## Attendance is sparce at bond community meetings

If attendance at two community meetings last week on Salado . I.S.D. Trustees' decision to call for a Feb. 4 bond election for two propositions totaling \$16.2 million, Salado voters have reacted with an overwhelming....

Yawn.

While community meetings in late 2004 and early 2005 concerning the future needs of Salado ISD filled the Meadows Auditorium of the Salado Civic Center, the low number of people attending the morning meeting on Oct. 7 and the evening meeting on Oct. 10 would be lucky to fill a Honda Civic.

"Did you really expect to see a vast number of people here at eight o'clock in the morning?" T.R. Pappas asked school trustees, who responded that the morning meeting was held in response to criticism

night-time meetings.

Morning or night, it seems that public interest in the two bond propositions coming up on Feb. 4 is tepid at best and non-existent at

But those who did attend the meetings grilled Superintendent Robin Battershell and several of the trustees in attendance about the particulars of the bond and its costs.

Bud Wood asked what impact the bond would have on the Maintenance and Operations cost for the school district. Dr. Battershell told Wood that she anticipated increasing the M&O tax rate to the state maximum, \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation from the current M&O rate of \$1.42.

"It will be at least two years before we can occupy the school, if it is approved," Dr. Battershell said. "The state may change the funding formula in the meantime."

Trustees also fielded by people unable to attend questions about building

or expanding at the current site on Thomas Arnold.

"We would have to shut that campus down for two years," Jeff Kelley said of trying to add a story to the high school, "and that will do nothing to address the problems of core capacity at the high school, septic problems with added growth and further congestion."

Wood asked the board why it was not moving the athletic fields to the 50-acre site and building classrooms on the current site.

"I consider it a misuse of money to tear down a useable facility in order to get a useable facility," trustee Lynn Renfro said. "Not to mention that it would cost us at least \$2 million to build those fields."

Trustees will likely face many questions in the days to come before the election with at least one more public meeting likely some time after the holidays.

Hopefully, there will be more than a dozen in atten-

### Aldermen not yet ready to act on property annexation requests

Salado aldermen took no action Oct. 6 on the request of residents on O.W. Lowery to be annexed into the city limits as the ordinance to approve the annexation was not completed for the meeting.

The board will consider the request by some two dozen property owners on O.W. Lowery during its next meeting 6:30 p.m. Oct. 20 at the municipal building.

Following input from the public hearing, however, the board may turn down the request so that residents may resubmit the boundaries of properties to be brought into the Village of Salado.

According to one property owner, who spoke during the public hearing Oct. 6, the boundaries that were submitted to the Village government were not the same that signers of the petition were shown when they agreed to be brought into the Village.

At question is a section of land that has yet to be developed that backs up to homes that have requested to be brought into the Vil-

Bill Wright, one of those homeowners, told the board of aldermen that he understood the undeveloped property was to be part of the annexation.

"We can only act on what has been submitted to us," Mayor Rick Ashe

The residents may decide in the coming days to resubmit their request for annexation, including the as-yet undeveloped property in the map.

If that is the decision of those property owners to include the undeveloped land in the annexation request, the board of aldermen will have to turn down the initial request.

Homeowners such as the Wrights say that they want the undeveloped land included in the annexation so that property abatement codes can be enforced by the Village.

### Bush's pain, McCain's gain

Katrina has indeed altered our political landscape: For the first time in years, conservatives have listened to Arizona Sen. John McCain talk about a high-profile domestic issue and have nodded their heads vigorously. The maverick Republican made his reputation by bucking his own party, especially its conservative base, and, after his failed 2000 nomination bid, seemed to want to make a career

After Katrina and the countless billions of dollars that began pouring toward the Gulf Coast, conservatives clamored for spending offsets elsewhere in the budget, and there was McCain right there with them, excoriating pork-barrel spending (as he always has) and calling for repeal of the massive new Medicare prescription-drug entitlement. In a major battle between conservatives in Congress who want to cut spending, and the party's leadership, which is -- to put it mildly -- unenthusiastic about the prospect, McCain is with the conservative rebels.

This is so important because, if he runs, McCain is probably the frontrunner for the Republican presidential nomination in 2008. But he's an odd front-runner, a front-runner whose campaign is almost certainly doomed unless he handles conservatives better than he did in 2000.

