Ditch the penny

Giving money away for free is not behavior one expects from ordinary, rational Americans. But it's something they do every day in massive numbers -- that is if you consider the penny to be money.

At store counters around the country, people will leave pennies for the next customer, something they'd never do with a dime or quarter or any piece of currency they actually value. The poor, pathetic penny has become clutter in the nation's pockets, the irritating detritus of cash transactions that inconveniently don't end in a 5 or 0.

Yes, we love Abraham Lincoln. We love our memories of buying candy with pennies when we were children. We love our traditional adages ("a penny for your thoughts," etc.). But none of that should be enough anymore to inflict the penny on adults attempting to conduct cash transactions in an efficient way. Who will rid us of this nettlesome coin? Perhaps Congressman Jim Kolbe, R-Ariz., who will soon introduce legislation to move to a system that rounds cash transactions to the nearest 5 or 0. This would be a further step toward the penny's obsolescence, or -- as it should be thought of more accurately -- toward stopping the madness.

The penny is no longer made from copper (too expensive), but merely has a copper coating over zinc, which is also now too expensive. It isn't easy finding a substance worthless enough to make into pennies. It now costs 1.23 cents to make 1 cent. That means it will take 10.7 billion pennies to make 8.7 billion pennies this fiscal year.

Penny defenders argue that the coin is the only thing standing between the U.S. and a devastating inflationary spiral, since rounding would always mean rounding up. Wake Forest economist Robert Whaples did a study of 200,000

transactions at a multistate conveniencestore chain and found that prices would be rounded down about as often as they would be rounded up.

There is no rule that the country has to keep its coins forever. The half-penny was eliminated in 1857, and the nation weathered the trauma. Finland ended production of its 1-cent and 2-cent euro coins with no dire consequences. U.S. military bases overseas stopped using pennies in the 1980s, adopting a rounding system for cash transactions that has been operating perfectly smoothly. The main force behind keeping the penny is pure numismatic nostalgia. There is no doubt that the penny is an endearing and very American coin. Generally, I sympathize with the sort of cussed traditionalism that has resisted the introduction of the metric system and the one-dollar coin. But these innovations also represented a significant nuisance factor, in the effort it would take to learn a new measuring system and to distinguish dollar coins from quarters. In the case of the penny, it is the traditional rather than the innovation that is

People should be free to be nostalgic about the penny, but not to make everyone else endure it. As the penny slowly fades away, they can keep bucketfuls of them in their houses to remind them of whatever it is they want to be reminded of. The rest of us, meanwhile, can get on with life with pockets and purses full of coins worth the bother.

Corridor hearings not faring well as unhappy citizens blast project, Governor, and foreign involvement

Public hearings currently being conducted by the Texas Department of Transportation concerning the proposed Trans-Texas Corridor 35, (aka TTC 35) are drawing large crowds with the majority expressing one overriding sentiment - they think the plan stinks! Or using newly created Bushspeak - not worth a half dozen "meadow muffins."

The project has created a storm of mostly rural wrath ever since Governor "Crazy Hair" Perry (R) unloaded it on an unsuspecting public back in 2002. The first question raised then (and remains to this day): "Why can't the public take a look at the contracts between Texas and the Spanish-American road building conglomerate?" Followed by the next most popular inquiry: "Who (or what) is really behind this gargantuan land grabbing monstrosity?"

After all (some have opined), this horror couldn't have been thought up by our Governor alone. He's creatively-impaired when it comes to thinking up progressive Texas governmental ideas that meet the majority needs of its citizens.

The road contracts, **that are being kept under wraps**, reportedly contain cost figures ranging from \$7.2 to \$184 billion, which should trigger some enterprising newspaper (using the Freedom of Information Act) to secure (and divulge) the agreements. After all, it's our dough (and land) they're playing with here!

RURAL VS. URBAN BATTLE?

The Corridor-tollway confrontation has every appearance of degenerating into an urban-rural fight, and if that's the case then the massive-roadway will be built! It's simply a matter of counting votes and money - and cities usually win! Unfortunately there are also bitter feelings developing between the two That fact emerged groups. time and again during the hearings, with beleaguered farmers and ranchers pointing out that the people who, for the most part, need (and clog) the roads, live in the cities. Consequently, tollways should be built in

Urbanites, on the other hand, don't want high density "corridors" next door to their homes. They love driving around the State's clean rural areas, and figure there's plenty of wide-open countryside in Texas - so, that's the place to put toll roads, particularly super-wide, multi-use, roadway systems as conjured up by TTC 35 planners.

