

McLane, Kelley given nod on SISD, **Preston-Dankert**, Cole, Bell on BoA

Jeff Kelley was re-elected to the Salado ISD Board of Trustees on May 4. He will be joined by Amy McLane in an election that had a very low overall voter turnout.

Amy McLane led the field of three candidates for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees, receiving a total of 497 votes. She received 275 votes in early voting and 222 votes on election day.

Jeff Kelley was re-elected with 420 votes. He received 248 votes in early balloting and 172 votes on May 4.

Brand Webb received a total of 296 votes: 151 votes in early voting and 146 votes on election day.

The trustees will be sworn in at 6 p.m. May 13 during the regular school board meeting.

Prior to the meeting, a reception will be held to honor Darrell Street, who has served on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees for 15 years and announced he would not seek re-election this year. The reception will be 5:15-6 p.m. May 13 at the Salado Civic Center to honor

Amber Preston-Dankert led the four-person race for three two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of

Salado Creek flows over Main St. Bridge, more rains expected this week

For the third time in less than a decade, Salado Creek got over the Main Street bridge as the area received about six inches of rain overnight of May 2-3.

Residents in the southwestern portion of the Salado Creek watershed reported that the creek also got over the high bridge at FM 2843 (Florence Rd.).

The Salado Creek gauge of the US Geological Services reported that Salado Creek (downstream from Main Street Bridge) showed a maximum of 18,000 cubic feet per second discharge and had a maximum height of more than 12 feet. The SEE FLOODING, PAGE 5A

Work begins on \$5.2M Main St. job


Work began May 6 on Main Street by placing debris barriers for the first phases of the year-long proj-

Capital Excavation, the contractor for the \$5.2 million project that will replace the Main Street bridge over Campbell Branch (near the intersection of Rock Creek Dr.) with a wider, longer, concrete bridge that meets current roadway safety and design specifications. The approaches to the structure will also be upgraded and replaced.

Additionally, the project will also include sidewalks, bike paths and street lighting and pavement upgrades at various locations within the project area of 0.98 mile on Main Street from Salado Plaza Dr. to College Hill Dr. north end.

TxDOT officials met with Saladoans at a Town Hall meeting on May 1 that was announced 26 hours before the event.

Is Emergency Services District headed to ballot?

The Salado Volunteer Fire Department needs more

Salado Fire Chief Shane Berrier mentioned this to Salado aldermen during his monthly report on May 2.

"Last year we responded to more than 900 calls," Berrier said, adding that this year "we will respond to

more than 1,000 calls."

The help needed for the fire department may require some full-time positions to be manned at the fire station. Currently, the fire department is manned by all volunteers who leave home or work at any hour of the day or night whenever the call has been issued through the county 911 system.

Having professional firefighters man the fire station

would reduce response time in the 100 square mile area that the SVFD serves. These firefighters would be supported and supplemented by the volunteers who remain on the call.

This will require the formation and support of an Emergency Services District, which could be approved by voters if put on a ballot for one of the general election dates in November or May.

The Texas Constitution allows for the creation of **Emergency Services District** under Chapter 775 of the Health and Safety Code.

Subchapter B states: "Before a district located wholly in one county may be created, the county judge of that county must receive a petition signed by at least 100 qualified voters who own taxable real property in the proposed district."

Part of that petition must contain a legal description of the boundaries of the proposed Emergency Services District. The Subchapter B further states that "(a-1) A statement that the boundaries of the district are coextensive with the boundaries of another political subdivision, as those boundaries exist on a particular date, is a suffi-

cient legal description." According to Section

48.e. of the Legislative Code, Emergency Services Districts may levy a tax rate of no more than 10 cents per \$100 of property value in their district.

The Salado VFD service area is 115 square miles and is larger than the Salado ISD boundaries.

The total taxable values for Salado ISD in 2018 were \$877,377,668. The prelimi-SEE ESD, PAGE 6A



Unemployment lowest in past half-century; US may be near end-game of expansion

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) eked out a mere 0.20% gain for the week ending May 3 at 2945.64 despite some very positive economic news on the employment situation. That lack of enthusiastic reaction may be a result of the Index being up a whopping 17.5% so far this year with traders being a little frightened of that number. From last year at this time, the SPX has risen a very respectable 10.6%. The word on the street continues to be that the continued good news on the U.S. – China trade talks is driving the gains, but they are tempered until the final deal is done and announced.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury Note yield continued its contrary signals, dropping a meager 4/100 to 2.524%, down nearly a quarter percent in the last three months and 44/100 from a year ago. The yield curve continued to signal a downturn ahead with yields from two to five years significantly below those of the 90-day T-Bill. West Texas Crude Oil was down about half a percent to \$61.84 but remains over 30% higher than last May. The WSJ Dollar Index slipped about 0.35% but is still up about 5.3% from a year ago.


