## Texas voters will cast ballots on 17 constitutional amendments Nov. 2

Early voting will continue until Oct. 29 for 17 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Election day voting will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 2.

Early voting will be 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 27 and 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 28-29 at the Bell County Commissioners Courtroom at 550 East Second Ave. in Belton.

Precincts 203, 205 and 403 will be consolidated to vote election day at the Salado Civic Center on North Main St.

The proposed amendments to the constitution are the following:

### Proposition 1

The constitutional amendment to revise the provisions for the filling of a vacancy in the office of governor or lieutenant governor.

### Proposition 2

The constitutional amendment relating to the making of advances under a reverse mortgage and payment of a reverse mortgage.

### Proposition 3

The constitutional amendment to eliminate duplicative, executed, obsolete, archaic, and ineffec-

tive provisions of the Texas Constitution.

### Proposition 4

The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt property owned by institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions from ad valorem taxation.

### Proposition 5

The constitutional amendment allowing state employees to receive compensation for serving as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district.

### Proposition 6

The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres, prescribing permissible uses of urban homesteads, and preventing the overburdening of a homestead.

### Proposition 7

The constitutional amendment authorizing garnishment of wages for the enforcement of court-ordered spousal maintenance.

### Proposition 8

The constitutional amendment to provide that the adjutant general serves

at the pleasure of the governor.

### Proposition 9

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a judicial compensation commission.

### Proposition 10

The constitutional amendment to provide that the commissioner of health and human services serves at the pleasure of the governor.

### Proposition 11

The constitutional amendment permitting a political subdivision to purchase nonassessable property and casualty insurance from an authorized mutual insurance company in the same manner that the political subdivision purchases life, health, and accident insurance.

### Proposition 12

The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation leased motor vehicles not held by the lessee primarily to produce income.

### Proposition 13

The constitutional amendment providing for

## Dodson shares her interviews with nation's poor women

Lisa Dodson's research into the lives of poor women in America has taken her away from the think tanks of academia to different kinds of think tanks: think tanks around kitchen tables, lobbies, park benches and laundromats.

It has been at these think tanks that Dodson, a Harvard professor, learned of the daily lives of poor women, whom she describes as living in "the jeopardy of being extremely vulnerable and still keeping on."

Dodson spoke to the Institute for the Humanities at Salado Oct. 24 about "Surviving Abuse and Raising Resistance in the Lives of Poor Women in America."

Much of Dodson's lecture was based on her book, *Don't Call Us Out of Name*.

While conducting interviews for her *Don't Call Us Out of Name*, Dodson

said she found that abuse dominates the lives of poor women.

Poor women face three types of violence: the expectation of violence from growing up in a family of abuse; abuse from their partners; and institutional abuse stemming from the system which is to help them.

Dodson read excerpts from her book which exemplified the vulnerable status of poor women, who are often "marginalized, segregated and stigmatized as being welfare mothers."

Dodson met Terry and Rona in 1991. The two women were in their early 30s, were single moms with two children and spent time going on and off welfare.

While their stories were separate, they shared common themes, Dodson said.

Rona grew up in a house with seven children. They lived in a working class community until her father died. At that point, her mom moved the family into

public housing and took on two jobs so she wouldn't have to "go on the dole," Dodson read. Left on their own, the brothers began to run with criminals and the girls began to mess with boys.

By the time Rona was 18, she lived alone in a small apartment, scared and isolated, with her two-year-old daughter. After gunshots broke out next door to her apartment, Rona decided she had to move.

Which was when Cabrelle entered her life. Rona remembered Cabrelle as being somewhat of a guardian angel at first, scooping up Nicole and helping Rona move.

But he didn't stay that way for long. He beat Rona regularly, even when she became pregnant with his son. Rona told Dodson that she found the strength to leave the abusive relationship when she realized that while she got used to the abuse, she was teaching her

## One man, one vote?

Amendments decided by 10% of voters

Over the past five weeks this newspaper has presented each of the 17 proposed changes to the State Constitution along with a complete explanation, related pros and cons and an editorial recommendation on each amendment created by lawmakers for our final approval on Tuesday, November 2.

Purpose has been to alert Saladoans to these potential constitutional alterations as well as to drum up interest in an election that the Texas Secretary of State's office predicts will draw a scant ten percent of the state's electorate to the polls.

It staggers the imagination to think of having only one in ten eligible voters taking a few minutes out of their day to attend to the important task of determining what modifications need to be made in the highest law of our State.

**A ten percent turnout gives each voter the "power of ten" when it comes to decision making in this or any election.** That is way too much authority to be granted to any individual in a representative democracy such as ours and certainly not what the founding fathers had in mind when

they created our system of government.

Another factor involved in this seeming indifference to the simple task of voting is the question of who it is that does go to the polls "religiously" regardless of what is up for consideration? All too many of these "ten percenters" are "aginners" or partisan single issue voters. Nothing wrong with this in principal, but if they are the only ones voting, what happens to the necessary balancing factor that should be present, so both sides of an issue have input before final decisions are made that affect everyone?

Early voting on the proposed amendments ends this Friday, October 29. General election day is Tuesday, November 2.

We urge each citizen of this village to show the rest of our County and State that we do care and we do vote! We can, by example, lead the way percentage-wise - as we should.

## Amendments 15-17 reviewed; Saladoans urged to vote Nov. 2

*Writer's Note: This is the last in a series of five articles on the proposed Amendments to the Texas Constitution that will be voted on November 2, 1999. Early voting continues through this Friday, October 29, and to date there has been a less than vigorous outpouring of interest in this off-year election. We urge each reader to take a look at today's editorial and then vote - up or down - the proposed changes to the highest law of our State.*

### AMENDMENT 15: PROPERTY

Texas adopted the Spanish and Mexican community property laws when they declared themselves a Republic in 1836 and later included it in our current post-reconstruction constitution.

