Chamber directors give raise, discuss budget, membership, family festival contribution

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors gave executive director Laura McQueary an \$1,800 a year raise, amended its 1996 budget and discussed membership and the Salado Family Festival at its Feb. 12 meeting.

Jap Barrett asked the board to consider a policy concerning the Art Fair, Antique Show and Salado Family Festival.

Vendors at the Art Fair and Antique Show, which are Salado youth, civic and church organizations, are required to pay 10 percent of their profits for their booth spaces at the annual events.

"This policy should apply to all Chamber-sponsored activities," Barrett said, adding that it presently does not apply to the Salado Family Festival.

"Comparing the Salado Family Festival to the Art Fair or Antique Show is not comparing apples to apples," said board mem-

ber Tim Fleischer, who chaired the Family Festival in 1995. "The Art Fair and Antique Show are fund-raisers for the Chamber. The Family Festival was not created to raise money for the Chamber."

The board tabled the matter until its March 11 meeting.

The Chamber board learned that the Central Texas Council of Governments will complete its contract to research an incorporation election at no charge to the Chamber.

The \$4,713 budgeted for the contract was reallocated by the board as the following: \$2,000 to salaries and \$2,713 to contingency.

Membership chairman Darrell Street reported that with 181 members to date, \$7,190 has been paid in membership dues.

The Chamber budgeted \$13,500 in revenues from memberships for 1996.

Through January 1995, \$6,560 was paid in membership dues. The Chamber had over 400 members in 1995.

Louisiana presidential caucus battle, told supporters a day or so before the vote, in typical 1996 rhetoric - "We will bury Gramm in the swamps with the alligators". Sure enough, he and his religious-populist right fielders carried the day in the nation's first presidential primary caucus.

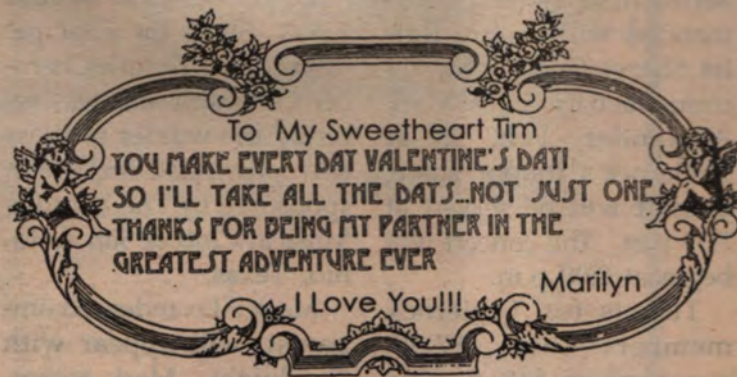

Lady Eagles win district championship

The Salado Varsity Lady Eagles beat Rogers 44-39 Feb. 12 to win the district championship in basketball for the second year running.

The Lady Eagles won their last five games of the season to move from third place to a tie for first place, including wins last week over Lexington and Academy.

The Lady Eagles of Salado and Rogers fought back and forth for the title as Salado led 15-7 at the end of the first, Rogers led 25-22 at the half and Salado recovered the lead 27-25 at the end of three periods. The Lady Eagles stretched that lead to 44-39 with 17 points in the fourth period.

Marie Grigsby led the scoring with 17 points, including 10 points in the final period. Jackie Alcozer

and Chrystal Whiteley followed with 9 points, Elizabeth Boyd, 4 points, Elizabeth Whiteley and Melissa Matthews, 2 points each and Larah Davis, 1 point.

The Lady Eagles beat Lexington 44-36 in a make-up game Feb. 8. Grigsby again led the scoring with 18 points, followed by Boyd, 9 points and Alcozer, 8 points.

Also scoring were E. Whiteley, 4 points, C. Whiteley, 3 points, Katee Punchard, 2 points.

The Lady Eagles blew out Academy 51-26. Grigsby had 21 points to lead the scoring, followed by C. Whiteley, 10 points.

Also scoring were Punchard, and Michelle Martinez, 4 points each, Alcozer and Davis, 3 points each and E. Whiteley, Car-

rie Puckett and Boyd, 2 points each.

