## Survey findings presented

Salado ISD Superintendent Robin Battershell presented to Salado ISD Trustees Oct. 18 the summary findings of a survey of Salado students and teachers conducted by the Dana Center at the University of Texas last spring.

The population of students surveyed were 66 sixth graders, 70 eighth graders, 75 ninth graders and 59 12th grade students.

Of the students surveyed, 37 percent reported having five or more drinks at one time in the past 30 days. Of those surveyed, 25 percent of the students had used marijuana, while five percent had used crack or cocaine, four percent had used LSD and 38 percent had drunk enough to feel drunk.

Of those students who had used cigarette and alcohol, the average age of first use of cigarettes and alcohol was 12, while the average age for first use of inhalants, smokeless tobacco, marijuana, downers, ludes, barbs, jimson weed, cheeva and psychedelic mush-

rooms was 13.

The average age for first use of cocaine, crack, drunken behavior, LSD and mescaline was 14, among those students who had used the drugs.

The survey asked students their reasons for using drugs and alcohol: 32 percent said it was okay to try drugs or alcohol to see what it is like, 30 percent indicated it was okay to use drugs or alcohol to have a good time, 24 percent said it was okay to use drugs or alcohol to relax, while nine percent said it was okay to use a foreign substance to lose weight.

Additionally, 32 percent said they would use alcohol in the future as compared with 27 percent who said they would use some type of tobacco product in the future.

Of those surveyed, 43 percent said they would go to their parents first with drug or alcohol problems.

The survey examined several areas of student life. It found that 88 percent of Salado students live in a

two-parent home (which may include a stepparent). Over half, 57 percent, said they had attended a church, temple or spiritual meeting with an adult one to three times weekly.

A small number, 6 percent, of students said they have earned a D or F, while a large number, 88 percent said they had a positive attitude about themselves, and 85 percent said they were satisfied with themselves.

The survey also queried students about their friends; it found that 21 percent knew a friend who sold drugs, 24 percent knew someone who had been in trouble with the police, 65 percent knew someone who had used alcohol and 42 percent knew someone who had used drugs.

The complete survey can be viewed at the Salado ISD Superintendent's office.

The Dana Center at the University of Texas conducted the survey in May 1999 at no charge to the Salado ISD.

## Institute to hear histories of poor women Oct. 24

Lisa Dodson, an authority on the subject of women and poverty, will be the featured speaker in the second program in the fall series sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities at Salado, Oct. 23-24.

On Oct. 23, Dodson will lead a seminar at the Halley House on Main Street, 10 a. m.-3 p. m., on "The Customs of a Country: Choosing to 'Count our Riches in People.'" On Oct. 24, she will speak at 4 p.m. at the Salado Civic Center, Main Street, on "Surviving Abuse and Raising Resistance: Hearing the Histories of Women in Poor America." Her lecture will be followed by discussion.

Dodson's 1998 book, *Don't Call Us Out of Name: The Untold Lives of Women and Girls in Poor America*, was the culmination of a

major eight-year project documenting the lives of hundreds of white, African American, Latino, Haitian, and other women and girls living in poverty. The book challenges traditional concepts of American poverty policies by looking closely at the histories and stories of girls and women in low-income communities.

Dodson is a Fellow of the Radcliffe Public Policy Institute, Cambridge, Massachusetts. She teaches courses on women and poverty at Harvard University. She is the past director of the Massachusetts Division of Women's Health. She holds a Ph.D. degree from Brandeis University.

"The fall series," said Institute President Jim Veninga, "focuses on that intersection where the stories, myths, and politics of

poverty come together."

The series began with Alex Kotlowitz, author of the best selling "There Are No Children Here: The Story of Two Boy's Growing Up in the Other America."

Subsequent speakers will be William Finnegan of *The New Yorker* (Nov. 6-7) and Harper's magazine contributing editor Earl Shorris (Nov. 20-21).

## Friends Feeding Friends

The Tenth Annual Friends Feeding Friends Food Drive concludes Oct. 21. Friends Feeding Friends is an effort by the local Board of Realtors to meet the needs of the poor and homeless not just by words, but by action.

In Salado, the food collected will be delivered to

the local food pantry. A collection box has been placed at Brookshire Brothers, according to Melanie Kirchmeier, Salado coordinator for the project. Melanie asks that locals shopping at Brookshire Brothers buy a can or two extra to donate.

Items needed for the pantry include: Dry beans or peas, canned vegetables, canned fruit, canned meat, jelly, peanut butter, sugar, flour, rice, soup, jello or pudding, canned juice, or any non-perishable items. Personal hygiene items are also needed such as bar soap and toothpaste.

Plans are now complete for the special commemorative event at the Salado Civic Center this Saturday morning, Oct. 23, starting with a band concert at 9:30 a.m., according to an announcement yesterday from Hulda Horton, manager of the center.

The former red brick school building that now houses the Civic Center will celebrate its 75th anniversary since opening its doors in Sept. 1924. To help honor the old school, the Civic Center Foundation's Board is asking as many former students of the Main Street school as possible to attend the special event. All Saladoans are urged to attend the special event and remain for the lunch to be served under the giant oaks

next to the bandstand.

To add to the festivities will be the unveiling of a life size statue of a young boy and his dog on the way to school. The bronze was created by Troy Kelley, local artist, and has been donated by Morris Foster, a graduate of the old high school.

Foster is President of the Exxon Upstream Development Company and he will dedicate the statue, "Late Again", to his parents, Wilbur and Jessie Foster, longtime Salado residents.

### FORMER STUDENTS BEING CONTACTED

Patsy Sanford, a member of the board of directors of the Civic Center Foundation, is in charge of contacting former students and graduates of the old

Main Street School.

"We have tried very hard to collect names and mail invitations to as many former students and graduates as possible. We hope that others will learn of this event by word of mouth and through the Salado Village Voice, and be able to be present on Oct. 23", Chairman Sanford noted.

### BAND CONCERT

To start the program off, a contingent from the famed Fourth Infantry Division Band led by Bandmaster Fred Catchings, will present a short concert. The program will take place on the front lawn of the civic center with shaded seating provided for what is hoped will be a large crowd.

