Salado Chamber membership turns down by-laws amendments Oct. 9

The general membership meeting of the Salado Chamber of Commerce Oct. 9 brought forth 10 candidates for four three year terms on the board of directors. Two amendments to the by-laws proposed by the Merchants Committee were defeated during the meeting.

The following Chamber members were nominated for election to the board of directors by the nominating committee, chaired by Jap Barrett: Sue Carter, Vernon Holt, Don Mackie, Eldon Miller, Bea Stewart and Darrell Street.

Four Chamber members were nominated from the floor: Virginia Cospier, Robert Denman, Ken Norman

and Billy Pipes.

Ballots will be mailed out by Oct. 18 to all members of the Chamber of Commerce. Members will have two weeks to return the ballots. Members can vote for up to four. The top four vote-winners will join the 1996 board and will serve three years.

A proposed amendment which would have immediately eliminated the family membership was defeated by a 52-59 margin.

Family memberships are afforded two votes, while all other memberships have just one vote.

According to Ken Norman, who drafted the proposed amendment to the by-laws, the Chamber

of Commerce may be in danger of losing its non-profit corporation status.

In order for there to be different classes of membership, Norman said, the classes of membership must be outlined and defined in the corporation's charter, its articles of incorporation or its by-laws.

Norman said that the family membership and its two votes are not defined in any of these documents. He further said that any and all votes of the membership could be made void if a voting member were to file suit against the Chamber for its practice of affording two votes to family memberships.

Jim Patterson, chair of

the By-Laws Committee, said that the By-Laws Committee did not have a chance to discuss the amendment change because the proposed amendment was mailed to the general membership by the deadline of 10 days before the general membership meeting.

"These changes could have been mailed out in early September to give us a chance to research and discuss them," Patterson stated.

Many of those with family memberships were present and stated opposition to the amendment, saying that they joined the Chamber in 1995 with the understanding that the

family membership had two votes. To change mid-stream would be wrong, many said.

In an early motion, the membership voted to reject the amendment and to direct the Chamber board to further research the legality of the family membership and make a recommendation at a later date. This motion carried 73-55.

Immediately following the vote to reject the amendment, a motion was made to adopt the amendment. It failed 52-59.

The membership also failed to adopt an amendment which would cause the Chamber board to bind

Bill Sims will not run again

It's Official!

Our own Senator Bill Sims has announced, as predicted in this column several months ago, that he does not plan to run for reelection next year and will retire from the political field of battle due in large measure to the results of a stroke he suffered earlier this year.

He has served 14 years in the legislature and will wind up his lawmaking career on January 1, 1997, when his current term ends.

Sims' district is one of the largest in Texas and includes 21 counties ranging in size and distance from Salado in south Bell County all the way west to Abilene.

Sims, a conservative Democrat from Paint Rock over in Concho County, has been a leading voice in agricultural matters in the legislature and is currently serving as Chairman of the Natural Resources Committee in the upper house as well as holding membership on the Administration, Criminal Justice and Finance Committees.

It hardly comes as a surprise to have a wide variety of folks express an immediate interest in running for Sims' slot in the Senate including Temple's own Hugh Shine who was defeated by Sims in 1994.

Other GOPers paying a degree or more of attention include: Rep. Bob Hunter out in Abilene and Troy Fraser, Big Spring.

Temple's representative in Austin - Diarne Delisi, indicated to reporters last

week that she would not seek Sims' seat in the Senate. Many conservatives feel she would be a front runner if she changes her mind and enters the fray.

Democrats, fearing a Republican take-over are scurrying about trying to find a candidate that can keep the Senatorial balance between the two parties at least where it is today - 17 Demos and 14 Republicans.

With a total of 31 upperhousemen, it will only take two changes to hand the Senate over to the GOP. The changes could be in the form of defeats at the polls or defections by unhappy Democrats.

The Republican high command is well aware of this and has already targeted Sims' spot as well as several others in an all out move they hope will change the balance of power in the Senate when lawmakers meet in January 1997.

