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## SHS students take 1st in state in number sense, math

Four Salado High School students competed at the University of Interscholastic League Academic State meet held May 6-7 at the University of Texas at Austin.

In the individual Number Sense competition, Brent Cabaniss repeated as state champion with a score of 373. Vinny Michna placed second with a score of 328 and Kyle Anderson placed fifth with a score of 256. In the team Number Sense competition, the Salado team won the state championship with a score of 957. The team from McCamey High School placed second with a score of 689.

In the Persuasive Speaking Contest, Ricky Engleking, a senior at

Salado High School won fifth place. His topic for the final speech was "The School Voucher System."

In the individual Mathematics Competition, Brent won the state championship with a score of 228. Vinny and Kyle chipped in with score of 164 and 140 respectively, to give Salado the state championship in the Mathematics Team Competition with score of 532. McCamey High School again finished second with a score of 504. Brent is a senior while Vinny and Kyle are juniors. Brent closes out his high school career in U.I.L. academic competitions with 30 medals (including 29 gold and 1 silver) from the district, regional and state levels.

## Salado historians seek protection of district

Eighty-five Saladoans gathered May 4 to discuss incorporation of the Historic District to protect the area and to prevent Salado from being annexed by Belton or Temple.

Pat Barton, Troy Kelley and Jack Herrington discussed the formation of the historic district and its guidelines, the successes it has had in influencing construction within the district and its failures.

The guidelines, according to Herrington, "have no enforcement powers. We try to persuade people to

abide by the guidelines and for the most part, people are supportive of the guidelines. Many times we don't find out about a project until we see the construction begin. By then, it is often too late to have any real impact on their plans."

Stephan Sheets and Cary L. Bovey, Round Rock attorneys, discussed with the group how incorporation, in their opinion, could work to protect the historic integrity of Main St. Salado and prevent Salado from being annexed by another city.

Sheets discussed the historic district in Round Rock and zoning regulations for

historic and new properties within the district.

"Within the historic district, aesthetics are regulated," Sheets said. "For property owners within the district following the guidelines, a 75 percent tax exemption is offered."

Because construction permits are required for new projects, Sheets explained, an incorporated city can get the jump on influencing those plans.

"When McDonald's built in Round Rock, we were able to convince them to use natural stone in their construction," Sheets said. This was done when building permits were sought

from the city.

The Round Rock historic district has zoning ordinances concerning historic properties and new construction, as well as landscaping and signs.

Bovey explained that there are several reasons a community decides to incorporate: to implement zoning ordinances, to sell alcohol and to prevent being annexed by a nearby, larger community.

Bovey said that Belton could annex Salado without the permission of its residents because it is a home-rule city.

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## Chamber discusses 'grave' topics at meeting

MaryBelle Brown discussed plans, projects and problems of the Salado Cemetery Association during the monthly meeting of the Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors May 8.

"The function of the Salado Cemetery Associa-

tion is to oversee, maintain, clean-up, repair the cemetery, as well as to handle the sale of lots and preserve the historical integrity of the cemetery," Brown said.

The Association has as its goal providing perpetual care at the cemetery. Presently, the Association pays one trustee to mow the open lots and historic area of the

cemetery.

The historic area of the Salado Cemetery includes markers of 41 Confederate veterans, a Union soldier and two veterans of Texas' War for Independence.

Brown said that the two graves of the veterans of Texas Independence will have markers dedicated with the Daughters of the Republic of Texas during

Memorial Day ceremonies at the Cemetery May 29.

Brown thanked volunteer groups and individuals including World War II veterans who helped fund the purchase of 200 US flags which will be flown at the cemetery Memorial Day.

## Quiz Show

What egghead nominated this documentary-like movie for Best Picture? That's the question running around my head after having sat through it. Like its predecessors **Schindler's List** and **Philadelphia**, **Quiz Show** tries to educate and enlighten its viewers, as well as entertaining them. It fails miserably at any of these.

**Quiz Show** examines (in depth, way, way too much depth) the naivete of the American public and the scandal surrounding the corruption in the quiz show industry in the 1950s.

