Smith offspring remained close in spirit but were scattered by location. One exception was youngest child Julia, who never married and lived with her mother and sister for most of her life. She died in 1954. Archie married a local girl, Emma Caskey, staying in Salado where he made his living farming. The couple had two sons but neither lived to adulthood. The boys, (named James L. and Archie) are buried in Salado Cemetery. When

age of fifty-nine in 1918, a local newspaper described him as a prominent Salado citizen whose death caused much sorrow. His death also marked the end of the James Lowry Smith family presence in the Salado area.

Second son Jimmie lived an exemplary life, making a name for himself in Amarillo where he lived with his wife Marie. His life story was so captivating that it is the subject of a book titled, Civilizing the Texas Frontier, by Bill McCarron. James, a highly successful businessman, was devoted to his wife and his church He left no children when he

died in 1927. If it is fair to say that there was one nonconformist among the Smith children, then the distinction belongs to fourth son Robert. After Jimmie left home and his father died, Julia wrote Jimmie to complain that she was having problems with Robert, then in his late teens. Jimmie, always the dutiful son, allowed Robert to relocate and he even found his brother a job. But Jimmie found his brother's habits annoying and was happy when Robert took a job as a ranch hand and moved on. By 1887, Robert Smith was married, farming, and living in Illinois where he lived until his death in 1943.

Doctor Forrest Bedford Smith suffered a premature death at age forty-seven. His early demise cut short the time he should have had to enjoy his many acleagues who were desperate to save him, but lost the battle in early 1915.

Harriett "Hattie" married Jacob Ralston, an attorney, and moved to Cameron. She died in 1951. Frank and Roxalee Andrews had three sons but lost one before his third birthday. Oldest son Edward became a banker. and Forrest Lee became an attorney.

Julia Catherine Smith lived forty years after her husband's death. When she died in 1923 at the age of 84, she had outlived four of her children including Forrest and Archie, and had lost three grandchildren to early deaths. She had spent the last third of her life in Houston in the Andrews home, far from Salado. For that reason, it likely seemed logical that Julia be buried in the Andrews family plot in Houston's Glenwood Cemetery. But over time, some of Julia's family members have begun rethinking that choice. The treasure trove of documents, letters, and family memorabilia they have lovingly saved, leave little doubt that Salado was considered the James Lowry Smith's family home. After a separation lasting one hundred and thirty-five years, Smith descendants think it might just be time to reunite Julia and James in the Smith family plot in Salado.



Beware of scammers pretending to be from **Social Security**

n the digital age, frauds and scams are an unfortunate part of doing business online. During the holiday season, Social Security has traditionally seen a spike in phishing scams, and we want to protect you as best we can.

We urge you to always be cautious and to avoid providing sensitive information such as your Social Security Number (SSN) or bank account information to unknown individuals over the phone or internet. If you receive a call and aren't expecting one, you must be extra careful. You can always get the caller's information, hang up, and — if you do need more clarification — contact the official phone number of the business or agency that the caller claims to represent. Never reveal personal data to a stranger who called

Please take note; there's a scam going around right now. You might receive a call from someone claiming to be from Social Security or another agency. Calls can even display the 1-800-772-1213, Social Security's national customer service number, as the incoming number on your caller ID. In some cases, the caller states that Social Security does not have all of your personal information, such as your Social Security number (SSN), on file. Other callers claim Social Security needs additional information so the agency can increase your benefit payment, or that Social Security will terminate your

benefits if they do not confirm your information. This appears to be a widespread issue, as reports have come from people across the country. These calls are not from Social Security.

Callers sometimes state that your Social Security number is at risk of being deactivated or deleted. The caller then asks you to provide a phone number to resolve the issue. People should be aware the scheme's details may vary; however, you should avoid engaging with the caller or calling the number provided, as the caller might attempt to acquire personal information.

Social Security employees occasionally contact people by telephone for customer-service purposes. In only a few special situations, such as when you have business pending with us, a Social Security employee may request the person confirm personal information over the phone.

Social Security employees will never threaten you or promise a Social Security benefit approval or increase in exchange for information. In those cases, the call is fraudulent, and you should just hang up. If you receive these calls, please report the information to the Office of the Inspector General at 1-800-269-0271 or online at oig.ssa.gov/report.

Remember, only call official phone numbers and use secured websites of the agencies and businesses you know are correct. Protecting your information is an important part of Social Security's mission to secure today and tomorrow.
