## Early voter turnout heavy in elections

Early voter turnout has been heavy in the two election set for May 4 in Salado.

Early voting in an election calling for the incorporation of a two square mile area of Salado ended April 30. At presstime, with one day left to early voting, 262 had cast ballots in the election.

In order to vote in the incorporation election, Salado residents must live within the boundaries of the proposed city of Salado. Their voter's registration cards must have a physical address and not a PO Box number to qualify to vote.

Voting in the incorpora-

tion election will take place 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 4 at the fellowship hall of the First Baptist Church of Salado on Main St.

Jim Pringle is election judge for the incorporation election.

In another election slated for May 4, residents of Salado ISD will elect three candidates to three year terms on the board of trustees. Eight candidates have filed for the election.

Early voting in the Salado ISD Trustee election ended April 30. As of presstime this week, 230 had cast ballots in the school board election.

Election day, voting will take place at the school cafeteria on Thomas Arnold Rd. 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 4 with Lillian "Doodle" Bridges acting as election judge.

Candidates for three three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of trustees are these:

Barry Simpson, Wayne Garner, Mike Tubbs, Tom Berrier, Sara Mackie, Fletcher Rhodes, Bob Merrill, and Rita Brown.

Results of both election will appear in the May 8 issue of the *Salado Village Voice*.

# Minimum wage is no-win situation for GOP

The federal minimum wage is a "no-win" topic for Republicans and the sooner they get it out of the way, the better. Two weeks ago, a group of moderate House GOPers appeared to be ready to join their Democratic brethren and hike the wage from \$4.25 to \$5.25 an hour. Both House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Senate Majority leader Bob Dole were on board in a resigned sort of way.

President Clinton, who last year changed horses and joined the union's hue and cry for a 90 cent raise,

was more than happy with the buck an hour conservative plan.

One week later, the grouchy House Majority Leader Dick Armey (R-Irving) twisted Newt's arm and the plan was abandoned in favor of a tax break of some \$500 per family - with some nebulous stipulations destined to limit the amount before it even gets to the bill writing stage.

**What's the deal?** Are Republicans cold hearted, mean spirited and uncaring about those at the very bottom of the economic ladder? **Answer is no - they are not.** This is hardball politics. What they know is what most everyone else knows - that very few people are at the minimum wage level so an increase helps a handful of workers at best. Mostly kids. Few, if any, heads of households. Also few, if any, voters.

By the same token, it will not force non-union minimum wage companies such as the fast-fooders to layoff workers as some industry doom and gloomers

think. The hamburger sellers will keep the same number on board - just raise prices a little and drive on.

Important thing is, at least to most politicians, minimum wage wars do not affect that many people whereas a \$500 across the board tax break would have a profound affect on a vast number of citizens. Now we are talking big time votes, folks!

**But here's the rub.**

In the wonderful game of politics, the Repubs may be on the correct track but being right makes no difference this particular election year. It is a **political loser** for anyone trying to sell the proposition that there is no need to have the minimum wage raised!

**Why?** Impossible to convince the average voter that it is alright to pay top executives, of large companies that hire minimum wage workers, millions of dollars in annual salaries plus more millions in bonuses and then turn around and fight a hike for their lowest paid workers.

As one of **Texas GOPers** **least favorite former Governors** was wont to say: "That dog won't hunt!"

If Americans think a minimum wage is needed - then lawmakers might as well go ahead and pass the legislation that will put it in place.

We live in a world of impressions and personal beliefs and **if we think something is true and factual - then it becomes true and factual** - at least

in our own minds.

And so it is with most voter's feelings about the minimum wage. **They think it is needed.** They think the Democrats are for it and therefore they are the good guys. Conversely - if Republicans oppose it - they are mean, tight fisted, etc.

President Clinton wins this squabble no matter what happens so it would behoove the Republicans to pass the minimum wage increase quickly and move on to other matters that might help them in November.

They might also try pulling together and stop beating up on their presidential candidate Bob Dole, as many of the leading Repubs have been doing in recent days.

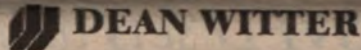

# Road to non-violence is difficult but attainable

The violence and cruelty around the world was brought much closer to home when Nobel laureate Betty Williams spoke to the Institute for the Humanities at Salado.