John Turturro steals the show as the slightly sweaty, nerdy Herbie Stempel, who is ousted as Champion by the quiz show *Twenty-One* by the telegenic, fair-haired Charlie Van Doren (Ralph Fiennes).

When Stempel is given a panel show of his own, he blows the whistle on the whole bunch. Who takes the fall? The network? The sponsors? The executives? The contestants? Who always takes the fall?

Director Robert Redford was ambitious in taking on this topic. But, instead of using the medium to educate and enlighten the huddled masses, he succeeds in boring most of them to tears.

It has been a full decade since the last time Salado, through the Chamber of Commerce, did a thorough study of incorporating the village. A study that took months to complete and ended up going nowhere including a decision not to even bring the matter to a vote.

Today the subject is back on the community's plate due in no small measure to the Salado Historical Society and the Historical District Committee of the society.

The historical preservationists feel they have no other way to stop unwanted or outlandish new or remodeled construction, signage, outside paint colors used and type businesses put in place, short of incorporating the area to be protected.

This area would include Main Street plus a number of side streets that take in many of the village's historic homes. Pace Park is included on the proposed new town map. The historians feel there are more than the required 201 individuals in the designated area to qualify for a **minimum two-square-mile-general-law-town**.

To this end the historical society and district

committee's public meeting last Thursday featured a slide show, an update on the history of the district and a workshop session complete with two legal experts in the field of municipal government.

While all this has been going on, the Chamber of Commerce has been quietly putting together a group of village leaders under the title "Strategic Planning" that will, no doubt, end up with a full fledged study that will include the pros and cons of incorporating the entire village, not just an historic area inside the town. Historic districts can be assigned after a community is fully organized.

The Chamber is not about to go on record favoring or opposing such a political move but hopes to be the vehicle for presenting the facts and letting the community make the call.

It would appear, if history is any guide, that there will always be two major drawbacks to getting Salado incorporated - even beyond completing an objectively developed infor-

mation proposal. First, there is the matter of taxes (how much and how often) and secondly, who will be in charge of the municipal government (elected officials).

Personalities always play a big role in any movement such as this, especially in a small village where everyone knows everyone else up to and including warts and all.

In order to get the incorporation separated from personalities it might be wise to do just the opposite of what was recommended by the legal folks last week and have the up or down vote on incorporation held first, by itself, and then later work out in a subsequent election, who will be mayor and the city councilpersons.

This would keep from confusing the two issues and might make for a cleaner and more sensible campaign.

The Belton-Temple "boogie-bear" (ETJ's annexation of Salado) came up as expected last week and the workshop attendees were told there was not much Salado could do if either of the two Home-Rule cities decided to make a play for the village. Could

Bovey said further that the annexation could take just a few months if Belton were to annex down I-35 toward Salado. "Each step could be a mile and could be planned in such a way as to domino in effect," Bovey said.

Belton has an Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of one-mile outside its city limits. The residents within that ETJ cannot be annexed by another community or incorporate on their own without the permission of Belton.

However, if Belton were to annex Salado, it might have to provide services such as police, water and sewer to the level its resident receive.

"But they have a loop-hole if topography prevents this from being feasible, which it would, most likely, for water and sewer," Bovey said.

The Salado Historic District Committee is examining incorporating the Historic District laid out in the guidelines for the purpose of providing enforcement

powers to its guidelines for new construction, renovation and signs.

This incorporation may not include providing water, sewer, landfill, police or fire services, since these services are provided by private parties or by the county.

Proponents of incorporating the historic district say that it would protect the integrity of the historic district by having enforceable guidelines for construction. Some opponents say incorporation would de-

stroy property owners' rights and the creativity and freedom of design found in some of Salado's most recognized areas: Salado Square and Rock Creek Dr.

Some oppose the idea of incorporating just the Historic District, saying it will divide the village.

This discussion may heat up with the hot Texas summer ahead if the Historic District Committee pursues incorporating the Historic District.