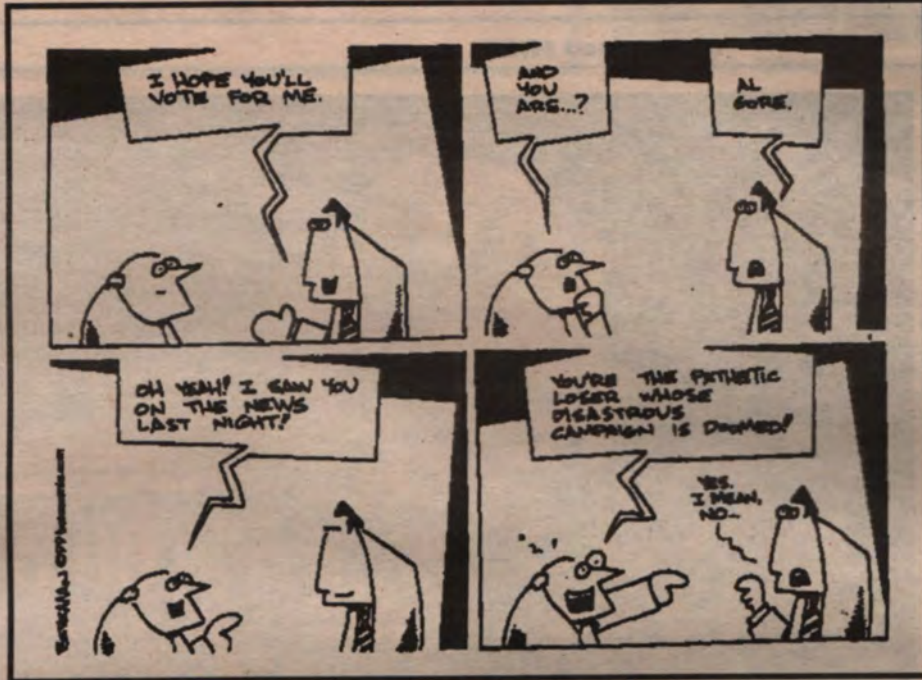

## Amendments 12-14 deal with car leasing, loans, board members

**W**riter's Note: This is the penultimate column on the proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution that will be voted on November 2, 1999. Thus far we have examined the first 11 proposals with numbers 12 through 14 scheduled for today. The final three amendments - will be discussed in next weeks column.

### AMENDMENT 12 TAX EXEMPTION

In Bell County and across most of the State, personally owned motor vehicles **are not subject** to the ad valorem tax. However, leased vehicles for personal use **are subject to this property tax**. In some cases, the leasee pays the tax while in other situations the company doing the leasing pays. Therefore this is not a tax that is fairly applied so the 76th Texas Legislature decided to do something about it - ergo Amendment 12!

Amendment 12, if passed, would exempt from ad valorem taxes, in all taxing jurisdictions, vehicles that are leased and used for non business purposes.

Since auto leasing is becoming more popular it would seem only fair to apply the vehicle property tax treatment on an equal basis by granting the same exemption to the leasee as is done for the owner of a motor vehicle - provided of course that the car is not used for business purposes.

The standard argument against this proposal is that any tax exemption, for any reason, adds to the tax burden of the non-exempt taxpayer. In this case there is an unequal tax burden to start with, thus contradicting the basic philosophy of democratic taxation, namely that all taxes must be fairly and uniformly applied. Taxing leased cars and not personally owned vehicles does not fit this description - therefore an adjustment needs to be made as will be done if this amendment passes muster.

**Recommend that Amendment 12 be approved!**

### AMENDMENT 13 SALE OF BONDS

Amendment 13, if passed, would allow the State of Texas to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$400 million in order to finance additional student college loans.

To date, citizens have approved a total of \$960 million in college loan bonds that are backed by the full faith and credit of the State.

Repayment of these loans has been extraordinarily good with the interest and principal repaid by students being sufficient to repay the loan fund as well as cover the debt service on the bonds plus the cost of operating the program.

Due to the increasing cost of a college education, students are requesting higher dollar loans and according to the Coordinating Board that watches over higher education in Texas, failure to pass this amendment could result in a number of students either having to go without loans or loan amounts in general be reduced.

The basic argument for this proposal is that widespread college attendance that produces a well educated and productive workforce is essential to the economic well being of the State.

Repayment of these loans has been excellent so there is little chance for taxpayers to have to pick up the defaults - however this is always a possibility and therein lies one of the arguments against

such a bond plan.

A second dissent against approving the sale of bonds that are backed by general revenue dollars, is that borrowing money through the sale of bonds is a form of deficit financing which is absolutely forbidden by the State Constitution.

All arguments to the contrary, it would appear that the overall good in long term benefits to the state outweighs the deficit spending argument.

**Recommend passage of Amendment 13!**

### AMENDMENT 14 BOARD MEMBERSHIP

There are literally hundreds of State commissions, boards and agencies that have a varying numbers of members on their governing boards. Starting with as few as three members and going up in multiples of three, thanks to a constitutional requirement that one third of the members of State boards be elected or appointed every two years.

This creates a problem for even numbers of board members such as a six, twelve, eighteen, twenty four person board, thus creating the possibility of a tie vote resulting in no action on important matters pending before the agency in question.

Amendment 14, if passed, would mandate that all state agencies and commissions be governed by a board composed of an odd number of three or more members. The next legislature would then go through all the agencies and boards and commissions and determine the odd number size for each group's membership.

This is not the most important matter to come before voters on November 2. Large board membership generally does not have everyone present so tie votes are few and far between. Even in odd numbered boards - should one member abstain from voting, there then is the possibility of a tie vote.

Those who argue for passage note the problem with tie votes and those who oppose passage mention the difficulty of identifying all the boards that need to be changed in number thus taking away valuable time from lawmakers.

In actual fact, the whole idea of taking up this perceived problem indicates the legislature has more time on their hands than suspected and fiddling with board numbers probably gives lawmakers a little too much influence in agency business than is profitable.

**Recommend Amendment 14 be disapproved!**

### NEXT WEEK

Next week we will conclude this series of five articles on the pending amendments to the State Constitution. We recommend that everyone take a moment on November 2, to vote - up or down - on each of these 17 proposals.

We repeat what we stated at the outset of this series - a watchful eye is necessary when it comes to the highest law of our State. Voting is that "eye of eternal vigilance" that we must train on all that goes on in State government.

