## Bond issue fails, 835-164

*SISD Trustees canvass election results, approve bids on restrooms, extend contracts of ADs, principals*

During their monthly meeting Jan. 23, Salado I.S.D. Trustees canvassed results of the \$5.7 million bond issue to build a new high school, which was defeated 835-164 by Salado voters Jan. 21.

According to Supt. Steven Ervin, 47 percent of the eligible voters in the school district voted in the election. In absentee balloting, 94 voted for the bond issue and 152 voted against the bond issue.

Linda Blevins, treasurer of Concerned Citizens of Salado, addressed the trustees. "We need to get ourselves back together on the issue of building a new school. Everyone understands the need for expansion of our schools."

"We should examine the costs of the school and try to get it down from \$66 per sq. ft. The board should consult with the communities for the ideas they have about the school," Blevins said.

Bill Hall echoed Blevins' thoughts, adding that the board should examine closer "expansion of the elementary and building a middle school on the present school site. Most of us feel the existing property would have enough room for future growth."

Although a dozen community members were present for the meetings, no others spoke during the community input session of the meeting.

After canvassing the election and hearing community input, the board approved bids for construction of restroom facilities at the football field and adjacent to the elementary school gym.

Bids for construction of the new restroom facilities totaled \$41,831. Following are how the bids were awarded: slab, \$9,383, Charles McQueen; block, \$5,925, Sam Montgomery; Electrical, \$3,800, Allen Goodnight; plumbing, \$4,800, Joe Montgomery; roofing, \$9,930, Donald Haire; painting, \$2,375,

Berry Construction. The district will spend \$5,618 on other items, such as partitions, doors and hardware.

The board voted 7-0 to approve the bids on the project.

The board also voted unanimously to approve a Science Club field trip to Mo Ranch in Kerrville in March. The overnight trip with 10 students will be paid for by Science Club funds and individual students, according to sponsor Kim Berg.

Following an executive session, the board voted unanimously to extend the contracts of athletic directors Dan Wasik and Larry Salisbury for one year.

The board voted to extend elementary principal Rod Stockstill's contract for one year and set his salary at \$50,000 per year. On the same motion, the board extended the contract of high school principal Ed Thomas for two years and set his salary at \$50,000. The vote was unanimous on the principal's contracts.

## CofC banquet Jan. 28

Chamber Executive Director Laura McQueary added, "Response has been good from the public, and tickets are selling well. People who have heard Dr. Faulkner speak, know that he is very talented at presenting an important and meaningful message in a humorous and entertaining way."

McQueary continued, "There are a limited number of tickets available, so early purchase is suggested, but not required."

Tickets are \$15 per person and can be purchased at the Chamber of Commerce office, Peoples National Bank, First State Bank or IGA/Village Foods. If there are any left, they will be sold at the door.

## Foundation pays down on note at Peoples

The Old Salado School Foundation Inc., received two large donations this past week that allowed the OSSF to reduce the renovation debt on the Civic Center by \$21,000, according to Ken Clapp, president of the foundation's board of directors.

Clapp noted: "The Paul J. Meyer Family Foundation pledged a total of \$39,138.00 in 1993, to be donated in three annual installments. The third and final gift arrived this past week in the amount of \$13,138.00. Added to this most generous grant was the equally generous gift of \$8,000.00 from the Morris Foster family who has donated over \$25,000.00 to

the renovation project."

"These dollars were applied to the building debt at once, as promised, leaving the civic center with \$14,000 remaining to pay on the \$100,000 renovation note taken out in late 1992," Clapp continued.

The massive renovation project of the old red brick school building came to nearly \$450,000 with donations and pledges amounting to about half the required dollars needed. The Meadows Foundation gave a grant of \$118,000, thus requiring the OSSF board and the Salado Chamber of Commerce to sign a joint seven-year bank note for \$100,000 to complete the work. In a little

over two years the debt at Peoples National Bank has been reduced to \$14,000 through Chamber of Commerce grants, gifts, auctions, sale of memorial bricks and life memberships. President Clapp noted he and his board are in hopes that the 1995 auction set for March 4, will bring in a high percentage of the balance due the bank and that the rest will come from the continued sale of memberships and bricks.

Clapp concluded: "The OSSF Board of Directors are grateful to all who have donated time and money to the civic center which is now the center of community activities. We are es-

pecially grateful to the two largest individual donors for their kindness and interest in the project: Morris Foster, a graduate of the old high school on Main Street and now one of the top executives of Exxon, USA and Paul Myers, who announced his family's gift when he spoke to the Chamber's annual banquet three years ago. These very large and generous grants of money have allowed the OSSF to carry on their task of operating the civic center and paying off the renovation note. Words alone cannot adequately tell how great is the appreciation of the board and all Saladoans for this help."

## SISD Trustees have long haul before them

The Salado school trustees have some major decisions to make as they sift through the ashes of the bond issue that went down in flames by the lopsided vote of 835 against and 164 for the \$5.7 million plan to build a new high school on land two miles north of town.