The Economy

This week's headline economic news was that the U.S. hiring boom is back in gear. Our economy produced a net 263,000 new jobs in April as the official unemployment rate dropped to 3.6%, the lowest level since December 1969. The caveat to that number is that the percentage of Americans considered being in the labor force dropped by a half-million to 62.8%. In the same report, wages were noted as rising 3.2% from a year ago.

Since the end of World War II, an unemployment rate below 5% has generally caused wage growth to

to an over 10% annualized

wage growth rate.

In an economic expansion, consumers tend to first work on paying down debt from the last recession, then they tend to restock savings. As the economic expansion matures, consumers tend to then increase spending at a faster rate than wages. As that happens, employers begin to compete for workers and wages soar. Classical economic theory would put us at about that point now, and if April's growth in spending continues, then we could see inflation, now running at a somnolent 1.6%, start to rise in a few months. If that happens then it would indicate that things aren't really different this time from other expansions. It will also start the Federal Reserve cranking up interest rates again to head off inflation and start the process that traditionally led to the next recession.

The absence of significant inflation in this recovery has economists puzzled, but many think the new factor is to be found in ubiquitous internet accessibility. Stores are being forced to compete with online suppliers and the consumer can check a price in the store

against online prices instantly. That lack of pricing ability has led stores to hold wages down and forced suppliers to do the same. Compounding the issue, the rising dollar has effectively cut prices on imported consumer items and many parts on U.S. manufactured goods. Supporting that argument is the fact that local services prices for things like plumbing and home repairs have indeed inflated as expected in the face of increased demand and limited supply. Another indicator is that worker productivity has suddenly risen as well, suggesting that more automation is being used to meet increasing demand.

Data on economic growth potential continued to be conflicting. Construction spending fell nearly 1% in March according to the Commerce Department. That puts the important construction spending number down 3.6% from March 2018, and critically, residential construction spending down 8.4%. Ironically, construction companies are almost universally complaining that they are limited by a shortage of workers.

In another signal that the economy may be at or nearly at full capacity, the ISM Manufacturing Index peaked at about 61 last August and has fallen to 52.8 as of April. Numbers above 50 indicate growth while those below 50 signal a decline. Importantly, the new orders index fell to 51.7. Manufacturing is still growing but the rate of growth has now been declining for eight months.

In short, the data suggest we are in a mature economy approaching the end-game for this expansion.

The Greatest Show on Earth

No one enjoys getting impeached, and if it happens to him, Donald J. Trump will be no exception.

On the other hand, it's hard to imagine any potential target of impeachment in Anglo-American history relishing the fight more than Trump. He'd rather be done with the Mueller investigation in all its permutations, but there's no one better suited to being at the center of a harshly partisan, deeply personal political and legal donnybrook that will ultimately be just for show.

Trump famously told top aides at the beginning of his administration that he wanted them to view each day as a TV episode. Impeachment would be a helluva season, matching a momentous process of American government with low political melodrama.

This may feel like a devolution from the buttoned-up Mueller probe, but the House should have been the locus of the Trump investigation in the first place.

Because Justice Department policy says a president can't be indicted, Robert Mueller was never going to reach a legal conclusion about alleged obstruction. The question was whether the president's conduct constituted an abuse of power that Congress would deem impeachable; in other words, it was a political



Congress, then, was always the most appropriate venue for the investigation and disposition of this matter, not the office of the special counsel, where instead of being out in the open, it was behind closed doors. Instead of being nakedly political, it was clothed in thick legal analysis. Instead of being a struggle between the branches, it was a struggle within the executive branch.

Now, the battle is truly joined. The body that is going to make the ultimate decision of what to do about Trump's conduct, if anything, is on the hook. It has to decide what goes too far and not far enough. Should it subpoena Trump's children? How much time should it devote to investigations as opposed to its policy agenda? And, of course, should it impeach?

