## Salado Art Fair time

Annual event Aug. 1-2 in park, along creek

The 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Salado Art Fair Aug. 1-2 under the oaks in Pace Park in downtown Salado, along the banks of the Salado Creek.

Featuring over 100 award-winning artists and artisans in a wide range of media, the Salado Art Fair has developed a reputation as one of the finest small-town art shows in the state.

The Art Fair will be open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug 1 and 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Aug. 2 with \$3 admission. Children 12 and under will be admitted free of charge.

Artists working in oils, watercolors, acrylics, pastels, photography and mixed media will sell their works in Salado. Sculpture, woodworks, glassworks, jewelry, metalwork and hand-made clothing will also be available.

An artists' reception 7:30 p.m.-9:30 p.m. Aug. 1 will be held at Jack's Barn, adjacent to Pace Park. The evening reception will include music, refreshments and a silent auction of works donated by participating artists. Admission to the

reception is \$15 per couple, payable at the door. RSVP to the Salado Chamber of Commerce at 254/947-5040 by July 27.

Live music sponsored by Tablerock Festival will be performed during the Art Fair for visitors to enjoy. A children's tent sponsored by Salado Pottery will have creative activities for youngsters.

Drawings will be held throughout the fair. Prizes include free night stays at some of Salado's Bed and Breakfast Inns, including Inn at Salado, The Rose Mansion and Country Place Bed and Breakfast.

Concession stands manned by volunteers from Salado's civic, church and youth organizations will offer food and drink, including barbecue, snow cones, fudge, ice cold drinks and much more.

There is free parking throughout the village with shuttle buses to the show.

Salado artist Ronnie Wells has captured the 'Spirits of Pace Park' in his original watercolor used for the 32<sup>nd</sup> An-

nual Salado Art Fair poster.

The original painting captures a view of Salado's Pace Park, home to the annual Art Fair.

kids in the private schools where there is greater discipline without legal hassles, but will not stand for that same discipline in the public schools they wish to leave.



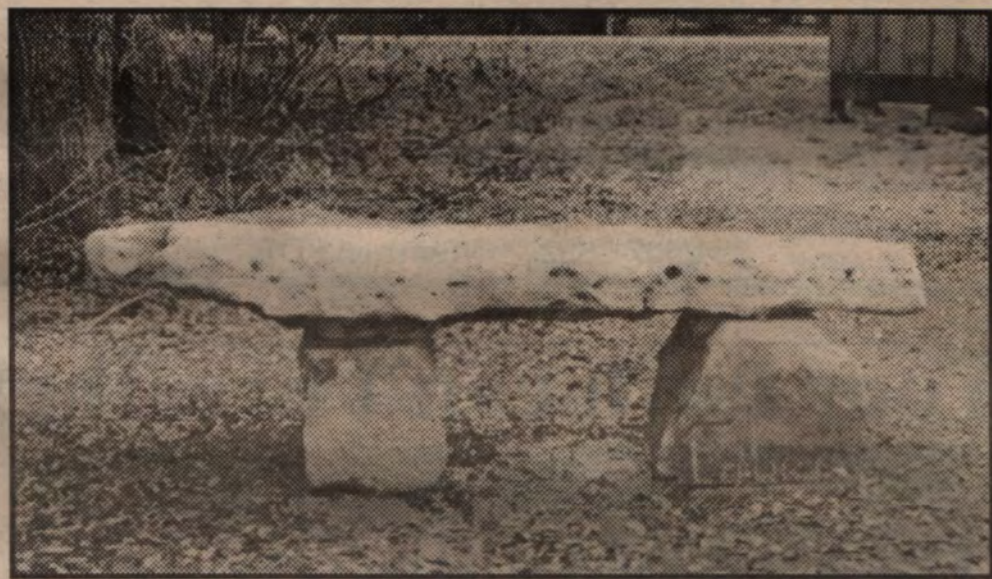

## Salado's future discussed

"Georgetown and Round Rock were not prepared for the growth they have faced. We need to be prepared for what is coming up I-35," one citizen declared during a town-hall meeting July 7 on the future of Salado.

