Mayor Skip Blancett read proclamations thanking both McDougal and Jackson for their service during their terms on the Board of Aldermen.

Final work approved to connect Stagecoach

Aldermen approved a \$34,279 amendment to the FY 2019 Operating Budget for the final connection of the Stagecoach Inn property to the Salado Wastewater System.

The amendment was approved after aldermen learned from Village Administrator Don Ferguson that about 20 percent of the properties in the sewer service area have begun the process of tying in to the sewer system and have made impact fee payments. Properties have until July 1 to tie in to the system.

The \$34,279 amendment was approved because the Village has an agreement with the Stagecoach property owner to assume the costs of tying into the new sewer system. General operating funds are being used to pay the cost because the work will be done on property that will ultimately be owned by Stagecoach Inn. Bond funds cannot be used on the improvements necessary on the property to serve Stagecoach Inn.

According to Article II of the Master Development Agreement, "The Purchase Contract shall provide that Village will demolish, remove and abate all existing wastewater related improvements, and complete construction of new lift station and wastewater collection lines on the site pursuant to be approved in ad-

vance by Owner, such approval for aesthetic and operational concerns, prior to the sale and conveyance of the site to Owner."

Ferguson told aldermen that the old plant has been decommissioned and carried off of the premises to allow for the sale of the property to the Stagecoach Inn. Aldermen approved a contract amendment of \$130,536.29 to Matous Construction for the decommissioning and removal of the Stagecoach sewer plant.

The MDA between the Village and Stagecoach Inn further states in Article III that "Impact fees are not applicable to this project."

Stagecoach Inn and the retail properties on Main Street and Royal Street will not pay Impact Fees because they were current customers at the time that the Village approved Impact Fees in 2018. The Village accepted the donation of the 40+ year old Stagecoach Inn sewer system from Morris Foster in 2014 and those properties have been served by the Stagecoach sewer. Ferguson reported to aldermen that those properties are now using the new sewer system.

OTHER PROPERTIES

MUST PAY IMPACT FEES

The other 130 or so properties in Salado that are being forced to tie onto the sewer will have to pay impact fees (\$3,750 per Living Unit Equivalent of 100 gallons per day water usage) to the Village of Salado be-

cause they are considered "new development." Those properties will also have to pay the cost of tying into the sewer system within the 90 day period that began April 1. Further, those properties will have to pay for the decommissioning of their current functioning on-site systems. The properties will have one year after tying into the sewer system to decommission their system.

Multiple properties in the initial service area have reported to *Salado Village Voice* that they are being required to pay Impact Fees of \$50,000 and more based on the LUE calculation for non-residential use. Add to this, the cost of tying into the sewer and the cost of decommissioning their operating systems.

However, the first properties that will be annexed since the sewer system was completed will pay no impact fees.

Aldermen held the second set of public hearings on May 16 for the annexation of the Salado ISD properties and the adjacent rights-of-way along Salado School Rd. from West Village Rd. to Thomas Arnold Rd. and Williams Rd. from West Village Rd. to FM 2484.

Prior to the annexation public hearings, Ferguson reported to aldermen that the Village is pursuing an interlocal agreement with Salado ISD to provide resource officers to the school campuses through the Salado Police Department. The

cost to the Village of Salado for supplementing the year-round salaries of the officers (who will work for the school district for eight months of the year) has not been determined.

In earlier public hearings on annexation of the school properties, the interlocal agreement to provide resource officers to the school were not discussed.

FY 2019 BUDGET SET

FOR SEWER OPERATIONS

Aldermen discussed a \$97,100 budget amendment to the FY 2019 general operating budget for the expenses and revenues for the sewer system for the remainder of the fiscal year.

The Village anticipates \$60,786 in revenues and \$97,110 in expenses for the remainder of the year, leaving a deficit of \$36,224.

LOT SIZE COMMITTEE

WILL TAKE PUBLIC INPUT

The lot size committee will meet for a workshop session at 6 p.m. June 4. It will have a public input session at 6 p.m. June 11 at the municipal building.

Because the Village can now serve properties that tie into the sewer system, the required lot sizes of half-acre minimum in the current zoning ordinance can be reduced.