### Salado strategic planning group

The Salado Chamber of Commerce this year has embarked on a unique long range study and planning mission that will extend to the end of the century if plans, underway at the present time, are completed, according to Roy Hector, president of the chamber.

Termed the "Salado Strategic Planning Group", and including a blend of old-timers, newcomers, young and old, friends and neighbors, the new planning group will form into a series of committees designed to study Salado as it is today and project what will be needed tomorrow as the village grows and prospers.

Dr. Wayne Baden, chairman of the SSPG, in addressing the group of more than 30 Saladoans at the initial session of the group explained the mission as follows:

"The Salado Chamber of Commerce believes the steady growth of our village has reached the stage that requires thoughtful, controlled growth. On that basis, a strategic planning group has been established to formulate a "master plan" for our future. We must blend our individual agendas into this overall plan."

Baden continued: "Our mission shall be that evermindful of the rich, historical and attractive lifestyle of the Salado community as an ideal place to live and rear a family, the SSPG shall strive to determine the optimum community condition and environment which may exist within Salado and

its immediate surrounding area during each ensuing five year period. This determination includes discovery, cataloguing and prioritizing facts and collaborating information impacting on planning and required actions to attain optimum reachable goals and mileposts within projected resources. Planning and projected actions must always meet the simple test of "What is best for the common good of Salado and its citizens'."

The executive committee of the newly organized group is composed of: Chairman Baden along with Roy Hector, ex-officio member; Dr. Don McDonald, Dr. Doug Willingham, Ruth Howe, Eldon Miller and Bea Stewart.

Committee chairmen include: **Arts** - Doris Manning, chairman; **Business**, Robert Denman and Cathy Sands; **Education**, Dr. Steven Ervin; **Land Management**, Bill Bartlett; **Governmental Affairs**, Gerry Gamble, Bob Cottle and Dr. Luther Brewer.

**Health Care**, Dr. Charles Barrier and Mary Belle Brown; **Historical**, Dr. Doug Willingham; **Natural Resources**, Cindy Dale and Jim Dale; **Public Information**, Tim Fleischer and Ken Clapp; **Recreation for All Ages**,

Larry McGregor and Danny Grim and **Religion**, Mike Bergman and Dempsey Stripling.

In appointing this committee of the Chamber of Commerce, president Roy

Hector noted: "On behalf of the Chamber of Commerce and citizens of Salado, I convey their sincere thanks and appreciation for the efforts each of you are undertaking. #### Incorporation

There is little doubt that the matter of incorporation will come up when the future of Salado is studied. This has been done several times in the recent past and met with a variety of views. It is not the purpose of the long range planning group, according to its leaders, to promote or discourage incorporation but when it comes up for study the group will put together all the facts - pro and con as well as all costs associated with such a venture - and at the proper time present this information to the community for their consideration and future action, if any.

The newly formed long range planning group is an experiment by the current chamber of commerce leadership. Membership will not end at the conclusion of any given chamber year but will continue for a full five years in order to provide continuity to the study of what Salado can be and should be in the years ahead.

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

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be done in a short period of time - assuming of course they want to do it at all.

**When and if full incorporation** (not just part of the village) comes to pass, it would be great if we could find 2001 inhabitants of all ages residing within a **four** square mile area and lock it into the proposed City of Salado. This would offer the city more citizens to select leaders from and certainly provide a larger tax base.

By the way, do not be fooled by talk of Salado not setting a tax rate if incorporated. True, a new city does not legally have to collect taxes - but it would happen. On that you could bet the farm!

Probably the best thing all of us can do at this point in time is to pay attention to what the Chamber comes up with insofar as facts - pro and con - on the value of being an incorporated city. This probably should be done in concert with the historical group - no reason the two cannot work together. And finally, when all the facts and figures are assembled, call for a full-blown town hall meeting and then, if enough folks want another go at an election - get 50 voters to sign a petition and let the County Judge call the election.

It might also be a good idea for all eligible Saladoans to register to vote some time soon. The number on the rolls at this time is disgracefully low!