This is an age old battle between urban expansion versus protection of rural land. And, as noted, ruralists rarely win that tussle. Sadly, there is no workable alternative to bridge the two groups - both of whom have cogent reasons for opposing this massive turnpike project.

MEDIA MUST MONITOR THIS PROJECT

Key questions still remain unanswered: (a) What do the preliminary agreements between Texas and the Spaniards actually contain? And, (b) Who is really promoting "Crazy Hair's" road scheme and what's in it for them?

Remember the old "Watergate" admonition to: "Follow the money." Do that and profiteers will be exposed and we'll discover what all's behind this web Perry has weaved.

This is one governmental project the media must "watchdog" every step of the way. Reporting every con-

tractual agreement; every dollar spent (to whom and how much); and every production-construction slowdown and failure.

REP DELISI AND LOCAL CONTROL

Salado's State Representative Dianne Delisi (R-Temple) mailed out a constituency Newsletter late last month, reviewing the third special session dedicated to unsnarling the way we finance our public schools.

Missing from the "report" was her explanation of why she supported legislation that continues the trend towards centralizing control of school districts at the State level, rather than adhering to what conservatives have long declared to be of paramount importance - i.e. local control of education.

Here's a few of the new statutes lawmakers passed to pilfer additional local control from our schools: (a) Set a uniform starting date for all schools (with no waivers permitted); (b) Require HS students to add a fourth year of math and science in order to graduate; (c) Set the dates for school board elections; and (d) Allow the State to determine local school property tax rates.

Added to the above, is the authority Texas Education Agency officials were given to close low performing schools; dismiss teachers and principals; and if necessary turn an entire school (within a district) over to a privately managed team of educators.

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED?

If the long-range legislative purpose is to "end-run" locally elected school boards, and eventually move the administration and operation of schools to the state level - then our Republican controlled legislature can mark "mission accomplished" to their third "special" counterproductive centralization fiasco.

We should remember that no one connected with the public schools (parents, boards, administrators, taxpayers) ever asked lawmakers to destroy local control of the public schools.

If citizens really want to control their schools - they better start raising some serious questions with those seeking election to both Houses of the State Legislature - and do it before November 7 (general election day)

And perhaps someday - elect a Governor with something on his mind besides just cutting taxes and privatizing state government.

With vacation money tied up in tuitions this year, I spent my vacation time observing the comings and goings of the Swift family on our front porch. For the past five years, we have been watching the comings and goings of this bird family and each year the Mother and Dad Swift industriously add a mud and twig layer to what we affectionately call the bird condo. Like the layers in a tree, we can count the number of years that they have been gracing our home by the number of layers on the condo. Topping off the condo, a feather provides élan to the complex.

Each year I threaten to level the condo, but as I mount the ladder armed with a garden hose and a shovel, I just can't do it. This nest and the arrival of its homeowners has heralded the arrival of spring for the past five years and to mar it in any way seems sacrilegious: For as the birds have come and gone so have my own chicks.

keeps guard. Morals:


All little things need food, a home, and loving parents to grow.

Critics ignore reform benefitsChange is desperately needed

Six months ago the state launched an ambitious plan to overhaul the way applications for government assistance are handled. But the plan has taken a pummeling at the hands of the state employees union and advocates for bigger government; they have relished the bad news and missteps dominating news reports of the new system.

Like the blacksmiths of a previous age facing the advent of the automobile, critics are calling for it to end before it can begin.

By making use of modern tools - such as the Internet and phone that have become standard conveniences today - the new system is designed to control costs, increase efficiency and greatly improve client accessibility. Rather than relying on inperson interviews in a field office with limited hours of operation, the new system allows applicants extended hours by phone, and 24hour access online.

On July 10th, 30 House members sent Texas Health and Human Services Commissioner Albert Hawkins a letter, expressing support for the new system and its promise to "bring administration of human services programs in Texas into the 21st century."

Two days later, other members of the Texas House sent an entirely different letter to Commissioner Hawkins urging him to cancel the state's contract for this new, privatized health and human services eligibility system. They asked him to "commit the remaining resources to rebuild the human services eligibility system that, as little as two years ago, was among the best in the country."