The lot size committee will make its recommendations to the board of aldermen for consideration.

The Village earlier this spring approved the waiver

of the minimum lot size for a 54-acre subdivision on Royal Street and Smith Branch that will allow lots of about a quarter-acre in size. Since approving the waiver, the Village has not yet received a formal request for annexation of the 54-acre subdivision.

Ferguson told aldermen that design work has begun on extending the sewer to the proposed subdivision. The property owners will pay the cost to extend the sewer line, according to Ferguson.

The Village has received no plans on from The Sanctuary development despite Robert Sulaski telling aldermen on Sept. 6, 2018 that the first plans for the 300+ acre development would be in Village hands in "February or early March." The first phase will be residential and assisted living.

The Village is contractually obligated to provide sewer services to The Sanctuary development.

2020 BUDGET SCHEDULE

The board set a schedule for the adoption of the FY2020 Budget. Aldermen will begin meeting on the budget in July after publishing a notice in June asking for public input on the budget for next year.

The Mayor will present the proposed budget on Aug. 5. Public hearings on the proposed budget and tax rate will be Sept. 5 and Sept. 12 with final adoption scheduled for Sept. 19.

VILLAGE TO ABANDON SOME RIGHT OF WAY PROPERTIES

Aldermen authorized village staff to facilitate the abandonment of two pieces of right-of-way northwest of College St. and Royal St. to transfer the ownership of the property to Inn on the Creek properties. Ferguson reported to the board that the rights-of-way has no access to streets and that there are no planned public uses for the small pieces of property. Will Lowery reported to the board that he had no plans for construction on the property once it is conveyed to Inn on the Creek. Michael Coggin gave the motion, which received a second from John Cole. It passed unanimously.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

DISTRICT DISCUSSED

Aldermen discussed in workshop the process that citizens will need to take in order to bring a proposal for the formation of an Emergency Services District to benefit the Salado VFD. No formal action was taken by the board. Consensus in discussion was that trying to bring the election to voters in November 2019 might be too early.

John Newman told aldermen that he could have a petition with 100 signatures calling for an election within 72 hours.

Aldermen will meet again in regular session at 6:30 p.m. June 6.

The Salado ISD School Board met on Monday, May 13. The following is a summary of that meeting:

- Shannon Heinzen was recognized as the Salado Rotary Educator of the Month for May.
- Students who competed at state in UIL competitions were recognized, including the cast and crew of the 2019 4A State Champion Salado One Act Play, Theater Design, UIL Filmmakers State Champions, the third place Mathematics team including State Champion Ben Sunshine, and the State runner-up Spelling team.
- Darrell Street was recognized for his 15 years of service as a school board member.
- The Board approved canvassing the returns and declare the results of the May 4, 2019 school board election.
- Jeff Kelley and Amy McLane took the office as school board members.
- The Board approved hiring eleven certified educators, including teachers, teacher/coaches, and school counselors.
- The Board received an

- update regarding the construction of the bond projects.
- The Board reviewed the enrollment comparison. The current enrollment is 1,956 students, which is the highest enrollment in the history of our school district. The April enrollment in 2018 was 1,845 students and the April enrollment in 2017 was 1,773 students.
- The Board reviewed the monthly financial reports.
- The Board approved the minutes from the April 15 school board meeting.
- The Board approved the budget amendments.
- The Board approved the Communities in Schools contract for the 2019-2020 school year.
- The Board approved the adoption of English/language arts textbooks.
- The Board approved a memorandum of understanding with Intervention Services, PLLC for mental

- health counseling services.
 - The Board approved the renewal of contracts for administrators.
 - The Board approved changes to cafeteria prices. The changes will increase the prices only for adults. The cost of breakfast for adults will increase by ten cents to \$2.35 and the cost of lunch for adults will increase by twenty-five cents to \$3.75. The student prices will remain the same at \$1.35 for breakfast and \$2.75 for lunch.

Despite bad economic news, markets hold up

The Markets

With all the noise and bad news for the week ending May 17, it would be reasonable to expect to see a massive drop in the markets and that drop duly reflected in the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX). Instead, what really happened was the Index declined a mere 0.76% and even for the trailing month it was only down 1.57%, closing at 2859.53. Admittedly it is still 2.4% below where it was last September but things easily could have been worse. The SPX remained up 5.4% from a year ago and is up a whopping 14% so far this year.

