SISD expects **1,270** this year

Salado I.S.D. will welcome students for the first day of school Aug. 16.

School budget may top \$9.1 mil in 2006-07

Salado I.S.D. trustees will meet 6 p.m. Aug. 28 at the Salado Civic Center to adopt a proposed operating budget of \$9.1 million in expenditures.

The board will also set a tax rate following a public hearing on the matter.

Trustees met Aug. 8 to propose a tax rate for the hearing. The Aug. 8 meeting was after press-time this week, but trustees were considering a \$1.60 per \$100 valuation total tax rate.

The debt service (I&S) portion of the tax rate will increase from 15.8¢ per \$100 valuation in 2005-06 to 30¢ per \$100 evaluation in 2006-07 after voters approved more than \$16 million in school construction bonds this spring for renovations and a new high school.

SISD Administration is recommending that trustees approve a maintenance and operation (M&O) tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100 valuation, which is just below the maximum rate the district could adopt without facing voter rollbacks.

If approved by trustees, the \$1.60 total tax rate will generate \$6.5 million in local revenues for M&O, which is \$84,000 more than last year with the \$1.58 total tax rate. This increase in local revenues is possible because of a nine percent increase in taxable property values.

Total taxable property values (before frozen taxes are considered) in Salado school district are \$497,811,300, which is \$42 million more than in 2005-06. The district loses another \$83 million to frozen taxes, bringing the adjusted value to \$414,763,058.

Salado schools will see state revenues almost double in 2006-07 to \$2.6 million from \$1.4 million.

The district receives few federal funds and will budget only \$186,084 for 2006-07.

With a total of \$9.4 million in revenues, the district anticipates adding \$279,708 to the fund balance in preparation of opening the new high

school with the beginning of the 2008-09 school

Trustees are mulling a budget that spends \$9.1 millon, which is almost \$1 million more than last year's \$8.2 million.

The largest increase is in instruction, which is proposed at \$5.3 million. Plant maintenance and operation will increase its expenditures from \$777,489 to \$886,219, making it the second largest increase in the operating budget.

The increase in operating expenses is in part due to inflation, in part due to additional students and in part due to salary increases for all personnel.

Trustees, after approving a salary increase last month that is beyond the state salary boost, considered increasing pay to administrators by an average of seven percent.

A complete budget and tax rate comparison will appear in next week's Salado Village Voice following any changes in the working budget resulting from the Aug. 8 meeting.

Texas Education Agency (TEA) rated Salado I.S.D. as Academically Recognized, as well as two of its campuses last

ementary Salado Intermediate School were also rated as Recognized.

Salado High School earned an Academically Acceptable rating.

According to TEA, 3,380 Texas public schools earned the prestigious Exemplary or Recognized rating because of their

students' strong academic performance, compared to 2,213 campuses that earned one of these top two ratings in 2005.

About 28 percent, or Thomas Arnold El- 349 districts or charter holders, earned one of the top two state ratings in 2006, compared to 183 districts or charter holders last year.

To achieve a recognized rating, a district or school must achieve 80 percent mastery in each subject area of the TAKS tests for all students and for special populations.



Run, Newt, run

The casual TV viewer has probably noticed two things during the past few days -- there's a war in the Middle East, and Newt Gingrich is commenting on

Gingrich has been a ubiquitous analyst on the war -- ubiquity being one of the tireless, outsized former House speaker's favorite qualities. In between appearances in his role as a commentator for the Fox News Channel, Gingrich announced on "Meet the Press" that we are in the midst of World War III. A few days later, Hezbollah declared that it welcomed World War III, nicely capturing the moment: Simultaneous with its shooting war with Israel, Hezbollah is in a war of words with Newt Gingrich.

The old conventional wisdom about Gingrich was that we wouldn't have him to kick around anymore. The new conventional wisdom is that he's back, and he's doing the kicking.