While incorporation of the business district was the first topic of discussion, it gave way to others: fire safety and insurance rates, septic tank and sewage, protecting Salado Creek, dealing with the sudden growth of Salado, volunteerism and others.

Salado Fire Chief Wayne Rutherford addressed the group of 50 or so villagers about recent changes in law from the Legislature. "We used to piggy-back on Belton for our fire safety rates, but the Legislature has eliminated that," Rutherford said, adding that the Salado area now has a rating of 7 for homes within 500 feet of a fire hydrant and within 5 miles of a fire station and a rating of 9 for homes more than 5 miles from the fire station and more than 500 feet from a fire hydrant.

"Back when I was in school, a score of 32 was considered failing," Rutherford said about the rating system. The Salado Volunteer Fire Department is

working to better that score, he said, by purchasing new fire trucks.

The SVFD has entered a lease-purchase of three trucks: a 1993 pumper truck, 1995 rescue truck and a 1973 reserve pumper. The annual lease payment on the three trucks is approximately \$25,000.

"It's pretty scary when you sign your name on the line for \$250,000," he said.

A possible approach to improving fire safety is an Emergency Management District, which would create a local taxing authority to generate funds for use by the local fire department. An elected board would oversee those revenues, Rutherford explained, likening it to the recently-approved Salado Public Library District.

Rutherford termed this a "stop-gap measure," adding that the water delivery system in Salado would have to be improved in order to get better insurance rates.

In other discussion, villagers talked about incorporating the downtown business district, incorporating the whole of Salado Proper and finding other solutions besides incorporation for addressing the problems facing the village.

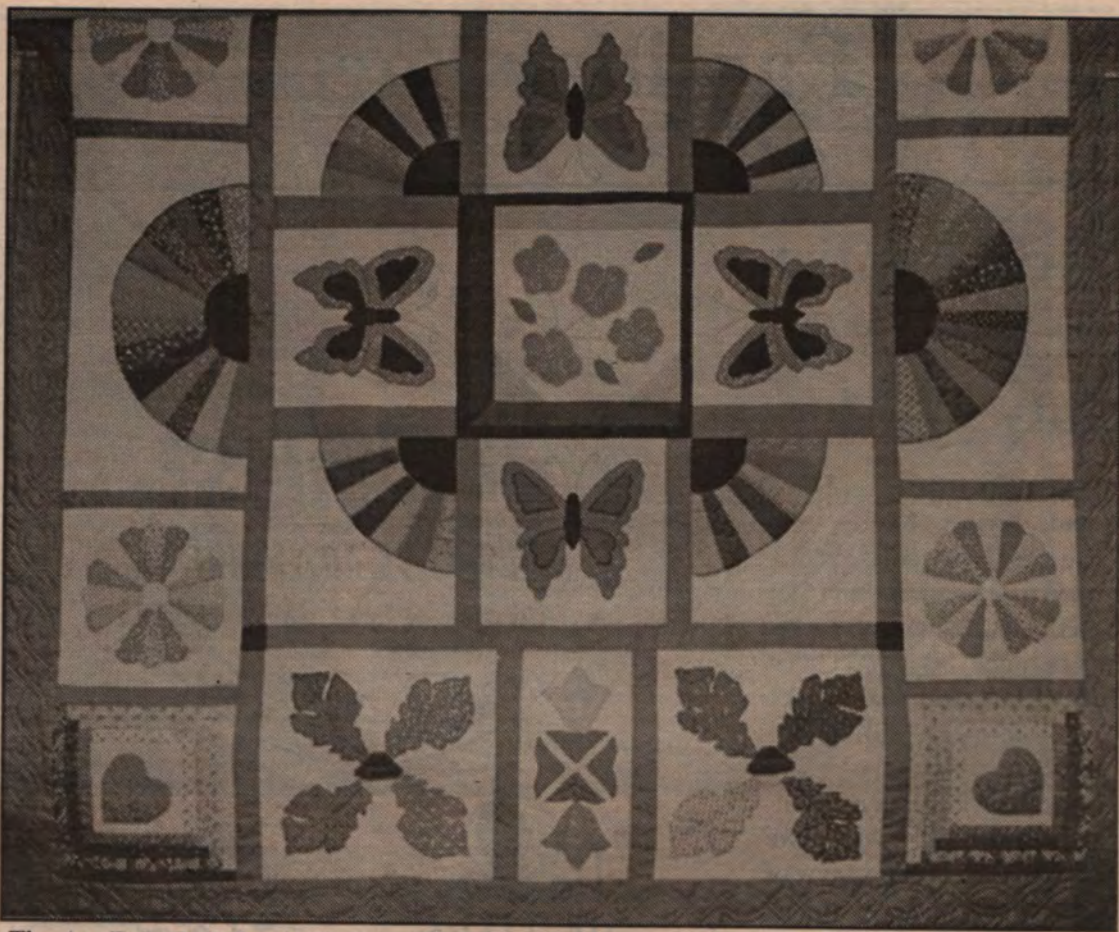
While no action resulted from the town-hall meeting, those attending stated that a grass-roots approach to the village problems is the best.

