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Trustees debate layout, plans of new high school

Salado school trustees spent almost two hours Sept. 18 debating plans and alternatives for building a new high school on 50 acres at FM 2484 and Williams Dr.

The chief topic of conversation was whether to build two gymnasium, a super gymnasium, or single gymnasium, although trustees also discussed adding classrooms to the proposed plans, as well as the square footage of the fine arts, cafeteria and agriculture portions of the school.

Baird-Williams has estimated the cost for building a 107,000 sq. ft. high school at \$16.2 million, including administrative costs, design costs and furniture, fixtures and equipment.

This is \$1.2 million more than the \$15 million originally budgeted for construction of the new high school in proposal A, which totaled \$15,675,000 for a new high school and renovations of current

Dr. Robin Battershell told trustees that most of the renovations were completed for about half of the \$675,000 originally budgeted for improvements.

Coupling the \$300,000+ in savings from the renovation portion of bond proposal A with the interest that the bond will generate over the lifespan of the construction would bring the original \$15 million for construction of the high school to \$16.3 million. Finance Manager Lyndal Cabaniss estimates the interest earnings for the bond proposal A at over \$1

However, the board may still have to consider cuts in the high school building project, the second gym being the highest ticket items among five areas that Baird-Williams Construction Managers suggested as cost-cutting.

Blair Williams said that deleting the practice gym could save \$740,000-\$760,000 in construction costs. Other items that could be deleted include student lockers (\$48,0000), downsizing canopies and porches (\$39,000), deleting half of the landscaping allowance (\$50,000) and delete a single bay of 28 parking spaces (\$12,000).

In addition to bidding out alternatives that will make the above cost cuts, architectural firm Fields & Associates will bid out an alternative that will add four basic classrooms to the campus.

Architect Chuck Fields explained to trustees that the current plans will serve an enrollment of 800 students for core facilities and an enrollment of 600 students for classroom capacity. Trustee Frank Carlson, who asked architects to consider an alternative with four additional classrooms, questioned whether the classroom capacity would serve 600 students.

"You have 19 core classrooms," he adding that at a 22:1 student to classroom ratio it could not serve that many.

Fields explained that the 19 classrooms did not include special education classes, computer labs, science labs, agriculture space, fine arts classrooms, or athletic space. "Not all of the students will be in those 19 classrooms at the

Aldermen revisit building permits

Richard Riley, a selfadmitted newcomer to Salado, summed up the feelings of the vast majority of the almost 50 people gathered for a special workshop meeting of the board of aldermenm gathered at the Municipal Building Sept. 14 to discuss the building permitting and inspecting processes and the fees attached to it.

"When you start raising prices exponentially, you are telling me you don't want me here," he

Lew Akins echoed the sentiment by saying that the new building fee structure would shut down speculative building in Salado. "If people

don't own a lot already," he said, "you are going to be pushing them out of here."

Dave Broecker told aldermen that the new contract with Bureau Veritas to conduct residential inspections and site review and inspections for commercial construction would "stymie any new building in Salado.'

In fact, it may have already had its first victim as Broecker announced that he and wife Pat would not be building the Salado Broecker Funeral Home on the west access road. 'Your decisions tonight should not be about a funeral home," he said, "because that's not going to happen. It should be about the future of Salado."

Sign of the times: Billboards, other signage important to village image

As one of the main arteries of transportation passes through the front yard of Salado, the village has the opportunity of reaching more than 50,000 potential customers traveling past every day.

The chief means of reaching those potential customers is through billboard signs, as many businesses in the village have discovered.

In fact, billboard and other signs are such important aspect reaching potential visitors that Destination Development, Inc. (DDI), the consulting firm hired by the Tourism Council to conduct a tourism assessment, dedicated more than a dozen of its 30 recommendations to signs and "branding" for the Village of Salado.

first suggestion Its deals specifically with billboards.

billboards would perform better if they were moved farther away from the village, 5-10 miles or so," DDI states in its initial tourism assessment report. "This would give potential visitors more time to make an impulse decision as to whether or not to stop."