The idea is simple - all property (real and personal) brought to a marriage or earned by gift or inheritance after marriage by either spouse is considered "separate property", whereas all real and personal property earned after marriage becomes "community property" and should the marriage fail - only this community property is subject to division.

Amendment 15, if approved, would allow spouses to agree in writing and signed by both parties, to legally convert his or her separate property into community property thus allowing a sharing of what was previously held to be non-divisible in the event of divorce or death.

Today, a spouse is allowed to shift community property to separate property. This new proposal would allow the shift to go both ways thus creating a form of reciprocity that allows Texas spouses more freedom in disposing of their personally owned property.

Those who oppose this measure cite the potential problem of undue pressure placed on one spouse by the other to force the movement of privately owned property into the realm of joint ownership. There is also the problem of regretting such an action later in a marriage with no recourse available to reverse the decision. This could be overcome if both parties agreed to the reversal, however this is not likely to happen if the two parties involved are looking at a potential divorce proceeding.

Proponents say that a spouse should be able to share his or her separate property as that person sees fit including converting it to community property or giving it away to charity or to family and friends.

No doubt a new field of family law will open up for lawyers in Texas if this amendment is passed, but the bottom line is that a person should be able to chose, hopefully with mature judgement, what happens to his or her separate property and this will be possible if Amendment 15 is approved.

**Recommend Amendment 15 be approved.**

### AMENDMENT 16: NEW PRECINCTS

Amendment 16, should it pass, would allow certain counties, after the 2000 census is completed, to increase the number of their precincts based on population growth. In general there are three categories of counties in Texas. Group One includes smaller counties having less than 18,000 residents. These counties must have from one to four precincts. Group two - population from 18,000 to 30,000 that must have from two to five precincts. Last group is the over 30,000 population and they must have from four to eight precincts.

In short, Amendment 16, would

simply move the 30,000 population number to 50,000 and allow the middle group (two) to have from two to eight precincts, an increase of three precincts.

Not much of a change and certainly a bit premature since the census figures won't be verified until well into the next legislative session in 2001, if then. For Bell County there would be no change whatsoever since at the current level we are allowed up to eight precincts (we have four) and little likelihood of increasing that number regardless of the census, according to County Judge Jon Burrows.

Bell has four precincts with the two largest (Killeen and Temple) having two Justices of the Peace each with the other two precincts having one each plus a constable for each precinct.

As counties grow, so does the demand for services, hence the thinking on the part of lawmakers to amend the current constitution and allow burgeoning counties to add JP and constable services if they so desire. That is what this amendment is all about statewide - additional services and costs to county taxpayers in growing population centers.

**Recommend passage of Amendment 16, despite the premature factor involved in this pre-census rush.**

### AMENDMENT SEVENTEEN: PUF

Amendment 17, if approved on November 2, would change the way proceeds from the Permanent University Fund (PUF) would be channeled to the Available University Fund (AUF).

The constitution of 1876 created the Permanent University Fund by setting aside what became oil rich land in West Texas. The mineral royalties from these lands; proceeds from the sale of such lands and all capital gains on investments made with such proceeds go into the PUF and become principal. **This is untouchable at present.**

Only the interest and dividends from this principal is available to the University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems, first for repayment of university building bonds with what is left over going for basic school maintenance and operation.

Amendment 17, would make a major change in that the AUF would be able to secure not only the interest and dividends from the principal of the PUF, but also a modest amount of the capital gain growth (seven percent) from the fund which could possibly go as high as \$50 million by 2004.

Plenty of safeguards are attached to this change and certainly if there is a downturn in the market that produces most of the capital gains - the amount to the AUF is automatically reduced.

Even more importantly, if at anytime the distribution of the 7% capital gain would cut back on the basic principal making up the PUF, the entire procedure is halted.

Complicated financial stuff but basically the eighteen colleges and universities in the two systems would receive more funds for operation and repayment of building bonds thus keeping student fees from escalating. Fees that currently help pay for facilities.

**Recommend passage of Amendment 17.**

## Unlock aviation trust fund

I've flown the length and breadth of Texas over the past 25 years, and landed on more than one runway that left my hair standing on end. Every one of those trips reminds me how important it is for our state to have a strong system of small and medium-sized airports to back up our major international facilities.

And each one of those trips is a reminder of how important it is that we take every precaution and spend every dollar needed to ensure the safety of the flying public - whether in a single-engine private plane landing in Uvalde or on a 747 commercial flight touching down in Houston.

Nearly 200 airports in Texas are eligible for federal funding. But for several years Texas airports and those in the rest of the country have not been getting a full share of the funds they need for optimum safety, maintenance and improvement. The money is there, it just hasn't been available.

For more than a decade the federal Airport and Airway Trust Fund has been collected but, for the most part, unspent. General aviation pilots pay into the trust fund "at the pump" through a special federal tax on fuel, while airline passengers contribute through an excise tax on airline tickets. The surplus is expected to total \$12 billion next year.

That situation may be about to change. Both the House and Senate have passed legislation outlining next year's aviation spending and addressing the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) safety and air traffic control programs. The House version of this legislation, which I favor, will unlock the trust fund coffers and permit all taxes collected from aviation users to be spent on aviation needs. If the House version eventually prevails, next year we can begin to provide desperately needed funding for airport and air traffic control modernization. We did this with the federal Highway Trust Fund last year, and we should do it for aviation safety as well.

The final bill will increase funding to airports across the nation for high priority safety, capacity and noise abatement improvements.

The bill would for the first time set aside funds specifically for smaller, general aviation airports and more than double Airport Improvement Program (AIP) grant funding available to them. These are the smaller airports on which so many rural communities in Texas depend.

