# SISD early voting outpacing spring failed bond election

Early voting in the Salado I.S.D. bond election so far has surpassed the record-setting April 2005 bond election as more than 375 voters have cast ballots regarding the two proposals totaling \$16.175 million in the first five days. The pace is about 15 percent higher than the first five days of early voting last spring, when voters rejected a \$17 million bond proposal by a 214-vote margin, 844 against to 630 for.

Early voting was extremely heavy in that spring election with 901 casting ballots. During that early voting period, 484 voted against the proposal and 417 voted in favor of the proposal.

If the current pace continues, the \$15.675 million and \$500,000 bond propositions could see more than 1,600 voters cast ballots, which is more a third of the 4,458 registered voters in Salado I.S.D.

In recent bond elections, a high voter turnout

has resulted in the defeat new high school will be a of the proposals, including Bell County where voters twice rejected a proposed jail and courts complex and Round Rock I.S.D. where voters turned back a \$349 million bond. In Liberty Hill I.S.D. last year, voters rejected a \$65 million proposal 799 against, 410 for and a \$5 million athletic complex 877 against, 318 for. Liberty Hill quickly called another bond election for \$20 million for classroom facilities, which passed 382 for, 128 against in an election with low voter turnout.

Salado I.S.D. The bond Proposition 1 is \$15,675,000 for construction of a new high school on 50 acres of property at the corner of FM 2484 and Williams Rd. and renovations of the current school campuses. Of the \$15,675,000, \$15 million has been estimated by the school district's architects and construction manager for construction of the new high school and \$675,000 will be budgeted for renovations of current academic facilities. The one-story building, most likely utilizing pre-engineered components, with a classroom capacity of 600 and a core capacity of 800 students. The school will be designed to allow the future construction of additional classrooms. The current student enrollment at Salado High School is 414 students. The total student enrollment is at 1,220.

Proposition \$500,000 for renovation of the elementary gymnasium and renovation and expansion of the current football stadium on Thomas Arnold Rd.

If Proposition 1 and Proposition 2 are approved, a property tax increase of 17.83 cents per \$100 evaluation will be required to retire the debt, if there is no change in the taxable values of the school district. Salado ISD has shown at least a 10 percent increase in taxable property values for the last five years. If property values increase by 10 percent in the first year of the bond, the estimated increase in debt service

taxes will be 16.21 cents per \$100 valuation in the first year of the bond.

If only Proposition 1 is approved, the tax rate is anticipated to increase by 17.2 cents per \$100 evaluation with no growth in taxable values. A 10 percent increase in taxable values could result in a debt service tax increase of 15.64 cents per \$100 valuation.

As property values increase in the district, the tax rate required to retire the \$1.5 million total annual debt payment will decrease proportionally. The total debt payment includes debt on the new construction as well as on the current bonds. As the current bonds are paid off, the annual payment for

them will be rolled into the new bonds.

In addition, Salado school administrators expect to increase the maintenance and operation tax rate from the current \$1.422 to the \$1.50 maximum to operate the new campus when it opens in the 2008-09 school year, if construction is approved by voters.

Early voting will be 7: 30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. weekdays through Jan. 31 at the Salado Civic Center. There will be two additional early voting opportunities: 5:30-8 p.m. Jan. 26 at the Salado Intermediate School commons area and 8 a.m.-noon Jan. 28 at the Salado Civic Center. Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Feb. 4.

# Water Co. proposes increase

Salado Water Supply Corporation members will meet 6:30 p.m. Jan. 26 at the Salado Civic Center to discuss a rate increase, among other items on the agenda.

The (SWSC) Board of Directors have recommended the following rate increase: raise the minimum charge for 2,000 gallons or less from \$17.50 to \$19.90; also, a three percent per 1,000 gallon increase to customer using over 30,000 gallons per month.

This is the first price increase in three years.

In other business, the SWSC treasurer will present a report and the 2006 budget for consideration.

