Texas Monthly gives 3 stars to Thomas Arnold Elementary

Salado school officials are excited about Thomas Arnold Elementary receiving a three-star rating based on a study of Texas elementary schools by *Texas Monthly* magazine.

"It was indeed an honor to learn about the latest article regarding the high quality of education and hard work Rod Stockstill and the elementary staff provide for the children of Salado," said Superintendent Steven Ervin.

"We are very proud of our teachers, staff, students and parents for making Thomas Arnold a top rated school. By working together, we can continue to provide a quality education for our children," said elementary principal Rod Stockstill.

The *Texas Monthly* list rates 3,172 of the elementary schools in Texas. The rating system is based on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test.

The Winick-Toenjes system compares schools with similar numbers of disadvantaged students to see how they compare to their peers.

The best schools in Texas earned four stars; the worst, none. These are the requirements for earning a star.

• One star if at least 30 percent of the students passed the TAAS test.

• A second star if the school ranked at or above the median passing rate on the TAAS test for schools with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students.

• A third star if at least 70 percent of the students passed the TAAS test.

• A fourth star if the school had a passing rate on the TAAS test in the top 15 percent of schools with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students.

In 1996, 91.1 percent of third graders taking the TAAS test passed all tests taken; 82 percent of fourth graders passed all TAAS tests; 79.2 percent of fifth graders pass all TAAS tests and 82.8 percent of sixth graders passed all areas of the TAAS test.

Only two schools in Region 12 Education Service Center received a 4-star rating: Holland and Rosebud-Lott.

Thomas Arnold elementary earned a three star rating, along with eight Killeen ISD elementary schools and two Temple ISDs elementaries.

Two Belton elementaries, two Killeen elementaries and one Temple elementary received a two-star rating.

A one-star rating went to 12 Killeen elementary schools, three Belton elementaries, and Bartlett, Rogers and Troy elementaries.

Indian Danseuse to perform at Salado Civic Center Nov. 3

Shila Mehta, a brilliant and accomplished exponent of Kathak, one of the major classical dance forms of India, will perform at the Salado Civic Center at 4 p.m. Nov. 3.

Kathak is a vibrant dance form, born of the marriage of Hindu and Muslim cultures, that flourished in North India under Mughal influence. It is popular with both men and women. A woman dancer wears a brocade blouse, a long wide shimmering silk skirt, a transparent tissue scarf of gold threads and a heavy cluster of ankle bells. The dance form is known for its precision footwork with movements in stylized complex rhythmic patterns. With mathematical precision, the dancer doubles and quadruples the beat of the drummer with quick shifts and transfers at dizzying speed.

Kathak is based on the comprehensive dance treatise, *Natya-sastra* (1st century BC to 1st century AD), written by Bharatha Muni. It describes elaborately the origin and function of drama and dance, gesture language and makeup, miming, theater architecture, masks and the various emotions (bhava) and sentiments (rasa). No other book of ancient times contains such an exhaustive study of dramaturgy.

An accomplished kathak danseuse

and choreographer, SHILA MEHTA has carved out a niche for herself and is now a leading Kathak dancer of India. She started dancing at the age of five under renowned Kathak dance teachers and performers. She is now one of the best female exponents of this dance form.

The recipient of the prestigious NRITYA PRAVEEN award in 1982, Shila has performed all over India and abroad. She has an attractive stage presence and maintains a dignified control over her dance techniques mastered over a period of many years of perseverance and commitment. A sense of aesthetics, both in her choice of dance numbers and costumes, is also revealed in her performances.

Apart from being a brilliant performer, Shila is also a producer and choreographer of exceptional ability. Her imaginative blend of classical and folk dances has won her wide acclaim. A passionate teacher, Shila has her own dance-center (NUPUR-ZANKAR in India).

Nobel Laureate to speak

Brown discusses Demise of Physician Scientist, Heart Attacks at Institute for Humanities Nov. 2-3

Nobel Laureate, Michael S. Brown, presents a seminar and lecture this weekend sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities at Salado. Dr. Brown gives an all day seminar on Nov. 2, on "The Demise of the Physician Scientist." The program begins at 10 a.m. at the Allen Hall. Dr. Brown's Sunday lecture, Nov. 3, is at 4 p.m. at Mill Creek. His topic is "Heart Attacks: When Genes & Environment Collide."

