



Filing starts Jan. 15 for local elections

The first day to file for a place on the general election ballot in any of three Salado elections is Jan. 15. The last day to file for a place on the ballot in those local elections is Feb. 14. The last day to file for a declaration of write-in candidacy in those local elections is Feb. 18.

There will be three local political elections on May 2: Village of Salado Board of Aldermen and Mayor, Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees and Salado Public Library District.

Two two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen will be on the ballot for May, as well as a two-year term as the Village of Salado Mayor.

Skip Blancett will complete his third two-year term as Village Mayor. We reached out to Blancett about whether he was going to file for re-election, but have not heard back from him as of presstime.

Frank Coachman will complete his third two-year term on the Board of Aldermen. He told *Salado Village Voice* that he has not yet made a decision about seek-

ing re-election.

Michael Coggin will complete his first two-year term on the Board of Aldermen. Coggin told *Salado Village Voice* that he may run for mayor. If he does not run for mayor, he will run for re-election to the Board of Aldermen.

Three three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees will be decided in the May election. Kim Bird will complete her fourth three-year term on the board. Troy Smith and Nate Self will both complete their first three-year terms.

Bird and Smith told *Salado Village Voice* they will file for re-election.

Two two-year terms come up for election in May on the Salado Public Library Board. Bill Kinnison will complete his fifth term on the board and Nancy Mills Mackey will complete her third two-year term.

The last day to register to vote before the May 2 election is April 2. Early voting will be April 20-28. Last day to apply for a ballot by mail is April 20. Last day to receive ballot is May 2.

Last day to register to vote in party primary is Feb. 3

Orange voter registration cards went out recently to Bell County voters for the upcoming March 3, 2020 primary election.

Jan. 1 is the first day to apply for an Annual Ballot by Mail for early voting of the March 3rd Primary Election. The last day to apply for a Ballot by Mail request (must be received, not postmarked) is Feb. 21. The deadline for receiving Ballots by Mail (must be received, not postmarked) is March 3.

Registered voters that fall into one of the four following categories are eligible to vote by mail: Individuals 65 years or older; Disabled;

Will be out of the county on Election Day AND the entire period of early voting; Confined to jail, but otherwise eligible to vote

Applicants for ballot by mail may submit applications to: Bell County Elections Department, P.O. Box 1629, Belton, Texas 76513.

The last day to register to vote in the March 3rd Primary Election is Feb. 3.

Despite its warm, fuzzy acronym here is what SECURE Act does

The Markets

Despite the near-panic level of Friday's international news, for the week ending January 3, the Standard & Poor's 500 Stock Index (SPX) lost a mere 0.16% to close at 3234.85. That still left it up 2.83% for the trailing 30 days, 9.58% for the trailing three months and a whopping 28% from last year's opening week. Of course, it is good to remember that the SPX fell about 16% in the last quarter of 2018, so the net gain from before that drop is rather less impressive. Since simple arithmetic doesn't work when we are using percentages, we can cut to the chase and announce that the net gain in the market for 2019 after subtracting 2018's near-bear market was only 11%, a less startling but still impressive number. All indications we can see suggest that 2020's gains will be less enthralling.

The U.S. ten-year Treasury obviously missed the party as its yield dropped 12.8 basis points to close at 1.78%. The interest rate slide started shortly after the markets opened on January 2 and continued to the end of the day on the third. Shortly after bond trading opened on the second, the yield briefly touched 2% but then turned steeply down. The bond market appears to be unimpressed with the Phase I trade agreement. Political tensions in Southwest Asia were credited with causing West Texas Intermediate oil prices to rise 2.06% for the week to \$62.99. Bad news there, as usual, translated into good news out in the oil patch.

The Economy

The economic news as 2020 begins is much the same as when 2019 ended. Holiday retail spending was up significantly over last year. The best estimate so far is that consumers spent about 3.4% more this holiday season than last. Mean-

while, the factory sector of the U.S. economy continued to shrink in December. The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) announced that its US Manufacturing Index declined to 47.2 in December from the 48.1 reading in November. That was the lowest reading since the bottom of the recession in June of 2009. Readings below 50 indicate contraction. December marks the fifth consecutive month in which U.S. manufacturing has declined.

The SECURE Act

In the closing days of 2019, President Trump signed the Setting Every Community Up For Retirement Enhancement (SECURE) act. As far as we can tell the SECURE act has nothing to do with communities and doesn't make much of anything more secure, but it is a testimony of what Congress can do with bipartisan motivation and good PR staff to create warm and fuzzy acronyms.

What the SECURE Act does do is alter retirement planning if you have an IRA or tax-deferred annuity. First, it raises the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) starting age for IRAs to 72 from the current 70 1/2 if you haven't yet reached 70 1/2. Second, it provides two more years to do Roth IRA conversions, thereby allowing you to pay the income tax now rather than in increments using the RMDs. Third, it allows contributions to a tax-deductible IRA, presuming you are still working, after 70 1/2. Fourth, it allows small business owners to join forces in creating a 401(k) for a Multiple Employer Plan (MEP).