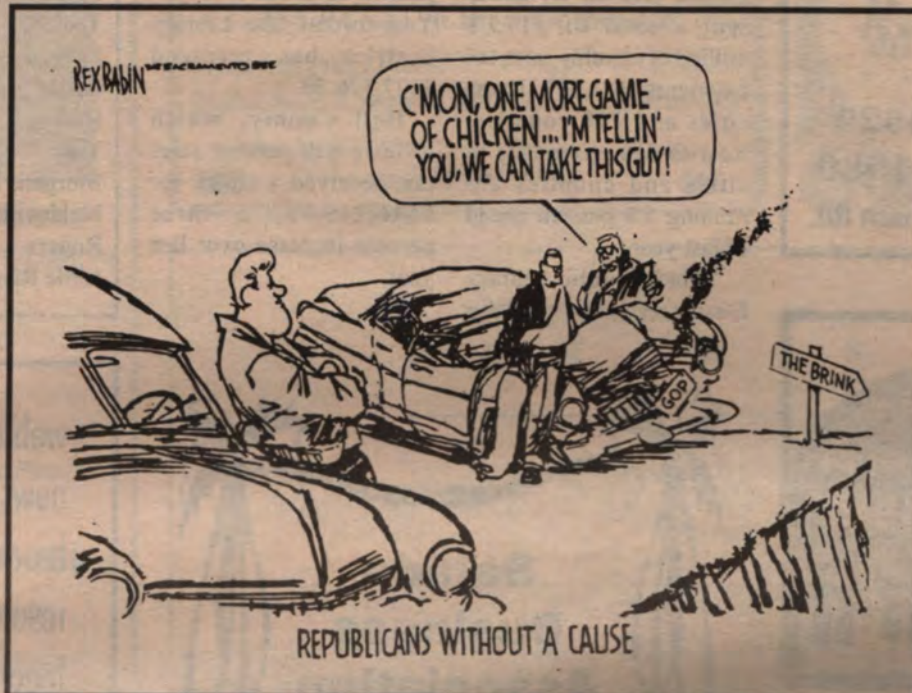
Then Porky started eating the screen door which opens onto the porch from the outside. She learned how to open the door and walk right in.

## Nuisance neighbors can be shut down if they refuse to stop crime

**Q: The motel at the end of our street is horribly run down. Police are there all the time and we think people there sell drugs. Can't it be shut down?**

**A:** The Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code and the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code both contain provisions that allow the Office of the Attorney General to take action against nuisance properties. Under these "nuisance abatement" statutes, an owner who allows criminal activities to occur on a property may face financial loss if the Office of the Attorney General is forced to close it down.

By using these civil statutes, we can close down crime-infested properties for such offenses as prostitution, drinking by minors or drug deals. Suits filed only have to prove that the owner of a property knowingly allowed illegal activities to occur. The authorities do not need to prove that the owner is guilty of illegal acts.

The Civil Enforcement Section of my office has closed down nuisance properties in Ft. Worth, Austin, Dallas and El Paso, among other places. We are working with law enforcement agencies to return neighborhoods to their rightful owners - law-abiding citizens.

A property that is declared a common nuisance and closed under the Civil Practice and Remedy Code will remain closed for up to one year unless the owner posts a \$10,000 bond and promises to eliminate crime. If the property is declared a public nuisance, the owner may have to post a \$1,000 bond and promise improvements within six months.

My office is available to help law enforcement agencies take the necessary steps to close down crime-ridden properties where drug, alcohol or firearm violations, prostitution, obscenity, gambling and gang activity occur. We can also shut down

apartment complexes where frequent violations occur.

Law enforcement agencies use the following test to determine whether a suspected site is nuisance under Texas law. A "yes" to a majority of questions means that the property may warrant action.

- \* Is the house or business habitually used for criminal activity, such as, violations of drug laws, obscenity, prostitution, gambling, discharging firearms, organized criminal activity or the illegal use of alcohol?

- \* Have there been at least six arrests for these activities at that location?

- \* Will the prohibited activity continue indefinitely if action is not taken?

- \* Have the lives and businesses of people in the surrounding area suffered or been adversely affected by the nuisance?

- \* Is the house or business unsanitary?

One option in nuisance abatement cases is for staff from my Civil Enforcement Section to meet with the property owner to offer help in improving the safety of the premises. However, if there are too many violations, my office will file suit. A property owner who cooperates can expect the support of law enforcement agencies and fire, health and safety code inspectors in ridding the property of crime.

In fact, my Civil Enforcement Section resolves many cases without ever going to court. Often, just the threat of legal action will motivate a property owner to clean up the property. In about a third of the cases my office investigates, property owners promised to clean up their property without going to court.

Only about a fourth of the cases handled by the Section were resolved through litigation. The remaining cases are either pending or currently in litigation.

If there is a property in your neighborhood that you think might be a public nuisance, contact your local police department to ask about possible nuisance abatement enforcement.

## Border health crucial issue

One of the first bills I co-sponsored after being elected to the Senate in 1993 authorized the creation of a U.S.-Mexico Border Health Commission. That bill became law in 1994. But to date, the commission remains a plan on paper, the victim of benign neglect and a severe case of bureaucratic inertia.

The border region suffers from Third World health problems, and its residents suffer from a higher rate of deadly, infectious diseases than anywhere else in the country. Disease knows no boundaries.

A binational effort to address this public health situation is long overdue.

To end the foot dragging, I, along with Senator Jeff Bingaman of New Mexico, have introduced an amendment directing the President to appoint the U.S. commission members within 30 days of its passage.

Public health officials have long been telling us that the diseases that prevail along the border - in a setting that straddles two sovereign nations - must be addressed through a binational effort. Establishing the commission will allow health officials of both countries to cooperate in tracking, preventing and working to cure numerous communicable diseases, as well as to cope with a number of other health issues unique to the border setting.

Tuberculosis is endemic on both sides. The average number of TB cases in the United States is 8 per 100,000 population. In Texas, the average is 10.3 cases per 100,000 people. In Laredo and Webb County, the rate is 18.8 cases per 100,000. Last year Reynosa, Mexico reported 400 cases of multiple drug-resistant tuberculosis.

Lack of access to medical care and preventive health services has meant the border region is subject to numerous other diseases as well. The incidence of Hepatitis A and various forms of dysentery and intestinal parasites linked to poor sanitation along the border is two to three times the national average. Upper respiratory infections and preventable diseases such as measles flourish. There is a higher-than-average incidence of cervical cancer among Hispanic women living along the border. Diabetes, anemia and high blood pressure are much more common than in other areas.

The U.S.-Mexico Border Health Commission would serve as an early warning system for the rest of the country, detecting and perhaps averting major outbreaks of infectious disease, such as cholera and salmonella, which already have shown signs of spreading beyond the border region.

