Ft. Hood commanding general discusses Army's readiness, military might with Lions

Fort Hood's three-star commanding general told the Salado Lions Club that today's Army is changing from the days it charged up hills toward the enemy.

Too late for Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders at San Juan Hill in 1898, but just in time for the 21st century warrior.

"The Army is changing lightning fast," Lt. Gen. Thomas A. Schwartz told the Lions during their Jan. 14 luncheon at Mill Creek Country Club.

Schwartz has seen a number of changes in the Army -- "for the best," he stressed -- since graduating from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in 1967.

The St. Paul, Minn., native did not come from a military family (his father had served during World War II and his five brothers also served). But, as he told the Lions, "there was a tickle in the back of my mind to go to West Point."

The former high school All-America football player (a rangy 6-foot-5 lineman) nearly didn't go to West Point, however.

After his SAT scores were reviewed, it was recommended he attend prep school. But when he balked at the idea, officials reversed themselves and accepted him.

He recalled with humor a paper he wrote for an English class which had no grade on the front, but did include several red marks. On the last page, the instructor had written in red ink, "Is your native language English?"

Schwartz, who played football at West Point, would go on to earn his bachelor's degree and later returned to West Point to serve three years as a tactical officer. He also earned master's degrees in both psychology counseling and personnel management from Duke University and Salve Regina in Newport, R.I.

Prior to returning to West

TEXANS BIG ON REGULATORY REFORM

During my travels around Texas I get an earful of what's on people's minds. Last month, a Henderson County rancher told me federal environmental regulations are more of a problem than insect infestations and other natural disasters.

He longs for the "good, ole days" when the big challenges were the weather, market fluctuations and pesky insects.

A lot of Texans feel that way: sick and tired of being overly regulated and second-guessed by intrusive government. Responding to my annual questionnaire, 86 percent of you said you support Congressional efforts to roll back excessive regulation by federal agencies; 71 percent said that private property owners have a role to play in the effort to protect endangered species.

Here are some other Texas opinions on this sore subject:

From Fort Stockton: "Congress should require that all regulations, existing or new, are justified by honest, audited, proven science. Data provided by the Environmental Protection Agency is not always representative or correct. In addition, all regulations should be subject to a cost/benefit analysis before they are imposed."

From Coppell: "Congress should impose "sunset" laws to require periodic legislative review of government rules and regulations. If not reauthorized, those rules and regulations would fade from the law books."

From Brady: "The size and scope of all environmental agencies should be reduced. They operate with tunnel vision. They are too powerful, and ignore the rights of property owners."

From Rusk: "I say don't just roll back the environmental laws, repeal them."

From Kirbyville: "I consider myself a good steward of my land. I voluntarily protect endangered species on my property. But I expect and demand that the federal government butt out."

From Rochelle: "I have worked with the Environmental Protection Agency in the past and was often amazed at the extent to which its representatives were removed from reality. I had just run a long, extensive road test of methanol powered cars, when the EPA proclaimed that this was the answer to pollution problems and that cars could be converted for only "about \$3000." Our data certainly did not support such enthusiasm. The EPA chose to ignore the fact that methanol costs twice as much as gasoline, but only got slightly better than half the mileage per gallon. It reduced the emissions we measured, but greatly increased some that were not yet regulated. The whole program was and is a real loser."

From Eddy: "Some of these regulatory agencies act as if they are the law. It is extremely difficult for a private citizen or property owner to overturn one of their decisions, no matter how wrong. This is not democracy."

From Clifton: "Don't expect landowners to limit their use of their own property to accommodate any species. Evolution has always eliminated species. Why should we interfere with nature?"

From Onalaska: "I am for preserving valuable environmental resources, but in a way that demonstrates common sense — and preserves the constitutional protection of private property. Property owners should have a major role in deciding on efforts to protect species."

From Tomball: "Please give relief from federal regulations. They cause conflict and nullify any benefit to owning private property. You don't really own it, you just get to pay for it, while someone else tells you what you can and cannot do with it."

From Junction: "We need less federal government and more state and local government."

It seems to me Texans have a realistic view about the limits — and limitations — of government. Regulation has to be balanced against the need for America to stay productive and competitive, and, most important of all, free.

