

## Village meets with business owners

More than \$15 million in infrastructure has been injected in Salado in the past two years, Village administrator Don Ferguson told a small audience of business owners Sept. 10. While the sewer and the Main Street project to add sidewalks, drainage and lighting will help businesses in the long run, many have expressed concern about overcoming the damage done by prolonged construction.

"If we're here when they're done," one owner sounded off from the audience at the meeting that Ferguson announced in a letter that was delivered to business owners less than a week before the meeting.

Even though the Sept. 10 meeting was announced via hand-delivered letters, it was not announced in either the weekly Chamber of Commerce newsletter of Sept. 4 nor was it announced in the Sept. 5 *Salado Village Voice*, which is the newspaper of record for the Village of Salado.

Regardless, Ferguson addressed the time line for the construction on Main Street and its impact on retail business in the interim.

He told the group that the construction of sidewalks, lighting, parking improvements and drainage south of Rock Creek is expected to be complete in mid- to late-December.

He added that the contractor will not work on the weekends of Christmas Stroll.

Debbie Stevenson asked the Village to work with the contractor to have less of a negative impact on Salado during the Christmas season. "The weeks from Thanksgiving through December 24 are crucial to us," she said.

While equipment will

be taken off-site during the Stroll weekends, barriers will remain in place.

Beginning Jan. 4, Main Street will be closed at Rock Creek to replace the culvert there with a bridge that is built to code.

"The contractor will have 40 days to get in and remove the drainage culvert and replace with a brand new structure," Ferguson said. "This is an incentivized project. The contractor will be paid by the state for getting done earlier."

Once the project is complete, the contractor will do an overlay of Main Street. The contractor is expected to finish by Summer 2020.

Ferguson also addressed the formation of the economic development committee that is looking to create incentive packages for smaller businesses, not just large businesses.

He discussed the formation of a business resource center to help business owners analyze their situations and business plans and make recommendations for growing their business.

Ferguson also advised businesses to be more careful and positive when talking with TV media. "You may be angry because of something that is happening to you," Ferguson said, "but when you get on TV and spray venom, you may get it off your chest but it will hurt all of us and hurt the image of Salado. You have to understand the message you're portraying."

Ferguson and the audience also discussed the potential formation of a Merchants Association to work in parallel to and with the Chamber of Commerce.

Further dates were discussed with consensus being a monthly meeting until the end of construction.

Hopefully, those will be better announced than the initial one.

## Open forum Sept. 17 on golf cart regs

Alderman John Cole will host an open forum to discuss additional golf cart regulations at 6 p.m. Sept. 17 at the Municipal Building.

Cole called for the meeting after aldermen defeated his recommendation 3-2 on Sept. 5 for additional regulations under the golf cart ordinance.

"I am not here to try to shut down use of golf carts," Cole said. "I am here to try to make it safer."

"We can operate golf carts on the streets right now and there are not many guidelines or safety factors to their operation," he said.

Cole proposed that aldermen direct staff to draft changes to the current golf cart ordinance to implement the following regulations:

- Licensed drivers only can operate a golf cart on public streets.
- Children over age 14 without a license may get a village-issued permit by attending a safety class taught by the Salado police.
- Golf carts must have liability insurance to operate on public streets.
- In golf carts that have seat belts, seat belts must be used. Cole said that he was not suggesting that golf carts had to be retrofitted with seat belts.
- Children and infants

should not be in the lap of the driver.

• For night time driving, a golf cart must have headlights, tail lights and turn signal lights.

The current ordinance allows for daytime operation of golf carts on public streets within the Village of Salado on roads that have a posted speed limit of 35 mph or less.

During discussion on the matter, alderman Michael Coggin expressed his opposition by saying, "If I am driving with my four year old grandson down our bumpy roads, I usually have him in my lap because a toddler is like wrestling an octopus." He added that car

seats are not designed for golf carts and would not be a safe alternative.

