## Civic Center note Paid-in-Full

The Board of Directors of the Old Salado School Foundation announced on March 16, that a final note payment of \$2000 had been paid to Peoples National Bank, thus marking "Paid in Full" on the \$100,000 renovation debt incurred by both the OSSF and the Salado Chamber of Commerce less than two years ago.

Ken Clapp, President of OSSF, noted: "It is with great pleasure and joy that we announce today (Thursday) the payment-in-full of the civic center's renovation note that the combined boards of directors (OSSF and Chamber) signed in mid-1993. We are grateful to Peoples National Bank for extending their helping hand, not only in lending us the money but in allowing us to accelerate the payoff without penalty."

Clapp continued: "Thanks to the great success of the auction earlier this month we were able, on March 9, to apply \$10,000 to the note. Then,

following the March OSSF board meeting, during which several members of the board committed to putting a special effort on brick sales - we were able, in less than a week, to pay-off the final \$2,000 owed to the bank."

According to bank records, the OSSF saved a total of \$30,800 in interest payments through early payment of the note which originally was planned to be paid over a seven year period!

The note was signed jointly in 1993 by the OSSF and Chamber boards. During the intervening months the Chamber paid a total of \$18,643.59 in principal and interest payments on the note including a final interest payment of \$1,271.13 on March 15. The OSSF, through auctions, fund raising events, brick sales and memberships plus very generous gifts from the Paul Meyers and Morris Foster families, paid the remaining amount due. All in less than two years.

OSSF President Clapp

concluded: "Now that we have the debt paid off, the board has immediately gone into a pre-planning stage for a village wide "Thank You, Salado" day celebration. The date as yet, has not been firmed up, but rest assured it will be a very special day in the history of the community. Everyone from the village and area who helped make this wonderful dream come true, will be invited to see the "note-burning"; enjoy some great refreshments together with a minimum of speeches; hear great live band music and in general have a wonderful time at the popular community center."

Members of the Board of Directors of the Old Salado School Foundation include: Ken Clapp, president; Bob Cottle, vice-president; Lloyd Parks, treasurer and member; Peter Clapp, Wilma Williams, Pete Jennings and Stewart Smith. Representing the Chamber of Commerce on the board this year is Chamber Board President Roy Hector.

Seven Saladoans have filed for three positions on the Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees at presstime March 20. The deadline to file for the May 6 election is 5 p.m. March 22.

Ronnie Goodnight filed early for the one year unexpired term.

Filing for the two three year terms are Cindy Fisher, Wayne Garner, Bill Hall, Donnie Jackson, Carl McQueary and Juana K. Preston.

The Board of Trustees met for its monthly meeting March 21 at the Salado Civic Center.

The meeting was held after the Salado Village Voice went to press early March 21, but topics for discussion included the 1995-96 school calendar, approving textbook committee recommendations, appointing election officials and approving the Bell

County Alternative School agreement.

Salado I.S.D. will begin school Aug. 18, 1995 and conclude with graduation May 24, 1996. The first semester will extend Aug. 18-Dec. 15, 1995, while the second semester will be Jan. 3-May 24, 1996.

Teacher inservice days will be Aug. 14-16, Oct. 9, Feb. 7-8. Teacher workdays will be Aug. 17, Jan. 2 and May 25.

School holidays will be Sept. 4, Nov. 22-24, Dec. 18-Jan. 1, March 11-15 and April 5. Snow days will be Feb. 9 and April 8, which will be holidays if not used.

The Bell County Alternative School Agreement has as its mission statement: "Bell County Alternative Center is an alternative setting for students who are academically behind and behavioral challenging. At Bell County

Alternative Center students are given the opportunity to learn academic and social skills. These Skills are necessary for success in the traditional school setting and to prepare students to be responsible and productive citizens."

Presently, Salado I.S.D. joins five other districts in utilizing the Alternative Center: Academy ISD, Holland ISD, Bartlett ISD, Troy ISD and Rogers ISD.

One Salado student is presently at the alternative center.