For his part, Trump is liberated to fight like a caged animal, asserting executive prerogatives visa-vis the legislature and engaging in flat-out partisan combat.

Trump would prefer a world in which he's universally praised, but short of that, this is his element. He's handled every controversy or fight -- no matter how personal or treacherous with the same straight-

ahead aggression. Trump is almost certainly better prepared and temperamentally suited for thermonuclear war with a Democratic House than he was to get substantive achievements out of a Republican House. He obviously hadn't thought through an actionable populist-conservative policy synthesis, but he has a lifetime's experience resisting and belittling enemies and extemporizing his way from

one crisis to the next. It may be impossible for him to stop impeachment, certainly not if Nancy Pelosi supports it. But he'll be the focus of a historic drama that will rate -- or at least be remembered and analyzed -- for a very long time. He will have succeeded in making the Democratic House majority all about him, and, if not getting convicted by the Senate counts as a victory, he will win in the end.

The post-trial tweetstorm will be something to behold.

A border crisis of our own making

For 30 years I've led faith DELEGATIONS TO CENTRAL AMERICA, SEEING FIRST-HAND HOW U.S. POLICIES DISPLACED THE PEOPLE NOW ARRIVING AT OUR BORDER.

For more than 30 years, I've led faith-focused delegations to Central America — and since 2016, to U.S.-Mexico border communities. We've taken nuns, bishops, rabbis, and grassroots congregants to learn about realities rarely covered in the news.

This April our delegation visited El Paso, Brownsville, and McAllen, Texas, as well as Juarez and Matamoras, Mexico. We talked to U.S. border patrol agents, religious and NGO workers on the ground, and migrants who recently crossed over, including those caged under the bridge in El Paso.

The migrants' stories, gaunt faces, and vulnerability continue to haunt me. Nearly all the children were sick, and some were so malnourished their hair was whitening.

The discrepancy between what's portrayed in the media and what our delegation witnessed is stark. I worry for my country as fear-mongering politicians spread disinformation, instead of the truth: What we're seeing at the border is a crisis of our own making.

While we were in those Texas border communities, I read the White House's daily email blasts depicting an "invasion" of criminals, gang members, and traffickers pushing children across the border.

Yet everywhere we went, we felt safe — and our faith partners living in U.S. border communities report that they do too. Research has shown that undocumented immigrants are far less likely to commit crimes than native-born Americans.

Yet the administration is exposing innocent asylum seekers to terrible danger. They've instituted a "Remain in Mexico" policy to force asylum applicants to wait indefinitely on the Mexican side of the border. I met a Mexican priest who picks up dismembered body parts outside his migrant shelter, where organized crime networks engage in organ trafficking.

As a result, many desperate migrants feel they have little choice but to cross illegally in the deserts, and then ask for asylum. The majority are families who had to make the wrenching decision to leave their homelands because of the dangers, only to be treated like criminals when they ar-

The current chaos at the

border is the result of political stunts by the Trump administration that have dramatically slowed the processing time for asylum applications, three former officials wrote in Politico recently.

But our moral responsibility for the crisis goes deeper than that: In fact, decades of U.S. foreign policy have led to the massive displacement of Central Americans today.

Free trade policies such as NAFTA and CAFTA pushed hundreds of thousands of Mexican and Central American small farmers off their land, benefiting big agriculture companies but destroying local economies. That's left countless now-desperate migrants unable to feed their children.

Meanwhile, U.S. military support of repressive regimes in Central America going back to the 1980s, but even still today - has propped up rapacious elites and crushed democratic social movements for change. most recently in Honduras.

These policies have consequences, and the migrants at our border are the faces of those consequences.


Distorting the truth to demonize the vast majority of migrants crossing the border, while treating them as criminals, is unconscionable. Asylum is a right, protected under U.S. and international law, including

for people without travel documentation.

Neither a wall nor cages are the answer to the desperate people arriving at our borders. What's needed are major reforms to the U.S. asylum and immigration systems, as well as to foreign policies that have defined "the national interest" against the needs of human beings.

More deeply, we need a national soul-searching. Or else, we should erase the quote on the Statue of Liberty: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe



in Bartlett revealed at open house May 11 The public is invited to attend an open house 10 a.m- 3 p.m. May 11 to celebrate the restoration of the historic Central Christian

Church in Bartlett. Built more than 100 years ago, the church at 504 W. Jackson in Bartlett (corner of Alamo and Pietsch) has undergone an extensive renovation and restoration.

