The dreaded "T" word

What is there about the word "Taxes" that conjures up such seething resentment among our fellow citizens? Can it be the Biblical connotation - that of staying as far away from tax collectors as possible, even to the point of not eating with them?

Or could it be that there is a deep feeling entrenched in our hearts and minds that those who collect our hard earned taxes rarely spend it wisely?

Today in Texas we are seeing the subject bandied about with great alacrity by those at the highest level of government up to and including the work being done by our bright young Governor George Bush.

The Governor, shortly after his successful first legislative session, noted that as he worked with the legislators during the first six months of his term and later traveling around the State, had found one subject that was over-ridingly unpopular - the hated homeowner's property tax that supports most of our local public school systems.

Bit of history: Back some 47 years ago, a brand new approach to the funding of education came into being. Called the Gilmer-Aiken Law, it set up a minimum

foundation relative to what should be taught, who should teach and what supplies and books should be used in all schools.

Based on enrollment and average daily attendance and provided that schools agreed to offer at least a minimum educational program for each student, State dollars would roll into the districts at the ratio of 80-20. Eighty percent of the money from the state and twenty percent from local taxpayers.

This would not include debt retirement for building bonds, nor would it include any extras that the district might want to put in place for such things as an upgraded teacher salary schedule, special courses, fancier athletic aids and so on.

Today, the cost of running a school is unbalanced at the rate of 55% from local ad valorem taxes and the rest from the State treasury. When local funds are added to pay for bonded indebtedness, the hometown contribution easily increases to nearly 60 percent of the total education bill in most school districts.

This is getting close to an exact reversal of the funding schedule used not so long ago and explains why the homeowners property tax has gone through the roof and why taxpayers are so unhappy.

Problem to be solved - how to provide relief to

property owners while at the same time equalizing the tax burden for all citizens and still meet the statewide financial obligations that include education, health and welfare, highways, and so forth?

BUSH PLAN

First thing Governor Bush did was to set up a high profile committee composed of top elected and appointed officials with staff support from the state budget office and other related experts. Their charge was to bring forth ideas on how to give tax relief to homeowners; equalize the overall State tax burden and most important of all - **not come back with a recommendation for a state income tax!**


The blue ribbon committee reported that without an income tax they would have to recommend higher franchise taxes on business; increase the current sales tax and/or expand the base of that tax to include everything sold; tinker with a value added tax; hike user fees for all state services or a combination of all the above.

Not satisfied with these results, Bush appointed another committee headed by Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer and sent them on a series of "dog and pony" shows around the state in order to gather input from the grass roots.

These meetings are going on as we write with not much of anything uncovered other than the age old

OTHERS IN ACT

As if these committees were not enough, other politicians decided to get into the act. Our pushy State Comptroller John Sharp jumped last week and opined that if the Governor and his folks were too politically scared to come up with a plan to ease the tax burden on Texans - **he would "come to the rescue"**.

Bear in mind - Sharp goes to sleep at night hugging his Governor's Teddy Bear; dreams of life in the Governor's Mansion and wakes up hoping it is his inauguration day. The rest of his waking hours are spent doing all he can to convince the rest of us voters that we need to upend first term Bush and let the great John Sharp solve our problems!

What the comptroller's constitutional job description has to do with all this is anyone's guess. Presume he has so little to do in his own office that he can spend his time getting into everyone else's business while keeping his gubernatorial press machine roaring at record speed.

SENATE RACE LEVEL

Even at the lowly state senate race level we find tax relief action pending. Democrat nominee Rick Rhodes, who is battling GOP Troy Fraser for the District 24 seat in the Texas upper house,

shouted in Temple last week that he will, if elected, set up a Tax Force from within his senatorial district, that includes Bell County, to help him "lead the way" towards tax reform when the legislature convenes come January, 1997.

Just how much pull a neophyte senator, regardless of party, will have on such weighty subjects as equalizing taxes state-wide is anyone's guess, but having watched proceedings down in Austin for some time, it is this reporter's view that Rhodes or Fraser will be lucky to be given a seat on the committee-that-counts-toilet-paper during a first year in office.

But it does sound good when you are running for a senate seat as it must sound to Sharp who is hoping to dump a popular one term governor year after next.

