SISD has split vote, 4-3, on Sup. contract extension

Salado I.S.D. Trustees, in a 4-3 vote Feb. 20, extended the contract of Sup. Steven Ervin for one year and maintained his salary at the present level.

The split vote came after a two-and-a-half hour executive session in which the board also discussed contracts of Salado I.S.D. teachers and coaches.

The vote passed on a motion by Roger Hunter, receiving a second by Cindy Fisher.

Hunter, Fisher, Tom Berrier and Dr. James Daniel voted for the extension, while Jerry Adams, Gary Bartlett and Rita Brown voted against the extension. Sup. Ervin's contract with SISD will now expire at the end of the 1998 school year.

All SISD teachers received contracts for next year with a unanimous vote of a motion by Berrier, with

a second from Brown.

The board also voted unanimously to extend the coaches' contracts.

The board also approved a summer course in home economics in which a four-day trip to the New York City garment district would be included to meet course criteria.

Home Economics teacher Christy Hallbauer explained that the students will have four days of intensive classroom study 9 a.m.-4 p.m. May 29-June 1 before the trip to New York City.

To-date, five students have expressed great interest in the course, which will include tours of the garment district.

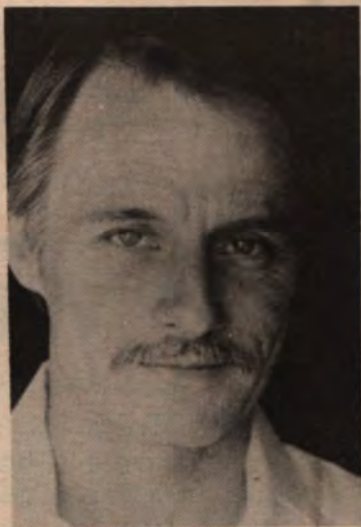
The cost of the trip will be \$715 per person, which will be paid for through fund-raisers and personal funds of the students on the trip.

Wallace returns from briefing on entitlements & tax reform

Aliceanne Wallace of Belton, AARP/Vote Regional Coordinator for the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), participated in an entitlement issue briefing in Dallas recently on Entitlement and Tax Reform.



Wallace received training on Entitlements, Budget, Social Security, Medicare, Poverty Among the Elderly, Tax Expenditures, AARP's positions on deficit reduction and the Entitlement commission.

"Social Security, our nation's most successful anti-poverty program, isn't adding one penny to the deficit," Wallace said. "Any changes to Social Security must be used to strengthen the program for the long term, not reduce a federal deficit that it did not cause."

Wallace also expressed concern that Congress is targeting Medicare. Medicare has dramatically increased access to health care for those 65 and older and the disabled, improving the quality of health

care for millions.

"The skyrocketing cost of health care is driving up the deficit, not the cost of the Medicare program alone," Wallace said. "Comprehensive health care reform that includes effective cost containment is essential for deficit reduction."

AARP is the nation's leading organization for people age 50 and over. It serves their needs and interests through legislative advocacy, research, informative programs and community services provided

by a network of local chapters and experienced volunteers throughout the country.

Reading between the lines of US House's of recently passed line-item veto bill

The U. S. House of Representatives, with great aplomb and fanfare, passed the "Line-Item-Veto" measure by an overwhelming vote several days back thus adding another notch in the GOP "Contract With America". The bill is sitting quietly in the Senate awaiting further action. This should make us all feel a bit better since it will give the President a chance to whack off bits and pieces of pork, fat, useless and nonsensical spending from the annual budget. Presidents for years have salivated over the possibility of allowing their veto-pens to rub out such unnecessary items as are currently in our expenditure list - as we speak. Such items as: a footbridge from New Jersey to Ellis Island or the renovation of a shipyard that is about to be closed by the Navy!