One news story coming out of Austin indicated several Democratic members of the House of Representatives are looking into the race including: Layton Black of Goldthwaite, who is our man in the House of Representatives; Allen Place, Gatesville and Bob Turner, from the super small community of Voss (Coleman County) that has a population of fewer than 50 souls.

Also Bob Junell, San Angelo, who would have to move into District 24 now that his hometown has been divided between Districts 25 and 28.

Considered by many to be the leading prospect to keep District 24 in the Democratic fold is Cappy Eads, Bell County's District Attorney. What should also be of special interest to each of us - he is a resident of Salado.

Eads, in an exclusive telephone interview this past Thursday told us that indeed, he was going to take a long look at the race but would not make a decision before January 1, 1996. If he did announce prior to that time he would have to immediately give up his DA's job according to State statutes.

The 54 year old District Attorney is well known in Democratic circles, having served for nearly a quarter of a century as a successful prosecuting attorney.

Eads noted: "A decision such as this will require some in-depth thinking including a look at what do I want to do for the rest of my career. Serving in the Senate would be a great honor and one which I know I would enjoy and hopefully be able to do some good for those I would serve as well as for the State. What could be better than that?"

The DA also noted that he would spend time be-

Eagles win Homecoming

The Salado High School Varsity Eagles delivered a homecoming present to fans and ex-students Oct. 6, beating the Axtell Longhorns 21-6 at Eagle Field.

Eric Lopez delivered the first present, returning the opening kick-off 70 yards for a touchdown. Chris Frazier added the extra point to give Salado a 7-0 lead 13 seconds into the game.

Rusty Wasik scored on a 7 yard dive to top a drive by the Eagles late in the first quarter. Chris Frazier's kick gave Salado a 14-0 lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prinston Harrison scored on a 2 yard run for Axtell. The two-point conversion failed, leaving Salado a 14-6 lead.

The Eagles would pad that lead in the opening minute of the fourth quarter on a 1 yard dive by David Berumen. Frazier again kicked the extra point to give Salado its final 21-6 lead.

The Eagles offense tallied 124 yards, 105 on the ground. The Longhorns had 112 yard total offense on an evenly balanced attack.

The Eagles were called seven times for penalties totalling 65 yards while the Longhorns were called seven times for 69 yards.

The defense was led by David Berumen, with 17 tackles, Jerry Ratliff, 15

tackles, Rusty Wasik, 13 tackles, and William Culp, 12 tackles.

Culp also intercepted a Longhorn pass.

OSSF meets deadline for matching grant

The Board of Directors of the Old Salado School Foundation announced Oct. 2 that the Challenge Grant proposed by Peoples National Bank has been met with over \$5,000 raised in less than 30 days.

OSSF Treasurer Lloyd Parks made the announcement and added: "We are grateful to the officials of Peoples National Bank for the \$5000 challenge grant they set up early in September. The challenge was for the foundation to match the grant dollar-for-dollar, so that funds would be available to begin work on the bandstand that will be erected just south of the civic center."

Parks continued: "We have raised more than the needed \$5,000 in matching monies thanks to our many friends who have supported the renovation of the civic center since its inception.

The contract for the preliminary work on the band-

stand has been set with an Oct. 15 starting time. Much of the money has come as gifts in memory of the late Doris Cottle.

"We still lack a little over \$1,500 to complete the finishing work on the project and we hope that villagers will see fit to help us finish this fine project that will provide so much enjoyment for the entire community," Parks said.

"The new bandstand as well as the frontage fence and sign, plus the landscaping around the civic center are all part of the master plan for the old school campus," according to OSSF President Ken Clapp.

Clapp further noted: "The Board of Directors plan in the months ahead and as funds become available, to increase the size of the parking area both on the north and east sides of the civic center. When that work is completed, there are additional items that are also part of our master

plan that will be addressed including what will hopefully be an old time Sain Street look on the east side of the center, complete with historic buildings including an old post office, general store and farmhouse.

All of these buildings will be located in a row along the east boundary of the campus and will be available for tourists to visit and see how folks lived in years gone by."

"Walking paths from the civic center to the proposed main street buildings are on the drawing board together with benches and areas for picnicking," Clapp added.