The open house will include an art exhibit and musical performances by Amy Stockwell, who will be singing selections from the church's original hymnal.

In conjunction with the church open house, the Bartlett community will also be celebrating the town's history as well as recent revitalization efforts through an all-day event, "Bartlett on the Bricks."

The event includes grand openings for The Matrix, a family-friendly spot to enjoy a burger, play games and listen to music. Willa and Bell, a general store with Texas hand-made goods and clothes. Red Door Architectural Salvage which arries vintage doors, windows, stained glass, tubs, hardware and all sorts of unique and unusual finds.

The day's activities will include an ice cream social and fun activities for the children sponsored by the Volunteer Fire Department, the Old School will show movies filmed in Bartlett and serve free popcorn, the Methodist Church will open its doors for the public to view its beautiful 100 year old stain glass windows. Hay rides will transport people throughout the


town's historic district. Churches all across America are closing at an alarming rate. It is estimated 6,000 to 10,000 shut their doors each year - a rate of 100 to 200 closures per week.

Texas is no exception. The landscape is littered with the bones of late 19th and early 20th century buildings that served as both a house of worship and a social center for communities.

More than 30 years ago, the Central Christian Church in Bartlett fell victim to a dwindling congregation and lack of financial resources. Standing empty at the corner of Pietsch and Alamo, the faded beauty of this wonderful example of late 19th century Victorian Gothic architecture has been a popular subject for photographers from across the country. But after losing shingles from the original shake roof almost a decade ago, the devastating impact of time and the elements escalated the structural and interior damage.

In October of 2017, Kris Kaskel-Ruiz was definitely not looking for a new project after just restoring and renovating a historic bank in a small town east of Dallas. But according to Ruiz, God had another plan and placed the church in her path.

"When I walked into the building, I was immediately hit with an overpowering sewer smell. Water damage from the breached roof was extensive. In fact, I could hear water dripping from the rafters. Portions of the floors and ceilings had



caved in while a tree was growing into the back of the building," Ruiz said. "Even with all that damage, I just saw the beautiful windows, a magnificent tin domed ceiling, gorgeous doors with the most amazing hinges, and a huge baptistery pool. I made an offer on the spot."

A woman's passion for preserving history along with the skilled help of Shawn Brill of Brill Quality Construction and, not to mention, a little divine intervention; brought life back to the church and even helped energize the community.

"It's been 15 months of very hard work. A miracle in some ways. Shawn Brill has done an incredible restoration job," stated Ruiz. "Honoring and preserving the building's architecture, history and purpose served to guide all of our design decisions. While the church appears much as it did when it was first built, the interior received a makeover that merges the early 20th century with the function and aesthetic of today."

Some of those changes include a custom-designed chandelier that hangs from the crown of the restored tin ceiling. The inspiration for the fixture was taken from the chandeliers found in Greek orthodox churches. A bible verse, Proverbs 4:18, wraps around the six foot diameter lighting.

The most stunning feature of church has to be the windows. Colored glass in wood frames create a kaleidoscope of patterns throughout the day.

"I think one of my favorite things about the windows is that not all the glass matches. Over time, replacements have varied in texture and color hue.

In fact, we were unable to exactly match the pattern found in the bulk of the glass that came from a 70s renovation." Ruiz added, "We located a similar pattern and color from a glass manufacturer that's been around before the church was built. Nothing is perfect in a century old building and those imperfections only add to its character, telling a unique story about the church."

While the baptistery pool represented a tough design challenge, the creative in Ruiz saw a repurpose opportunity. Originally open to the sanctuary, the space was enclosed and plumbed as a shower. Beautiful mosaic tile covers the entirety of the baptistery and its surrounding twelve foot walls. A massive rain shower head measures a total of two by four feet.

Through Ruiz's passion, the Central Christian Church will remain part of the town and Williamson County. However, preservation wasn't the only thing on her agenda.

"Finding available and reasonably priced real estate in this area is a challenge. I wanted the project to show others that small towns such as Bartlett offer a unique living experience through an inventory of affordable, historic buildings. These one-of-a-kind structures are a viable, and in some cases, a non-traditional option, when looking for a home or place of business," stated Ruiz. "It's really the ultimate in going green – recycling, on a large and meaningful way, that immediately contributes to the preservation and development of rural Texas."





nary 2019 values received by Salado ISD last week were just over \$1 billion.