Predict Sharp will get kicked hard by Bush if the over exposed Comptroller decides to take on the really "sharp" Governor. And, also guess that whoever wins the district 24 senate seat will be so flushed with victory that he will forget all about "Tax Forces" or any other type of local input, except for the all important "reelection committees" whose job it will be to raise money to secure the sinecure.

SAID AND DONE

"When all is said and done - all that will be done is said" is an old political axiom that pretty well out-

lines what the Governor will come up with when he checks the results of all the hearings and reports about who gets the tax hike "black bean".

With at least one hand tied behind everyone who seeks information about tax relief and equalization - that being "no state income tax", there is only one other way to ease the property tax payer burden and that is to increase tax rates on someone else.

Unless of course, the cost of government is decreased but since we have not reached the age of miracles yet, taxes will have to be raised.

Be it a jump in the business franchise taxes, increased sales taxes, value added taxes, widening the sales tax base to include things like food and medicine, hike the sin taxes on tobacco and liquor and/or raise fees for all state services.

There appears to be no other options available.

Sorry about that Governor Bush, but thanks for trying!

A MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE OF HOUSE DISTRICT 54:
Dear Friends:

I recently announced my decision to leave the Texas House of Representatives where I have had the honor of representing you for nearly seven years. My resignation from the Legislature will be effective August 1 when I will begin a new job working with Texas Attorney General Dan Morales.

Because you have honored me with your support and counted on my representation of you, I want to explain to you why I have made this decision.

All my life, I have been a rancher. As you know, our area is going through one of the worst droughts in our history. The drought has affected the livelihood of every livestock raiser in our area and I am no exception. This has made it difficult for me to continue devoting a major portion of my time to serving in the Legislature.

For the past three and a half years, I have served as Chairman of the House Administration Committee. This is the most time-consuming position in the House of Representatives because it carries the responsibility for managing the day-to-day operations of the House. In addition, I chair the Sunset Advisory Commission which conducts detailed reviews of the operations of state agencies to ensure that your tax dollars are being spent efficiently and effectively by your state government.

I am proud that I had the opportunity to serve in these important positions but they demanded that I spend much of my time in Austin, away from my home and business.

When the position became available with the Attorney General's Office, I saw it as an opportunity to continue serving the people of Texas and remain involved in the process in a new and challenging capacity.

Even though I will be

leaving the Legislature, my legislative offices in Austin and Lampasas will remain open with a staff of hard working and dedicated people to serve you and provide assistance until you, the voters, choose a new representative. If you need assistance on any matter involving state government, you can contact the Austin office at 512-463-0684 or the Lampasas office at 512-556-8954. The Lampasas office is open on Monday through Wednesday between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Serving you in the Texas Legislature has been the most personally satisfying and rewarding experience of my life. I have tried my best to make certain that your opinions and ideas were always represented in the process of writing our state's laws. I and my wife, Thresa, thank you for your friendship and your years of support.

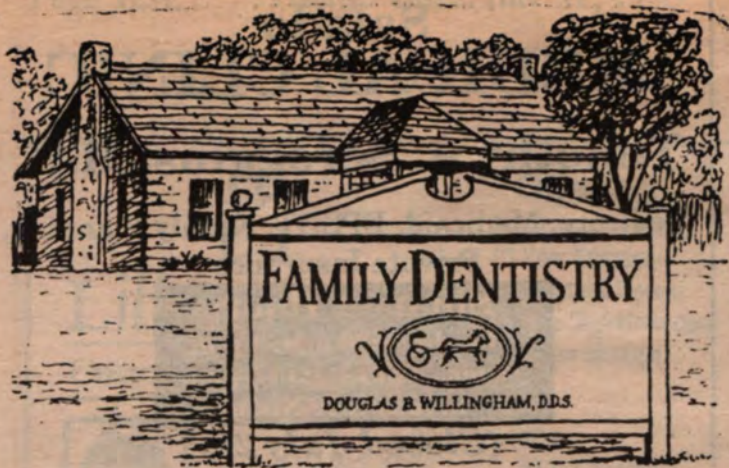

 **CAPITOL COMMENT**
 U.S. SENATOR

If you're the victim of a crime in this country, the scales of justice are tilted away from you. When a conflict occurs between the rights of a criminal and the rights of a victim, the criminal almost always wins. Is this an overstatement? Not at all.

Last year the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the Texas Board of Pardons may not consider victims' protest letters at a parole hearing. So if someone is convicted of killing a member of your family, the board is forbidden to listen to your objections to the murderer's early release from prison.