Fifth, and last in the administrative changes, it shields employers from liability if a company offering a fixed annuity in a retirement plan fails and absolves employers from selecting the least expensive annuity for a retirement plan.

For people with larger IRAs, the change in the way an IRA is distributed to one's non-spousal beneficiaries is perhaps the biggest and most problematic of the changes in the SECURE Act. Prior to the SECURE act beneficiary IRA distributions could commonly be spread out over decades according to the age of either the original owner or beneficiary depending on whether RMDs had already started. Starting this year, a non-spousal IRA beneficiary has ten years to liquidate the IRA and pay the taxes. The beneficiary can take some or all the value at any time during the ten years but must have it liquidated and the taxes paid by the end of the ten years following the death of the owner. This does not apply to surviving spouses, who can still transfer IRAs to the surviving spouse's name. The key question facing many IRA owners is whether to pay the taxes while they are still alive by doing Roth conversions each year or avoid the taxes now while knowing that their beneficiaries may have a steep tax bill later when they receive the funds.

There are not a lot of certainties anywhere in the economy leaving us with the conclusion that 2020 is likely to be a hard year to predict, so keep your powder dry and your seat belt fastened folks!

The absurd crusade against vaping

Never before has a boon to public health been met with such hysteria and ingratitude.

Vaping is almost all upside in comparison with traditional smoking, a wanton destroyer of health and lives, and yet the nation is in the grips of a panic about e-cigarettes. In a rarity for the Trump era, the anti-vaping sentiment jumps traditional geographic and political bounds, running from the Oval Office to San Francisco, from President Donald Trump to his most fervent enemies.

Trump has announced a proposed Food and Drug Administration ban on flavored e-cigarettes, while the San Francisco Board of Supervisors banned the sale of vaping products at retail outlets. New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo imposed a ban on flavored e-cigarettes on an "emergency" basis. "Vaping is dangerous, period," Cuomo pronounced, citing, like the president, teenage use in particular.

Actually, there's little evidence that vaping, as a general matter, is hazardous, especially when compared with traditional cigarettes, whose smokers inhale a witch's brew of carcinogens and carbon monoxide. Smoking accounts for 30% of all cancer deaths, and 18% of all deaths.

A credible estimate is that e-cigarettes, which involve inhaling a nico-

tine-infused vapor rather than smoke, are about 95% less harmful than cigarettes.

The vaping-related illnesses that have recently garnered headlines and prompted the regulatory actions appear not to implicate standard vaping, but rather the use of black-market liquids containing THC, the active ingredient in cannabis. We could make the risky products involved illegal, if they weren't already illegal.

The problem with the flavor bans -- and especially a San Francisco-style outright ban -- is its effect on adult e-cigarette users. About 11 million adults vape, and some percentage of them are former smokers or would be smoking in the absence of e-cigarettes. A robust study in the United Kingdom found that vaping is twice as effective as other common nicotine replacements in getting smokers to quit. The flavors, according to surveys of users, are a big draw for smokers quitting traditional cigarettes. It's manifestly absurd to ban vaping products and leave cigarettes, including flavored cigarettes, on the market.

Another source of the

current panic is that teen vaping is way up, but there's nothing to suggest that this increase in vaping is encouraging real teen smoking, which has fallen below 6%. Everyone would prefer that teens not develop a vaping habit, but this presents nothing close to the health issue presented by combustible cigarettes.

By all means, let's crack down on retailers who are selling products to minors. But exaggerating the harms of vaping and prohibiting the products is a formula for giving back some of the gains against traditional smoking. The libertarian publication Reason points to one study that, insanely, shows more people beginning to consider e-cigarettes as dangerous as regular cigarettes.

The U.K. has adopted a much more sensible approach that welcomes e-cigarettes as an important harm-reduction measure. A couple of National Health Service hospitals have even allowed vape shops on their premises.

That would cause a hue and cry in the United States, where we can't agree on anything except, apparently, our irrational hostility to a product that is an alternative to a terrible scourge.

Rep. Carter Presents Carnegie Hero Medal to Allen Sirois of Salado

Representative John Carter (TX-31) presented the Carnegie Hero Medal to Allen Sirois, a Salado native, last week. On May 26, 2018, Allen was working in Belton when he heard a crash and saw an overturned concrete truck in flames off I-35. Sirois quickly ran to the truck with a fire extinguisher, but when it did little to combat the flames, he entered the cab of the truck and pulled the driver, Melvin Belcher, to safety.

The Carnegie Medal is a

prestigious honor for those individuals who have risked their lives saving or attempting to save others.