"Why fix something if it's not broken," he added.

On the motion by Cole to instruct village staff to draft changes, Rodney Bell, Frank Coachman and Coggin voted against, Cole and Amber Preston Dankert voted in favor.

Coachmen then gave a motion to have staff draft changes to the golf cart ordinance to allow for the night time driving of golf carts in the Village, receiving a second from Bell. It passed 3-2 with Bell, Coachman and Coggin voting in favor and Cole and Preston Dankert voting against.

## Village wants to extend sewer lines while less than half are tying onto it

Aldermen are considering extensions of the Salado sewer system, even though less than half of the initial customer service base has taken any steps towards the forced connection to the sewer with the deadline of Oct. 1 looming. The deadline for connection was initially July 1, but was extended for 90 days by the board of aldermen earlier this summer.

Village administrator Don Ferguson reported to aldermen at their Sept. 5 meeting that 42% of properties in the initial service area are "in the process" of connecting to the sewer system. In the process is defined as having made contact with the Village.

Ferguson reported that the first extension of the sewer system, to Salado ISD, has already connected to the system. Salado High School, he added, is in the process of connecting and the new Middle School will be connected when it opens in 2020.

He told the board that Sonic has notified the Village that it is interested in coming on line to the sewer system. Cost estimated for a low pressure extension off of Williams Road and a grind-

er pump is about \$57,000, according to Ferguson. Extending the line farther with low pressure lines, duplex systems and grinder pumps to connect Country Boy, Fairway Golf Carts, Cowboys and Robertsons could cost as much as \$282,000.

"The significant costs is the duplex systems," Ferguson said.

The Village has also received cost estimates to connect to a proposed development at the intersection of FM 2484 and Williams Road. The initial cost estimate for this is \$465,000, Ferguson said. "This would have served the convenience store piece at that intersection," Ferguson told aldermen, adding that further discussions have included the possible construction of a hotel, retail piece, restaurants and the convenience store. "That clearly will not be served by a low pressure system, but by a force main," Ferguson said, adding that the force main and lift station cost would be \$1.25 million. The low pressure system for the other properties to tie into the sewer would be \$282,000.

The Village has also discussed tying in the Salado Public Library with a low pressure line and grinder pump at cost of about \$71,000. Ferguson said that

a traditional gravity system would cost \$135,000 to connect the Library.

He also reported that the Village has been in discussion with the hotels north of town, which would need to annex into the Village in order to be served by the sewer. "Development there may include another hotel, convenience stores and restaurants," Ferguson said. "This could not be serviced with a low pressure line." A gravity line from Salado Plaza to FM 2484 on the east side of I-35 would cost \$1.36 million.

"We would need to find alternative routes besides I-35 frontage road to connect these properties," Ferguson said.

The cost for the Royal Street extension to reach the proposed subdivision at the corner of Royal Street and Smith Branch would cost \$191,000.

The Village has also discussed connecting Brookshire Brothers to the sewer. The cost to connect would be \$75,000, according to Ferguson.

The Village has looked at extending the sewer line beyond Solas Gallery on Rock Creek Drive, connecting the retail properties and Barton House. This would cost \$129,000.

Current village policy is

that the cost of extending the sewer collection system will be borne by the property owners and not the Village. However, the property owner's costs to extend the sewer to their property line would be deducted from the Impact Fees imposed by the Village.

Now, however, the Village is considering Economic Development Agreements to potentially reimburse some of those connection costs. Development agreements could include reimbursement of expenses, increment financing, property tax and sales tax agreements.

While the Village is considering how to reduce the costs for extending the sewer to potential customers outside of the initial service area, it is also considering how it will handle properties that are in the initial service area that are required to tie onto the system and pay impact fees and demolish their operating systems when they do not meet the Oct. 1 deadline.

If an existing property does not meet the Oct. 1 deadline, it will lose the four-year payout of impact fees. In addition, liens could be placed on the property. The Village could, after the deadline, connect a property at whatever cost it determines and place a lien on the property at the time.