Williams shared her experience of fighting the violence in her homeland of Northern Ireland with non-violence and peaceful protests.

She shared the sickening feeling of "being able to distinguish between the gunfire of the military and the gunfire of the IRA" echoing in her neighborhood.

"I have witnessed people being brushed into bags," Williams said. In fact, her family has suffered because of the insurgency in Northern Ireland: two family members were killed in the violence in the Northern Ireland streets.

"I have come to learn that tears without action is wasted sympathy," Williams said. "The greatest sin of all is to say nothing or to say that 'this is none of my business.'"

Williams recalled the violence which ended her

silence when three children were killed in the street by a car careening out of control.

In her effort to fight the violence in Northern Ireland and throughout the world, Williams has fought two myths.

The first myth she fights is "we kill each other in the name of God," she said.

"Why do we have priests in our Armies? To pray for men to go kill other men," Williams said, "and to take confession and offer absolution so that those men can go kill again."

The second myth Williams confronts in her work is the concept that "war is accidental."

"In Ireland, we love our

children and we look after our children," Williams said, "but unfortunately, we also shoot our children and call it an accident of war. How dare we refer to children as accidents of war when there is no accidental war."

To change these myths and defeat the violence will require changing society from the bottom up, not from the top down, Williams said.

But the road to non-violence is difficult because the typical reaction to violence is to return the violence.

Williams recalled when she was told when interviewing for a job that it was not the policy of the

company to hire Catholics. "I told him that one day I'd have his guts for garters," Williams said. "As you can see, I was not a non-violent person. It takes so much strength not to use vio-

lence."

But with petitions, rallies and taking back neighborhoods one house and one block at a time, violence can be overcome.

his political life. He and his father before him had a total of a half century of sherifing and Larry wanted to hang on to that tradition.

Primary challenger John Trousdale first led the balloting by ten votes and later by only four when the canvassing took place. The closeness caused incumbent Pamplin to seek a recount.

So, with a representative of the Secretary of State's Election Division standing by in Marlin, a recount committee went to work and when all was said and done and counted - Trousdale had won - **by two votes!**

**If just a few more folks had voted.....well, you know the rest of that story.**

Pamplin will have one other shot at getting his job back and that is to go to

district court and attempt to prove that the vote was in some way rigged against him.

A judge could order, if some irregularity or illegality is proven, a brand new election - at which time both candidates would try to get out "one more vote" that might spell the difference between victory and defeat.

"We clipped away at the terrorist block, just as the dissidents clipped away at the Soviet bloc," she said. "I watched the women of Ireland take an insurmountable mountain and make it a molehill. Now they're taking the molehill."

Williams has traveled the world in defense of defenseless children. Her recent travels took her to Thailand because Burma would not allow eight Nobel laureates into the country to visit Anson Su Chi.

Su won 82 percent of the popular vote in a country of 40 indigenous groups, but was imprisoned by "an illegal military junta."

The Slork regime in

Burma ransacked villages and killed supporters of Su. Williams recalled the heartbreaking story of two children who got away from the regime after being imprisoned.

"These children were forced to watch as their parents dug their graves. They watched as their parents were shot in the back of their heads. They were made to bury their parents and then were used as human porters," Williams said.

"If they were allowed a cup of rice a day, they were lucky. But it was worst for the little girls as they were systematically raped at night by the soldiers," Williams said.

"I had to ask one girl if she could remember how many times. She told me that she lost count after 150 times, but that she would always remember the first time," William said with a catch in her voice.

"These atrocities happen every day," Williams said. Williams is working with other Nobel winners and leaders to form a force to approach the United Nations and governments to stop the violence against children.

"We will work with the children so that they can confront the leaders of the world," Williams said. "It is much more convincing when a 12 year old tells a UN delegate that he is lying and covering up the truth of torture and violence against children than if it is one of us."

"When the children finally have a voice, then changes will come," she said.

One of those changes she hopes to see is the true meaning of patriotism: "Patriotism is not waving a flag. It is seeing that your neighbor has bread on his table."

"How can we live in a democracy where children are hungry," she said. "If we really do love our country, then we must love the children."