“Allen Sirois embodies the word hero,” Rep. Carter said. “He ran towards danger and didn’t think twice when someone needed his help. Because of his brave actions, a man is alive and able to be with his family. I was immensely proud to present Allen with the Carnegie Hero Medal for his valiant actions. I can’t think of a more deserving recipient.”

“I was raised to help people and when I saw a burning truck on the side of I-35, I knew I had to do something,” said Allen Sirois. “Receiving the Carnegie Hero Award is an honor, but the real reward is knowing that Melvin Belcher survived and he is able to see his granddaughter’s birthday. I appreciate Congressman Carter for presenting the medal to me with my family.”



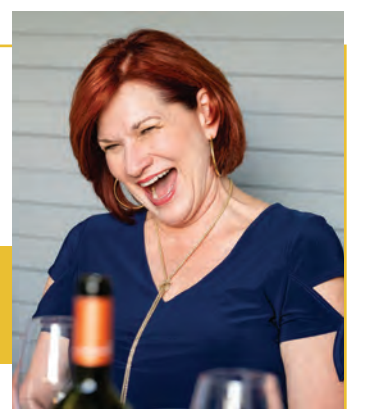

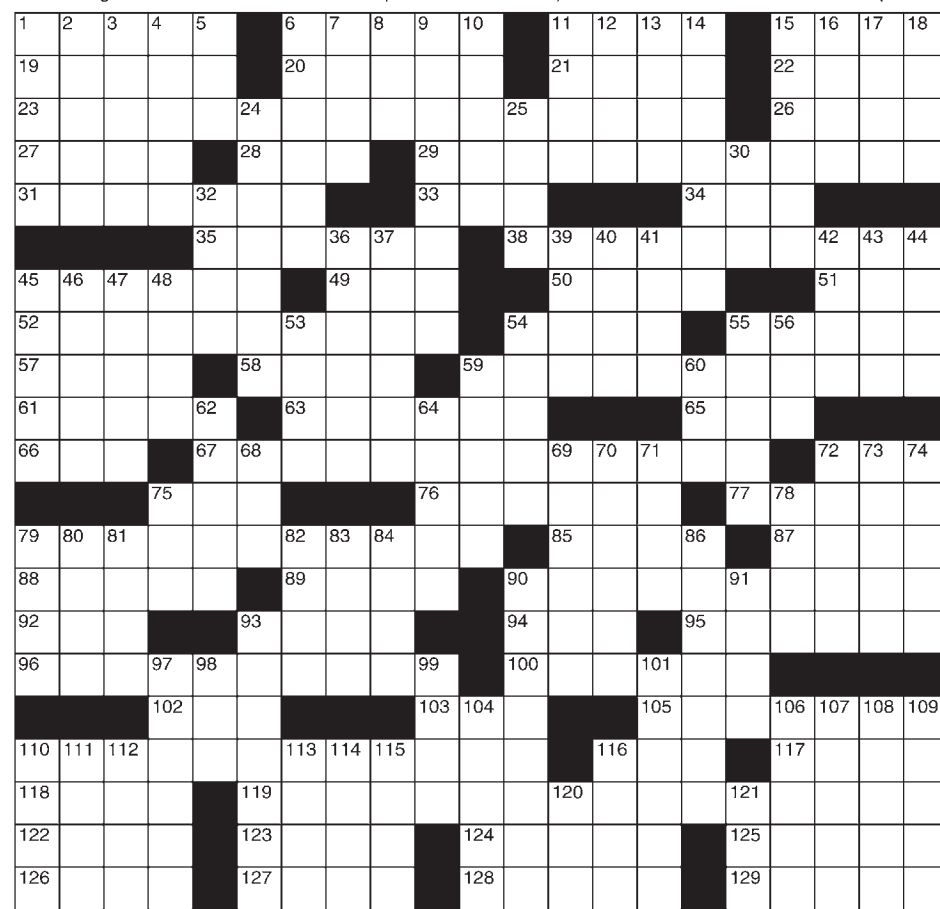

approve of the bidding, but, be that as it may, Solomon wound up in six hearts, and West led his singleton spade. Superficially, the slam appears impossible to make. South seemingly must lose a spade and a club and go down one. However, Solomon made the contract — and there was absolutely nothing the defenders could do to stop him. He won the spade lead with dummy's ace and started out spectacularly by cashing the A-K of diamonds, on which he discarded the K-Q of clubs! He then ruffed a diamond, establishing the suit, and drew the opposing trumps, discarding two spades from dummy. Solomon now made his bid for fame and fortune by leading the deuce of clubs toward dummy's J-8. Whether West, who had nothing but clubs remaining, went up with the ace or not, declarer could not be prevented from discarding his three spade losers on dummy's diamonds to bring home the slam. Had Solomon instead discarded two of his spade losers on the A-K of diamonds before establishing the suit, he would have failed against best defense. By taking the ace of clubs at the proper moment, West could prevent declarer from getting back to dummy, and South eventually would have lost both a spade and a club for down one.
