Mentoring group given green light

"A mentor is not a replacement for a parent," Bob Roemer told Salado I.S.D. Trustees April 17 before the board approved the Salado Mentors program. "They're not a replacement for a teacher. A mentor is an additional role model for a student who may need that extra guidance."

Roemer sought and received authorization of the Salado Mentor program by the board of trustees as the next step in a series of actions to introduce the program to the school system. He explained that a mentoring board was formed earlier in the school year to build the foundation for a successful mentoring program in Salado schools.

Thus far, the board has established a timeline for actions, including the next phase of recruiting volunteers to meet on a regular basis with Salado fifth graders. After establishing a working program with the fifth grade at Salado Intermediate School, the board may decide to extend the program to other grades.

While the mentoring board has worked on the process from its inception, it has not done so alone.

"We have had a lot of contact with the Round Rock schools, which have had a very successful mentoring program for several years now," Roemer told trustees.

Learning from successes and mistakes made by others, the Salado group hopes to begin to match mentor volunteers with receptive students in the 2006-07 school year.

School trustees Deborah Aldridge was the catalyst to forming the group, calling the first informal

meeting last fall.

Since then, though, the group has grown from a small handful to a board of 11 people with specific assignments and responsibilities. Salado I.S.D. personnel, such as Superintendent Robin Battershell, Intermediate School counselor Melissa Kemp and Communities in Schools coordinator Jessica Beyers, sit on the board along with trustee Aldridge and other community members.

The board has adopted by-laws and other operating procedures. One of the key procedures is a background check of mentor hopefuls. According to Dr. Battershell, the district will use a national database to conduct background checks of mentor applicants.

Matching the student to the mentor is another key, according to Battershell: "A good match is so important."


Protecting the confidentiality of the student is one of the top priorities in the program, Roemer told trustees.

School counselors, teachers and administrators -- as well as parents and the students themselves -- may request a mentor for a particular child.

Participation is voluntary for the child and family. "We're not going to force it on a student or a parent," Dr. Battershell told trustees.

The board unanimously approved the program, which will present an annual report to trustees, to go forward with recruitment and training of volunteers on a motion by Lynn Renfro, receiving a second from Jackie Burson.

The board will begin recruiting volunteers in May.



Conceptual master plan

Board approves bond sale, eye conceptual master plan

After awarding the issuance of \$16,175,000 unlimited tax school building bonds at their regular meeting April 17, Salado I.S.D. Trustees examined the conceptual master plan for the 50 acres of property on which the new high school will be built using proceeds from the sale of the bonds.

Merrill Lynch & Co. was awarded the bid, with the lowest rate of 4.803 percent, among six companies submitting bids. The highest bid was 4.869 percent

Before the board awarded the bid to Merrill-Lynch, Ed Moore, with Southwest Securities informed trustees that Salado I.S.D. had improved its bond rating by two ratings.

"In my 24 years of experience, with anywhere

from 200 to 250 bond rating applications, Salado is the second school district that I have seen to be raised two notches," Moore said.

Prior to the bond rating process, in which extensive research into the district's finances were conducted by the rating company Moody Investors, the district had a rating of Baa2. SISD improved its rating to A3, Moore said.

"This improvement is due to the robust tax values in the district, improving the fund balance year after year and the additional financial flexibility of the school district because it is not at the ceiling of \$1.50 M&O," he said

"It is a direct concerted effort of the board, the administration and staff," he added. "Whatever you guys around the table and in the administration are doing, you should really keep it up."

All bonds for Texas schools are rated AAA, because of the Permanent School Fund, Moore explained, "but the higher your underlying bond rating is, the more the bond companies will quote. You are getting better bonds than you would have otherwise."

The 30-year bonds that were approved April 17 have a 10-year call, at which time the district may refinance the bonds or begin to pay them off at a faster rate.

After approving Merrill Lynch for the sale of the bonds, trustees reviewed a conceptual master plan for the new campus on 50 acres at the corner of FM 2484 and Williams Rd.