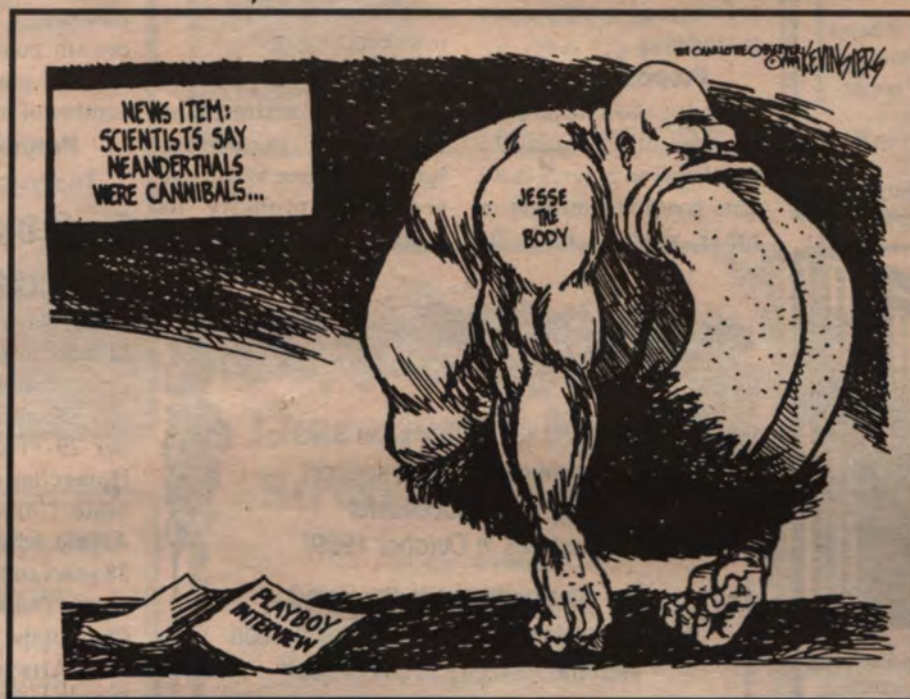
It also requires the FAA to consider the need for improving runway safety areas (runway extensions that provide a landing cushion beyond the ends of runways) and to consider requiring the installation of precision approach path indicators, which are visual guidance landing systems for runways. Cargo aircraft will be required to have instruments that warn of impending midair collisions, the same kind of equipment already required on passenger aircraft. These and a long list of other provisions are critical in the continuing effort to enhance safety and reduce accident rates.

This legislation contains another provision that would benefit Texas: creating a program to help smaller communities attract improved air passenger service.

The aviation industry has a \$3 billion impact on Texas' economy annually. A sound air transportation system is essential to our state's - and our nation's - well being and continued prosperity.

## Long term farm policy should be national priority

For three quarters of a century, Americans have allowed political expediency to replace a sound, responsible agricultural policy. As a new millennium dawns, we can no longer afford that luxury. Agriculture is currently gripped by the latest and most severe of a series of crises that threaten American agriculture as we have come to know it.

The United States must develop an effective, long-term national farm policy that incorporates the ideas of fairness, sanctity of private property rights, effective monetary policy and producer profitability as the primary goal. Farmers, consumers and the American economy all lose if current farm policy fails to address farmers' needs.

Because of a sharp decrease in profit margins, disturbing numbers of full-time farmers are cutting back to part-time or quitting altogether in favor of city jobs. Inevitably, American consumers will feel the impact of this trend when they discover that food prices are no longer reasonable. Or perhaps Americans will lose control of their food supply as our grocery shelves are filled with imported food, because there may not be enough U.S. farmers left to do the job.

For much of the last century, Americans spent less of their income on food than citizens of any other nation in the world. However, we cannot continue to count on cheap food.

Ineffective farm policy affects not only food prices, but the family farm as a national institution. Farmers who want nothing more than to work full-time have been forced, by poor farm economics and low commodity prices, to settle for part-time work. What does this mean for the future? How will this effect the next generation of what should be family farmers? We really can't afford to wait for time to tell.

An effective national farm policy must include the idea of fairness, in competition, trade policy, regulation and all commodities. Government should protect against the monopoly power that is a growing threat in agriculture. Allowing monopolies to continue this unchecked growth seriously threatens fair competition.

Foreign agricultural policy also requires fairness. The U.S. is slow to act when trading partners, who fill the campaign accounts of elected officials, restrict imports of U.S. farm goods. Farmers and ranchers are forced to settle for whatever is left. A

wise domestic farm policy must have equal standing with foreign relations policy.

Government regulations threaten to strangle the American farmer. A noose, woven with concepts like pesticide regulations and endangered species listings, constantly tightens around the neck of the farming community. Regulators view agriculture as "guilty until proven innocent." Scientific proof has become less important than emotion and politics. The government should take action only after careful examination of the impacts on all of agriculture.

A key part of the American agriculture system is the right to own and produce on private property. This right separates the U.S. from other nations and our unmatched productivity in terms of food and fiber production is the result.

Today, the idea of private property rights is eroding. The U.S. government's practice of confiscation by regulation diminishes an owner's right to use his property. Incentives created by private property ownership must be a component of a national farm policy.

As property owners and business managers, farmers deserve representation on the Federal Reserve Board. Concern mounts in the farm community over the impact of the board's policies on commodity prices. A strong agricultural economy should be a Federal Reserve priority.

In order to achieve a strong agricultural economy, farming and ranching must be profitable. Government payments have helped in the midst of extremely low commodity prices, but short term fixes do not assure long term success. Also, income should come from the marketplace itself, not from government. Freedom of choice in what and how much to plant would help farmers to create a profit-yielding market.

Other programs should be developed to assist U.S. agriculture over the long term. Measures to counteract large price swings should provide a safety net for farmers. Crop production risk and revenue assurance systems would also be part of this net. The government should use aggressive overseas market development programs. Agricultural research and extension programs should receive increased funding.

A national commitment to securing the futures of America's farmers makes good sense for all areas of our society. A viable long-term farm policy would keep American-grown food on grocery shelves and full-time farmers on their farms. Then, the history of our time would tell of another American success story.