What is tarnishing the entire matter - of finally doing something to cut waste in government is the almost unnoticed provisions of the bill that will allow the continuation of what has come to be known as "welfare for business" programs that give to the greedy (as opposed to the needy). Included here are such "off limits" items from the Line Veto as the boondoggled Transportation

Projects. These are highway demonstrations that build roads going no-where; study the amount of punishment given to roads by trucks (as if they cannot check such IH's as 35 if they really cared) and on and on. These are given to friendly congresspersons from districts that "vote right". Road builders also contribute greatly to Political Action Committees. No use to rock that board - "contract" or no "contract"!

Also protected from the veto-pen are several other big ticket items such as tax breaks for large corporations doing business overseas and in Mexico; free advertising of major companies and products in foreign countries; special research and development grants to universities that benefit big business. Further protection for what solons call "Rifle Shot Tax Breaks" for high profit corporations and individuals are also sacrosanct. These are the coffers from which comes the liberally donated dollars that help entrenched lawmakers stay entrenched. It is amazing how the term "liberal" sounds good even to the far right GOPers when it comes time for contributory handouts!

Too bad the folks on true welfare don't have PACs or we would see less news concerning cutting kids off food programs at home and school.

Well Done, Governor

Governor George Bush deserves high marks for deciding to assign his budget staff to sit in with the legislative budget folks rather than waste time preparing a costly and lengthyspending plan himself. Traditionally, the Governor's Office would spend months putting together the biennial tome assigning numbers to every phase of State government. The printed document, hundreds of pages long, would be delivered to each member of the House and Senate with proper press coverage. Following which the Guv's work would be tossed in file-13 or put to better use as a door stop. No one seriously considered it for reference or as the base for state spending.

The true budgeteers are found in the Legislative Budget Board. They work year round keeping track of spending and at the proper time put the numbers together for the legislative committees - Appropriations in the House and Finance in the Senate. When these high rollers finish their work the rank and file members are allowed to debate in the frenzy that normally takes until the witching hour on the final day of the session to complete.

Reason the LBB is the budget power is because of who runs that show - namely heavy hitters like the Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House plus a few veteran lawmakers.

When the Governor decided for the first time in memory not to waste his

TNRCC estimates waste

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) estimates that 4 million tons of yard waste; grass, leaves, tree limbs and other organic material, end up in Texas landfills each year. This takes up about 20% of all landfill space and costs nearly \$250 million per year. A lot of this space and money can be saved by composting. This composting can be backyard of larger scale endeavors.

The Brazos River Authority wastewater plant in Belton, TX has an award winning composting operation. The cities of Temple and Belton have their curbside brush pickup material delivered to the wastewater plant where the material is ground up and mixed with dewatered biosolids. This mix of wood chips and bio-solids are placed into an aerated static pile composting process for approximately 2 to 4 weeks. The material is then moved into windows and processed for approximately 2 to 4 more weeks where it is mixed and aerated with a window turning machine. This material composts into a rich, safe, humus soil conditioner.

After composting the material is screened and then sold in bulk as TRI-GRO Compost, to the general public at \$5 per cubic yard. Besides the obvious money and landfill space savings, compost has benefits for the gardener; Compost amends the structure of the soil, aerates it and improves its water holding ability.

Compost also adds some nutrients to the soil, but best of all, when used correctly, it will decrease the amount of water needed for your lawn or garden.

Another product that is also available is wood mulch produced from the grinding operation. Mulching will help retain moisture in the soil, as well as choke out some of the weeds. Mulch can also improve the looks of your shrubs or flower bed.

A visit to Doubleday or Walden book stores reveals at least four or five people buying books. At Barnes and Noble or Taylor's you have to dodge elbows it's so crowded. And the buyers are of all ages and appearances.

There is still a consum-

ing interest in **READING**. Not just fiction, either, but poetry, history and even some Mark Twain or William Faulkner. We all like to collect books, to add to our personal libraries. And that's good.