The board also considered entering into a contract with Texas School

## Term limits face uphill battle in GOP House after passage in Demo-controlled Senate

The Texas Senate broke some real ground this last week when they voted 24-6 to limit to 12 years the terms of office of both houses of the legislature plus the top elected officials including the Governor, Lt. Governor, Comptroller, Attorney General, Treasurer, Ag and Land Commissioners. The bill was sent to the House for their consideration where it will face an uphill battle since Speaker Pete Laney is dead-set against the proposal.

Does seem a bit strange that all this could come out of a Democratic controlled Senate here in Texas when the big boys in the GOP, sporting a majority in Congress and who ran on term limits in their "Contract," have decided to low-key this business of giving up the security of GOP office holding. Fact is, once elected to the national scene there are few, if any, who want to turn away from the power and prestige associated with such high offices. Not to mention the retirement and health plan that goes with the other perks relative to membership in Congress.

lage Voice that the federal commodities program that has been distributing certain types of food, free of charge, to needy families here in Salado has been discontinued.

The Salado branch of the world famous "Do-No-Gooders" club immediately went into action on the subject. Those members who lean to the right of center leveled the charge that this was part of a nefarious scheme by Democrats to call attention to their favorite "bleeding heart" programs that are on the GOP chopping block.

This was immediately followed up by a blast from the Demos who are keeping up the attack on their version of the forces of evil and decrying the free food curtailment as just another example of the "mean-spiritedness" of "Little Newtie" and his legion of righteous righters in Congress.

In this instance both sides are wrong - which may be about par for the course with these redoubtable observers of the passing scene. A call to the Hill

County Community Action Agency over in San Saba put us in touch with the 13 county director - Fred Wittenburg and it was from him we got the word! Seems that for years the Department of Agriculture (USDA) has been taking some of the surplus food that the government purchased under the support laws and handing them over to the States to distribute to schools and the needy. In past years some 20,000 Central Texans each month have hauled away tons of free food. Today the surplus has diminished to the point that only schools and emergency needs can be met with certain types of food reserves.

Higher farm prices and foreign exports are part of the reason for the reduction in surpluses such as butter, cheese, peanut butter, beans, flour, juices and canned meats.

In recent days the surpluses were so low that the federal boys had to go to the open market and buy food to give away! This idiocy was stopped by some upper level Washington bureaucrats who had notified the White House.

President Clinton ordered the foolishness stopped and this in turn

## Galbraith to lecture at Institute March 26

Institute for the Humanities' spring series on LITERATURE AND TRUTH. Professor Galbraith, known for his lucid, persuasive writing style, has published over twenty-five nonfiction and fiction books dealing with the state of American society.

Galbraith has consolidated his reputation as an influential social critic while refining his ideas in such books as *The Affluent Society* (1958), *The New Industrial State* (1967), *The Culture of Contentment* (1992), and most recently *A Journey Through Economic Time* (1994). He is also author of two best-selling novels, *The Triumph* (1968) and *A Tenured Professor* (1990).

John Kenneth Galbraith's seminar, "Reflections on the World Since the Wars: A Journey Through Economic Time" is March 25 at the Allen Meeting Hall in Salado. His Sunday lecture, "The Imperial Syndrome: The End of an Era" is March 26 at Mill Creek dining room in Salado.

Galbraith is the Paul M. Warburg Professor of Economics Emeritus at Harvard University with a distinguished career in American and international politics. He was president Roosevelt's deputy administrator in the office of Price Administration in the early 1940's, where he organized and administered the wartime system of price controls. Galbraith also served as President Kennedy's ambassador to India from 1961-63.