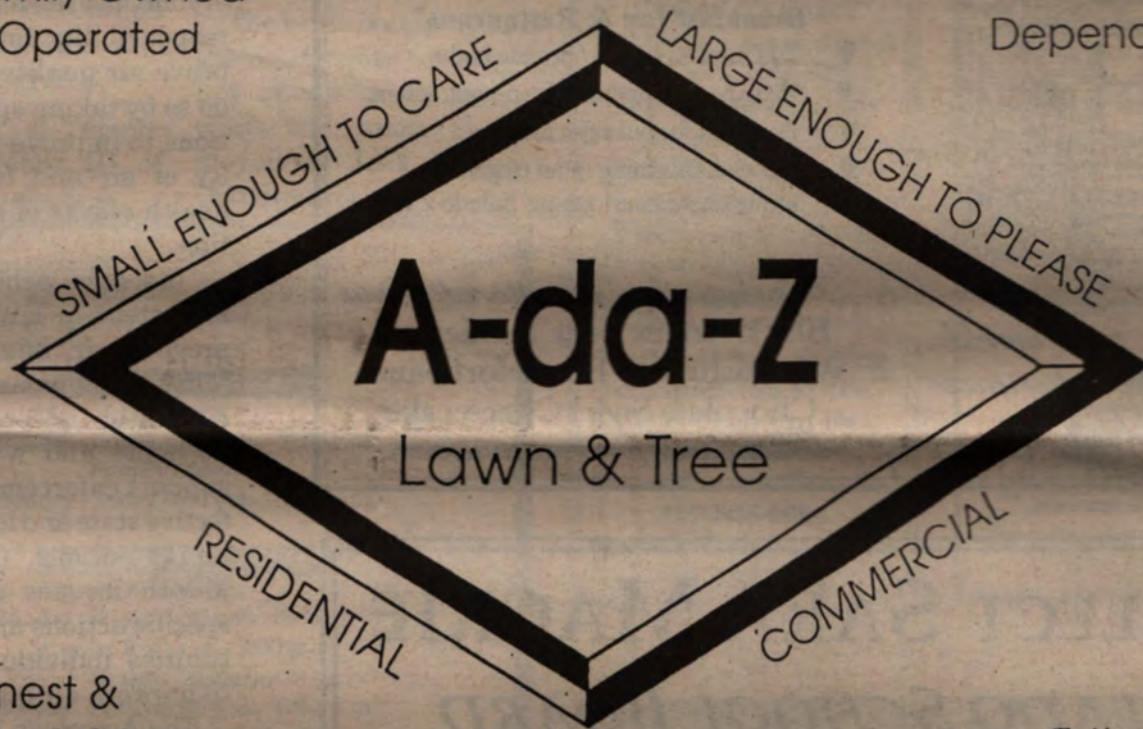

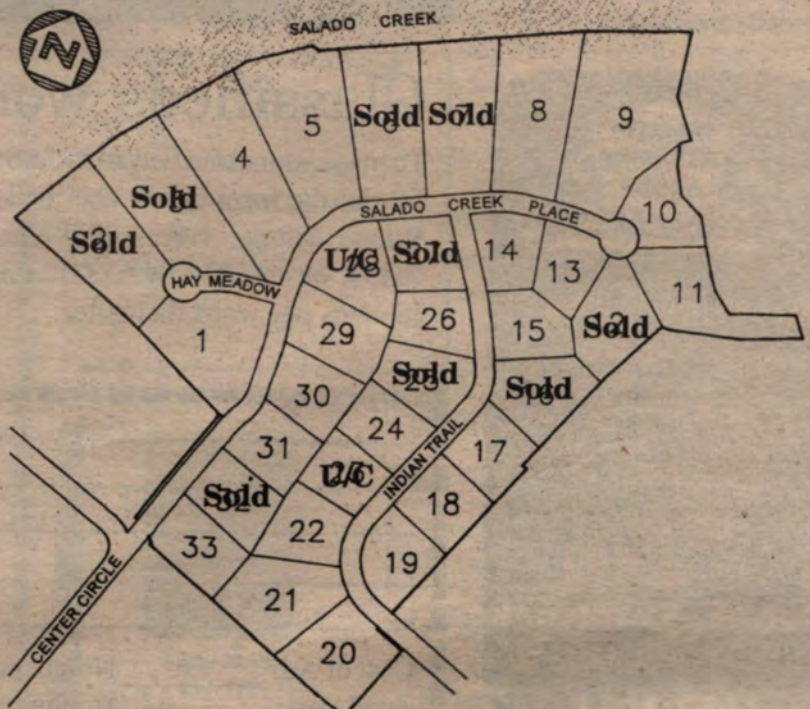

## Learn how to complain in a way to get things done

Got a complaint? When you complain about a product or service, be sure to do it the right way. To register a complaint:

Describe clearly your current problem or complaint. Use facts like dates, costs and problems.