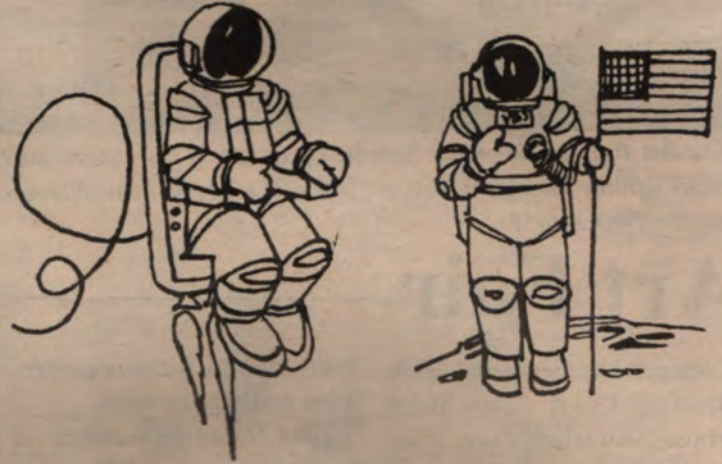



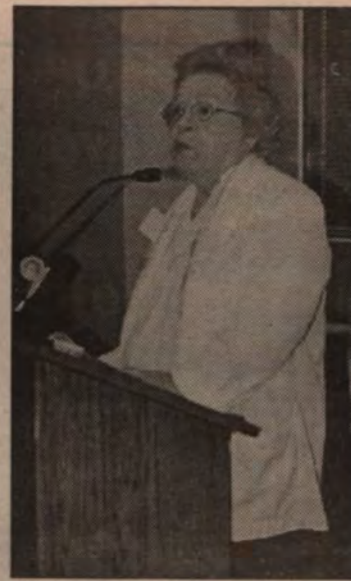

# Texas sports writers select David Kirk second-team Class 2A All-State catcher

David Kirk, who graduated from Salado High in May, has been named to the Class 2A all-state baseball team as selected by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

Kirk, a catcher, was a second-team selection. Three teams were selected.

Salado High baseball coach Melvin Bates said he was disappointed that Kirk wasn't named first-team.

"I can't believe there's another 2A catcher in the state with better stats," Bates said.

Kirk batted .489, with seven home runs and 31 RBIs. He set school records for hits (46), doubles (15) and runs (48) in a single season as the Eagles posted a 25-3 record and advanced to the regional finals.