Ousted by his own party after its 1998 midterm election losses, Gingrich has re-established himself as a party leader through sheer intellectual energy. He has had something intelligent to say about literally every issue, from health care to Katrina to the war on terror. "He has helped himself immensely -- he's all over the place," says former Republican National Committee Chairman Ed Gil-

Gingrich is partly benefiting from beneath-the-surface conservative exasperation with President Bush. In 2000, Bush represented a break from brainy, hyperpartisan, Gingrich's government-cutting conservatism, for something more personable, more bipartisan and more comfortable with government. After six years of Bush, no-holds-barred, limited-government brainiac again.

Opinion is split about whether Gingrich will run for the 2008 presidential nomination, but no one doubts that

he would love to. A GOP strategist says: "The only question for Newt will be, 'Can I devise the message that will rouse the nation?"

Gingrich is still in bad odor for many Washington insiders who remember his often self-indulgent, erratic four-year run as speaker. Grass-roots Republicans, however, don't share their dismissiveness.

It's hard to see any plausible path to victory for Gingrich unless George Allen and Mitt Romney fizzle, freeing up room for an anti-McCain conservative. But the first-inthe-nation Iowa caucuses are a conservative bastion. In 2000, even unserious candidates Alan Keyes and Gary Bauer combined for 23 percent of the vote. "I think he could do very well in Iowa," says top Republican pollster John McLaughlin, "and you never

If one of Gingrich's strengths is that he is enamored of ideas, a weakness is that he seems too enamored of his own. He has ethical issues from his time as speaker related to a book contract and the funding of a college course he taught, but in the Age of Abramoff those scandals seem quaint. More potentially damaging is his messy personal life and the sense of arrogance that sank his speakership.

Whatever happens, Gingrich stands to be the party's most important intellectual table-setter. "Whoever wins," says Gillespie, "is going to have spent a lot of time talking about what Newt was talking many conservatives are ready for a about." There are worse places for the party to look for a renewed agenda.

"Do-Nothing" trophy passed to '06 **Congress; Current lawmakers may** end up working 80 days this year

Readers of the bogus advertisement (at right) will quickly figure out that the "job opening" is a tonguein-check reference to one of the 435 House of Representative sinecures up for grabs this year.

Last week, several TV newscasts featured stories about congressional absenteeism. Their sarcastic handling of that information gave birth to our dopev enticement.

Serious reading of the news relating to congressional "work habits" indicates a growing public exasperation stemming not only from news the Republican controlled Congress was taking another holiday (started July 29), but that following the Labor Day "break," our elected dawdlers will return for a few days in early September, before commencing their "extended" pre-general election leaves-of-absence (most of September, all of October, returning sometime after November 7).

The most troubling part of this story is that this year's Congress will work only 75-84 days. That, in turn, has resurrected the old "Do-Nothing" nickname that President Truman tagged Republican lawmakers with in 1948. Fact is the 1947-8 Congress worked some 26 days longer than this year's crop of high priced pork-barrellers.

Partisan and non-partisan observers of our government have been puzzled by the current GOP controlled Congress that has failed to create much of anything legislatively. They fumbled the minimum-wage-hike ball; failed to pass an estate tax break; and produced nothing on immigration, lobby, or social security reform. Added to this disgraceful dawdling - these virtuosos of dilly-dallying haven't even begun a "tentative" budget plan for 2007.

"GIVE 'EM HELL HARRY!"

Is it any wonder the harsh (but accurate) "do-nothing" epithet has been assigned to the current Congress? As noted, it was first slapped on the 1948 edition of the GOP Congress by President Truman, who consistently blasted their inaction when running for his political life against the fire-breathing New York Republican Governor Thomas Dewey.

A reminiscent side-bar: All of us (with a little age) felt Truman's chances of winning reelection in 1948 were "slim to none!" Pollsters and professional pundits alike gave Dewey the nod. But, who can forget Harry's whistle-stopping across America. Halting his campaign train (at nearly every town) and speaking from the back of the club-car, he'd lambaste the "Do Nothing" Republican Congress, and others of low birth and esteem.

Invariably someone would shout: "Give 'em Hell Harry!"Truman's response is part of our political lore: "I never give anybody hell. I just tell the truth and they think it's hell!"