There is a familiar saying in Spanish (and English as well) that sums up what's happening with the U.S. Mexico Border Health Commission: *Mas vale tarde que nunca* - better late than never.

## Sales Tax Rebates increase over last year


Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander sent a total of \$175.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,097 Texas cities and 118 counties. Year-to-date, payments to cities and counties are running 5.8 percent ahead of last year.

Salado Public Library District received a check for \$14,724.76 for the half-percent sales tax it levies. Year-to-date, the Library District has received \$127,576.70.

Bell County, which levies a half-percent sales tax, received a check for \$546,219.78, a three percent increase over last year.

the Civic Center Foundation, will be the master of ceremonies. He noted: "It is our hope that many Saladoans will join the former students of the old high school for this special program that will conclude with an early luncheon to be held next to the bandstand on the south side of the center."

**BUILDING SAVED**

The former school building was constructed in 1923-4 and the first classes were held in September of 1924. The last class to graduate from the school was the Class of 1979. From that date to early in 1992, the building was not used and deteriorated badly. It was in that year the Salado Chamber of Commerce undertook the formation of study and work com-

mittees charged with the feasibility of renovating the building for public use. The Chamber held public information meetings and invested thousands of dollars towards the renovation program.

The story of the renovation project has been called a "textbook example" of a community effort both in time and money to fulfill a need within the village - in this case a civic center that would house the Chamber of Commerce office, Historical Society, the public library as well as the school administration offices plus meeting rooms for village and area gatherings. Later an older building on the campus was renovated and became an Art Center for the Village Artists.

The brick and wrought iron fence, landscaping, construction of the bandstand and expansion of the parking area were all accomplished in the years following the opening of the center.

Individuals donated funds in large and small amounts as did a number of community organizations including the Chamber of Commerce and the Salado Historical Society along with large grants from the Meadows and the Paul J. Meyer Family Foundations. It was also necessary to borrow money from Salado National Bank and later from the Compass Bank to complete the project.

The dream became a reality on Oct. 9, 1993, when

the building was opened for public use as a civic center.

A private foundation headed by a board of directors was set up to manage the civic center. The non profit foundation was approved by the IRS and incorporated by the State of Texas. Current members of that board include: Ken Clapp, Chairman and CEO; Bob Cottle, President; Lloyd Parks, Vice President for Finance; Wilma Williams, Secretary to the Board and members Patsy Sanford, Pete Jennings and Jim Patterson.

The total number of dollars invested in the civic center project is nearing the \$600,000 mark. All renovation debts have been paid and the center is operating in the black and has done so since its opening in 1993.

Funds for operating the civic center come from leases, rentals, donations and annual grants from the Chamber of Commerce, Ladies Auxiliary, Spring Phone Company, Garlyn Shelton, Compass Bank, First State Bank, the Salado Lion's Club and a popular annual auction held each Spring.

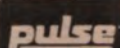

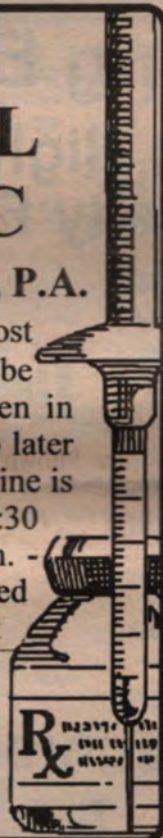

## Public servants need vaccine to prevent flu spreading

Healthcare workers, policemen, firemen, caregivers, and others who work closely with people on a daily basis need to get a flu shot.

"The vaccine not only protects but prevents individuals from passing the flu to others, especially those with health problems," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen with the Influenza Research Center

at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

A large proportion of high risk individuals have conditions such as asthma, bronchitis or cancer, that make it difficult for the flu vaccine to work effectively. This is why it is especially important for people around them, such as caregivers and medical personnel, to be vaccinated.

High-risk populations include:

- \* Persons who are 65 years of age and older.
- \* Persons with heart disease, diabetes, kidney failure, and AIDS.
- \* Children and teenagers on long-term aspirin therapy, which could put them at risk for Reye's syndrome after getting the flu.

Flu season begins in No-

vember and lasts through March, so now is a good time to get a flu shot. Influenza kills thousands of people, mostly elderly, and affects millions of others every year.

"The best advice I can give is to get a flu shot," said Glezen, a Baylor professor of microbiology and immunology. "It's your best defense."