He was named MVP in District 26-2A, after hitting .534 in district play. The Eagles posted an 11-1 mark in district play and then defeated Hutto in a district playoff game to determine the district champ.

Kirk went 2-for-3 with an RBI in that game, a 7-6 nine-inning affair.

The Eagles ended the season June 1 with a 4-3 nine-inning loss to Comfort in the regional finals.

Kirk plans to continue playing baseball at Tarleton State in Stephenville. He is currently playing for Baseball Academy of Texas in Round Rock and his team will participate at the AAU Nationals in Orlando, Fla., later this month.

Last month, the 6-foot-1, 185-pounder was selected to the Texas Baseball Coaches Association All-State team,

along with teammate Chris Michna, a Senior '99.

## Ings is the place for all sorts of unusual things

Tucked inside an old one-room schoolhouse on Royal Street is an off-beat shop featuring an eclectic mix of *tribal art & assorted whimsys*.

Ings (rhymes with *things*) offers imports from Indonesia and Micronesia, as well as some Native American crafts.

Owner Ingamaj Knutsson had lived on the island of Guam (a U.S. territory in the Pacific where she lived before moving to Texas last November) and visited Indonesia on several occasions.

She also worked on Micronesian islands doing archaeology, and is quite familiar with that colorful part of the world and what it has to offer.

"I've always been a collector of strange things," she said, her friendly face framed by long blond hair parted down the middle.

"Living in Guam, I started going into Indonesia. I started collecting unique things and wanted to bring them to other people's attention."

Like the green hand-painted Manta Ray kite that hangs among the various items at the shop. Kites are quite popular in Indonesia, as she discovered during one particular trip.

"They were flying their kites and they were just spectacular," she said. "The Indonesian people love kites. The children even take plastic bags and make kites out of them."

# Annika Garcia, third place essay winner in high school division

3rd Place, \$200 Annika Garcia  
 It's very sad that cigarettes have been promoted as a signifier of rebellion and independence when the reality is that young people are being manipulated by a vicious industry. Young people seem to think that smoking is cool and smart, but it's hard to see what's cool about being addicted and losing the unqualified freedom to choose not to smoke.

There are many reasons why I choose never to smoke. Among young people who smoke one or more cigarettes a week, 3 in 10 light up their first cigarette of the day within 30 minutes of waking. Six percent smoke within the first five minutes. Only 1 in 10 can wait for as long as two hours before smoking. These alarming figures indicate a degree to which teenage smokers quickly become addicted

to nicotine. Young people who experiment with cigarettes quickly become addicted to the nicotine in tobacco.

Another reason I choose never to smoke is the law. Texas teens caught smoking face fines, education courses and community service. The anti-tobacco law, approved by state lawmakers lets law enforcement officers catch anyone under 18 smoking, or possessing tobacco products, send those teens to court. There, the minors would be sentenced to pay fines, attend education courses or complete community service.

I would encourage my friends not to smoke for several reasons. The first reason is that tobacco use is the NO. 1 preventable cause of death and disease in our country. It kills more Americans than AIDS, crack, heroin, cocaine, alcohol, car accidents, fire and murder combined. I would like



for my friends to stay my friends, and help them to choose never to smoke. Another reason I would convince my friends not to smoke is to inform them of the danger and health risks that smoking involves. Heart disease, lung cancer, throat cancer, and addiction are all results of smoking that can end your life.

We know that 90 percent of smokers start before the age of 18. The number of younger smokers has grown in recent years. In 1987, 15 percent of smokers were between the ages of 18 and 24, compared with 22.9 percent in 1995. The Centers for Disease Control estimates one of every three children now using tobacco products will die at an early age from a tobacco-related disease. More than 400,000 Texas youths now use tobacco products and it is estimated that one of every three children now using tobacco products will die early from a tobacco-related disease. You can't tell young people they're going to get sick, because they think they're invulnerable, but when you start telling them they're being used by adults—that really gets through.