SWSC Manager RIcky Preston will report on the operations of the water system and update members on future projects and associated costs.

# Village of Salado fights fires

Salado aldermen are likely to adopt an ordinance banning the discharge of fireworks within the village in the near future, following a brief discussion of the possibility during their Jan. 19 meeting.

Banning fireworks in the village "doesn't hurt my feelings a bit," said alderman Michael Cooper during the discussion. He added that, "during a drought like this one" fireworks should be banned.

"I agree," Merle Stalcup added.

The fireworks ban, coupled with the current outdoor burn ban in the

village, are steps aldermen will take to prevent fires within the village. An outdoor burn ban is in place through March 31 within the village limits.

In other business, Salado aldermen discussed what steps were needed to lower the ISO ratings for the Village of Salado.

Currently, structures within five miles of a fire station and within 1,000 feet of a hydrant are rated at a 7, while structures within five miles of a fire station and beyond 1,000 feet from a fire hydrant are rated at 9. Properties that are more than five miles form a fire


station and beyond the 1,000 feet from a fire hydrant have the highest (and costliest) rating of 10.

Fire Chief Wayne Rutherford told aldermen that improving the equipment of the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, improving training for volunteer firefighters and improving the water system are crucial to lowering the ISO ratings.

The SVFD is currently working to address the areas of improvement that it can. The Salado Water Supply Corporation will have to address the water delivery system to fire hydrants within its area.







# **Answers to questions about the SISD bond**

If the bond is approved when will construction begin?

Construction for renovations may begin as early as Summer 2006. The bidding process for the high school would be in Fall 2006 with construction beginning in the winter.

## What will the new high school look like?

We will not work on plans until a bond passes, however initial discussions involve using a pre-engineered building design, one floor, with some type of limestone façade.

What is going to happen with the portable buildings at the current campuses?

The goal is to move all regular classrooms out of the portable buildings.

Is there going to be an auditorium?

Not at this time.

Is there going to be a tage?

We would like to have a stage in the new high school; however this is contingent upon the bidding process, which would be in Fall 2006 if a bond is passed. Adequate classroom space is the top priority.

How many classrooms in the new high school?

Our architects have

said that they can build a high school for a student enrollment of 600 with a core capacity of 800 for \$15,000,000. We have not finalized square footages at this time; although we can expect between 90,000-100,000 sf.

## What is your estimated completion date?

If the bond is passed, August 2008.

# Why did you look at renovating the elementary gym?

The TAE gym was originally built to protect students from inclement weather, most notably during the winter months. It has gradually been added on to and is now an intrinsic part of the elementary campus. Although there will be fewer students on the current campuses, elementary students would have to work around the scheduling for middle and high school and travel across the campuses to use those gyms.

The gym is hot. We want to offer comparable facilities on all campuses.

# How does a new high school impact crowding on all campuses?

It shifts all grade levels

# What is the difference between the last bond and this one?

The last bond included a school and athletic facilities in one package. No other options were presented.

This bond focuses on additional classrooms through a new high school and renovations to current campuses. A separate package includes the option to renovate parts of the current football field and elementary gym.

The focus is on class-room space.

#### Why is the Board not using a General Contractor instead of a Construction Manager At-risk?

Based upon visits with many districts and attendance at several Texas Association of School Board's training sessions on school construction and on the comments of 3 attorneys, the major differences between conmanagement struction at-risk (the method which SISD has selected) and a general contractor are that with the CM At-risk, all bids are taken to the school board for decisions. If bids come in under the anticipated dollar amount the school district receives the savings. General contractors are not required to use a bidding process. They can use the sub-contractors they so choose. Thu; the school board has little input on the quality of amount of the bids selected and if savings are incurred the district is not assured that it will be the beneficiary of these savings

The CM At-Risk also covers all liability.

# What kind of rooms will be in the new school?

The new school would have rooms required for all of the current programs including home economics, computer science, fine arts, band, ag/vocational science, art, and special programs.