And you'll recall - he trounced Dewey when the rural vote was counted in the early hours of the morning after election day!

Questions to ask about the TAKS

Supt's Corner

Salado ISD was rated as Recognized for its 2005-06 TAKS results. The test was upgraded three years ago, with the first year not counting toward a school district's accountability rating. Last year, Salado ISD was academically acceptable on the new accountability rating.

I have read many newspaper articles over the past two days with data on districts, which are exemplary and academically unacceptable. These articles left me with the following questions.

How many charter schools are exemplary?

How many charter schools are academically unacceptable?

How many public school districts are exemplary?

How many public school districts are academically unacceptable?

How many high schools are exemplary?

What is the demographic profile of the exemplary school districts?

I printed the entire accountability State's ratings and did a hand count, thus there may be some minor counting Out of 1,227 errors. Texas school districts, 13 public school districts and 6 charter schools are "Exemplary". Sixty-two districts are "Academically Unacceptable" with 14 of those being public schools and the remaining 48 being charter schools. There are 303 public schools, which are rated as "Recognized", and 693 that are rated "Academically Acceptable".

In Bell County, there are no Exemplary or Academically Unacceptable districts. Four of the eight districts

achieved Recognized ratings. The remainder of the districts are rated as Academically Acceptable.

The 13 Texas public school districts which are exemplary include Bluff Dale (Kindergarten-8th grade), Doss Consolidated (K-8), Divide (PK-6), Fayetteville (Pk-6, 7-12), Highland Park, Nazareth (K-12), Patton Springs (PK-12), Prairie Valley (PK-5, 6-12), Pringle Morse (PK-8), Red Lick (EE-5, 6-8), Spur (PK-12), Sundown (small 2A), and Walcott (PK-6).

Only six public high schools in Texas were rated as Exemplary, with many Texas high schools rated as Unacceptable.

The numbers speak for themselves. Legislators have mandated testing. Now they need to live by the data that that testing is generating. Two facts become clear, 1. charter students school not performing at the level of public school students and 2. students in smaller school districts are consistently scoring higher than their peers attending larger schools.

While the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS), the state-wide goals, have certainly provided a standard for education Texas, across they have also homogenized education. The facts are that schools should be accountable and testing is the most objective means to determine accountability. However, when the totality of a child is determined by one test a year and the "one size fits all" model is applied to the complexity of human beings, we lose what makes each of us and each of our children unique... and in this we are both fortunate and unfortunate to be "Recognized".

Of course, these types of investments do provide something you will need a lot of during your retirement years: income. supplement Social Security and the distributions you receive from your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, you may need to generate a substantial amount of retirement income from your investment portfolio. Corporate bonds, Treasuries and CDs all provide regular income in the form of interest payments.

However, all fixedincome investments will be affected by one key factor: interest rate movements. Specifically, if interest rates fall, and remain low for an extended time period, you may have trouble getting the income you need from new CDs and bonds that may be available.

And that's why you need to diversify your portfolio during your retirement years. If all your investments are going to be subject to interest-rate risk, you could potentially run into cash-flow problems at some point. Consequently, you may want to add dividend-paying stocks to your holdings.

Interest rate movements can also affect stock prices, but the impact can be quite different from that experienced by fixed-income securities. Falling interest rates may be good news for some types of stocks; when companies find it cheaper to borrow to expand their operations, their profits - and stock price - may rise.

And if you are investing in stocks that pay - and increase - dividends, you'll have a source of rising income that can help keep you ahead of inflation during your retirement years. By contrast, when interest rates are low, your fixed-income investments may not keep pace with inflation - which means you could lose purchasing power.

Keep in mind, though, that stocks are not fixed-income vehicles; even if a company has increased dividends for 25 straight years - as some have done - it can choose to reduce, or not pay, its dividends at any time. And it's true that no stock can offer the protection of principal you will get from an investment-grade bond or a CD.

