

2020: Time to meet your newspaper staff

The *Salado Village Voice* newspaper was founded by the late Dayton Kelly with the first edition on February 17, 1979.

The newspaper has seen four decades of service to the Village of Salado.

For three of those decades, Tim and Marilyn Fleischer have been at the helm of the *Salado Village Voice*.

Salado Village Voice newspaper has always been a family affair, since its founding by Dayton Kelly in 1979. After Dayton's death, his sons Dennis and Bill operated the newspaper until the Fleischer family purchased the newspaper in 1988.

Salado Village Voice is locally owned and operated. "We are vested in Salado and invested in Salado," says publisher and editor-in-chief Tim Fleischer.

As we begin 2019, *Salado Village Voice* staffers would like to re-introduce themselves to the community they serve.

Salado Village Voice has a staff of four full time and one part time, including publishers Tim and Marilyn Fleischer.

Other staffers are Stephanie Hood, advertising composition and Royce Wiggin, office assistant and Shelby Kabler, archivist.

In addition to individual awards by staff members, *Salado Village Voice* has been honored by the community and state. The newspaper was the first-ever Business of the Year, awarded in January 2003 by the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

For more than 25 years, *Salado Village Voice* has published *Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas*, a quarterly magazine.

The newspaper also maintains an active website at www.saladovillagevoice.com and has electronic editions of the newspaper available for subscribers.

The newspaper joined the Texas Press Association in 2010.

Tim Fleischer

Tim Fleischer has been a newspaperman since he was 16, working for both weeklies and daily newspapers. "I got the Devil's Ink at an early age and haven't been able to get rid of it," he said of his 35 years in the newspaper industry.

For 30 years, he has been the editor of the *Salado Village Voice*.

But his love for Salado has been for more than three decades. "I came to Salado with my parents for the Art Fair and Gathering of the Clans when I was growing up in Coryell County," he said. "I drove through it every day on my way to run a small newspaper in Florence."

Tim and Marilyn Fleischer have published the newspaper since 1988. During that time, the newspaper has grown from an

eight-page tabloid to a full-size broadsheet newspaper with four sections.

"We have grown with the community and are a reflection of it," he said.

In those years, the newspaper has won several awards from the Texas Community Newspaper Association, where *Salado Village Voice* competed against newspapers from San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Austin and around the state.

Tim has won several TCNA awards: advertising design (third in state for large ad format and third in state for advertising series); editorial work (first in state for editorial writing, third in state for column writing) and second in state for community service (for articles during the incorporation election).

In 2019, he and Royce Wiggin won a Texas Press Association award for Feature Photography in 2019.

Fleischer has been named to the Texas Association of School Boards Media Honor Roll several times during his tenure at the helm of the newspaper, including the 2019 Honor Roll. Media are recommended and nominated for the Honor Roll by local school boards for their coverage of schools.

He has also served the community in a variety of capacities, including four different terms on the board of directors of the Salado Chamber of Commerce and six years on the board of directors of the Institute for Humanities at Salado.

He was president of the Salado Chamber of Commerce in 1998 and treasurer for two years of the Institute for Humanities at Salado.

Fleischer was Chairman of the Salado Chamber of Commerce in 2015.

He served a term on the inaugural board of the Salado Community Foundation.

He was also on the first board that established the Mentoring program in Salado.

Tim is a Mason and twice Past Master of the Salado Masonic Lodge #296. He served as District Deputy Grand Master for Masonic District #48 in 2011-12 and is the current Secretary for the Salado Lodge. He is the Lodge Flag Committee chairman.

Tim was installed on Dec. 28 as the Eminent Commander of the Temple Commandery #41 of Knights Templar, an appendant Masonic body.

He currently serves on the Pace Park advisory board for the Village of Salado.

He is known to great grandson Nate Timothy Potter as DoDo (like the bird).

He and wife Marilyn share responsibilities at the newspaper. "She runs the office and makes the busi-

ness decisions and I make editorial decisions," he said.

The Fleischers are voering their third generation of Salado kids. "We are recognizing the last names of the kids of those kids we covered in the late 80s and early 90s," Tim said. "Not very many newspapermen can say that they are covering multi-generations of families in a community."

"A community newspaper should be both a cheerleader and a conscience for the town it serves," he adds. "We celebrate our successes whenever we can."

