## Gathering of the Clans here Nov. 10-12

Kilts, cabers and ceilidhs are just a part of the 34th Scottish Games and Gathering of the Clans Nov. 10-12 in the historic village of Salado. Sponsored by the Central Texas Area Museum, the Gathering of the Clans will include Highland dancing, piping and drumming contests, and Scottish games.

The Scottish Games and Gathering of the Clans will begin with registration and a chance to see the Scottish Vendors in the Hall of the Clans at the Central Texas Area Museum on Main St. 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Nov. 10.

Imported Scottish merchandise and Scottish foods will be available 10:30 a.m.-12 noon Nov. 10.

A genealogy workshop will be 1-4 p.m. in the Longhorn room of the Stagecoach Inn, followed by more visits to Scottish vendors, the Museum and the Wee Scots Shop.

The Games will kick off 9 a.m. Nov. 11. Among the Scottish Games will be a Piping Contest on College Hill, a Highland Dance Contest on the Village Green and a Drumming

contest on College Hill.

In Scotland, Highland Dancing was once an athletic event. Scottish dances, such as Highland Fling and the Sword Dance are in fact solos dances of the Highland men, and are so vigorous that one must be in top physical shape to perform them. Some of the dance are old and date back to ancient rites in celebration of marriage, victory, defeat, joy for the living or lament for the dead.

Two Ceilidhs will be held at the High School during the day, as well. A Ceilidh (pronounced Kay-lee) is an informal gathering.

In Scotland, groups gather in a home, a pub, a hotel, or even a church social hall to play and sing the old songs. There is usually not a planned, prepared program: it's just a happening.

Listen to the pipes and beat of the drums, see Highland dancing at its best, hear soloist sing the good ole Scottish songs and join in the singing yourself.

Clans will gather in tents on the Village Green while Sheep Dog Trials will be-

gin 8 a.m. Nov. 10 at the Robertson Ranch.

Church services will be held in the Longhorn Room of the Stagecoach Inn 9 a.m. Nov. 12.

Over 18 Scottish games will be held at the Robertson Ranch including tossing the caber, weight toss and weight throw, hammer throw, tossing the sheaf and putting the stone.

The origin of tossing the caber is somewhat obscure, even though records of its existence dates back to the 16th Century. This event, like so many athletic events, may well have begun as a military discipline to breach fortifications and barriers.

The weight toss and weight throw are normally combined into a three part competition using two metal weights, one of 28 pounds, the other 56 pounds. The 28 pound weight is thrown for distance. The 56 pound weight is tossed for height as well as for distance.

The hammer throw became popular in the Scottish Highlands as a pas-

time among strong young men who gather in the late afternoon at the local blacksmith shop. There, the smith's long-handled 22 plus pound hammer was thrown to prove one's strength and agility.

General admission to the Scottish Games is \$4 per

person Nov. 10 and 12 and \$5 per person, Nov. 11.

Admission to the 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. Ceilidhs is \$4 per person.

## Brodsky next Institute lecturer

The Institute for the Humanities third speaker in its fall series of seminars and lectures is Joseph Brodsky, Russian born poet. Brodsky will give a seminar on November 4 at the Allen Hall, Salado entitled "Brodsky: His Life and Work." His lecture is November 5 at Mill Creek and is entitled "Readings The Written Word Comes to Life."

Joseph Brodsky was born in Leningrad in 1940 and emigrated to the United States in 1972. He serves as Andrew Mellon Professor of Literature at Mount Holyoke College. He was named the recipient of a MacArthur Foundation grant in 1981, won the National Book Critics Circle Award for criticism for *Less Than One* in 1986, and was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1987. In 1991 and 1992 he served as Poet Laureate of

the United States.

Brodsky states, "What provides you with subject matter is your own language and that's all. A writer is a tool of the language rather than the other way around." When the Swedish Academy awarded him the Nobel Prize, they cited both Brodsky's essays and poetry and honored him "for an all-embracing authorship, imbued with clarity of thought and poetic intensity."

The academy also paid tribute to Brodsky's heroic commitment to his art, noting that as a young underground poet in Leningrad, he was imprisoned in an Arctic workcamp for parasitism and was later exiled from the Soviet Union in 1972.

