May 6 board election to decide 3 new trustees

The Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees election is 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 6 in the school cafeteria. Early voting in the election for three seats on the board ended May 2 with over 100 casting ballots.

Eight Saladoans are vying for three spots on the board. Six candidates are running for two full three-year terms and two candidates are running for a one-year unexpired term.

Each candidate was presented with a questionnaire by the Salado Village Voice for background information and specific questions regarding the role of school board and superintendent and the future building needs of the school district.

The specific questions were these:

Question #1: Why are you seeking election to the board?

Question #2: What role does the board of trustees play in the schools? in the community? How would you improve this presently?

Question #3: What role does the superintendent play in the schools? in the community? In your opinion, how is our superintendent doing in relation to these roles?

Question #4: Does Salado need to build a new school? Why or why not?

Question #5: Where would you build a new school?

Question #6: Why type of school would you, as a trustee, favor?

- Middle school
- Elementary school

Jessica Lange won her second Best Actress Oscar for her performance in Blue Skies. But if this role is indicative of the female characters in movies produced today, then Hollywood needs to get on the stick.

There is an abundance of good roles for men, and apparently a shortage of good roles for women. Either that, or the Academy has poor taste.

Her portrayal of a Southern woman in the 1950s is reminiscent of the character played by Cher in *Mermaids*. She is flighty, emotional, sexy and fiery.

Her husband (Jones) is an Army Major who has his life continually turned upside down by his wife's antics. Everything comes to a head when she has an affair with his commanding officer, played by Powers Booth.

The two men's desire for her and desire to control her lead to a conflict and tragic confrontation.

Blue Skies is a good story, but drags on in its telling. The viewer understand within the first 10 minute that Lange's character is a bubble shy of level and further evidence of this is overkill.

Blue Skies is a movie for fans of Lange and Jones. I think everyone else will be bored to tears.

One would require enactment of special legislation for Salado by the Texas Legislature. The other would require incorporation of the Historic District.

Eagles on 9 game win streak

For only the second time in district the Salado Eagles were extended to a full seven inning game. On April 25 the Hutto Hippos stayed close to the Eagles early on, but allowed them to slowly pull away enroute to a 13-1 victory.

Each team scored unearned runs in the first inning. Salado added two more in the top of the second. William Culp walked and scored on Shawn Easley's double off the left center field fence. Easley eventually scored on a passed ball.

The Eagles increased their lead to 5-1 with two more runs in the fourth inning. Billy Hughes had a two out single to keep Salado batting. Easley followed him up with a home run to left field.

Salado added one in the fifth inning and iced the game with four sixth inning runs. In the big sixth inning the Eagles received four walks, Hutto made two errors and Easley and Brent Cabaniss both had hits.

Three runs were collected by the Eagles in the top of the seventh. Jereme Hosch hit his fifth homerun of the year for two runs. Chris Frazier drove in Josh Goodnight with a single for the final run.

Easley collected three hits on the evening to lead Salado. Cabaniss and Jereme Hosch both chipped in two hits.

Chris Frazier pitched the complete game. He did not allow a hit. He walked three and struck out nine.

The Eagles travelled to Austin, April 28, to take on St. Stephens in a non-conference game. Salado was without two starters (Jerome Peoples and William Culp), who were at the regional track meet.

The Eagles scored the first run of the game in the top of the second. Jason Hosch led the inning off with a triple. He scored on Chris Frazier's sacrifice fly to center field.

St. Stephens tied it up with an unearned run in the bottom of the third. Salado came back to regain the lead with a run in the top of the fourth. Jason Hosch reached on an error and scored on a fielder's choice by Ryan Cooley.

Salado finally got a little breathing room with three more runs in the top of the sixth inning. Josh Goodnight started things with single which was the only hit of the inning. A St. Stephens error, a sacrifice fly by Shawn Easley and four walks produced the runs.

A barrage of base hits in the top of the seventh enabled Salado to score eight runs. Steven Cloud and Jason Hosch collected two hits each in the inning. Easley, Jereme Hosch and Chris McGregor also collected a hit in the inning. Brent Cabaniss had a grand slam homerun in the inning.

Salado's final district game will be played at home on May 12 against Academy. J.V. game starts at 5 p.m. and the Varsity begins at 7 p.m.

Question #2: The School Board serves as the over-seeing body in the district that sets broad policy and works with the administration to see that the goals of the district are met—much like a board of directors and CEO operate in business. The board does not and should not get into the day to day running of the district. The board's role in the community is to be available to listen to taxpayers' concerns and interests and bring those to the attention all board members and the administration. I believe there has been a bit of a lack of communication between these three entities in the recent past which could be improved.

Question #3: The Superintendent's role is to be the chief administrative officer of the schools and to run it according to the guidance and oversight of the board. It is his responsibility to hire and manage the staff and make sure that the district meets and maintains its mandated standards and curriculum. I believe our superintendent has done a very good job in bringing the district to its current recognized status and improving conditions from the disarray that he found when he arrived.