## Woody's Place Texan Voices

In 1946, Woody Frazier bought a combination eating place and grocery store in Haskell. "I guess you could call it the first convenience store in Haskell," says Woody. "People didn't really know what a convenience store was back then."

He sold some groceries in the store, but mostly people went there for sandwiches. "We had bologna sandwiches and pressed ham sandwiches," says Woody. "The bologna sandwich was called a Woody special and sold for a nickel. It was just mustard, bologna and bread. A pressed ham sandwich cost a dime."

His place of business was right across the street from the school in Haskell. "It had a lunch room, but nobody wanted to eat there. They wanted to go to Woody's."

He started selling hamburgers for 25 cents each. Drinks were a nickel. "During our busy times we'd sell between 100 and 150 hamburgers a day. We'd make up 75 or 80 ahead of time. No heat lamp to keep them warm. All we had was a little rack across our grill. We'd stack them up on it."

He made a real hamburger. "I used ten pounds of hamburger meat with one pound of whole wheat bread mixed in it. That was my meat recipe. The hamburger had lettuce, tomatoes, onions and pickles. They were all the same."

Woody's was a busy place. "Usually after a rush we couldn't see the floor for all the trash. That's how big the business was. It was unbelievable."

He offered credit. "I just had a little clipboard there with names in squares. Whatever they'd get we'd just put it down. At the end of the month I'd add it up and get a bill ready. Some paid by the week. A lot of the parents paid their kids' bills."

Woody's was a hangout. "Kids didn't have anything to do. Most of them didn't have a bicycle. So we got us a Mrs. Baird's bread box and drew a checkerboard on that thing. And we got us some Dr. Pepper and Coca-Cola crowns and we'd have a checker tournament there."

"And then we'd babysit some kids after school whose parents were working. Instead of being home alone they stayed here until their parents came for them."

The kids started putting their school pictures on the walls of Woody's store. Those are all at the school now and they use them at homecoming. "Everybody had a flat-top haircut back then. There's just a lot of laughter now in those pictures."

Woody had his place 25 years.

"I had a wonderful experience. The years spent there were the best years of my life."

Woody sold his place to a man who was impressed with the amount of business the store generated. But he was never able to do the business Woody did. He eventually closed the store.

daughter the same thing.

Terry ran away from home when her stepfather's affections became unfatherly. She spent 10 years on the street, "living by her wits, waiting tables and doing drugs," Dodson explained.

Terry told Dodson that she lived with a man who would "beat the hell out of me if I did not come home with enough money for his habit."

At one point, the man beat Terry into premature labor. When Child Protective Services threatened to take her daughter Amelia away, Terry did something about the abuse.

She plunged herself into treatment and support groups. She remembered taking Amelia with her to those meetings, "first in a basket, then in a stroller and then hand-in-hand."

Dodson said that Terry and Rona's friendship was about sticking together and finding the strength to survive their abuse.

Dodson also shared stories about the abuse many poor women suffer at the hands of the institutions

which were established to help them.

The relationship between a man with power and a woman with no power can lead to sexual exploitation, Dodson said. What "was profound to me," she said, "was that these events were often unremarkable to the women. They described it as the way of the world."

Dodson also discussed ways in which women are resisting against the abuse, both personal and institutional. These were her stories of hope and strength.

Ronette, a woman Dodson interviewed in 1996, was the first in her family to go to college. Ronette said she could feel a sense of pride in her family, even from her children, a 12-year-old son and a nine-year-old daughter.

Ronette was struggling with her classes and was afraid that she wouldn't pass. She kept this from the other people in her family, but somehow her daughter knew she was struggling.

One day her daughter bought a present for her: a small figurine of a woman in

a cap and gown.

Ronette went on to earn her Associates Degree and began 'work on her Bachelor's Degree. She told Dodson that she wanted to work in career counseling with young girls and women.

Rosa and Sharise are two teenagers Dodson interviewed for her book. Sharise told Dodson of the time Rosa "lost it" with her stepfather.

Rosa said her stepfather was strict but not abusive in the home. When her stepdad would get angry, Rosa would usually stand absolutely still, hoping he would overlook her.

But one day, her stepdad lost his temper with Rosa's eight-year-old sister Carmelita and slapped her face.

To hear Sharise tell the story, "my girl went wild. She screamed at him and ran into the kitchen for a frying pan," which apparently was the weapon of choice of the women in Rosa's family.

Rosa was somewhat embarrassed but pleased to

have her friend tell the story. Rosa told Dodson that "I can't always be like that, but I could that day."

"She said she felt like something powerful, something red," Dodson said. Something Rosa."

Odessa, a 32-year-old, gave Dodson the title for her book, **Don't Call Us Out of Name**, when she explained how women were called "out of name" because they were poor.

Odessa told Dodson that poor women are "called out of name" such things as sluts, whores and welfare mothers. "These words are brands like racial epithets," Dodson said.

Odessa told her that "when you accept those names, you become them." Odessa emerged from the system with her strength and family love. She said she now names herself.

Being called out of name, Odessa said, "is a practice that stops with her."

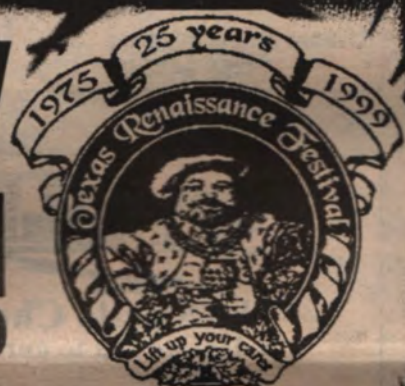

## Eagles thrash JC 50-8

Salado Eagles clipped the Johnson City Eagles 50-8 for a homecoming victory Oct. 22.