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## Texans to decide fate of 14 amendments

about the remaining amendments other than the briefest of reviews and even shorter recommendations.

Continuing a review of the Constitutional Amendments is the assignment for this week's column.

Last week we took a look at the first seven proposals and today will finish up the final seven - just in time for next Tuesday's vote on the newest changes to our oft-massaged "law of the land", the Texas Constitution.

The seven to be studied this week includes one that is, no doubt, the most important of the entire group of 14 proposed changes - that of abolishing the office of State Treasurer.

Added to this are four more requests to delete or reduce property values from ad valorem taxation; more foolishness related to the impossible Texas Growth Fund and finally an amendment that gives us another strong reason why the Texas Constitution needs to be revised - the request from three counties to abolish their Constable's jobs.

Other than the business of doing away with a major state agency - one that takes in and invests our tax dollars, there will be little need to say much

In our rush to be brief - we will try not to overlook any important factors hidden within the lawmakers formidable legalese terminology that has been used to complicate the description and/or explanation of the changes as they first arrived from the legislative halls down in Austin.

We will, however, try to include as much as necessary in order to convince readers of the need to go to the polls on Tuesday, November 7.

### Amendment Eight

Since county officials - from the County Judge to the Commissioners Court and on to the offices of Sheriff, D.A., District Judges, JP, county and district clerks and the County Attorney - are all listed in our Constitution, it takes a statewide referendum to get rid of them if the voters of that jurisdiction are so inclined.

The idea of folks in Bell County telling voters in Mills, Reagan and Roberts Counties that they have "our" permission to abolish the office of constable in "their" governmental units seems a bit farfetched - but it has to be done.

**Recommendation:** Go ahead and vote for Amendment Eight. If the voters of Mills, Reagan and Roberts Counties want to get rid of the office of con-

stable in their areas - let them do it!

By the way - voters in each of the three counties involved must also approve the measure or it won't work. The nutty thing is having to make the rest of us have a hand in their local worries.

**Amendment Nine**

Once upon a time (actually in 1988) voters amended the constitution and allowed for the creation of the Texas Growth Fund. Purpose was to provide an alternate source of capital for new businesses, small businesses and other businesses that were having trouble securing traditional loans.

At that time this column fumed about passage of such foolishness and urged the matter be defeated. We called this another "bank of last resort" for businesses that could not come up with collateral to get started the way everyone else has to do it - with properly developed capital, a trained workforce and a product that competes.

Anyway - the measure passed and the Board of Trustees of the growth fund (including select board members and dollars from the Permanent School Fund, Permanent University Fund and the two State pension systems) were required to deny lending to any company that in turn planned to do business with South Africa and/or Namibia.

Reason being that both countries were in the midst of a rational policy of apartheid and wanting to be politically correct, the legislature included it in the amendment.

Also involved was the matter of getting the minority lawmaker's vote locked into the Growth Fund idea that seemed spurious then and continues in that same vein to this date.

Today apartheid is over in both countries so the need to force businesses financed by the growth fund, to swear on a stack of financial statements that they do not do business with countries practicing bad things, is no longer de rigueur.

Amendment nine takes away the disclosure requirement that companies once had to make telling everyone they were not investing in South Africa or Namibia.

**Recommendation:**

thing to vote for this amendment since it would save someone - probably a lawyer in the AG's office - the time and effort and therefore tax dollars to

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# Eagles at top of district after Rogers victory

It was not nearly as cold as that night, but the Oct. 27 game between Salado and Rogers was reminiscent in many other ways of a contest two years earlier between the Eagles and the Thorndale Bulldogs.

First, the game was a tough fought battle with both teams holding the lead at different periods. Second, the game was not decided until the closing minutes. Third, the Salado Eagles were underdogs in both fights.

Both Thorndale and Rogers were pre-season picks to win the district. Both were surprised by the Eagles who may well be district champions if they win at Eagle field Nov. 3 against Lexington.

The 28-19 victory over the Rogers Eagles leaves Salado as the only team undefeated in district 26AA play.

Rogers, Hutto, and Lexington are all 2-1 in district play while Academy and Somerville dwell in the cellar at 0-3.

If Lexington beats Salado, it will force a three way tie going into the final game of the season, which may result in Salado being left out of the play-offs altogether.