Based on this preliminary value, a 1¢ property tax levy would generate \$100,000 per year for an ESD with boundaries that are the same as the school district. A 5¢ tax levy would generate about \$500,000 for the emergency services district per year. A 10¢ property tax levy (the maximum) would generate about \$1 million per year.

A 1¢ tax rate for a property valued at \$250,000 would be \$25. A 5¢ tax levy would be \$125 on the same value and a 10¢ tax rate would be \$250 per year.

Currently, Salado Volunteer Fire Department funds its budget through donations, fundraisers such as the annual Smokin Spokes, payments from the county and a \$40,000 payment from the Village of Salado.

Salado VFD has an

annual budget of about \$145,000 for equipment and maintenance and repairs, fuel and other costs. No salaries under the current Salado VFD.

Volunteers give more than 4,000 man hours each year. There are currently 25 volunteers on the VFD.





When Salado Intermediate School opened, Salado Masonic Lodge donated more than \$5,000 worth of books to help seed the library. When Salado High launched its Soccer program, Salado Lodge donated more than \$2,000 to the fledgling sports program.

Due to the success of the flag program, Salado Masons provide \$5,000 per year in scholarships to graduating Salado seniors, as well as providing \$1,000 per year in back to school supplies for low-income elementary students and donating bikes each year at Christmas for Salado children. A small country lodge dating to 1867, Salado Lodge has given more than \$20,000 in scholarships in recent years.

The Mirabeau B. Lamar medal is named after the Father of Texas Educatioon, who was an early Texas Mason and President of the Republic of Texas.

In his first address to the Congress, he pleaded for the creation of a public school system in Texas. He declared, "If we desire to establish a republican government upon a broad and permanent basis, it will become our duty to adopt a comprehensive and well regulated system of mental and moral culture."

He proposed the set aside of public lands for the creation of a permanent en-

education. His educational views met with the approval of Congress and provisions were made for public education. Congress set aside three leagues (13,285 acres) of land in each county to support primary schools and an additional fifty leagues (221,420 acres) to support two colleges in 1839. In 1840, Congress set aside an additional league for the support of county schools. In addition, they made provisions for the certification of teachers. Once again, many of these legislators were Masons.

While these acts were important in the establishment of public education in Texas, the lasting impact was in the creation of a permanent endowment for the support of public education that lives to this day. Furthermore, Texas was the first state to give state aid to education. In 1854, the State legislature established a permanent school fund and an available school fund to finance the education of the youth of Texas. The "school lands" of Texas continue to provide revenue to the permanent endowment and support common education in Texas and supplement the property taxes dedicated to the school systems.

In 1988, under the leadership of Grand Master Graham Childress, the Lamar Award of Excellence was established. The Lamar Medal is awarded to students and educators in recognition of outstanding personal achievement in academics, citizenship, community service, or sports.





Aaron Watson returns to Johnny's Outback

Aaron Watson will take the stage at Johnny's Outback on May 11. Tickets are available online at johnnyssteaksandbbq.com for \$30 per person. Tickets will be available on the day of the show for \$35. Reserved lawn chair seats are \$50.

Mason Lively and Colby Cooper will open the show for Watson.

Aaron Watson isn't interested in what someone else thinks he should do. But instead of getting lonely as he sidesteps expectations, he's followers--hungaining dreds of thousands of them. Delivered with a warm smile and fueled by a wild spirit, Watson's rebellion echoes the land that helped make him.

Watson remains strikingly similar to the people that still dot his native West Texas. They're a rugged people, proud of home but humble and hardworking, the first to help a neighbor but also fiercely independent. And Watson is unquestionably one of them.

"I've always considered myself an anti-rock star," Watson says, his drawl cracking slightly as he grins. "People don't like me because I'm a rock star. People like me because I'm just like them."

Throughout his 17-year career that spans a dozen albums and more than 2,500 shows throughout the U.S. and Europe, 39-year-old Watson has stubbornly and sincerely identified with the everyman--even as he's proven to be the exception to the rule.

The latest evidence of Watson's homespun singularity is Vaquero, an ambitious 16-song set of character-driven storytelling, level-headed cultural commentary, and love songs for grown-ups that promise to further solidify his status as one of today's finest torch-bearers of real country music.

