Town hall meeting July 25 on incorporation of Salado

The first in a series of three town hall type meetings to discuss the incorporation of Salado has been scheduled for 6 p.m. July 25 in the school cafeteria located on Thomas Arnold Road, with the entire program lasting two hours.

Jim Reed has been contracted to serve as the Project Manager of the in-depth study of three options that will be presented to Saladoans, when the work is completed - including the incorporation of a town four square miles in area - taking in most of the village; incorporation of a smaller two square mile downtown area that would include most of what is generally considered to be Salado's historic area or the third possibility, that of not incorporating anything.

Reed, a certified planner with the Central Texas Council of Governments, noted in a press release from his office late last week that the first meeting on July 25, will focus on an introduction of the study and solicitation of questions, comments and concerns from the community.

The forums will be informal in nature with the goal of the first meeting to introduce the project manager and staff to the community and allow those in attendance to advise the planners on issues of concern and interest the citizens have in relation to the matter of incorporation.

The second meeting, slated for August 15, will focus on a more intensive review of the topic of incorporation and its' implications to the Village of Salado. Answers to questions posed at the first meeting will be addressed and further questions and comments will be accepted.

The final town meeting set for August 29, will be preceded by a newsletter mailed to all residents of the area, containing summaries of the work to date, plus answers to questions most commonly asked concerning the subject of incorporation.

The newsletter will be ready for mailing the week of August 21-25, and will also contain a "sample ballot" which can be completed and returned to CTCOG to record residents views on the matter of incorporation.

The third and final town hall meeting August 29 in the school cafeteria will be slightly more formal in nature.

This last session will center on a detailed presentation of the three scenarios (incorporation of the entire village; smaller downtown area or no incorporation at all) with the final responses to questions and concerns of the citizens.

Specific information will be presented relating to costs associated with incorporation; tax structure; rules and regulations associated with the operation of a general rule city and other pertinent information involved in moving to a city government.

There will be a question and answer period following the third session.

The study will culminate with a final report being delivered to the coordinating committee on September 8.

Director Reed noted that the study team welcomes comments and that residents wishing to discuss the study with any member of the planning group may do so by calling the CTCOG office in Belton at 939-1801 during normal business hours.

At some point in time after the third town hall session, provided there is an interest shown in pursuing incorporation, the Salado Chamber of Commerce will hold a meeting of the residents within the proposed city limits for the purpose of preparing a petition requesting the County Judge to call an election so voters may have an opportunity to vote the measure up or down.

If the incorporation measure is passed then a second election will take place to elect officials for the new town.

Board hires asst. principal, 2 teachers; accepts coach's resignation July 17

The Salado I.S.D. Board of trustees hired Joe Palmer as assistant principal at the high school and accepted the resignation of Dave Westfall, during its regular meeting July 17. The board also hired Brett Mullins and Elaine Hanson as high school teachers.

The board voted unanimously to increase prices for cafeteria breakfast to \$1 and for cafeteria lunch to \$1.50 for the next school year.

In other business, campus principals Rod Stockstill and Ed Thomas

discussed plans and progress on four portable buildings to relieve crowding on the campuses.

High school principal Ed Thomas said that the portables at the high school will add six classrooms to be used in the following manner: one class for fine arts, two rooms for computer labs, one classroom for resource, one classroom for content mastery and one room for additional staff.

The addition of portables at Thomas Arnold Elementary will allow all the sixth grade classes to meet in the portables on the north side of the school.

Gifted/Talented and Technology will also be moved to the portable as well as a mailroom for the school.

Speech and other special education classes will be moved into Mrs. Curry's old classroom, which will free up space to be utilized for conference areas for the teachers.

Stockstill told the board that the district received a \$13,000 grant to be used to install the T-Star

Berg named Teacher of Year by Soil Conservation Districts

The United States Soil Conservation Districts has announced the selection of Kim L. Berg, science teacher at Salado High School from 1992 to 1995, as the South Central United States Conservation Education Teacher of the Year for 1995. Berg was selected as the winner in the secondary school category from a five state area.

Award-winning projects directed by Berg include: Enviro-Camp 1993-1994, a conservation and ecology day camp for Salado elementary students; Creek Tours for Education Youth 1994 and 1995, which introduced some 400 children to Salado Creek; and "Vision of the Tree", and original conservation-based play; plus creation and distribution of a brochure about creek ecology.

Berg has also participated in teacher education workshops, macro-invertebrate surveys and water

testing as a cooperative teaching effort with the Salado Creek Preservation Committee.

Students at Salado High School have attended marine science workshops; water tests training; Texas Parks and Wildlife Expos; and Environmental Leadership Programs as members of the Salado High School Science Club, founded by Ms. Berg. Fund raisers, to decrease parent financing, were an important part of trip planning. Other awards and honors shared by Berg and her students include: A Texas State Senate Resolution in their honor, May 1993. Second place in the HEB Environmental Challenge '93 and '94.

A total of \$2,000 in prize money has been awarded in scholarships or used to fund students trips.