In Florida, the parents of a 15-year-old boy who was beaten and shot to death were never notified of the sentencing of two gang members involved in their son's murder.

In Colorado, defense attorneys subpoenaed the victim's mother as a witness in a murder case, effectively keeping her out of the courtroom during the trial. She was never called to testify.

The American criminal justice system has come to exclude victims from any meaningful participation in the process. Victims are voiceless and powerless. In many cases, they're invisible.

Defendants have the right to a speedy trial, the right to trial by jury, the right to free counsel, the right not to incriminate themselves, the right to subpoena and confront witnesses and the right to due process. But victims have no guaranteed rights whatsoever under the Constitution. Victims and their families often are treated as inconveniences and ignored throughout proceedings. They often learn from the news media when their attacker is released from prison.

For this reason, I am co-sponsoring a Senate bill that would add a victims' rights amendment to the Constitution. Such an amendment would put victims' rights on an equal par with those of criminal defendants. It would guarantee victims:

- The right to be informed of proceedings.
- The right to be heard.
- The right to be notified of the offender's release or escape.
- The right to a final disposition of their case free from unreasonable delay.
- The right to restitution.
- The right to be notified of their rights -- as is every criminal defendant.

Those who argue that we don't need to change the Constitution to accomplish this balance need to reconsider the facts. Laws and statutes haven't worked to restore fairness for victims. American history teaches us that constitutional protections are needed to ensure the basic rights of Americans. Who would be comfortable now if the right to free speech, or a free press, or any of our other major rights were subject to the vagaries of changing legislative or court majorities?

It is right to ensure that those accused of committing crimes receive all the protections they are entitled to under the Constitution. Shouldn't victims of crime have equal standing in the eyes of the law?

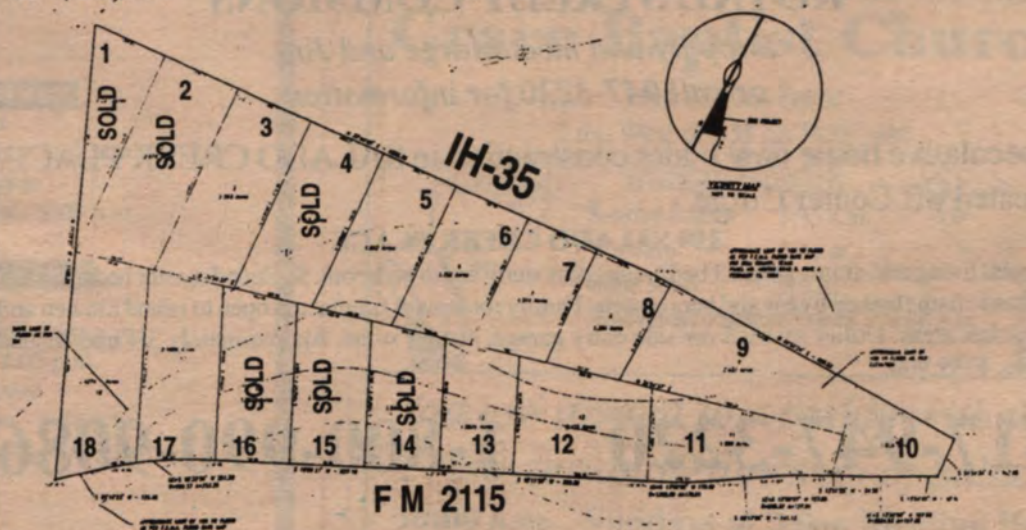

 It is time for ranchers who want to enter the 1996-97 Ranch to Rail program to make preparations.

According to Dr. John McNeill, Extension Beef Specialist who coordinates the Ranch to Rail program, two hundred fifty eight ranches from five states

participated in the 1995-96 Texas A&M Ranch to Rail program. Ranch to Rail is an information feedback program that allows commercial cow calf operators and purebred breeders to determine if their calves meet the needs of the beef industry and to realize what constitutes value beyond the weaned calf phase of beef production.

of efficient gain, low medicine costs and lean, high grading carcasses.

There are those who believe that since calves are so cheap you can't afford to properly prepare them to enter the marketing channels. Even though calves are cheap, the cost of production due to high grain prices necessitates attention to details to optimize production. Calves that got sick at the feedyard (primarily respiratory disease) had an average medicine cost of \$34.05 per head and a death loss of 3.5%. They didn't gain as well nor did they grade as well as healthy calves. They calculate to be worth \$10.33 less per cwt. as feeders due to their inefficiencies and added production costs.

