## Salado Family Festival set in Pace Park Sept. 21

Tickets for the 2nd Annual Duck Race are now available.

## BRA plans intensive test of Salado Creek in Sept.

Intensive testing of Salado Creek water by the Brazos River Authority (BRA) will begin this month, according to David Collinsworth, field operations manager in the planning and environmental division of the BRA.

Collinsworth discussed Salado Creek and its water quality problems with the Salado Rotary Club at its Aug. 27 breakfast meet-

ing. He will likely address other groups in Salado in the coming months.

The BRA is a quasi-state agency covering an area of 14,000 square miles. It does not rely on state tax dollars, but is funded by fines levied by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) and from the sale of water from 13 reservoirs.

The BRA gathers information on the streams and watershed of the Brazos River. It reports problems

and polluters to the TNRCC, which has enforcement powers. The BRA has no enforcement powers.

Salado Creek is one of the tributaries of the Brazos River, as it meets with the Lampasas River and Leon River at Three Fork, forming the Little River, which feeds into the Brazos River.

Collinsworth said the water quality problem with Salado Creek is three-fold: the health problem resulting in signs posted along

the creek, the algae problem and the aesthetic problem.

The type of pollution in Salado Creek is non-point source pollution, meaning that it is evident there is pollution of the Creek in the form of fecal coliform and nutrients, such as nitrate and phosphates, but that the source, or sources, of pollution is unknown, Collinsworth explained.

However, Collinsworth added that he knows of some possible sources for

the nitrates and phosphates in the Creek.

The high count of nutrients in the creek, which contributes to the large amount of algae there, could be caused by fertilizer run-off from yards, agriculture run-off and/or improperly working septic systems, Collinsworth said.

Sunlight, combined with low water flow and nutrients result in an overabundance of algae in Salado

she attended public schools. She met and married Governor George W. Bush in Midland in Nov. 1977.

Governor and Mrs. Bush are the proud parents of 14 year old twin daughters Barbara and Jenna, who are named after their grandmothers.

Mrs. Bush received a bachelor of science degree in education from Southern Methodist University in 1968 and a master's in library science from the University of Texas at Austin in 1973. She taught elementary grades and

served as a librarian in public schools in Dallas, Houston and Austin, 1968-1977.

The Bush family is active in the United Methodist Church.





Creek, Collinsworth said, "which means it will probably dissipate in the winter and return in the spring."

Collinsworth explained that the high count of fecal coliform "does not pose a threat by itself, but is an indicator of other bacteria and viruses which may be present."

Fecal coliform, Collinsworth said, is "introduced into the stream by warm-blooded animals."

The BRA will begin walk tests along the Salado Creek beginning at Patterson's Crossing to the point where the creek feeds into the Lampasas River.

The BRA will take samples of the water at each source along the Creek. "The tests won't show the introduction of

fecal coliform," Collinsworth said, "The tests may identify hot spots of nutrient loading into the creek."

If the BRA cannot identify some of the sources of pollution in the Creek from the walk test, it may have to conduct a dye study of

septic tanks along the creek.

"If the village volunteers to conduct a dye test," Collinsworth said, the test would answer some of the questions about the sources of pollution in Salado Creek.

"To address the problems in Salado Creek, we are going to need your help," Collinsworth said, for volunteers, input and information.

Collinsworth told Rotarians that dredging the creek would not be an adequate solution. "One acre of surface water can produce more than a ton of algae," he said. "After it is cleaned, it will return immediately."

"This is not a problem that will be solved next summer," Collinsworth said, "but if you don't start to do something now, every year it will be that much worse."

"We're all guilty...." said one attending the meeting, "Pointing fingers will get us nowhere. The solution will require all of our effort, working together."

Have you ever had a package damaged or lost in the mail system? Help us to help you eliminate that from happening by correctly preparing your

packages for mailing.

Select the proper container for the item you are mailing. The container should be large enough to hold the contents plus space for adequate cushioning but not so large that shifting of contents occurs.

Use cushioning to absorb shocks, vibrations, and prevent shifting. Bubble wrap, paper towels, newspaper etc. can be used.

Wrapping a package in paper is discouraged. Use address labels on the package or just write your address on the box itself. If you do wrap, use heavy brown paper without using twine or string. Seal your package with good reinforced tape. Don't use scotch tape or duct tape because they don't stick for long periods of time.

Put a piece of paper inside the package with your return address and the address you are mailing to in case the outside address is lost or becomes obscured.

When addressing be sure to use the zip code or zip+4 code. Mark the package Fragile, Perishable or Do Not Bend if appropriate.

Insurance is available at low fees. Remember Priority and Express Mail envelopes and boxes are free when mailing at those rates.

Postal employees are your friends and neighbors wanting to help you have only good experiences with your mailings.