Johnson City led briefly in the first quarter, when freshman quarterback Kris Heavner ran in from the one yard line. Josh Brodbeck ran in the two-point conversion to give the JC Eagles an 8-7 lead with 3:17 left in the period.

The lead would vanish with time running out in the first period as Michael Schoepf found Tigger Day for a seven-yard touchdown pass. The play capped a 51-scoring drive, highlighting a 24-yard pass by Schoepf to Rory Oldham and a 16-yard run by Nick Long.

Jon Robbins sacked Heavner for a nine yard loss as Salado forced Johnson City to punt from their own 19-yard-line.

Salado converted the three-and-out defensive stand into a touchdown in short order. Taking over at the Johnson City 47-yard line, Salado took just over a minute to score. Schoepf ran the ball in on a quarterback draw from the Johnson City 23-yard line. Paul Lucas' point-after kick

gave Salado a 20-8 lead with 8:11 left in the half.

Justin Marshall sacked punter Danny Alba for an 18 yard loss when Salado forced a fourth and seven to go at the Johnson City 44-yard line. A conduct call against Johnson City moved the ball to their 11 yard line.

Schoepf immediately found Lucas in the end zone with 4:22 left in the half. The PAT gave Salado a 27-8 lead.

With just over a minute left in the half, Salado was forced to make its only punt from the Johnson City 48-yard line. Day scrambled

downfield and stopped the punt from rolling into the endzone. Salado downed the ball at the Johnson City one yard line.

Trey Hutton and Michael Gunter stopped Heavner in the end zone for a safety with 1:04 left in the half.

In the last 60 seconds of the half, both teams would turn the ball over.

Brent Hansen took the ball away from Edgar Tabullo at the Johnson City 41-yard-line with 37 seconds left in the half.

It was all Salado needed as Schoepf scrambled out of the pocket before find-

ing Lucas for a 39-strike with no time left on the clock. The extra point gave Salado a 36-8 lead going to the lockers.

Salado scored midway through the third quarter on Matthew Fleck's three-yard run at 5:57. The run capped a 35-yard drive by Salado. The PAT brought the score to 43-8.

Salado, which passes the ball all night, stayed on the ground in the last period; yet the Eagles scored again when Fleck broke through for a 34-yard run with 4:47 left in the game.

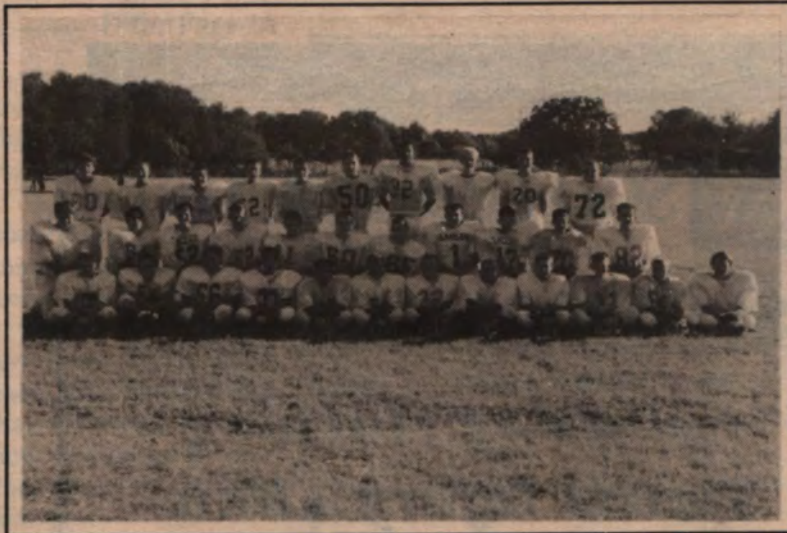

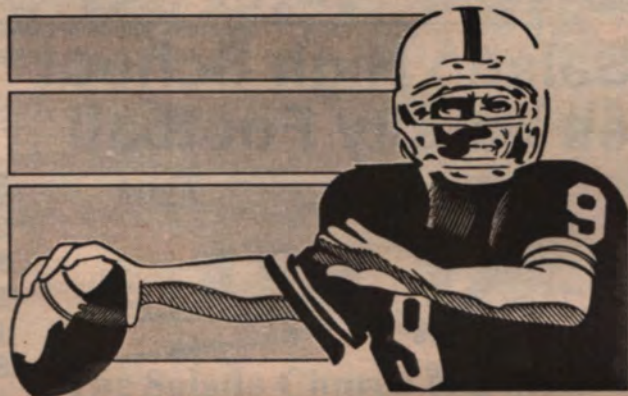

## Senior immunization comes to Salado

The Central Texas Partners-in-Health, Bell County agencies and business are sponsoring the Bell County Senior Immunization Roundup Nov. 1-6 to provide Bell County seniors age 65 or older influenza, pneumonia, tetanus/diphtheria shots.

The Roundup will stop at the Salado Civic Center on Main St. 1-4 p.m. Nov. 3.

"Our goal is to immunize 80 percent of Bell County seniors age 65 and over," said Virginia Feaster, project manager for the Community Research and Program Development Department at Scott and White Memorial Hospital.

"The primary thing is that the immunizations are

free of charge for seniors 65 or older," Feaster said.

The sponsors purchased the immunizations and supplies through the Texas Department of Health, she added.

Scott and White Memorial Hospital funded the flu vaccines. King's Daughters Hospital purchased supplies for the immunizations and pneumonia vaccinations. The Area Agency on Aging of Central Texas gave \$5,000 for the purchase of pneumonia vaccines.

Feaster said the sponsors are looking to give immunizations to about 7,000 of the 28,000 Bell County seniors.

Traveling teams of medical professional and

students will travel with Belton, Temple and Killeen Meals on Wheels programs to find seniors seeking immunizations.

The Texas Department of Health is training volunteers to give the vaccinations and handle paperwork for the immunizations.

The medical mobile clinic will be provided by Metroplex Hospital in Killeen.

