## Candidates begin to throw hat in ring for school board

Ronnie Goodnight is the first Saladoan to file for the May 6 Salado I.S.D. Trustee election.

Three positions to the Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees will be up for election: two full three-year terms and one one-year unexpired term.

Goodnight filed for the one-year unexpired term. Gary Bartlett was appointed to the board to fill the space vacated by Grant Critchfield, who resigned from the board last year. Bartlett told the *Salado Village Voice* March 6 that he would not seek election to the seat he was appointed to fill.

Dr. James Daniel's seat on the board will be up for

election as will Cindy Fisher's. Dr. Daniel told the *Salado Village Voice* March 6 that he was undecided on seeking re-election.

Cindy Fisher also told the *Salado Village Voice* that she was undecided about running for re-election.

At presstime March 6, Bill Hall and John Soberhad, candidates in last year's board election, both told the *Salado Village Voice* that they were undecided about running for the board.

Wayne Garner told the *Salado Village Voice* that he picked up a form and will seek election to a three-year term. At presstime, he had not yet filed the

application.

Donnie Jackson also told the *Salado Village Voice* that he has picked up an application and will seek a three-year term. He has not filed the application, at presstime.

Applications may be picked up at the superintendent's office Monday-Friday 8 a.m.-noon and 1-4 p.m. The deadline to file is March 20.

During the week of Spring Break, March 13-17, applications for trustee election may be picked up from Laura McQueary in the Salado Chamber of Commerce office during the hours of 9 a.m.-noon and 1-5 p.m.

## More work scheduled for I-35

A project to resurface Interstate 35 from Loop 121 in Belton south to the Williamson County line has been awarded by the Texas Transportation Commission.

Ballou Construction Co., Inc. of Salina, KS will place a seal coat and slurry seal on the main lanes at a cost of \$714,000. This project, which should be completed by early summer, will improve the riding surface of this 12-mile section of I-35.

The commission also awarded two contracts to Joe Richards, Inc. of Belton to seal coat approximately 55 miles of state highway in Bell County this summer.

Highways included in these contracts are FM 93

near Heidenheimer, FM 439 from Texas 317 to FM 93, FM 2271 from FM 439 to FM 2305 and Texas 36 from Texas 317 west to the Coryell County line.

Near Salado, FM 2484 from FM 1670 to the Lampasas River will be resurfaced, as well as FM 2843 from Interstate 35 to the Williamson County line.

Seal coating is part of the Texas Department of Transportation's preventive maintenance program. The work involves applying a layer of liquid asphalt and topping it with a layer of crushed stone.

## Fiction writers are like bag ladies

"Fiction writers are like bag ladies," said novelist Tony Hillerman, "they go through life picking up all kinds of things that they might use later."

Hillerman discussed writing novels with the Institute for the Humanities at Salado March 5 at Mill Creek. He discussed his own particular style of writing a novel.

Hillerman, who for many years before writing fiction, was a journalist and professor, is today a best selling author with 20 novels published. Most are murder mysteries set in and around the reservations of Navajo Indians.

"I do not so much care for who-dunit or why when I write a mystery," Hillerman said. "I am more interested in using the mystery as a vehicle to drag the reluctant reader through the Navajo culture. I do this by getting them interested in the people and plot of the story."

To do that, Hillerman says he has to have a good

enough first chapter "to interest the reader in turning to Chapter Two."

Hillerman discussed his writing process, saying that he long ago gave up trying to outline the chapters of his novels.

In one novel, Hillerman's main character Det. Leaphorn stops a speeder who tries to run him over when he gets out of the car. "Leaphorn fells this was really inappropriate," said Hillerman. So starts the mystery as all Leaphorn can see in the car is the reflection of gold-rimmed glasses. "And another pair of eyes in the back seat," Hillerman said. "I didn't know at that time who the eyes belonged to, but a few days later, when I returned, I knew that they were the eyes of the dog. The dog plays an important role in the novel because it and the car were stolen by the man from a kennel."

"If I had followed a rigid outline, I would not have stumbled upon this possibility," Hillerman said.

"For me, to begin a novel with an outline of events

and characters eliminates the possibilities for happy accidents," Hillerman said.

Hillerman shared many other stories of how plot twists came into being in his novels, including one of a murder in a deserted ruin.

"My biggest problem was how to get someone to discover the body in a deserted ruin miles from anyone," Hillerman said.

While on a trip down a river on the reservation, Hillerman noticed a lone Heron. "I wondered why that Heron was alone and on the river. Herons are like us in that they choose a mate for life, so I figured that this Heron had lost its mate and was here to live out the rest of its days alone."