Brown and his colleague, Joseph Goldstein, established the first cause of heart attacks traced to the molecular level. He and Goldstein shared many prestigious awards including the Nobel Prize in Medicine or Physiology (1985) and the National Medal of Science (1988). Dr. Brown was elected to membership to the U.S. National Academy of Sciences; the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society.

Dr. Brown is the Paul J. Thomas Professor of Genetics and director of the Jonsson Center for Molecular Genetics at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. He is a vocal advocate for the National Institutes of Health which supports the bulk of medical research in the United States.

Nov. 5 is scarier than Halloween

If you think Halloween is a spooky time, think how scary it must be to this year's crop of politicians as they see time running out before judgement day - November 5.

Plenty to watch for as the returns roll in next Tuesday evening, above and beyond the race for the White House which some say was over the day Republicans nominated Bob Dole.

That contest plus control of Congress for the next two years will be of interest to those who proudly wear the title of "political wonks".

Of closer-to-home interest are the races that bear directly on Salado including the Chet Edwards - Jay Mathis contest for the 11th Congressional District.

Edwards, an incumbent Democrat, is running for reelection against Republican Mathis who is a hard charging neophyte in the big league.

Edwards is holding a comfortable lead as that scuffle enters its final days.

The battle for former State Representative Layton Black's District 54 seat is between non-incumbents since Black opted out, after winning the Demo nomination, to go to work for the Attorney General as a state paid lobbyist.

Copperas Cove Republican Suzanna Hupp profited from Black's unusual post-primary defection since her campaign at that point was well organized and underway thus creating a late entry "try-to-catch-up" gap that Demo Dick Miller, a San Saba rancher, has not closed at this point in the scrimmage.

Another free-for-all is found in State Senatorial District 28, currently held by lame duck Bill Sims whose health is forcing his end-of-the-year retirement.

The two seeking Sims slot are Democrat Rick Rhodes and GOper Troy Fraser.

This "too-close-to-call" fracas is of particular interest to Lt. Governor Bob Bullock who presides over the Texas Senate and controls a slim Democratic majority of 17-14 members.

Loss of Sims' district to the GOP plus one more defection would turn the Senate over to the Repubs for the first time since Reconstruction and put Democrat Bullock in the unusual position of trying to ride herd over a Republican controlled legislative body that could easily turn into a large scale fracas.

Bullock's even handed approach to both parties in the upper house over the years may keep things on an even keel even if the conservatives do take charge although that would differ from what took place at the national level when a major shoot-out began the day the 104th Congress went Republican in 1994 and Gingrich grabbed the speaker's gavel.

