## Supt. looks forward to new year

We are entering a new millennium and a new school year! This has been a year of change; here is a review of last year and some information for the coming year.

Student enrollment increased by 4.67 percent. Our Average Daily Attendance (ADA) was 914. Why is ADA important? ADA is one of the main sources of state dollars for our district. These dollars pay for personnel, books, supplies, extracurricular programs, etc. We are projecting a four percent increase in enrollment for 1999-2000. It is critical for all parents to work with us on instilling excellent work values, including good attendance. Our 1999-2000 goal is 98 percent attendance rate.

Legislation was passed for the next biennium which increases teacher pay, restructures the state funding formula which affects our debt service, requires students to pass TAAS in grades third, fifth, and eighth to proceed to the next grade level, and requires parent notification when non-certified teachers or teachers teaching outside of their area of certification are assigned to classes.

We have a bright and cheerful new school! Renovations are near completion

at both the elementary and high school. An open house is being planned for September.

Parent and community involvement has been a priority. These efforts have resulted in a mentor program, beautification of our school grounds, expansion of SPAT, a district improvement plan, a three year strategic plan, summer mobile library co-sponsored with Salado Public Library, nationally renowned speakers sponsored by local churches and The Institute for the Humanities, a safety assessment and plan, The Education Foundation, and much, much more. Mike Gentry, Harker Heights Chief of Police, donated his time and expertise and completed a comprehensive safety assessment of our campuses. This is the foundation for revisions in procedures and policies on our campuses. The Education Foundation is a non-profit organization which provided a financial aide counselor at our high school. There are plans to expand the Foundation for next year.

We have had a balanced budget this year, with no budget amendments, and have been rebuilding our general operating bank balance. A softball field was constructed using donated funds and labor. The Education Foundation was established through corporate

donations. We are in the process of working on grants for job shadowing, technology, and social services.

Earl Bragg, from Professional Datasolutions Incorporated, was hired as our technology director. He installed a new network this summer, linking all classrooms to each other and the central office thus providing an internal e-mail system. He is working on establishing a Web site for our district, applying for additional Technology Infrastructure Funds (TIF), and establishing distance learning. Distance learning would provide additional courses to our students through the Internet. We are working toward computerizing all grade files, attendance, and our curriculum guides.

We prioritized writing during our staff development this year, with TAAS writing scores reflecting a 10 percent increase for 1998-99. Test data is being used to determine individual student strengths and weaknesses. Students and teachers will work with this data to plan individual education goals for 1999-2000.

Board meetings are held the third Monday of each month at 6 p.m. Board subcommittees have been a significant step in decreasing meeting times.

## Belton's annexation plan will put their ETJ inside Salado's school district

The ever present and always fearful specter we call "annexation" has reared its ugly head once again as our neighbor to the north announced plans last week to absorb some 200 acres south of the Belton city limits along IH-35, a full mile closer to Salado.

According to the map, this puts Belton's city limits near the Lampasas River and its extra territorial jurisdiction smack dab into our school district! That's right folks - when you add the one mile ETJ to Belton's planned expansion you begin to invade our village's school district.

The Salado ISD's northern boundary is the Lampasas River so by moving south past that line - you get right into our area of concern.

School superintendent Robin Battershell noted that many city boundaries cross school district lines with no impact on students, so at this point in time there is no immediate problem associated with our schools in this developing saga.

That part is good news but the lurking tax and governmental authority lines that continue to creep towards us are certainly things to consider and yes, worry about - unless we care little about our future.

Belton City Manager Jeff Holberg told this column that there would be two public hearings on the proposed annexation but that in all probability the land grab will go through and the county seat's south boundary on IH 35 will be the Lampasas River.

Holberg decried the notion that his city has secret plans to eventually move within striking distance of Salado. Beltonians have stated these views many times as has Temple and Killeen-Harker Heights - but these metro areas are hemmed in and running out of expansion room therefore long term annexation plans would have to include a move on Salado which sits like an unprotected pigeon among a gaggle of hungry cats.