Clapp concluded: "There has been some thought given to allowing two or three local non-profit organizations taking these buildings on as special projects, using them to present and sell items appropriate to that early time in our history. A club could sell homemade or group-made items, from the store or post office or the old farmhouse, to visitors who might make this stop a regular part of their visit to Salado. The thinking right now is that the clubs would keep all of their profits other than that which they would spend to maintain their adopted building including utilities, yard work and maintenance. These details are still in the early thinking stage since the actual movement of the old timey buildings is months away."

The civic center's board also noted that the Lions Club plans to create a park around the new bandstand so citizens may come and sit and enjoy not only the outdoor programs to be presented but also provide a stopping place for tourists who might want to rest for a minute as they tour the village.

The civic center is operated by a private foundation (OSSF) under the appropriate laws of the state and has secured the proper designation from the Internal Revenue Service so that all donations are tax deductible.

Thus far, since the renovation began in 1992, the foundation has secured funding mainly from individuals, local organizations, plus the one endowment grant from the Meadows Foundation.

4 p.m.- 6 p.m. Oct. 18
 10 a.m.- noon Oct. 25
 4 p.m.- 6 p.m. Nov. 1
 1 p.m.-3 p.m. Nov. 8

Groups at increased risk for influenza-related complications are:

Otherwise healthy persons 65 years of age or older. Adults and children with chronic disorders of the pulmonary or cardiovascular systems requiring regular medical follow-up, including children with asthma. Adults and children with chronic metabolic diseases (e.g. diabetes mellitus, renal dysfunction, or hemoglobinopathies).

Physicians, nurses and other personnel in both hospital and outpatient settings, Providers of home care to high-risk persons and residents of long term care facilities are also at increased risk.

The vaccine begins to protect you after one to two weeks and protection

may last up to a year. The viruses that cause influenza change often so it is advisable to get the vaccine every year.

Influenza is most common in the United States in December through April, so it is best to get the vaccine in the fall.

Since influenza viruses change frequently, they may not always be covered by the vaccine. The vaccine does contain viruses that are thought to be most likely to come to the U.S. this year. Their names are A/Texas/36/91 H1N1), A/Johannesburg/ 33/94 H3N2) and B/Harbin/07/94

About the Disease
 Influenza (sometimes called the flu) is a serious disease passed from an infected person to the nose or throat of others. Influenza can cause fever, chills, cough, headache, sore throat, and muscle aches. It can lead to pneumonia and death.

Influenza can make

people of any age ill. Although most people are ill for only a few days some have a much more serious illness and may need to be hospitalized. Thousands of people die each year from influenza-related illnesses. Most deaths caused by influenza are in elderly people.

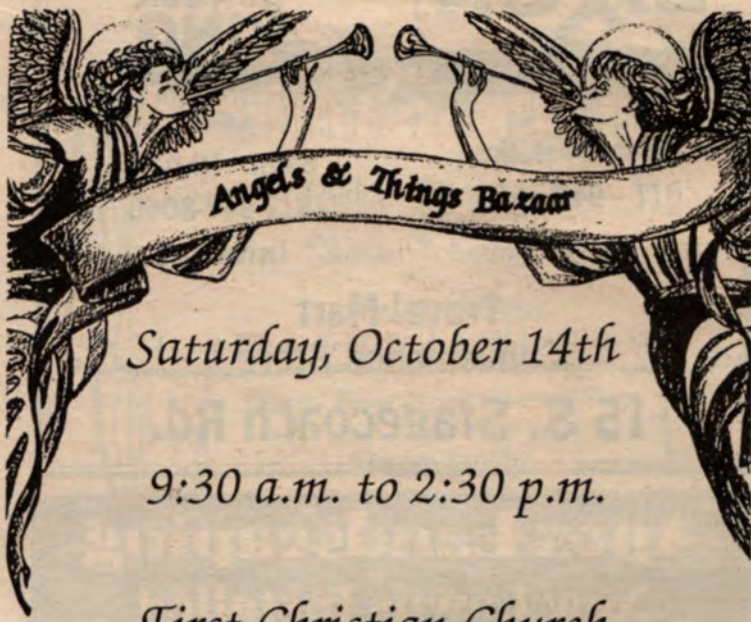

Peter T. Dillo, Recycling Manger of the City of Killeen will conduct the hour-long seminar hosted by Karen Kinnison chairperson of Salado Recycles.