The Salado Public Library is given an average of 15 books a week. Most of these are "Paperbacks", used to be called "Pocket Books". They're usually in good condition, and are immediately added to our shelves. We are also frequently given copies of relatively recently published "Best Sellers", with jacket covers in good condition. They're added to our shelves, too, though we've usually already got a copy.

It's interesting that people will donate "Best Sellers" once they've read them, but will hang on to **THE POETRY OF ROBERT FROST** or an illus-

trated copy of the **RUBAIYAT OF OMAR KHAYYAM**. Those Best Sellers just don't seem to have much staying power.

The important thing is that everybody is still **READING**. In this electronic age one must still be able to read, and read with comprehension. That's why we pay so much attention to our pre-school section of the Library. It's the place where there's the stuff to learn how.

By the way, as our children grow older and advance in their reading abilities the Library would sure like to have the books they've grown out of. And this is all ages. Other kids in town could benefit greatly.

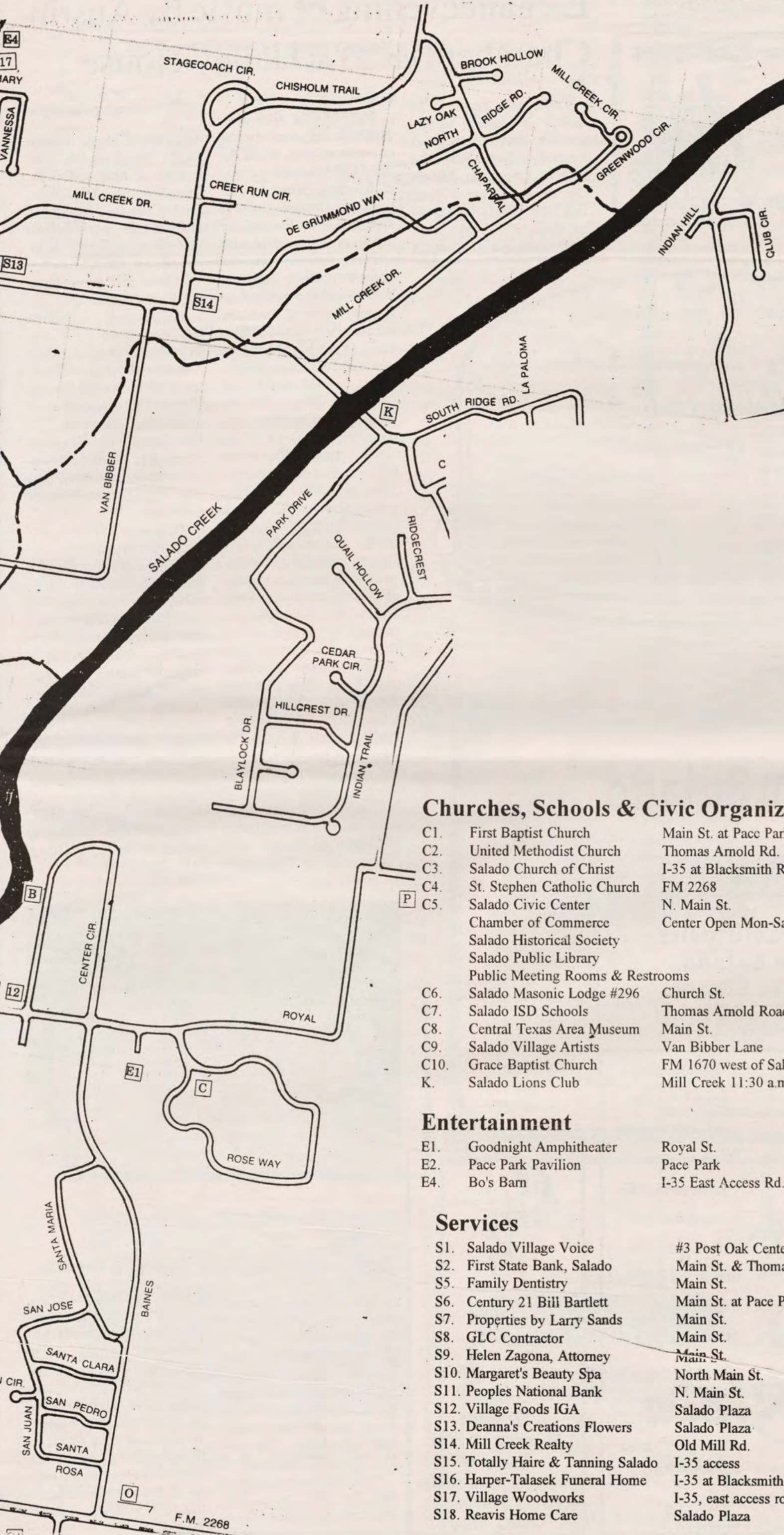

To the Editor:

Ken Clapp is on target when he feels that English

should be taught as the primary language in our public schools. Our country has a heritage of ethnic diversity for which our citizens are rightfully proud.

Many different groups provided their own unique backgrounds to build this country into the great country it is today. However, the basis for our ability to function so well to the mutual benefit has largely been our common language.

Until recent times, everyone assumed that new arrivals would learn English no matter what else they retained of their culture. Failing to require children to use English in school (beyond an initial adjustment period) severely limits their future employment in our society and contributes to fragmentation of our unity as a country. One only has to look to Canada or any other country that has chosen to be bilingual or multilingual to see the way the country breaks into factions and discord when there is not a common language. It would be no more divisive to have several currencies to contend with.


On the issue of State versus local control of the schools, he is well meaning but not facing the facts. Years of State control and "oversight" is not producing the quality of graduates he feels would be lost if local boards were to assume control of the schools.