Still, most companies with long histories of paying dividends are well-run businesses that make a point of rewarding investors. So, as you seek to diversify your portfolio during your retirement years, and possibly boost your income stream, look for dividend-paying stocks. You could spend two or three decades in retirement - so you'll want to invest wisely.

A seller's asking price is a top factor in determining how quickly the home will sell, if at all. That's why it's critical to do your research, and to speak with an agent about how to price your home.

There is a perception floating around that some real estate agents suggest a lower price to sellers in order to secure a "quick sale." This seems to fly in the face of another perception that agents want to earn the highest possible commission. Indeed, both of these ideas illustrate a misunderstanding about the nature of pricing a home to sell.

Most agents aren't anxious about whether a home sells for \$150,000 or \$170,000, since the difference isn't that significant once the commission is split with the buyers' agent and the agent's brokerage. Agents work hard to sell a home before the listing expires, simply because it is in their best interest to do so.

If you suspect your listing has been underpriced, it's possible that your home hasn't been properly analyzed against comparable properties. You could protect yourself by ordering an appraisal prior to listing, because it is ultimately the seller, and not the agent, who decides on the actual asking price.

The agent is an invaluable resource, and your choice of agent, as well as your choice of asking price, will determine your ultimate success.

How many others assisted in emergency shelters, donated funds or supplies, or offered a spare room? The number of individuals who did something to help cannot be counted easily, because there were so many of





Tiger's win in the British Open shows us lots of things about him:


1. He is human. I think the tears for his father recently were genuine. The missed cut at the U.S. Open said lots to me about his humanness.





This costly grace is what becomes revealed in the life of Our Lady Mary, often in certain Christian circles celebrated as the Queen

woman Mary makes room for the presence of God through her freedom, her free yes to allow for God's presence. This means that God's presence is allowed when self-preoccupation, fear and resentment are overcome. Mary is the prime example of perfect humanity. But, this has implications for us, for our understanding of our own humanity, and our social and political agendas, for the way the world runs. Mary carries a challenge to the political and religious leaders of our own days as well, who seek and find ways that promote exclusion, fear and resentment of the "other", whoever that other may be?

Fr. Said, age 31, was born in Nazareth and raised and educated in Galilee in the village of Kufur Yasif. Fr. Said is currently working on his PhD in Medieval Muslim Legal and Political Thought at Corpus Christi College, Faculty of Divinity, Cambridge University, England. Academic credentials include Masters of Philosophy, Master of Arts and Tripos Honours Degree in Theology from Corpus Christi College,

Paxton has been in the business of creating fine art in glass for over 25 years. She moved her studio to Salado from Arizona in 2004.

Her art has been acclaimed across the U.S., and she has appeared on national television on several occasions. Some of her creations are soon to be shown again in HGTV's "I Want That" program. Coyote Glass specializes in custom glass sinks, but also produces matching mirrors, custom vanities and commissioned art.

For example, Paxton has produced glass etching for the new Bell County Justice Center, among many others throughout the nation.

The couple shows Coyote Glass products at the National Kitchen and Bath Show in Chicago, alongside such industry giants as Kohler. Paxton says Coyote Glass grew 800 percent during its first year in Salado and doubled again the second year. There are now nine employees, and a new warehouse is planned, increasing space from 800

The glass-making process itself involves starting with clear glass and sandblasting the surface to be finished, then etching and painting with silver, gold and copper backgrounds. Samples of the art were shown to the attendees and generated great interest.

Resist that impulse Contract Bridge

Opening lead — five of hearts.

Assume you're declarer at three notrump and West leads a heart. You win East's jack with the queen, and the question is how to continue.

There is a strong temptation to try a club finesse at this point, hoping to find West with the king. If he has it, you're sure to wind up with at least 10 tricks.

But since the contract is certain to make whenever West has the king of clubs, you should start thinking in terms of what you can do if East has the king.

In that case, if you lost an early club finesse, you could duck East's heart return, but a third heart would then drive out your ace. Since you would have only eight sure tricks at that point, you would eventually have to try a diamond finesse. If it lost and West started with five hearts -- as in the actual deal -you'd go down one.