"The current signs are so close to the exits that by the time they have thought about it, they are past the exits," the report explains. "This would give potential visitors more time to make an impulse decision as to whether or not to stop."

The Salado Chamber of Commerce pays the rent for the "Find Yourself in Salado" signs on each end of town. The property for the sign on the north end of town is leased to the Chamber at \$250 per month, while the property for the sign on the south end of town is leased to the Chamber for \$100 per

Most billboards on interstate frontage lease

for \$1,000 per month, or more, which means the Chamber has been given great opportunities for its two signs.

One of those opportunities will change in the coming months as the southern sign is in the newly-acquired right-ofway for I-35 expansion. When construction of the I-35 expansion begins south of Salado, the Chamber will have 30 days to remove that sign.

In the meantime, the Chamber is hoping to find property to which it can move the sign.

While the Chamber igns are placed very close village. to the exits for Salado, placement of billboards for Salado shops, inns and restaurants begin up to 20 miles away, with placement in Temple, Georgetown or Killeen, with added boards closer to the village.

The importance of placing billboards will increase dramatically


when Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) begins expansion of I-35 through Salado in 2008-09. While TxDOT has told village representatives that it will not permanently close any of the exits coming through Salado, exits and entrance ramps will likely be closed on a temporary basis for the construction project.

overpasses The Salado will be rebuilt during the expansion process, as will the underpass at exit 285 that is likely to move south in order to straighten out the northern entrance to the

These construction challenges will require the village and its businesses to have better signage.

How that will be done is still being discussed among village officials, TxDOT engineers and businesses.

Snooty Democrats target Wal-Mart

Attention Wal-Mart shoppers: Democrats disapprove of your buying habits. The Democrats call their broadsides against the super-retailer "populist," but it's an odd populism that attacks a company that attracts more than 100 million customers a week with no-frills convenience and rock-bottom prices for everyday consumer goods. If Wal-Mart specialized in selling high-end windsurfing gear, yes, it might be a juicy populist target. But detergent and toilet paper? Huey Long himself would be mystified at this choice of demagogy.

Attacking oil companies for allegedly price-gouging is unquestionably good (if grossly opportunistic) politics. What Wal-Mart perpetrates, however, is price-gouging in reverse. It sweats every inefficiency out of itself and its suppliers so it can pass those savings on to consumers. Attacking the company for that isn't populist, it's perverse. A mom struggling to make ends meet might be angry at spending another \$2-a-gallon to fill up at the pump. She's not going to be so exercised by getting a great deal on diapers.

Democratic Sen. Joseph Biden of Delaware declared at a recent anti-Wal-Mart rally in Iowa, "I don't see any indication that they care about the fate of middle-class people."

Who does Biden think is strolling the long aisles of the nation's Wal-Marts? It's not the malefactors of great wealth. Wal-Mart prices make the most difference for exactly those families spending the greatest portion of their budgets on the basics. One estimate is that Wal-Mart saves the average household as much as \$2,300 a year. That's nothing to big donors to the "Biden for President" campaign, but for most families, it's real money.

Wal-Mart's attackers say that its low prices come at the expense of its

1.3 million wage slaves who are denied decent pay and health benefits. But the wages and benefits offered by Wal-Mart are comparable to those of other retailers. The stumbling automaker General Motors has, in contrast, engaged in a long experiment in paying wages and benefits that are unsustainably high in its industry, and it hasn't been a happy one. If retail-level wages and benefits are unconscionable in America, perhaps we should shutter the entire sector and ship it overseas. Then, of course, Democrats would complain about the loss of jobs.

Why do Democrats target Wal-Mart? As in so much else in Democratic politics, from trade issues to the minimum wage, part of the answer is to follow the unions. When Wal-Mart began to sell groceries, it ran afoul of the unions that dominate supermarkets, and they have made Wal-Mart a hate-brand on the left.