McCain will come out of the gate with formidable assets, among them near-universal name recognition, media adulation and credibility as a serious candidate. But if he again lets another major candidate get to his right on nearly everything -- as he let President Bush in 2000 -- his campaign will again attract independents, but not the Republicans who are by definition necessary to win the Republican nomination.

So McCain is in a different game from other potential candidates. They need money, media attention and insider

buzz. McCain needs the "right" to stop loathing him, and he seems to realize it. Indeed, McCain's campaign will strain his capacities for insincerity. If a second marriage is the triumph of hope over experience, a second McCain presidential campaign, to be successful, will have to be the triumph of experience over the candidate's own predilections.

McCain has never demonstrated great affection for social conservatives. whom he blasted in 2000. But he can work around these things. He recently endorsed teaching Intelligent Design in schools, although he probably has as much sympathy for this critique of evolution as The New York Times editorial board does.

McCain will be the strongest performing Republican against Hillary Clinton in early opinion polls; if anything, he is more aggressive on the War on Terror than Bush is; he will have a strong theme of returning to a cleaner Republicanism after the ethical lapses of the current congressional majority. And all of this will be wrapped in his appealing thematic mix of patriotism, sacrifice and duty.

The problem for McCain is that he has such a richly layered history of apostasy, including on conservative gospel like the Bush tax cuts. A strong conservative candidate who unites the right can take him down. But for that candidate, the less conservatives nod their heads at anything McCain has to say, the better.

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### **Bush nominee for high court has Demos** happy; GOPers twisting in wind; FEMA contracts; Fears about a 1929 repeat

The nomination of Miss Harriet Ellan Miers to the Supreme Court wasn't a complete surprise to some insiders within the D.C. "beltway." Fact is, Senate Minority leader Harry Reid (D-Nevada) had recommended her to President Bush.

Other Demos seem equally pleased with Miers, thus handing the upcoming Judicial Committee hearings a strange anomaly, with leftists favoring (perhaps) a conservative appointee, and the rigid-right trying to find politically escapable ways of saying "No."

Miss Miers has an "interesting" record. She didn't go for an Ivy League law degree (nailed hers at SMU), and is much like new Chief Justice John Roberts - bright, quiet, steady and tenacious in pursuit of facts (from all sides of an

Nothing in her record on "hot-button" items (abortion, assisted suicide, death penalty, gay-lesbian issues, affirmative action). Nor does Miers have a judicial paper trail which is always exciting fodder for the "anti's."

Probably thousands of "internal" memos and commentaries from Miers (as current White House Counsel), but those are mostly protected under arguable attorney-client privileges.

This may be the "perfect" nomination to stymie Democrats like Senators Schumer, Kennedy and Boxer, who had been salivating in anticipation of a "knock-down, drag-out" brawl over what they felt would be a "hard-core" ideologue fashioned along the lines of Justices Scalia and Thomas.

### CONSPIRACY AFOOT?

From the conspiracy-buffs - one intrigue emerged immediately following the Miers' nomination. Involves a complicated scheme created (supposedly) in the White House, that included enticing GOP loyalists to purposely "bad-mouth" Bush's pick for the high court seat being vacated by Justice O'Connor.

Thinking was, if Democrats believed Repubs hated Miers, then she must have some "worthwhile liberal" leanings. They would then naturally fall in the trap, and support her.

Once on the court - Miers would then reveal she is really a mirror image of Scalia! How's that for a "Deep-Throated" conspiratorial connivance?

### DO-NO-GOODER'S REACTION

One local wag had an unusual reaction to Miss Miers' potential job advancement. He shall remain anonymous, but is among the rag-tag group of "Do-No-Gooders" who still meet with alarming regularity at the Stagecoach Coffee Shop.

This stalwart DNGer was impressed by the early written comments about the nominee. That is until reading a National Review story that quoted Miers - to wit: "The president was the most brilliant man she had ever met."

to Alabama, and deals with how our government is handling the billions of dollars earmarked to resurrect that area following the twin hurricanes - Katrina and Rita.

Keep in mind the name - Richard Skinner. He's Inspector General of the Homeland Security Department. He and his assistants are overseeing the mass (or mess) of agreements issued by FEMA to contractors of all shapes, sizes, abilities, and past performances.

Skinner has admitted that most of the contracts for work along the Gulf Coast were issued on a "no-bid" basis for the sake of speed (and of course political opportunism).