## Reverse-logic of underwhelming jobs report boosts market

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) gained a respectable 1.79% for the week ending September 6 to close at 2978.71. From this time last year that puts the market up 3.71%. Subtracting the last 12 month's inflation of 1.8% from the SPX return results in a real return of only 1.91%. The good news that appeared to send the market upward with a bang toward the end of the week was a combination of an announcement that the U.S. and China would resume trade negotiations and, in the reverse-logic so common in the stock market, an impressively underwhelming jobs report.

West Texas Intermediate oil (WTI) jumped upward with the stock market, rising 2.8% to close at \$56.52 on hopes that the Federal Reserve will continue to cut interest rates for the rest of 2019. The surge of trade optimism even communicated itself to the bond market resulting in an end of week yield of 1.565%, up a tiny bit, for the U.S. ten-year Treasury note. Unfortunately, with the 90-day T-bill still yielding 1.971%, the historically prophetic Treasury yield curve was still severely inverted. Since we have had yield curves to measure, no inversion of this length and depth has failed to be accurate in predicting a recession 12-18 months later. Again, it is good to remember that in October of last year, the U.S. 10-year Treasury note yielded a healthy 3.263% and that yield has declined more than 50% since then. The bond market traders seem to be unanimous that the cause of the inverted curve and the severe drop in forecast loan demand has been the real and threatened trade war actions.

As always, the monthly jobs report from the Labor Department was the headline grabber this week

but the headlines were potentially misleading. The official news was that the U.S. economy added a reasonable, but not spectacular 130,000 jobs. The news behind the news was that about 27,000 of those new jobs were probably hiring by the Census Bureau as it spins up for next year's, constitutionally required count of the residents of these United States. "Real" employment growth of 100,000 would indicate that we have gone from a net employment growth to barely holding our own.

In another bit of good news, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) reported that the service side of our economy increased its index reading to 56.4 for August, up from 53.7 in July. In an oddity that bears watching, while the ISM non-manufacturing survey results were extremely positive, the service-employment index declined from 56.2 to 53.1 while inventories grew from a reading of 50.0 (neutral) to 55.0. In all the readings, 50 is the delineation between growth and contraction. The underlying readings suggest that even in the services sector, inventory buildup may be driving the positive returns. That impression was compounded by the report that the backlog of orders index reading declined to 49. The distinct possibility exists that even the services side of the economy is surging in anticipation of increasing tariff cost for materials while companies involved are seeing a slowdown in future activity.

The same ISM organization reported on Thursday that America's manufacturing sector is likely in a recession. The ISM Manufac-

turing Index came in at 49.1, officially signaling a contraction. Inside the report, one of the more worrisome details was that manufacturers appear to be reducing employment, a reading of 47.4. As we have seen elsewhere, the respondents blamed the trade war. To put that reading in perspective, just before the threatened trade war with China became a real conflict, the Manufacturing Index stood just below 60, an indication of very healthy growth. The anecdotal comments from the respondents last September indicated nothing but good times for the next year or more.

In a separate report, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that manufacturing productivity decreased 2.2% in the second quarter as output slowed while the cost of labor increased. The shortage of skilled workers revealed itself in an increase of 2.6% in second-quarter labor costs across the economy. Another significant indicator surfaced as the four largest truck manufacturers in the U.S. reported an 80% decline in new truck orders in July from a year earlier.

The bottom line appears to be that the U.S. economy is still growing but the growth rate is decelerating with each passing month and that deceleration started with the imposition of tariffs on Chinese goods. The Federal Reserve announced this week that the existing tariffs will subtract at least 1% per year from our GDP and if the promised future tariffs set to go into effect later this year, the subtraction will be greater. Barring a significant change in policy, the likelihood of a recession in late 2020 or early 2021 remains significant.