The requirements our colleges and Universities expect out of their entering students is not difficult to determine and is easily within the intellectual grasp of local school boards. Unlike their State counterparts, they have to bear real heat from the parents in their district if they do not see that the educational

needs of the students are met. Teachers who fail to perform could no longer rely on the state to uphold their position, but they would have real accountability to those who are by far the most interested in the children's welfare, namely, their parents.

In speaking of the educational needs of the students, Mr. Clapp expresses concern that locals in rural areas might "decide that only the study of pigs and goats would best serve their students." His attitude with this remark indicates an ignorance of the complexities and value of modern animal husbandry or an arrogance toward a noble life's profession. The student who is entering college and the student who plans to run an agricultural business both need similar skills in many areas of their high school education. Indeed, many successful ranchers have a college education. This is not unnoticed by rural parents intimately familiar with agriculture. Those same rural parents (say in a place like Salado) will still insist that their children learn reading, writing, history, and mathematics because they know that these skills will help them to be successful whether they become independent business owners (i.e., agricultural business), pursue a college education or both.

I vote that we show support for the intelligence and integrity of parents to do what is best for their children - the State and Federal governments cannot know what is best or see that it gets done.

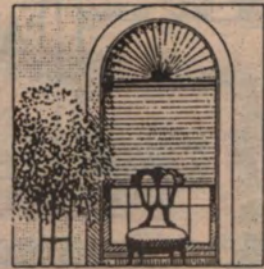

Waste paper is the largest component of the waste stream, comprising approximately 41 percent. Five broad grades of waste paper are recycled: newspaper, corrugated cardboard, office paper, mixed paper and high-grade waste paper.

Newspaper constitutes the majority of recycled

waste paper, about 25 percent of newsprint is recoverable for recycling, mainly for new newsprint.

Office paper is a relatively new grade of waste paper. Ledger and computer paper are high grade paper fiber and can be recycled to manufacture new paper products, such as

writing paper, computer paper and paper towels.

High grade waste paper is generated by commercial printers in clippings waste.

Mixed papers is one of the largest components of residential waste, including cereal boxes, junk mail, telephone books, paper

packaging and grocery bags. There is a strong export market for mixed paper.