There are several schools of thought relating to the massive defeat that saw 47 percent of the eligible voters go to the polls last Saturday. One group that favored a new high school but opposed the location voted against the measure hoping a new vote could be orchestrated in the near future with a site either on the current campus or nearby.

A second group opposed the idea of any school - anywhere - and placed their "aginer" reasons on a normal fear of new taxes in particular and growth in general. Many did not feel that there was a demonstrated need for new construction and were opting for adding-on to the current facilities. A few allowed personalities and false information to sway their votes.

This anomaly of having folks who wanted a new school (sited elsewhere) joining with those who did

not want anything, caused the heavy anti-vote.

Now, back to the school board and what to do in the days ahead. Drop the building program for another year? Begin at once to restructure a workable plan to revisit the situation of a growing student population and the need for more classrooms? Or, call for another town meeting and see which way the political winds are blowing in the village and move from that point? Or, do nothing?

The only word of advise that comes from the vantage point of 20-20 hindsight vision would be that if we are to move forward, let us get every bit of information together, validated and printed in readable prose for presentation through the newspaper and in public hearings. This would include enrollment projections, current use of facilities, cost, and most important of all - the site - all lined up for public inspection at a town hall meeting. And for goodness sakes - have the community meeting before voting begins on the issue! This

one mis-step last time around caused many folks to drop-kick the bond plan thoroughly and completely into the dumpster.

Those who opposed the bond issue, as well as those who were for it all stated they wanted what was best for the children of the district. Let us see if this is true by outlining a well planned program of study and presentation. And then have a second vote on this important matter!

### The New Governor

Governor George W. Bush wasted no time after taking the oath of office on January 17. He hit the ground running the very next day as he drew up plans to introduce through friendly members of the legislature, an assortment of proposals that came directly from the "Bush Covenant". These were the ideas he successfully ran on throughout 1994. Time and space preclude reporting on all of them but several warrant special consideration and review. They can be found in the "Welfare Reform" section of the covenant and include the usual ideas such as job training, child care and job creation. What is different

## Dear Editor:

This is a painful letter to write but it must be done. Unless some drastic changes are made, the Salado Humane Society is closing its doors. For more than four years I've done most of the physical work of caring for the animals. Going on calls to pick them up, taking them to our vet, housing them, feeding them, cleaning up after them, trying to find good homes for them.

My sister Claudia Cabaniss moved back here two and a half years ago and took over a lot of the burden. But by that time my phone number had been passed all over Bell County and we were getting many more phone calls, some as far away as Killeen (all non-local calls are referred to other facilities, but we do listen sympathetically). One call from a tearful lady who had found a terrible injured cat but couldn't catch it for treatment. My

sister crawled under a car and spent 45 minutes coaxing it to come to her. It couldn't be saved. Last December on a rainy Saturday night she found a small dog on the West service road in Salado whose back had been crushed by a car. While I made countless phone calls trying to find help. (Our local vet was away on a call) she sat on the ground holding her coat over him for three hours. These are only two calls out of many.

Our resources, time, energy, emotions, and money have been stretched and stretched to the breaking point. We have 50 percent more animals than the Greater Temple Humane Society and yet our expenses are four times less than theirs. We do everything possible to make what funds we have cover everything, but they don't. My sister regularly spends several hundred dollars a month out of her own pocket on the animals, plus giving many hours to their care. Hours she can ill afford away from her teaching job. She is not willing to do this anymore. Nor should she have to, neither of us has ever taken a dime for personal expenses. We use our own vehicles and gas, everything we have done has been volunteer. But we cannot continue like this.

May, two years ago, I had a second heart surgery. Last year I was told I had developed Lupus and since last fall I have had inflamed lungs from damage caused by the heart defect. I'm not telling you all this to gather sympathy but to try and make everyone see just how much work it is to keep this going and why my sister and I can't carry on alone anymore.

After having said all this let me add that we have four devoted members help keep the paper work and other things going. Right from the start we've had faithful support from quite

a few people in Salado. I wish I could name them all and tell them how much it means.

Also several of the Salado shopkeepers give us solid support in donated goods for yard sales, bake sales and even done fund-raisers on the side for us. Namely Susan Stockton, Peggy Stanford, Sherry Pilgrim, Steve and Natalie Tolley and Carolann Hanks. Unfortunately, the people who use us the most rarely contribute anything.

Obviously, we can't continue with things as they stand. First, we need a steady reliable flow of money; next is more "hand on" people who can actually work with the animals and can go on calls; and last, but certainly not least is organization. We need someone to take us in hand, draw in membership, collect annual dues, and help organize fund-raisers.

Bell County as a whole is rapidly growing in population. Salado certainly has and is still growing. The need for a Humane Society will be even greater in the future.