### "BAD RECORD" COMPANIES

Among companies given contracts are several with records of poor performance including the Bechtel Corporation that received a hundred million dollar nobid contract for work to be done in New Orleans. Bechtel is under investigation for the supervisory job they performed on the infamous "Big Dig" project - Boston's downtown tunnel fiasco.

Oh yes - also mentioned was Halliburton subsidiary KBR, that overcharged \$60 million (to date) for questionable service contracts in Iraq - i.e. invoices for meals "never served" to the military; as well as unsubstantiated charges for laundry services, construction, etc.

### FEMA TO REBID CONTRACTS

Result of the furor that erupted from Skinner's, and other public complaints about "no-bid" contracts - FEMA officials were hauled up before Congress and quickly told lawmakers they plan to "re-bid" all non-competitive contracts originally issued.

That's a good start. We'll watch closely to see who "now" gets their snouts in the federal-feeding-trough, this time around.

Meanwhile, we wonder what the future holds for Skinner, who blew the whistle on the "no-bid" outrage. He appears to be an honest official trying to do a good job. As a result, he may not last long in today's Washington climate, where word on the street is "protect the administration; help their cronies; and keep your mouth shut!"

A friend recently passed along the editorial page of "The Commercial Appeal." A respected newspaper printed in Memphis, Tennessee since 1889.

It had a report from David Broder (nationally syndicated political writer) who had met recently, in Washington, with a group of top ranked professional men and women whose jobs, during the past two decades, have included steering economic and fiscal policies inside government, as well as corporate America.

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

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## Eagles hope to avoid deja vu

Salado head football coach Jeff Cheatham and his Eagles are feeling a bit like Yogi Berra going into the Oct. 14 contest with the Lexington Eagles 7:30 p.m. here at Eagle Field.

Salado Eagles find themselves in much the same position as they were at this point in the season last year: facing a tough opponent after coming off of a heart-breaking last-second loss to the Academy Bees.

The race for the District 25AA crown was picked by many to come down to the Oct. 14 contest between Lexington and Salado with neither team having a clear-cut advantage over their opponent. Both teams have been ranked at one time or another slightly ahead of the other in the top rankings statewide.

The Lexington Eagles probably remain in the top 10, following their 49-14 whooping of the hapless and winless Rogers Eagles, whom Lexington beat in the Region IV Finals last year.

Lexington returns five offensive starters from "It's deja vu, all over that squad, including standout running back Corey Lewis, who has already amassed more yards on the ground midway through the season (687) than he did throughout all of 2004.

> Lewis is second in rushing in District 25AA, behind Jarrell's Charles Spradley, who has 1,076 yards so far. Immediately behind Lewis in the district is teammate and quarterback Chase Mc-Cravey, who has 679 yards on 89 carries. Both have the ability to break long runs, as Lewis has a run of 55 yards and McCravey has broken off an 85 yard run this year.

With that powerful tandem in a multiple set offense -- Lexington runs from an I set and a spread offense -- Lexington hardly puts the ball in the air.

In fact, the visiting Eagles are dead last in the district when it comes to passing, with only 161 yards passing.

Lexington Overall, is third in the district in offense, behind Jarrell, which has amassed 2,654

yards, and Salado, which has 1,946 yards in total offense.

Salado will make some adjustments in its defense to offset Lexington's speed advantage.

"If they get a gap, it's hard to contain them," Coach Cheatham said, adding that the defensive ends will have to contain the rush, while the linebackers fill the holes.

Chance Coe, Austin Smith and Ethan Williams have all turned in solid performances for the Eagles defense, as have linebackers Jesse Rodriguez and Justin Konzen.

Rodriguez and Konzen led the defense against Academy: Rodriguez had 18 total tackles, including three unassisted tackles, while Konzen had 17 tackles, including four unassisted tackles.

Matt Fritsch also turned in a slew of tackles, with 15, two unassisted and a fumble recovery.

Williams had eight tackles, two of them unassisted, a tackle for loss and a quarterback sack.

Coe contributed six tackles, two unassisted, a tackle for loss and a sack.

Expect to see one

change in the Salado defense: Wes Ruth will play both ways in the game.

"He's one of those players who is best kept on the field," Cheatham said.

By keeping his best players on the field, Cheatham hopes that his Eagles can avoid that same old feeling again.