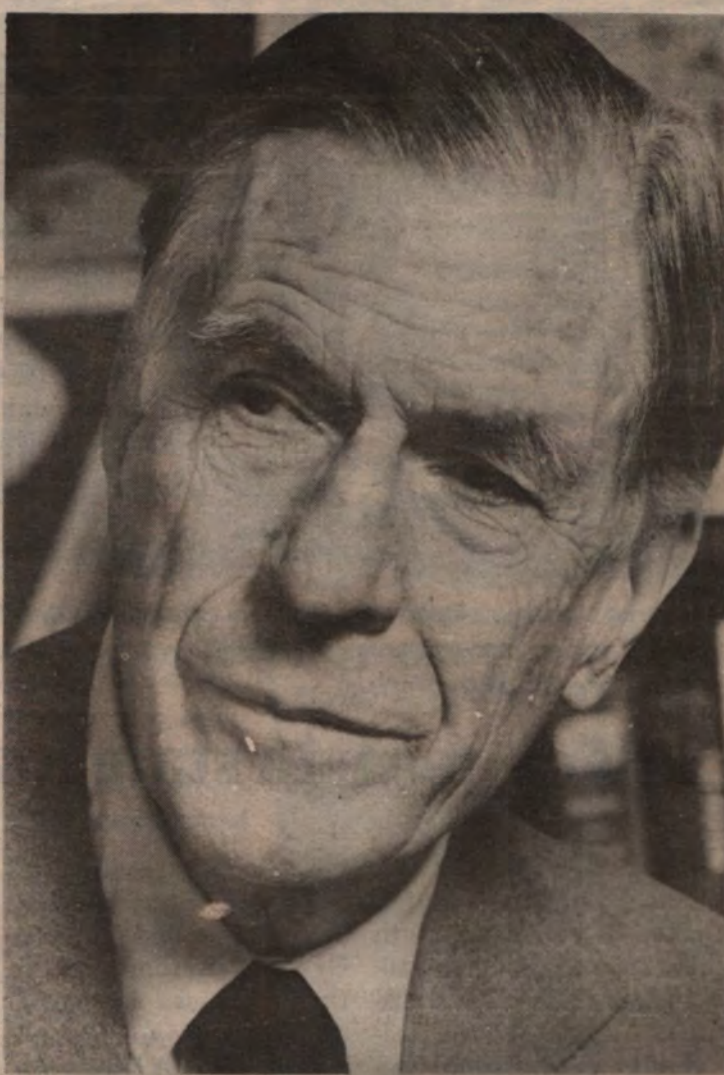

## Saladoans win state math contest

Eight Salado High School students participated in the Texas Math and Science Coaches Association (TMSCA) State meet March 18 at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Competition is held in four contests: Number Sense, Mathematics, Calculator and Science and is separated by student grade level and by school classification. The Salado students were outstanding in Number Sense and Mathematics and returned home with 8 individual and team trophies, four ribbons, and one scholarship. A total of 1,153 students competed at the meet.

In 2A, ninth grade Number Sense Michelle Lenis placed ninth and Berry Hodge placed 10. In 10th Grade Number Sense Kurt Salisbury tied for fifth

place. In 11th Grade Number Sense Vinny Michna placed first and in 12th Grade Number Sense Brent Cabaniss placed first and Bill Boyd placed eighth. TMSCA teams are composed of four highest scorers and the Salado Number Sense Team which was composed of Michelle, Kurt, Vinny and Brent easily won first place, outscoring second place McCarney High School 929 to 622.

In 2A, Ninth Grade Mathematics Ashlea Norman placed fourth, Michelle Lenis placed sixth, Kristin Cawthon placed seventeenth and Barry Hodge placed 20th.

In 10th Grade Mathematics Kurt Salisbury placed sixth.

In 11th Grade Mathematics Vinny Michna placed first and in 12th

Grade Mathematics Brent Cabaniss placed first and Bill Boyd placed third.

The mathematics team composed of Kurt, Bill, Vinny and Brent also won first outscoring second place Springlake Earth High School 686-478.

In 12th Grade Calculator Brent placed eighth and in 11 Grade Science Vinny placed seventh. Both the Calculator and Science teams finished in 12th place.

Sweepstakes trophies were awarded for the three highest scoring schools in all four contests combined. Salado received the third place trophy with 2,016 points. Springlake Earth High School won first with 2,134 points and Stamford High School won second with 2,123 points.

Brent Cabaniss received a \$300 scholarship for his outstanding performance at the meet.

## March is Texas Women in History Month

Great moments in history are usually credited to great men. The history books have as their main characters men or groups of men who fought great wars, led migrations, ran governments or made great discoveries.

But, readers are reminded of the old adage: Behind every successful man is a good woman.