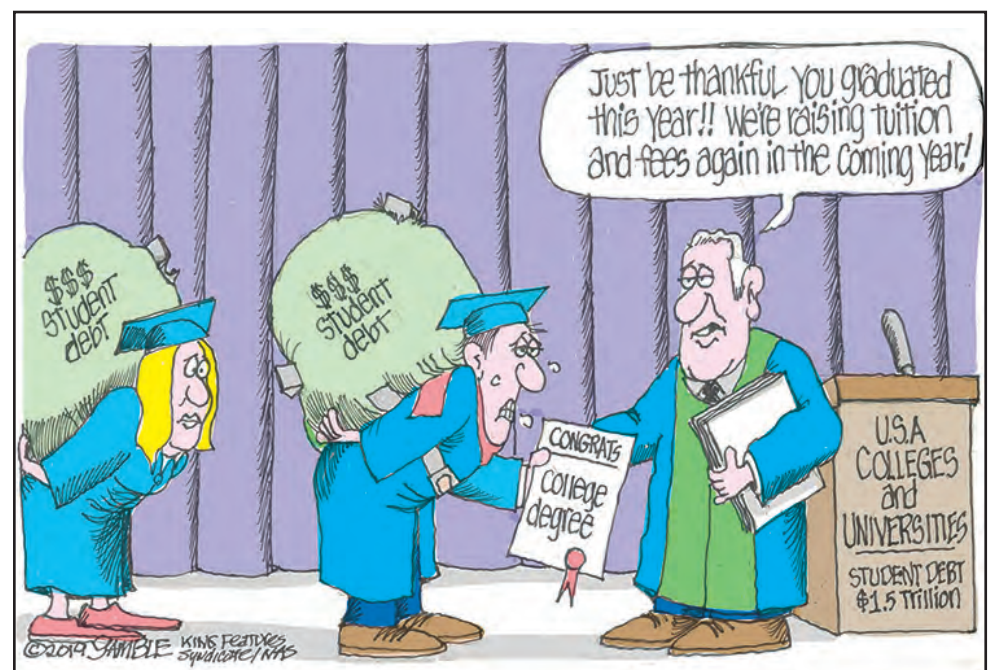
the schools; and maintain a policy of no surprises by sharing information with school officials.

## The threat of Red Britain

Tory Prime Minister Boris Johnson has, to his credit, seized the initiative in the battle over whether Britain will truly exit the EU, and on what terms.

But no one can know how this high-stakes gamble will turn out. Johnson just lost his slender parliamentary majority, and the prospect of a new election looms. If things break the wrong way, the winner could be opposition leader Jeremy Corbyn, a throwback leftist redolent of the bad old days of Britain's self-imposed stagnation.

It's hard to exaggerate the threat represented by Corbyn and Co. taking control of our most important ally. In U.S. terms, Corbyn is a mashup of Bernie Sanders and the Squad, mixing orthodox socialist economics with a hostility to U.S. foreign policy and Israel.

He is a figure that time is supposed to have forgotten. He inveighed from the back benches against Labor's turn away from the old-time religion under moderate prime minister Tony Blair. When he mounted an unlikely leadership bid in 2015, he found an audience, much as Bernie Sanders did in 2016. Now, the old-time religion is a few lucky breaks away from power.

Corbyn's past, and present, is littered with valentines to left-wing thugs.

He cozied up to the IRA in the 1980s when it was trying to decapitate the British government by bombing. He wrote for a pro-Soviet newspaper during the Cold War. He called the Russian invasion of Ukraine "not unprovoked." He's said warm things about Hamas and Hezbollah, and can't bear to condemn Islamic terrorism without also criticizing the West.

It's no accident that his Labor Party has become lousily with anti-Semites.

His left-hand man, John McDonnell, shadow chancellor of the exchequer, is fond of implicit threats of violence. To wit, "Any institution or any individual that attacks our class, we will come for you with direct action." He has called Tory MPs "social criminals." This from the man in line to become, in our terms, secretary of the treasury of one of the great banking centers on the planet.