Dr. Lecocq retires from Scott & White after 14 years of service in dentistry there

Kenneth Lecocq, B.S., D.D.S., Director of the Dental Program for the Scott and White Health Plan and Associate Professor of Surgery at the Texas A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine, has retired after 14 years of service.

Dr. Lecocq has made extensive contributions to the establishment and development of the Dentistry program at Scott and White Memorial Hospital and the Dental Plan for the Scott and White Health Plan.

Dr. Lecocq joined Scott and White in 1982 as Chief of Hospital Dentistry. In 1987 he helped establish the Dental Program for the Scott and White Health Plan, and served as Dental Director, a position he currently holds. The Dental Plan now has over 78,000 members and 150 dental providers.

Before joining the Scott and White staff in 1982, Dr. Lecocq had private practices in San Antonio and LaSalle, Illinois. While in San Antonio, he also served as Director of

General Practice Postdoctoral Program at the University of Texas Dental School, which he created, and Chairperson of Postdoctoral Affairs Committee at the University of Texas Health Science Center Dental School. While in Illinois, he was also President of Rotary International and President of the school board of LaSalle-Peru Township High School.

Dr. Lecocq is a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry, the International College of Dentistry, and the American Academy of General Dentistry. He is a Certified Dental Consultant for the American Association of Dental Consultants, and a Life Member of the American Dental Association and the Illinois Dental Association. He is also a member of the American Association of Hospital Dentists and the Texas Dental Association.

Dr. Lecocq graduated from LaSalle-Peru Township High School in LaSalle, Illinois. He received his bachelor of science degree from the University of Illinois, and doctorate

in Dental Surgery from the University of Illinois College of Dentistry. He served a rotating residency in dentistry for the United States Air Force from 1954-1956.

Dr. Lecocq was raised in Oglesby, Illinois, the son of Frank and Mary Lecocq, both deceased. He had one brother, the late Frank Jr. Dr. Lecocq is married to the former Sue Stafford from Wedron, Illinois. The couple has four children, seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild. 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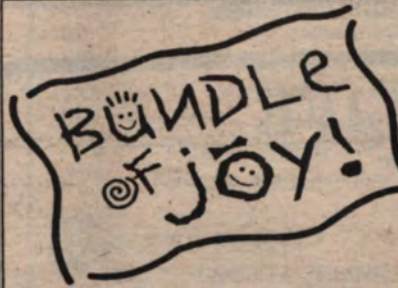

Cultivating God's Garden

Recently, I saw a beautiful rainbow. Its beauty defied description. The encyclopedia tells us that what I saw was an arc showing the colors of the spectrum, which is a display of light separated according to wavelengths. Each wavelength of light consists of a different color. Therefore, the rainbow appeared as a band of colors ranging from violet, with the shortest wavelength, through indigo, blue, green, yellow, orange and red, the hue with the longest wavelength. Now you know some facts about what I saw, but you did not see the glory and beauty of what I saw. Abstract knowledge about is one thing; experiencing its beauty is quite another.

In the first chapter of II Peter, he mentioned two kinds of knowledge. In vss. 5-6, he used a Greek word for knowledge that means the abstract information needed for spiritual growth. But in vss. 2,3,8, he used the Greek word that denotes a more complete, practical knowledge of Christ. These two terms differ in the same way reading about a rainbow differs from seeing its beauty. Friend, there is such a thing as knowing a lot of facts about Christ but not really knowing Him personally. Do not be satisfied with what someone else says about Him. Get to know Him yourself.

Eagles hold off Florence torrent

The Salado Eagles held a comfortable 11-point lead entering the fourth quarter at home against Florence Jan. 16.

Then the Buffaloes came alive behind the awesome performance of Dusty Feazell.

The 5-10 senior guard almost single-handedly beat the Eagles, scoring 16 of his team's 20 fourth-quarter points.

About the only thing that could squash his feat -- and prevent a Salado defeat -- was the boy's two feet.

That and the inspired play of Salado's David Kirk, who played like a man possessed.

Final score: Salado 48, Florence 45.

The win put the Eagles at 3-1 in district play and inched them closer to the .500 mark with a 10-12 record overall. They hosted Calvert Jan. 20 in a non-district game (results were unavailable at press time) and resumed district play Jan. 25 at home against league-leading Rogers.

"It was a key win, but we have several more to go," Coach Alan Haire said, catching his breath after the Florence game. FHS drops to 2-1 in district.