A new, comprehensive exhibit spotlighting the history of the Chisholm Trail opens at the Bell County Museum Sept. 7.

*Rounding Up the Chisholm Trail* explores the development of the cattle trail industry, offers a glimpse of life on the trail, and examines the contributions of the Chisholm Trail to American history and culture. Several interactive stations, a video, and music will be included in the exhibit.

A public reception will be held 2-4 p.m. Sept. 7 to mark the opening of the exhibit. An "1872 cowboy," chuckwagon refreshments, and cowboy music will be featured at the reception.

Dr. William Harlow will speak on the history of the Chisholm Trail 7 p.m. Sept. 10. Dr. Harlow is a professor of history at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. He is a member of the Texas State Historical Association, and is a contributor to the *Handbook of Texas*.

The Chisholm Trail, one of the most well-known cattle trails in U.S. history owes its existence to several factors present in post-Civil War America. By 1865, over 5 million wild longhorn cattle roamed Texas. First brought to the New World by 16th-century Spain, the cattle had no real economic value because a practical means of transportation to the more populated, beef-hungry Eastern U.S. did not exist.

However, railroads had spread into Missouri and then into Kansas. Texans returning from the Civil War recognized the profit that could be made if the longhorns reached buyers at the railheads. From 1867-1887, the Chisholm Trail directed Texas cattle into newly-formed Kansas cities such as Abilene, Dodge City, and Ellsworth. At these points, the bees were loaded into boxcars for the trip east.

The trail consisted of several tributaries throughout Texas which joined in Indian Territory (now Oklahoma) and ended in Kansas.

From 1866 to 1881, over 4 million head of cattle were driven up the Chisholm Trail from South Texas, and many passed through Bell County. Helen Frances Embree Pendleton, living near Belton on the north side of the Leon River, wrote in 1872:

"Three droves of cattle in the pens tonight. Any no. of cattle are passing every day. Seems like they would lug them all up after a while but still they come..."

By 1890, long distance trailing was obsolete, except for drives in north-western states like Colorado and Wyoming. Prairie grass soon erased the Chisholm Trail, and longhorn cattle were interbred with Angus, Hereford, and other imported breeds.

A special feature of *Rounding Up the Chisholm Trail* is a "round-up"

chuckwagon. Explains museum curator Jodi Wright, "Research concluded that an actual trail drive chuckwagon was much larger than the period wagon belonging to the museum. However, round-up chuckwagons were smaller than trail drive wagons, so we were able to recreate a round-up chuckwagon scene."

"Exhibits such as this do not happen overnight or by museum staff alone," said museum director Stephanie Turnham. Many individuals have contributed their time, energy, and talent to help make the exhibit possible. Joe Dorm, and Maurice and Joan Northen of Belton, C.B. Hodge of Salado, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Wright, Jr. of Moody, Cavender's Boot City of Temple, and Wayne McMinn of Georgetown are just some of those who have assisted in the exhibit's success.

To supplement the exhibition, the museum bookstore is stocked with several publications related to the Chisholm Trail. These include J. Frank Dobie's *Cow People* and *The Longhorns*, Wayne Gard's *The Chisholm Trail*, and *Chuckwagon Lore*, by R.W. McMinn.

The exhibit will remain on view through August 1997. The Bell County Museum is located at 201 N. Main Belton. Hours are 1-5 p.m. on Tuesday - Saturday. Admission is free and guided tours are available.

# When it rains, it pours

The old saying of "when it rains, it pours," certainly applied to our local weather last week. Our weather always seems like one extreme follows another. The rain was good (except to farmers who had cotton ready to strip) to help recharge our soil moisture that was completely depleted. Maybe, we can get back on track and make some fall and winter grazing to offset the lack of hay.

The wet weather will promote rapid growth of pastures and will probably cause outbreaks of armyworms. The fall armyworm and true armyworm can be the most damaging insect pests of improved pastures, temporary winter pastures, permanent pastures and small grains. These insects commonly occur in spring, late summer or fall and are often associated with wet weather.

These, pests are easily controlled, but extensive damage may occur before growers notice an infestation. Improved temporary and permanent pastures, as well as small grains should be watched closely, especially during rainy periods in late summer and fall. The action level is three or more small worms per square foot.

Chemicals labeled for control of armyworms in pastures include Sevin, Malathion and methyl parathion. Be sure to observe grazing and harvest restrictions.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will conduct a second referendum on the sheep and wool promotion, research, education and information order Oct. 1.

In-person voting will take place in the county Extension offices. Voters may request an absentee ballot from the County Extension office that serves the voters residence or, if the voter is a business entity, the office that serves its main office or headquarters.