Little information is available about those pioneer women who lived during Salado's early years, but if we take a good look, we can discern that behind every successful or influential man, there was a good woman, be it wife, mother, or grandmother.

The following stories will attest to this:

**Zilla Bush**  
Preacher's Wife

Zilla Sherrill, born in North Carolina in 1825,

and William Tandy "W.T." Bush, born in Tennessee on June 5, 1819, were married on July 19, 1840 and were living in Kentucky when their first child, Catherine, was born. According to census records, the couple was living in Texas probably in the Salado area in 1844 when their second child, Manson Tandy "Mack" Bush, was born. A second daughter, Ann, was born to the couple in 1853. A fourth child, dates of birth and death unknown, is buried at the foot of its mother.

W.T. Bush was a minister of the Gospel who was caught up in the great religious revival movement which swept across America in the early and mid-1800s.

This revival or restoration movement of the Christian Church, sometimes referred to as the "Great Awakening," had its sporadic beginning in Europe, and was brought to

America, where it ignited the minds and hearts of students on the campuses of Cambridge (Harvard), Yale and Princeton Universities and followed the settlers as they migrated to the west and to the south.

Nowhere was this movement more evident than in the state of Kentucky. Some writers claim that this religious movement was the first truly "national" experience in our country, uniting all of America. So we find wherever the settlers went, the religious revival movement followed.

Hordes of people migrated to the newest nation on the North American continent, the Republic of Texas, in the 1840s. In this migration, came William Tandy Bush, itinerant preacher of the Gospel, his wife, Zilla, and two small children. The family came to Texas by wagon-