Salado led the entire game

and took its biggest lead at the end of the third quarter on a play more suited for the football field. But Florence tied the score at 40-all, with 3:35 left to play on one of Feazell's four three-pointers.

"It was his best shooting game of the season," Florence Coach Don Thorp said. "He stepped up."

Feazell, averaging nine points a game, took up the slack for scoring ace Brad Anderson. The Eagles concentrated on stopping Florence's top scorer, and his 13 points was 10 below his season average. Anderson did manage to score the four points in the fourth period that Feazell didn't.

Feazell nearly had a 17th point, on a basket with just

under a minute to play. But it was ruled that Feazell's foot was on the three-point line, making the shot a two-pointer.

A three-pointer would have tied the score, but instead made it 46-45, Salado.

Then, after Salado's Chris Michna missed two free throws with 34 seconds left, the Buffs set up for a potential game-winning shot.

But, with 17 seconds left, Feazell was called for traveling while shuffling his feet to set himself up for a shot.

Florence was forced to foul in an attempt to regain the ball, and Eagle Shawn Mitchell hit two clutch free throws with 12 seconds left to make it 48-45.

Controversy then occurred with just under 10 seconds to play when it was ruled that a Florence player was not in the act of shooting when he was fouled while setting up for a three-point shot. (It also cost Florence one of its vocal fans, who was tossed from the gym for some choice words to the ref.)

Instead of getting three free throws, the Buffs were awarded the ball out of bounds under the basket. But a potential game-tying shot with five seconds to play was well short of the basket, and the Eagles had survived a close call.

They won despite hitting just seven of 24 free throws -- four of 12 in the final period. Fortunately, Florence shot only three free throws the entire game, hitting two.

"It was a great defensive effort," Haire said, singling out Courtney Dodge and Robin

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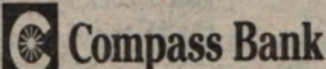

Lady Eagles sink Florence

The Salado Lady Eagles scored 29 first-quarter points against Florence Jan. 16-- their most points in a single quarter this season -- and cruised to a 67-33 win at home over the Lady Buffs.

The Lady Eagles, 19-6 overall, are atop the district standings with a 6-0 mark.

They went for their 20th win Jan. 20 in a non-district home game against Calvert (results were unavailable at press time) and resumed district play Jan. 23 at home against Rogers.

Salado, a game ahead of second-place Jarrell, starts the second round of District 26-2A play Jan. 27 at Holland.

Florence (1-4 in district) provided little competition for Salado. The Lady Buffs did manage to outscore Salado 17-16 in the second quarter -- some consolation for being outscored 29-4 in the first period -- but still trailed considerably at halftime, 45-21.

Salado extended its lead to 55-28 after three quarters, before Coach Larry Salisbury played his reserves in the final period.

Starters Leah Davis (13 points), Kathy Matthews (12) and Chrystal Whiteley (11) combined for three more points than Florence scored.

Melissa Matthews added eight points, and Katie Punchard and Lauren Quirk each had six. Quirk also grabbed a team-high seven rebounds.

The Lady Eagles were coming off a 55-24 win at Hutto Jan. 13. Salado led 10-4 after the first quarter, 29-9 at half-time and 43-14 after the third period.

Punchard had one of the team's best all-around games this season, with 20 points, four rebounds, four steals and

four assists.

Chrystal Whiteley chipped in 12 points, Liz Whiteley added nine, and Quirk had seven.

Quirk and Kathy Matthews led the team in rebounding with seven apiece.

Note: A win over Calvert would give Salado a fifth straight 20-win season in Coach Salisbury's fifth year as head coach. That, and a sweep of district (plus a win in a non-district game with Thrall tentatively scheduled Feb. 13), would match last season's 27-6 record. (Two of Salisbury's teams have won 27 games.)

A win over Holland would also give the program its 70th win in the last three years.