The contrast in positions could not be more stark. One side claims the old way is best and should be rebuilt, while the other believes privatization will modernize the system.

Of course, the old system – this "best in the country" system – is still largely intact and serves most recipients of the state's health and human services programs, since the new system isn't available statewide. And as critics pan the new system, they seem to hold

a romanticized notion of the old ways. Perhaps they should consider what the "old" system looks like. I drove to a field office

outside the "pilot" area

to see this old system in action. I sat for two hours in a room with dozens of people, many of whom arrived long before I did, and would remain long after I left. One man had been in the same office the day before, only to be told that his application couldn't be finished before the end of the work day, and he would need to return the next day. On day two he arrived 50 minutes early for an 11 o'clock appointment,

but was not seen until after

As one woman waited for more than three hours for her appointment, she said the rule of thumb for these appointments was to "pack a lunch." Not long after, she learned her name had been called while stepping outside, missing her "appointment." She was instructed to return the next day, despite protests she had other state-required appointments to keep and difficulty in finding transportation.

Considering her instructions to return the next day, perhaps she will also begin taking a sleeping bag.

Waiting clients were called for their appointments by name, without regard to privacy.

We sat in a waiting room with white walls and no reading material; no information on finding a job, getting a degree, locating community resources, getting parenting guidance or child care. Some of those waiting attended to their

children. Many talked on their cellular phones.

Most people spent hours just waiting – unproductively.

Perhaps I went to the one office in the state, on the one day of the year, for the two hour period, where things were just terribly wrong, but I doubt it. While many would argue this is the result of short-staffed offices, the reality is that there is no excuse for a horse-and-buggy system when considering technology now available. A system that treats people with such lack of dignity, and with no respect for their time, is simply indefensible.

At one time many of the new system's critics would have agreed. For years they were quoted in newspapers pointing to the inconvenience of going to a field office for an in-person interview, highlighting the virtues of one-stop shopping, and demanding change based on reports of dissatisfaction. Dissatisfaction with the system they now claim is superior to all others.

Reports of real problems in the new system cannot be taken lightly, and taxpayers should demand efficiency for every tax dollar. But calls to end the rollout and return to the old way are simply insufficient. To ignore the opportunity to deliver services more efficiently for taxpayers and more conveniently for the recipients, despite having the resources to do so, is unacceptable.

The state must move forward using wellestablished technologies that deliver better efficiency for taxpayers, along with greater convenience for the recipients of state benefits.

Can you hear me now? TTC-35 hearing turns into protect rally

Although the temperature topped 100 degrees outside the hall of the Frank Mayborn Convention Center, the temperature inside was not much cooler as more than 1,500 people gathered for one of 54 public hearings on Trans-Texas Corridor 35 (TTC-35) filled the halls July 26 of the Mayborn Center with their bodies, with questions and with anger at the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

And many politicians, most notably independent hopeful for Texas Governor Carole Keeton Strayhorn, are using the issue to rally rural farmers and residents who see the TTC-35 as not just cutting across their land, but cutting the throats of their small communities.

Strayhorn -- playing

upon the anger of farmers and ranchers who may see a 1,200-foot-wide swath of highways, railways and utilities cut its way through their properties - told the crowd that if she were elected in November "the TransTexas Catastrophe will be blasted off the bureaucratic books."

She told the crowd, which broke into cheers each time she paused to catch her breath, that she stands "shoulder to shoulder with those who say 'No!' to the largest land grab in Texas history, who say 'No!' to a \$184 billion boondoggle, who say 'No!' to replacing freeways with tollways and who say 'No!' to Perry and his band of highway henchmen."

Strayhorn said that as Comptroller she supported \$4 billion for Texas Mobility Bonds in 2005 "with the clear understanding that we would not have toll roads."

She criticized the "secret contract with a foreign corporation," adding that as governor, Texas "government will once again be conducted in the sunshine."

She called for bringing the TTC before the public for consideration in the form of initiatives and referendum.

Opposition to the TTC-35 was easy to measure, as Fred Head, a Democrat running for State Comptroller, asked the audience to raise their hands if they opposed the Corridor. "I can't count 'em all," he said as almost every hand shot into the air, along with cheers. He then asked those who favored the Corridor to raise their hands. Turning to TxDOT officials, he said, "Okay, you can subtract those 11 from the other 1,500 who are opposed to it!"