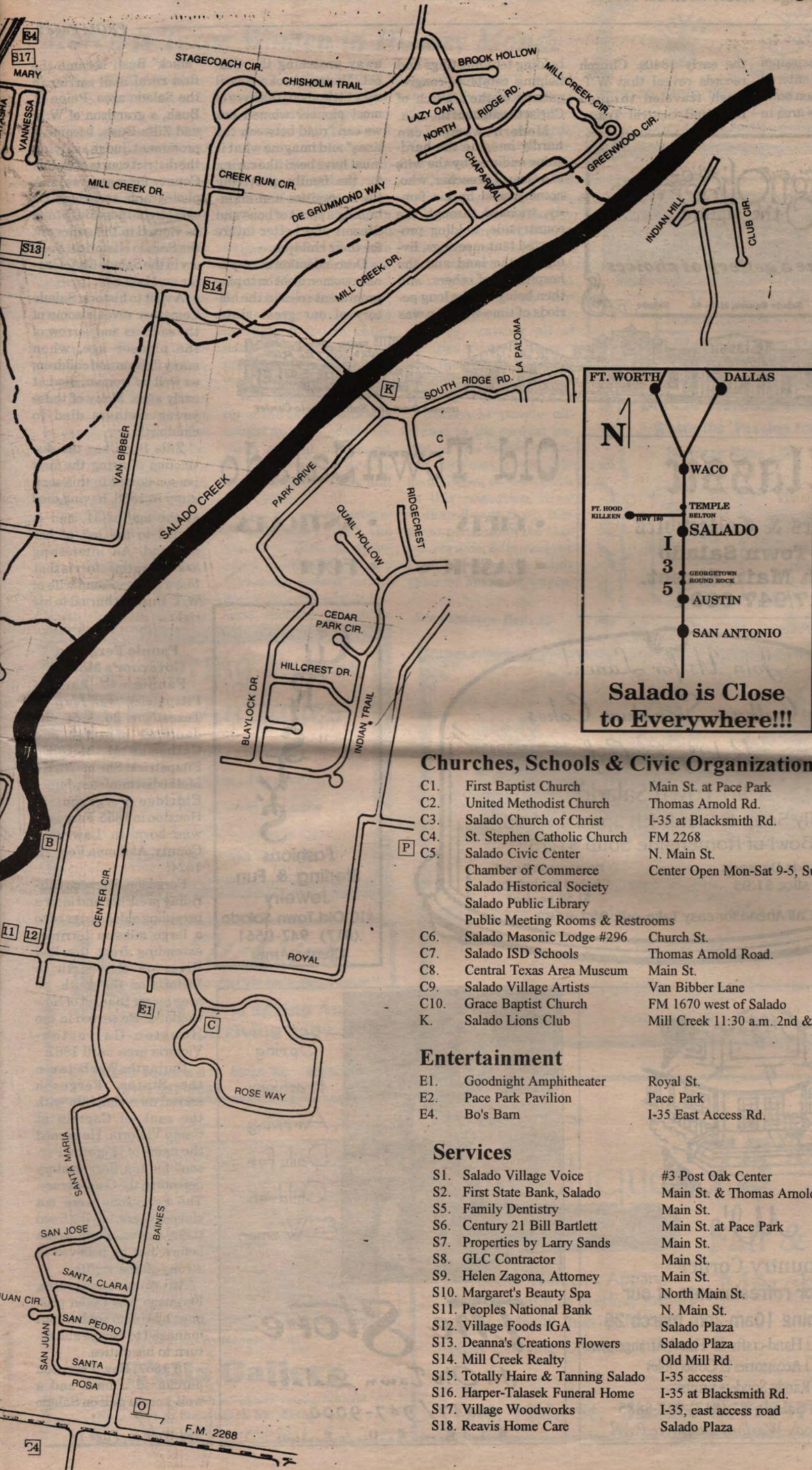

train through Mississippi and Arkansas and entered East Texas and then on to the Salado Springs area in the early 1840s. Church records reveal that W.T. Bush traveled through East and Central Texas,

holding tent meetings and helping establish congregations of the Church of Christ throughout the area.

Modern women can hardly imagine the hardships endured by the wife of a Gospel preacher, who, accompanied by his family, traveled through the countryside, holding protracted tent meetings, living off the land and the hospitality of others, and then being left for long periods of time while he was

away preaching the Gospel. History books reveal very little about the lives of most pioneer women but we can "read between the lines" and imagine what it must have been like caring for the family, providing the necessities and maintaining a spirit of hope and dreams of a better future for their children.

Descendants of these pioneer women went on to play prominent roles in the history of our great state.

"Mack" Bush became the first rural mail carrier in the Salado area. Paine L. Bush, a grandson of W.T. and Zilla Bush, became a prominent judge, serving the district courts of Callas County for many years. A photograph and short biography of Judge Bush may be viewed in the gallery of the Salado Historical Society in the Salado Civic Center on Main St.

A visit to historic Salado Cemetery reveals some of the sadness and sorrow of the pioneer age, when many infants and children, as well as women, died at early ages. Many of these young mothers died in childbirth.

Zilla Bush has the distinction of being the first person buried in this cemetery in 1856, having died at the age of 31, and is buried to the left of her husband. An interesting footnote to this story is that Mary Bush, second wife of W.T. Bush, is buried to his right.

**Fannie Ferguson Governor's Mother**  
Fannie Phillips Fitzpatrick was born in Texas Nov. 30, 1836, the daughter of Alvah and Catherine M. McGown Fitzpatrick. She married a Methodist minister, James Eldridge Ferguson, in Houston in 1855. Ferguson was born in Lawrence County, Alabama Feb. 11, 1824.

Ferguson was a circuit-riding preacher and later a presiding elder assigned to a large mission territory extending from the Red River on the north to Victoria on the south, an area larger than all of New England. He served in the Houston-Galveston-Victoria area until 1867.

During the War Between the States, Ferguson served as a chaplain with the rank of Captain at Camp Victoria. He earned the name of "Fightin' Parson" for his fiery oratory defending the Confederacy. The Fergusons were not slave-owners, having freed their slaves many years before, but he believed in strong states' rights.

According to one source, Ferguson was taken prisoner by Union soldier, but managed to escape and return to his duties.

In 1867, Rev. Ferguson purchased a farm and a well-known mill on Salado

Creek. The mill was built earlier by the Chalk family, but became known as "Ferguson Mill" in later years.

In due time, Fannie Ferguson and her children took over the management of the farm and mill and Rev. Ferguson was left to give full-time to his preaching. He was remembered as the first circuit-riding Methodist preacher in Bell County.