State exactly what you want the company or agency to do to make things right.

Print (don't write) your complaint legibly. Better yet, use a typewriter if you have one.

Use standard 8.5 X 11, preferable white. Colored paper often does not photocopy well. Since several people or departments may be involved in handling your complaint, your letter and other documents may be photocopied several times.

Use a pen with dark ink (blue or black) and medium point so that the letter will be legible when copied.

Include copies (not the original) of all related documents, purchase receipts, service receipts, past correspondence with service agencies and the manufacturer.

Date your letters and other documents.

Provide your daytime telephone number.

Reread your letter several times before you mail it. Put yourself in the reader's shoes. Your letter is not a place to vent your anger, only state the facts and what you would like as a resolution to the problem.

Be polite and remain calm. Customer relations personnel with a company or agency may be instructed NOT to deal with rude or offensive customers.

Don't delay providing any additional information that is requested.

Follow the exact directions for procedures and filling out forms.

Let the company know immediately of any new developments, such as the product was repaired or is working, or if a new problem has developed.

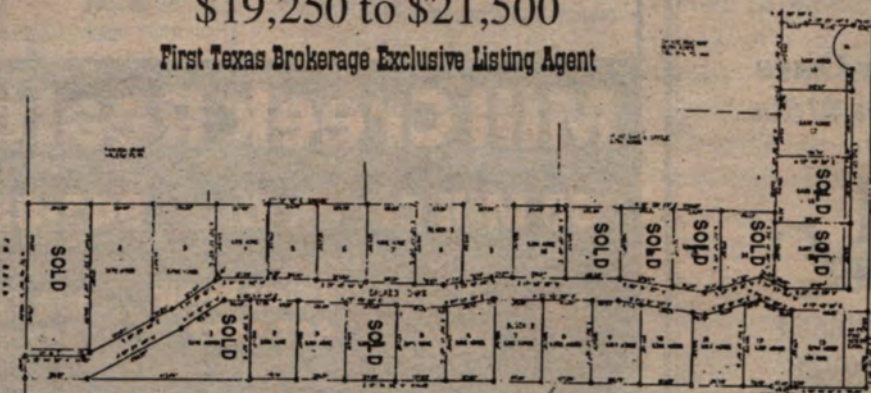

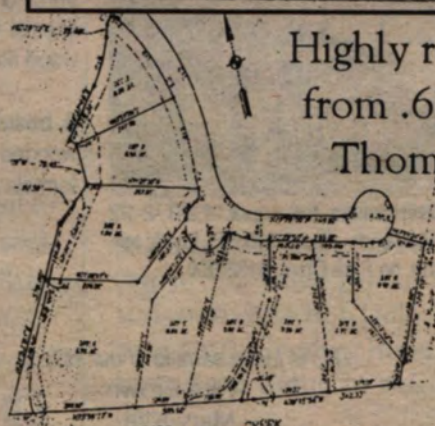

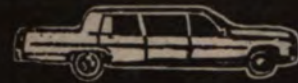

# More about incorporation

**To the editor and all my friends in Salado:**

Now, about this incorporation.

Not many of us remain who have known much of the goings-on in Salado for 85 or more years. Years alone do not verify wisdom but offer a viewpoint, a perspective that spotlights some of the long-term values. Some of the good and gracious values are still worthy of continued regard, I believe.

All over the world, good water is more and more treasured. Whole civilizations rise or fall with water supply. Great rivers offer a bed for industry, travel and recreation. As a child, I revelled in the beauty and ambience of the Creek at Salado. I mourn the loss of its healthy flow to contaminations.