Fact is, it has been 10 years since we last took a good look at the subject. Much has transpired during those years. Lot of new folks have arrived on the scene. Building has skyrocketed. Uncontrolled changes could be on the horizon so it may just be the right time to take another look.

And while we are looking - keep a weather eye to the north. Belton and

Temple are tax hungry and nothing makes a city drool with delight more than the prospect of adding some high volume tax producing land to which they would not have to provide services.

All in all, we appreciate the historians for putting together an interesting seminar for us but this business of setting up a "city within a village" could be most divisive when you think about it, so the best bet, in this writer's opinion (and a good many others we have heard from) would be to get behind the chamber effort and move forward with an all encompassing study of what we will be needing, as a village or city, up to and after the turn of the century.

Nice thing about all of this work, as well as everything else that happens in Salado, it is done by outstanding volunteers working only for the good of the village.

## Salado receives TAAS scores on exit-level 10th grade test

Salado I.S.D. recently received results of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills testing. The results are for 10th grade students tested in march on the Exit Level Test.

On the Reading test, 83 percent of the students met minimum expectations. The state average on the Reading test is 76 percent.

On the Mathematics

test, 60 percent of the students met minimum expectations. The state average was 59 percent.

On the Writing test, 88 percent met minimum expectation. The state average was 86 percent.

Of the 42 students test, 56 percent met minimum expectation on all three tests. The state average on all test taken was 54 percent.

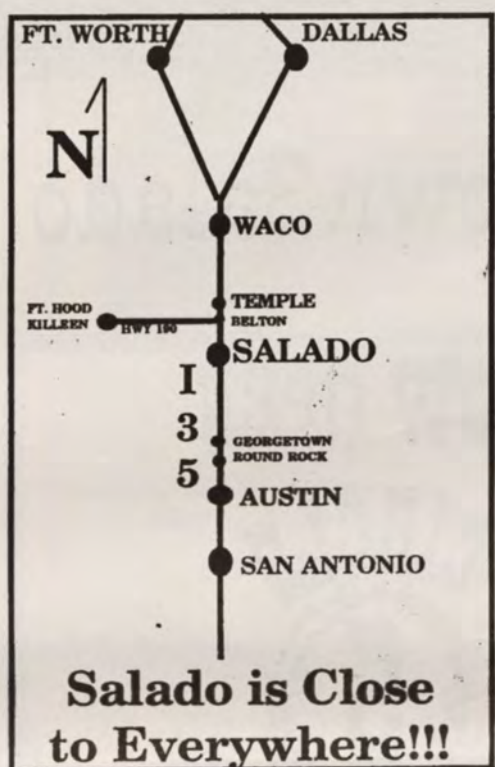
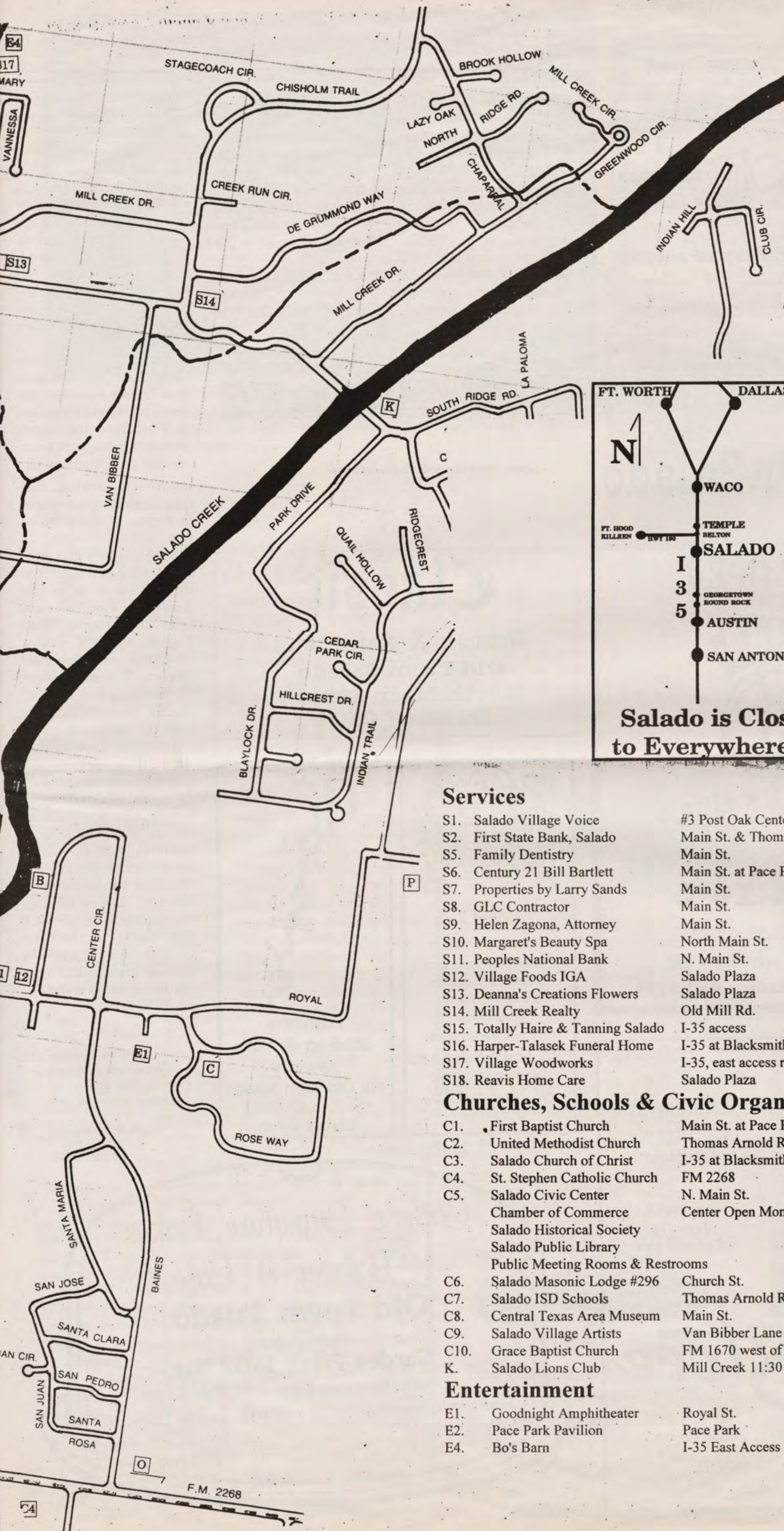

