Salado Eagle Bots are the SHS Robotics teams, which competes in UIL competitions which also fall under the FIRST Robotics Umbrella. FIRST Robotics is an international organization which hold competitions throughout the U.S. and the world. The competition rules and the season's challenge are released every January. The teams are given six weeks to design and build a robot to meet this challenge. They then compete against other teams in district wide events. The winners of the district competitions compete at the state level. The state winners move forward to compete in the world competitions which are held in Houston every year. The world competition includes teams from across the U.S. as well as international teams.

"Unlike other team events robotics competes across the board with teams from all UIL levels. Many of these teams are from larger and better funded schools. These larger schools are able to provide better equipment and materials to build their robots. There is even a team from Houston that is sponsored & mentored by NASA robotic engineers," Small said. "Despite the obvious disadvantage our team has against these teams our students represent Salado well in both ability and attitude."

"Last year our team competed in the quarter-final rounds in both of the district competitions we attended. In the past the Eagle Bots were selected by the state championship team to join their 3-bot team to compete in the world competition," she added.

"Building a robot, travel expenses, and competition entry fees are quite expensive," Small said. "Our team is responsible to raise our funds through various fund raising events."

"We have reached a point that, despite our prior successes," she said, "it is difficult to sustain our momentum and continue to compete against the larger schools without increasing both our fundraising and/or sponsorship activities."

Capital business investment grows by paltry 0.8%

The Markets

After peaking on the day before Thanksgiving at about 3154, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) felt a bit overstuffed and sagged back a bit to 3140.98 as it closed out the day early on Black Friday. Still, it turned in a very respectable 1.21% gain for the shortened week. It is now up 3.4% for the past month and 7.4% for the trailing three months. To provide our traditional perspective, nonstandard the week's 1.21% gain puts the Index 3.8% higher than it was at the end of July and up at an annualized rate of about 4.6% since February 2018.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury note failed to get in the holiday mood as it fell 5 basis points to 1.782%. The Treasury yield curve remains essentially flat out to five years where it was showing a 1.635% yield. The curve is, in essence, predicting that interest rates will be slightly lower a year from now, at around 1.6%. The bond market is thereby collectively predicting a mild recession in 2020 but like most predictions, it is to be taken with a grain of salt. West Texas Crude oil (WTI) rather suddenly fell from \$58 per barrel mid-day on Friday to close at \$55.42 at the end of the day, taking it down 4.33% for the week. Traders credited the drop to a resurgence in pessimism on the U.S.-China trade war and resulting global demand for oil.


The broad economic news initially looked fairly cheery this Thanksgiving week as the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) revised the third quarter Real GDP growth rate with its "second" estimate, raising it from the first estimate's 1.9% to 2.1%. In the same report, the BEA reported the

core PCE Price Index, the Federal Reserve's preferred measure of inflation, was rising at a 2.1% annualized rate in the third quarter, almost exactly at the Fed's target of 2%.T he report also revealed that the revised higher growth rate was primarily from increases in inventory, suggesting that pre-tariff hoarding was still a factor in the economy. Inventory buildup is, in effect, borrowing from future GDP numbers and in the event of a downturn can later become a negative GDP input.

While the revised third-quarter GDP data were pleasant, October, the first month in the fourth quarter, produced some less delightful results. For the first time in many months, personal income did not rise but rather came in at 0%. Disposable personal income sagged in inflation-adjusted dollars by 0.3%. U.S. household spending was up by what initially looked like a healthy margin of 0.3% for the month, but looking a bit deeper revealed the increase was from higher electric bills and more expensive gasoline. The darker side of the report revealed that spending for longer-lasting goods fell at a 0.7% rate. That core PCE inflation rate that reflects the change in prices on things that consumers actually buy each month, dropped back to a 1.6% year-over-year rate, indicating demand may be softening. Another bit of concerning news the Wall Street Journal reported that capital business investment by the companies in the S&P 500 grew only 0.8% in the third quarter and without



Meanwhile, the CPB World Trade Monitor reported on Monday Nov. 26 that the volume of global trade dropped by 1.3% in September and is now down 1.1% from this time last year. It is important to remember that profits are generated by trade. A persistently declining trade volume globally will eventually create a global recession and we are part of the global economy.

Last but not least in the litany of news from the dismal science, the Conference Board's Index of Leading Economic Indicators (LEI) declined for the third consecutive month in October, down 0.1%, after falling 0.2% in August and September. Those declines bring the six-month average down to a -0.1%. The red flags are not up, predicting an imminent recession, but we are seeing yellow flags and if

the LEI reports continue to fall, the probabilities of a recession in 2020 will grow from the roughly 50% level we are currently seeing.