"It hit me that this was how to get someone to discover the body. Det. Leaphorn's wife dies and he comes to this part of the reservation to mourn her passing and to be alone," Hillerman said.

For Hillerman, inspiration is a fleeting thought which cannot be tied down to outlines, and synopses.

the "Contract On America" have brought up visuals of poor little *Oliver Twist* with his pitifully empty plate standing before the ladlers of soup and bread. In a plaintive plea he says "more please" all to the accompaniment of adult laughter! Great theater but what are the facts in this matter of sending nutritional dollars to the States in the form of block grants?

#### Facts Emerge

First bit of research came from the office of Congressman Chet Edwards. Press Secretary Vance Gore gave us the leads we needed to trace the facts on the Nutritional Act of 1995 that just cleared Representative Bill Goodling's Economic and Educational Opportunity Committee (used to be called the Education and Labor Committee - but sounds better now). The Pennsylvania Republican noted in an AP story that he felt that by "block granting" nutritional funds to the States that there would be great cost savings

thanks to cutting out a level of government, namely the feds, thus giving more money to a program that will continue to provide free or reduced breakfasts and lunches to kids who qualify through a low income survey. Also part of this new law is the WIC program that provides food for women, infants and young children below the poverty level.

A total of \$6.78 billion will be the first year's contribution to the States and this will rise to a cap of \$7.8 billion by the year 2000. This amounts to a shade more than \$200,000,000 per year increase in the overall program for five years. This validates the claim by Republicans that the program will have more money in it when passed than is currently spent.

Delving deeper into the bureaucracy of Washington, it was discovered that there is going to be an apparent shortfall in this planned program due to the fact that the number of eligible kids and WIC participants has been growing and will continue (it is predicted) to grow at a rate higher than the funds assigned to feed the kids. Under-Secretary of Agri-

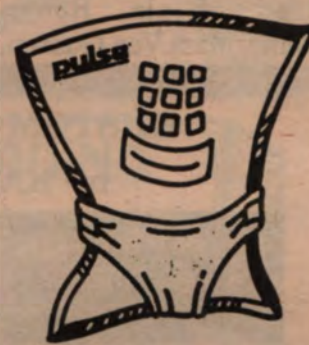

culture Ellen Haaf noted that there will be some 100 million fewer dollars than needed in 1996 and a total of \$1.3 billion by the year 2000. This due, she noted, to the growth patterns of the general population and its accompanying poverty class.

Turning next to the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office (GOPers would refute that statement about non-partisan) we discovered a flat-out comment (in written form to Congress) that the shortfall in the proposed nutritional program would amount to between \$5 and \$7 billion by the year 2000. Also due to the growing number of kids in the country from which a certain percentage qualify for the free food program.

The Department of Agriculture also mentioned in a Washington Post article that over the last five years the number of eligible students (for free or reduced meals) had grown by 23 percent.

What all this means, at this point in the life of the proposed legislation is that a certain amount of money will be appropriated as block grants and sent to the States. These sums will be dollar-certain and for five years will increase slightly. There will be no additional funds granted to the States (after the caps are reached) so that if a State should fall into hard times and the number of kids eligible for free or reduced meals increases it

would be up to the States to provide the added dollars - or the kids would go without.

Add to this potential problem is a paragraph in the proposed law that would allow states to use a portion of the grant for other than nutritional purposes. That could include, it is presumed, highway construction; capital investments; state salaries or cars and airplanes. The amount that could be diverted is unclear but this rather insidious feature is in the bill at this time. It must be remembered that all this has to pass the Senate and be signed by the President - not a couple of low hurdles to say the least.

### Bush On School Lunches

Down here in Texas our Governor has stated more than once that he likes the idea of a nutritional block grant. He figures that we have the vehicle to pass out these dollars in place. Using the TEA that currently hands out and monitors the lunch program in Texas there would be no additional costs assigned to processing the grants. So far so good. Now comes the kicker - what if we should have a recession and the number of kids eligible for the lunch program increases?

Knowing Governor Bush and our Legislators there is little doubt that money would be found to feed the additional children. That is a given - but where would it come from? Some other

program would have to be cut and one day state taxes would have to be increased to take up the slack. This fact alone blows the GOP theory of tax savings a bit out of the water. In a few states where the folks are not as kind hearted as we are in Texas you would find the dollars just would not be forthcoming and some kids might have to go without.

### Salado

Here in Salado we have a total of 165 kids on free or reduced priced breakfasts and lunches. That comes out to about 23 percent of the total student body. This is a surprisingly high number for what is generally considered a well-to-do village. Fact remains we have the kids and they do qualify and they are being fed. Thank goodness.