State Representative Dianne White Delisi told TxDOT officials that they should more deeply involve Regional Mobility Authorities in the planning process in order to serve the local areas that will be drastically effected by TTC-35.

She said that for 15 years, she has been working for the expansion of I-35 to greater capacity. "Interstate 35 is a major artery of transportation for the whole nation," Rep. Delisi said. "We have a blood clot in Bell County. I-35 should be the first concern. It should be expanded to at least three lanes on either side."

County officials expressed their concerns about the impact of TTC-35 on lost taxable properties, accesss to communities and impacts on local

businesses.

County Judge Jon Burrows, who was booed as he came up to the microphone, told TxDOT, "Don't forget about the promised I-35 projects. These must be completed."

Judge Burrows also asked that TxDOT consider access to TTC-35 from state and county road as well as reconsidering whether the project could be completed taking an 800-foot-wide right-of-way rather than the 1,200-foot right-of-way.

"This will cut precinct 3 in half," said Commissioner Eddie Lange, adding that the plans call for no crossovers for county roads, limited crossovers for FM roads and access points on for interstates and state highways.

"There should be crossover for all FM roads," he said.

"I resent the fact that TxDOT does not see people," Commissioner Richard Cortese stated, adding that the state's "urban centers have created the needs for roads," but TTC-35 does not connect small communities. "Local and regional problems are ignored," he added.

Not every speaker was opposed to TTC or even concerned about it. Temple Mayor Bill Jones said that he favors the Corridor plan because it addresses the long-term transportation needs of the growing state. "Texas could be 45 to 50 million people in 2040," he said to hoots from the crowd. "Seventyfive percent of the population lives within 30 miles of I-35. We need greater roadway and highway capacity."

He added that toll roads are the only way to get that additional capacity because they are an effective way to pay. "Relying on the fuel tax is foolish," he said.

Ronnie White, mayor of Academy, responded that "If you want to build a bigger highway, built it down I-35, where you already have a mess."

But TxDOT officials point to a study from the 1990s that would require up to 12 traffic lanes for rural areas and up to 16 traffic lanes in urban areas. The footprint for that size of a highway is not available along I-35. Because property along the interstate has been allowed to develop, the cost of purchasing additional right-of-way for that many lanes of traffic is unfeasible.

Mary Beth Harrell, a Democrat challenger to U.S. Rep. John Carter (District 31-Bell and Williamson Counties), called for a Congressional investigation into the "secret contract" between Cintra and the state of Texas.

Harrell said that if she were elected in November, that she would "do my job as Congressman" and subpoena the contract and parties involved and "tell us what's in it."

Hank Gilbert, running for Ag Commissioner as a Democrat, said that TTC-35 "would take 100,000 acres of some of the richest farmland in the state of Texas out of production and cover it with pavement." He added that the TTC-35 could result in 10,000 jobs being lost,

not added, to the Texas economy.

Mae Smith, mayor of Holland and secretary of the Central Texas Water Supply Corporation, said that TTC "splits my town and splits my school district."

She added that water lines for CTWCS, a regional water wholesaler, would cross under the TTC-35 four times. At each crossing, CTWCS would be required to bury its waterlines 15 feet deeper than they are currently buried.

This is just one of the many hidden costs to local and regional governments caused by the TTC proposal.

Chris Hamel, who heads the Blackland Co-

alition, a group organized to oppose the Trans-Texas Corridor, asked TxDOT officials to enter into the record maps developed by the Coalition that show "more than a 100 different archeological, environmental or historical sites that are not on TxDOT maps."

Hamel said that his group would continue to oppose TTC-35 and would work to elect candidates who publicly oppose TTC as well.

"You wrongfully thought that we would role over and play dead," Hamel said.

"As Americans. we should be embarrassed by this (TTC)," Hamel said. "As Texans, we should be angry."

As Baby Boomers retire, they may drastically effect healthcare industry

As the Baby Boomers begin their retirement in the coming years, they may find that half of them may spend some time in a nursing home. Additionally, 75 percent of those over age 65 will need

some home care. For those over 85 years

of age, 83 percent have a chronic condition that limits their daily functions with half requiring some form of assistance.

"This has created an demand unprecedented for long-term care," Sandy Carlson told the Salado Lions Club July 26. Carlson is the Regional Marketing Director for Trisun Healthcare Temple Region. Trisun operates four living centers in Temple.