"Because we live here, pay taxes here and serve in our community, we feel a responsibility to holding local officials accountable for their actions," he adds. "This is not always an easy thing to do, but we owe it to the taxpayers, businesses and residents to do this."

"The one thing I try not to do is to tell my readers what to think," he adds. "This is why we have not officially endorsed or opposed a candidate for school board or board of aldermen. We try to present, in as fair a manner as I know how, as much information as possible for the residents and voters to make up their own minds. This is why we have presented the questions and answers forums over a series of weeks leading up to local elections."

Marilyn Fleischer

Marilyn got the Devil's Ink in her blood after meeting Tim 31 years ago.

She is managing editor and advertising manager of *Salado Village Voice*.

She worked in the corporate world prior to the purchase of the *Salado Village Voice* in 1988.

She also owned and operated a business in the Killeen/Copperas Cove area for several years while raising her three children.

During their years in Salado, Marilyn has served the community in many ways.

"I think I have been most satisfied with my work with the Salado Family Relief Fund," she said. For her birthday in 2017, Marilyn

asked her friends to contribute to the Salado Family Relief Fund, raising more than \$1,000.

In addition to her work to establish the Family Relief Fund, Marilyn has also been Art Fair chairperson for multiple years, and served three years as a Chamber of Commerce Director.

She served two three-year terms on the Salado Civic Center board of directors.

She was on the founding board of the Salado Community Foundation.

She has also won awards from the TCNA. She has twice been honored. She won second place for Best Feature Photo and second place for Community Service for her work with the Salado Family Relief Fund.

The Fleischers helped to establish what became known as the Public Arts League of Salado and the Salado Ambassador Program.

The Fleischers' children -- Royce Wiggin and Jenny Potter, both graduates of Salado High School -- have grown up in the eye of the community. Royce graduated in 2007, beginning in second grade in Salado schools. Jenny began her school career as a kindergarten at Thomas Arnold Elementary School and graduated in 2009.

Marilyn welcomed her ninth grandchild to the world in 2015. Beren Crow Baggett was born on August 26, 2015.

Great-grandparents to Nate Potter, they are eagerly looking forward to the arrival of twin great-grandchildren in 2020.

Royce Wiggin

Royce Wiggin is one of those rare species: a native of Salado, born here on July 5, 1989.

His first home was the historic Levi Tenney House in Salado's Pace Park.

He has attended school in Salado since second grade graduating in 2007.

While in high school, he was a trumpet player in the Salado Eagle Marching Band.

He began work at the newspaper over the summer

of his junior year in high school.

His responsibilities include photography and reporting, classified advertising, placing and rotating ads on pages, directing phone calls in the office, proof reading, typesetting and a myriad of other duties.

This year, Royce has been the staff sports photographer, traveling to games on Tuesdays and Fridays to shoot football, volleyball, basketball, cross country, soccer and in the spring, track, baseball and softball.

He is the son of Tim and Marilyn Fleischer, owners of the newspaper, and is glad to finally get paid for all the hours he spends at the newspaper office.

He attends Temple College while working full time at the newspaper.

Stephanie Hood

Stephanie is a hometown girl at heart and a third generation graduate who is raising a fourth generation of Eagles.

"I am a country kid, I was 'raised here' as they say. The history of Salado and Bell county is intertwined with the history of my family. With that comes a certain respect for the old buildings, farms and the old timers who built the community we now call Salado."

Main St. at Campbell's Branch closes Jan. 5

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will close Main street at the FM 2268/Main Street Bridge at Campbell Branch in downtown Salado on Jan. 5.

The closure will allow the contractor to begin the de-

molition and replacement of the bridge at that location.

Northbound and southbound Main street traffic will detour via the I-35 frontage road to streets that access businesses north and south of the Campbell Branch Bridge.

The adjacent pedestrian bridge crossing at Campbell Branch will remain open throughout the project.

The Main Street bridge structure replacement is currently scheduled for completion by the end of March

2020. The \$5.2 million bridge replacement project began in May of 2019 and includes sidewalks and pavement upgrades at various locations along Main Street within the project area.

Work generally takes place between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, with some overnight work when the bridge is actually being replaced. The ultimate project completion is scheduled for early

Summer of 2020, weather permitting.