Yet, Salado came through for fans Oct. 27, bringing a 12-6 deficit at the half to a 28-19 lead with 1:57 left to play.

Chris Frazier did all the scoring in the first half on field goals of 38 and 35 yards, respectively.

Rogers built its 6 point halftime lead on a safety, touchdown and field goal.

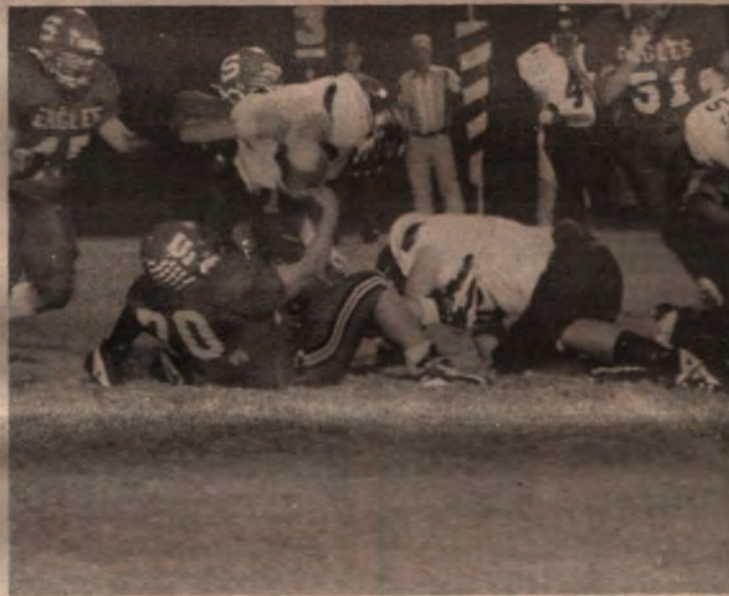
Frazier kicked a 35 yard field goal early in the third quarter to bring Salado to within 3 points, 9-12.

Salado regained the lead when Jerry Ratliff returned a punt blocked by David Kirk 6 yards into the endzone with 1:07 left in the third.

Rogers retook the lead on a sustained ball-control drive which took half of the fourth quarter before Thomas Mayes scored from the 1 yard line on fourth down and goal.

Things began to look bleak for Salado when Daren Turner intercepted a Salado pass at the Rogers 25 yard line.

But Salado turned lemons into lemonade when

Eric Lopez fell on a Rogers fumble at the Rogers 27 yard line.

With 5:28 left in the game, David Berumen punched the ball into the endzone on four straight carries. His 9 yard TD run came with 3:52 left in the game.

A booming kick by Frazier and coverage by the Eagles left Rogers at its own 13 yard line with 3:39 left to play.

With tough defense by Berumen, Rusty Wasik and Ratliff, the visiting Eagles

were four and out, giving Salado the ball at Rogers' 4 yard line.

Berumen broke two tackles at the line of scrimmage and spun off another before running across the endzone with 1:57 left to play, sealing the win.

Berumen had 68 yards on 5 carries, followed by Shawn Easley's 34 yards on 2 carries.

Berumen had 21 tackles, Wasik, 18 tackles and Jerry Ratliff, 15 tackles. Jerome Peoples had an interception.

### Amendment Ten

Amendment Ten is really what changing the constitution by referendum is all about. If passed, this proposal would do away with the statewide office of Treasurer of the State of Texas.

This is correctly listed as a constitutional office - that deals with the banking of all state income (taxes, fees, etc) and if it is deemed necessary to abolish this office, then all the people should have a say - ergo - amendment through a popular vote.

Those of you with a degree of "citizen-time-in-grade" will remember the most famous of all our Treasurers - **one Jesse James**. Not the real one but another gentleman with the same name.

Treasurer James was rarely challenged as he ran for reelection time and again from 1941 to 1976.

Who could win against a man with such a famous

name in our bank-robbing history - and to be in charge of the State's only bank, for goodness sake!

James served 35 continuous years as Treasurer and never once did he find it necessary to upgrade his office with computers or other modern paraphernalia. Some wags said the deposits were noted with quills as workers hunched over high desks as they perched on stools. Like Bob Cratchit in the Christmas Carol.