### NUMBERS GAME INTOLERABLE

A sort of high stakes numbers game is being played in State after State with poor children and their parents coming up losers while politicians and bureaucrats hold the winning hand in a despicable ploy to make welfare reform look good while eligible citizens are denied help!

Here in Texas, Governor Bush has proclaimed long and loud about our State being number one in reducing welfare rolls. This is great stuff for political speeches and together with bragging about taking the state's surplus and giving it back to property owning taxpayers - a statement that borders on fabrication - we have all the makings of an unstoppable presidential campaign.

Welfare offices statewide, and across the nation, have created a virtual paperwork roadblock against families who have kids eligible for foodstamps. Long lines with little help in explaining what programs are available; more forms to fill out; fewer welfare workers to assist in answering questions or checking to see about needs and eligibility plus a general attitude that folks wanting assistance need to go to work. And to heck with hungry kids who are eligible for foodstamps or families who qualify for assistance.

All for what seems to be a desire to make the numbers look good for a Texas Governor who by his very upbringing should be shocked by these facts.

We cannot blame all this on just the GOP's proclivity to look at the bottom line (in hopes of finding money for tax cuts) while disregarding the plight of those in need - we must also take the Democrats to task for letting this go on without raising a single voice in protest.

A pox on both their houses in regards to this matter of turning a political back on the helpless and the young. No wonder the Governor is turning to private charities to help feed, clothe and house the unfortunate. ## News of Health and Medicine

### Health care victories shouldn't be overlooked

The 76th session of the Texas Legislature will be primarily remembered for the debate over tax cuts and education spending. Yet the biggest winners of Texas' biennial legislative slugfest were the people of Texas themselves, as a whopping \$1.8 billion was appropriated to improve health care, a direct result of the state's \$17 billion victory over the tobacco industry.

It would have been painful for lawmakers to use some of the tobacco fund to cut taxes and increase spending on education and teacher salaries as other states have done. But to their credit, they did not. A bipartisan coalition led by Sen. Bill Ratliff and Rep. Rob Junell successfully fought to ensure that tobacco settlement funds went to health-related programs and institutions.

Because of their efforts, the 76th Legislature will long be remembered as the most successful session for the sick and uninsured in Texas history. Every Texan owes a debt of gratitude to Governor Bush and all those who worked so diligently to make this pos-

sible. Texas needs to thank everyone from the legislators who had the courage and discipline to dedicate those funds to health-care to the legal team who successfully sued the tobacco industry and earned Texas a \$17 billion windfall.

With the initial \$1.8 billion of the settlement, lawmakers were able to:

- \* Fund the expansion of the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), making 400,000 previously uninsured Texas children eligible for health insurance

- \* Establish two \$200 million endowments; one to help establish a first-rate cancer center in San Antonio, the other to help MD Anderson in Houston stay as the world leader in cancer treatment and research

- \* Endow \$100 million to provide grants to aggressively research, treat, and combat children's health issues

- \* Endow \$200 million to create an anti-smoking campaign targeting kids.

As great as these accomplishments were, they are only the beginning. This was only the first installment of the \$17 billion from the tobacco settlement. In future legislative sessions, more of the tobacco settlement money must be appropriated for comprehensive, well-funded tobacco control programs to keep kids from starting to smoke and ensure a decrease in the rates of current smokers. But before any additional settlement monies are appropriated, we must put an end to the bickering over legal fees that have cast a

cloud over what otherwise would be considered Texas' greatest victory.

The fight over legal fees turned alarmingly partisan and personal. Somehow, several "rights" have actually made one big "wrong." Former Attorney General Dan Morales was right to decide to sue the tobacco industry for its actions. When he made that decision, no tobacco lawsuit had ever been won. Morales was also right to hire a world-class team of independent plaintiff's attorneys, who produced unprecedented and extraordinary results. Former General Morales told us that he had contacted 30 defense firms in Texas about the possibility of representing the State in the suit, but that all declined. Many of the defense firms were already representing the Tobacco industry.