If McDonnell's style of rhetoric has a grim revolutionary cast, it's for good reason. In an interview with -- no joke -- the Trotskyist Alliance for Workers' Lib-

erty years ago, he said that the most important influences on him were "Marx, Lenin and Trotsky, basically." Corbyn has expressed similar sentiments.

At least they don't leave any doubt where they are coming from. If Corbyn had his way, it would be as if Margaret Thatcher never happened (indeed, McDonnell has mused about going back to the 1980s to assassinate her -- you know, the way many people do about Adolf Hitler).

Corbyn's program would renationalize sectors of the economy, punish shareholders and landlords, and impose stiff new taxes. If his campaign against capital crashed the pound, he'd surely be inclined to respond with capital controls, truly taking Britain back to the 1970s.

Every election in a democratic society is important. But Britain in the coming weeks will be faced with unquestionably momentous choices: Whether to take back its full sovereignty from the EU, and whether to throw in with a dangerous radical. Its modern history, and perhaps that of the West, is in the balance.

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# Library changes from quiet solitude to community resource

It's Saturday morning. Friday's work whistle has blown and the normal working world is taking a breather. But, here, three workers busily prepare to welcome some very special visitors to an open house at their workplace. The walls are freshly painted with bright welcoming colors. There are stuffed Koala bears, toy xylophones, fire trucks, and dolls. There are crayons and drawing paper on tables with chairs too small for anyone who doesn't still have their baby teeth. Oh yes, and play rugs on the floor colored gloriously as if designed by Disney. Soon, moms and dads will bring their small charges to see what this is all about. No, it's not a new pre-school. Believe it or not—it's the Salado Public Library and the three workers are librarians.

Most of us have an image of the library as a bastion of silent solitude where researchers lose themselves in thought from the pages of musty books. But these three ladies, Jeanie Lively, the library director, Julie Hoy, children's librarian, and April Edmiston, her assistant, want their visitors to know that the library is changing. The library is no longer just a book repository for readers. More and more it is becoming a community resource with programming for people. (For example, they have planned an "Area 51" Lock-in for high school teens who don't

plan to attend the Homecoming Dance.)

This open house was to introduce its newest offering, Bright Beginnings, a five week program for babies, ages 1-3. Its purpose is to teach parents how to play with their babies. Utilizing experts as conversational resources from five different specialties, the program is the result of a "Family Place Library" grant received through the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and the Institute of Museum and Library Service. The Salado Library was one of only five libraries in Texas to receive this prestigious grant.

So, why is the program important? Well, first, the Salado Library is a regional library, serving several communities in the area: Salado, Holland, Bartlett, Prairie Dell, and even Belton. And, even though the Salado schools are renowned for the highest standards, studies show that 31% of incoming students are at risk when it comes to reading.

This program seeks to address those needs. Each week, parents can approach

and talk with a different expert for advice in the following areas: Literacy, Speech and Language Pathologies, Child Development, Nutrition, and Music and Movement. By "experts" is meant professors and researchers from Texas A&M, Texas Women's University, UMHB, and others.

The three ladies are dedicated to their profession and their mission. Jeanie oversees the whole library, Julie applied for the grant, and, she says, "April is a "baby magnet."

April, who is pursuing her bachelors degree at A&M Central Texas, is in charge of story time for the babies. "She started with one or two babies," Julie says, "but now, it's up to twenty-four." Jeanie smiles, shakes her head, and says, "No. Last time there were thirty-nine babies at April's story time!"

Though young, April has worked at other, larger libraries before coming to Salado. When asked,

"What do you like about the Salado Library," she replies, "It's quaint. It's small. You can feel the love." Overhearing her, Julie, her eyes thoughtful and reflective, says softly, "That's right. We know the people. We know their names."

When you walk away after hearing their passion for the community, the people, and the children, you think you understand where it's coming from. You think you know why. It's true. You can sense it from them. You can feel the love.

