

Beginning August 1 at the Salado Museum, Salado Village Voice will present "Cartooning Texas: One Hundred Years of Cartoon Art in the Lone Star State," an exhibition developed by Maury Forman and Robert A. Calvert for the Center for Texas Studies at the University of North Texas with support from Humanities Texas, the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Political cartoons in Texas often focus on hotly contested, controversial and colorful political campaigns—usually for the governor's chair.

In "Cartooning Texas" you will meet a fascinating array of flamboyant politicians, ranging from the controversial Governor Hogg to the remarkable Pappy O'Daniel.

"Cartooning Texas" is

both a cartoon history of Texas politics and a history of political cartooning in Texas. It tells the story of one hundred years of events in Texas from 1890 to 1990 in a form that is wonderfully visible and precise.

This exhibition serves as a compilation of the visual commentaries of journalists about the issues and people most important to Texans during the 100-year period.

Not-so-good news is good news

The Markets

The week's theme for the first market week of 2019's third quarter was, "Even not-so-good news is good news." The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose 2.24% for the week to end at 2990.41, less than ten points short of the magic 3000 mark after bumping up to 2995.82, another record close, on the shortened market day Wednesday. The not-sogood news was that the recently imposed 25% tariffs on \$250 billion of Chinese imports would remain in place but the application of that level of tariffs on another set of goods worth \$300 billion annually would be put on hold. Notably, while the announcement of the 25% tariffs a couple of months ago caused a market decline, the announcement that they would remain in place, but more tariffs were tabled, caused a rise in stock values. The SPX is now up 9.28% from this time last

The strange stock market behavior in which good news, like the June jobs report, causes the market to decline and bad news, like May's weak jobs report, causes it to rise is due to a focus on the Federal Reserve. At the top of a market or economic cycle, investors tend to focus on short-term interest rate adjustments by the Fed. Bad economic news tends to cause the Fed to lower short-term rates, exciting investors, while good economic news tends to be followed by shortterm interest rate increases, depressing traders' enthusi-

After dipping below the 2% mark to 1.95% on July 3, the ten-year U.S. Treasury note ended the week at 2.041%, a mere 1.7 basis points (100ths of one percent) below last week's close. With the 90-day T-bill yielding 2.211%, the yield curve remains firmly inverted, signaling a high

probability of a recession in the next 12 to 18 months. The dollar rose 1.15% to close at 97.24 on the WSJ Dollar Index and is up 3.41% from a year ago. The drivers appeared to be the tariff news and jobs report. West Texas Intermediate (WTI) oil declined almost 1% to \$57.67 on continued indicators of declining demand amid slower global economic growth.

The Economy

June's employment report was released Friday by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). That report indicated that hiring surged in the month to a net 224,000 new jobs filled in the U.S. economy. The word "surged" is appropriate as last month's new hires netted out at 72,000 making June's report a 200% jump in new employees. That means that either May's decline in hiring or June's surge was an anomaly. More significant is the three-month moving average of new jobs filled. It is currently running at 171,000 while a year ago it was 243,000. As is common with economic moves, we will need to wait another month or more to see which way the trend is pointing.

171,000 is still a high number, higher than the new labor market participants being created by school graduations and other standard sources, meaning that it is not sustainable over the long-term. We did see where the new hires were coming from as the unemployment rate rose from 3.6% to 3.7%. That number comes from the "Household Survey" in which the BLS workers call random households across the country

and ask about employment. It seems quite a lot of people who had dropped out of the labor market for various reasons have decided to return. They appear to be attracted by offers of higher pay and better working situations.

There typically are a lot

of cross-currents at economic tops and bottoms and this one is no exception. The Bureau of Economic Analysis at the Commerce Department announced on July 3 that the U.S. trade deficit jumped 8.4% in May from April to \$55.52 billion for the month, the biggest rise in more than four years. Last week we commented that consumer spending was up but both domestic manufacturing and domestic services saw a decline. This announcement is a confirmation that it indeed was imported goods that consumers were buying. The lion's share of that increased trade deficit was with China even though tariffs were already in place.