Likewise, Attorney General John Cornyn was right to challenge lawyers' claims against the state. His work helped save the state from a questionable \$259 million claim. But the personal feud between Cornyn and Morales and these lawyers blurs our vision. This feud has taken the focus of this great day off of health-care. That is wrong. We should put our energy towards fighting disease not partisan political wars. The billions of dollars from this settlement has revitalized our commitment to decrease smoking rates and improve the health of all Texans, and that is something in which everyone can

## Awareness helps manage asthma at school

Any given classroom will have at least one student with asthma, so it is important that parents and school officials have a clear understanding of the condition.

"In most cases, the student with asthma can participate in every activity," said Dr. Barbara West, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

Asthma, a chronic condition that limits the flow of air into and out of the lungs, is present in up to 10 per-

cent of all children. It can appear at any age, and the frequency and severity of symptoms can change over time.

The condition usually can be managed effectively with medications and an awareness of what can trigger symptoms. Common symptoms include coughing, wheezing, shortness of breath and chest tightness.

West listed factors to consider in a school setting:

- \* Students with asthma should have a written action plan on file at school. This plan includes a list of prevention medications and a rescue plan if certain symptoms appear or get worse.

- \* The student should have access to medications

that relieve symptoms. Depending on the age and maturity of the child, these medications can be kept in the office or with the student.

- \* The school staff should understand asthma, its triggers, symptoms and treatment.

It is also important for classmates to learn the symptoms and to be instructed to stay calm and to alert an adult who can help the student get medication if a symptom appears.

"It boils down to whether the teacher has a good understanding of asthma," West said.

For example, the child may need to take asthma medication just prior to any

physical activity, so a quick trip to the school office before PE might be necessary.

Also important are environmental concerns that can cause an asthma patient to show symptoms. Included are the presence of warm-blooded animals, high mold counts and dust mites in carpeted classrooms. West said these are issues important to all students, not just asthma patients.

With a proper understanding of asthma and how to prevent and treat symptoms, school officials easily can accommodate students with the condition.

"We don't want to be overprotective, but we don't want to ignore symptoms either," West said.

## Food safety tips put lunch box bugs on ice

Parents who do their food-safety homework can protect their children's brown-bag lunches from hungry bacteria.

"Bacteria love school-room temperatures, which allow them to multiply quickly when there's also a source of food and moisture," said Dr. Debby Demory-Luce, a registered dietitian with the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

To keep harmful bacteria at bay, she offers the following suggestions.

Before school begins:

- \* Add well-insulated lunch boxes or bags, insulated bottles for hot and cold foods and several days' supply of freezer gel packs to your back-to-school shopping list.

- \* Stock up on shelf-stable foods, such as canned

fruit or puddings with pop-top lids, peanut butter, crackers, fresh fruit, bottled water, single-serve packets of mayonnaise, and boxes of 100 percent fruit juice. Disposable silverware and individual hand wipes are also a good idea.

At home:

- \* Wash hands, food preparation surfaces and utensils with hot soapy water before making lunch-box fare. Wash raw fruits and vegetables thoroughly.

- \* Avoid using mayonnaise or mayonnaise-type dressings as a spread or salad base for take-along lunches that can't be refrigerated. Handle other perishable foods like sandwich meats with care.

- \* Prepare lunch-box offerings the evening before and store in the refrigerator or freezer. Frozen sandwiches, bottled water and juice boxes offer additional

protection and will usually thaw completely by lunchtime.

- \* Tightly wrap cold foods in waterproof plastic and pack around a frozen ice pack or juice box.

- \* Pre-heat or pre-chill insulated bottles to maximize the protection they provide. Fill with piping hot water or ice water and let stand a few minutes.

At school:

- \* Store lunch boxes and bags out of direct sunlight and away from schoolroom radiators.

- \* Discard leftovers. Gel packs and insulated containers won't keep foods safe all day.

After school:

- \* Wash lunch boxes, gel packs and insulated bags with hot, soapy water and air dry. Using a little baking soda helps control food odors. Return gel packs to the freezer.