The three ladies will be the speakers at the next Rotary Club luncheon at 11:30 Wednesday, September 18 at the Barton House. Visitors are welcome. Cost is \$15 which includes lunch.


9th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division since August 2018.

**Explanatory Statements for the November 5, 2019 Constitutional Amendment Election**

**Proposition Number 1 (HJR 72)**

HJR 72 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time. Unlike an appointed municipal judge, an elected municipal judge may not concurrently hold another municipal judge office. This amendment would allow an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time, in the same manner as appointed municipal judges.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time."**

**Proposition Number 2 (SJR 79)**

SJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds, in an amount that does not exceed \$200 million, for the economically distressed areas program. These bonds can only be used to provide financing for the development of water supply and sewer service projects in those economically distressed areas as defined by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."**

**Proposition Number 3 (HJR 34)**

HJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to temporarily exempt from ad valorem taxation a portion of certain property located in an area covered by a disaster declaration of the governor. The proposed amendment would allow the legislature to prescribe the method of determining the amount of the tax exemption and the duration of the exemption and also would allow the legislature to create any additional eligibility requirements for the tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by a disaster."**

**Proposition Number 4 (HJR 38)**

HJR 38 proposes a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state from imposing or collecting an individual income tax, including an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income. There is no current constitutional bar on imposing or collecting an individual income tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."**

**Proposition Number 5 (SJR 24)**

SJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would automatically appropriate the net revenue received from the portion of the state's tax revenue received on sales of sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The legislature would maintain the authority to determine the specific uses of the funds and their allocation between TPWD and THC.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."**

**Proposition Number 6 (HJR 12)**

HJR 12 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) from \$3 billion to \$6 billion to be issued by the Texas Public Finance Authority. CPRIT was created in 2007 to promote and fund cancer research in Texas. CPRIT uses bond proceeds to award grants for cancer research and prevention.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."**

**Proposition Number 7 (HJR 151)**

HJR 151 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions from \$300 million per year to \$600 million per year to the available school fund and also allowing the State Board of Education, the General Land Office, and other entities that manage revenue from land or other properties held in the permanent school fund to distribute certain revenue to the available school fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."**

**Proposition Number 8 (HJR 4)**

HJR 4 proposes a constitutional amendment creating the flood infrastructure fund as a special fund in the state treasury, using money appropriated from the economic stabilization fund. The flood infrastructure fund would provide additional resources to implement plans to mitigate flood damage. The proposed amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to use money in the flood infrastructure fund for drainage, flood mitigation, or flood control projects. The proposed amendment also would authorize the creation of separate accounts in the flood infrastructure fund as necessary to administer the fund or authorized projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."**

**Proposition Number 9 (HJR 95)**

HJR 95 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a property tax exemption for precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."**

**Proposition Number 10 (SJR 32)**

SJR 32 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow a state agency or political subdivision to transfer a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker in certain circumstances. Currently, the Texas Constitution prevents the transfer of certain public property, such as law enforcement animals, to a private person or organization at no cost. This amendment authorizes the legislature to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker at no cost, upon the animal's retirement or at another time if the transfer is determined to be in the animal's best interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances."**

## Eagles play lights out against Bees, 52-21

It was lights out for Academy (figuratively and literally) as Salado beat the visiting Bees 52-21 in the Eagles' first home game of the season tonight.

The northern lights on the home side went out near the end of the half thanks to some kid who sent Salado maintenance staff scrambling by tripping a breaker or switch on the pole.

By that time, the Eagles had a commanding 28-7 lead over the Bees.

The Bees scored on their first drive, but would not score again until a couple of meaningless touchdowns late in the fourth.

Academy drove 75 yards, scoring on a 13 yard touchdown from Jerry Cepheus to Jaylin McWilliams at the 7:14 mark in the first. Blake Buddy kicked the PAT for a short-lived 7-0 lead.