Overall the data are strongly indicating a better than even chance of a mild economic recession in 2020.



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Impeachment

Nancy Pelosi said she undertook impeachment "prayerfully," and apparently what she was praying was that she could get it over with as soon as possible.

The House is preparing to send a flagrantly incomplete factual record to the Senate as the basis of an effort to remove a sitting president for the first time in our history.

Pelosi has affected a posture of heavy-heartedness since the outset of the process, saying that "there's no joy in this" and urging a somber spirit as Democrats pursue the facts wherever they may take them -- so long as that's not too far into an election year.

In substantive terms, the Democrats had a good set of public hearings before Adam Schiff's intelligence committee in recent weeks -- with one gaping hole. They didn't have anyone with first-hand knowledge of Trump's directives on Ukraine or his state of mind. The closest was EU ambassador Gordon Sondland, who, still, could only "presume" a quid pro quo over the defense aid.

There are people who probably don't have to presume, and Sondland named some of them: Trump's personal counsel Rudy Giuliani, acting White House chief of staff Mick Mulvaney, Vice President Mike Pence and Secretary of

State Mike Pompeo. They all were closer to this than Sondland, yet Democrats are happy to make the guy from the outer bounds of the inner circle their "star witness" and forgo the inner circle. To get the more central witnesses requires litigation since they all have at least colorable claims of privilege. The Democrats don't want to wait for the courts.

The minimum requirement of a historic impeachment case, only the fourth in our history, would seem to be a complete account of the facts. Schiff used to say as much: "We have to flesh out all of the facts for the American people. The seriousness of the matter and the danger to our country demands nothing less." Now, the seriousness and the danger are demanding that Democrats rush things along so the president can be impeached by the end of the year.

No matter how often Democrats say, "Let's honor the Constitution," their actions say, "Let's check the box."

Democrats have had the difficulty from the beginning of trying to build an

edifice of impeachment and removal atop the narrow foundation of the Ukraine episode, and now they aren't even going to finish the edifice, content with what they could complete in a two-month investigation largely reliant on the testimony of people who weren't around for the main events (former U.S. ambassador to Ukraine Marie Yovanovitch) or were out of the loop (former Trump Russia adviser Fiona Hill).

With every day that passes it becomes a little more absurd to say Trump should be impeached and removed when the public can make its own verdict in the election. Besides, Democrats know that impeachment is going nowhere in the Senate, so why bother locking down the case to make it worthy of the gravity of the process?

They might as well go with what they have, a partisan impeachment pursued on a political timetable. During Bill Clinton's impeachment, it was his defenders who were saying, "Let's move on." Now, it's Trump's pursuers, who prayerfully and sorrowfully want to get impeachment over with.

Bell County Cities to receive Child Safety Fees Vehicle Registration County Fees

In 2001, Bell County Commissioners Court authorized the county to collect \$1.50 on each Vehicle Registration.

In the Bell County 2019 Fiscal Year, \$435,636.00 was collected with Vehicle Registrations.

By Texas Law, Transportation Code, Chapter 502.403, the amount collected must be distributed to the municipalities in the county based on population and must be used for Crossing Guard Programs.

If there are no crossing guard programs, School Districts can use the funds on health, nutrition, child abuse prevention and intervention, or drug and alcohol abuse prevention.

"The FY2019 amount is the largest amount collected since Bell County started this

program and is \$7,741.50 lated with the populations more than FY2018", Shay Luedeke, Bell County Tax Assessor-Collector said. "It's the result of registering 290,424 vehicles in Bell County during the fiscal year.'

Col. (Ret.) Jean D. Tarbutton USAF age 99, of Salado, Texas passed away on Saturday November 23, 2019. was born in San Antonio, Texas, on October 27, 1920, to James Wilford and Gladys DuPuy Tarbutton. He attended public schools in Palestine, Lufkin, Houston, and Brenham, Texas. He graduated from Brenham High School in 1937. At the college level, he attended the Allen Military Academy, Texas A&M University, the University of Maryland, and the University of Mary Hardin Baylor. He was awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree in general studies and a Bachelor of Science degree in education.