## Drive for the Cure Aug. 24

Scott and White will host a very special event on Aug. 24, the BMW Ultimate Drive. 





Everything else booms while...

# Rural America is on verge of ruin

All of America, it sometimes seems, is one big boom town, set to enter the new millennium with an economic force that will not be denied. The stock market has zoomed to new records. New businesses and new jobs are created every day.

Leave the cities, however, and drive across rural America and the picture changes. Many farmers and ranchers are swept up in an economic crisis that is so deep and so severe, that rural America is verging on economic collapse. In many ways, our state saw the crisis sooner, and was more profoundly affected than elsewhere.

In 1996 and 1998, it was drought that dealt Texas agriculture a crippling blow. It takes more than one year to recover from disasters of that magnitude, but in 1999, timely rains will at least provide a crop. Trying to sell that crop, however, will be an exercise in frustration. Commodity crop prices have flirted with record lows, levels that will not recover the cost of production in many cases.

Yet bankers have to be paid. Equipment must be replaced or repaired. Seed and fertilizers must be purchased. The children of farm families need shoes and school clothes, and a chance at higher education. The economic state of many farm families is too focused on surviving today to plan for the future.

Farmers and ranchers accept that difficult times are part of the profession. Today, however, agriculture is dealing with a series of events stacking up like boxcars slamming into one another in a giant economic train wreck.

Last year, federal help averted the coming catastrophe.

It was the difference, for many farmers, between giving up during a dismal 1998 and putting seeds in the ground one more time. This year, once again, we face another national decision. Should we invest in agriculture again? If we do not, then the face of agriculture in America will be forever altered, and I believe, for the worse.

The American Farm Bureau Federation has advanced an agricultural recovery program that is both affordable and responsible. I helped draft it. I think it is fight for agriculture and fight for America. The plan would invest \$9 billion in preserving America's ability to produce its own food and fiber. Less than half would be earmarked for much needed direct assistance to farmers and ranchers. The rest would go toward immediate export initiatives to help boost commodity prices and toward reform and expansion of the federally supported risk

management safety net.

On July 20, the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors adopted a resolution stating the serious nature of this farm crisis, and endorsed the AFBF plan for relief.

Some will wonder out loud, "Why don't farmers and ranchers pull themselves up by their bootstraps? After all, the Freedom to Farm Act, while phasing out price supports, will provide market flexibility. Isn't that enough?"

The short answer is, "No, it is not enough." In fact, the Freedom to Farm Act, for agriculture, remains mostly a broken contract. Often forgotten in the debate is that 1996 legislation promised increased attention to expand world markets for agricultural products and a reduction in the enormous regulatory burden on agriculture (the AFBF relief plan also addresses these issues). Neither has happened, and there are no bootstraps to

grasp.

For many Americans, living in a time of unprecedented prosperity, these events seem far away and quite unimportant. Just beneath the surface however, looms a question that it is time to answer. "Who will grow our food in the not too distant future?" Will our fruits and vegetables come from family farmers in California, Florida and the Texas Rio Grande Valley? Or perhaps we are comfortable with the notion that they will come from Mexico.

Will our beef come from the plains of Texas, or from Australia? Will our rice be grown in the fields of Texas, California, and Arkansas, or the Far East? On our own soil, we know the 44 who" and the "how." Across our own borders, we can never know.

Will America become a nation dependent on imports for our food? Can we

# Guidelines given for free and reduced school lunch program

The Salado I.S.D. school serves meals each day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.70 and breakfast for \$1. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or TANF for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch, \$.30 for breakfast. To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. We cannot approve an application that is not complete.

**How to apply:** If you now get food stamps or TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult house-



# Mr. BoJangles by Jerry Jeff Walker

Everybody from Sammy Davis Jr. to the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band has recorded the song, Mr. Bojangles. It was written by Jerry Jeff Walker, whose real name is Ronald Clyde Crosby.