The Lady Eagles will face Mason in the first round of the play-offs. Mason lost to Johnson City in a play-off for the District championship Feb. 12.

The JV Lady Eagles beat Academy 54-32 in their final game of the year. Lori Matthews led the scoring with 11 points, followed by Amanda Collins, 9 points and Marisa Scully and Carly Converse, 8 points each.

It then became apparent that in order to keep the building in top shape for the many events that take place each week as well as to serve the hundreds of villagers and visitors that use the center, it would be necessary to have additional funds to take care of scheduled as well as emergency maintenance and repair work.

Lease payments from permanent tenants as well

as from those groups that rent the building on a daily basis all go towards fixed costs such as utilities, personnel, insurance, cleaning and security. Grants from the Chamber of Commerce, Salado Lions, Ladies Auxiliary and Centel-Texas augment the costs of operating the center that includes normal repair and maintenance work as well as keeping rest rooms open and cleaned every day of

the year except for Thanksgiving, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Funds from such events as the annual auction, sale of name-bricks and lifetime honorary memberships are earmarked for major repairs and maintenance that require more money each year as the building ages and the large number of users takes a normal toll on the facilities.

Families in Crisis open house set Feb. 20

Families in Crisis, Inc. (FIC) will hold an open house and ribbon cutting ceremony 11:30 a.m.- 1 p.m. Feb. 20, to open new outreach offices in Belton.

The event will take place at 512 South Main in Belton, the current home of Legal Aid of Central Texas (Legal Aid) and home of FIC's new offices. All members of the public are invited to attend. Families In Crisis, Inc. is a nonprofit, community based organization which provides services to the victims of Family Violence and

survivors of Sexual Assault. Families In Crisis, Inc. strives to create a non-judgmental, supportive environment in which victims of family violence and sexual assault can assess their individual situations, plan short and long term goals, and gain necessary information to make decisions which support the attainment of these goals.

To accomplish this mission, Families In Crisis, Inc.

1. Provides immediate safe shelter for victims of family violence and sexual assault.
2. Provides crisis information and counseling.
3. Provides information, referral, support and educational groups for residents.
4. Provides emotional support, food, clothing and personal items.
5. Provides advocacy services, emergency hotline services, and outreach programs.

Families in Crisis was established in 1982 for the purpose of providing emergency shelter and support services to victims of family violence in Bell, Coryell, and Hamilton Counties.

In August 1983, the center expanded its services to include victims of sexual assault through a merger with the Central Texas Community Rape Crisis Center. FIC operates 24 hours a days 365 days a year, providing round-the-clock services.

FIC provides emergency shelter services for up to 52 individuals per day. All

services are confidential and free of charge.

FIC wanted outreach offices located in the Belton/ Temple area to expand on existing outreach services.

Legal Aid is a non-profit organization which provides free legal assistance and related educational services to low-income individuals and families living in Bell County. For almost two decades, the Belton office of Legal Aid has helped clients in the areas of housing, family, public benefits, and consumer law. The office helps local residents with legal problems involving basic human needs, such as access to food, health care, shelter, and a safe family environment.

In 1980, Legal Aid of Central Texas initiated meetings to address the need for a shelter to protect battered spouses and children. Families In Crisis, Inc. was founded as a result of these efforts. Nic Serna, managing attorney of Legal Aid, said, "Services to victims of family violence have always been a high priority for us. I am pleased that Legal Aid continues to take steps to better serve Bell County families. Through these collaborative efforts, we hope to enhance the quality and accessibility of our respective services."

Terry's Texas Rangers

Civil War Re-enactment group will meet in Salado Feb. 24

When Texas seceded from the Union, Benjamin Franklin Terry, a wealthy sugar planter and Thomas S. Lubbock, a Houston commission merchant, went east to join the Confederate army. These two Texans subsequently served as aids at the FIRST BULL RUN receiving commissions and were ordered to return to Texas and organize a cavalry regiment.

Operating out of Houston, Terry and Lubbock recruited ten companies mustering them into service on September 9, 1861. Some of their officers had experience as former Texas Rangers.