Vaquero is the follow-up to 2015's The Underdog, an acclaimed collection that also made history. Watson was sitting at his kitchen table as his wife Kim scrambled eggs when he got the call: The Underdog had debuted at No. 1 on the Billboard Country Albums Chart. It was the first time an independent, male country artist had ever outsold majors to premiere at the top spot. "We started jumping around and squealing like kids," he says. "It was a beautiful moment because I got to share it with the girl who believed in me when I was broke and playing some pawnshop guitar. It is something I'll never forget." That momentous instant also arrived with a built-in challenge. "Once we dried the tears of joy, it hit me," Watson says. "I had my work cut out for me for my next album."

Determined, Watson committed to waking up every morning before the sun rose to write songs on that same old pawnshop guitar he scored 20 years ago. "I bet you I couldn't get \$50 for that guitar," he says. "But it means the world to me." He penned songs in the back of a bus on the highway, too, as the band spent the last two years playing more than 35 states and six countries.

The result is Vaquero, a bold album that confidently draws from Texas' storied musical melting pot: dancehall shuffles, dustbowl narratives, Tejano, and more fill the record.

In writing the new album, Watson felt especially drawn to the idea of the vaquero, the original Spanish horseman that set the foundation for the North American cowboy, a solitary figure with a legendary work ethic. Watson is a modern-day vaquero-he just gets up at 5 a.m. to wrangle songs instead of cattle. And while he won't deny the pressure he felt following his last album's success, outside barometers can't compel him to change who he is or what he writes. Watson is Watson, chart-topping record or not.

"This is the first album I've ever made where if it's the last album I ever make, I could be content with that," Watson says of Vaquero.

One listen and it's easy to understand why. Album opener "Texas Lullaby" pays lilting homage both to home and to the bravery of the young heroes fighting wars. Deep connections to place and family course throughout the record. Singalong "These Old Boots Have Roots" celebrates new love by offering promises grounded in the honor and grace of past generations. A fiddle accents Watson's lines playfully then escalates to a hopeful roar.

Romance is a central

theme of the album, but Watson isn't interested in adding to the steady stream of hook-up anthems coming out of Music Row. Watson's love songs are celebrations of monogamy and the bonds that only time, mutual respect, and persistence can build. The swinging, fiddle-soaked "Take You Home Tonight" anticipates a steamy night in, while "Run Wild Horses" is a passionate ode to lovemaking featuring a standout vocal performance from Watson. whose laid-back croon lets loose and soars. Infectious first single "Outta Style" and shuffling "Be My Girl Tonight" both praise staying power and explore how to protect it.

Watson revels in another kind of love on the album closer, "Diamonds & Daughters." Two years ago, his then four-yearold daughter asked him to write her a song for his next record. "I thought it sure would be special if I could write her a song right now that we could dance to at her wedding someday," he says. That's exactly what he did. A tender look at the past, present, and future, the song will undoubtedly touch every parent and daughter who hears it.

The title track is an accordion-fueled joy, buoyed by Watson's delivery of life lessons courtesy of an old vaquero sitting alone at a bar. "Mariano's Dream" "Clear Isabel" are companion pieces, placed back-to-back to stunning cinematic effect. Plaintive "Mariano's instrumental Dream" kicks off the experience, haunting and sad as an acoustic guitar carries listeners through a lush Tex-Mex soundscape. The song then segues into "Clear Isabel," and listeners soon discover the Mariano named in the previous track is father to Isabel. A story of sacrifice and heartbreak, "Clear Isabel" imbues the souls who choose to cross a river in search of safety with the dignity and beauty they deserve. "It's one of my favorite moments on the record," Watson says. "I feel like if I could play Guy Clark that song, he'd smile."

"They Don't Make 'Em Like They Used To" begins as warm nostalgia, and oth-

er comforts before intensifying into no mere stroll down memory lane, but an increasingly indignant rant, capturing the hurt and anger of a country that's currently reeling politically and socially. "I think it might be the best song I've ever written," Watson says.

Refusing to worry about charts or current trends, Watson hopes the main thing Vaquero accomplishes is bringing his growing legion of fans joy. And no matter what happens next, he is anchored and ready. "It doesn't really matter whether I'm playing a dancehall in Texas or a stadium tour around the world, I'm just me," he says. "I won't change. I'm just too rooted in what I believe in. When you've played for such a long time to nobody, now that there's somebody, you really don't take that for granted.