TxDOT urges residents to be cautious and watch for construction personnel and equipment in the work area.

The times they are a changing

To the Editor:

The times really are “a changing”: Older generations often recall the past as being better times. Some call this “selective memory”. I admit to this malady; however, a recent question set me toward an assessment of U.S. trends: My son asked if they still made pickup gun racks. They do, and after looking for one for my UTV and seeing none in trucks today, I was afraid they would stop making them, so I bought two. In 1964, I bought a new pickup - it cost \$2500. (Today’s replacement would be \$60,000.) The only accessory I bought was a gun rack. Then almost every truck sported one, and usually there was a long gun in it - and often a fishing rod. Like mine, even parked all day at Belton’s square, those trucks were seldom locked. Unlike today’s massacres, the rare shooting was personal and between belligerent individuals.

As did almost every schoolboy, I carried a pocket knife, and knife games were played before school and at recess. I don’t recall anyone getting stabbed or cut. When a freshman, my eighth grade teacher asked me to speak to her class about transition to high school. When I finished my talk, she gave me a present - a pocket knife. Check out today’s school rules on pocket knives.

I built on my ranch in 1966. The entry gate was a sagging “wire gate” of netting and cedar staves and closed by a wire hoop. My wife and I would often be gone for several nights and days, but nothing was locked. Now we lock up, and I keep a loaded shotgun beside my bed. Last year total strangers from El Paso and Killeen came onto my place and shot more than 100 pistol rounds before

being caught. Older Texans knew a fence meant “keep out.

We are assailed by multiple daily phone calls from crooks - foreign and domestic; a drug that sold for \$40 in 2001 now costs almost \$40,000; a banana taped to the wall sold for \$120,000; opiate dealing drug makers kill thousands and walk away with a hand slap and billions of dollars; church leaders abuse children, and the “church” protects the abusers; politicians “lie” the U.S. into a never-ending war and an economic collapse that still threatens the world’s economies, and then they are rewarded with taxpayer money and enhanced position. 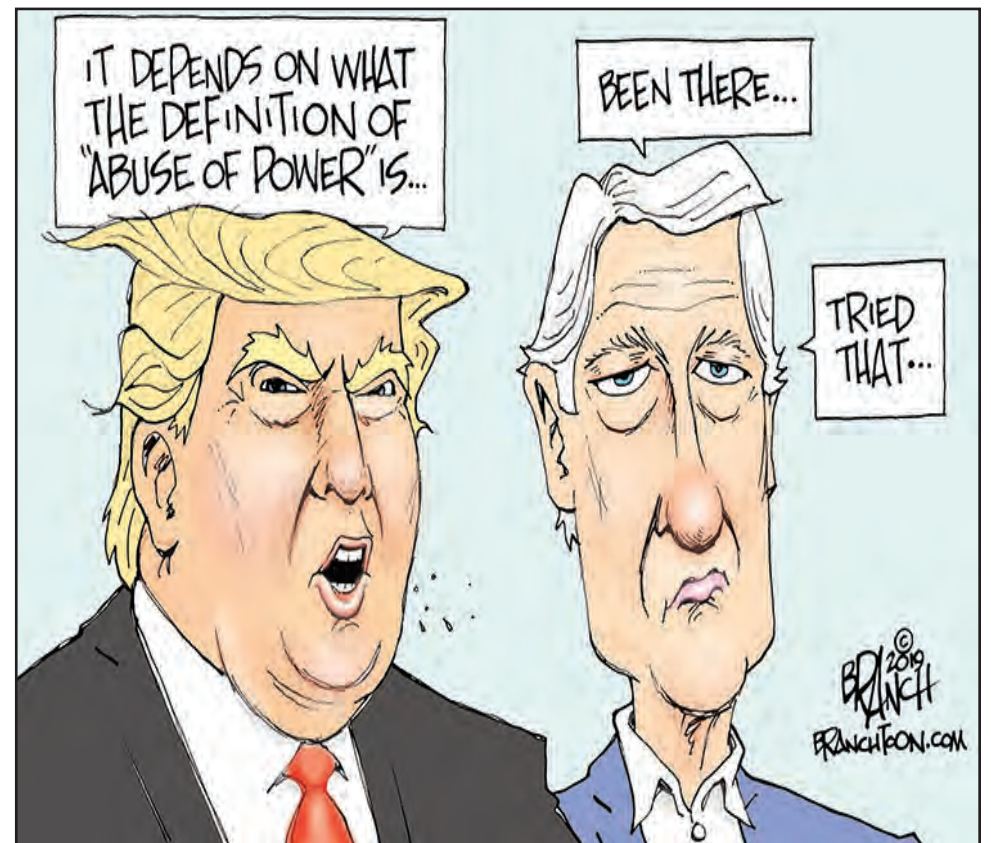
I want to thank all the financial contributors to the Gateway sign as well as the BOA and the City Administrator in completing a project that ran into a four year endeavor.