Superintendent Robin Battershell told trustees that the drawings com-

Village sales taxes up 10%

Salado's sales tax rebates increased more than 10 percent this month, as the Village received a \$21,192.26 check, compared to last April's \$19,168.67.

So far this year, the Village has received \$114,774.95, which is 9.26 percent more than the \$105.046.44 paid to the Village through April 2005.

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn sent April sales tax allocations of \$249.3 million to Texas cities, up 17.8 percent compared to April 2005. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are running 15.5 percent higher than last year.

Eleven cities within Bell County levy sales tax. Those cities collected a total of \$2.7 million, which is 15.32 percent more than last April's payments of \$2.4 million.

Bell County levies a half-cent sales tax. The County received \$912,438.63 for April, up 12.89 percent from last year's \$808,201.82. For 2006, the County is 11.18 percent ahead of 2005, receiving \$4 million, compared to \$3.6 million through April 2005.

Salado Public Library District showed a remarkable 24.73 percent increase in sales tax rebates for April. The Library District earned a \$14,810.66, compared to \$11,873.57 in April 2005. For the year, the Library District has received \$75,700.46, up 16.89 percent from the \$64,758,75 received through April 2005.

April payments made to local governments represent sales that occurred in February.

Romney vs. Allen

The non-McCain primary has begun. There are two major slots in the battle for the 2008 Republican presidential nomination -- one for Arizona maverick John McCain, the other for some other candidate. It is shaping up as a battle between Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney and Virginia Sen. George Allen.

Romney vs. Allen could well become a classic of intra-Republican conflict, featuring two equally formidable politicians jockeying to occupy nearly identical ideological ground. Romney is off to a strong start. He is a polished performer on TV, and people are noticing. He is good-looking, charming and articulate -- so impressive that at times one has to wonder how he found himself tossed among all of us mere mortals.

The governorship of Massachusetts isn't a natural launching pad for a Republican presidential run. But Romney has shrewdly leveraged his position there into an ongoing social-conservative credential. He has been in fights with liberals on every social issue imaginable -- gay marriage, cloning, abstinence education, emergency contraception, gay adoption.

Romney isn't running for a second term this year, which frees him up for energetic presidential stumping and organizing, all for the cause of getting a leg up on Allen. The Virginia senator is as affable a politician as exists in America. The son and namesake of the famous football coach, Allen is such a perfect representative of football-obsessed, NASCAR-loving Red State America -- down to the cowboy boots and the spit cup -- that you couldn't create a better specimen in the laboratory.

Allen's natural political skills and his down-the-line conservatism have fueled the strongly favorable insider buzz about his candidacy. But Allen is running for re-election this year, limiting the organizing he can do in early primary states. If

his Democratic challenger in Virginia is former Reagan Navy secretary and Iraq War critic James Webb, and if the situation in Iraq continues to deteriorate, Allen could find himself embroiled in a bruising, nationally watched referendum on the course of the war.

Allen's circumstances are sticky in another way. A great populist wave is building against Washington, and he has been sitting in the Senate for six years. Romney is perfectly positioned to blast away at the bloated and out-of-touch Beltway, since he has never voted for any federal spending programs nor taken any congressional pork. After eight years of President Bush, there might be a thirst, even among Republicans, for a different cultural feel in a candidate.

But Allen has advantages of his own. For many primary voters, a conservative from Virginia will more naturally compute than one from Massachusetts. Perhaps most importantly, beneath Allen's easygoing exterior is a fierce competitor who knows how to hit, and hit hard. Opponents beware.

It is early yet. A dark horse could emerge, or Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist -- a candidate who is widely discounted because he is thought to have a political tin ear -- could surprise. But it looks like it's going to be Allen vs. Romney -- a race that could be tremendously entertaining and, with Bush's domestic and foreign agendas increasingly tattered, momentous for the GOP. Will extreme partisanship destroy the effectiveness of our system of representative Democracy?