Some 15 or 20 years ago, I attended a sort of Town Meeting at the Methodist Church for the discussion of a possible sewer system for Salado. Two or three engineers from a state office knowledgeable of such matters at the time were present to give technical information: area forma-

tions of gravel and/or limestone, the Edwards Aquifer and its vast area of blessing, the variety of water tables from local annual rainfall and the sources of groundwater, the water sheds, etc. The engineers that night explained that septic tanks, for the time being, could be adequately filtered with ground-base of gravel and limestone, but any overload would endanger the deep-water resource for two or three generations to come.

Three or four possible alternatives were presented as to disposal/usage of the affluent, and I think a modified form of one was later used by the Stagecoach Inn.

Then, it was pointed out that Salado would have to be incorporated in order to establish a governmental entity to get the grants and loans necessary for approval of whichever plan might be most feasible. I don't recall ever hearing of that meeting again. Many of the movers and shakers, the "Johnny-come-latelys" who make things go around Salado have been vaguely aware of the long-term dan-

gers that loom, but most objections I have heard or noted in the paper have to do with increased taxes (yes, they obviously must, whether we incorporate or wait for Belton or Temple to swallow us). Or, "there will be too much bitter local politics connected with all this." Yes, politics does generate a lot of pettiness, brings out the worst and the best in all we good folks. But these are short-term dangers that do not compare with endangering the water supply for ... well, I suppose it could be forever ... too many future generations in this central and southwest section of Texas.

I still own property in Salado, property my family has owned for over 100 years. I would have to vote for incorporation, if I could vote, if for no other reason than to establish a local governmental organization

With walls 26 inches thick and possibly the first drainage basis in Texas, located in the doctor's surgery room, now an elegant country style bedroom, the house is considered the most unique house in Salado.

The present owners, Robert and Doris Denman, have furnished their home with their vast collection of Early American and Texas antiques. Of museum quality, both house and furnishings nevertheless invite family and guests to relax and rest where time has stood still.



The Veranda

## The Veranda

A relocated building that during its over 125 years has been a hotel, a boarding house, a sanatorium, a brothel and finally a private residence before it was abandoned and marked for demolition will be one of seven unique structures open to the public during Salado Historical Society's Historic Home Tour May 4-5.

The Veranda, moved from Lampasas and restored by a group of local businessmen, now serves as a professional office complex. Relocation originated in 1993 when Joe David Stanford, owner of the local site, and Tim Brown, who had bought the Lampasas property several years before, joined with Glenn Hodge and Billy Pipes to accomplish the venture.

In the adaptive reconstruction of the building, care was given to duplicate the original. The building was dismantled and the cut limestone blocks numbered for precise reassembly. Much of the flooring and interior doors came from the Texas capitol old lumber and other vintage materials were used.