He wrote the song while living in New York, his birthplace. "I was with a psychedelic rock band then," says Jerry Jeff. "It was the only type of gig you could get in the sixties."

As a fluke, he joined a group of folk singers who were living in Greenwich Village. "There were bluegrassers among them, some banjo pickers. One of them wrote music for the movie Deliverance.

"Anyway, I was hanging in that folk scene and a bunch of us got pretty drunk one night in the village and we decided to go up to this all night radio station. It

was a listener-sponsored radio station and the guy had a program called Radio Un-namable and he kinda just did whatever anybody did that showed up. We all showed up and started picking.

"One of the guys said 'play that song you wrote about that dancer.' So I played Mr. Bojangles. After a couple more songs I went over in the corner and went to sleep. When I woke up there was a whole bunch of pickers who heard the song on the radio and came up to the radio station. The whole room was full of people all picking and singing. I got up and joined them. Someone said 'play that song about that dancer again.'"

"So we all played Mr. Bojangles. When we finished, the DJ told me he thought that was a really nice song."

"We went out for breakfast and then I went back to my psychedelic band. The guy that had the radio program kept playing both versions of Mr. Bojangles every night on his radio show for about two months. And everybody in New York was calling around trying to find out who wrote the song and they wanted to record it. And I was way in the background saying 'I did it and I'd like to record it.'"

"My band was kinda goin' nowhere then. Consequently I signed with Atlantic Records and cut Mr. Bojangles as my first single."


Jerry Jeff knows that one song propelled him into the national music spotlight. "I'll always thank Bob Phas, the DJ on that show. I called him the other day when I was in New York and he invited me to come on his show if I had some

new songs. I told him I did."

Jerry Jeff has a book coming out this year titled "Gypsy Songman." He says it's about his whole musical journey. "When somebody asks me how to get in show business I tell them I have no idea. Just stay up all night and get a bunch of musicians to play your song live on the radio."

He traveled around the country for four or five years, then settled in Austin in 1970. He first visited there in 1964. He liked it because it was cheap. "Rent was \$129 a month. Electric bill was \$9."

Jerry Jeff has done 28 albums to date and plays somewhere in the world a few nights each week. When he's not working he's loafing at one of his homes in Austin or Belize.





# Lawn and Gardening Tips

## Seasonal Garden Tips

When considering the garden tips below, remember that climate and soil conditions vary considerably from region to region in this country. Learn to read the weather and let your garden tell you when a particular season has arrived.

### FALL

• Fall is the time to clean up and weed all flower beds. Rake and turn over soil between plants and cut down herbaceous perennials. Transplant any shrubs that require it. Prune vines and trees immediately after the leaves have fallen.

• Tulips should be planted in October in all but the most southern regions, where they can often be planted in November.

• September frost in northern regions means certain death to flowering

annuals. By covering them with black plastic on cold nights, you may enjoy added weeks of colorful blossoms in your garden.

• Bag any vegetable garden debris since it may harbor pests and diseases. The same is true for fallen rose petals and foliage.

• If you use the same area every year for a vegetable garden, a good way to replenish nutrients in the soil is by sowing winter rye once the harvest is over. The rye will grow to about five inches by the first frost. Leave it for winter, then turn it under in early spring.

• Keep mowing the lawn as long as the grass continues to grow. Heavy leaf accumulation can smother turf if the leaves are not raked and removed periodically.

### WINTER

• Winter is the time to order seed catalogs, seeds and garden supplies. When making a seed list, remember the varieties that have done well for you in the past. Order novelty varieties early, because the supply is often limited.

• Pruning of dead wood from ornamental and fruit trees can be sewn even in chilly weather.

• A blanket of snow is the best insulator for plants during the winter months. If your region does not have much snow, you should protect flower beds and small shrubs with at least a six inch cover of mulch. You might try pine boughs or straw for this purpose.

• Never try to remove ice from coated branches; you can do more harm than good. Snow can be

carefully removed from low shrubs, or gently swept off with a broom.