The increased trade deficit will have a direct impact on the Commerce Department's GDP estimate due out on July 26. Current estimates by the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank and historically accurate private firms suggest the second quarter GDP will come in at an annualized rate of between 1.3% to 1.5%, or less than half the growth rate reported for the first quarter. If we see a decline of that magnitude, it will be a reversal of the pattern we have seen for the past several years as first quarters were low and followed by rising quarterly growth rates through the year.

Favoritism runs rampant

To the Editor:

Favoritism and self interest are part of every day life in the village government.

Take City Manager Don Ferguson, who was caught with his pants down around his ankles when shortly after he suggested that a surplus 2010 F-Series police pickup truck was approved to be donated to the Belton ISD Career and Technology Education(CTE) program on June 20 (the actual issue on the agenda to be considered was that it be sold at auction), it was found that Ferguson's own wife runs the CTE Department and he never disclosed this favoritism to the public or the aldermen at the June 6, June 20, or July 3 BOA meetings. True to the character of other Salado public officials, instead of admitting any error in disclosure last Thursday, omniscient Ferguson doubled-down in justifying his actions:

"I want to stress something – this vehicle is going from a village city government (that Ferguson runs) to a school district (CTE program that Ferguson's wife runs), not from one individual to another individual.

That's all I'm gonna say," Ferguson said last Thursday night in response to the revelation.

Let me get this right: If I run a city and my sister runs an adjacent school district and my son runs the jail system it's perfectly fine to give the public entities that they control a bunch of stuff because it's going from one government entity to another and I shouldn't have to disclose it to anyone for that reason alone?

Ferguson claimed the pickup needed \$3000 in repairs. Where is the estimate? Ferguson said it would bring limited value at auction, without stating what that value would be. Value based on what? NADA suggests a value of \$10-15K, enough to light both Salado gateway signs. Ferguson said he contacted the Salado ISD first and they didn't need it. He already knew this. With whom did he speak and isn't the village hiring a school resource officer in

partnership with the school district that will need a car to go back and forth to schools (limited mileage), or maybe the village should take the bilk the taxpayer path and just buy him/her a brand new one. Was the concept of staging the high mileage police car in strategic locations around the schools discussed in an effort to be a deterrent? Of course not.

The lack of morals and ethics in the village government is unbelievable. Neither the mayor nor the aldermen have the courage to question what Ferguson failed to disclose because so many have engaged in favoritism and self-interest themselves.

If small conflicts like a pickup truck donation aren't disclosed, imagine what undisclosed larger conflicts exist among our elected and salaried public officials.

We have the money to fix our food system

Poverty is expensive, but fixing it doesn't have to be — at least not compared to

the status quo.

The Institute for Policy Studies and the Poor People's Campaign recently released a Moral Budget, and it's a veritable treasure trove of illuminating data proving that point.

They propose we could easily cut \$350 billion from the annual military budget — which would still leave us with a bigger budget than China, Russia, and Iran combined — and raise \$886 billion by enacting fair taxes on the rich and corporations.

That would free up billions to help alleviate poverty and make life more secure for all of us — including by making sure we all get access to good food and nutrition.

The Moral Budget identifies additional funding for SNAP (or food stamps) to the tune of \$6.5 billion, and \$1.1 billion for child nutrition. That would be fantastically effective, and it would cost just a tiny fraction of the overall savings the budget finds.

But on the heels of a farm bill that continued the cycle of subsidizing a small group of American farmers that farm in a deeply unsustainable way, we could use another small portion of those billions to help fix our food system.

Our entire food industry is built upon the exploitation of labor and land. The reason we have cheap meat and vegetables is because farm workers — often undocumented immigrants — are underpaid to work long hours, exposed to pesticides and herbicides that harm not only our environment, but also their health.

It's a tragedy. But it's also one that can be remedied.

Funding incentives for local, organic producers would help address the needs of our population, our health, and our planet. Boosting the pay of farm workers and providing an easy path to unionization would be a boon for the folks who pick our fruits and veggies.

Outlawing factory farming and the awful facilities that dominate our meat industry would go a long way to better the treatment of animals in America.

We also need to keep the meat industry from polluting our waterways with animal waste, and instead use a model that's more in harmony with growing crops. Studies show that a farm that raises both animals and crops is a healthier and more productive farm.