# Country performers entertain crowd that includes Hood commander Gen. Schwartz

FORT HOOD -- Central Texas county music fans were entertained by a pair of traditional country singers from Texas -- up-and-comer Lee Ann Womack and million-selling artist Mark Chestnutt -- during the 1998 Community and Family Support Dog Days of Summer Army Concert Tour, which made a stop at Hood Stadium July 10.

Opening act Womack -- named Best New Country Artist during the American Music Awards in January -- overcame the stifling heat that was still prevalent at the concert's 8 o'clock start (her hit single,

"Never Again, Again," an apt mantra perhaps, for those attending their first Dog Days of Summer concert, now in its fifth year).

Still, Womack (not to be mistaken for Leann Rimes, as she was at the end of her set) set the stage for headliner Chestnutt to rope in a willing crowd estimated at over a thousand -- including the post's commander, Lt. Gen. Thomas Schwartz.

By the time Chestnutt had thrown his hat into the crowd and signed off with, "We'll see ya," he had wooed the crowd with more than 20 songs dating back to his 1990 debut. He capped off his hour-long show -- never stopping, not even to introduce his solid band -- with

a 15-minute encore.

Chestnutt and company were going full guns by his seventh song of the night, "Brother Jukebox," his first No. 1 hit from November 1990.

That was followed by the lively, "Your Love Is A Miracle," as a full moon rose above the stage.

The crowd gave perhaps its best feedback for "Almost Goodbye," the sixth of Chestnutt's 11 No. 1 hits in seven years. Its rock-like guitar licks and insightful lyrics -- "sometimes the most important words are the ones left unspoken" -- set the tone minutes later for Chestnutt's latest No. 1 hit from '97, "Thank God For Believers."



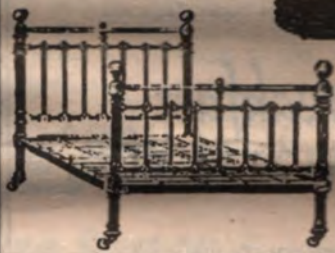

**Dennis Furlow to show Shaker wood boxes at Art Fair**

Carrollton artist Dennis Furlow will show his Shaker wood boxes at the 32nd Annual Salado Art Fair Aug. 1-2 in Pace Park.

Furlow is one of over 100 artists who have been accepted to show at the juried art show.

Other artists will show in all media of art, including oil painting, watercolors, pastels, acrylics, pen and ink drawings, pencil drawings, sculptures, woodworks, furniture, jewelry, glass, pottery, clothing and mixed media.

"These are all 100 percent handmade by myself," Furlow said of his wooden boxes. "Thin strips of wood (.050" to .150" thick) are heated, bent around a form (after the fingers are cut) and hand-nailed with small copper tacks so they won't discolor the wood or rust."

"Tops and bottoms are usually made from quarter-sawn stock to minimize shrinkage. Wooden pegs secure the tops

and bottoms to the bands," he explained.

Boxes range in size of 1"x2" to 15"x22" with bands made of maple or cherry. Tops and bottoms are made of various woods such as birds-eye maple, cherry, aromatic cedar, chestnut, and oak.

"The boxes store easily because you can nest a whole set of them in the space of one when not in use," Furlow said. "A handle can be put on them if you need one to carry items."

"The Shakers used these boxes for kitchen dry goods, herbs & spices, sewing notions nails, seeds, personal items, even as a spittoon with wood shavings," he added.

"Oval boxes, oval trays, and oval carriers were sold to the 'outside world' for more than 150 years," Furlow said. "None of their other products were sold as long."