## The Fowler House

The Fowler House is located just north of Main St. on the access road. Built

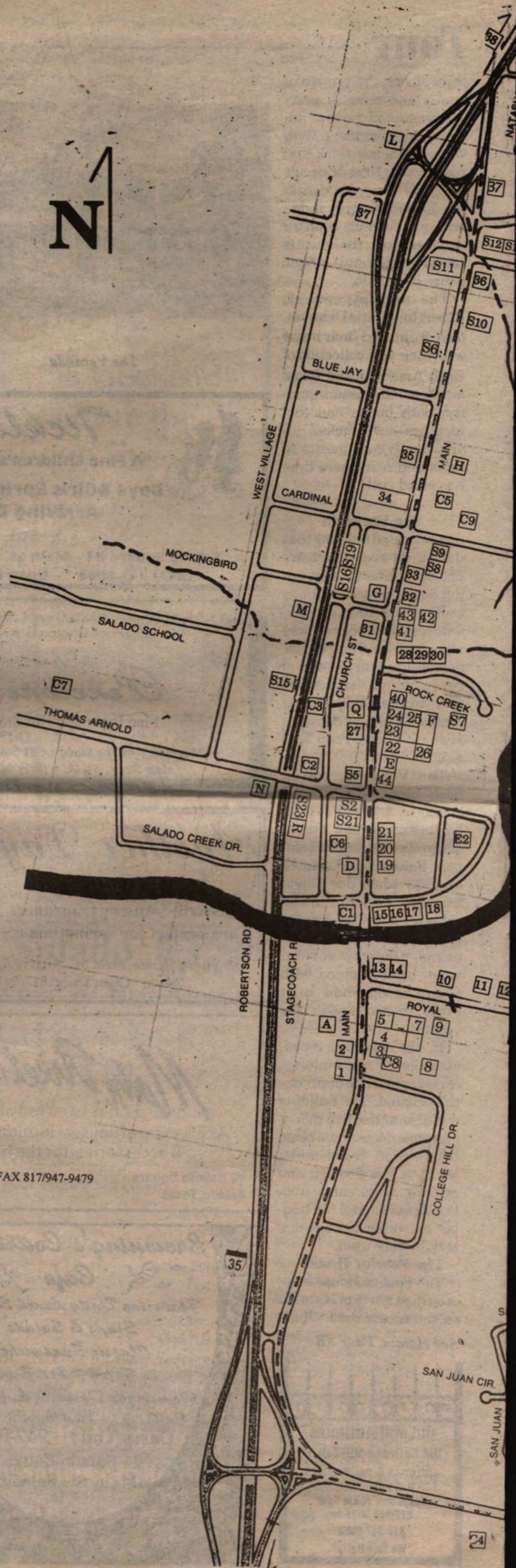

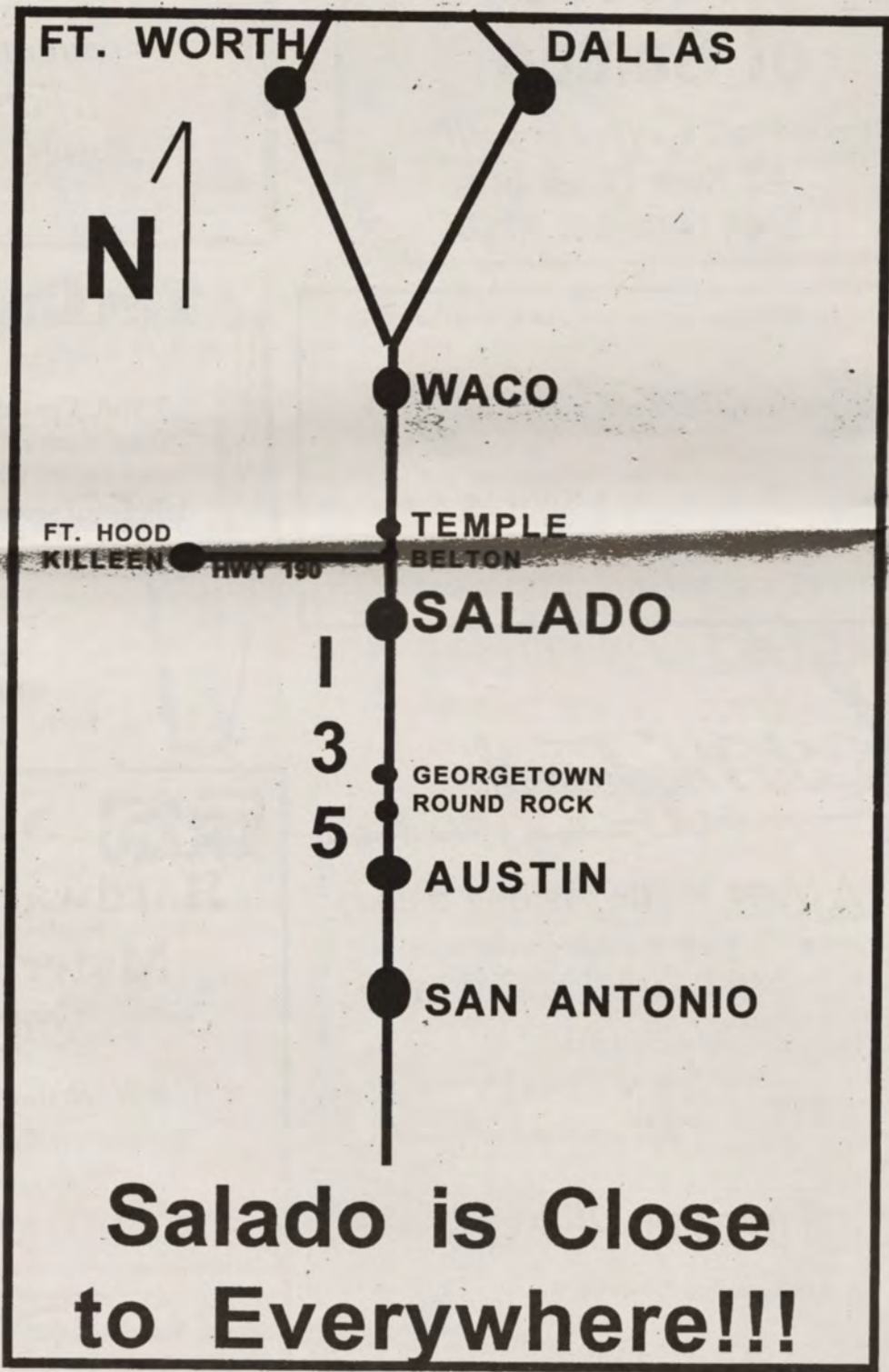

by Captain Josiah Fowler in 1872, the white clapboard home is the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Gore. The Fowler House on North Main was built in

1872 by Josiah and Rebecca Fowler who moved to Salado to spend their "declining years." He joined the faculty of Salado College, teaching mathemat-

ics. He and his brother had collaborated on a mathematics textbook first issued in 1834 in Tennessee, their native state, and used extensively in secondary schools of the South. Four of the Fowler sons served in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. After his parents died (Josiah in 1888, Rebecca in 1890), H. C. Fowler sold the house, and over the next years it saw several owners until it was purchased and extensively restored in 1974 by Dean and Helen Clemons. The present owners, Dale and Laverne Gore, acquired the property in July, 1994, and have furnished the house with their collection of mid- to late-Victorian antiques. Built in the Federal style, with some influence of Greek Revival, probably reminiscent of the Fowlers' early Tennessee home, it is essentially a simple country house which, the Gores say, is "putting on airs in her old age."