While the stock market showed some degree of moderation and even a glint of optimism for the week, the bond market, represented by the 10-year U.S. Treasury note was sounding the alarm bells. The 10-year note ended the week yielding 2.393%, down 12.7 basis points (hundreds of a percent). The alarm was that the 3-month Treasury bill was yielding 2.399%, putting the curve once more in an inverted position. The intermediate term notes dipped even further with the 3-year yield at around 2.1%, strongly signaling that the bond market anticipates an economic slowdown starting as soon as next year.

West Texas Crude ended the week having eked out a 1.59% gain to \$62.68. The black stuff is up over 32% for this calendar year but down over 5% from last May. The dollar continued its relentless climb, up 0.72% on the WSJ Dollar Index to 98.02, and up 1.38% against the Chinese Yuan. Critically in the trade war, the dollar has risen about 8.5% against the yuan, offsetting the 10% tariffs and shows every sign of rising to offset higher tariffs if and when they go into effect.

Market & Economic Update

The Economy

Once again trade wars and rumors of trade wars dominated the economic news. Last week's announcement of 25% tariffs against many Chinese imports with warnings of an across-the-board 25% toll on all Chinese imports continued to reverberate as China announced counter-tariffs. Toward the end of the week, the news that the tariffs on steel and aluminum from Mexico and Canada were going to be lifted provided some degree of counter-balance as did the administration's notice that it would hold off on a 25% tariff on EU automobiles for six months. In response, the Dow Jones Industrial Average and the SPX turned in their biggest one-day losses since January 3 on Monday but gradually nearly recovered over the rest of the week.

The stock market reflected the economic crosswinds that could result in a strong economic performance for the rest of the year or bring us closer to a recession. Walmart announced that sales were up 3.4% in the first quarter, boosted by a strong online showing. That was the exception for retailers as overall spending at stores and shops declined in April by 0.2% after zig-zagging through the first quarter. Retail sales remain up about 3% for the trailing 12 months. The Conference Board's Index of Leading Economic Indicators sounded a positive note as it rose 0.2% in April, following a 0.3% gain in March and a 0.2% rise in February. Tak-

en together, those numbers strongly suggest the next six months to one-year are likely to be recession-free.

On the other side of the scale, utility output dropped 3.5% in April. That was accompanied by a 0.5% decline in manufacturing output for the month, compounding an average decline of about 0.4% per month in the first quarter. Manufacturing output is a relatively small portion of the overall U.S. economy but has proven in the past to be a bellwether indicator. New housing starts were a bright spot in April, rising 5.7% but failed to offset the 7% decline in the first quarter.

In a view of the bigger picture, information is accumulating that the 3.2% annualized GDP growth in the first quarter was largely generated by businesses stockpiling goods in anticipation of tariffs. If so, then the slowdown we are seeing in the first month of the second quarter makes sense as companies stop building up inventories. The consensus for second quarter U.S. annualized GDP is now running about 1.8% to 2% with the potential for a slower growth rate in the following quarters.

The bottom line remains the same. If the trade wars take on a worst-case scenario, things could get quite unpleasant in about a year but if the tariffs are dropped and the trade wars with the EU and China are ended, we still could get quite a good growth and market gain this year.

There really are no Trump mysteries

The surprise about the big New York Times story on Donald Trump's tax returns is that there are no real surprises.

Trump's taxes have been an obsession of the left since he, in violation of a long-standing norm, reneged on his promise to release his returns during the 2016 campaign.

Democrats counted as one of the advantages of taking the House that they could demand Trump's returns. The dispute resulting from the administration's refusal to turn them over is now probably headed to the Supreme Court.

All the while, the expectation, or at least the suspicion, was that the returns contained some awful secret, perhaps evidence that he is a tool of the Russians. And here, The New York Times has obtained Trump's tax information spanning a decade from the mid-1980s to mid-1990s, and the revelation is that he wasn't doing as well as he said in public and lost a boatload of money in a period that nearly destroyed him. In other words, exactly what anyone paying any attention would have expected.