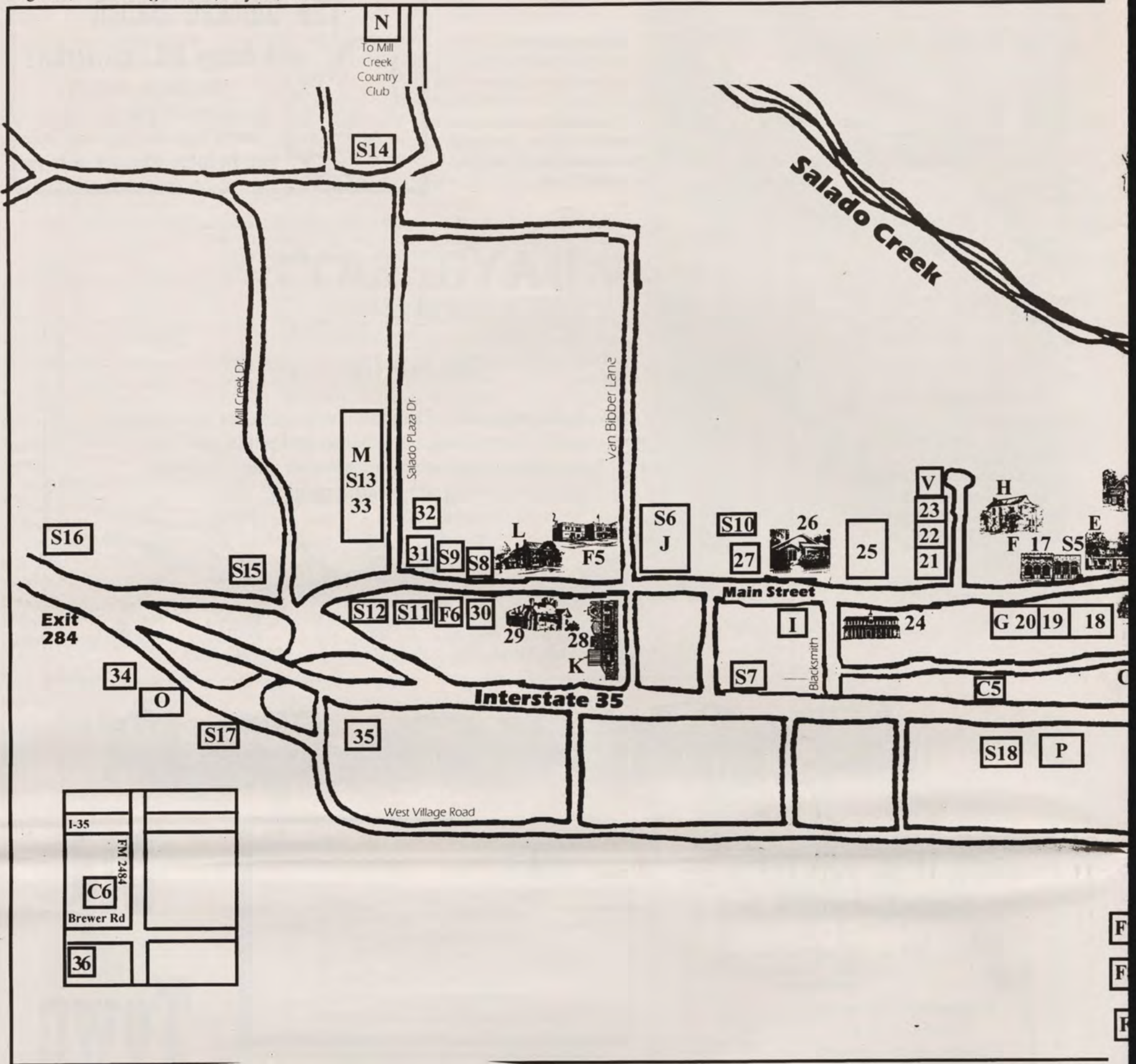

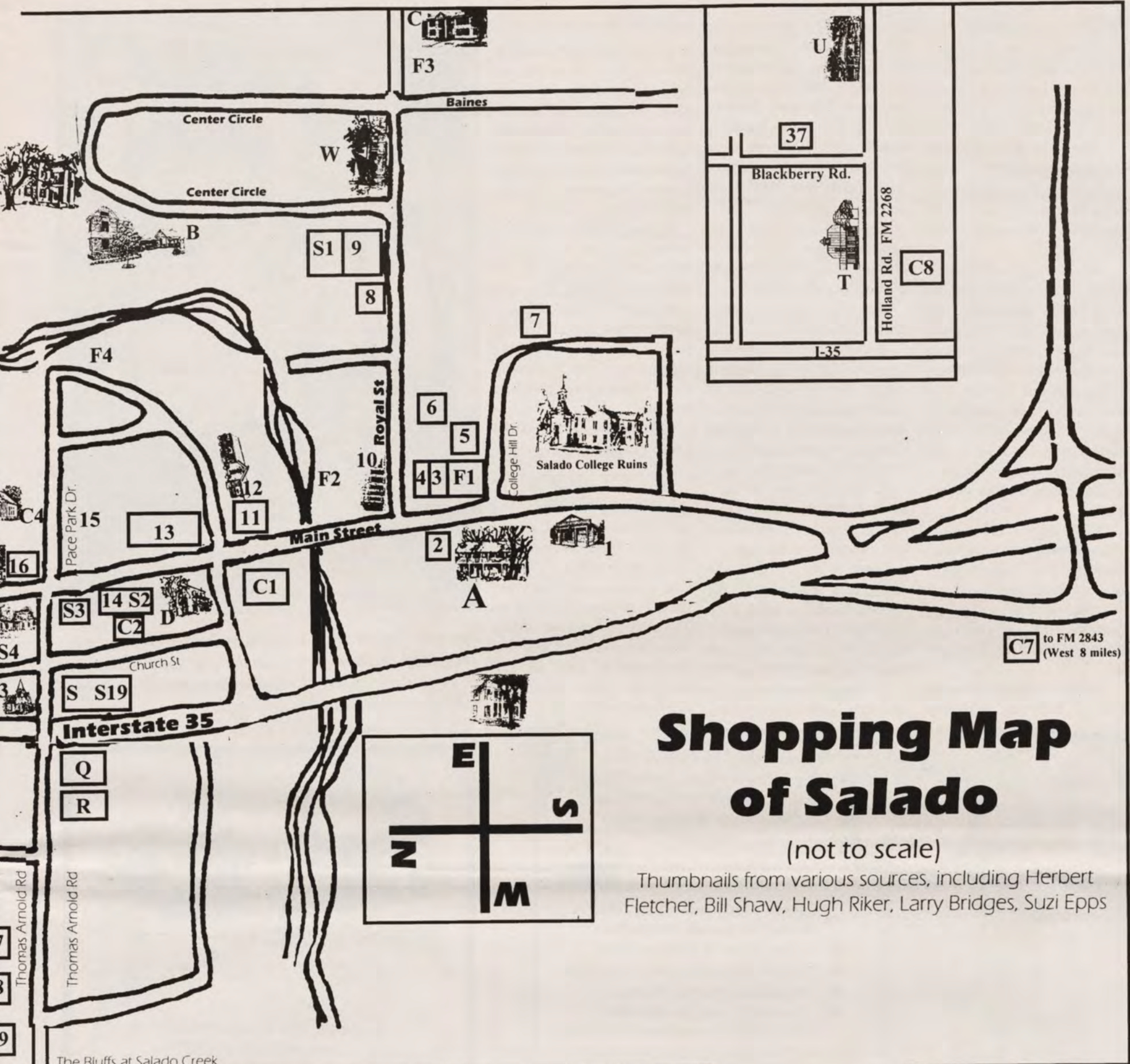

lived in Hawaii for five years, she knew that mainland tourists would hesitate on some purchases because of limited space on the flight back.

Take, for instance, the outrigger replica hanging on the wall at Ings. It will fit easier in most four-doors than in an overhead compartment of a 737.

Also, Ingamaj liked Salado's central location and its proximity to Dallas and Austin. She first came to Salado two years ago while visiting friends in Texas, and liked what she saw.