County Extension offices may only fill requests for absentee ballots through Sept. 17. Completed absentee ballots must be received in the County Extension Office by the close of business on Sept. 27. Ballots will be counted on Oct. 16.

If the referendum is approved, the program would be funded by a mandatory assessment on domestic producers, feeders and exporters of live sheep and greasy wool. The assessment would be 1¢ per pound of live sheep sold and 2¢ per pound on greasy wool sold. Importers would be assessed a 1¢ per pound on live sheep, the equivalent of 1¢ per pound of live sheep for sheep products as well as 2¢ per pound of degreased wool or the equivalent of degreased wool for wool and wool products.

An earlier referendum was carried out on Feb. 6, but Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman determined that the results were invalid because the procedures were applied incorrectly and inconsistently.

Eligible voters must have been a person engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products during the calendar year of 1994. The USDA defines a person as an individual or legal entity (a corporation partnership or estate), or a

group of individuals with a joint ownership interest in sheep (a family cooperative or an association). All 4-H or FFA members who owned sheep in 1994 are eligible to vote.

In this referendum, each person has only one vote. Spouses who jointly own sheep are considered a family and are not entitled to two votes even in community property states such as Texas.

No one is authorized to register or to vote on behalf of an individual voter.

Raw wool is exempt from assessment, and importers who imported only raw wool are not eligible to vote. Questions about voter eligibility, verifying the volume of production, challenges, the challenge resolution process, appeals of eligibility determinations, ballot counting, reporting and related topics should be made to county FSA offices.

Questions about voting procedures may be asked at the county Extension Office. Any other questions about the referendum may be referred to Kenneth R. Payne, Agricultural Marketing Service, Washington, D.C. toll-free 1-888-265-8110.

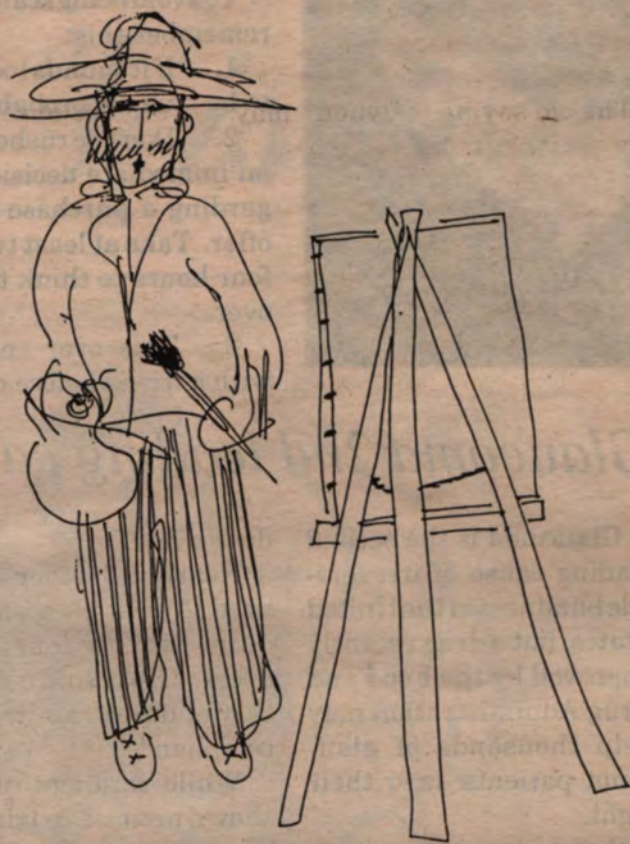
# Hill to show at Barnhill-Britt

## Glaucoma 2nd leading cause of blindness

Glaucoma is the second leading cause of irreversible blindness in the United States, but a drug recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration may help thousands of glaucoma patients save their sight.

'Latanoprost has been shown to have advantages over previously available medications,' said Dr. Ronald Gross, associate professor of ophthalmology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and one of the physicians who participated in clinical trials for the new drug. 'It apparently has fewer side effects, and patients need only one

dose a day.'

Nearly all other drugs used to treat glaucoma require two to four daily doses. Gross said a reduction of doses can improve compliance.

While latanoprost has shown promise in trials, in most patients, it is not meant to be used as first line therapy against glaucoma.

'In people with green and hazel-colored eyes, the drug makes their iris darker,' Gross said. 'Researchers are not sure why this happens.'

As a precaution, it is recommended that the drug be used only in patients

who have not benefited from other medications.

The new drug is expected to be available in September.

Glaucoma is a disease that slowly steals a patient's sight. If the disease is diagnosed early, blindness may often be prevented, but the vision that has been lost cannot be restored. Ophthalmologists recommend glaucoma screenings beginning at age 40 for most people. However, people with a family history of glaucoma and African-Americans should be checked starting at age 30. Glaucoma is three to four times more common among blacks.