The escalation of mean spirited partisanship between our two major political parties is not only sapping the strength and energy of our political system (particularly at the congressional level), but has all but eliminated the use of compromise - the one necessary ingredient in creating legislation that can withstand the intimidation of special interests.


I am tired of "Political Correctness." I am tired of the vocal minority

Lawmakers should remember educators

Gov. Rick Perry wants the special legislative session to work only on rearranging the Texas tax system. An effort to spread more equally the tax burden borne by businesses makes sense, since many businesses carry a heavy load as other businesses duck through loopholes in the franchise tax

Meanwhile, the state has dumped too much of the cost of operating schools onto the backs of local taxpayers. Texas needs to shift some of that tax burden from local homeowners back to the state.

However, Perry was not forced to call this special session because the business tax is unfair, or because property taxes are too high. He called this session because courts have ruled that the school finance system is broken and must be fixed.

Perry touts his plan as one that raises new taxes only in order to reduce property taxes. That also means that schools get no new money. I can hear some of you saying, "Schools always say they need more money; they can never get enough." Before you buy that argument, consider some of the special circumstances that our schools face today.

School enrollment in Texas grows by about 80,000 students each year. Each of those new kids needs a classroom, a desk, a teacher, and a textbook. The new classrooms must be kept clean, the school buses need drivers, and the school cafeteria needs lunches. Schools need more than \$500 million more each year just to keep up with this enrollment growth.

After Hurricane Katrina, our public schools welcomed about 45,000 new students whose families fled the devastated areas. Local schools had to come up with more than \$250 million to take in those evacuees.

State lawmakers have demanded better performance on tougher tests from Texas students. So far schools have met the challenge. However, we cannot expect our 4.4 million schoolchildren to hit higher and higher levels unless we give them the additional help they need to make the grade.

2003, legislature actually has gone in the opposite direction, with cuts in education spending on personnel and programs that add up to more than \$4 billion per biennium. We are not talking about cutting fat. Funding for textbooks, advanced placement courses, and basic skills programs was slashed, along with many other vital educational programs. Texas teachers have not received a pay raise from the state since 1999. While failing to provide pay raises to teachers, the legislature actually cut health-care compensation for school employees by \$500 or more per year in 2003. That cut continues in force today.

This special session has its genesis in a court case filed by school districts over the twin issues of adequate and equitable school funding. In his ruling in favor of the school districts, the trial judge noted that, unless the state government fulfills its responsibility to fund education, Texans in the future will be less educated, poorer, and more needy. The judge summed up by saying, "Education is expensive, but ignorance costs more."

Governor Perry and the leaders of our legislature should remember that the fundamental issue facing the new special session of the legislature is the problem of adequate, equitable school funding. If they neglect their responsibility to fund schools, then the judge's grim prophecy could become reality. At one time or another, you probably wished you could increase your investments - if only you had the money. And it's certainly true that investing can be expensive.  Investment cipline - To be a successful investor, you need the discipline to continuously invest, month after month,

year after year, in good markets and bad. Many people lack this discipline and take a "time out" from investing until they feel they can really afford it. But, as you know, we can all find other ways to spend money, and investing often ranks tossed aside for what appear to be more pressing needs. However, by taking part in DRIPs, you will invest steadily, and with virtually no effort on your

part. And since you never received the dividend checks in the first place, you won't really "miss" the money. Remember, though, that a systematic investment plan does not guarantee a profit and does not protect against loss in declining markets. It involves continuous investment in the security regardless of the price of the security. You should

continue your ability to

invest through periods of

low price levels.

Until the laws changed a few years ago, dividends were taxed at your current income tax rate. Now however, dividends are taxed at a maximum rate of 15 percent. (This rate is set to expire at the end of 2008, barring congressional action.) But even this new, relatively low rate can lead to a hefty tax bill for you if you receive a great deal of dividends. Consequently, if you participate in several DRIPs, you might want to keep some of your stocks in a tax-deferred vehicle, such as an IRA. DRIPs for the Long Run

Ideally, to use a DRIP, you want to find stocks that offer attractive current yields and growth potential, and you want to keep adding shares of these stocks for a long time. Fortunately, you should not find the task too hard, because the companies that regularly increase dividends are generally high-quality businesses that actively try to reward their investors.