Carlson spoke to the Lions about the changing demographics in America, especially with the aging of the Baby Boomer generation. The current life expectancy has risen for men to the age of 81 and to 84 years for women. "With increased longevity," Carlson said, "the chances increase that a chronic condition or physical or mental disability will develop which will require special care."

Half of the 78 million Baby Boomers born between 1946 and 1964 will live past the age of 90. About seven out of every 10 Boomers plan to work past age 65; half plan to work into their 70s, at least part-time. The youngest of the Baby Boomers will reach retirement age of 65 in 2030.

Many of the Boomers, Carlson said, are also sandwiched between caring for children and their own parents.

Sandwiched families are typically dual-income and face the challenges of caring for aging par-

ents while also caring for children. "There are many retirees who are caring for their parents," Carlson said, adding that this growing trend is complicated by the sandwiched parents having a "lack of planning or experience in dealing with health-care issues."

"Often the caregivers, who are usually the oldest female, have medical challenges of their own and little or no caregiver experience," Carlson said. "Sometimes the caregiver looks worse than the patient does by the time they come to us."

While California and Florida will continue to rank as the states with the highest populations over 65, Texas will surpass New York and Pennsylvania to be third in that ranking within two decades.

As Texas ages, the need for care will continue to grow, Carlson said, adding that there is a spectrum of care available to individuals today: in-home assistance, adult daily care, assisted living facilities and retirement communities, skilled nursing and rehabilitation facilies and long-term facilities.

In less than a decade (1987-1995),Medicare spending for home health services increased nearly tenfold. "Most of the growth in spending is due to an increase in the number of visits of the low-tech, personal services usually regarded as long-term care," Carlson explained. "The length of home health services has increased for some users to two years of more."

In the Temple area, there are more than 20 providers of in-home assistance, which can range from health, personal care, nutrition, homemaking and social and safety needs.

The average cost of home care is \$15-21 for nonskilled services and up to \$100 per hour for nursing care. The average cost for in-home care in Bell County is \$20-30 per visit

Adult daily care is provided out of the home on a daily or as-needed basis without overnight stays. Temple and Belton has no facilities of this sort available, which the except of an adult day care center for those suffering from dementia.

Assisted living facilities and retirement communities offer a range of services from independent to assisted living for those who don't require 24hour nursing supervision. "These facilities are supporting an 'aging in place' philosophy," Carlson said, adding that there are seven facilities in Temple/ Belton.

A skilled nursing facility stay often follows hospitalization, Carlson said, to "allow the patient time to strengthen using extensive nursing care for receiving rehabilitative therapy services." Area hospitals have in-house skilled nursing facilities and there are 11 long-term care facilities in Temple/ Belton that provide skilled nursing and rehabilitation services.

Long term care facilities provide around the clock care with licensed nurses. The care is allencompassing. Only five percent of the over-65 population are nursing facility resident, while 21 percent of those over 85 are nursing facility resi-

As there are a variety of facilities, there is also a variety of ways to pay for long-term care, Carlson said. Medicare is available to the disabled and those over age 65. It pays up to 100 days for skilled nursing and rehabilitation following a qualifying hospital stay. Medicare pays 100 percent for the first 20 days with a \$119 daily co-payment for the next 80 days of care.

Medicaid is a federal and state program to help those who meet established financial and medical criteria. Single







Delisi says she is currently involved in several issues starting with solving the school finance issue while holding down taxes. She gave a brief history of the current finance issue, starting in 1991 under Governor Richards, when the State was issued a court order to fix the finance problems. It took five special sessions to come up with a program. Again in 1996 Governor Bush took some measures to solve the finance problems.

As of now there have several special sessions. She says there are four needs that must be addressed: First property taxes must be lowered, but her figures suggest it requires \$1 billion of State funds to compensate for every 10 cent reduction in property tax rates. Second, the disparity in individual school tax resources must be addressed. For example, she said Salado is a "gap school district," meaning it falls between the affluent districts that now have revenue transferred and the donee districts. Third, Delisi said teacher pay must be increased to that comparable to individuals in other professions of the same skill level. And fourth, according to Delisi the franchise tax must be reformed as it currently nearly amounts to a voluntary tax.

Another issue of local importance is the I-35 relief corridor. Delisi is in favor of the proposed project, citing number of deaths on I-35, especially in the Salado area. She cited the accident record in the Salado area where 12 people had been killed in the recent past by median crossover head-on collisions.

than he already faced.