High grain prices and low fed cattle prices resulted in an average loss of \$28.32 per head. However, the range in ranch returns per head varied from +\$137.04 to \$307.91. Steers were sold on a carcass basis with premiums for Choice and Prime quality grades and discounts for Standards. Premiums were paid for Yield Grades 1 and 2 with discounts for Yield Grades 4 and 5.

Producers who are serious about being competitive in the future need to determine whether or not their steers meet the needs of the industry and implement changes to genetics and/or management to hit the industry target. Ranch to Rail provides that opportunity.

Carcass prices were relatively good in February and March when the first steers were marketed, but weakened in May when the bulk of the cattle were sold. Therefore time of marketing had a major influence on net return. However the data documents that even in bad economic times there are cattle that excel in meeting the needs of the beef industry. The high profit ranch entry (\$137.04 per head) happened to sell at the top of the market. However, if you use the average carcass prices paid for the various quality grades and yield grades, their calculated net would still be \$110.08. This ranch entry, like the other 17% of the ranch entries that had a positive net return, were characterized by high rates

Applications accepted for farms loan

"Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Gatesville, Texas," James I. McWilliams said today.

Bell county is one of six in Texas recently named, by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the damages and losses caused by the drought.

McWilliams said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," McWilliams said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 3, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season" McWilliams said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Gatesville is open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

plasma torch from sheet steel, chipped, brushed, welded, rusted and painted," Alanis said. "Designs are western or Southwestern. Sculptures are base or wall mounted."

The times for this year's fair will be 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 3 and 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 4. Admission is \$3 for adults and children under 12 are free.

Salado Humane Society members' letter concerns animal control effort

DEAR EDITOR:

We, members of the The Salado Humane Society, have been watching with interest the formation of "Salado Animal Control Organization". Animal Control is badly needed in and around Salado. We have been doing our best for several years with very limited resources to alleviate this problem.

Rather than have two separate organizations for the control of animals, wouldn't it be more productive to join forces. Perhaps the efforts of the Salado Humane Society have been misunderstood. Do people think that we only "feed cats"?

For the record, during the past five years we have picked up or taken in 233 cats, 154 of those were spayed or neutered, 67 were adopted, 62 put down either because of disease or injury, 50 were either killed by cars, dogs or disappeared. Of the 66 dogs taken in, 20 were spay or neutered, 36 adopted, 16 put down due to disease or injury, 2 disappeared and

one was hit by a car. The Humane Society, through the generosity of one of its members has built a facility to hold cats, however the shelter is presently filled to capacity. We have no facility for dogs, however through the generosity of our veterinarian, Jon Kendell, we have been able to board some dogs, but not near the number that need care.

We also report animal cruelty cases to the Bell County officer, Perry Moose at 817-933-5439.

Mr. Moose is currently investigating an alleged case of poisoning in Salado. The poisoning of an animal is expressly prohibited by the Texas Code of Criminal proceedings, Statute 42.09. Persons who are found guilty of cruelty to animals can be prosecuted.

The Salado Humane Society is especially interested in seeing that illegal poisoning of animals is stopped.

Some of our members have been criticized for feeding stray cats in

Salado. We would like to set the record straight: all stray animals taken care by the Humane Society have been vaccinated and neutered to prevent the spread of more unwanted or diseased animals. New "dumps" arrive every week. We catch them as fast as we can but sometimes the sheer numbers overwhelm us.

The Salado Humane Society is very proud of the work that has been accomplished. But there is so much more to do. We are sincerely encouraged by the fact that other members of our community recognize the severe problem that exists in the town of Salado as well as areas around the town. And we are encouraged that people actually want to do something. The problem is large enough for both the Animal Control Organization and the Salado Humane Society to work together on this serious problem.