Composting is a simple biological process that breaks down leaves, grass clippings, wood chips, brush and food scraps into dark odorless nutrient-rich organic product.

"A backyard composter can easily turn these forms of waste into fertilizer which would otherwise take up about 18 percent of the landfill space," Kinnison said.

In cooperation with the Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG), Salado Recycles is offering a composter for \$5 to those attending the seminar. The composter normally sells for \$35. The supply is limited and those who would like to purchase one of the composting bins should sign up with Kinnison prior to the seminar. She can be contacted at The Woman's Exchange on Main Street, phone 947-5552.

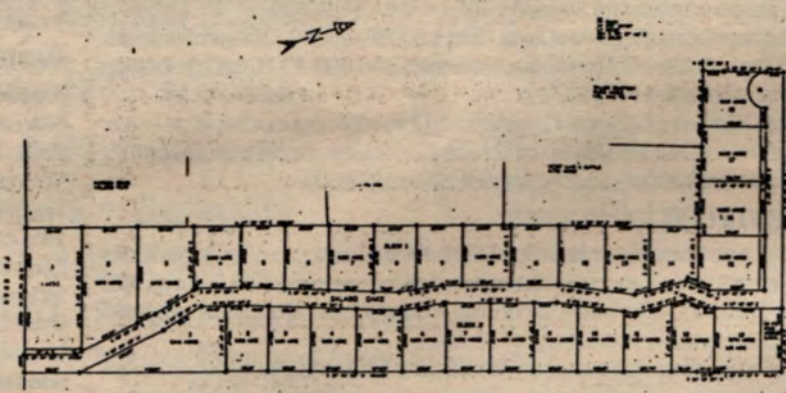

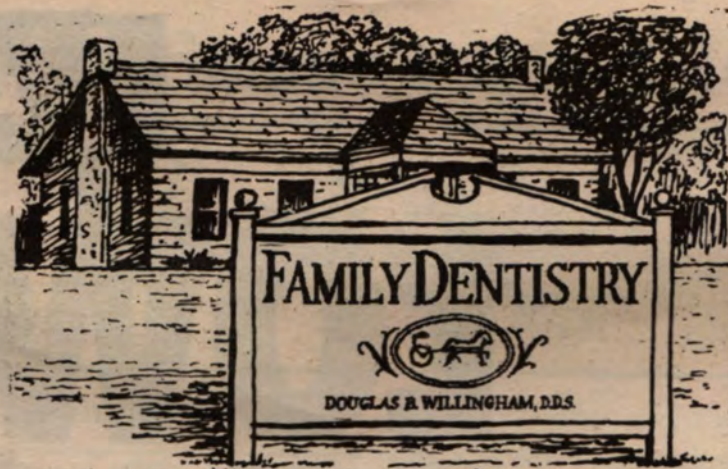

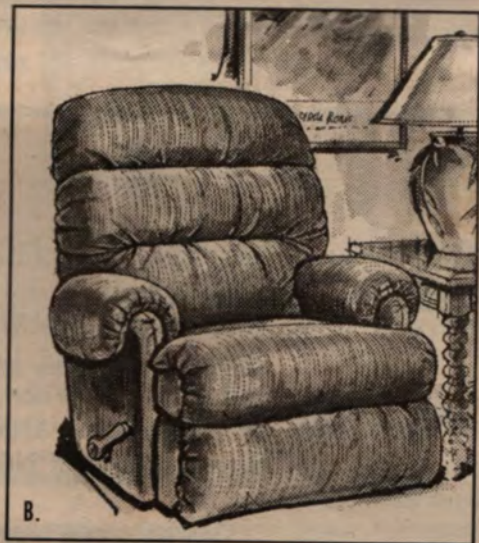