The Victim President

President Donald Trump’s impeachment letter to Nancy Pelosi is nothing if not sincere.

The missive establishes, if there were any doubt, that Trump hates impeachment with a passion, and he expresses his contempt in his own inimitable voice -- scornful, hyperbolic, colloquial, on brand (Russia Witch Hunt, Do Nothing Democrats, etc.) and, above all, aggrieved.

We’ve never had a president in the modern era who has actively cultivated an image of victimhood, a posture that once would have been considered whiny and weak, but that Trump has, through his personal alchemy, made into a kind of political strength.

It is inevitable that a president -- carrying out impossibly weighty responsibilities, in a very public capacity, while the opposition and press fasten on every peccadillo -- is going to feel besieged, misunderstood or otherwise unfairly treated.

This naturally often leads to private venting, brooding, plotting and perhaps even an overly defensive or peevish outburst in public.

The Prussian statesman Otto von Bismarck captured what might have been the experience of more than one president when he reportedly told his personal assistant one morning, “I

could not sleep, I hated all night.”

With the exception of, most notably, Andrew Johnson, who openly raged against his partisan enemies, the presidential mode is to try to keep feelings of persecution under wraps. But not Trump, who unashamedly airs these feelings and uses them as a weapon.

This has been his practice his entire adult life, and it has worked for him. He sought to outlast and wear down anyone in a dispute, unwilling to be, as he sees it, cheated of money, attention or glory.

As he put it in an interview early in the Republican nominating contest in 2015, “I am a whiner and I keep whining and whining until I win.”

One of his favorite words is “unfair.”

Part of the strength of Trump’s bond with his base is that his voters feel sneered at and attacked, and so identify with his plights. A passage in his letter to Pelosi that truly lands is his bitter account of the Russian investigation, during which the FBI abused its powers, the most outlandish speculation was routine fare

on cable news, and a special counsel investigation blighted the first couple of years of his administration.

He’s right to point out that impeachment is, essentially, an extension of this episode. It might be the best example since Hillary Clinton’s “deplorables” line of an affront that both Trump and his voters can take personally.

Trump will wave the bloody flag of impeachment until November as an example of how Democrats tried to get rid of him -- and disregard his voters. The timing on the cusp of an election year means impeachment works perfectly for this argument both looking backward and forward; it (partly) invalidates the 2016 election, while also short-circuiting the 2020 vote.

Still, Donald Trump occupies the most powerful office in the world, bedecked with all the majesty and pomp and circumstance that a republic can muster. The media hangs on his every word, and his name, long after his buildings are gone, will remain part of American history.

This is not the profile of anyone’s victim, and Trump would do more honor to the office if he brooded more and vented less. *Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review. (c) 2019 by King Features Synd., Inc.*

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Markets: higher profits despite lower earnings

Despite the hoopla about daily record closes, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) ended the week only 0.58% higher than last week at 3240.02, another record high close. The index is up 3.15% for the last month and 9.39% for the trailing three months. The stock market continues its series of record-high closes in hopes of better profits in 2020 despite lower earnings at this point than a year ago. The SPX price-to-earnings ratio (P/E), a measure of just how high the market really is, rose to 24.27, certainly well above the index's long term mean of 15.77, but not wildly out of bounds. Still, when the P/E ratio gets around 25, historically it has marked a countdown to a market correction that will take it back to much nearer the long-term mean (average). The P/E ratio is the current price divided by the last year's earnings.