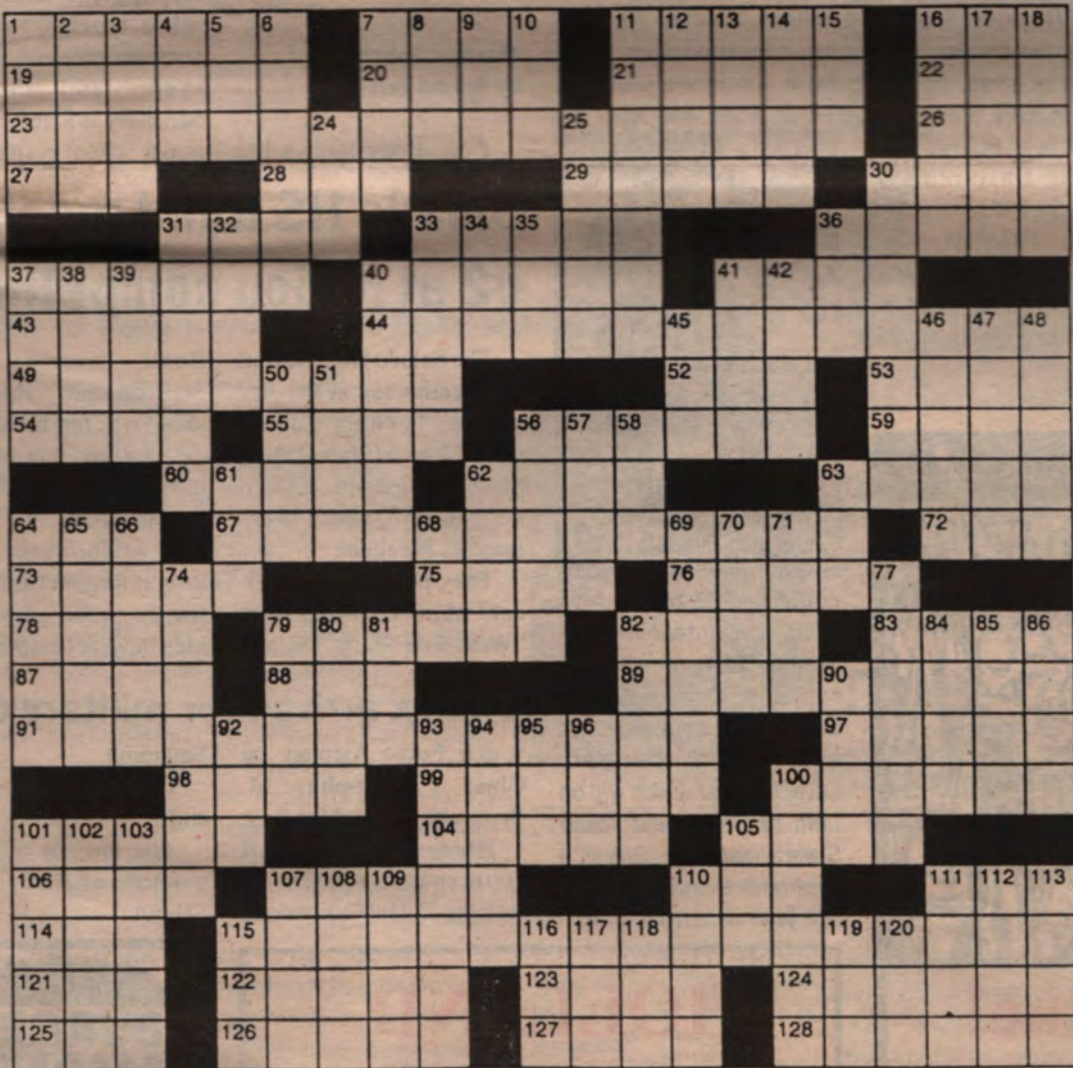

## "The Crucible" slated for CTC, Tablerock

Saladoans Hope Buchanan and Beth Correa will be featured in Central Texas College's upcoming performance of Arthur Miller's *The Crucible*. The two Salado women have prominent roles in the production with Buchanan playing Mary Warren, a confused young woman caught in the middle of *The Crucible*'s cross fire and Correa as Goody Putnam, the aging mother seeking desperate answers to her infertility.

Set in 1692 Massachusetts, *The Crucible*, directed by Saladoan Ernie Patterson, is centered around the Salem witch trials in which 19 people were hanged for practicing witchcraft. John Proctor, Miller's protagonist, who otherwise minds his own business, is compelled to testify at the court's hearings due to personal secrets he knows about the accusers. Inadvertently, Proctor's testimony becomes the catalyst for the destruction of several eminent townsmen of Salem.

*The Crucible* is "an allegory of our times." For Miller, the play paralleled the tumultuous McCarthy hearings during the cold

war when the question, "are you now or have you ever been a communist," echoed through the chambers of the House Un-American Activities Committee setting the stage for the infamous blacklist of many of Hollywood's elite. However, *The Crucible*'s stroke is much broader. The play's theme speaks right to the heart of a core value American's hold dear: innocence is assumed and guilt must be proved.

"This is a huge project for CTC Theatre and it is truly a community effort." Including understudies, there are 20 student actors in the cast ranging in age from 11 to 57 and coming from as far as Lampasas to Salado. "This cast is representative of the community CTC services; we have high school and middle school students, Ft. Hood soldiers, CTC students, and community volunteers involved with this project. We even have a CTC faculty member in our cast."

Many observers have said that *The Crucible* is about religion, Puritanism, or witchcraft. "I believe Miller's story goes beyond these limited ideas and targets a more universal



theme," Patterson said. "At its center, this play is about lies and their destructive nature. Further, it is about the lies we tell ourselves. The characters in *The Crucible* mirror the people of today and it is their self-deception which leads to their self-destruction. It is ironic then, that in *The Crucible*, the noose is reserved only for those that are honest with themselves."

*The Crucible* will be performed at Central Texas College on Oct. 21-23 with

the final performances at Tablerock Theatre in Salado on October 29-30. Curtain time for all performances is at 7:30 p.m. with the exception of a 3 p.m. Saturday matinee at Central Texas College on Oct. 23.

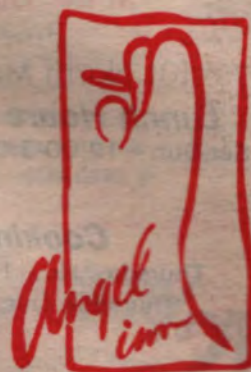

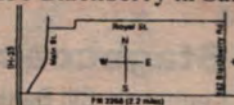

# Salado Creek brings joy to many

## History of Salado Creek First in a Series

(The following is the first in a series of excerpts from a book in preparation. It is taken from the first chapter which emphasizes the creek's origin, water source, and pristine state 150 years ago.)

Written records and memories remind us of the joy and fun Salado Creek has brought to countless people. These records describe groups and individuals enjoying camping, fishing, swimming, picnicking, religious services, and simply letting the beauty of the setting fill their spirits with peace.

There are five Salado Creeks in Texas. Our Salado Creek arises in and around Florence. Small bubbles and trickles join to form intermittent spring-fed streams. About 4 or 5 miles from Florence, the north

and south branches of Salado Creek join and flow through the Jarrell area and continue northward.

When Salado Creek has traveled about a third of its journey, it becomes a constant stream and remains so for the remainder of its course through Salado, north and east to Three Forks where it meets the Lampasas River. About a quarter of a mile downstream they join the Leon River and become the Little River. The Little River flows into the Brazos River which terminates in the Gulf of Mexico.

Salado Creek is fed by the Edwards Aquifer, a vast reservoir of ground water yielding huge quantities of water for millions of people. It provides some of the best ground water in the

world and deserves major efforts at conservation.

Descriptions by early explorers in Texas describe springs that gushed like fountains. Less than 100 years ago, Big Boiling Spring (where the Sirena statue is now placed) was described as a fountain, rising five feet high. But such fountains were deenergized many years ago.

It may be that spring flow depletion occurred because of early white settlers' activities such as deforestation for cultivation, building, or pasture land. The ground became more impervious and the balance between underground reservoir recharge and spring flow was destroyed by soil compaction as more and more land became pasture. By the mid-1800s, deep

wells were being drilled, and a flowing well could be brought in almost anywhere. These artesian wells shot water columns as high as 80 feet, and some were allowed to flow continuously, wasting tremendous quantities of water.

When wells ceased to flow, pumping began. Ground water levels were systematically drawn down, in some areas as much as 700 feet.