Ingamaj was familiar with small towns, having lived in the artist community of Bentonsport, Iowa, (pop. 35), home of the historic Restored Village, along the Des Moines River.

"I thought it would be interesting to have a little shop here," the former owner of Bentonsport Pottery explained. "I had a cooperative art gallery (which she started) in Bentonsport and really enjoyed it."

A native of Eksjo, Sweden, (about halfway between

Stockholm and Copenhagen, Denmark), Ingamaj had moved to Middle America with her American husband. The two students met in Sweden in the 1960s, although both were studying in different parts of Europe at the time, he in Spain and she in Germany.

The studious *beatnik* became a mother of two (a boy and girl, now both grown), and eventually a grandmother.

But don't let the Granny glasses fool you.

Ingamaj still has the spirit of someone half her age (depending on the particular day, of course) and doesn't think twice about hopping on a plane and flying halfway around the world to search for interesting items.

In May, she went to Indonesia, and stayed on the island of Bali because of political unrest elsewhere in the area.

Some of the treasures she discovered overseas are the handmade baskets available at the shop. "I find it amazing that someone can spend a month making a basket," she says.

The textiles in her shop are also handmade. Several of the

so-called *Batik* and *Ikat* textiles are still worn by the natives and the designs are very traditional. (Some of her textiles may eventually hang on the walls of Java Noodles Restaurant in Austin, with accompanying stories on how they are made.)

Ingamaj's goal at Ings is to be able to offer "an eclectic blend of folk art from several areas and countries," she said.

"I hope to expand that and to offer things from all over the world. I like the idea of visiting people I buy from -- learning about who they are and how they live.

"That contact makes the items come alive."

*Ings is located at 112 Royal Street in Salado, just past the tennis court, across the street from Dusty Rose.*

*Business hours are 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. each day (although generally closed on Tuesdays). Hours on certain Saturday evenings may expand until 10 p.m., but call first. The phone number is (254) 947-4336.*

# Friedrichs art on display at local banks

Throughout July and August examples of the needlework and quilting of Wilhemenia Friedrich and the photography and oil paintings of Egon Friedrich will be on display in the lobbies of the First State Bank and Compass in Salado.

Wilhemenia Carsten Friedrich was born and raised about three miles east of Salado. In the fall of 1925 she entered first grade in the new Salado Schoolhouse, now the Civic Center, driven there in a horse drawn cart by her older sister Josephine.

Her first sewing project was hemming dishtowels by machine at 10 years of age. At 11 she began to embroider after her paternal grandmother gave her a small cedar chest containing scarves and embroidery floss. When she was a senior in high school she took a class in Home Economics and at the end of the year received the Certificate of Honor.

After graduation, with the help of her mother, she started piecing and quilting. By the time she and Egon married in 1939 she had completed five quilts for daily use. She also made her clothes and home accessories as well as most of her sons' shirts using feed sacks for material.

Wilhemenia taught herself to crochet after her mother passed away in December 1957 leaving many spools of crochet thread and hooks as well as a book titled How to Crochet.

In 1978 she became a charter member of the Salado Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary and made her first benefit quilt for that organization.

In 1983 she joined the Village Artists and is still quilting, crocheting and sewing and sharing her skill with others.

She has won many awards for her beautiful quilts.

Egon Friedrich has been a farmer and rancher for sixty years.

In his early school years he developed an interest in drawing and painting, but was discouraged from developing his talent by one of his teachers who "came up the aisle from the rear, looked over his shoulder, popped her ruler on his desk, told him to put his drawing away and that she never wanted to see him drawing again."

Sixty years later he resumed painting after a drawing class with Jim Sim Benton. He has also studied with Laura Reinowski, Troy Kelley, and at the Robert Garden School of Art in Irving, TX and Temple.

He is a member of the Village Artists and has won awards for his photographs and paintings.