entrance and a community water supply.

Dale also said that merchants are alarmed that the Stroll may suffer this year and next because there is no Homes Tour. The Merchants and/or Chamber may consider sponsoring an accompanying Tour-like event for December, but no action was taken by the board.

The Chamber will sponsor a village-wide event later this year to raise funds for the Salado Youth Association, which is building athletic fields and facilities on land off Rose Lane. Event committee chair Tim Fleischer told board members that the first meeting of the committee will be 9 a.m. May 11 at the Civic Center. 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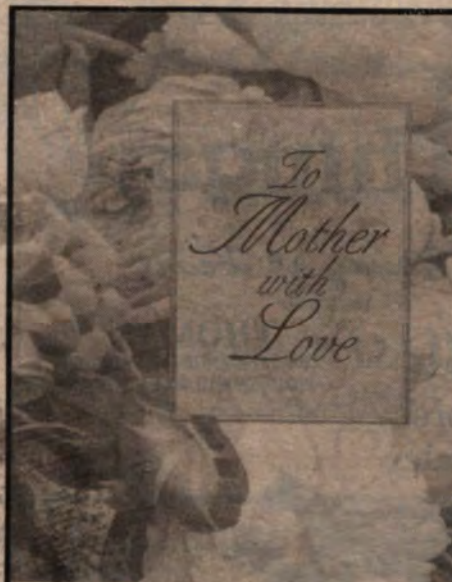
# UMHB musicians seek placement in honor fraternity