Depletion has been compounded by contamination of the aquifer and the creek. These contaminants can come from individuals, businesses, or industries. They include petroleum products and waste from humans and animals -- to name a few. Some polluting situations cannot be rectified, but many can be avoided, as will be seen.

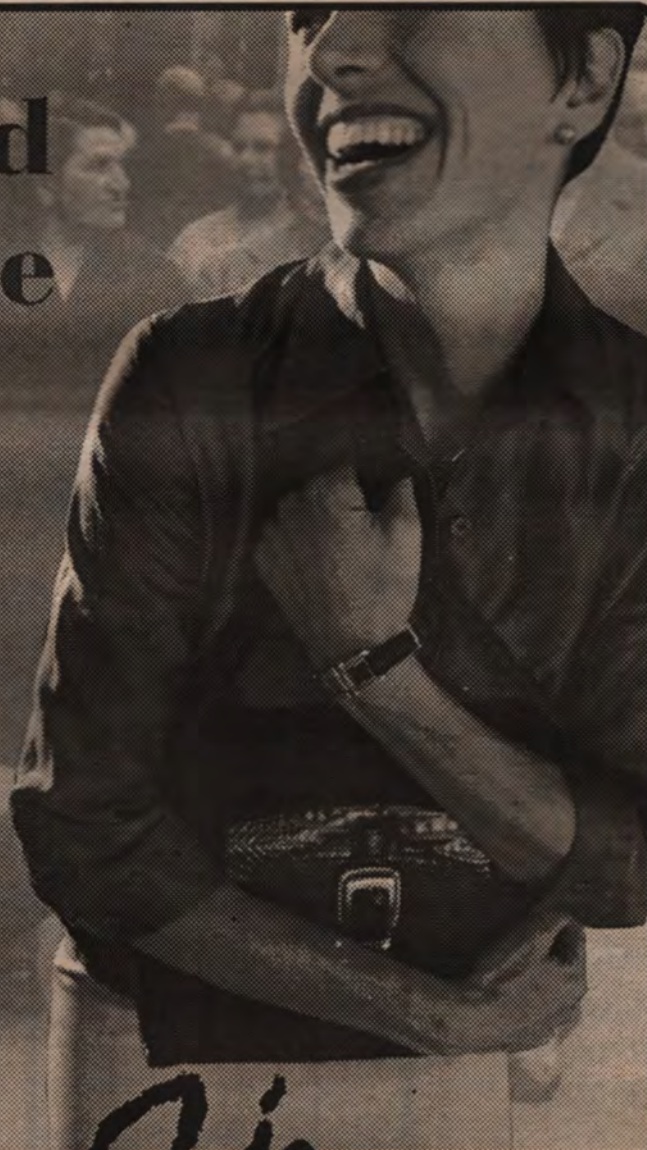

# Families in Crisis staff attends conference on Family Violence issues in Corpus Christi

Saladoan Sheryl Russell joined five other staff members of Families in Crisis at the 18th Annual Statewide Family Violence Conference in Corpus Christi.

"Interaction, information, training, and general knowledge are valuable to Families in Crisis, Inc., and since October is 'National Family Violence Awareness Month,' the conference was especially appropriate.

The networking that occurs at the events and the casual learning that follows are as valuable as structured sessions," said Russell. Russell is Community Relations Coordinator of Families in Crisis.

Families in Crisis, Inc., a United Way Agency, provides shelter, outreach, counseling, and education services in three counties-Bell, Coryell, and Hamilton. Texas has over 60 shelters and numerous organizations that intervene in family violence situations.

In Texas, 110 women met their death at the hands of their partners in 1998. To honor those victims and the many hundreds of others, who continue to suffer, a candlelight vigil was held on the opening evening of the conference. "This simple, but moving ceremony began with various

people in the audience reading the names, ages, and places of death of the victims," Russell said. "Then survivors in the audience stood and stated their names and the time - often years - of their suffering and the years or months of being survivors," Russell continued. As the activity ended, each attendee received a red and white carnation to carry as a reminder of the victims of family violence.

Some simple truths heard at the conference:

\* Violence is a cultural and community concern.

\* Violence is bad enough, but it's far-reaching side effects and continuing trauma and tragedy involve family members as well as friends, employer/employees, agencies and organizations.

\* In the United States a woman is battered every 12 seconds.

\* Violence does not recede or stop without intervention. The fear never ends.

\* As many as 13 agencies may be called on to help a person cope with a family violence situation.

\* As many as seven visits to shelters and other outreach facilities may occur before a person begins the process of change that makes a victim into a sur-

vivor.

\* People stay in family violence situations because the 'power of love' subtly changes into the 'love of power.' It is not one massive thing that happens. It is many, many little things that undermine self-esteem, isolate, control, and hurt before they kill.

\* Women of all races are about equally vulnerable to violence by someone with whom they are intimate.

\* The majority of domestic violence victims are women, and perpetrators are men. But men can be victims of abuse, too.

\* A woman is in more danger in her own home than she is in most other settings including her car, her job, and her normal activities of life.

Numbers alone cannot measure family violence and its true expense, victims tell of long term emotional trauma and other outcomes of abuse that are insidious and far-reaching, even affecting children.

"Knowing more about family violence situations and the problems that spill over into the workplace may help identify victims and lead to solutions," stated Brock. "Why not use October, 'National Family Violence Awareness Month' as a catalyst for conversations

about the Intervention and resources that are available from Families in Crisis, Inc. and other agencies like Legal Aid, people who are experiencing family violence need to know their options and have good information," Brock said.