This command proceeded immediately to Bowling Green, Kentucky where they received horses and was formally organized into the 8th Texas Cavalry. November that year the members of this regiment elected Terry as colonel and Lubbock as lieutenant colonel. As excellent scouts these Texans constantly patrolled the area in reconnaissance missions. At Woodsonville, Kentucky, December 17, 1861, the regiment engaged a Federal force, and Col. Terry, leading the initial charge, was killed. Lt. Col. Lubbock succeeded Col. Terry, and the cavalrymen adopted the name Terry's Texas Rangers.

During the next three years the regiment earned a reputation as one of the hardest-fighting cavalry

men that "the Texas Rangers are as quick as lightning. They ride like Arabs, shoot like archers at a mark, and fight like devils." Serving under such outstanding cavalry commanders as Maj. Gen. Nathan B. Forrest and Joseph Wheeler, the unit fought at Shiloh, Perryville, Stones River, Chickamauga, Knoxville and Atlanta.

In a raid on Fort Donelson in the winter of 1863, a ranger, Sam Maverick, swam the frigid Cumberland River in a sleet storm and set fire to a number of union transports.

Terry's troops were never well disciplined although they fought with recklessness and courage and with their howling "Rebel Yell" in combat soon became famous. This unit was paroled at Greensborough, North Carolina April 28, 1865. Terry's Texas Rangers had a combat record among Texas Troops second only to General John B. Hood's famous Texas Brigade.

Terry's Texas RANG-

ERS (8TH Texas), Civil War Reenactment Unit will meet Feb. 24, in Salado for their annual election of officers and will have a dinner and dance at Jack's barn.

The Rangers will form up at the Thomason Ranch, in full uniform at 9 a.m. and have a brief drill and tactical after which the men will ride into Salado on horseback for their meeting. Following the meeting the men will return to the ranch, take care of their steeds and prepare for the evening soiree.

The Ladies of the unit will have a tea at Inn on the Creek in 1860 dress.