For this reason, the correct play -- strange as it may seem -- is to lead the diamond jack at trick two! This ensures the contract against any distribution of the adverse cards (assuming West started with at least four hearts).

If the jack holds, you next try the club finesse, guaranteeing nine tricks even if the finesse loses. If the diamond jack loses, you duck the heart return before taking the ace and then attempt the club finesse.

If the finesse wins, you have at least 10 tricks. If it loses and East has no more hearts, you're also home. And if East has a heart, which means the suit was originally divided 4-4, nine tricks are again assured.


The recommended approach to the play defuses the lone danger to the contract -- the possibility that West has a long heart suit and a side entry. Since that entry can only be the king of diamonds, you must deprive him of that card before it can be used to defeat you.





Sarah's cafe in Ft. Stockton is closed

Cleo Castelo and her husband Mike have operated Sarah's Café in Fort Stockton since 1965. Cleo's mother bought the café building in 1929.

"It was four rooms," says Cleo. "The family lived in the building. She made one of the bedrooms into a dining room and started serving meals to the public. The same kitchen they used for the family they used for the restaurant. That dining room had four tables and could seat 16 people. Now it has a seating capacity of 80."

Cleo says her mother built an addition to the structure and turned it into a boarding house.

"The upstairs had a big room with five cots on each side. Ten men stayed by Tumbleweed Smith

there and worked at various jobs, shearing sheep, working on ranches and so forth. She fed those men breakfast every day at five o'clock. She would make them lunches, then cook supper for them. She worked longer than we do. She worked from 5 a.m. until 10 p.m. every day. Mike and I take off from 2 to 5 every day for a siesta and a walk. I can take a 15-minute nap and get so much energy. I can have two starts at the same day

that way."

When Cleo's mother retired in 1965, she turned the restaurant over to Cleo and Mike. The change-over required some fast maneuvering.

"She came to my house and told us that she was going to close the restaurant unless we took it over. She said we could run it with one condition: we had to live on the restaurant premises. So we moved that day. She came over about 8:30 in the

morning and told us not to worry about money, that money was in the register. She had told the cooks to get ready to open for the lunch crowd. So we took over right then."

Sarah's Café has served governors, presidents, ambassadors, foreign dignitaries and all kinds of famous people. Their pictures and letters line the walls. The café has been the subject of travel books and magazines all over the US, Canada, Mexico and Europe.

"That's because we have the real, authentic, Mexican food," says Cleo. "People love our food and our hospitality. We really roll out the red carpet for our tourists and out of town guests. We give them complimentary quesadillas and desserts."

She and Mike do the main cooking.

"Because mother told us never to teach anyone how to do the main cooking. The cooks can put it together, but we do the cooking. That way, we still have mother's secret recipes."

I interviewed Cleo in late June. The café closed its doors for the last time on June 30. It is for sale. The Castelos are tired and plan to move to San Angelo.

"Whoever buys it, they're going to get all the write-ups," says Cleo. "We have others. The sale of the restaurant includes the name and the recipes."







What are effects of global warming?

EarthTalk: Dear In what ways is global warming already affecting us in North America? **Tyler** Merson, New York, NY

There are many examples of climate change's real and present impact. For one, the 20 hottest years since record keeping began in the 1880s have all occurred since 1983, and until this year 2005 was the hottest year ever. Now, according to a new U.S. climate report, 2006 is well on its way to taking the top

you like New If England's maple syrup, you'll be dismayed to that producers report seeing global warming's effect on their seasonal harvesting cycles. Farmers are tapping their trees a month earlier than their ancestors did, and some fear that global warming will eventually reduce the trees' ability to produce high-quality sap. "I think the sugar maple industry is on its way out," says University of New Hampshire professor Barrett Rock, who led research on regional risks related to climate change.

Some ski resorts in the Pacific Northwest blame global warming for the warm weather that shut down the 2004-2005 season before it even began. University of Washington professor of atmospheric sciences Cliff Mass reports that less snow has been falling in Washington State for the last 20 years. "Global warming is occurring," he

concludes. Also in trouble due to declining snow are New England and Midwestern resorts.