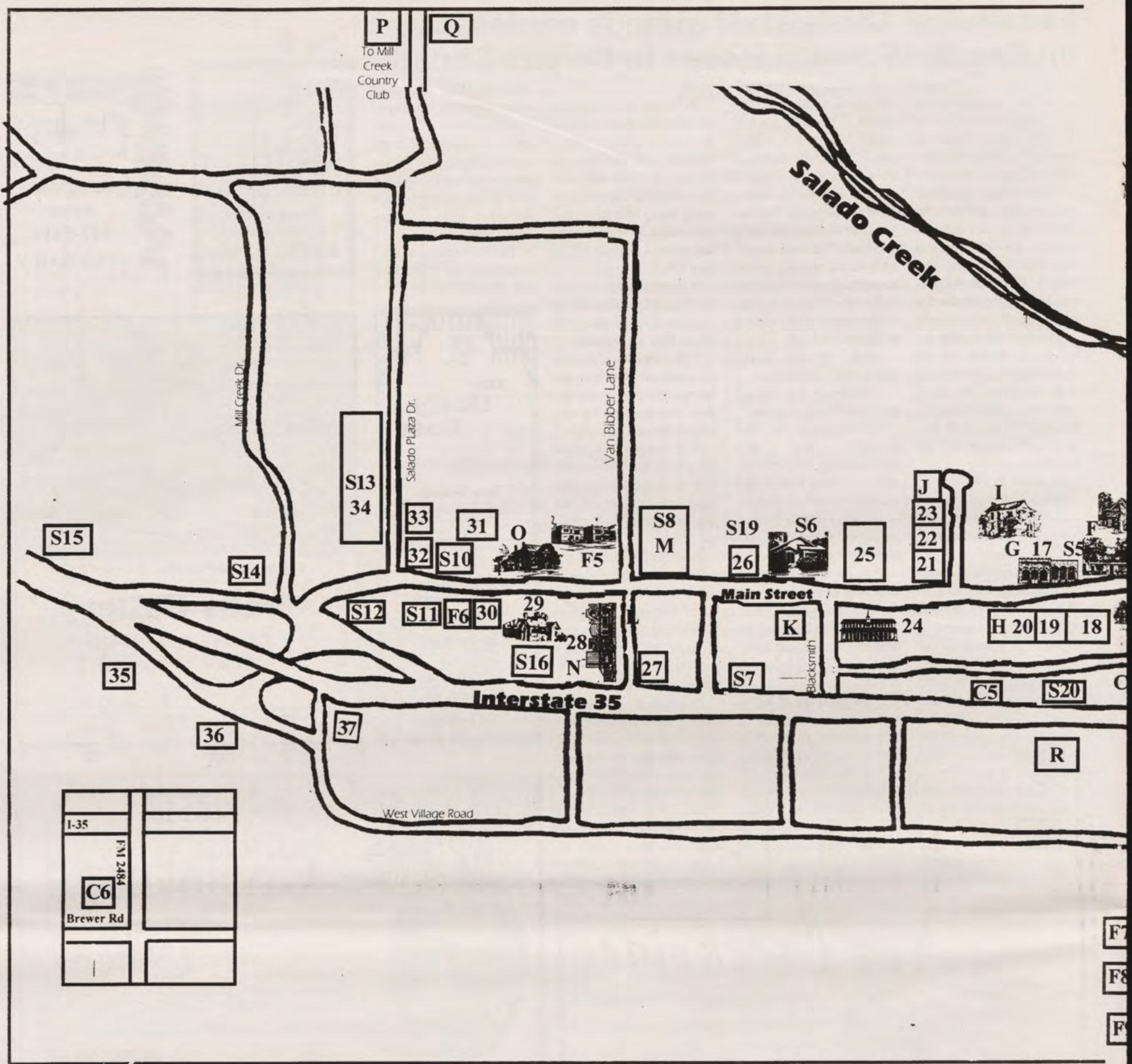

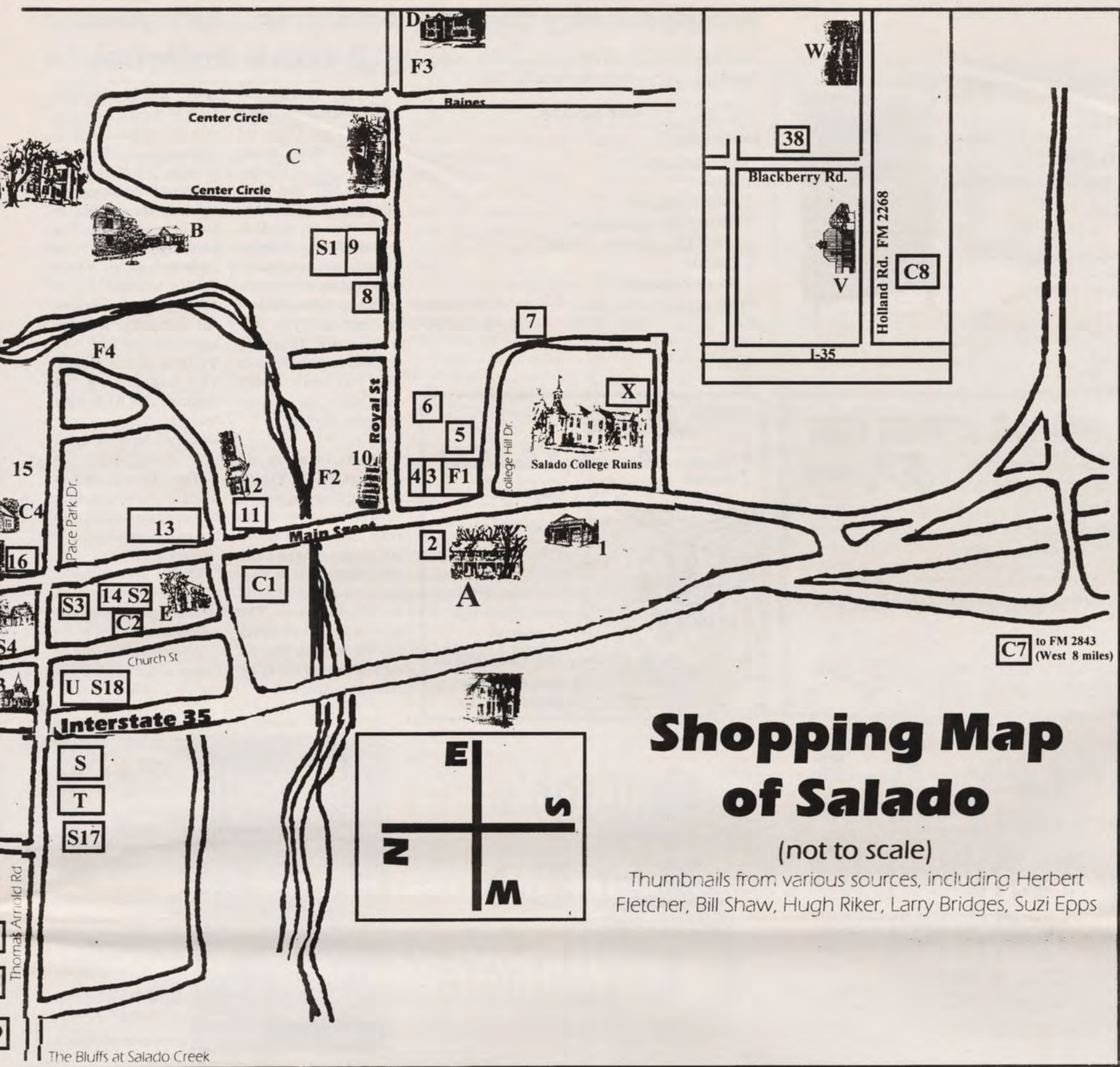

Q: My family has some dishes marked "Rose China, Occupied Japan." Who made them?

