Salado just says 'No'

Voters reject incorporation of village by wide margin, 530-190 May 4

Salado voters turned out in droves May 4 to defeat a proposal to incorporate a two-square mile area of Salado. The measure failed by a margin of 190 for and 530 against. A margin proportionately similar to earlier incorporation elections.

The incorporation issue came to the forefront in Salado a year ago when the Salado Historical Society announced that its Historic District Committee was considering pursuing incorporating a one-square mile area known as the Historic District to obtain enforceable codes to protect the historic nature of the area.

The Historical Society, and later the Salado Chamber of Commerce, contacted the Central Texas Council of Governments for information and guidance about incorporation.

Roy Hector, president of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, appointed a steering committee to work with CTCOG on an incorporation study which included three town hall meetings, a straw poll of registered voters in the 76571 area code and recommendations by Jim Reed, project supervisor for CTCOG.

The Chamber of Commerce funded the study for approximately \$1,300 last year.

Reed recommended that Salado pursue incorporation of the two-square mile area and, should that effort fail, then the village should pursue incorporation of the smaller historic district area.

The Chamber of Commerce board voted to hire CTCOG for \$4,700 to prepare a petition, voter list, maps and conduct town meetings prior to a proposed Jan. 20, 1996 elec-

tion. The first petition filed Dec. 20 was submitted after the deadline of 60 days to call for an election. The petition was also declared invalid.

Because of the errors made regarding the petition, CTCOG informed Chamber Directors that it would perform the tasks originally agreed in the contract at no cost.

A second petition was filed at the court calling for the May 4 election.

Because the election date was postponed until May, the original steering committee working with CTCOG on the election was expanded to include the 1995 and 1996 leaders of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, Salado Historical Society, Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary, Mill Creek Community Association, Old Salado School

The election results were canvassed and the new board members given their pre-oaths of office at a special called board meeting May 6. The next regular meeting of the SISD Trustees will be 7 p.m. May at the high school.

2 qualify for state track meet in Austin May 11

For the first time in eight years, Salado will send a competitor to the State Track Meet in Austin.

In fact, Salado will be sending two to the State Meet.

Senior William Culp took first place in the 300 Meter Hurdles, setting a school record of 39.1 at the Re-

gional Track Meet.

Junior Brian Bell also set a school record in the 3200 Meter Run with a time of 10:01. He also won first place to qualify for the State Meet.

The two Salado High Schoolers will run in Austin May 11.

Board members elected in heavy turnout

In a highly contested race May 4, Salado voters elected Sara L. Mackie, Rita S. Brown and Bob Merrill to serve three year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees.

Mackie was elected with 584 votes, followed by

Brown, 432 votes, and Merrill, 408.

Eight candidates ran for the three spots, including Fletcher F. Rhodes, 390 votes; Wayne Garner, 223 votes; Barry Simpson, 222 votes; Thomas Berrier, 176 votes and Mike Tubbs, 88 votes.

McQueary resigns as executive director of Chamber

Laura McQueary, executive director of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, tendered her resignation effective May 17 to accept the position of executive director of the Bastrop Chamber of Commerce.

"I feel honored to have had significant involvement in the Chamber's community activities; I pray that the progress made by the Salado Chamber in recent years will continue," McQueary stated in her letter of resignation to

board members. "I am also proud of my personal accomplishments during the five years I served as your chamber executive."

McQueary began her work at the Salado Chamber of Commerce five years ago, working 10-12 hours per week. When the Chamber moved into its new home in the Salado Civic Center, she began full-time work in 1994.

Laura and Carl McQueary moved to Salado in 1990, when Carl began

work as the director of the Bell County Museum in Belton.

In 1991, Carl was named the director of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas Museum in Austin.

The McQuearys move to Bastrop will bring Carl closer to his work.

The Chamber will begin a search for a replacement. President Lloyd Parks asks that interested parties send resumes to him at PO Box 1021, Salado, TX 76571.

The Chamber Board will

begin the search process at its regular meeting May 13.

"Laura will be greatly missed by the Chamber of Commerce," said director Tim Fleischer. "She handled the business of the Chamber with a dedication and resourcefulness that will be hard to duplicate."