Something deeper is at work, as well. In Democratic politicians' contempt for Wal-Mart, there is an element of snobbery. They have a distaste for such a down-market, lumpen-bourgeois operation where few of their voters shop (one poll found that 76 percent of weekly Wal-Mart shoppers are Bush voters), let alone anyone they socialize with

The Democrats' anti-Wal-Mart campaign ultimately represents a politically unappealing snooty-populism. Their rhetoric is with the common man, but their noses are in the air.

School emergencies

Supt's Corner

One of the worst events that can happen to a community is a crisis involving a child or children. Throughout last spring, Salado ISD, the Village of Salado, Salado Fire & Police Departments. local churches, and the Crisis Response Team met to develop an emergency plan for our community and for our schools. Emergency plans are preventative measures in a sense. They help you to know what to do when an emergency occurs. In the event of a crisis, EVERYONE in this community must do their

I am asking you to go against instinct. Our first instinct as a parent is to go to our children. In the event of an emergency, I am asking you to follow some guidelines for the sake of your child(ren) and those of your friends and neighbors. In an emergency, some type(s) of emergency vehicles will be required. Those may be fire trucks, bomb squads, or ambulances. Imagine what would happen if 600 parents tried to get their children at the same time that these emergency vehicles were attempting to get to the school.

PLEASE follow the simple guidelines below and trust the school to take care of your child(ren).

- 1. PLEASE do not rush to the school.
- 2. DO go to the District's website or the television or radio stations listed on the 2006-07 school calendar further directions about what is going on and when and where you can pick up your child(ren).
- 3. DO NOT call your child(ren) on a cell phone.
- 4. DO NOT answer the cell phone if your child(ren) call you. Cell community for a long phones can trigger radiodetonation activated devices.
- 5. **STUDENTS** WILL NOT BE ALLOWED to leave in their own cars during the

emergency.

In the event of an onsite emergency, such as a school fire, bomb threat, water leak, chemical spill etc., Salado ISD students will be evacuated to the following areas.

- Thomas Arnold: Softball Field
- Salado Intermediate School: Baseball Field.
- Salado High School: Football Field.

Evacuations off of the school premises would occur if there were a rapidly moving grass fire, chemical spill on I35, explosion, etc. We have timed what amount of time it would take to load all of our students. We would go to Holland or Academy ISD's if we were forced to move east or to Florence or Killeen ISD's if we were forced to move west. Day care centers would evacuate to the same areas.

As soon as things are safe, the students will be allowed to go with their parents and to leave on buses just as usual. Students absolutely may not leave in their own cars.

If we need to go to a place within the community and away from the school, we will go to the Salado Civic Center.

Lock downs may occur in the event of a danger occurring on campus. If a lock down is required, all doors will be locked, law enforcement notified, all window coverings will be pulled and students will be moved away from all doors. Students will not be allowed to leave the room where they are at and no visitor will be allowed inside the buildings until law enforcement goes to each room to notify them that it is safe.

Having been in this time I know how you pull together in all emergencies. Please keep the information above. Put it in your memory. It may save a child's life.

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

that the village develop a "Gateway, Signage and Wayfinding Plan." This plan "will help visitors know where attractions and amenities are located, and it lets them know what you have to offer."

"All tourism-related signage," the assesment states, "should be decorative, fitting the community's 'brand.""

DDI compliments the village's gateway sign on the north end of town, adding that the limestone sign would benefit from additional landscaping around. "A similar sign needs to be placed at the southern end of Main Street in a setting that is near the beginning of the real downtown" to give a good first impression, DDI states.

However, the assessment is critical of broken and ineffective signs, including the gateway signs on the south

end of Main Street.

In addition to gateway signs that create an attractive, welcoming entrance to the downtown areas, DDI suggests significant improvements to non-existent signage on northbound access road south of Holland road.

"At the first intersection, there are no signs telling you where Salado is," the report states, "yet there are three roads the visitor can take. A decorative wayfinding sign is definitely needed at this intersection.