# Are you considering a pre-engineered building?

Yes, this is a likelihood. The Intermediate School is a pre-engineered building.

# Can you build a waste water treatment plant in stages?

Yes, the master plan includes a wastewater treatment plant that can be built in stages as the need arises.

# What are the District's plans if the bond doesn't pass? Will the District go for another bond anytime soon?

The District does not have plans to pursue another bond if this one does not pass. Depending on growth, the District may choose none, some or all among the following options

- Add portable buildings.
- Add some classrooms to existing schools using fund balance, Delinquent Tax Anticipation Note, or Tax Anticipation Note.
- Use creative scheduling at the high school.

  What is the M&O tax

## what is the M&O tax rate going to be?

Since the Texas Supreme Court upheld the lower court's decision that the current dependency on local property taxes constitutes a state property tax, we do not know how the current funding structure will be changed for M&O. Currently 48 percent of Texas districts are taxing at the \$1.50 cap and 67 percent of districts are taxing at \$1.45 or more. SISD currently taxes at \$1.422 for M&O. Debt service, or the tax rate approved by voters for construction, will be unaffected. The Court did not rule on debt service taxes.

# What is the I&S tax rate going to be?

Based upon no property value increase and no increase in enrollment, the maximum projected I&S tax rate increase for both propositions would be \$.1783.





of whether or not to draw trumps, whether or not to take certain finesses, whether to establish highcard tricks or long suits, and so on.

Some or all of these things might have to be done, but the order in which they take place is usually of prime importance. The timing of such plays often spells the difference between the success or failure of a contract.

Take this case there South was in four hearts and got a spade lead. He won with the ace and immediately led the jack of trumps and finessed, losing to the queen. Back came a spade to South's king. Eventually, he lost four tricks -- a spade, two hearts and a diamond -and went down one.

Declarer should have made the contract, however. While the idea of attacking trumps was good, it was put into effect prematurely. By tackling trumps at once, South in essence pinned all his hopes on limiting himself to one trump loser.

South failed to recognize that he could afford to lose two heart tricks and still make the contract, provided he escaped the loss of a spade. This could have been achieved by leading the king of diamonds at trick two. After the defense took the ace, dummy's third diamond would provide a parking place for South's spade

Even if the king of diamonds was refused, a diamond continuation would establish dummy's third diamond as a trick. In that case, the jack of clubs would serve as the entry for the discard.

In the majority of suit contracts, declarer plays trumps at once. But when there is more urgent work to be done, as in this deal, declarer delays trump extraction until a more propitious time.

tingency Plans Officer to the Vice President. Several high-level positions overseas, including stints in Germay and Bosnia-Herzegovina, culminated with his appointment to his current position as Chief of Information Operations for the 1st Cavalry Division.

He began by presenting a short video of activities in Iraq, showing conditions prior to U.S. occupation and activities to restore and upgrade the living conditions and quality of life. He outlined U.S. goals in Iraq, which include establishing freedom and democracy and also providing freedom for our own future genera-Roberts tions. went on to say that about 50 percent of the population is "on the fence" as to societal preference, and the goal of our occupation is to educate this group on the virtues of freedom and democracy.

As to the primitive na-

ture of the Iraqi existence prior to our involvement, Roberts had pictures illustrating that the Iraqi people had no basic infrastructure such as potable water, rudimentary utilities, trash disposal and many other basic services we have accepted as necessary to existence. He went on to give examples of the many services the U.S. is providing for them that they have never experienced in the past. For example, the U.S. has built 350 new schools, 100 new clinics, upgraded medical schools, recruited 8,000 police, and built 72 police stations, according to Roberts.

Colonel Roberts reiterated that the goal of the U.S. is to change the lives of Iraqis, and that success has been demonstrated by the "purple fingers," which illustrate the Iraqi people's record of voting during the recent elections, which far exceeded predictions.