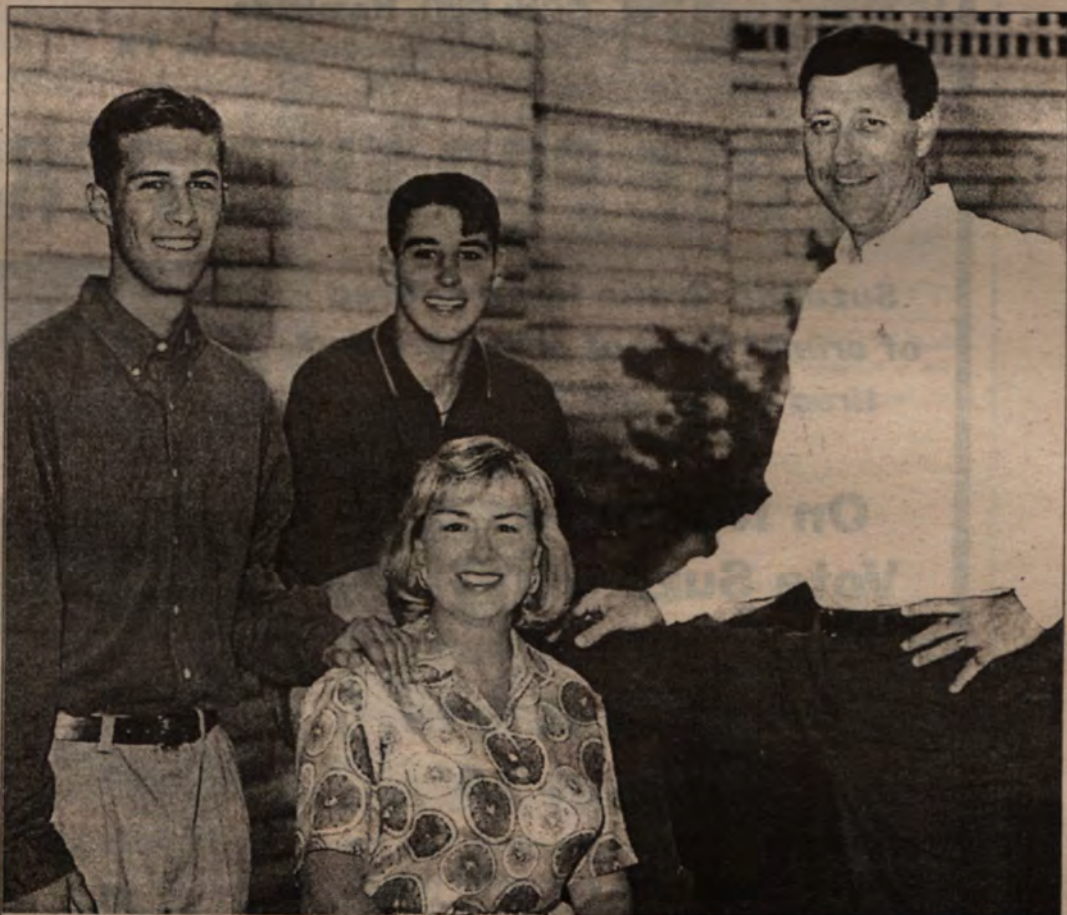

Halloween safety tips given for trick or treaters

Trick or treat! Treat yourself and the kids who are special to you to these safety tips and there's no trick to having a Happy Halloween. Texas Department of Health statistics show that 87 people younger than 20 died in auto-pedestrian crashes in 1994. Stay safe and don't add to those numbers this year.

Safety tips for trick or treaters:

1. Look both ways before crossing the street, even a quiet, neighborhood street. Look three ways before crossing - left, then right, then left again.
2. Stand clear of stopped or parked cars so drivers can

see you and you can see the street clearly.

3. Stop at the curb before crossing the street.

4. Wear Halloween makeup instead of a mask - you'll see better as you cross the street and go up and down steps and stairways.

5. Help your folks put reflective tape on your costume and on your candy bag, and carry a flashlight or a glowstick.

6. Careful with loose, billowing costumes - fabric can get caught on sharp edges or cause you to trip or fall.

Safety tips for drivers:

1. Drive slowly and carefully in residential areas - excited kids can dart away from adults and into the street.

2. Before proceeding at a stop sign, make sure kids see you. Don't drive through the intersection until the trick or treaters stop at the curb.

Gene Weatherall, chief of TDH Bureau of Emergency Management, added more safety warnings.

"Adults should inspect the treats kids collect and discard anything suspicious such as unwrapped or loose candy or food or inappropriate or unsafe toys," he said. "And besides causing kids to trip or fall, those loose, flowing costumes could be a fire danger, especially around anyone who smokes."

Emergency medical technicians and paramedics across Texas respond to more than a million emergency calls every year, according to Weatherall. "We want to make sure the Halloween season is a safe and fun time for kids, and a trip with EMS to the emergency department would be no fun at all," he said. "So help us keep the little ones, and the big ones, safe."

Eagles beat Hutto, 13-6 for 2nd district win

The Salado Eagles defeated the Hutto Hippos 13-6 last Friday at home to improve their chances for a playoff berth.

The Eagles, 3-5 for the year, are 2-1 in District 26-2A entering Friday's game at Jarrell. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

A win over Jarrell, 0-3 in district, would set up a crucial match in the regular season finale against Holland, which is tied for second place at 2-1 with the Eagles. Holland plays Hutto (1-2) Friday.

"We control our destiny," Eagles coach Dan Wasik said. "If we win out, best I can tell we're in the playoffs."