"Not only will she be missed by the Chamber," Fleischer added, "but she will be missed by her many friends in Salado,"

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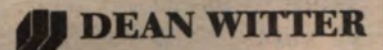
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Area merchants, supporters are generous givers to recent TAAS Bucks Auction

Foundation and Merchants Committee.

The Salado Historical Society board of directors in late 1995 endorsed incorporation to protect the historic nature of Salado.

At its December meeting, the board voted unanimously to support incorporation of as much of the village as possible and should that fail, the board voted to support incorporation of the smaller historic district.

At its May 16 board of directors meeting, the topic of incorporation will again be discussed.

"The board will discuss and hopefully decide whether or not the Historical Society should attempt to incorporate the Historic District," said Historical Society President George Kolb. "This is a very controversial topic and there-

fore it is helpful to the board to receive as many comments and suggestions from the members, both pro and con. Non-members who reside in the Historic District should also submit their comments to us."

Comments on incorporation of the historic district may be sent to the Salado Historical Society,

"I don't see the Chamber having anything else to do with incorporation," said Chamber President Lloyd Parks. "We only facilitated what the straw polls from the CTCOG study indicated as the wishes of the community."

Peaceable Kingdom Retreat for Children Inc., is a retreat that occupies about 125 acres on the Lampasas River in Central Texas. Its mission is to furnish a place for chronically ill children to enjoy country living and the beauties of nature, free of charge and without regard to race, religion or ability to pay.

Activities include fishing, river-rafting, swimming, horseback riding, hiking, play on rope chal-

lenge course, a sport court and playground and learning about nature and how our ancestors lived.

To better serve, the chronically ill children the retreat is designed specifically not to be like a hospital or a camp, but home for a big family living in the woods.

The retreat 501(C)(3) corporation, owns, builds equips and maintains the facilities. It arranges with a charitable hospital to select the children to come, to furnish hospital personnel and counsellors and to feed and supervise the children while there. Neither the retreat nor the hospital charges the children or each other. While it is available to other charitable hospitals, Scott & White Memorial Hospital, is the only one using the facility thus far, and it maintains a permanent in-house staff to work on retreat projects.

The retreat serves and estimated 2,000 people per year, many for weekend retreats throughout the year. It has nine week-long summer sessions each for up to 17 boys and girls, plus staff of at least one for every two children and sometimes one-on-one. The

plan of the retreat is always to work with small groups so as to avoid regimentation, encourage the scared or timid and build-in flexibility so as to offer the staff better opportunities to learn each individual child's needs and interests.

Two new log homes (each accommodating at least 16 people) plus accommodations for another 14 in the main building, also make it possible to have up to a half a dozen families plus staff for overnight, weekend or week long sessions of great value in teaching them to deal with the children's illnesses.

The children for the summer sessions are chosen by doctors of the using hospital in cooperation with the hospital's retreat staff, on the basis of those who will be best served by the experience. Children with at least 29 different illnesses, some very rare, have enjoyed the retreat.

The retreat is supported entirely by donations from interested parties (more than 1,000 so far). It receives no government funds and depends entirely on donations for its operating budget and for capital improvements.

In Fiscal Year 1995, approximately 1.2 million inquiries for Texas travel information were received and fulfilled by the Texas Department of Commerce and the Texas Department of Transportation as a result of the state tourism advertising campaign.

Texas is the second most visited state in the nation. In 1994, 166 million domestic visitors traveled to Texas. An additional 5.3 million international visitors traveled to Texas in 1994. Total travel expenditures in Texas by U.S. residents reached more than \$21.5 billion in 1994, and spending by international travelers added an additional \$3 billion.

