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BoA begins work July 18 on 2019-20 village budget

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Salado aldermen will discuss the 2019-2020 budget at 6:30 p.m. July 18 at the municipal building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. Village administrator Don Ferguson will present aldermen with the 2020 Fiscal Needs Budget.

If the current budget is any indication, the proposed budget will top \$1 million in general operating revenues and expenses.

Currently, the Village operating expenses are funded by approximately \$800,000 in taxes, \$215,000 in franchise fees, \$80,000 in licenses and permits, \$31,000 in subdivision fees and \$38,500 in fines and forfeits for revenues totaling \$1.13 million.

Of the taxes, just over half is from sales tax revenues (\$408,000) and mixed beverage taxes (\$18,000). The village budgeted just over \$372,000 in property taxes based on the \$0.20910 per \$100 valuation general operating property tax.

Expenditures in 2018-19 total \$1.13 million and include approximately \$425,000 for administration. Of that, about half (\$223,000) is for personnel costs for the village administrator and village secretary. The village budgeted \$35,000 for services and \$93,000 for professional fees, including \$35,000 for accounting and \$35,000 for legal fees. Add \$60,000 for other charges and services.

The Village budgeted \$100,000 for development services department, including \$78,000 for personnel costs for the develop\$21,000 in professional fees. Public safety was bud-

geted at almost \$450,000 in 2018-19. Of that, \$40,000 is paid to the Salado Volunteer Fire Department. The Village budgets \$303,000 for police personnel; \$19,000 for police facility costs, \$30,000 for automobile, ammunition, equipment and other incidental costs; \$37,00 for capital outlay for police vehicles and equipment; and \$17,000 for municipal court costs.

The public works budget for 2018-19 was just under \$47,000, including \$45,000 for personnel costs.

The Parks department budget was another \$11,000.

The Street Department budget totaled \$20,000 for labor and supplies, \$14,000 for utilities and \$66,000 for capital outlay for a total budget of almost \$100,000 for

In addition to these budgeted expenses in 2018-19, the village has spent another \$49,000 in transfers out of the general fund budget to the Stagecoach WW Plant budget.

Hotel motel occupancy taxes are not part of the general operating budget. Those HOT tax revenues were budgeted in 2018-19 at \$217,000.

HOT budgeted expenditures totaled \$212,000. Of that, \$100,00 was for personnel services, for the director and a part time employee.

Other HOT expenditures include \$25,000 for the lease of the visitors center, \$70,00 for marketing and another \$15,000 in printing, postage, subscriptions and dues, travel and training, public art support and maintenance.

Of that \$210,000 budgeted in HOT revenues, the Village has received about 64% ment services director and of that so far in the fiscal

year through June, \$134,000. The fiscal year ends Sept. 30, so revenues are on track with three months of income remaining.

The Stagecoach WW Sewer Fund, also separate from the general operating fund budgeted \$25,000 in revenues, including \$12,000 in service fees and a \$13,000 transfer from the general fund. Actual expenditures have exceeded the budgeted amount of \$35,000 by more than \$14,000. An additional \$28,000 has been transferred from the unrestricted general fund balance.

The Stagecoach Sewer fund operating costs and revenues should come off of the village budget in 2019-2020 and be replaced by the wastewater system fund.

To-date the Village reports that as of June 30, it has collected \$97,711.87 in Wastewater Impact Fees and another \$2,105.26 in wastewater customer deposits. According to the Village financial reports, it has charged \$3,540 in monthly wastewater services fees through June 30.

Discussion of the proposed budget is one of four business items on the July 18 board agenda. Other items include a proposed Memorandum of Understanding with the Children's Advocacy Center; contract amendment number 11 with McLean Construction and possible creation of an Economic Development Advisory board.

Slated for discussion only in workshop session are these: potential operation of an all abilities playground as a public park and the potential future relocation of the municipal building.



At 121 months, US is now in longest economic expansion in history


The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed out the week up a mere 0.78% at 3013.77, but at a new record high and, notably, for the first time, at an end-of-week close above 3000. The number sounds impressive, and it is psychologically, but the Index has only risen 7.58% from one year ago, about the average annual gain over its long history and is only up about 2.9% fro where it was at the end of last September. Still, the fact that it rose above that symbolic 3000 level on Thursday and then slowly improved to end higher on Friday says a lot about the attitude of professional investors. As always, where it goes from here is the big question. There are more than a few signs that this leg of the bull market has legs. An interesting but historically common event preceded the stock market run-up to the new record. Individual investors pulled nearly \$30 billion from equity mutual funds last week. Historically, when individual mutual fund investors panic and bolt to sell their funds, it is a good time to buy or at least hold fast. That maxim appears to have

once again been validated. The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note managed to crawl back above the 2% yield level closing out the week with a yield of 2.118%. With the 90-day T-bill yielding 2.151%, the inversion of the yield-curve remains but is not as severe. That did not help the yield dip at the two- and threeyear maturities, yielding 1.87% and 1.85% respectively. Hurricane warnings in the Gulf of Mexico sent oil up 4.43% for the week and about 15% from a month ago to \$60.30. The Economy

age of only 1.6%.