Rev. Ferguson died Jan. 22, 1876, leaving his wife a widow at age 40, with five small children.

After Rev. Ferguson's death, a former partner in the milling operation attempted to claim the mill. However, two distant cousins of the Ferguson family held the man at gunpoint while a third family member rode into Belton to confer with Judge X.B. Saunders, who ruled that Widow Ferguson was the rightful owner.

Fannie Ferguson remained on the family farm for many years, caring for her children and earning their living from the farming and milling operation. In later years, when cotton became an important crop in Bell County, she became a successful cotton farmer.

Some of the Ferguson children attended Salado College. One of these, the fourth child, James Edward Ferguson, became Governor of Texas in 1914.

Fannie Ferguson died Sept. 28, 1915 at the age 79. She is buried beside her husband in the old Salado Cemetery.

Fannie Ferguson, born into a new nation, the Republic of Texas, lived to see and to be part of much history in our great state. Wife of a circuit-riding preacher, a soldier, and a prisoner of war; a successful businesswoman, and mother of five children, one of whom became a governor; what battles must have been fought in the heart of this brave pioneer woman!

**Charlotte Hallaran Jones**  
**Missionary Teacher**  
 Charlotte Hallaran Jones first came to Salado as a bride in 1884 when her husband, Dr. Samuel J. Jones, became principal of Salado College.

Dr. Jones was a graduate of Vanderbilt University and had formerly served on the faculty of the University of Texas at Austin, where he was known as a brilliant educator.

Charlotte, a native of New Orleans, was also a teacher and served as her husband's assistant, filling in wherever she was needed.

From 1880 to 1884, Charlotte had served as a missionary and teacher in Mexico City. Later, after the couple moved from Salado to Huntsville, where her husband taught at the newly organized Sam Houston College, Charlotte served for six years as a teacher among the Mexican convicts incarcerated at the Huntsville prison.

In 1890, Dr. Jones was persuaded by leaders in the town of Salado to return and to begin a new school. Dr. Jones leased the old Salado College property

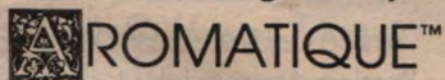

and organized an innovative high school which he named Thomas Arnold High School, in "grateful appreciation of the character and work of the great master of Rugby, who made the men who made England." Dr. Jones stated as his aims, "to rigidly maintain the high school standard, to supply the gap that exists between the grammar schools of the State and the University and to prepare for active work that young man or woman who finds it impossible to continue study in a higher institution."

Dr. Jones maintained very high standards within the school and restricted the enrollment to 100 students. Students came from all over Central Texas, even where there were free schools, and the reputation of the school spread throughout the state. Graduates ranked high in preparatory work and scholarship and it is believed that no secondary school in the state out-ranked Thomas Arnold High School.

The school was not only known for its high scholastic ranking, but also by the

personality of its founder and headmaster. Dr. Jones and his wife, Charlotte, were beloved by those who knew and understood them.

While Dr. Jones was sometimes branded as "eccentric," his beautiful wife Charlotte, was described as "brilliant, wise, witty" and kind and was beloved by everyone. She was described as the perfect helpmeet and co-worker, and it is said that she opened her home as a happy gathering place for the students of Thomas Arnold High School, especially the boys.

Charlotte Jones helped her husband in various ways, as a substitute teacher and sponsor for the Elizabeth Barrett Browning Literary Society (EBBLS), at the same time caring for her five children, four of whom were born in Salado.

The preamble to the EBBLS written plan read, "We, the girls of Thomas Arnold High School, in order to encourage a more general culture; to establish a firmer and a more sympathetic bond among ourselves and between us and the earnest girlhood of the world; to gain a broader understanding of all that is good, true and beautiful; to elevate our ideal of true womanhood; and to strengthen our determination to live up to that ideal, do organize this society." The motto chosen was from Keats, "Beauty is truth, truth, beauty." Colors were blue and white, and the chosen flower, the daisy. Subjects studied were the fine arts, sculpture, architecture, painting and music.

Charlotte Hallaran Jones died very unexpectedly July 17, 1904 and was mourned by thousands whose lives she had touched.