So, work with a financial professional to identify these stocks and then turn on the faucet and let the DRIPs begin.

pleted by Fields and Associates Architects for the 50 acre site are only conceptual in nature and should be used for future planning.

"A master plan should not only take care of current needs, but help this community have a framework for expansion in the near and far future," Dr. Battershell said after the meeting. "I want to put into place a game plan for the future where we have a priority list of what will happen -- first, second, third -- on the current school sites and on the 50 acres."

The 50 acre conceptual master plan includes space for a future football and track stadium, future tennis courts, future baseball and softball fields, and future additional parking, as well as additional classroom wings and a possible performing arts auditorium adjoining the new high school.

The master plan also considerable reserves acreage for an additional school campus. The future campus may be an expansion of the high school, i.e. a ninth grade center, or a future junior high campus at which athletic facilities can be shared with the high school.

One key change in the master plan for the 50 acres is to have the high

school face FM 2484 rather than facing Williams Rd. Student parking will be behind the high school, with access from Williams Rd. Visitor and staff parking will front the school with access on FM

Trustees will begin examining floorplans for the high school in May and June in preparation of sending the work out to bid by the end of the year.

"That's when your hard decisions will have to be made," Dr. Battershell said of the coming months.

In other business at the April 17 meeting, school trustees approved the addition of a Curriculum Director for the school district. The board approved a part-time position for Curriculum Director after comparing the curriculum director positions and pay for several peer school districts in the area.

"The board took a great step forward last night," Dr. Battershell said. She told trustees that the curriculum director was a request she had put off for several years.

Trustees also approved increasing teaching positions by 3.5 total slots.

In other business, trustees approved hiring five teachers: Fran Smetana and Jennifer Marquis at the elementary and Kenneth Mann (composite social studies, boys' basketball coach), Linda Seawood (home economics in which she has a master's degree) and Grady Newton (English, boys' ssistant basketball coach) at the high school. Newton was going to retire at the end of the school year and had turned in his resignation, requiring board action for rehiring.

Drought affects backyard wildlife

Dry gardens. Wildfires. it will be important for Low reservoirs. These are all examples of how the drought is affecting Texas this year. State wildlife biologists say there is something land managers and gardeners can do to offset the drought's impact.

"Water is a vital resource for all life, including our backyard visitors," says Matt Wagner, Texas and Wildlife Department director of wildlife diversity. "If drought continues,

homeowners across the state to maintain water features that wildlife are using in our backyards."

Not only will water be needed for ponds and birdbaths, but the plants animals use in gardens will be struggling as the drought continues. Wildscapes, or landscapes that are designed with wildlife in mind, and supplemental feeders will become increasingly important, since food for birds, butterflies and other

animals depend on may be scarce from other natural sources.

"Nectar, seed and fruit production all require water," said Mark Klym, coordinator of TPWD's Wildscapes Texas program. "Leaves are composed heavily of water and stems serve transport water through the plants. The Texas Department of Transportation recently stated that they do not expect a great wildflower display this year. This is

typical of what will be happening with plants in the wild during droughts. The plants we use in our wildscapes are native, generally consuming less water than cultivated ornamentals, but they still require some water. These plants will also be important food and shelter sources this year."

Childhood obesity a complex issue

Childhood obesity creates a multi-faceted challenge that involves not only the children of America, but their parents, their schools and our government. The impact of childhood obesity on our families, and our nation will be quite devastating. Here are just a few comments from specialists around America:

John Foreyt, director of Behavioral Medicine Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, estimates that almost every American will be overweight or obese by 2040. Very few, possibly five percent to 15 percent, might be able to maintain a healthy weight, he says. most of us are in trouble," Foreyt says. "We are affected so strongly by the environment — fast food, big portion sizes and the lack of a need to be active - that we are doomed."