• If plants have been pushed up by frost, do not try to press them back into the ground. Instead, cover the plants with mulch and let them settle back into the ground on their own, or replant them when the soil thaws.

• Spread phosphorous-rich wood ashes from the fireplace around trunks of conifers and fruit trees. The ashes improve the soil, and are also a deterrent to slugs.

• To test vegetable seeds you have saved, fold a piece of moistened paper towel around a sample of about 10 seeds, then place the paper towel in plastic wrap. Keep moist for about a week. If the seeds are good, approximately 75 percent of them will sprout.







## Salado Country Cooking

These recipes came from the Salado Country Cooking Cookbook, sponsored by the Monday Club.

### Green Pepper Steak

**Weeta Evans**

- 1 lb. beef chunk or round steak
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1-1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1 cup green onion, chopped fine
- 1 cup green pepper, diced
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1 cup water
- 2 tomatoes, chopped

With a very sharp knife, cut beef across grain into thin strips. Combine soy sauce, garlic and ginger; add beef. Toss and set aside. Heat oil in large frying pan; add beef and toss over high heat until browned. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Turn heat to medium-high, and add vegetables; toss until vegetables are tender (approximately 10 to 15 minutes). Mix cornstarch with water; add to mixture and cook until thickened. Add tomatoes. Serve over rice or noodles.

### Lazy Jackie's Apple Crisp

**Jackie Mills**

- 2 cans pie apples, or 9 good cooking apples
- 1 cup flour
- 1-1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 stick (1/4 lb.) butter
- Whipped Cream

Place apples in a 8x12 inch baking pan. Mix flour, sugar, salt and cinnamon in medium mixing bowl; cut in butter with pastry blender or fork, until mixture is the consistency of coarse meal. Sprinkle mixture over apples. Bake 45 to 50 minutes at 375 degrees, or until golden brown. Serve topped with whipped cream or ice cream.

Note: Can use sliced peaches instead of apples.

## Antiques & Antiques

**Q.** My great grandmother had a German beer stein of porcelain with a pewter lid. If you empty the stein and hold it to the light, you can see a scene in the bottom. It is a picture of a dog and three people. How was it made?

**A.** The picture in the bottom of the stein is a lithophane. That is a porcelain picture made by casting the clay in layers of various thicknesses. When held to light, the picture is visible because of the shadows. The makers first made a picture using translucent beeswax. It was placed on a lighted glass shelf, and the wax was carved to show the picture. The wax was then used to make a plaster mold. Clay was cast in the mold for the stein. Lithophanes have always fascinated people. They were most popular between 1825 and 1875.

**Q:** I have a Snoopy jack-in-the-box made by Mattel. It dates from the early 1960's. The box is metal, and the music and spring mechanism still works. Is it worth any-

thing?

**A:** Jack-in-the-boxes were first made in England as practical jokes about 300 years ago. They became popular novelties in the 1890's, and were exported to the United States from Italy and Germany. By the 1930's, the American toy companies Marx and Gabriel were making boxes based on characters from children's stories. Early boxes were made of composition, paper-mache, wood or hard cardboard.

The Mattel Toy Company created its first jack-in-the-box in 1951, a "Jolly-Tune the Clown" cardboard box that played "Pop goes the Weasel." It sold for \$1.98. Today it is valued at \$75 to \$150. By the mid 1950's, Mattel was using lithographed tin for its boxes and was licensing characters from popular cartoon and TV shows. Your Snoopy box is one of the more common boxes, but it still is worth \$20 to \$50. Mattel switched to plastic boxes in 1976 and stopped making jack-in-the-boxes in 1992.





## Reader wants Dept. of Transportation's attention

Dear Editor:  
I am sending you a copy of the letter I wrote to David M. Laney, Chairman Texas Department of Transportation in Austin in hopes of addressing what I think is a dangerous problem in the area. I am sending to you to inform the people of Salado of this situation. Dear Chairman Laney,

The purpose of this communication is two-fold: First it is a request soliciting your support in expediting the department's action relative to a dangerous situation that has to date received no response on a local level, and second, it is to register a citizen complaint about the lackadaisical attitude evidenced by TDOT's local supervisors and personnel when such matters are brought to their attention.