But most importantly, we need to use this money to erase the food deserts

that litter the country.

Low-income and communities of color often are situated in these food deserts, without access to fresh fruit and vegetables. It's a large reason why those communities, who are stuck with processed, unhealthy foods, have higher rates of diabetes and diet-related health problems.


Funding more urban farms, food co-ops, farmers markets, and CSAs would help alleviate this problem, especially when used in tandem with an expansion of food stamps. Child nutrition programs — especially free breakfast, lunch, and dinner programs — should be universal, and sourced with healthy foods from local farms.

Transitioning our agricultural system to a more regional and localized operation would reduce emissions and pollution from poor farming techniques, boost wages for farm workers, and improve our national health.

So instead of giving our military billions of dollars to go pollute the globe, and letting big companies run family farms out of business, we should instead pay for a better system for all.

It'd be a pittance compared to those billions we're giving away. But it would have a huge impact.

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American Beauty

We live in an era of public ugliness, of architects who deliberately make their forms unsightly and inhuman, and of public art installations that are invariably ridiculous.

The most obvious exception is the ballpark, which has gotten more beautiful rather than less in a great example of renewal through a return to tradition.

Paul Goldberger, a former architecture writer for The New York Times, traces this journey in his wonderful new book "Ballpark."

He rightly calls the ballpark "one of the greatest of all American building types" and argues that "as much as the town square, the street, the park, and the plaza, the baseball park is a key part of American public space."

Ballparks went from delightfully peculiar structures shoehorned into city streets, to monochromatic multiuse facilities with all the charm of public-works projects, before rediscovering the old

The first ballpark was built in Brooklyn in 1862 and called "Union Grounds." Amazingly enough, "The Star-Spangled Banner," not yet the national anthem, was played before the first game. The wooden parks of the 19th century tended to burn down, sometimes spectacularly (a fire at the South End Grounds in Boston took out 200 buildings in Roxbury).

The 20th century brought the age of steel, brick and concrete, and "the Golden Age" of 1912-14. It gave us Crosley Field, where the Reds played until 1970, with Rich Lowry



an upward slope known as the "terrace" in left field; Tiger Stadium, quirky and cozy (a flagpole stood in the field of play in deep center); and especially the "jewel boxes" of Fenway, Wrigley and Ebbets.

Subsequent decades brought a flight from cities, and from idiosyncrasy. Cleveland previewed what was to come in the 1930s with its publicly funded, gargantuan, usually half-empty, symmetrical, multisport Municipal Stadium, or the "Mistake by the Lake."

The truly dreadful, indistinguishable concrete doughnuts, made for football and baseball but manifestly unsuited for the latter, arrived beginning in the 1960s.

The turning point was Camden Yards in Baltimore, opened in 1992. Originally conceived as another multisport suburban facility, it instead decisively moved baseball beyond such hybrids. Camden Yards has a red-brick exterior and exposed steel supports inside, eschewing the concrete of the doughnuts. It limits foul territory to bring ground-level seats closer. The stands are arranged asymmetrically to avoid a deadening sameness, and frame a view of the Baltimore skyline, anchoring the park in the city.

It was such a triumph that its retro style has become a

design cliche. Its influence stamped the best of the new parks: PNC Park in Pittsburgh, which, outside of Fenway and Wrigley, might be the most charming place to watch a game in the country; Oracle Park in San Francisco, which is everything its execrable forebear, Candlestick, wasn't; T-Mobile Park in Seattle, which is enchanting despite a retractable roof.

Goldberger writes of how the ballpark, with its lush field at the center of an enclosure of concrete and steel, is the garden in the city, a sports combination of the Jeffersonian agrarian tradition and the Hamiltonian emphasis on cities and industry.

It's a wonder we managed to mess it up, but we did, before the current revival that shows there's always a way

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


Seaton married Nicholson June 8 at Saint Stephen


The study encompasses Exodus, Leviticus and Numbers.



During all this time, he was active in farming with his father. After retiring from real estate, he devoted most of time to his Salado farm.


He and Ramah built a home on the farm in 2000, where he lived the rest of his life.



If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. If you wish to be placed on the permanent and/or the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.