A long range issue for the village will require a major effort to address individual retail signs, which are sized for pedestrians to read, "not motorists going 40 or even 35 mph along Main Street."

"Even though many of the retail signs are positioned for motorists, the size, color and fonts do no lend themselves to easy reading," DDI states in its report. "Larger, betterdesigned signs placed so motorists can read them might be a solution."

Before that can be considered, the Village sign ordinance will have to be consulted to keep any new signs within the regulations of the ordinance.

The report says that signs should "sell the lure, not the business name" of the Village with key words like gallery, cafe, gifts, collectibles. "Make the signs simpler and easier to read by selling what you have to offer," it states.

While signs may lead to first impressions of Salado, those first impressions may not be the most lasting ones.

In the future, we will examine other ways of making lasting impressions.

same time," Fields said.

Dr. Battershell added that the plans add "one or two classrooms" to each content area: English, mathematics, science, social studies, fine arts, vocational education.

In discussing the two main alternatives that architects presented Sept. 18 (one calls for two gyms, the other for a single gym), trustees digressed into debate about the agriculture space and space for the band hall.

When one trustee said that students could use gymnasium space on the current high school or intermediate school campus, another countered that the same could be said of the band hall, if the project should run \$3 million over budget, instead of the \$1.2 million over current budget where the project currently stands.

"If we come in \$3 million over budget," said Blair Williams of Baird-Williams Construction Managers, "you need to run me off because I'm not doing my job."

Architectural firm Fields and Associates and construction management firm Baird-Williams Construction Managers were seeking guidance for further preparing blueprints and bid documents, which will go out early next year. Construction is expected to begin in the spring, if trustees are able to keep on schedule.

"It's time to move down the road," Fields said, asking for direction from the board.

Trustees informally directed the architect and construction manager to look at the following additions or deletions to the current plans:

- Deleting the second gymnasium.
- Building a super gymnasium rather than two gymnasiums.
- Adding four class-rooms to the plans.

Prior to the discussion of the high school plans,

trustees formally approved contracts with Fields and Associates and Baird-Williams Construction Management for the high school project.

In other business during the regular monthly school board meeting, trustees approved 2006-07 district objectives and goals recommended by the sitebased decision making committee.

Those goals will be posted on the Salado school district website: www.saladoisd.org.

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Salado has open week before district opener

Eagles get thumped 42-15

It's a good thing Salado has an open week this Friday. The Eagles will need it to recover from the old-fashioned whooping they took at the hands of the Hamilton Bulldogs at home Sept. 15, losing 42-

Hamilton pounded out 182 yards rushing on 40 carries shared among 10 players who carried the ball at least once.

No ball carrier, not eevn senior Philip Abdou, rushed for more than 72 yards or carried the ball more than eight times.

Hamilton smashed out the ground game from the wishbone with two huge fullbacks: Arthur Lopez, a 5'6" senior topping the scales at 285 lbs. and Spencer Thomas, a 5'10" 240 lb. senior. They combined for 57 yards on nine touches but provided great up-the-middle paths for the halfbacks and quarterback Justin Bell. Abdou led all rushers with 71 yards on just six carries, the majority of them coming on his last carry, a 53-yard touchdown run with 8:25 left in the game to bring the final score to 42-15.

Surprising, the runcrazy Bulldogs also threw the ball, as Bell completed five of nine passes for 171 yards on the night.

Jorden Lowe, who had four catches for 157 yards.

While the Hamilton offense had 353 yards of total offense, Salado had 227 yards of total offense, spread evenly between the ground game (121 yards on 31 carries) and the passing game (106 yards on 13 of 25 passing with three interceptions).

Tanner Myers was the favorite target of quarterbacks Stephen Quicka nd David Rosenau, who threw to him five times for 58 yards. Blake Newman was next with three catches for 34 yards.