A: In 1946 and 1947, the Noritake Co. Ltd., made china for the U.S. military forces in Japan. The war had caused shortages, and the factory was unable to make china of the same quality as their well-known trademark that had been used since 1904. By 1949, dishes were again marked with the name Noritake.

Q: We found an old wooden RCA Victor packing crate in our attic. On two sides of the crate there's the familiar picture of the RCA dog, Nipper. He is staring into the speaker of an old gramophone. The crate measures 37 inches by 26 inches by 34 inches. Would the crate interest collectors?

A: Anything that pic-

tures Nipper is collectible. Nipper was a real dog who was born in England. His master, Frances Barraud, painted his picture next to a phonograph and sold the painting to the Gramophone Co. The painting became the trademark of the Victor Talking Machine Co. in 1901. Victor, an American company, was the manufacturer of the Victor record player. The Radio Corp. of America (RCA) bought Victor in 1929. Your crate would sell for about \$150.

Q: My bronze figure of a naked woman is 15 inches high. It is signed "Andreas."

A: Andreas worked in France about 1910. He is not a well-known maker.

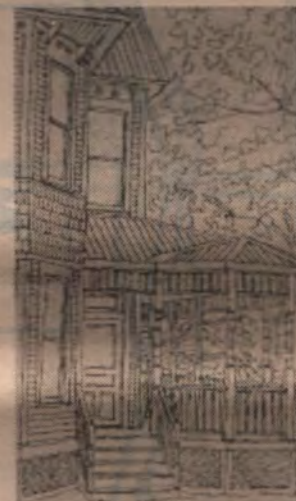

# Local travel agent insist on customer service first

Airline commission cuts do not worry Joan Schrock, CTA.

"Another shot in the airline's war against consumer choice" is how local agency Joan Schrock describes the sudden announcement by United Airlines and American Airlines that they are further cutting travel agency commissions.

"The airlines are pretending this is all about cutting their costs," say Joan. "I don't think that is so. My analysis suggests that it costs an airline as much or more to directly sell a ticket to a traveller as it costs them in commission when a travel agency issues it on their behalf." She believes that airlines now view travel agencies as threats to their ability to impose artificially

high fares on travellers, and are trying to shut agencies down by dropping them and dropping their commissions.

"The airlines hate the fact that we can help the wise consumer quickly and conveniently comparison shop amongst hundreds of fares from dozens of different airlines, enabling the consumer to choose the lowest fare that most conveniently meets their needs," she said. "When was the last time you called an airline directly and they volunteered that there was a cheaper fare, or a better connection, on a competing airline!"

As for what the reduction to a five percent commission means to Joan Schrock says, "It has been

clear to us for several years what the airlines are trying to do to us. We're increasingly focusing on being a proactive provider of services and travel advice to clients, much more than just a simple airline ticket outlet. And, of course, the more advice we give our travellers, the more the airlines hate us. I wouldn't be surprised if they end up cutting commissions down to zero, and still pretending, as they do it, that they are only doing it to 'cut their costs.' But we're in this to stay, and as long as our clients value our expertise, we'll be around to help ensure they still have the opportunity to selectively shop and conveniently choose the best travel values."

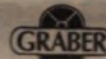



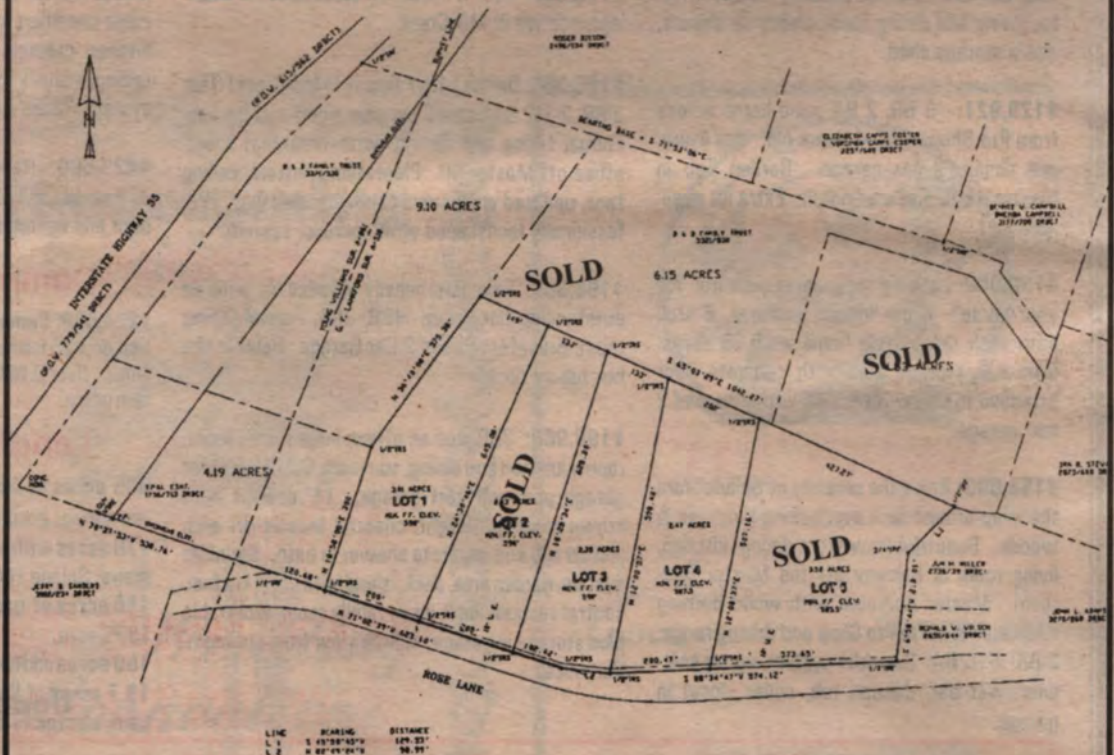