Samuel Klein North American Association for the Study of Obesity says, "More lives are being lost to obesity than any war or terrorist attack".

public-health Yale expert Dr. David Katz believes, "Today's kids may be the first generation in history whose life expectancy is projected to be less than that of their parents!"

Consider this:

Excess poundage takes a terrible toll on the human body, significantly increasing the risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, diabetes, infertility, gall-bladder disease, osteoarthritis and many forms of cancer.

The total medical tab for illnesses related to obesity is \$117 billion a year, and climbing, according to the Surgeon General.

Revenue from Social Security and taxes will drop substantially life expectancy drops in America, creating an even greater burden for the U.S. government.

With the decline of proper nutrition in our homes and schools, and the discontinuation of mandatory physical education our schools, there has been a tremendous increase Attention Deficit in Disorders and Childhood Depression.

My answer to this epidemic is quite simple, but unfortunately difficult to implement, as we live in a "convenience food culture" where the lifestyle trends lean toward longer working hours, more working mothers, and time-poor/ cash-rich parents.

Conventional wisdom would lead us to believe that we are obese because we are eating too much, but this is only a small part of the story. Americans are malnourished while consuming thousands of calories more than we need. The displacement foods that our children spend the majority of their lives eating are loaded with calories and have little or no nutritional value.

I will even take it one step further and say, "children may have enough will power to stop eating if they have eaten enough calories, but no one has enough will power to stop eating if they have not consumed the essential vitamins, minerals, fat and proteins their body's need." This is one of the main reasons people struggle on diets that are loaded with non-fat/lowfat manufactured foods.

Here is a simple to understand approach for parents and their children: Go back 200 years and think of the foods that would be available, and eat

Consider yourself a Hunter and Gatherer. Eat only foods that were killed, caught, gathered, picked or harvested.

Eat foods only in their natural state.

When shopping, shop the perimeter of the grocery store. You will find 90 percent of fresh, natural, and whole foods outside the aisles: fresh produce, meat, fish and poultry.

Focusing on a few simple nutritional rules will create tremendous results when fighting against childhood obesity.

- Children should daily: • Eat real food
- Eat breakfast (eat leftovers from dinner if
- Avoid eating "Displacement"* foods and The "Big 6"** (which shouldn't be called food at
- Replace drinking sodas, juices and other sugar drinks with water (dehydration has been shown to lead to obesity and retarded growth in children)
- Eat dinner around the dinner table (Nutritionists and anthropologists agree

· Move, Move, and Move (there is a direct relationship with unwanted bodyweight and amount of time spent watching television and playing video games)

One last word of wisdom (caution): Don't focus on a problem child. It's better to get the whole family eating right, starting with yourself. Sit-down family dinners offer the best opportunity for building good eating habits.

Grilled Wild Alaska Salmon with Basil **Butter Rub**

Serves 4

- 4 wild Alaska salmon fillets, 6 oz each
- 1 tsp salt
- 3/4 tsp pepper
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped or 1 tsp garlic powder
- 4 tsp butter, softened
- 4 TB basil, chopped

Preheat grill. Season salmon with salt, pepper, and garlic. Mix butter with basil and rub over salmon skin.



It states that East thinks the contract can be defeated if West leads the suit he opened the bidding with -- in this case, hearts. Had West led a heart, the defenders would have scored four heart tricks and a club, and South would have gone down one.

But West led the king of diamonds instead, and South made the contract. He won the diamond with the ace, established dummy's clubs and made the contract with an overtrick after West cashed the Q-J of diamonds.

It is easy to sympathize with West, who was naturally more inclined to lead a diamond from a solid suit than a heart from a broken suit. We've all witnessed worse leads that turned out more successfully.

But here West had no one to blame but himself. Once partners agree that a double in a given sequence -- such as the one here -- is lead-directing, the player on lead is ill-advised to override his partner's wishes.