After forcing Salado to back-to-back three and out series, Hamilton drew first lood by driving just 11 yards in four plays. Abdou returned a 27 yard punt 33 yards by following his wall of blockers to the right side to bring the ball to the Eagles' 11 yard line. On fourth down and one to go from the Salado two yard line, Abdou followed his big offensive line in for the first score at 5:34 in the first quarter. The PAT made it 7-0.

Salado answered on its next series after Tyler Wright returned the ensuing kick 18 yards to the Eagles' 33 yard line. From their, the Eagles drove to the Hamilton 11 yard

line on 10 plays before Stephen Quick dashed up the middle, breaking two tackles to score with 42 seconds left in the quarter.

The Bulldogs answered by pushing 50 yards down the field on eight plays, including Abdou's yard touchdown run with 10:13 left in the half. The key play of the drive was a 14 yard pass from Bell to Abdou on a fourth and 11 fake punt giving the Bulldogs a fresh set of downs at the Salado 37 yard line. The PAT failed, giving Hamilton a 13-7 edge.

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Core moves exercises

Are you interested in improving your overall functional efficiency? Well, you will want to begin to train your core. The core is not only where the body's center of gravity is located, but it is where all movement begins.

If your core is efficient you will find that it is much easier to maintain proper muscle balance throughout the body. The musculature of the core can be divided into two stabilization systems: and movement. muscles of the stabilization system are weak compared to the movement system you can expect injury to follow. An example of this would be an injury to the low back because of strong rectus Abdominis, External Obliques and Erector Spinae, but weak Transversus Abdominus and Lumbar Multifidus.

This week I will demonstrate three isolation exercises and two integration exercises for the core.

Before starting any of the movements below, you must activate the Transversus Abdominus.

Lightly exhale, and simultaneously, draw the belly button in and up. With normal breathing, hold the belly button in place.



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
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
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Early families of Salado: the Robertsons

The first "First Lady" of Salado was the wife of our Village's Founder, Colonel E.S.C. Robertson. She was Mary Elizabeth Dickey Robertson, his second Before Colonel Robertson decided to move to Salado and build the wonderful big Greek

Revival style plantation home that still stands and is still home to members of his family, his first wife died leaving one small son.

Elizabeth Mary Robertson was the mother of 11 children and, of course, she cared, too, for her stepson. In addition, her mother, Sophia Lynch, was part of the household so their large house was a blessing. They lived in the Willingham Cabin where the motel office at Stagecoach Inn now stands while their home was built. How very glad the family must have been when their home was completed!

Colonel Robertson had already led an interesting and full life before the move to Salado. He was the son of the Empressario

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Sterling Robertson and, as such, was in Texas in the 1830's. After the move here, he donated land for both the Salado Cemetery in 1852 and the West Salado Cemetery in the 1870's for the use of his newly freed slaves, and, of course, he donated 100 acres of land at Salado Springs for our town and the college. Even though his generosity gave us two community cemeteries, the Robertson family chose to be buried in their family cemetery their house. behind Colonel Robertson served in a number of important positions in the years he and his family lived in Salado. He was a County Judge here in Bell County, a delegate to the Secession Convention of 1861 and a member of the Texas Constitutional

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Convention in 1875.

These time-consuming activities plus three years away during the Civil War on the staff of General Hugh E. McCullough meant that Mrs. Robertson was left at home to oversee the operation of the farm and to rear the children by herself for long periods. Her home was also a social center. Mrs. Robertson was indeed a very busy lady. Their home is honored with a 1936 Texas Centennial Marker and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

With your legs as straight as possible, slowly walk your hands away from the body. Walk your hands out as far as possible, with no stress on the low back or shoulders. After holding for a split second, slowly walk the feet back to your hands only bending at the ankles. If you must slightly bend the knees do so, but only bend them as much as

needed. The Hand Walk is an excellent exercise to improve core and shoulder girdle strength as well as improve hamstring flexibility. Your range of motion is dependent upon the strength level of your shoulder girdle and core area. Start with two repetitions and work up to ten as you become more conditioned. Once again, make sure you stretch your hamstrings and are appropriately warmed-up in the shoulder and hip girdles before you attempt this exercise.