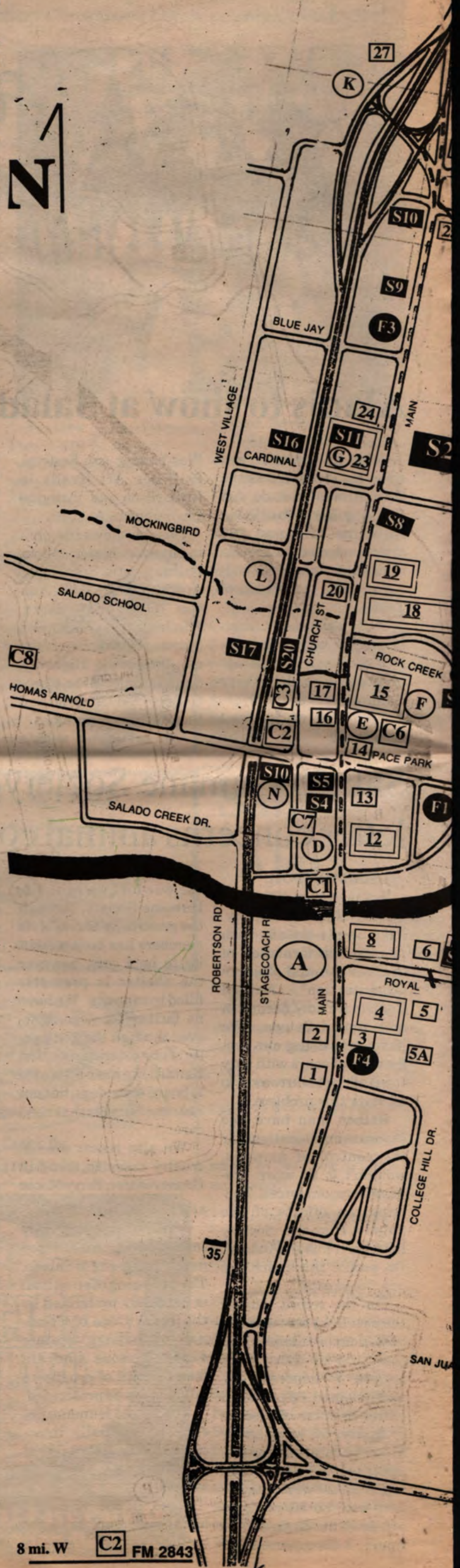