During this expansion,

our economy has evolved into something that even in the 1990s would not be recognizable. In the last half of the 20th century, the United States was an industrial powerhouse, with the big three automakers occupying a dominating slice of the economy and banks both highly profitable and the second cornerstone of prosperity. Today, if there were something like a "big three" it would actually be "five"; Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, Alphabet (Google's parent), and Facebook. In another perspective on that statistic, if we used market capitalization as the measure of size, number five would be Berkshire Hathaway, a company that doesn't actually do anything except own shares in other companies. None of those companies is in heavy manufacturing, nor are there any banks. Even the one company in the list that does some serious, although light, manufacturing, Apple, does most of that manufacturing outside the U.S.

At the same time, this

strange, almost unrecognizable U.S. economy is by any measure the strongest, most resilient, and fastest-growing of the larger world economies. We fret because our 10-year benchmark bond-yield is around 2% while in Germany and Japan, the two economies that were giving us a run for first place twenty years ago, ten-year interest rates are negative! Only 4.27 percent of the world's population lives in the United States, but they produce around 25 percent of the goods and services of the entire planet, about \$20 trillion per year. China, by comparison, has about 18.5% of the world's people but only about 15% of the world's GDP or about

\$12 trillion.

Another metric has perhaps even more profound implications over the long-term. Both China, the number-two economy, and the European Union, number three, find themselves with an effective annual population growth of near-zero percent and facing a rapidly aging population, while the U.S. is still a "growth" economy with population growth averaging about 1%

This economic expansion will eventually come to an end and we will undoubtedly have a recession, but even as we do, recognize that of all the nations and allied groups of nations on the planet, you are living in one that is by far the most economically healthy and dynamic.

This nationally competitive program sponsored by NASA's Texas Space Grant Consortium selects teachers who will increase their knowledge of science, technology, engineering, and math through space education.

This is an all-expense paid opportunity for weeklong workshops, tours, and seminars. It is funded by the Texas Space Grant Consortium and NASA in honor of the 50th anniversary of Apollo 11. Colleen and Laura were accepted to LiftOff last summer at Johnson Space Center, and they said it was an incredible experience. This is the first year for LiftOff Alumni which is offered to teachers who have attended any of the 28 previous LiftOff Institutes.



The US women are winners, not victims

The women of the U.S. national soccer team are famous for being extraordinary athletes, repeat world champions -- and plaintiffs.

The team's lawsuit alleging pay discrimination against the U.S. Soccer Federation has done much to define its identity. A nearly perfect run through the World Cup has been widely interpreted as vindication of the merits of its case, so much so that fans chanted "equal pay" after the U.S. victory in the final over the Netherlands and booed the head of FIFA, the sponsor of the World Cup, during the trophy cere-

It's not to take anything away from the women's achievement -- they never trailed the entire tournament -- to note that the equal-pay complaint is almost entirely bunk.

It is true that the American women, who sweat and practice as much as their male compatriots (perhaps more, given their superior results), don't make as much. But the women's game isn't as popular or profitable, which fundamentally drives pay.

The total prize money for the women's 2019 World Cup was \$30 million, with the champion taking away about \$4 million. The total prize money for the men's 2018 World Cup was \$400 million, with the champions winning \$38 million.

This seems blatantly unfair, until you take into account the completely different viewership and revenue from the two events. FIFA raked in more than \$6 billion Rich Lowry



from the 2018 men's World Cup. The women's 2019 World Cup has been projected, when all is said and done, to make about \$130 million.

The women's tournament this year may have garnered about a billion viewers across all platforms, nothing to sneeze at, but the 2018 men's World Cup had more than a billion viewers just for the final game.

The lawsuit's explanation for a smaller audience for the women's team is what it calls "manufactured revenue depression," a deliberate effort by the federation to squelch the women's reach and undercut their ticket prices. Perhaps the federation should have done more, and can do more, to promote the women's game, but the smaller women's audience can't be the work of one organization.

Another element of pay for women's and men's players is their play for professional leagues, where the scale of the audiences is, again, vastly different.

The National Women's Soccer League has two strong teams that average more than 10,000 fans per game, but the other seven teams in the league average fewer than 5,000. Sky Blue FC, based in Piscataway, New Jersey, averages 1,432.

By way of comparison, the worst of the men's Major League Soccer teams, the Chicago Fire, averages

11,417. The best-attended team, Atlanta United, has drawn roughly 70,000 people for four home games this season, about the total attendance for all NWSL games

The women and men have two different collective bargaining agreements, and different World Cup hoops to jump through, so making direct apple-to-apple comparisons is complicated. It's hard to argue, though, with the simple approach the women say that they have proposed in the past -- revenue sharing based on how much money they bring in.