It must be assumed that partner is not doubling just to hear himself talk. Bridge is a partnership game.

Oliver's opens

Joe and Dottie Oliver's private yard and garden will be one of six stops on the May 6-7 Salado Yard and Garden Tour.

Located on a quiet deadend street in Mill Creek is the lovely woodland setting of Joe and Dottie Oliver's private yard and garden. Enter by the bridge, spanning the wet weather creek and under the ivy-laden majestic live oaks onto the spacious property. The flowering quince, an important part of early gardens in Texas, reveals its intensely red bloom as you pass by. This is a traditionally landscaped vard with formal foundation plantings, a smooth green expanse of a St. Augustine lawn, blooming annuals, comfortable areas throughout and a refreshing pool with enclosed courtyard located behind the home.

The circle garden of the motor court is planted with a contrasting mixture of dwarf yaupon, rosemary, Asian jasmine, iris and colorful annuals. The foundation plantings around the home have an added interest with the layering of the beds into tiers and filled with traditional plantings of Buford holly, nandina, Indian Hawthorne, pittosporum, and English ivy spilling forth through the layers and over the sides. Nandina, or "Heavenly Bamboo," with its lacy foliage is planted near the entrance to the home where in Japanese gardens it is found at the entrance because it is considered "the friendship plant."

Stroll along the western side of the property by the wet weather creek and enjoy the graceful curving garden beds under the ivy draped oaks; cross the charming cedar foot bridge and stop to rest or relax at the wooden bench; look for a stately white iris in bloom or the vine and ivy covered embankment; listen to the gurgle of water from the trickling creek, the wind blowing through the trees, the songs of the birds or the distant sound of a wind chime. Another peaceful spot is the bench flanked by native rocks and flowering red and purple verbena with the lovely birdbath statuary as focal point.

As one walks down the drive toward the back garden gate notice the


Mill Creek private woodland for Salado Yard, Garden Tour

foundation plantings are again terraced from the home using posts and stone. Autumn sage, or salvia greggii, with its tubular shaped rich red flowers lines the bed. This wonderful native plant flowers profusely in the spring and fall and is a favorite of the hummingbirds. planted in this side bed are Southern wax myrtles Southern bayberry. The berries of this shrub were used by the early American colonists to make fragrant bayberry candles. Wax myrtles are also important to many songbirds providing food and shelter.

The pool area and ivy draped walled courtyard is entered through a garden gate. This very private and intimate space is overflowing with hanging baskets of ferns, collections of sculptural wrought iron and crosses and a wealth of blooming in containers plants under the canopy of majestic live oaks. Two arbors frame the pool and provide cool, shaded seating arrangements for entertaining around the pool. These architectural garden structures have classical columns that support cross beams and have thick woody vines trained to cover the structure. An outdoor chandelier hangs from one of the arbors and

Ouestions & Answers About Our Environment

While it is true that tour operators in other countries play up their green-friendly itineraries, there is no shortage of eco-travel options right here at home. Eco-travel is alive and well in North Not to be confused with

"adventure travel," which may take one to wild places but which may also do harm to them, genuine "eco-tourism" - according to the United Nations - must satisfy several criteria that speak to both the enjoyment of the traveler and the well being of the host community. For the traveler, eco-tourism's main motivation should be the observation and appreciation of both the local ecology and the local culture, and it should contain "educational and interpretation features."

And to truly benefit the host community it should be organized for small groups by local businesses, it should minimize impact on both the natural and cultural environment, and it should generate income for the host community and increase awareness of the need for conserving its natural and cultural assets.