Prior to World War II, he was employed at the Hughes

as a second lieutenant in October 1942. In combat, he served in the Aleutian Islands as a dive bomber pilot and in the European Theater of Operations as a fighter pilot, flying the P-47 Thunderbolt and the P-51 Mustang. On December 5, 1944, while engaged in aerial combat on his 62nd mission, his P-51 caught fire and he was forced to bail out near Berlin, Germany. He was captured and placed in a prisoner of war camp where he remained until the camp was overrun by the Russian Army near the end of the war. In 1946, he received a regular commission in the United States Air Force and remained on active duty until he retired in February 1970. He retired in the grade of Colonel with an aeronautical rating of Command Pilot, and his last duty assignment was Base Commander, Bergstrom Air Force Base, Austin, Texas. His duty assignments included service at the base level, major air command level, and Headquarters, USAF at the Pentagon, Washington, D.C. 

The Central Texas College Culinary Arts program will host the last Patio Café Cuisine Nights dinner of the fall semester this Friday, December 6. The menu features a Middle Eastern cuisine and will be served from 6 to 7:30 p.m. in the culinary arts area of the Student Center.

The dinner starts with an appetizer, soup and salad. The appetizer is gebnamakleyah, or Egyptian feta cheese balls, (\$7.50) - feta cheese coated in seasoned breadcrumbs. The soup is lentil and Swiss chard soup (\$7 for a bowl or \$.50 for acup with an entrée) - warm and hearty soup with a combination of lemon lentils, Swiss chard, tomato and many spices. The featured salad is chicken shawrma salad (\$9.50) romaine lettuce, cherry tomatoes, cucumber and mint topped with chicken and lemon tahini dressing. Or diners can choose the house salad (\$3.75 or free with an entrée) - a blend of fresh salad greens, carrots, cherry tomatoes, cheese, cucumber, bacon bits, crouton and choice of dressing.

The entrees are pan-fried sea bass (\$19) - sweet and spicy fish sautéed to perfection and garnished with harissa sauce and rose;

pomegranate-glazed chicken (\$16.50) - oven-roasted half-chicken glazed in pomegranate molasses and juice then topped with buttery pine nuts; and kofta meatballs (\$17.50) - Lebanese-style meatballs made with flavorful spices and fresh herbs topped with lemon tahini sauce.

Each entrée is served with a choice of two side dishes. The choices are roasted cauliflower - roasted fresh cauliflower served with lemon tahini dressing; grilled carrots - grilled carrots served with cumin-serrano yogurt sauce; spicy Lebanese-style potatoes - diced potatoes tossed in flavorful spices and finished with a hint of lemon juice and cilantro; and Lebanese rice - rice, vermicelli noodles and olive oil garnished with parsley. Each side dish is also available a la carte.

Salado had five first team offensive players and five first team defensive players named to the 2019 District 8-4A All-District Football team which was released this week after Connally Cadets were eliminated from the playoffs by Gilmer.

Kofi Stoglin was named the Newcomer of the Year. Stoglin had three fumble recoveries during the season for the Eagles. He also casued two fumbles and broke up two passes. 

"What script do you use?" Harry questioned. After I hemmed and stammered around a bit, Harry said, "In other words, Jackie, you want me to write a script based on Dickens' story of A Christmas Carol and then direct the play?

"Exactly." I explained. And he did.

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





A defender is often forced to assume that a specific lie of the cards exists without knowing whether in fact it actually does. The defender makes the assumption after reaching the conclusion that if the desired situation does not exist, there is no hope for a favorable outcome.

Consider West's predicament in this deal. He led the club jack, taken by dummy's king. The jack of hearts was then finessed, losing to West's king. The question at this point was what West should do next. won with dummy's king, drew trumps and tried a spade finesse. East won and returned a diamond through the J-6, and declarer went down one, losing a spade, a heart and two diamonds.

The queen-of-diamonds play was far from just a lucky shot. It was based entirely on what could be seen in dummy and the play to the first two tricks, as well as the bidding.

West realized that if declarer had the king of spades together with the strong hearts and ace of clubs he was already known to hold, there was no possibility of beating the contract. He therefore had to assume that his partner held the spade king.

However, that would give the defense only three tricks — a spade, a heart and a diamond. One more would be needed, and the only hope lay in diamonds. Furthermore, the trick had to be established before the king of spades was dislodged; otherwise, South could discard at least two diamonds on dummy's spades.

Once this determination was made, the only remaining question was which diamond to lead. The play of the ace or a low diamond would hand South a second diamond trick whenever he held the jack; only the lead of the queen could neutralize declarer's jack if he had it.

So West led the queen, and South had to go down one.

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
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

The Tyson Home - designed by the architect Darwin Britt with old pine piers and beams reclaimed from wooden warehouses.


The Corbin Home - A one-of-a-kind home on a hill curated with an eye for Frank Loyd Wright's Prairie Style.



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