Declarer cashed the A-K of trumps and then abandoned further trump leads, leaving the jack outstanding. Next he played the A-K of diamonds and a third diamond to the queen. After West discarded a heart, South led his last diamond, ruffed it with dummy's last trump, ruffed a heart in his hand and scored the last two tricks with the Q-6 of spades.

It might seem that declarer was living dangerously when he began playing diamonds while a trump was still out, since one of the diamonds might have been ruffed. Nevertheless, South's line of play was absolutely correct.

If declarer had drawn a third round of trumps, he would have made the contract only if the opposing diamonds were divided 3-3, and he would have failed against the actual distribution. By playing as he did, though, declarer would not only make the contract if the diamonds were 3-3 -- in which case he would have drawn the last trump before cashing his fourth diamond -- but also if the player with the greater diamond length also held the jack of trumps, as in the actual case.

Of course, if the diamonds were divided unevenly and the player with the diamond shortness held the jack of trumps, South would have gone down one. But in that case, the contract could not be made regardless of what declarer did.







Watering woes



The lady bullfighter emerges from obscurity

Pat McCormick saw her first bullfight in Mexico City when she was seven years old. That experience had a profound impact on her life. Back in the hotel room with her parents, she practiced the moves she had seen in the bullring.

After growing up in Big Spring, she went to the University of Texas in Austin with hopes of becoming an opera singer. Her music instructors suggested she switch to art. When she brought home some of her artwork and showed it to her father, he said, "Pat, if you're going to draw a tree, it needs to look like a tree." He told his daughter she should enroll in a school that taught realistic art. Pat enrolled in Texas Western in El Paso.

Pat wandered across

the border and started hanging out in the Juarez bullring. She met a couple of bullfighters who taught her some rudimentary moves. With an old World War One blanket and a chair, she practiced them in front of a mirror in her dorm room. She practiced a lot. Bullfighting was becoming more important to her than her studies.

She became a familiar figure at bullfights across the border, learning a little more at each one she attended. Her presence and

her fervor did not go unnoticed by a bullfight promoter, who had watched her fight cows in a nearby pen. He lined up a ninefight schedule for her. She joined the bullfighters union, which enabled her to fight the big bulls, the same ones men fought. She became the first woman in North America to join that union.

She had a suit made for her in Mexico City and acquired three swords. At her first fight, the bull tossed her into the air. Pat

got up, brushed herself off and killed the bull. The crowd gave her a standing ovation. It was a good kill and Pat got an ear. Her career as a bullfighter was fully launched.

"I practiced in secret so my parents wouldn't find out what I was doing," said Pat. "When I finally told them I was going to fight bulls, they were shocked. At that first fight, my father stood on the sunny side at the top. My mother was unable to watch, even though I dedicated the kill to her."

Pat had no sisters or brothers. Her parents pleaded with her to give up this crazy notion of bullfighting. Pat told them, "It's like becoming a fighter pilot. It's just something I have to do." She fought bulls for ten years, from 1952 until 1962. She fought 600 bulls, getting top billing in bullrings in the US, Mexico and South America. She quit fighting when the bulls got smaller. "I didn't want to be remembered as a person who fought small

After her bullfighting career, she seldom mentioned it while working as a secretary for an art school in California. Recently she was a guest of honor in Villa Acuna where she had fought bulls. People stood in line to get her autograph. She now lives in Del Rio.



- See-through, low-cut and excessively tight fitting garments are not acceptable.
- All shirts, blouses and dresses MUST have a three-inch sleeve. Sleeves may not be rolled. Shirts longer than fingertips must be tucked in pants. All shirts must be tucked in if they are designed to do so (shirts with "tails").
- The midriff (stomach) or parts of undergarments must not be exposed when the student goes through the normal activities of a school day such as bending, stretching or reaching. Girls' blouses or shirts should be long enough to be tucked in at the waist or extend at least 3" below the waistband. Torso area must not be exposed at ANY time.
- Shorts' length must not be less than two inches about the knee. Biker, athletic, basketball or wind shorts are not allowed as outer garments. Button or zipper fasteners are required. Elastic or draw-string waist bands, cut-offs, holes or frayed cuffs are not permitted.
- Skirt length must be no more than 2 inches above the kneecap in front or back. Slits may not be any higher than fingertips when arms are held naturally at one's side.
- All pants must be worn at the waistline or hip. Pants should FIT the waist area and should not be over-sized or sagged. Pants not covering undergarments will be deemed sagging. For safety purposes, administrators may search pants with extra large legs or oversized pockets.