Yes, the amount of the reported loss, \$1.17 billion, is remarkable (although inflated for tax purposes) and some of the details memora-

ble, but can anyone say that they are surprised?

Trump himself, the Washington Examiner notes, talked about his precarious financial state in this period on the first episode of "The Apprentice." In fact, he may have exaggerated, saying that he had been "billions of dollars" in debt.

As for Trump's use of tax loopholes, he said in a debate with Hillary Clinton that if he didn't owe any tax liability, that made him "smart."

There really are no Trump mysteries. His flaws aren't hidden away. He often attests to them himself, or demonstrates them publicly. For someone who cares so much about his image, and so assiduously crafts it, he's a relative open book.

No blockbuster report has more than a passing effect because each dispatch is, ultimately, another dot in a pointillist portrait of the president that was largely completed long ago.

This is also why the hope that we are one investigation, tax return or subpoena away from the

revelation that will finally bring Trump down -- or even make a difference -- is almost certainly forlorn. Obviously, it was news that he had paid off a porn star during the presidential campaign, and highly embarrassing. This is why Trump denied it for so long. But he'd already told us about his womanizing in his own words, often on "The Howard Stern Show."

Likewise, the most blameworthy conduct regarding Russia's election interference in 2016 was out in the open -- the Trump campaign was happy to derive any possible advantage from the WikiLeaks disclosures, and Trump tried to deny the obvious Russian involvement.

We didn't need a 400-page special counsel report to break this news.

None of this is to defend or excuse Trump's business practices, or his conduct in office. It is merely to say that he's an extravagantly known quantity, and will likely win or lose in 2020 based on what we already know rather than the fruits of further investigation and fact-finding.

It is well-known that more contracts are won or lost on the opening lead than at any other stage of the play. Of course, some players are more gifted than others in choosing the opening lead, but the fact is that the batting average of almost every player suffers severely when the effectiveness of his opening leads is compared with the rest of his game.

As an illustration, take this deal

played in a rubber-bridge game. It was reported to us by West, who was upset by the result.

After three passes, South opened the bidding with five diamonds. West was tempted to double but chose the more conservative course of passing. He then had no clear-cut opening lead and, after much thought, selected his fourth-best club.

This was not very successful, because declarer won East's king with the ace, played the ace and another heart, ruffing in dummy, and discarded his last heart on the ace of spades. South then led a diamond and lost two trump tricks to make exactly five diamonds.

Disturbed by the outcome, West later polled 10 top experts to see what they would have led against five diamonds.

As usual, where an opening lead is involved, there was a lack of unanimity among the experts. Seven of them agreed with West's opening lead of a club. Two favored a low heart lead and one said he would lead a low spade.

Remarkably, they all struck out! Not one found the only way to defeat the contract, which was to lead the ace of diamonds and continue with the queen! Against this defense South is helpless and, in fact, goes down two tricks!

It just goes to show that even the experts can't achieve perfection when it comes to opening leads.

Western Black-necked Gartersnakes are active after rainstorms



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Western Texas is not the area that most folks think of to host species of animals that rely on water in order to live. However, there is an attractive species of Gartersnake that has adapted to life near permanent springs in the middle of the Chihuahuan Desert, and that variety is the Western Black-necked Gartersnake.

The Western Black-necked Gartersnake (*Thamnophis cyrtopsis cyrtopsis*) is a small non-venomous serpent, with most adults reaching sexual maturity between 18 and 24 inches in total length. The largest specimen recorded, however, measured just under a whopping 42 inches, but that specimen was definitely an exception to this species size rule. Like most other species in its genus, it has three stripes that run longitudinally on its body. The most distinctive stripe is the bright yellow/orange one that runs along the spine, while the other two pale lines run lengthwise along the sides on the second and third scale rows above the belly scales. In between the stripes are two rows of large, bold square shaped dark spots that alternate along the length of the snake. However, in most mature specimens, these spots are only visible on the front quarter of the snake while the posterior spots are obscured. The background coloration is typically dark gray, particularly on the latter half of the body. The most distinctive characteristic that this snake exhibits is the large black neck patch that separates body from the steel-gray to olive-green head, thus the common name of black-necked gartersnake. The eyes are large and are adorned with round pupils. To further set the

head apart, the cheeks are bright white, divided by black lines.

