Faulkner addresses Chamber banquet

1994 President presents awards, outlines accomplishments for year

Dr. Paul Faulkner told the crowd of 200 gathered for the annual Salado Chamber of Commerce Banquet Jan. 28 the four secrets to success: 1. believe you can change, 2. decide to change, 3. change the way you think and 4. act better than you feel.

Faulkner entertained the crowd with stories and anecdotes but pushed the point that "by changing all the inner attitudes of the mind, one can change the out circumstances of the world."

Outgoing Chamber President Jap Barrett honored many who helped to make 1994 a successful year for the Chamber, including retiring directors Steven Ervin, Denver Mills, Cathy Sands, Dave Gardner, and Stew Smith.

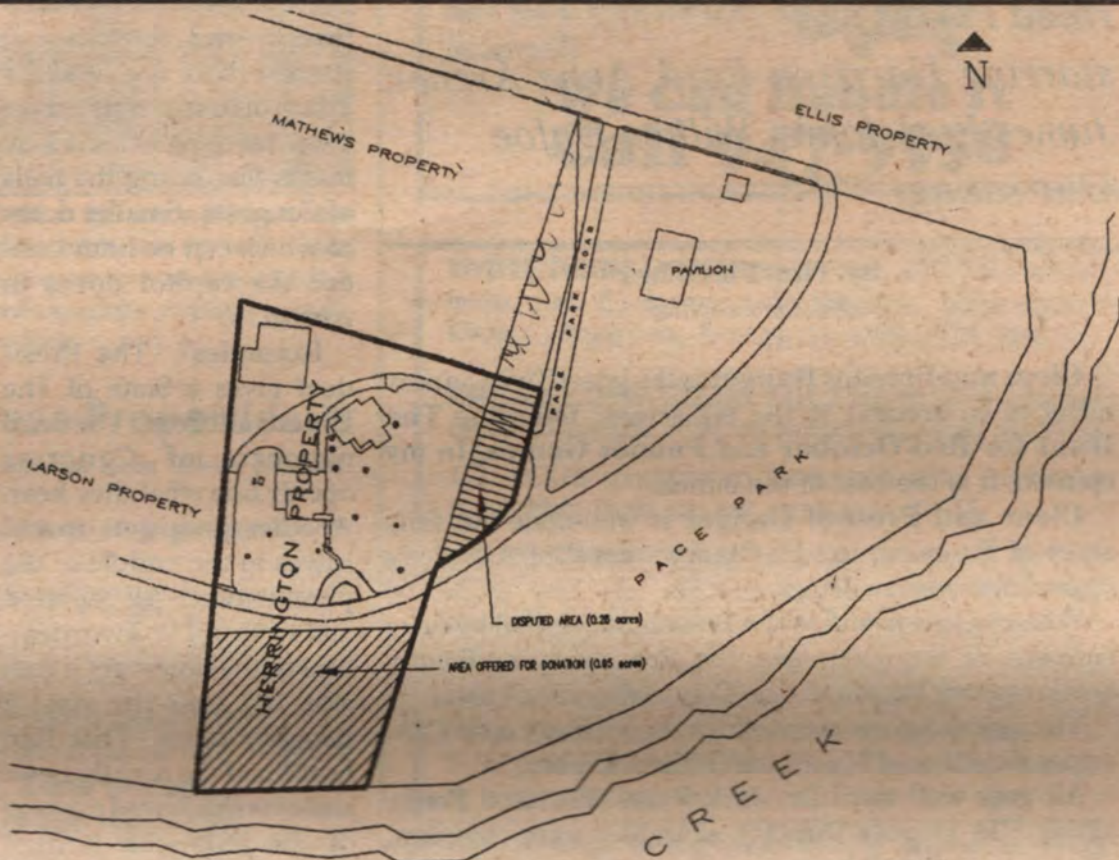
Gardner was absent be-

Barrett also recalled the accomplishments of the Chamber in 1994, including maintenance and improvements at Pace Park, payments on debt of Salado Civic Center, new billboards.

SALADO Pace Park trustees to consider land swap during Feb. 3 meeting

Pace Park Trustees will meet Feb. 3 to discuss a possible trade of .26 acres

of park land for .9 acres of adjoining property on Salado Creek, following a public hearing on the matter Jan. 25.