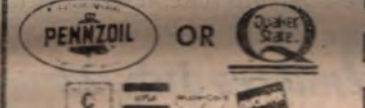
Although Berg is no longer at Salado High School, she continues to

further the educational opportunities for students here in biologic science and ecology. Four students and Bonnie Smith, with Berg, will attend a Texas Parks and Wildlife Ecology and Resource Management workshop on July 24-28, 1995. Watch for their next project!

Justin Hodge was awarded a \$10,000, four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo FFA scholarship recently in special ceremonies at the State FFA Convention in Lubbock.

Justin, the son of Glenn and Gloria Hodge, was a member of the Salado FFA chapter. He plans to major in agricultural business at Texas Tech University.

Members of the Texas Education Agency chose the FFA scholarship recipients. The selected students all demonstrated academic excellence and strong leadership skills throughout their high school careers.

All FFA recipients must pursue a degree in agriculture or life sciences at a Texas college or university.

"Half a million dollars for these 50 students tonight is a big investment," said Jim Bloodworth, first vice president of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. "But we are counting on being paid back many times over by the accomplishments of these fine young men and women."

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship presentations were part of week-long FFA activities in Lubbock, including workshops, seminars and the election of new state FFA officers.

These 50 scholarships were funded through net proceeds from the 1994 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and are only a part of the Show's annual educational commitment. In addition to these 50 awards, the Show also is presenting another 175 \$10,000 scholarships, 43 \$5,000 awards, 8 \$2,500 awards, 104 Hispanic scholarships totaling

\$206,000, graduate assistantships valued at \$235,000, school art scholarships worth \$70,000 and various other contributions to Texas colleges and universities. These contributions bring the organization's 1995-96 educational commitment to more than \$3.5 million.

"On a friend's advice, I decided to hedge my bets and to get my teaching cer-

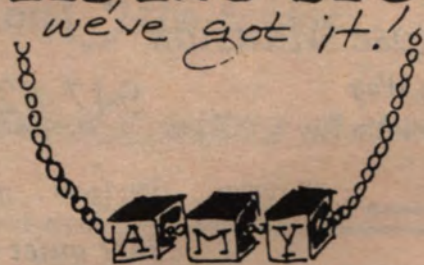

tification," Williamson said. "I supported myself solely as an artist during that three year period."

He is married to Stephanie Klemann of Temple and is currently teaching history at Sugar Land Middle School.

His subject matter tends to be of an historical, nostalgic, and Christian nature.

"I use camouflage and subliminal images to enhance my work as well as to give glory to my God and Saviour, Jesus Christ to whom I give all credit and glory for the ability to do this work," Williamson said.

Charlene Cooper

Charlene Cooper is the folkartist who creates unique Cypress Knee Originals. She has been a professional artist for the past 15 years and has worked with different media in many parts of the world.

She has gained insight into various types of folkart as she experienced the lifestyles, values and materials in such places as Denmark, Panama, Germany, California, New York, Kansas and now Texas.

Since a major part of folkart is using materials that are common to the area, Cypress Knees are a new media for Charlene. It is one that offers a challenge with each natural cypress shape and keeps the creative mind fresh and flexible.

The Cypress Knees themselves come from the swamps and bayous of the South. They are air roots that grow up through the water to help the cypress tree breathe. Each root has its own shape, just like people have fingerprints.

The Cypress Knees personalities emerge one-at-a-time by using a bit of humor, a touch of paint, and a little imagination.

The characters include Santas, Rabbits, Uncle Sam, Professionals and Sports.

Each knee is a signed and numbered original. The bottom can be personalized using a waterproof marker. Look for the lady bug that is included for good luck on each piece.

The 29th Annual Salado Art Fair August 5-6 in Pace Park will draw thousands of visitors to this quiet village.

The Art Fair also draws some of Texas' finest artists in several media, including all styles of painting, sculpture, jewelry, wood crafts, handmade clothing and handmade toys. This year, almost 190 juried artists, from a list of over 1,000 applicants, will show their work at the Art Fair.

According to Texas health officials, this year's mild winter and wet spring have contributed to an annoying boom in the state's mosquito population. But although the insects may spoil some outdoor recreation, so far no mosquito-borne illness outbreaks have been reported.

Key Vaughn, chief of the vector control program of the Texas Department of Health (TDH) General

Sanitation Division, said, "So far, most areas with mosquito infestations are bothered by 'pest' varieties of the insects, not the more notorious disease vectors."

He explained that of about 83 mosquito varieties native to Texas, only four or five species readily transmit serious diseases.

Vaughn explained that since mosquitoes must hatch in standing water, people should empty or dis-

pose of any outside containers where water can collect. Old tires, outside flower pots, holes in trees and clogged gutters on houses are infamous hatching places for mosquitoes. In addition, the water in pet dishes, children's wading pools and bird baths should be changed at least twice a week. Also, door and window screens should be in good repair to prevent mosquitoes from moving indoors.