"The superintendent should also be available to the community to translate and communicate school district actions that affect them. In light of the recent communication's failure concerning the bond election, I think this could be improved.

Questions #4-6: I think there is general agreement that we have an overcrowding problem at both of our schools that is only going to get worse, according to enrollment projections. We must do something. I favor building a new middle school or a new high school but I am undecided at the moment which to build or where to build. I am open to all possibilities as long as they make the most economic sense while providing for future growth.

Before making a major decision such as this I would want to rely on the assessment of our building needs now being conducted by a third party consultant as well as exhaust all research into the various possibilities and community wishes.

Question #7: I do not know about a price range. It would have to be tied to the types of school built, where it is built and community considerations regarding support of a bond issue.

Question #1: I am committed to creating an atmosphere conducive to learning for our children. Reports indicate that there is an obvious lack of adequate curriculum. Our TAAS scores are high, but our SAT scores are below state average. Also, as we know, not all children go on to seek higher education; therefore, it is important for us to prepare them to enter the work force as productive and responsible adults, I am a huge advocate of vocational education. Salado's population is small, but this should not reflect the educational needs of our children. Our schools need to offer the most current and effective educational methods used today to reach each spectrum of children.

Question #2: "The role of the board of trustees is to set policy and govern the school system."

Question #3: "The superintendent is the chief executive officer of the school system and carries out board policy."

Questions #4-7: At the present time this question can not be effectively answered. I would want to review the survey that is being currently conducted and evaluate past and present SISD records before I can give a concise answer. However, it would be beneficial to the school district, children and taxpayers to maintain and improve the present campuses. They are in a very poor state and regardless of whether a new campus is built, the existing buildings need to be brought up to standard immediately. Each year, money should be allocated in the budget for capitol expenditures to make necessary improvements to both campuses. This eliminates the need for crisis management.

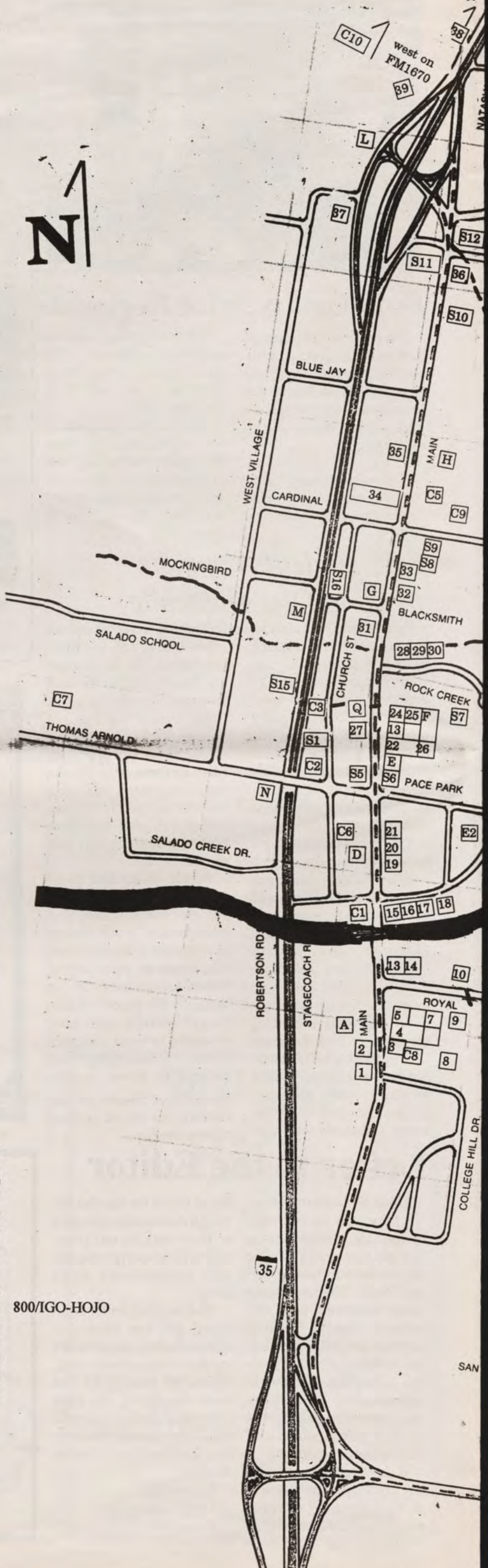

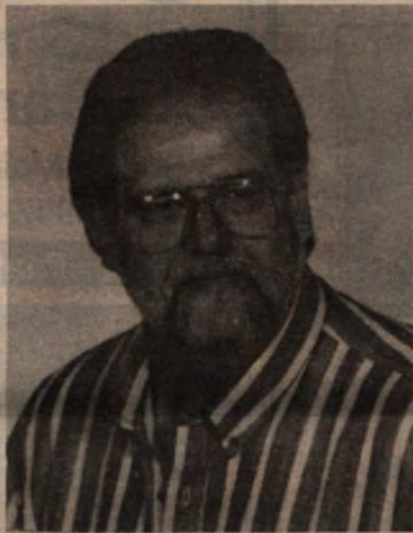