GRANDFATHERED DEVELOPMENT STATUS

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES ASSERTION, ESTABLISHMENT, DETERMINATION, RECOGNITION OF POTENTIAL GRANDFATHERED DEVELOPMENT STATUS CLAIMS UNDER TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE CHAPTER 245; PROVIDING FOR FINDINGS OF FACT; ENACTMENT; REEALER; AND SEVERABILITY

the Board of Aldermen supports the rights of private property owners and advocates clarity, predictability, and efficiency in the Village's regulatory program; and

the Texas Legislature altered the general rule, through adoption of Chapter 245, Texas Local Government Code ("LGC 245" or "Chapter 245"), by requiring that each permit in a series of permits required for a development project be subject to only the regulations in effect at the time of the application for the project's first permit, and not any intervening regulations; and

the Board of Aldermen finds that dormant, out-dated, and stagnant projects pose a substantial harm to preservation of the Edwards Aquifer and native environment as well as to traffic safety and human health; and

the Board of Aldermen intends the provisions of this Ordinance to supplement LGC 245 and provide guidelines for the application and interpretation of Chapter 245; and

pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 211.006(a), the Board of Aldermen has the authority to establish procedures for enforcing its zoning regulations and boundaries; and

pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 212.002, the Board of Aldermen has the authority to establish rules governing plats and subdivisions of land; and

the Board of Aldermen finds that it is necessary and proper for the good government, peace or order of the Village of Salado to adopt an ordinance establishing a framework within which property owners and the Village can determine what projects have obtained Grandfathered Development Status under certain regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Salado:

ENACTMENT

The Village of Salado hereby adopts the Grandfathered Development Status Ordinance, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Ordinance for all intents and purposes.

PASSED AND APPROVED this, the 20th day of July 2006, by a vote of 3 (ayes) to 0 (nays) to 0 (abstentions) of the Board of Aldermen of Salado, Texas.

What does 'sustainable' really mean?

Dear EarthTalk:
The term "sustainable"
seems to be the new
green buzzword. What
exactly does it mean,
particularly when
applied to such things,
say, as transportation
or agriculture? -- Steve
Nezhad, Portland, ME

"Sustainable," simply, is the positive conducting result of social economic, or environmental activities such a way that current needs are met without compromising the well-being of future generations. A sustainable activity also does not despoil the here and now, in part because of how it may affect the future.

For example, cars that run on oil and gasoline are unsustainable on both counts: They make use of a non-renewable resource (that is, one that will be completely depleted at some point in the future); and they pollute the environment right now. Thus they negatively impact the present-day as well as tomorrow.

What, then, sustainable is transportation? Any option that moves people or goods while impacting the environment minimally. Walking and bicycling are the most sustainable, using no energy except for leg power and consuming very little or no resources. And public transportation moves large numbers of people at once while also saving space, as one negative impact of cars is that activities tend to

spread out through the process of sprawl, creating the need to travel greater distances to obtain goods or get to work.

As such, to a large extent transportation can be made more sustainable through urban design. The closer together we locate shopping and entertainment centers, the easier it is for public transport to get us there, and the less reliant we are on cars. And cars themselves can be more sustainable by running on clean fuels or on technologies, like hybrids, that use less fuel. Better yet, cars of the not-toodistant future will be powered by fuel cells, which run on hydrogen and spew no pollution. Ideally, that hydrogen will be made from water, using power from solar energy,

thus creating no pollution at that point in the process, either.

In the realm of farming, sustainable agriculture in its ideal form provides a living for those who farm and supports the local community's needs while maintaining the natural ecology of the farm and its surrounding environment. According to the National Safety Center (NSC), "sustainable" farm produces crops without damage to the farm's ecosystem, including the soil, water supplies and other adjoining resources.

Sustainable agriculture is also "intergenerational," says NSC, in that it seeks to pass on to future generations a conserved natural resource instead of one that has been depleted or polluted.

Some examples of sustainable agriculture include avoiding chemicals, rotating crops, and choosing crops that suit the climate, so as to reduce the need for chemicals and preserve the long-term fertility of the soil. In light of modern developments. some might add that avoiding genetically modified crops would also fit with the sustainable model, given the uncertainty of their impact on ecosystems and personal health.