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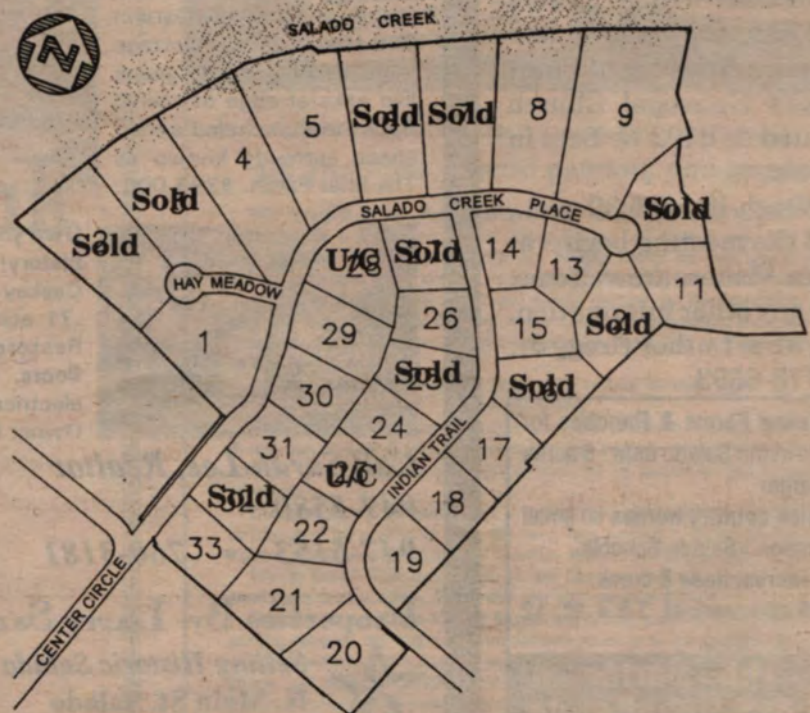

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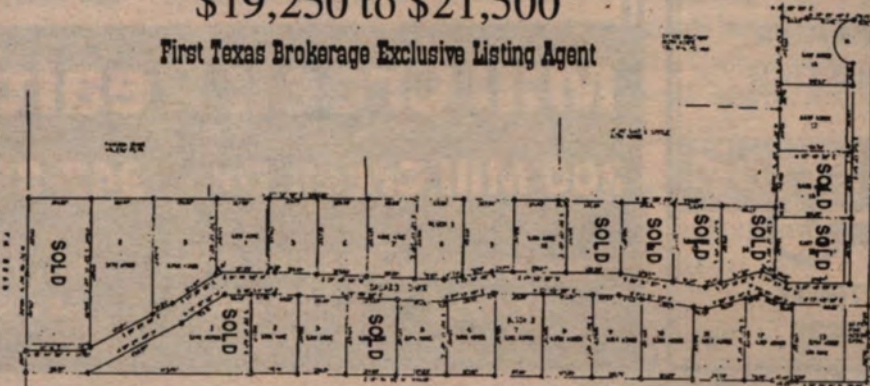

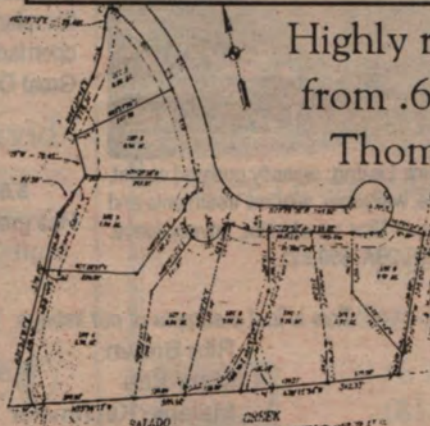

Salado Methodists will restore church

The Salado United Methodist Church has announced plans to restore the Sanctuary of the church which was constructed in 1890. According to Norm Roden, chairman of the Sanctuary Restoration Committee, the plan calls for reworking a substantial part of the building with the intent of restoring the structure to its original condition as completed over 105 years ago.

Some of the major changes include removal of the balcony; restoration of the original pine floor; removal of the false ceiling and restoration of the original beadboard; installation of beadboard walls to replace the sheetrock; new lighting; provisions for two entrances at the front of the building as initially constructed; and the addition of two stained glass windows at the entrance.

Several maintenance items will be handled simultaneously with the restoration including; replacement of the air conditioning system; reinforcement of the foundation; insulation of the walls, floor, and ceiling; the repair of several stained glass windows; and repainting of the structure both inside and out-

side. Roden says, "the cost of the restoration will be substantial, but the church feels that as one of the truly historic structures in the community, we have a responsibility to ourselves, as well as the community, to preserve and maintain our house of worship". Several organizations and individuals have donated funds for the project, but additional money is needed.

The church would be grateful for contributions from any Salado Community business or citizen who supports this project and would like to help. Any contributions would be most welcome.

Reverend Bruce Baker, Church Pastor is delighted with the project and wel-

comes any and all to visit the church and worship with the congregation both during and after the completion of the restoration.