One final bit of little known (at least to this writer) information on this important subject is that throughout most schools in the nation, including Salado, the money reim-

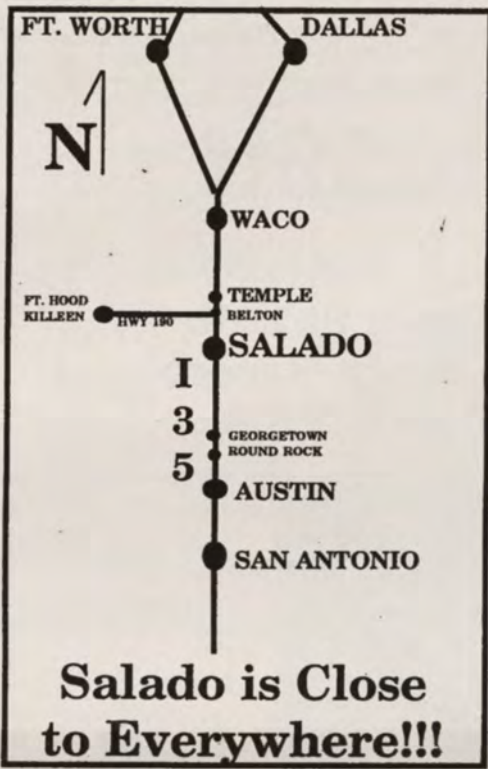
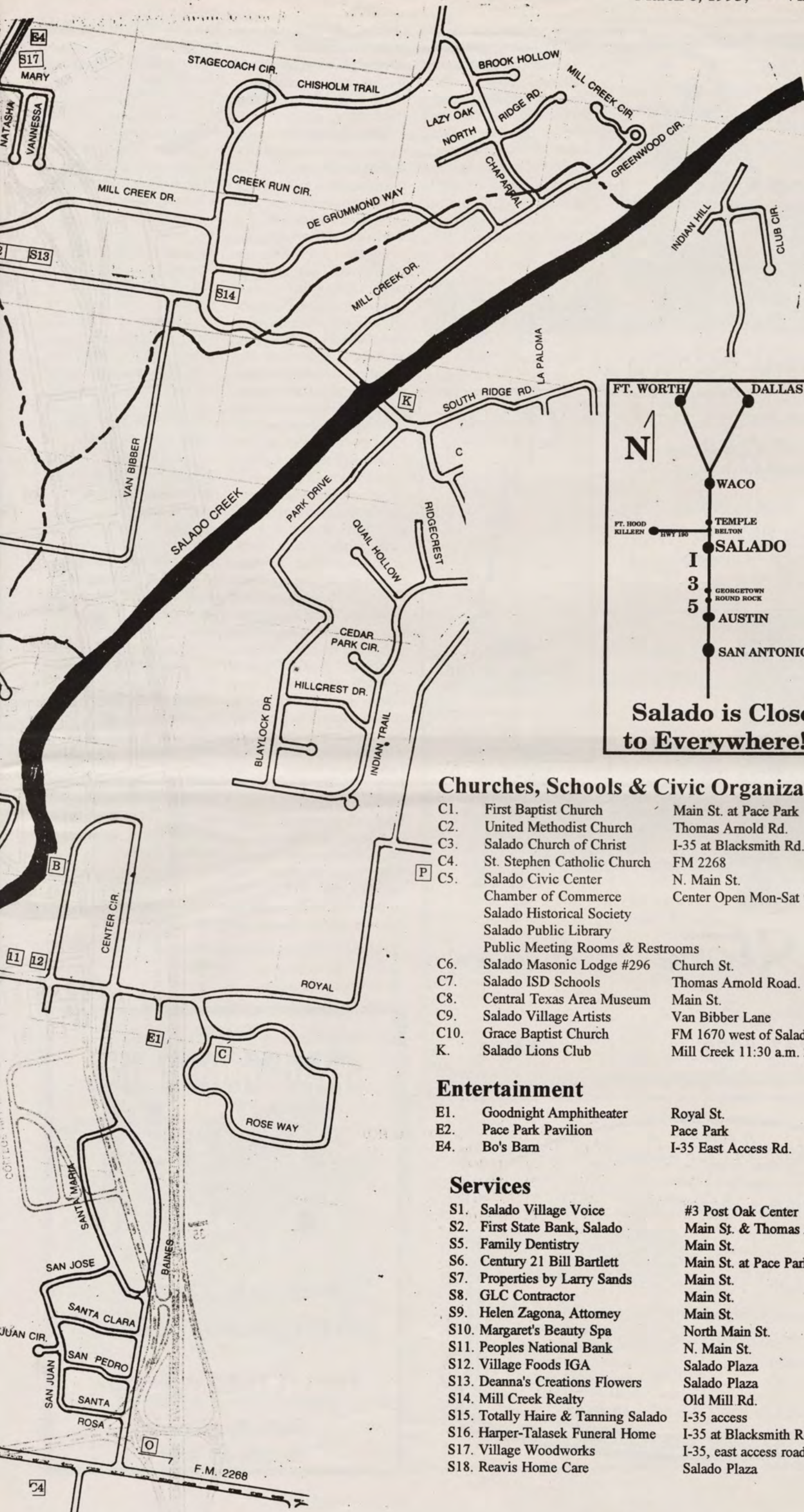