Remember, you should feel no pain during or after these exercises. If you experience discomfort to the shoulder area, lumbar spine or even the knee complex you either need to improve your technique or you have pushed yourself too hard. It's not 'No Pain, No Gain", it's "No Brain, No Gain".

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

For example, consider this deal played many years ago by Meyer Schleifer, Los Angeles star. He became declarer with the

South hand at five spades doubled.

S.

West led the six of hearts, taken by East with the eight. East couldn't be sure whether West or South had the missing deuce of hearts, so he cashed the ace of clubs to see whether West would signal for a club continuation. West played the ten on the ace to announce that he had the king and, in effect, that he also had the miss-

ing heart. So East returned the queen of clubs, ruffed by Schleifer, who then led a spade and went up with the ace, refusing the finesse. When East's king appeared, Schleifer had no trouble scoring the rest of the tricks, and so made his doubled contract.

Of course, anyone seeing the singleton king in East's hand would have done exactly the same, but the fact is that Schleifer speared the king without this advantage. He saw only 26 cards and yet played as though he had seen all 52.

Naturally, there was a good reason for his play. West had passed three diamonds and also passed four spades.

Since West appeared to have the king of clubs, he could not also have the king of spades and pass twice in the face of his partner's forcing two-bid. It followed that East had to have the king of spades, and the only hope was that it was unguarded.



Don't be scared - you can make Halloween costumes

(ARA) - If the words "Mom, can you make my costume this year?" strike terror in your heart, never fear. You can make a great costume that your child will love even if you have little sewing experience (and even less time).

Making a Halloween costume doesn't require professional sewing skills. If you can stitch a straight line with your sewing machine, you're in business. And since costumes are for short-term use, don't fret over perfection - you can hem your costume with fusible interfacing in a pinch, for example. Let your imagination run wild and take advantage of all the novelty fabrics, trims and embellishments that are available at this time of year.

You can save time by starting with clothes from your closet or the local thrift store. For example, a leotard can be the beginning of a ballerina costume, or maybe a princess (with the addition of a poufy skirt) or a fairy (add wings to the princess outfit). If you need to start from scratch, look for a simple pattern. If you haven't followed a pattern in a while, the fewer pieces you need to deal with, the better.

The right equipment makes whipping up a costume easier, too. Bernina recently introduced a new machine that helps make sewing simpler. To wear, attach the cape to the hook-andloop tape at the back of the shirt, then tie the ends of the ribbon in a bow in front. The hook-and-loop tape supports the weight of the cape.

Drs. Quirk honored by Thoroughbred Assoc.

Locals named breeders of year

Drs. Ken and Linda Quirk, who own and operate Q6 Ranch in Salado, Texas, received the 2005 Texas Breeder of the Year award from the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association on Sept. 8 in Lexington, Kentucky. The Quirks honored, along with the leading breeders in other states, during the TOBA National Awards Dinner at Vinery Farm.

The Quirks, both practicing veterinarians, bred Dixie Meister, the top Texas-Thoroughbred bred earner of 2005 and also the state's Champion three-year-old Colt/ Gelding. Dixie Meister is by Holzmeister, a stallion who stands at the Quirks' Q6 Ranch, and is out of the Dixieland Band mare Dixity Do Dah. His career picked up steam in 2005 when he won two six-figure stakes, the \$125,000 Jim's Orbit division of the Texas Stallion Stakes and the \$100,000 Star of Texas Stakes, both at Sam Houston Race Park in Houston. Dixie Meister also collected a second in the \$125,000 Stymie division of the Texas Stallion Stakes and a third in the \$40,000 Fort Bend County Stakes. All told, the gelding earned \$173,850 for a sparkling 3-year-old campaign.