You may correctly surmise that I reside on the western end of FM 2843, which I have been told falls under the jurisdiction of your Killeen office. This is now or is rapidly becoming one of the most dangerous farm-to-market roads in Bell County. There are several factors contributing to the situation which include an undulating terrain; mul-

multiple curves; increasing high-speed traffic - of which a significant portion is large trucks; a large deer population; and visual obstructions within the right-of-way.

The easiest of these elements to remedy is the last one, and it is the impetus of my request for your support. The right-of-way on this road has not been mowed in almost a year. This is evidenced by shoulder-high stands of annual and perennial grasses and weeds. The roadside presence of large cedars and other woody plants attest to the continuous neglect of this area by TDOT. In some places these plants and low-hanging, untrimmed tree limbs encroach upon the paved areas of the road, dangerously reducing visibility on both curves and straightaways. Tall brush and cedars on the right-of-way have been allowed to spread and grow into fences and to overhang approaches to bridges and culverts. At times, especially at night, one often has the feeling of driving through a narrow, high-walled alley.

Deer bed down in these shady areas, and as the

summer progresses, they prefer to browse unobserved in the tall grass and brush immediately adjacent to the pavement. When startled they often jump onto the road surface, and even that rare individual who drives well below the now excessive 70 mph speed limit does not have time to dodge the animals. (I once counted the remains of 13 deer within a 2 mile stretch of this road, and these were observed lying in the infrequent open patches that allowed such observation.)

My recent request that the roadbed be mowed was answered by "Well, we just haven't got around to doing it yet," and the pointing out to supervisors of specific trees that needed trimming was answered only by slack-jawed, blank stares. (I assume this latter request was made to supervisors - at the time there were four of them in three vehicles standing around visiting and "overseeing" the activity of two laborers.)

In a very few days, this road will be traversed daily and at night by area school busses transporting children to and from classes and extracurricular activi-

ties. One wonders if it must take a serious accident to get the right-of-way maintained. Bell County crews have recognized the need for and found the time to maintain connecting county roads, and since the state government has determined that all its departments are adequately funded, I am forwarding this letter to the area representative suggesting that some TDOT funds might be diverted to Bell County or a private contractor to carry out TDOT's neglected duties. I am also forwarding it to the local newspaper so that Salado parents will be aware of the potential peril to their children.

I apologize for imposing on your apparently busy schedule to bring my concern to your attention; however, since "going up the chain of command" has proved to be unsuccessful, I felt it is now imperative that I start at what has been represented to me as the top and work my way down.







## Home Improvement

### Tips for building a deck

Many do-it-yourselfers make the same construction mistakes when building their outdoor deck. To avoid common errors, here are some tips from the experts:

- Select the right material. Pressure-treated pine lumber offers the strength and durability for building any outdoor project. It's protected for decades against decay and termite attack.

- Fit the design to the house. Consider your home's style and floor plan.

- Consider sun and wind. Watch the pattern of the sun as it moves across your property, as well as prevalent breezes, before deciding on the deck's exact location.

- Check before digging. Locate the position of buried cable TV, telephone and other utility lines before digging post holes.

- Check for the stamp of an accredited agency. Each piece of pine lumber will carry an end tag or stamp to indicate the retention level, and its intended application, either for ground contact or above ground uses.

- Follow safe construction practices. Wear eye goggles and a dust mask when sawing.

- Use the right fasteners. Hot dipped galvanized or stainless steel nails and hardware should be used with treated lumber. Regular carbon steel nails will corrode, and possibly fail to hold securely.

- Arrange decking carefully. For best results, use long lengths to avoid splices in the middle of your deck. Make sure all joints occur over a supporting joint.

- Add a finishing touch. Allow the lumber to season or dry before staining or painting. If it is exposed to direct sun, wait two weeks. Apply a protective water repellent sealer to reduce surface checking and provide an attractive appearance.