There are four working fireplaces, including one in the kitchen. Floors are original as well as much of the window glass. Except for concessions to the need for modern amenities, the house is very much as it was when first inhabited. Furnishings, with pieces as early as the 1830's and as late as the 1880's, mostly American, are appropriate to a home of the period.

The house has a Texas Historical marker and is registered with the National Register of Historic Places.

Contrasts in time and life-style are seen in the variety of houses and properties featured on the Salado Historical Homes Tour May 4-5. The Salado Tour of Homes is held concurrently with the Salado Antique Show, on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center on Main St.

**The Farr House**  
The Farr House at 20 Rose Way, is owned by Mr. and Mrs. George Kolb. George Kolb moved the Farr House from its original site in Belton in 1993 and restored it to its 1870 appearance. A family den and two additional bedrooms were added later.

Features of the house include barn lumber in the kitchen with etched glass cabinet doors, original hardwood floors and a blend of primitive and early Texas antiques.

Kirk and McGregor both collected two hits each during the game. Frazier earned his twelfth win of the season. He struck out ten on the night, allowed six hits and walked three.

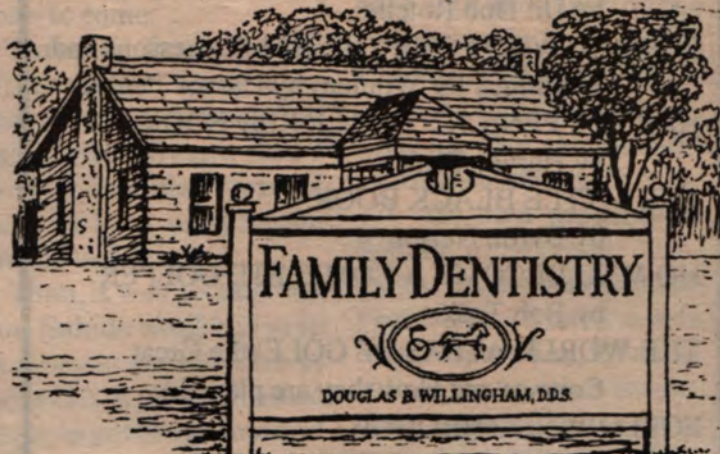
Salado took on non-district foe Waco Vanguard April 26 with three starter missing due to the regional