In 2006, Dixie Meister kept improving. The now four-yearold gelding tackled steeper graded stakes company in Louisiana and California before winning his biggest race to date on June 17 in the Grade 2, \$250,000 Californian Stakes at Hollywood Park.

Ken Quirk hopes that the success of Dixie Meister will lead to increased interest in the stallion services of Holzmeister.

"I think this will draw more attention to those foals that are already out there on the ground," Quirk said. "It's pretty clear that he can get versatility in his offspring in the sense that they seem to be able to sprint effectively and also go a distance of ground. There are not a lot of Texas-bred horses that are competitive at (1 1/8 miles) in stakes company, not to mention graded stakes company, so I think the fact that he can do that should be appealing to breeders here."

Q6 Ranch is a full service Thoroughbred breeding operation that offers boarding facilities. sales representation and bloodstock consulting. The farm, one of the largest breeding centers in the state of Texas, is home to stallions Connecting Terms, Desert Darby, Dixieland Excellent Heat, Secret, Hollycombe, Littleexpectations, Once a Sailor and Sudden Storm.

Big Lake is twin city

Debra Riggs is the official keeper of the twin registry in Big Lake, a city of some 2,800 people in Reagan County. The small town needs such a person to handle all the news about its twins, since Big Lake has a number of them. In fact, it is way out of proportion when you compare it to numbers of twins in other communities.

"People move to town and they either have twins after they get here or they bring twins with them or they let us know that they are a twin," says Debra.

Big Lake has 129 sets of twins in the registry that dates back to 1889.

"Currently there are 17 sets of adults with one or both twins living in the community and we have 15 sets of twin children in residence."

The registry is in a huge notebook filled with newspaper articles, photos, accomplishments and activities of Big Lake twins. It also contains one set of quadruplets and one set of triplets, (Debra's backdoor neighbors). She

keeps the registry up to date.

"Our oldest set of twins in the registry is the Colter twins, who were born in 1889. Our oldest current residents are the Wilburn sisters who were born in 1925. They married brothers. They're both widowed now, but still active in our community."

At one time, Big Lake had two sets of twins named Hamilton who were not related. They were next-door neighbors.

"The mothers of the Moore twins, the Vetter twins and the Rogers twins were all in preschool together in 1971. The Ramirez twins were born on Thanksgiving Day. My twins are the only adopted set of twins in town that we know about. The Anaya twins

were named Adam and Eve. The George twins were born on 7-7-77. Five students of the 1953 Future Homemakers Club of Reagan County High School had twins. I was able to track them all

Debra started keeping the registry 18 years ago when her twins were born. Sharon Farmer Jones, who now lives in Midland, started the twin registry in 1987. She has twin grandsons born in Greenwood in 2005.

People in Big Lake can't explain why there are so many twins there. Must be that rare and special Big Lake water.

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

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



Ordinance No. 2006.16 Village of Salado **County of Bell State of Texas** September 7, 2006

4-WAY STOP AT BAINES AND ROYAL STREETS

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING A FOUR-WAY STOP SIGN AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROYAL STREET AND BAINES STREET, SALADO, BELL COUNTY, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR REPEALING, SAVINGS, AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, Section 544.003 of the Texas Transportation Code provides that a local authority may designate, place and maintain a traffic-control device on a highway under the authority's jurisdiction in conformance with the Texas Transportation Commission's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices;

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Salado, Texas ("City Council") has investigated and determined that it would be advantageous and beneficial to the citizens of the Village of Salado, Texas ("Salado") to establish a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Royal Street and Baines Street, Salado, Bell County, Texas, which is under the jurisdiction of Salado, in accordance with the Texas Transportation Commission's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices as described below.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 2: Establishing a Four-Way Stop Sign.

Based upon an engineering and traffic investigation heretofore made, and the Texas Transportation Commission's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, a four-way stop sign is to be erected at the intersection of Royal Street and Baines Street, Salado, Texas to control traffic at the intersection.