There's risk to this arrangement if the women underperform, but this group is nothing if not self-confident, and so far has always deliv-

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

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

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Kelsey presents Empresario to BCHC

History enthusiasts are invited to attend the regular meeting of the Bell County Historical Commission, 7 p.m., July 22, in the first-floor courtroom at the County Courthouse in downtown Belton.

Nancy Graff Kelsey will present a program on her book, "Empresario's Son: E.S.C. Robertson of Sala-

Kelsey will discuss chapter one of her book which deals with the troubles that the Empresario Sterling Clack Robertson had with Stephen F. Austin.

Sterling C. Robertson was a colorful character in the early history of Texas. He was the empresario of Robertson's Colony, which eventually included 30 present-day counties. The original counties that were part of the Leftwich Grant are Bastrop, Bell, Brazos, Burleson, Burnet, Comanche, Coryell, Falls, Hamilton, Lampasas, Lee, Limestone, McLennan, Milam, Mills, Robertson, and Williamson. In 1834, Robertson was named by the Mexican legislature as Empresario of the property of the Leftwich Grant together with the 13 present-day counties that were part of what was called the Nashville colony: Bosque, Brown, Callahan, Eastland, Erath, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell and Stephens. This encompassed a 100 mile swath of land beginning at the San Antonio-Nacogdoches Road and extending northwest up the Brazos River for 200 miles, centering on Waco, according to the Texas State His-

torical Association. All colonial land offices

were closed in 1835 when the Texas revolution broke

Empresario S. C. Robertson is buried in the Texas State Cemetery in Austin. He is the father of Col. E.S.C. Robertson, who is founder of Salado because he gave the land for Salado College as well as the 100 acres that was divided into the first lots of Salado.

The BCHC, currently made up of 15 members, works to preserve and promote the county's historical heritage in accordance with Texas state laws and under the direction of the Bell County Commissioners Court. Projects set for 2019 include assisting in obtaining historical designation for various county cemeteries, locating little-known cemeteries, compiling detailed directions to those hard-to-locate cemeteries, and being available to assist residents and visitors with directions to county facilities, cemeteries and other places of interest. The BCHC also pairs with other organizations on historical projects.

Persons interested in more information or becoming a member may contact the BCHC office on the first floor of the courthouse in Belton. The office is staffed by volunteers most days Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to noon. The telephone number for the office is (254) 933-5917


In July, we are still able to see in the north NGC 457 (The Owl Cluster) and

Farther to the south in Sagittarius and the surrounding area are the nebulas and open clusters M16 (The Eagle Nebula), M17 (The Swan or Omega Nebula), M 24 (The Sagittarius Star Cloud) and M11 (The Wild Duck Cluster).

Still visible in July are several globular clusters. M3 in Canes Venatici, in the constellation Hercules is M92 and the larger, brighter M13 (Great Hercules Cluster). Venus is still a morning star this month, Mercury is almost directly in front of the sun and Mars is lost in NGC 663 in Cassiopeia as the sun's glare. Jupiter will well as the Double Cluster be quite bright in the south/ southeast at nightfall near the red giant star Antares. Saturn rises around or slightly before sunset.

Participants will look at these and various other celestial objects this month. Check www.centexastronomy.org, for directions to the site and for more information. If this event is canceled due to weather. a cancellation notice will be posted by 5 p.m. on the CTAS website. You may register online for this event and receive monthly notices of future events.

Participants may want to bring a small flashlight (preferably with a red filter) to get around the viewing area and a lawn chair to make viewing more comfortable. Mosquito spray is always a handy item.



One play can make all the difference in the success or failure of a contract. Declarer should therefore be careful not to play too hastily, even when a particular play may seem to be automatic.

Take this simple case where declarer gets to three notrump as shown and West leads the six of hearts. Let's say declarer plays the ten of hearts from dummy and East covers the ten with

eight forces the king.

But South has available to him a play that will stop East-West stone cold dead. All he has to do to stymie the defense is to play the queen of hearts from dummy on West's open-

ing lead. What can East then do? If he takes the ace, he can't return a heart without establishing dummy's ten. Whether East continues or discontinues the suit, South has the time he needs to wrap up nine tricks. And if East does not take the ace, he is no better off after declarer next leads the nine of clubs from dummy and loses the finesse to West's king.

The contract thus stands or falls on which card declarer plays from dummy at trick one. After giving due weight to East's one-heart overcall, South must recognize the importance of putting up dummy's queen. Otherwise, the contract goes down the drain.

South wins with the king, and, with the cards divided as they are, he must eventually go down at least two against best defense. East is sure to score four heart tricks as soon as West gains the lead with the king of clubs and returns a heart through dummy's Q-3. The same result accrues if declarer plays low from dummy on the first trick, in which case East's