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
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


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### **Turnovers haunt Salado Eagles during**

With just 17 seconds left to go, Academy's Brett Menifee caught a tipped pass from Chris Marek in the end zone to cap a last-minute 80 yard drive that was spurred by Chubba Kasa's third interception of the night. Academy had 146 yards on the ground and 111 yards in the air, most of it on the final drive of the game. The Bees were called five times for 25 yards in penalties.

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



The volleyball season will conclude Oct. 21 when Salado travels to Florence.

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

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


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

### **Salado Historical Society Homes Tour** returns Dec. 2-4; features 6 private homes

When the four children, spouses, 11 grandchildren and numerous cousins of Dr. Robert and Linda Mastin gather for the Christmas holidays at the Mastin home, 2518 Hester Way, there will be plenty of room.

The home's dramatic facade with its wide porch and stone columns, welcomes guests to an unexpectedly informal and child-friendly interior. The Mastin home is one of six private dwellings to be open on the Salado Historical Society's annual Home Tour, Dec. 2-4.

The dining room, opening off the fover, is. the home's most formal room, with its rich burgundy walls complementing traditional furniture, including Dr. Mastin's grandmother's china cabinet, filled with sparkling crystal pieces.

The wide entry, providing ample room for a stately Christmas tree with its wealth of heirloom ornaments collected over 45 years of marriage, leads directly into a huge

great room where an eclectic mix of comfortable furniture encourages conversation.

Linda says their builder thought the family would not like the unusual size of the room, but she held out for it as she had designed it, wanting a room where friends and family could gather without feeling crowded.

Floors are of five-inch wide oak planks handscraped to appear old. A grand fireplace with shelves and cabinets on either side is a focal point.

A long harvest table for informal dining anchors a corner, and to the left, the kitchen sports plentiful white cabinets with green granite counters and colorful English tiles for the backsplash. A complete collection of Hummel plates hangs on a kitchen wall. Four pewter chandeliers light the kitchen and great room.

Beyond the great room is "the most special room in the house," a place Linda designed especially for 11 grandchildren (nine

who are ages four-to-six). Their names are stenciled around the walls, marking places for sleeping bags and trundle beds.

From the kids room through a sun room looking out over a deck with swings and rocking chairs, visitors enter the master bedroom centered by a king-size poster bed custom-made by a furniture maker in Corpus Christi, the Mastin's hometown. The ceiling of the bedroom is painted deep blue, with white crown molding hiding recessed lighting. The master bath is designated "my beach room" by Linda, who has designed it to remind her of the south Texas coast. Deep blue walls, shell collections and paintings of sea and sand complete the theme.

Guest bedrooms are furnished with simple pieces and each is done in soft pastel colors, departing from the usual every-wall-the-samecolor decor. Vintage twin beds in one are covered with pink and blue quilts, complementing pale blue

walls. A pink crocheted sweater Dr. Martin wore as an infant is framed in a shadowbox on the wall. A portrait of Linda's grandparents holds a prime place in the room.

The study leaves no doubt that the residents of this home are graduates of Baylor University. Besides diplomas and other official documents, there are trophies and logoimprinted items in the beloved green and gold.










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## **Gil Wanzor to teach** perspective drawing

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



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

### **Families** in Crisis marks 25

Families in Crisis, Inc. will celebrate 25 years of progress 5:30-7:00 p.m. Oct. 13 with a reception at the office of Jeffrey W. McClure, 918 North Main St., Salado.

In 1980, a group of volunteers formed an organization to provide services to victims of family violence iin the Fort Hood

Thousands of clients later and 25 years later, the agency now employs 25 professional who provide free and confidential services to victims of family violenace and sexual assault in Bell, Corvell and Hamilton counties.

The organization incorporated in 1980 and, in 1983, purchased a 14,173 square foot facility that serves as the safe shelter facility. The shelter can house up to 55 clients per night and has space to house support staff.

In 1996, Families in Crisis, Inc. expanded nonresident existing outreach services to rural, underserved, and unserved populations by opening outreach offices in Belton, Gatesville, and Hamilton. A fourth outreach location has been opened in Temple.

Services to these areas have increased the number of victims that the agency has been able to serve.

In 2004, the agency provided 8,630 shelter nights to 320 adults and 502 children, as well as non-residential outreach services to 583 clients.

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
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

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