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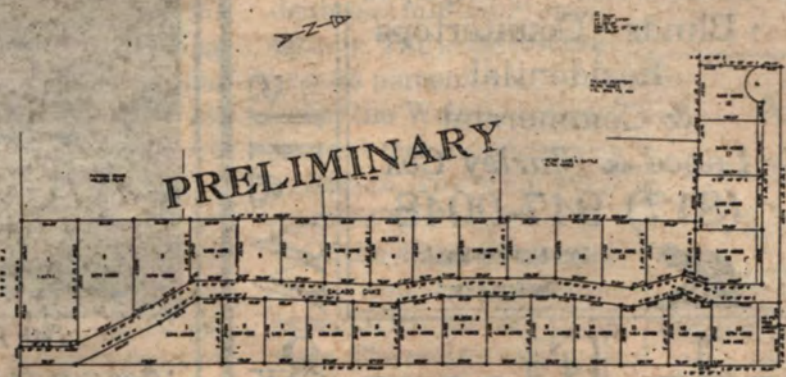

# Choose Texas Grown annuals and perennials this spring

Perennial and annual are two terms that can be defined simply, but cause bewilderment for many. When you consider that the same plant can be both an annual and perennial depending upon its environment, the confusion multiplies. In South Texas, during mild winters, begonias are perennial but in colder regions such as Dallas and Amarillo begonias are annuals.

Simply stated, a perennial is a plant which persists from year to year. Herbaceous perennials survive each winter underground

as roots, bulbs, rhizomes or tubers. Foliage and flowers die back during the winter.

Trees and shrubs, both deciduous and evergreen, are woody perennials. These perennials have woody stem tissue that persist above ground each year.

Most perennials are easily propagated by division, seed or cuttings. Division is particularly successful since it not only provides new plants but is necessary for the plants' continued vigor. Numerous perennials will tolerate rela-

tively poor growing conditions but all respond favorably to well-prepared planting areas containing high percentages of organic materials and moderately high fertility rates. TEXAS GROWN perennials also assure the buyer of quality and adaptability.

Annuals are plants which live their entire life in one year. They germinate, grow, leaf-out, flower, produce seed and then die. Many readily reseed themselves, leading you to believe the plant grew from its original roots. Not so. An entirely new plant grew from seed.

Both TEXAS GROWN perennials and annuals have a variety of landscape uses and offer an infinite number of exciting combinations. Container gardens, color gardens, borders and cut flower gardens all can be created with the use of perennials and annuals. Keep in mind perennials grow year after year and often require less maintenance than annuals.

Perennials were once a prominent part of nearly every Texas landscape, but are often overlooked by today's gardeners. Many medicinal and culinary herbs are perennials and can offer another dimension to the home landscape.

**Cutting gardens.** Cutting gardens provide the flower lover with abundant

material from which to fashion their arrangements. By providing a special cut flower area, the gardener can anticipate and plan for these needs without disturbing or diminishing landscape plantings. Another advantage of this garden type is that annuals and perennials may be conveniently and efficiently grown in rows where they are easily gathered and maintained. Cutting gardens need not be unattractive, but it is sensible to locate them so they are not the focal point of your landscape.

**Container gardens.** Effectively selecting and placing container plants is a practical way to replace lost ground space in our urban environments. Container culture of perennials, roses and annuals allows one to control soil quality, watering and plant placement. Most containers are relatively portable and may be grouped or moved to take advantage of seasonal displays. Hanging containers add another dimension to the landscape. When used with restraint and scaled to the surroundings, cascading annuals and perennials can be significant additions to courtyards, entrance areas and terraces.

**Pockets of color.** Perennials and annuals provide seasonal color change. By enlarging planting ar-

reas in front of evergreen shrubs it is possible to prepare modest sized spaces for clumps of seasonal color. Make sure to plant sufficient quantities of the flower to create a real impact and not just a "spot" in the overall picture. Use color pockets around outdoor living areas, swimming pools and entrance courts, where they may be enjoyed most.