The Eagles answered on a nine-play, 69-yard drive. Hunter Turk bounced off of the crowd at the line of scrimmage and made his way into the end zone for a 17 yard run, Wrook Brown kicked the extra point to tie the game.

From that point on it was all Salado. The Eagles punted only once in the game as they chewed up the brand new turf field for 376 yard rushing. Brown led the team with 146 yards on 16 carries and three TDs.

Brown scored his first TD on a 20 yard run with 10:55 left in the first half, capping a 60 yard drive. He then toed the PAT for a 14-7 lead.

The Eagles forced Academy to punt and then drove 55 yards, capped by a quarterback sneak for a one yard touchdown by Hutton Haire. Brown made the lead 21-7.

Salado added another on a 54 yard drive of 11 plays. Brown ran in from the 7 yard line with 1:42 left in the half. He kicked the PAT for a 28-7 halftime lead.

Salado received the sec-

Latrell Jenkins recovered a fumble at the Academy 44 to set up the next scoring drive. Haire hit Brown in stride for a 35 yard touchdown pass on a fourth and 15 to go. Brown booted the extra point to give Salado a 42-7 lead.

Brown then kicked a 32 yard field goal after Caleb Self scooped up a fumble for the Eagles in Academy territory.

The Eagles recovered the ensuing kick to set up Blake Volk, who bulled his way through the Academy defense for an 18 yard touchdown with 9:59 left in the game. Brown's kick made the score 52-7.

Salado then gave up a touchdown with 5:48 left to play on a short pass from Kullin Mraz to Braeden Lilly.

Mraz connected with Peyton Miller for a 12 yard touchdown with 13 seconds left. Alexander Pierce kicked the extra point to make the score 52-21.

# Ft. Worth Symphony Orchestra opens Concert Season Sept. 22

The Central Texas Orchestral Society of the Azalee Marshall Cultural Activities Center's first concert of their 2019-2020 Classical Concert Series will be held Sept. 22 at 4 p.m. with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra. The FWSO will be performing after the introduction of this year's Wildflower Belles and Escorts at the Azalee Marshall Cultural Activities Center.

There will be a reception before the concert that will consist of classical music played by local high school students and light hors d'oeuvres free of charge. The reception will honor the generous patrons and donors as well as the Wildflower Belles and Escorts. High school freshmen women pick an escort and they work together through community service, dance lessons, and etiquette training throughout their first three years of high school. At the end of their junior year, the men and women are presented as official members of society during the annual Wildflower Belle Ball. With the school year just getting started, the community's high school juniors are beginning their final year in the program as prominent figures of the Wildflower Guild and will be formally introduced at 3:00pm, an hour before the Fort Worth Symphony Or-

chestra takes the stage. Adopted in 2011, the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra strives "to perform great symphonic music, to present engaging music education programs, and to achieve ever-greater levels of artistic accomplishment." The Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra had their first public performance in 1912. The orchestra ran for five years until it was disbanded due to World War I. FWSO was re-founded in 1925. The Nancy Lee and Perry R. Bass Performance Hall opened in 1998 and serves as home base for the talented musicians in the orchestra. The Bass Performance Hall is where the orchestra holds most of its concerts in Fort Worth, Texas.

Miguel Harth-Bedoya was appointed Music Director in 2000 and is now celebrating his 20th and

final year with the group. Harth-Bedoya's leadership and expertise helped him win the 2002 Seaver/NEA Conductors Award, helped the orchestra make its debut at Carnegie Hall in 2008, helped create 13 out of 27 total recordings, and helped find multiple commissions throughout the score. In the orchestra concert series announcement, Harth-Bedoya said, "this season will be a momentous one for me, and I want it to showcase all

we can do as an orchestra. From the joy of revisiting beloved favorites, to the shared pride in presenting World Premiere works, we will celebrate how far we have come together over the past two decades."