Each year, 20,000 Americans die from influenza. In years of severe flu outbreak, 40,000 Americans will die. Ninety percent of these deaths occur to people 65 and over, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

## The Crucible part of Fright Nights

Set in 1692 Massachusetts, *The Crucible*, directed by Saladoan Ernie Patterson, is centered around the Salem witch trials in which 19 people were hanged for practicing witchcraft. John Proctor, Miller's protagonist, who otherwise minds his own business, is compelled to testify at the court's hearings due to personal secrets he knows about the accusers. Inadvertently, Proctor's testimony becomes the catalyst for the destruction of several eminent townfolk of Salem.

*The Crucible* is "an allegory of our times." For Miller, the play paralleled the tumultuous McCarthy hearings during the cold war when the question, "are you now or have you ever been a communist," echoed

through the chambers of the House Un-American Activities Committee setting the stage for the infamous blacklist of many of Hollywood's elite. However, *The Crucible's* stroke is much broader. The play's theme speaks right to the heart of a core value American's hold dear: innocence is assumed and guilt must be proved.

Many observers have said that *The Crucible* is about religion, Puritanism, or witchcraft. The characters in *The Crucible* mirror the people of today and it is their self-deception which leads to their self-destruction.

**The Vickery House** on N. Main St. It was built in 1885 by G. N. Vickery, Sr., for his young family.

**St. Joseph's Episcopal Chapel** on N. Main St. was established in spring of 1996. The first service was the liturgy for Ash Wednesday and Holy Eucharist.

**Lorree Sutton Home** on HomePlace Circle is nestled on a tree-covered knoll in Salado's Historic District. The Sutton home represents the much sought-after lifestyle of yesteryear.

**"Weatherstone"** on Pace Park Dr. is Salado newest bed and breakfast. It features two log cabins built by early settlers in the mid-1800s.

**The Summit**, on Old Mill Rd. is the home of

Robert and Doris Denman. The home was built by Col. Cliff and Lucille Pyle in 1970. The Pyles lived in a motor home on the location while the home was being built. The Denmans are the second owners of the home. The Summit overlooks Salado Creek and the Mill Creek golf course.

The townhouse of Frances Utley will also be on the tour. Located at 1710 Old Mill Rd., the Old Mill Townhouses were built in 1974 by Mac Sherrill, then the owner of Mill Creek. Each unit is individually owned. The Utleys purchased their townhome from Mrs. Alta Lackey in 1986. The architecture is of the cottage type, popular in the 1970s.