bursed by the feds for the free or reduced meals does not cover the true cost of each meal! Actually, when the government talks about free or reduced lunches they are talking about a set per-meal amount of money and not the full cost. Here in Salado, the federal food grant, coming through the TEA, pays for just a shade

over half of the actual cost of the free meals. The balance is paid for out of local tax funds - just as it is in most other Texas school districts.

The only conclusion that can be drawn from all this is that the theory of block-granting free meal funds to the States, in order to save federal tax dollars, will work provided the student population receiving the subsidized food remains constant. Any upward shift in the number of kids eligible for the program - as a result of normal growth or recession - will throw the equation out of kilter and the ratio of dollars to kids will provide less money per-child-per-meal or some will just have to go hungry. Or, what will probably have to happen is that States will supplement the federal dollars so no child goes hungry. Thus, as usually happens when federal programs head south or west, States end up paying some of the costs out of local tax dollars - despite all the unmandated laws being proposed by this or any Congress in the future.

through welfare and free health aid or at worst - prison costs and finally as they mature - higher Medicaid costs. Ergo - this business of feeding kids in school has a pay-back that cannot be counted in pure dollars alone although we all profit from healthy, productive and happy citizens.

It would be mean spirited to say or even think that the GOP leadership in Washington hates kids and that all this effort is just a way to save tax dollars at the expense of America's poor. Block granting money with no growth features attached is probably just something (hopefully) they have not thought through at this point. States can operate the nutritional program far better than the folks in Washington but everyone must know that it is going to cost the states added local tax revenues to do so and not try to sell this - like snake oil - as a way to save everyone taxes and reduce the national debt at the same time. It will save at the national level and cost at the state and local levels - so who is better off? That is the question. The answer to GOPers and Demos alike: keep trying. And while you try - see if you can be a bit more pleasant about dealing with one another. We are all just a bit weary of your constant blathering. There are enough problems in D. C. to go around for each of you - so try being part of the solution instead of the problem. Please!

A record setting crowd filled the school cafeteria this past Saturday evening and contributed some \$10,114.75 in hard cash through the purchase of meal tickets and later some truly spirited bidding at the Third Annual Old Salado School Foundation Auction.

Patsy Sanford, chairman of the event, noted: "We are so pleased at the results of this our final auction designed to help pay-off the civic center building renovation debt."

She continued: "We, as a board (OSSF), want to especially thank and commend Auctioneer Bill Hall for his work this year and in previous years. He has unselfishly donated his time and talents to our cause. We could not have made it without Bill!"

A \$100,000 loan was taken out several years ago

by OSSF and Chamber of Commerce directors to complete the renovation of the old Main Street school building. Peoples National Bank handled the arrangements for the loan. In less than two years that amount has been reduced to \$12,000, thanks to the contributions by citizens through gifts, grants, two previous auctions, purchase of memorial bricks and life memberships.

ing event went far beyond anything we dreamed could happen. We are ever so grateful for the continuing moral and financial support given to the OSSF from the day the project came off the drawing board down to the auction last Saturday.

Clapp continued: "Many people donated many fine things to the auction and to them we want to express our heartfelt appreciation. To our special merchants who contributed their fine pieces of merchandise; our artists who gave us some tremendous works of art; individuals who parted with special personal items and to those who allowed us to auction off professional services, savings accounts, meals and overnight stays at the local B & B's, as well as the donation of some hand-made quilts and home-baked goods - to all of these good people, we give our special thanks and gratitude!"

The board of directors plan to apply the total receipts, after related auction expenses plus cost of the meal, to the note within a few days. Board President Clapp predicted that a total of well over \$9000 will be applied to the note - leaving only \$3000 to complete payment on the two year old note. The board plans to put a "full court press" on the sale of bricks and memberships so as to be able to complete paying off the note within the next 45 days.