According to Natural Home and Garden magazine, top U.S. ecotravel choices that live up to these guidelines include: the El Monte Sagrado Living Resort and Spa in Taos, New Mexico; Inn Serendipity Bed & Breakfast in Browntown, Wisconsin; Papoose Creek Lodge in Cameron, Montana; the Sadie Cove Wilderness Lodge Homer, Alaska; and any of the options available within Yosemite National Park in California's Sierra Nevada Mountains. In Canada, the magazine named the Cree Village Eco-Lodge on Moose Factory Island, Ontario; Forest House Eco-Lodge in Air Ronge, Saskatchewan; and Wilderness Outpost at Bedwell River in Clayoquot Sound, British Columbia as its top picks.

For those looking to go a little farther afield, Maho Bay Camps and the affiliated Concordia Ecotents on St. John the U.S. Virgin Islands is a well-known green hotspot. These primitive lodges provide guests with treehouseplatform tents tucked into a rainforest canopy overlooking the Caribbean. The minimal impact accommodations and other lodge facilities are linked together via a series of intricate and environmentally-friendly boardwalks, some of which deposit hikers onto trails in Virgin Islands National Park while others make a bee-line down to the beach where surf and sand abound

Meanwhile, a sultrier option might be any of the tours and lodges available through the Hawaii Ecotourism Association, which provides a free online clearinghouse of pre-vetted eco-travel trips and accommodations.

For more information on how to judge the ecofriendliness of any lodge or tour one needs only to look online. The website of the International Ecotourism Society lists its criteria for judging a given operation's sustainability, and Sustainable Travel International (STI) goes so far as to certify lodges and tour operators who environmentally run responsible trips. STI also provides ideas for travelers to keep in mind in order to keep their impact as minimal as Conservation possible. International does the same, providing tips on traveling conscientiously on a special website devoted to eco-tourism.

Dear EarthTalk: It seems like the Amazon rainforest is not in the news nearly as much as it used to be. Have the environmental problems there been resolved? --Justin Tucker, Oakland, CA

Just because Amazon is not in the headlines today as much as when the media first covered its widespread destruction in the 1980s does not mean that environmental problems there have been solved. In fact, the non-profit Rainforest Action Network (RAN) estimates that more than 20 percent of the original rainforest is already gone and that, without stricter environmental laws and more sustainable development practices, as much as half of what remains could disappear within a few decades.

Researchers like Britaldo Soares-Filho of Brazil's Federal University of Minas Gerais (UFMG) concur with such findings. Soares-Filho and his team of international researchers recently reported in the journal Nature that, without further protections more than 770,000 additional square miles of Amazon rainforest would lost, and at least 100 native species would be profoundly threatened by the loss in habitat.

One of the driving behind forces destruction is the poverty in the region. Looking for

Green tourism available here? poor inhabitants clear tracts of rainforest for its timber value, often with government permission, and then further despoil the cleared land through destructive farming and ranching practices. And in some cases corporate conglomerates such as Mitsubishi, Pacific are underwriting conversion of Amazon rainforest into corporatesponsored farms and ranches.

In an effort to provide Soares-Filho solutions, and his associates plotted different scenarios to show how policy changes could have dramatic effects across the vast Amazon River basin. "For the first time," he told reporters, "we can examine how individual policies ranging from the paving of highways the requirement to for forest reserves on private properties" could determine the future of the Amazon.

With new checks in place, UFMG researchers believe that nearly 75 percent of the original forest could be saved by 2050. They also point out that, since trees absorb atmospheric carbon industrialized dioxide, countries like the U.S. should have a keen interest in forest protection so as to combat global warming.

Stemming the tide of destruction in the Amazon is a complicated task, but some concerned government officials, international policy makers and environmentalists are making strides. Groups like RAN and the like-minded Rainforest Alliance have mobilized thousands of activists around the world to put pressure on corporations governments the region (Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil and Venezuela all have Amazonian regions) to clean up their acts. Only if they do will we preserve the rainforest for its own sake as well as for its important contribution to medicine and other applications.

Meanwhile, Brazil recently announced plans to expand protections of its portion of the Amazon, telling reporters in March that it would declare 84,000 square miles of the rainforest a protected area within the next three years. But whether leaders there have the clout to enforce such protections remains to be seen.