Most of the gartersnake species are rarely encountered far from water, and this one is no exception. However, with its range in Texas being limited to the semiarid to arid areas west of the Pecos River, the Western Black-necked Gartersnake is far better adapted to living in dry environments than most of the other native garter snakes. It is an abundant snake in the right habitat, thriving in the numerous spring-filled pools that are scattered throughout the mountains and vegetated canyons of the mountains and mesas of western Texas. Outside of Texas, this species may be observed as far east as southeastern Arizona and as far south as the Mexican state of Aguascalientes.

As with almost all other reptiles that reside in temperate climates, it will un-

dergo a period of inactivity during the coldest months of the year, allowing sexually mature adults to generate the sperm and eggs necessary for successful reproduction in the spring. However, unlike most other harmless snakes found in Texas, the Western Black-necked Gartersnakes is oviparous, or live-bearing animals. Mating occurs primarily during the months of April and May, and the young are usually born sometime between late June and mid-August. Litters range in size from as few as 3 to as many as 25, although the average litter size is around a Baker's Dozen. The delicate babies, who measure between 6 and 8 inches in length, are typically more brilliantly colored than the adults and are capable of fending for themselves from the moment they are born.

Western Black-necked Gartersnakes are diurnal

(daytime active) during their foraging activities in the spring and fall, then they become nocturnal when the temperatures of summer reach temperatures too unbearable for most cold-blooded animals. Many are observed crossing roads during and immediately after rainstorms as they search for their primary prey of frogs and toads. Earthworms are also consumed, as well as the occasional lizard and small mouse.

Population studies have shown this species to have a dappled distribution, but in the areas that it is found, it is an abundant species. I have personally observed two dozen specimens in a spring-fed pool in Presidio county in one evening. It is also an unassuming serpent, preferring to rely on camouflage and speed to evade predators. Even when captured, it depends on the ability to emit a nauseating musk to dissuade a predator rather than biting. And even then, like the majority of snakes that occur in this state, they are completely harmless to humans.

While outdoor recreation is fun and healthy, the Corps reminds the public that water safety is also important. Swimming in open

water is more difficult than in a swimming pool. Statistics show that 90 percent of those who drown at USACE lakes and rivers may have survived if they had worn a life jacket.

If you see someone in trouble in the water, remember, "Reach or throw, don't go." Reach for the person with a pole, a long stick, a boat paddle, even a towel, in order to reduce the chance that the panicked victim will drag you under with them. If you cannot find something to reach with, or if the person is too far to reach, throw something that floats, such as a life jacket or a floating toy. Even a small closed water cooler can keep someone afloat long enough for a rescue.

While one fatality is one too many, the Fort Worth District is increasing its ini-

tiatives and efforts to lessen those incidents by at least 50 percent.

"It's important to expect the unexpected," said Col. Kenneth Reed, Commander, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth District. "Even the best swimmers can underestimate their ability to swim and can quickly get into trouble, that's why it is so important wear a life jacket in and around the water."

While having a blast this holiday and summer here are some water safety tips to help ensure you return home to those you love.

- Wear a life jacket.
- Know your swimming ability.
- Avoid exhaust fumes around boats.

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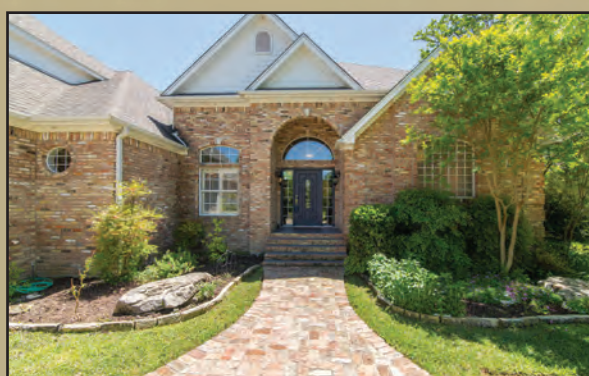