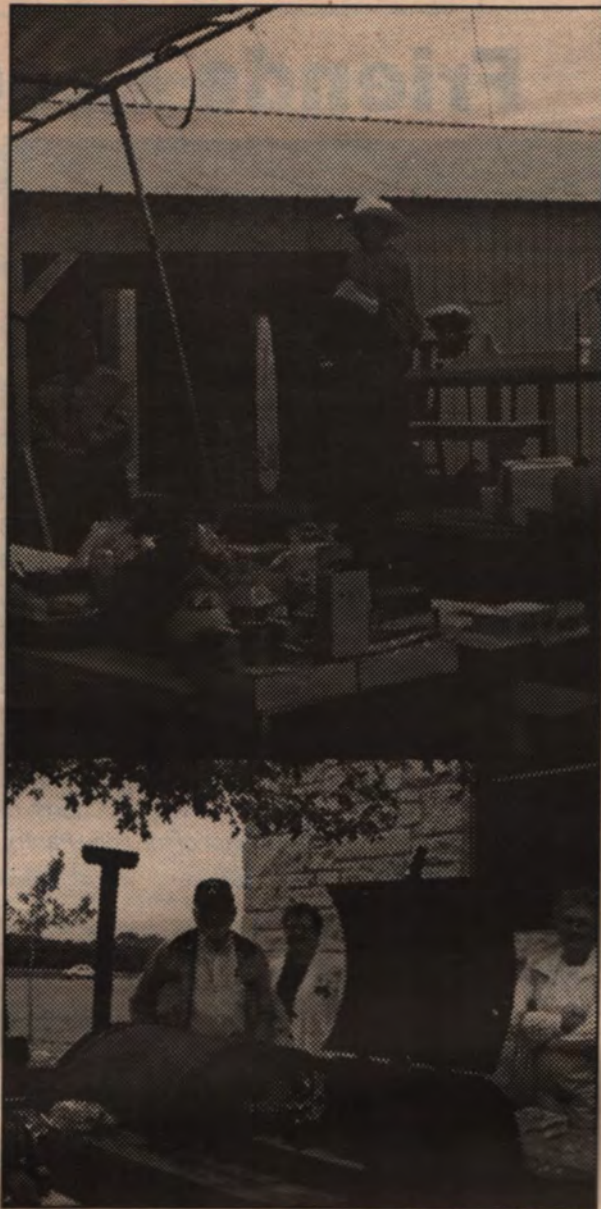

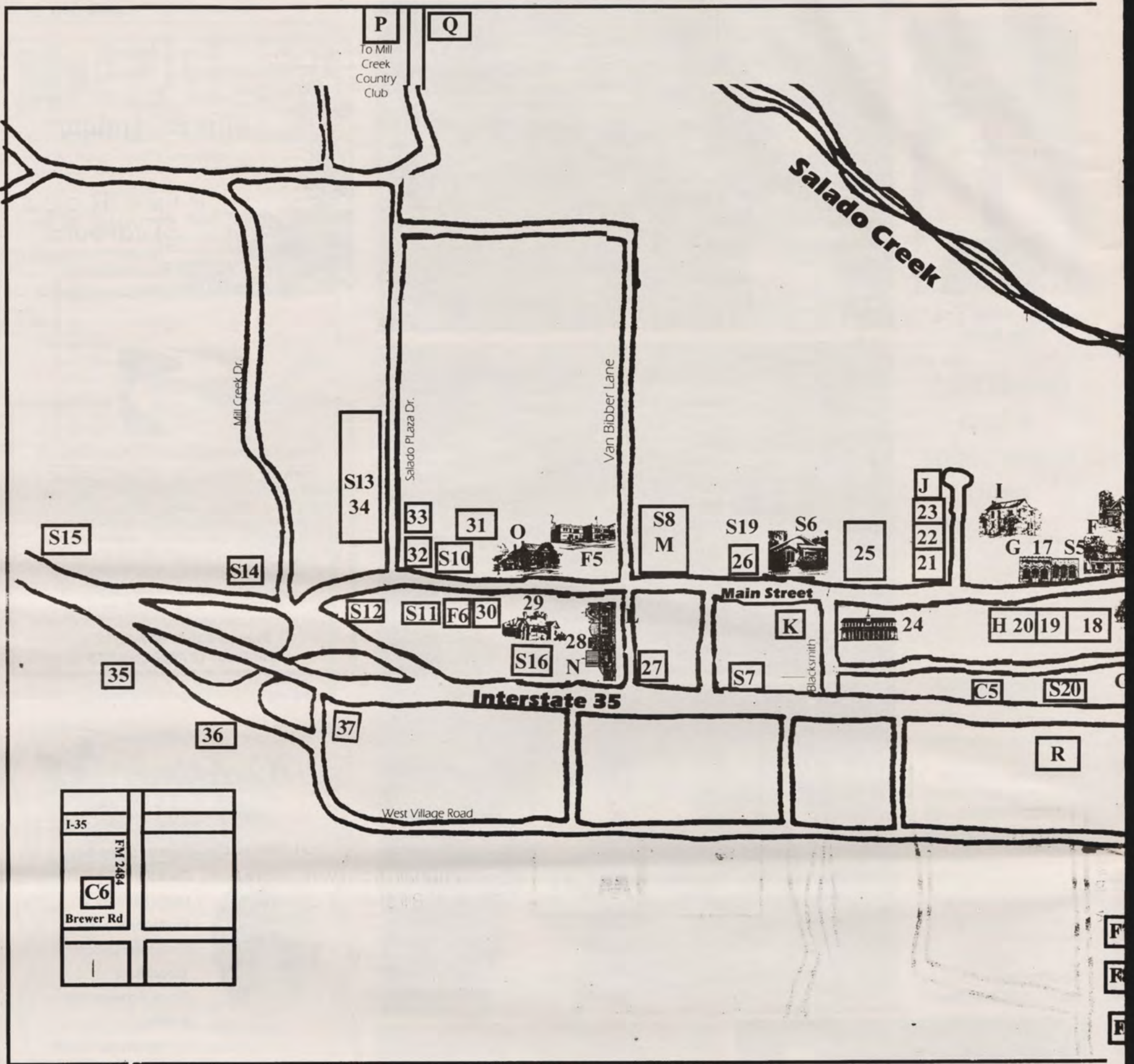

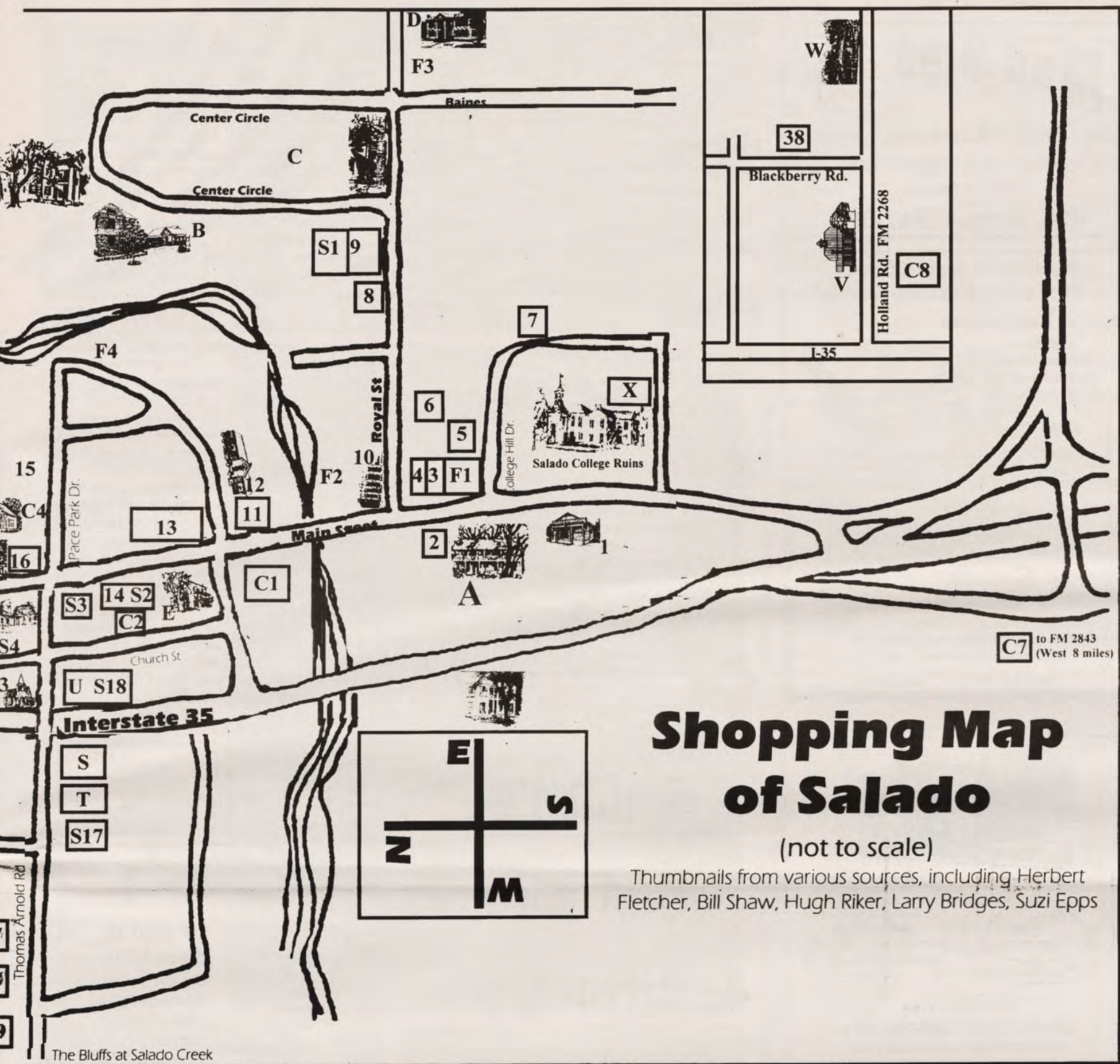

## Antiques...Antiques...

An antique dining room table is one of the most expensive pieces of furniture needed in a house. A good shopper can often find an old table at a bargain price. But there are pitfalls to be avoided when choosing a table. The table has evolved in the past 300 years as dining styles have changed. In the 17th century, the table was long and narrow, made to be used in a hall. Then came the gate-leg table that could be used on a round or oval table sized for the special room meant for dining. The gate leg swung shut, and the table could be moved to the side of the room.

By the 18th century, the table was often three tables, a center rectangle and two drop-leaf tables that could be added to the center table. All the legs on the three tables created a seating problem, so designers created the center pedestal table.

When buying a table, decide how many people will use the table and check the size of the table and room space. Be sure the table is