Salado's win over Hutto was its second in a row, after a district-opening loss to league-leader Rogers (3-0). The Eagles scored the winning touchdown against the Hippos with 7:16 left in the fourth quarter on a 5-yard run by Cody Hall.

The touchdown was set up by a Mitch Lindley fumble recovery caused by Rusty Wasik. Lindley recovered both of Hutto's lost fumbles.

End Drew Oldham was named the Eagles Defensive Player of the Week after gar-

nering three sacks "and doing a good job of stopping the reverse," coach Wasik said. The Eagles' defense allowed 194 yards of total offense, including 130 on the ground, but held the Hippos to just six first downs.

"It was the most aggressive game we've played all year defensively," Wasik said. "There were a lot of people on every tackle, which means the team is hustling."

"Offensively, we only had one turnover, which is what we've been looking for. But, on the down side, we had 12 penalties (for 95 yards). That's something we've got to concentrate cutting down on."

Salado's 294 yards of total offense included 150 yards rushing. Hall (51 yards on 22 carries) and Taylor Hutton (52 yards on seven carries) combined for 103 yards rushing. Plus, Hall (three catches for 23 yards) and Chris McGregor (two catches for 62 yards) accounted for all but one of Salado's 86 passing yards.

But it was 140-pound placekicker Josh Lee who was named the Eagles' Offensive Player of the Week. Lee kicked field goals of 31 and 32 yards - his first ones of the year -- in

the first two quarters. The first half ended in a 6-6 tie as Hutto missed the conversion following its second-quarter touchdown.

Junior varsity

The junior varsity Eagles (6-2) lost 22-14 for their first district loss.

Kevin Combs scored on a 1-yard run and added the 2-point conversion on a pass from Rory Oldham. Matthew Fleck scored Salado's other touchdown on a 10-yard run.

Offensive standouts besides Fleck and Combs were Adam Nuse and Paul Lucas. Defensive leaders were Larry Whitt, Timmy Thompson and Michael Schoepf.

8th Grade

The 8th Grade Eagles (2-5) lost to Hutto 6-0 despite playing hard. They had two good offensive drives but penalties stalled both.

Offensive standouts were Harley Davidson, Cole Wolf and Chris Ray. Ray also was a defensive standout along with Garlan Hennig and Matt Gunter.

7th Grade

The 7th Grade Eagles (3-2) tied Hutto 6-6 in a tough defensive battle that ended with the Eagles threatening to score inside the 1-yard line.

Offensive standouts were John Kirk, Alex Toney and Aaron Gonzales. Defensive standouts were Andrew Hanson and David Matthews, who had an interception.

I would like to call the attention of other readers and Mr. Ken Clapp to several facts.

"Of course we want Texans to know as much as possible about the fair and balanced civil justice reforms TLR supports and the need for these changes," said Ken Hoagland, a TLR spokesman who also developed the site, "but perhaps even more important to the average citizen -- and the democratic process here in Texas -- is the tool we have built into this page that tells a citizen who their state elected officials are and how to get in touch with them."

Hoagland said that the linking of the database with an Internet application has been in development for more than six months. "We had technical problems to overcome but those problems have been solved and are now behind us. We are excited that this new Internet feature will have tremendous utility in making the public more informed and more involved."