Suppose you're declarer at six spades and West leads the queen of diamonds. How would you play the hand?

When the deal occurred, South won the diamond with the king, cashed the A-K of spades and A-K of clubs and ruffed a club. He then crossed to dummy with a spade and ruffed dummy's last club.

At this point, declarer led a diamond

mond, hoping West would have to win the trick. If he did, West would have no choice but to yield a ruff-anddiscard or return a heart into the A-Q. Either way, South would avoid a heart loser and so make the slam.

However, West, who had been paying close attention to the proceedings, did not cooperate with declarer's plan. When the second round of diamonds was led to the ace at trick nine, West put up his jack. East was then able to win the third diamond with the ten and return a heart to scuttle the slam.

South had basically the right idea, but his sequence of plays had a serious flaw: He had openly telegraphed his intentions and thus made it easier for West to find the winning counterplay.

A far better approach is to win the diamond queen with the king and return a diamond to the ace at trick two. West would have to be very inspired to play his jack at this early stage. If he instead makes the almost automatic play of following suit with the nine, he is a dead duck. Declarer proceeds more or less as before, and finishes with 12 tricks.

The low diamond play at trick two should be made before West has any idea of what's going on. It's hard for him to know so early in the play that the crucial point has already been reached, and he should be put to that test as soon as possible.





Axis Deer are native to India

People ask me why I take the time every week to write this column. For me, it is about sharing my passion with folks about the natural world right here. People have always had a fascination with "exotic" animals, often overlooking those creatures that are just as pretty, endearing and interesting that may be found in their own backyard. However, sometimes I write about animals that, while not native, have been established here long enough for them to be readily observed. One of these creatures is a species of deer from India, and that hooved mammal is known as the Axis Deer.

Axis Deer (Cervus axis) are hooved mammals that look superficially like a native White-tailed Deer that is covered with spots. The coloration in adults ranges primarily from a light burgundy to dark brown on the upperparts. This coloration allows for the numerous, randomly placed white spots to be easily seen. Additionally, there is a dark stripe that runs lengthwise down the spine from the back of the neck to just shy of the tail tip. The underparts, save a small brown patch on the throat, is white.

Male Axis Deer have very distinctive antlers that have

three tines on each antler. These slender antlers can extend upwards of 2 feet behind the head. Under normal circumstances, females lack these antlers, although rarely some females will be adorned with extremely short stubs.

The Axis Deer is relatively small as adult males are typically just over 5 feet in total length (with a comparatively petite - 8 inch tail) and a maximum weight of just under 165 pounds. Like other species of deer, female Axis Deer are somewhat smaller than the males, topping out at a maximum weight of 100 pounds. Full size is not attained until males are 5 years old; for females it is 6 years.

Not native to this continent, the Axis Deer originated from India. At one time, it was a very common sight in the open plains; however, due to overhunting and habitat degradation, this species is not nearly as common as it once was in its native land.

In 1932, the first Axis Deer were introduced into Texas. Since that time, it has been estimated that the current statewide population is well over 15,000 free-roaming individuals. Most of these individuals reside within the confines of the Edwards Plateau, and at that, most are on private ranches behind very high fences.

This species is quite sociable with herds of up to 100 individuals being reported on a regular basis. These herds are generally led by a mature doe. Males are a part of these herds, even when the herd is comprised of several juveniles. This is a behavioral trait unlike our native species of deer.

Breeding season usually begins in mid-May and extends through August with the majority of reproductive activity being in June and July. The long gestation period is typically about 7 months, and a single fawn is produced from each mat-

ing. The mothers will hide their helpless young and return to them to nurse periodically throughout the day. At one week, the young will begin to walk on their own but will not begin to graze independently until they are over 5 weeks of age. The young will begin to be weaned when they are around 6 months of age. Sexual maturity is ordinarily reached at about 15 months of age in females. Full size is not attained

The diet of the Axis Deer varies from season to season, but its favorites include short-length grasses such as Little Bluestem and Switchgrass. Brush is also favored in the spring, and many individuals take a liking to young live oak, sumac, and hackberry.

Whereas most of the Texas Axis Deer population resides on private ranches behind high fencing, there are small populations that are free-ranging. Although seemingly minute, the effects of these non-native free-ranging populations on native deer and plants has yet to be fully determined and deserves close monitor-