not too wide for the room. The average rectangular table is 30 inches to 44 inches wide. There must be space to pull the chair away from the table to sit down. A chair is at least 24 inches wide.

Notice the position of the table legs. Be sure they will not make a seated guest uncomfortable. Check the number of inches from the floor to the bottom of the tabletop or apron. It must be high enough so you can sit in the chair without bumping your knees.

Look underneath the table to see if all of the leaves are original. Small tables are often made larger with added leaves. Prices are determined by the style, the type of wood and the age. An all-original table that seats more than eight is desirable. If it is large enough for 12-16, it sells for a very high price.

For Thanksgiving dinner, fill the table with guests and be sure you own a tablecloth that is long enough to hang at least 12 inches over at each end. Cloths over four yards long are hard to find.

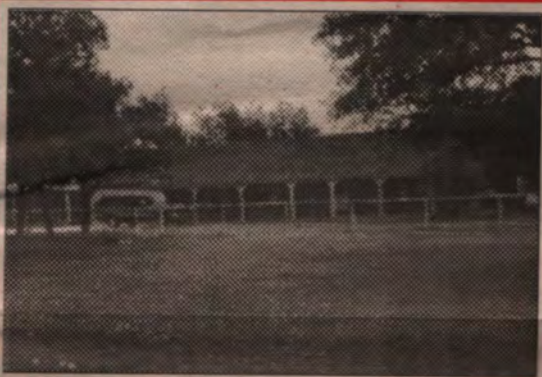

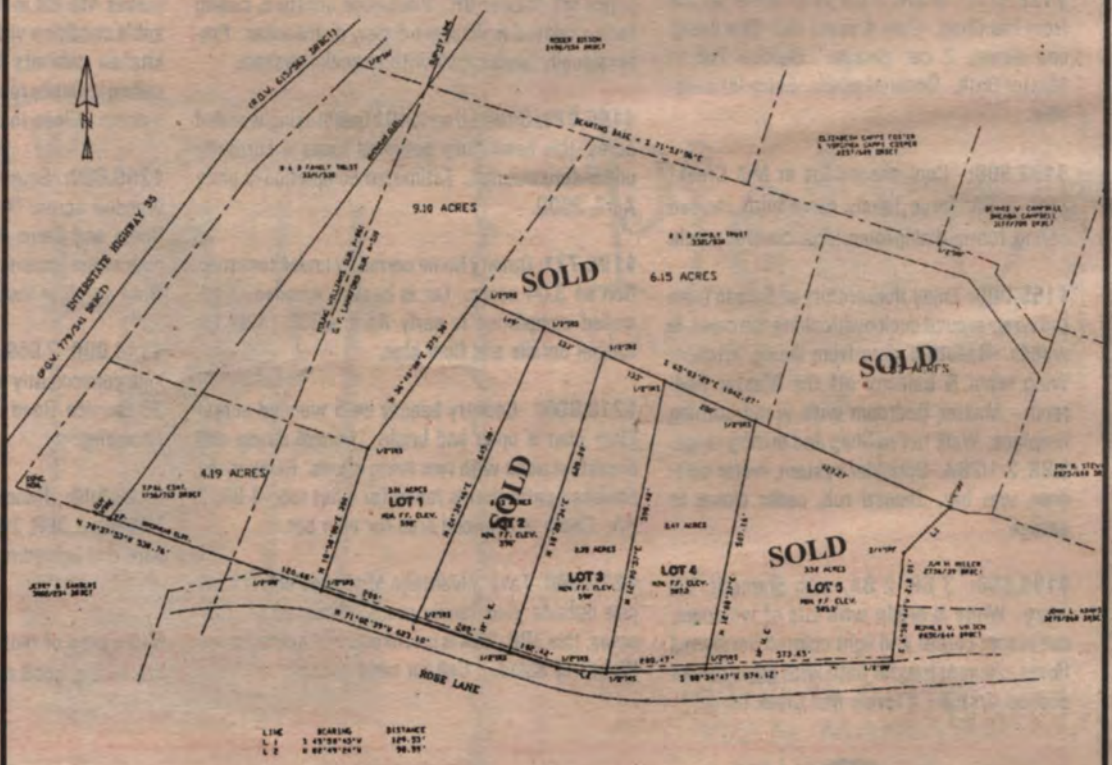