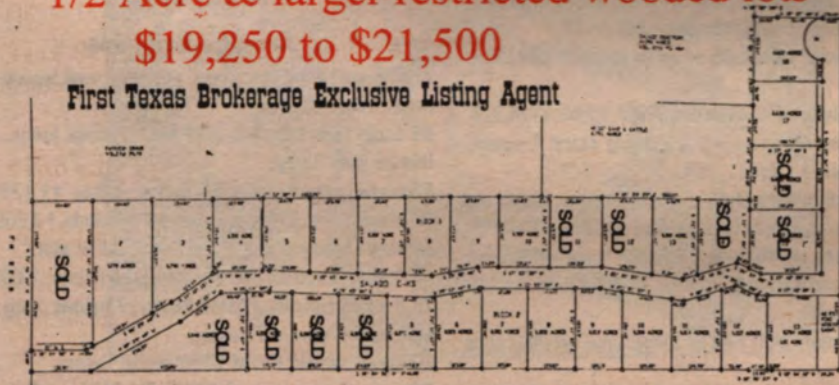

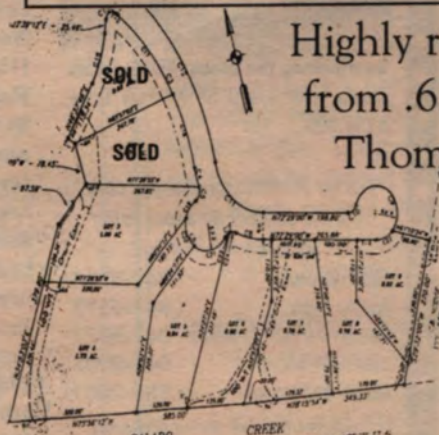

cated just west of Temple on Highway 36.

Temple in its usual high handed manner is seeking to annex six plus square miles west of the present city limits that would, if successful, bring the tiny unincorporated town of Moffat within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of Temple.

What this would mean, should the Temple land grab succeed, is that Moffat would have to seek permission from Temple, should the tiny hamlet ever decide to incorporate and this is not what the independent type residents of Moffat have in mind.

It also means that Temple could reach out and swallow Moffat in the years ahead if they were of a mind to, thus snatching up more base for their tax coffers. Again, not something the citizens in Moffat are at all interested in having done to them.

Quickly they secured the needed signatures to petition Bell County to hold an incorporation election this January to secure their borders and keep Temple at "arm's length" insofar as taxation and control are concerned.

They did this in a lightning-like move that checked-mated Temple since that city is still in the process of holding annexation hearings.

Field named after Russell Fellers

HORNET'S NEST

If you like to watch a hornet's nest come alive with stingers flashing, watch the general reaction in Texas to the Associated Press article that appeared in every newspaper in the State this past Friday - outlining the salaries paid to head coaches in the 485 largest high schools in Texas.

The salaries were gleaned from a University Interscholastic League survey of coaching salaries. The AP used the Freedom of Information Act to secure the numbers from the UIL.

Much has been said over the years about the disparity between teachers and coaches

salaries. The wiser heads among us feel that teacher's salaries should be brought closer to those who handle the extracurricular activities but also note that those who coach for a living have certain job security problems not generally found in most classroom assignments.

Also to be factored is the fact that teachers do not have to put their students on display in front of thousands of taxpayers each Friday night in some sort of competition that highlights what was taught in the classroom the previous five days.

On the other hand, teachers are judged by the results of standardized student tests given from time to time so there is a strong case for rewarding "winning" teachers as well as "winning" coaches.

One local observer noted that he felt anyone who spends his life in a career that is totally dependent on adolescents, whose minds and bodies are muddled with growing pains and emotions, and how well they perform in any given sports or academic event - certainly earns every penny he or she receives.

There will be a lot of "Letters To Editors" in many newspapers across the state in the weeks to come as adults voice their opinions on the pros and cons of organized sports and salaries - football in particular.

Some teachers will fuss about what is paid to coaches versus what is spent on classroom instruction. Administrators and school board members will seek cover and harried coaches will be forced to divide their time between fending off critics and trying to win the next district game and move into the playoffs.

NOT ENOUGH MONEY

After being around coaches as a former teacher and administrator as well as a current parent of a coach, I have come to the conclusion that there is not enough money available in any school district to sufficiently and equitably pay the good teachers and good coaches for all the great things they do for our kids.

It should not be a matter of athletics versus academics but the improvement of both since one without the other would create a singularly ineffective product. Our kids should be exposed to excellence in the classroom and on the playing field.