Another measure of the "real" level of the stock market is to measure the dividend yield. When the SPX dividend yield is above that of the ten-year Treasury note, the market is considered by that measure to be "underpriced." On the other hand, when the ten-year Treasury is paying a high-interest rate than the market is in dividends, the SPX is "overpriced." The SPX current yield is 1.44% while the ten-year T-note is yielding 1.878%, suggesting the market is a bit rich.

Indeed, the 10-Year U.S. Treasury note closed out the week yielding 1.878%, down about 2.1% from its close last week. For reference, the yield is still almost a full percent lower than it was a year ago. West Texas Intermediate crude oil rose about 0.7% for the week to close at \$61.72.

paid to rank and file workers has barely outpaced inflation over the past several years. 2019 may mark the turning point for that anomaly. According to the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, pay for the bottom 25% of hourly wage earners rose 4.5% in November from last year at this time. Across the board, non-supervisory wages have risen 3.7% from last year.

The Christmas shopping season has turned out to be even better than expected for on-line stores if less than exciting for the traditional brick and mortar variety of businesses. Total U.S. retail sales for November through Christmas Eve rose 3.4% from a year earlier, according to Mastercard Spending Pulse. What was notable was that the same source reported that online shopping rose 19% in the same period. In-store sales rose only 1.2% despite extensive discounting. Not too surprisingly, major department stores like Macy's and Nordstrom saw total sales fall by 1.8%.

As usual, the retail good news was somewhat offset by manufacturing weakness. Orders for long-lasting factory goods made in the U.S. fell a seasonally adjusted 2% in November versus October. New orders for non-defense capital goods, excluding aircraft, gave a glimmer of hope as they rose 0.1%. The sector remains weak as the year over year gains in that sector were only up 0.7% but at least they rose.

Despite the tariff assist to U.S. Steel manufacturers United States Steel Corporation announced it was idling most of a mill near Detroit as company losses are increasing. The same tariffs that raised the price

of imported steel appear to have put the crunch on domestic manufacturers who use steel, dropping demand and with it, lowering steel prices. A large part of the problem seems to have come from domestic steel plants expanding on expectations of a permanent rise in prices and in doing so created a surplus in supply. The result is that more modern, more automated plants can turn out steel at a lower price with fewer workers. Tariffs have indeed made the industry more competitive, but ironically, resulted in net job losses for steelworkers. Those workers may not have much difficulty finding new employment, but often that employment is with a significant wage reduction.

After sagging for most of the year, U.S. car and light truck sales surged upward 1.9% in November. The reason appears to be record sales of commercial vans to package delivery companies in anticipation of the online sales boom that hit during the Christmas season. Year-over-year, passenger car sales fell 9.8% while sales of light-trucks, including delivery vans, rose 3.4%. Overall the auto industry sales declined 0.8% for the trailing twelve months.

The bottom line remains the same. Retail sales are growing but the underlying part of our economy that produces things to sell continues to shrink. The market is pushing its upper limits and the beginnings of the market euphoria that historically ends a bull market may be showing its head. In many ways, it looks a lot like the end of 1999 but only time will tell.

The 1987 world women's team championship was won by the United States after a nip-and-tuck struggle with France in the final. This deal was instrumental in the American victory.

The bidding shown occurred at the table where Judi Radin and Kathy Wei were North-South for the U.S. The opening one-club bid indicated

16 points or more, and the one-no-trump response promised eight to 13 points. Four rounds of bidding later, Wei found herself in a tenuous six-club contract that appeared headed for down one. However, this assessment proved a bit premature.

West's opening spade lead went to the jack and ace, and Wei's hopes brightened considerably when a club to the ten held the trick. But when she returned to her hand with the ace of hearts and finessed the queen of clubs, East showed out, saddling declarer with a sure club loser. Since she also seemed certain to lose either a heart or a diamond, the slam appeared doomed. There was still a chance, however, and Wei pursued it unerringly. She cashed the ace of clubs and the K-Q-10 of spades, discarding a heart and a diamond on the last two spades as West followed suit. Next came the king of hearts, after which she exited with a club to West's king.

As Wei hoped, West had nothing but diamonds left and so was forced to lead a diamond from the king, handing declarer her 12th trick with dummy's queen. Making the slam yielded a sizable pickup for the Americans, as the French pair at the other table rested quietly in three notrump, making five.