Stray animals, especially dogs have caused problems in the past in Salado and are still an ongoing problem. A week or so ago a woman in Mill Creek, her little boy and her own dog were chased all the way to their back door by a barking, growling, stray. So far we haven't found the dog. There is a growing need to find a way to handle this sort of thing. Salado can't afford to sit back and ignore it. It won't go away, the problem will only get worse.

Our new Chamber of Commerce president, Roy Hector is also very much interested in all this. If you have concerns, ideas, suggestions, whatever, please contact him or me. Both of us will be most grateful for any input.

and innovative is the plan to require single mothers, who have children and are seeking to get on the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program, to identify the fathers of said children so the State can go after these hit-and-run dads for child support thus reducing the need for public AFDC funds. Failure to name the father would cause the mother to lose her benefits at once. Additional children after the effective date of the law would not be covered by any welfare payments. None of the laws would be retroactive since that is prohibited by federal and state statutes.

Another new and exciting idea would be to use fingerprinting as a device to identify food stamp users in order to stop the illicit trading of stamps for money, drugs and alcohol. And finally - a new law, if passed, would take away all licenses from a father or mother who refuses to pay court ordered child support. Licenses included would be for driving, hunting and those permits that allow folks to practice law, medicine and related health, work, plumbing, electrical contracting, dentistry, architectural work, taxi drivers, pilots, veterinarians, accounting, everyone connected with the criminal justice system, Realtors and the list goes on and on. Just about everyone other than

elect officials, the homeless and a few others of nondescript occupations.

These four ideas alone should take some of the steam out of the notion that folks can raise families at total public expense.

The Governor has assured the legislature and all others who will listen, that he does not intend to let children go hungry nor will he delete those adults who cannot work or are ill, incapacitated or forced to take care of sick children or parents.

No doubt the civil liberties gang will go nuts over these ideas and no doubt there will be test cases to try to stop all efforts to slow down fraud and illegitimacy. Fact remains these are good ideas and need to be put in place at the state level especially since welfare will soon become a federally funded effort if the new GOP congress has its way. We should support this move away from centralized thinking and allow the states to use their collective good sense to make things work properly.

**Alamo Saved**

Governor Bush also made a hit with the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, the day after his inauguration when he publicly announced he would veto the Ron Wilson (D-Houston) law that would transfer the Alamo from the care and protection of

the venerable DRT to the bureaucratic Parks and Wildlife Commission. This is not only good public policy but good politics. These preservation ladies can do a lot of good for an up and coming young Governor.

**Other Inaugural News**

Former Governor Ann Richards showed just how deeply she was hurt when voters turned her out of office after a single term. She arranged to be in California on inauguration day - something that is just not done by outgoing Governors. Tradition has it that one governor turns over the state symbolically to the next chief of state - in person on swearing-in day no matter how hard the campaign might have been. Sort of a healing and good sportsmanship type of thing. This one act of omission tars the feisty and popular former Guv with the sign of "sore loser" which is hard to overcome.

One newspaper reporter on the scene in Austin on inauguration day noted that former Governor Dolph Briscoe was on hand and that at his 1973 swearing-in he (Briscoe) wore boots - "To wade through the mess caused by the Sharpstown scandal" that propelled the Uvalde rancher-banker into the Governor's Office over such heavy-hitters as Ben Barnes, Preston Smith, Sissy Farenthold and a host of lesser-lights. True there was scandal enough to tarnish the veterans but what the young and uninformed reporter did not know and failed to research was the fact that Briscoe always wore boots (he had hundreds of pairs) at all times and for all occasions including formal dress up events!

## Sprint/Centel offers new service to area

As of Jan. 18, Sprint/Centel-Texas customers have a new option when calling 4-1-1 or 555-1212 for Directory Assistance. They can now choose to be connected to the phone number they are inquiring about.

The new service, known as Directory Assistance Call Completion (DACC) automatically connects DACC to any local or intraLATA telephone number received from Directory Assistance. It is available for all residential customers and most business customers.

To use the new DACC service, customers can either press "1" (if using a Touch Tone phone) at the

conclusion of the Directory Assistance announcement or simply hold the line, at which time the DACC operator will come back on line to provide assistance. For only 30 cents per completed call, customers will automatically have the call connected for them. If a called party does not answer or the line is busy, the customer is not charged for DACC.

Customers who do not want DACC, just need to hang up the phone once they receive the phone number they are seeking and dial the number themselves.

"Our customers are allowed 10 free DACC calls

for a month," explained Bruce Vasbinder, public relations administrator for Sprint/Centel-Texas. "If during one of those free calls a customer opts to use DACC, the charge is only 30 cents. Any DACC made after 10 free calls are 25

cents each. However, if a customer uses DACC after using all of their free calls, the total charge is 55 cents for DACC and 30 cents for the DACC service."

DACC is available for all Sprint/Centel-Texas' residential customers. It can also be used by all business customers except public, semi-public or private pay stations and hotel lines.