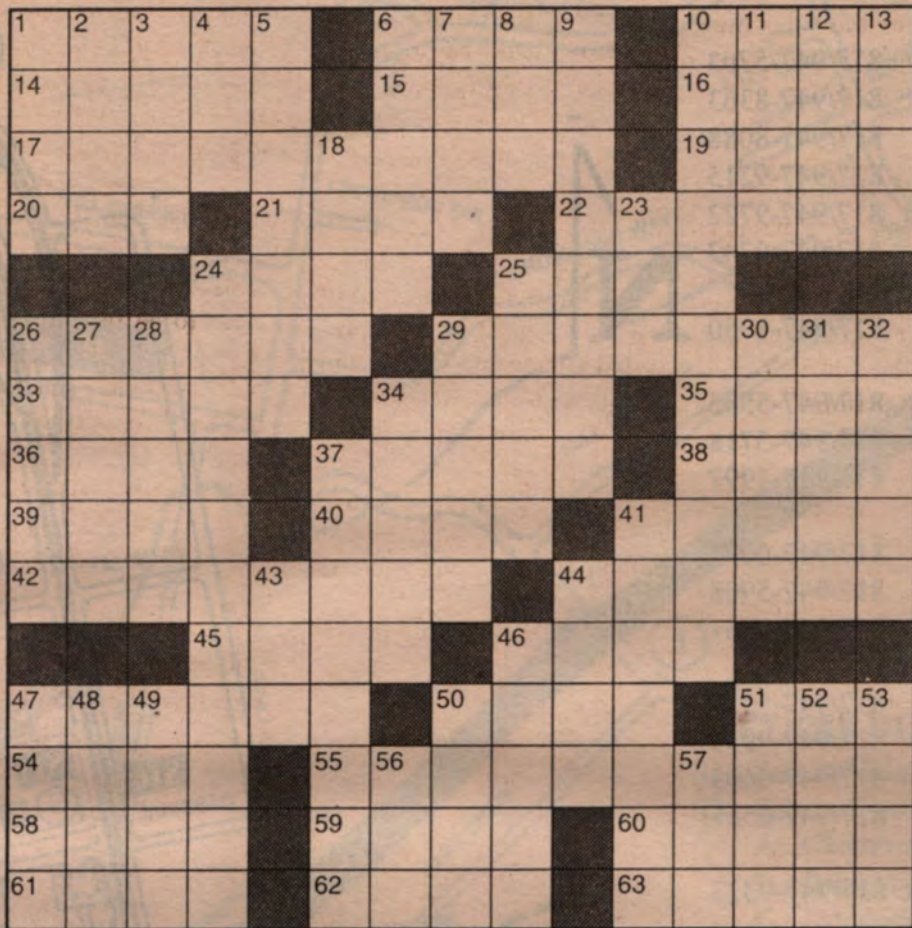
Neither tail should wag the dog by itself. We need both despite what the "experts" on the sidelines might say on this subject.