**Borders.** Perennial borders, inherited from England, evolved during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. These borders extended the growing season from a few months in spring and summer to year-round through the use of bulbs, ornamental grasses, annuals, perennials and herbs. English borders were limited in space by walls or hedges, giving continuity to the discord created by the use of a wide variety of plants, each displaying different colors, forms and textures. These herbaceous borders require considerable space, with dimensions of at least 5-6 feet wide and 20-30 feet long. Wider and longer borders offer more opportunity for manipulation and gradation of color, form and texture.

- "Reducing contamination is important to the success of plastic bag recycling programs," says PBA President Ron Schmieder. "For example, food scraps and paper receipts, which are commonly found in plastic bag recycling bins, make the recycling process more difficult and less efficient."

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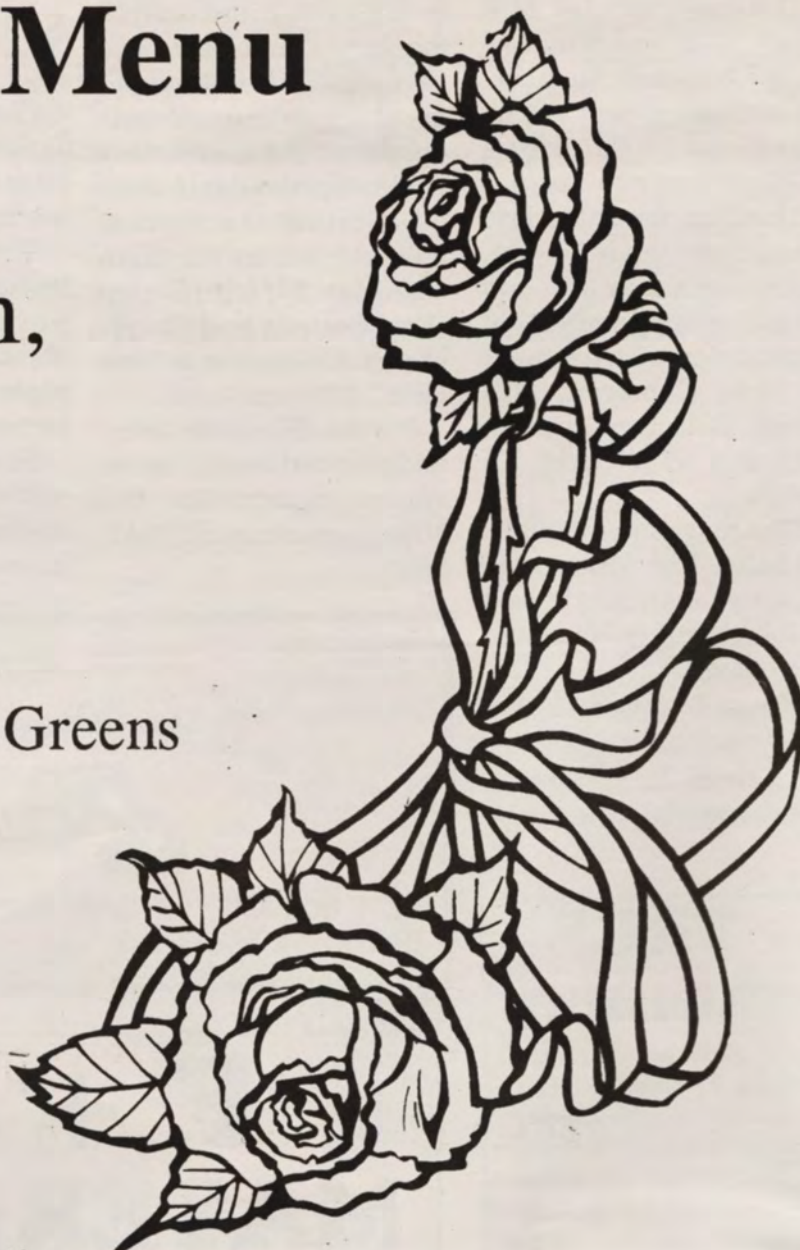