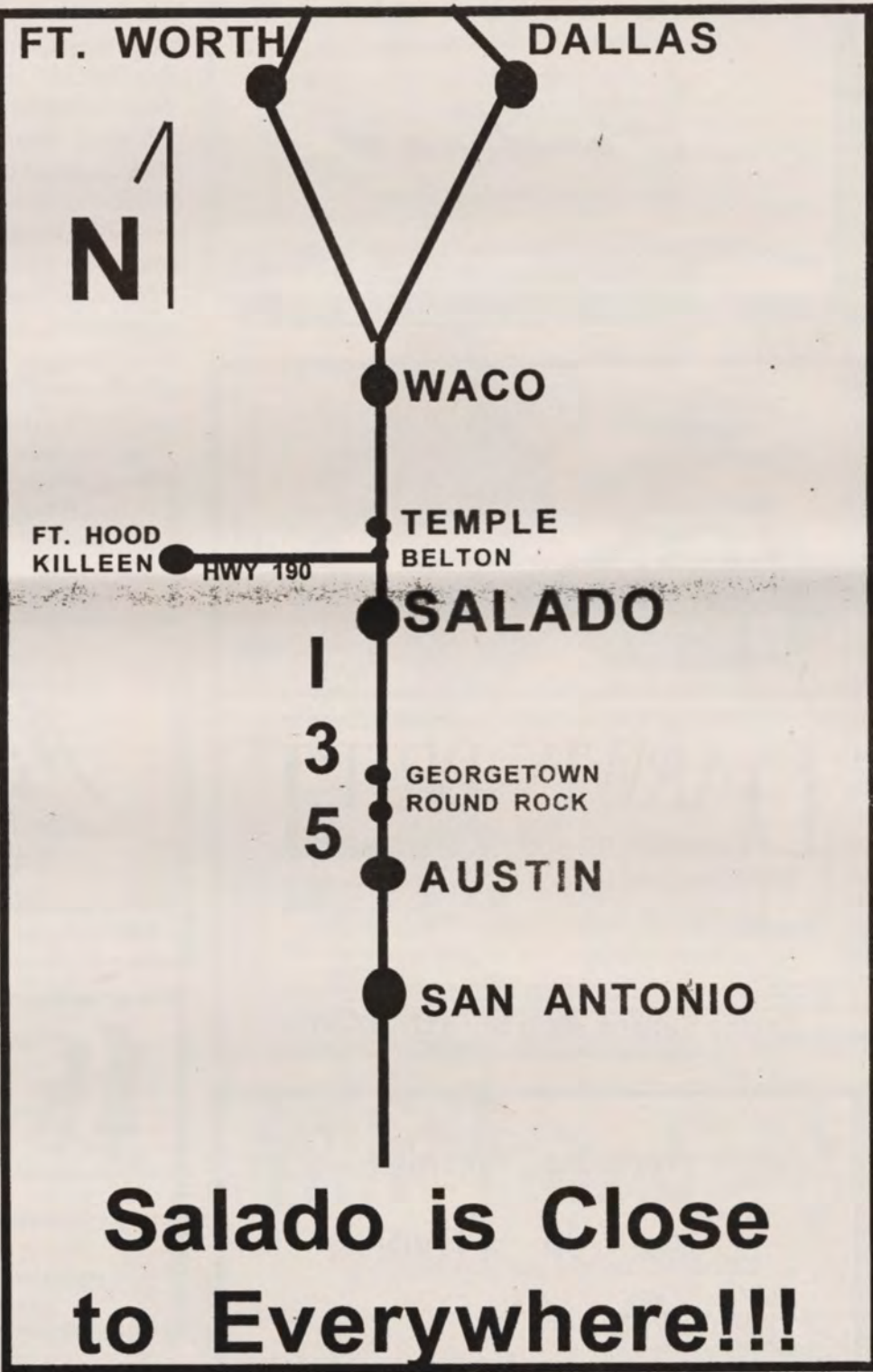
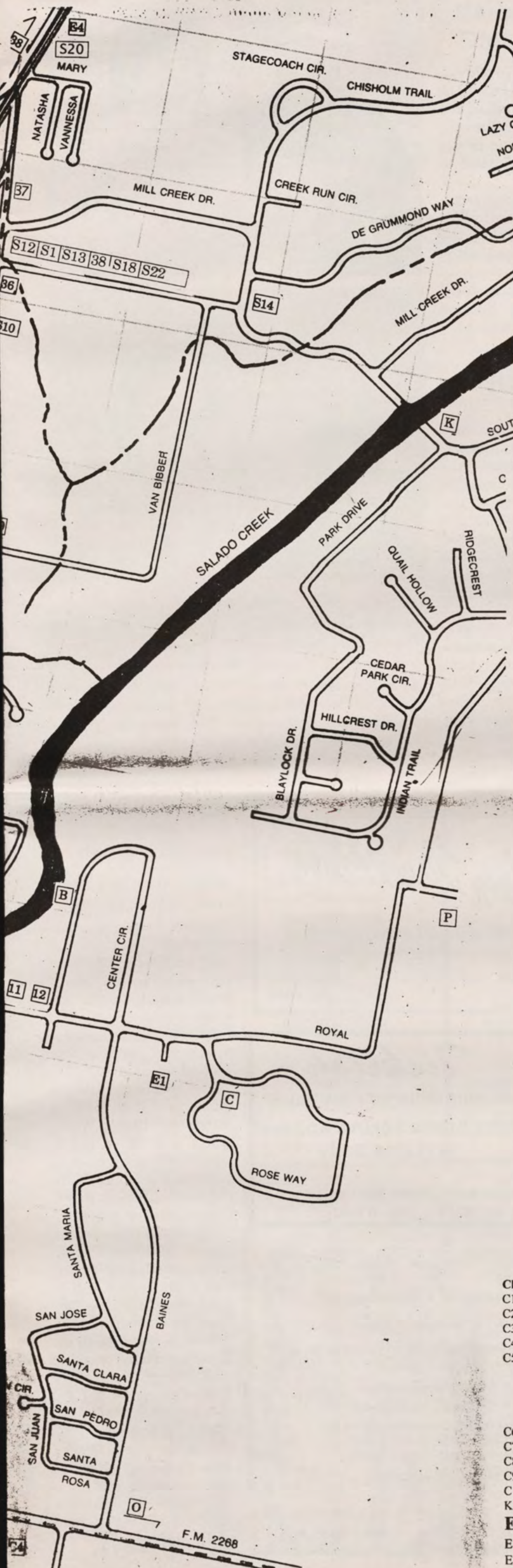