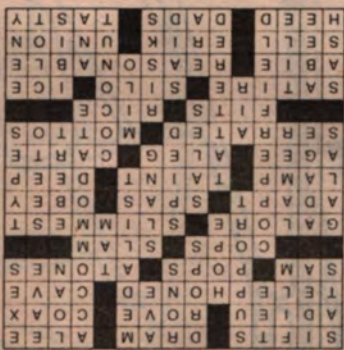

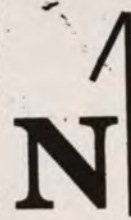

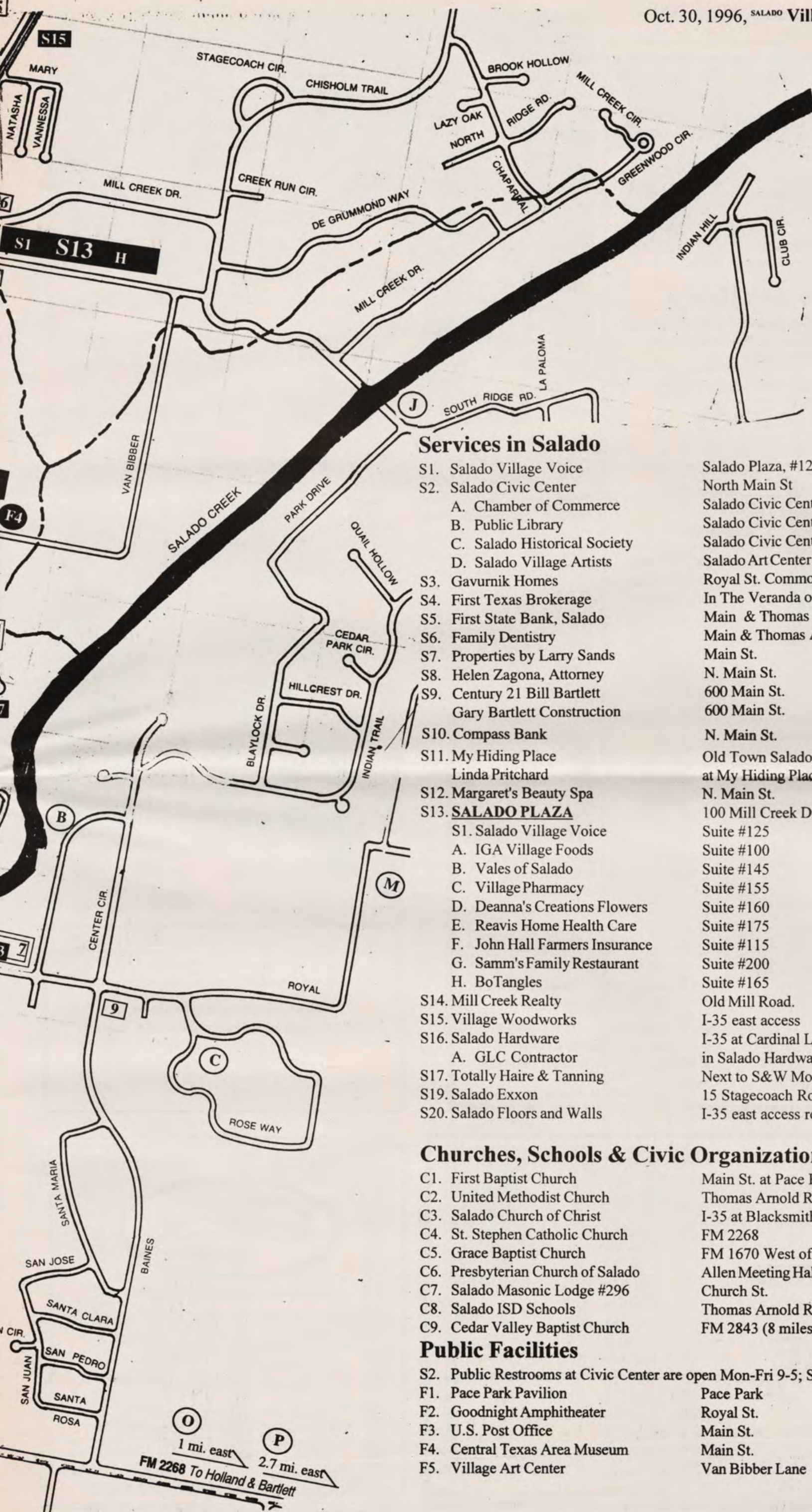

Not in kindergarten or medical school . . .

I didn't learn everything I've needed to know in kindergarten. And contrary to what I thought at the time, I didn't learn it in medical school either.

It wasn't until I had practiced pediatrics in a couple of underserved areas that I began to understand that while medicine has its place, it also has its limits. It wasn't until then that I began to understand and appreciate the importance of our nation's public health system.

In my four-and-a-half years as Texas Commissioner of Health, as head of the Texas Department of Health, our state's lead public health agency, I've learned a lot more.

Certainly, I do not know everything. There is much I may never figure out.

For example, I do not understand why we as a nation do not invest more money in public health. Experts tell us that 80-90 percent of the improvements in mortality and morbidity in this country since the turn of the century can be credited to our public health system. On the other hand, the world

of medicine, with all its pharmaceutical and technological advances, is credited with only 10-20 percent.

We're spending more than \$900 billion annually for health care. But we're investing less than one percent of it in public health. We're spending the other 99 percent on medical care. Is this a sound investment strategy? I don't understand why we can't buy in to the logic that it's better to prevent disease, illness and injury than it is to treat them. I don't understand why we don't put more money into anticipating, preventing and controlling diseases — the historical hallmarks of our public health system. I don't understand why we can't grasp that the only way we will ever really reduce the cost of medical care is by reducing the need for medical care.

Public health is more than the local or state health department, more than the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. It's more than childhood immunizations and controlling salmonella outbreaks and making sure the food, air and water is safe. Simply put, our public health system is that "someone" who's watching out for the

health of all Americans. It's that "someone" most of us take for granted. It's the reason you assume that the meat you bought today is safe to eat tonight.