The loss of sandy beaches due to climateaggravated sea level rises is also troubling, and the problem is accelerating. The National Science Foundation's Metro East Coast report says that beach erosion will likely double by the 2020s, increase from three- to six-fold by the 2050s and by as much as 10-fold by the 2080s. Already, sand loss has led to large beach replenishment efforts

And keep plenty of calamine lotion on hand. Researchers at Duke University found that some vines--including poison ivy--may thrive exponentially in a warmer climate. Experiments showed that poison ivy growing in a carbon dioxide-rich environment grew about three times larger than normal and produced significantly more urushiol, allergenic substance that causes rashes.

Another indicator of increased warming is the retreat of glaciers across western North America. This troubling phenomenon is especially noticeable in park Waterton-Glacier complex on the U.S.-Canada border. Several

by the Army Corps of major glaciers there have shrunk by half or more in recent decades. On the U.S. side of the border. the number of glaciers in Glacier National Park has dropped from 150 in 1850 to 35 today.

Wildlife is also feeling the heat. A 2004 study by the Wildlife Society, a 9,000-member group of wildlife professionals, found that global warming is affecting many North American species and could cause major shifts in ecosystems. The group concluded that caribou, polar bears, migratory songbirds and other species have already responded to climate change by shifting habitat, altering their breeding patterns or changing their migration routes.



storms like Hurricane Katrina in recent years may be partially explained by global warming. Researchers have found that both the intensity and number of category 4 and 5 storms have greatly increased in the past 35 years, and have linked that phenomenon to warming ocean temperatures.

Dear EarthTalk: I heard that Coca Cola is depleting ground water around bottling plants in India so surrounding villages have no safe water supply? Is this true? -- Dan Ehl, Centerville, IA

An ongoing drought has threatened groundwater supplies across India, and many villagers in rural areas are blaming Coca-Cola for aggravating the problem. Coke operates water-intensive 52 bottling plants in India. In the southern Indian village of Plachimada in Kerala state, for example, persistent droughts have dried up local wells, forcing many residents to rely on water supplies trucked in daily by the government.

Some there link the dry wells to the arrival of a Coca-Cola bottling plant in the area three years ago. Following several large protests, the local government revoked Coca-Cola's license to operate last year, and ordered the company to shut down its \$25 million plant.

Similar problems have plagued the company in the rural Indian state of Uttar Pradesh, where farming is the primary industry. Several thousand residents took part in a

10-day march in 2004 between two Coca-Cola bottling plants thought to be depleting groundwater. "Drinking Coke is like drinking farmer's blood in India," said protest organizer Nandlal Master. "Coca-Cola is creating thirst in India, and is directly responsible for the loss of livelihood and even hunger for thousands of people across India," added Master, represents the India Resource Center in the campaign against Coca-Cola.

Indeed, one report, in the daily newspaper Mathrubhumi, described local women having to travel five kilometers (three miles) to obtain drinkable water, during which time soft drinks would come out of the Coca-Cola plant by the truckload.

Water isn't the only The Central issue. Pollution Control Board of India found in 2003 that sludge from the Uttar Pradesh factory was contaminated with high levels of cadmium, lead and chromium. To make matters worse, Coke was offloading cadmium-laden sludge as "free fertilizer" to tribal farmers who live near the plant, prompting questions as to why they would do that but not provide clean water to local residents whose underground supplies were being "stolen."

Another Indian nonprofit group, the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE), says it tested 57 carbonated beverages made by Coca-Cola and Pepsi at 25 bottling plants and found a "cocktail of between three to five different pesticides in all samples." CSE Director Sunita Narain, winner of the 2005 Stockholm Water Prize, described the group's findings as "a grave public health scandal."

For its part, Coca-Cola says that "a small number of politically motivated groups" are going after the company "for the furtherance of their own anti-multinational agenda." It denies that its actions in India have contributed to depleting local aquifers, and calls allegations "without any scientific basis."