STAGE 3 - SEVERE WATER SHORTAGE CONDITIONS

Trigger Conditions -

Requirements for Initiation - When the General Manager determines that Stage 2 conditions and commensurate water reduction goals are not sufficient or when one of the following conditions exists:

- 1) A well pump runtime of more than 80% for more that 14 consecutive days,
- 2) A loss in well pumping capacity of 30% for more than 14 consecutive days.

Requirements for Termination - When the General Manager determines that the goals set for in Stage 3 have been met or when the General Manager determines that the system interruption described in 1) or 2) above has been repaired or alleviated.

Goal - 15% reduction in average daily water demands or 25% reduction in maximum daily water demands.

Requirements -

All requirements of previous Stages shall remain in effect during Stage 3. Under threat of penalty for violation, the General Manager shall implement one or more of the following water restriction:

- 1) Irrigation of landscaped areas with hose-end sprinklers, automatic sprinklers, soak er hoses, or drip irrigation may occur only between the hours of 12:00 midnight to 10 am and 6 pm to 12 midnight. The designated outdoor water use days are as follows:
 - 1) Odd numbered addresses: Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday
 - 2) Even numbered addresses: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday

There shall be no outside landscape irrigation with hose-end sprinklers, automatic sprinklers, soaker hoses, or drip irrigation on Mondays. Irrigation by hand-held buckets and hand-held hoses is permitted anytime.

- 2) The use of water for washing sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, streets, tennis courts, patios, and other paved areas, except to alleviate immediate health or fire hazards is prohibited.
- 3) The watering of the ground around foundations to prevent foundation cracking is permitted only during times designated for landscaping irrigation, except when watering to protect foundations is accomplished by a drip irrigation system or a hand-held hose. A drip irrigation system or hand-held hose may be used to water the ground around foundations to prevent foundation cracking at any time.

EarthTalk: Dear In a public restroom, which is the more environmentally sound and healthy option for drying your hands: a paper towel or an electric hand dryer? - Dee Janis, Binghamton,

Most experts would agree that wall-mounted electric hand dryers are preferable to paper towels from an environmental standpoint. Though they do use energy, they shut off automatically therefore waste energy--and they eliminate the need for paper while also keeping paper out of the waste stream.

But the answer may depend upon whom you ask. World Dryer Corporation, which supplies wall mounted dryers, prepared a study for the Topeka, Kansas public school system, which concluded that switching from paper towels to 102 of its wallmounted dryers systemwide would save annually 587 trees, 690,000 gallons

of water, 34.5 tons of solid waste, 103.5 cubic yards of landfill space, and almost \$90,000 per year (including electricity costs), with less than a six-month initial payback period for the cost of installation.

Others are not so quick to give the nod to dryers, and cite sanitation as the reason. The Handwashing For Life Institute (HFL), an association of food service suppliers that includes paper makers, argues that hand dryers have "no place" in restaurant or cafeteria washrooms or in other situations where food is being handled. "Most users walk away with wet hands and wet hands transfer bacteria 500 times more readily than dry hands," says the group's website. HFL advocates paper towels over dryers because they "remove bacteria from hands and reduce general bacterial counts by an average of 58 percent."

Many hand washers would agree that wall drvers do not work as effectively as paper. After all, who hasn't given their hands a final swipe across a pant leg after using a hand dryer for a few minutes? California State University facilities manager Gary Homesley was one of those, but in assessing whether or not to replace paper towels with electric dryers at a campus student union, he was shocked to learn of the significant amount of resources used to make paper as well as the large amount of pollutants that papermaking was responsible

for discharging into the atmosphere.

Ultimately Homesley chose the Xlerator hand dryer. The manufacturer, Excel Dryers, claims that it will dry hands in 10-15 seconds, and that it addresses the effectiveness issue with a high-velocity air stream that actually blows most of the water off the hands, leaving the thin remaining film of water to evaporate more quickly. The product is the first electric hand dryer to be awarded the Environmental Building GreenSpec News designation for conserving energy and reducing waste, and is also the first to qualify for the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program.

Despite the prevalence of recycled papers and the increased efficiency of electric hand dryers, it may still be disheartening to know that no matter what you are offered at the conclusion of your public restroom visit you are having some environmental impact. For those losing sleep over that, there is always the truly green fallback of carrying your own reusable washcloth.