I don't know why so many of us can't seem to understand why we must not only maintain, but expand our public health system. Don't we know what uncontrolled diseases can do to a population? Do we not realize, in this age of rapid global transportation, just how quickly a deadly exotic microbe from another continent can enter our country? Doesn't it make sense to have "someone" on guard, fully-equipped and poised to combat and control such an invasion?

Do we know about lead's effect on a child's ability to learn and what that means to a local and a global economy? Do we not understand cause and effect and just how far-reaching bad health can be?

There are some good people working very hard with very little to see that you are safe. They need your support. They need money. Continuing to cut away at public health expenditures is a false savings that will cost us dearly. The role of public health, with its avarice-free ability to protect the whole, isn't expendable. It's essential. Our public health system needs strong support at the national, state and local levels.


Public health isn't poverty health. Public support for public health isn't a handout for poor people. It's an investment for all people.

Rocks should not be in right-of-way

Richard Macchi, Bell County engineer, said it has been reported to his office that there are a number of residents in Mill Creek who have, or are in the process of having decorative rocks placed out near the road in front of their houses.

Concerning the situation, he would like to make known to the Mill Creek Property Owner's Association the contents of a legal opinion from the Bell County Attorney's Office, dated Dec. 20, 1979.

If the rocks are of sufficient size to create a hazard to persons using the roadway, then the placement of the rocks could invoke two statutes:

I. - Texas Penal Code Section 42.03, entitled, "Obstruct-

ing Highway or Other Passage-way," creates an offense punishable by up to 180 days in jail and/or up to a \$1,000 fine if a person:

1. "... without legal privilege or authority intentionally, knowingly or recklessly obstructs a ... street ... to which the public has access ..." (obstruct means to render passage unreasonably inconvenient or hazardous.)

2. "... without legal privilege or authority intentionally, knowingly or recklessly disobeys a reasonable request or order to move issued by a person with authority to control the use of the premises" (road).

II. Texas Revised Civil Statutes Article 6757 entitled "In-

jurating Property," states that, "Any person who shall knowingly or willfully injure any ... ditch ... upon any road ... shall be liable to the county and any person injured for all damages caused thereby."

In summary, the opinion states, travelers on our roadways have the right to use the entire right of way, not just the pavement, and if an owner of the property adjacent to the right of way places a border of rocks in the right of way of sufficient size to obstruct the use of the roadway or passageway, then he is in violation of the penal section referred to and would also be statutorily liable for damages to an automobile damaged while driven over such rocks.

Additionally, should the county expend labor in the removal of the rocks, it would appear that the landowner would be liable to the county for the cost of the labor.

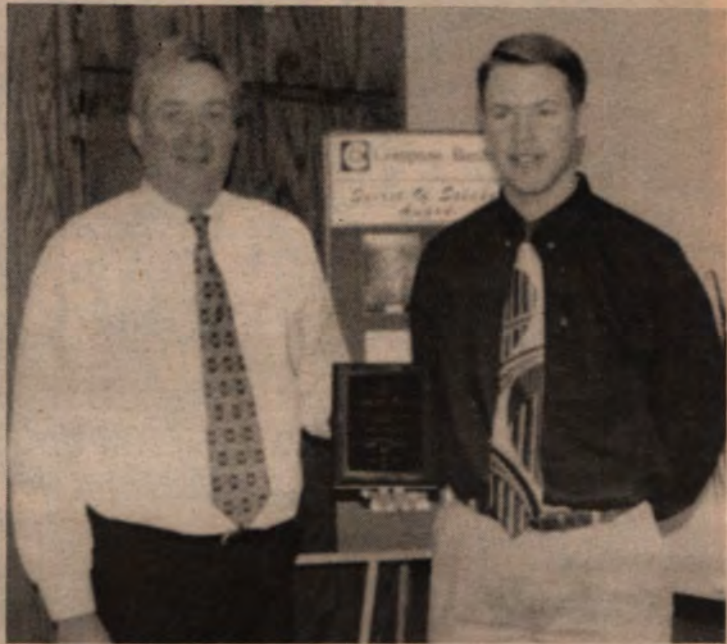
Chris Frazier wins award for 1st 6 weeks