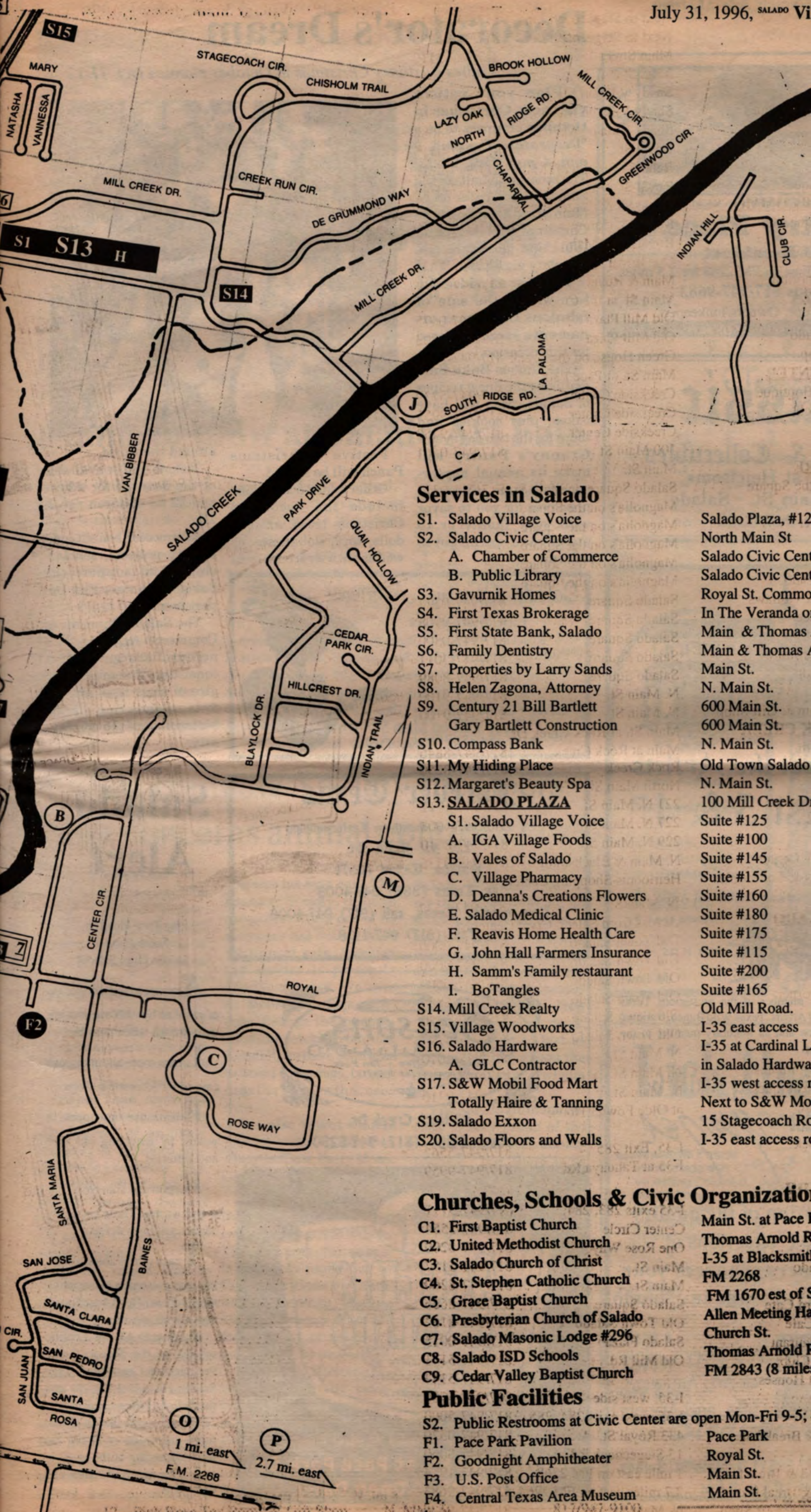

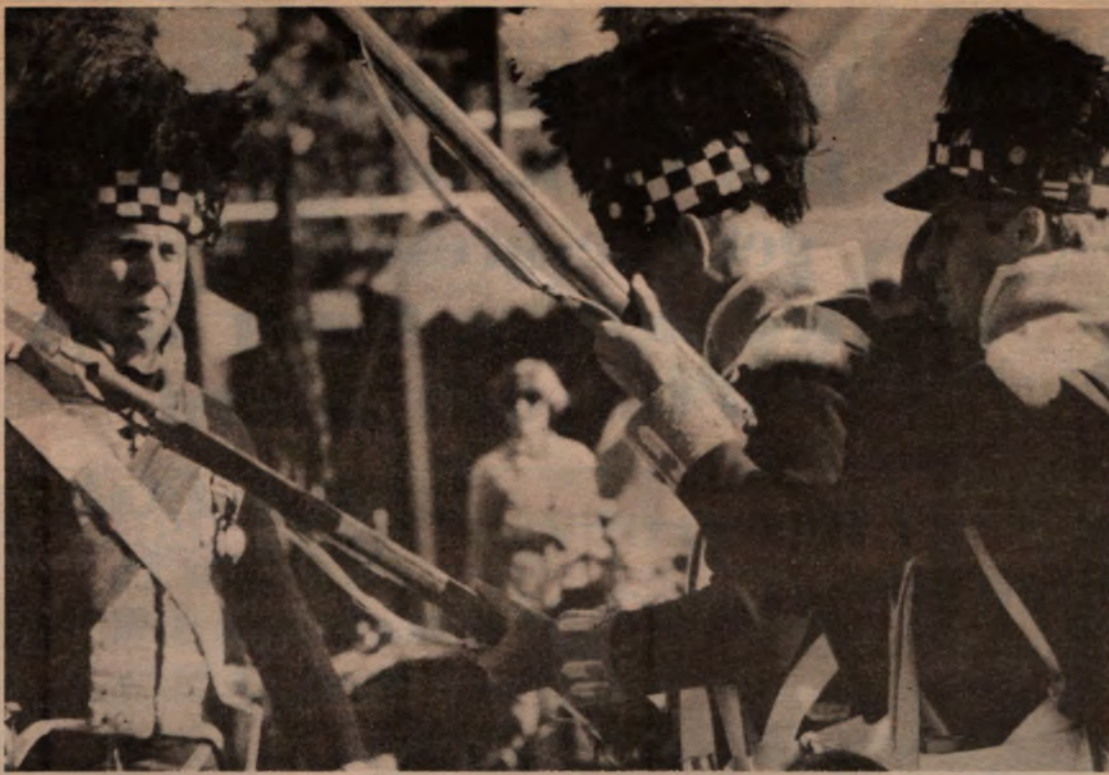