Pace Park Trustees in October sent Jack and Pat Herrington a letter instructing them to take down a cedar fence which sat on park property. The fence was put up on the property many years before the Herringtons bought the property.

The fence encroached upon .26 acres of Pace Park property at the bottom of the Herrington's property. (See diagram for clarification).

"Pat and I have always talked about deeding that property to the Park, since it is often used for functions in the Park, anyway," Jack Herrington told the 50 gathered for the public meeting.

The swap would allow the Herringtons to leave the fence and to continue to have access to Pace Park Road to the east of their property.

The public hearing was called after District Judge Rick Morris ruled that the proposed trade would not violate the 1946 deed of trust by which J.W. Pace and Elizabeth Pace Hodges gave the land for use as a park.

Those who favored the swap said that it made good sense for the Pace park board to trade land which had not been used for a park for many years for more valuable land.

Those who opposed the swap said they feared that the Judge's decision might be overturned in the future and that the park might revert to the Pace family heirs.

Some pointed to part of the trust which states, "that in the event the same is not so maintained (sic) as a public park the title to the herein conveyed property shall revert..." to heirs of the Pace family.

Others pointed to part of the trust stating neither the Trustees, nor their successors, "shall have the right to convey, mortgage or in any way involve the title to the herein described property."

After discussing the deed of trust and the judge's decision, Mills asked for a straw poll of citizens gathered, with the result being 23 favored the swap and 6 opposed the swap.

Clear and Present Danger is the latest Tom Clancey novel to be brought to the big screen, following **The Hunt for Red October** and **Patriot Games**. In my opinion, it is the best of the bunch.

Clear and Present Danger is well-done but falls short of the mark left by Clancy's novel of America's undeclared war on drugs.

When a close friend to the President is killed by drug runners on the open seas, the President unofficially declares open season on the Columbian drug cartel.

The secret war is enacted by the military and CIA, under direction of Mr. Clark (Willem Dafoe).

All goes well until Dr. Jack Ryan (Harrison Ford), acting CIA Deputy Director, stumbles unto the plan. Then the coverup begins.

From the opening minutes until the explosive conclusion, **Clear and Present Danger** delivers action and suspense. However the movie is nowhere near the story found in the pages of the novel. I recommend the novel as well since it is the only Clancy novel I have been able to finish.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) is installing a groundwater treatment system at the site of the former gasoline station on the west side of 1-35 at Thomas Arnold Drive.

Groundwater at this location has been contaminated by a gasoline release. The groundwater will be pumped out of several

monitoring wells, piped through a treatment system, and then discharged into Rock Creek. The treatment system has been designed to remove hydrocarbon contaminants to non-detect levels. Effluent from the system will be clean water. The discharged water will be analyzed on a weekly basis to make sure that the system is operating

correctly and no contaminants are being released.

This is a temporary treatment system, which will help to keep the hydrocarbon plume localized to the site. Later this year a complete hydrogeological investigation will be done, and a remediation system designed to address the contamination.

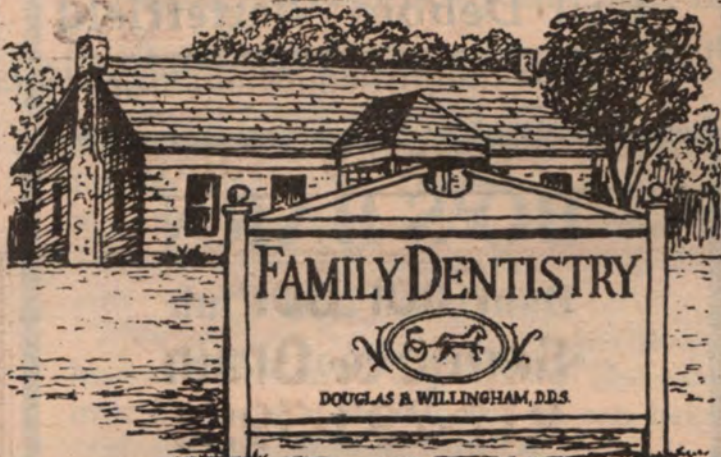