The JV beat Florence 41-31 despite playing with just five

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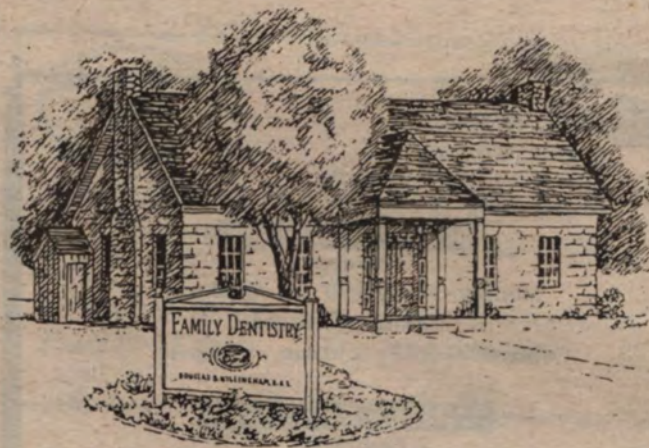
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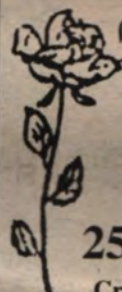

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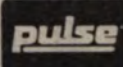

hope we can do some good things out here."

During a segment of his speech about Fort Hood, Schwartz noted that the post of 41,000 soldiers and 6,000 civilian employees has 180,000 people come in and out of its gates each day.

Schwartz said he thinks it's good that 80 percent of his soldiers live off post. "When we get to be separatists, that is not a good military. We want to integrate ourselves," he said.

Citing statistics from the State Comptroller's Office, Schwartz said the post has a \$3.7 billion economic impact on Texas' annual economy.

And business folks should take note that Fort Hood soldiers receive \$124 million in salaries each month.

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

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Sulphur Springs was once the site of bubbling pools of healing water

Around present day Sulphur Springs, Caddo Indians discovered bubbling pools of water curbed by native rocks and shaded by canopies of oak, cottonwood, willow and pecan trees. The water had a healing effect and the tribe used the springs for restorative bathing.

For specific ailments, they might sip water from the variety of mineral springs in the area or treat their illnesses with poultices from other water sources nearby.

The Indians held the springs in reverence. When they had to leave their tribal home, they left the healing waters and their camp grounds in pristine condition. When white settlers arrived, they found an area lush and beautiful, a perfect location to begin a new life.

Entrepreneur Eli Bibb established the first business in Sulphur Springs. In 1845 he built a one room cabin near the springs and sold basic items. He kept a small supply of whiskey and some of his home-made persimmon beer to sat-

isfy the thirst of travelers. He developed a campground on a four acre plot of ground that was described as one of the most beautiful spots in Texas.

The old campground today lies within the city limits of Sulphur Springs. In the developing years, enterprising men bought property around the spring lot and built hotels. Guests bathed in mineral water. Soon a public bath house was built on the spring lot.

Word about the healing waters spread and people came from every direction in hopes of curing their eye, kidney, stomach, skin and other diseases. Sulphur Springs became a resort town. New doctors opened practices and prescribed drinking the water and bathing in it. One doctor made a salve from the waters to treat eye problems.

There were several springs in the area, each one seeming to treat a specific medical problem. People with kidney disorders used water from the Jefferson Street Spring. Water from the Collegiate Institute Spring restored youth. The Crabtree Sour Well water

helped internal disorders and improved complexion.

One sickly man arrived from the east. Doctors had given up on him and he went to Sulphur Springs as a last resort. After drinking the water from the Crabtree well, his health had improved sufficiently for him to go to a farm south of town to help gather a bumper Elberta peach crop. At the end of the summer harvest he married one of the farmer's beautiful daughters.

Water from the Crabtree well had a bad taste. On Sunday afternoons, dating couples went there. If the young man could drink a cup of the water without making a face, he would propose.

The Downtown Square Springs provided drinking water to horses, oxen and mules. It was paved over in the 40's to provide parking spaces for automobiles.

The Spa business in Sulphur Springs is now a distant memory. The springs, which once were the source of growth for the city, are now a problem to builders. Many springs have been sealed with concrete.

We are expected to keep rest rooms open seven days a week as well as keeping the building properly cooled-heated, clean and well maintained - therefore we must turn to villagers to balance our budget through the annual auction," Clapp noted.

He continued: "We intend to fulfill our obligation to those who helped renovate the building, as well as the rest of the community, by keeping it in top shape so we can all be proud of the Civic Center. To do this effectively we must have help, therefore we are asking Saladoans to redouble their effort in supporting this year's auction."

The auction will again feature a excellent meal prepared by Clem Mikeska. Three meats including sirloin beef, barbecued chicken and sausage will be topped off with potato salad, beans, cole slaw, onions, pickles, homemade bread and iced tea.