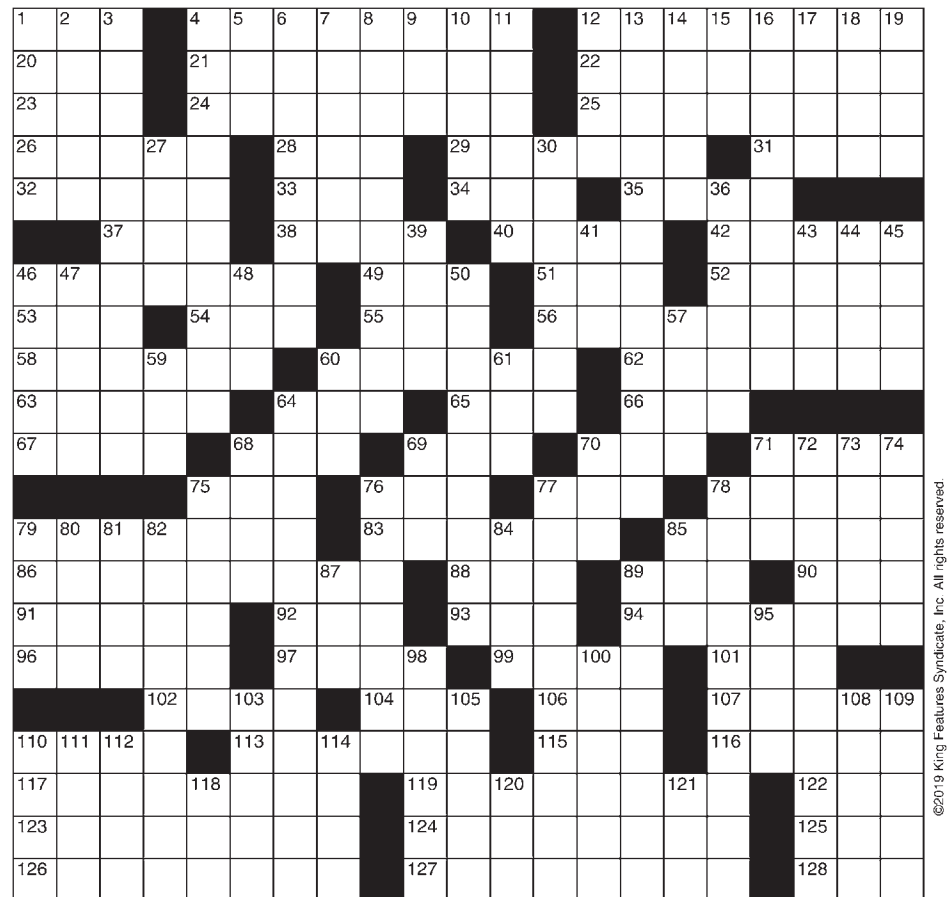

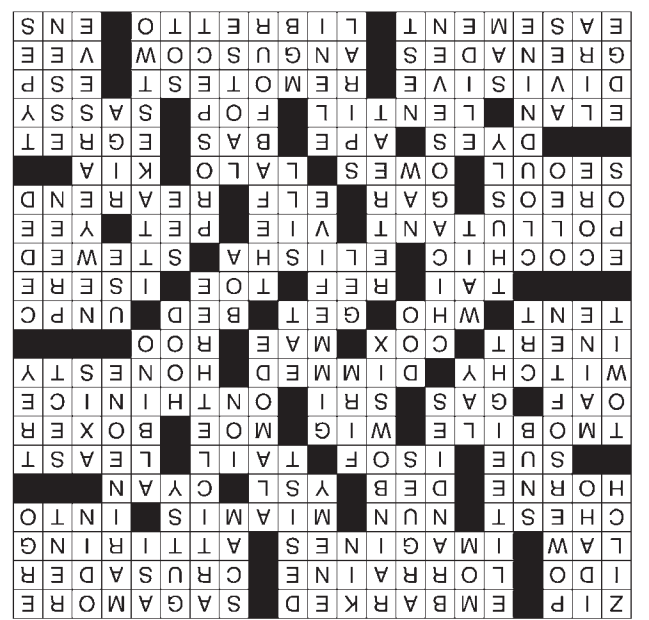