Another interesting sidelight to the office of Treasurer is that when James died in 1976, Governor Dolph Briscoe appointed another Texan with an unusual albeit historic name to the office. One William G. Harding - no relation but with the same name as the President who is remembered for the "Teapot Dome" oil scandal.

Our Treasurer Harding left office under a bit of a cloud for allegedly using staff and office for election purposes. He was defeated by Ann Richards. When Ann ran for Governor, Kay Bailey Hutchison won the top banking job in Texas.

Later when Kay left for the Senate the current lady-in-charge, Martha Whitehead, ran and was elected, on a platform of

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doing away with the office. The Legislature agreed and opined that by giving the duties of treasurer to the Comptroller the state would save money and reduce personnel.

Those favoring this amendment note that efficiency would be best achieved by putting the treasurer's most important job - (really the only one remaining today) - along with most of the top hands from Treasury - in a new division within the Comptroller's office that would handle investing state funds.

The rest of the treasurer's duties are already in the hands of the comptroller or the State Depository Board.

Potential reduction in

money - \$7.4 million per biennium and perhaps as many as 164 workers. Less of course those hired by the comptroller to handle specialized fund investment tasks.

Opponents of doing away with the Office of Treasurer note a lack of checks-and-balances should the now powerful Office of Comptroller, that would be collecting all state tax funds, also be spending those same dollars.

**Recommendation:** Since most of the work of the Treasurer is currently done by other offices outside Treasury, it would appear that the check and balance argument is weak at best. Therefore it would appear that this venerable office needs to be brought into the 21st century by assigning it to the Comptroller's office and move on.

**Recommend Amendment Ten be passed with no reservations.**

**Amendment Eleven**

Amendment Eleven is another in the series of measures that would, if passed, reduce the amount of tax dollars that could be collected thus passing the loss around to the rest of the tax paying public.

Currently land that is used for agriculture is taxed on productivity rather than market value, which normally carries a lower number for tax purposes. This amendment would add open space land devoted to wildlife management to the list of lower valued ag-type land that is taxed on the basis of productivity.

Those in favor of the idea - mainly large open-space land owners and environmentalists - note that the only way to protect wildlife is to give land owners a tax break to allow them to protect open space areas from intensive development.

Opponents proclaim that land that is appraised for farming and ranching is proper but that wildlife management is neither - therefore using productivity as the guideline for taxing is wrong.

They also use the old,

but true, bromide that land taken off the rolls or reduced in value passes the tax burden around to the rest of the tax paying public and that is unfair.

**Recommendation:** If we believe in protecting wildlife and endangered species we have to be in favor of this amendment since 97 percent of all the land in the state is in private hands. The only way therefore to protect fragile ecosystems is to give the land owner a tax break that will let him economically set aside some of his land.

One other reason why this proposal is alright and would not hurt the taxpayers of the state very much is that to be eligible for a wildlife management exemption, the land must also be able to qualify for a farm or ranch exemption thus keeping taxing units such as school districts and cities from having a run on this type tax reduction by non-agriculturists who happen to own an acre or two of vacant land.

**Recommend Amendment Eleven be passed.**

**Amendment Twelve**

Amendment Twelve is a sneaky proposal. It says in words of two or more syllables that the legislature should be granted the power to exempt from local taxation all income-producing and/or mineral properties (real or personal) that have a taxable value of less than \$500.00.

Reason, it is suggested, it costs more to process and collect taxes on such a small amount than is collected. So far, so good.

What is not mentioned is that giving the legislature unlimited power to set exemptions on various categories of taxable items as well as values of same, can evolve into very bad public policy.

If passed, what would keep our lawmakers from deciding at some future date that we need to add other categories to the list of exemptions and raise the

with no say in the matter.

**Recommendation:** In fairness to all those in the crop-harvesting professions, Amendment Thirteen needs to be passed.

**Amendment Fourteen**

And finally we come to the 14th and final proposed change to our Constitution for this biennium. Amendment Fourteen, if passed would grant the legislature authority to increase the amount of local property tax exemptions awarded to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and minor children.

Also included would be the surviving spouse and/or minor child of a member of the armed forces who dies while on active duty.

Back in 1972, Texas began a system of granting special exemptions that reduce the appraised value of property owned by a qualified veteran, spouse or minor child.

Since 1972, the value of land has gone up and up, with the exemptions remaining static. This amendment would allow the legislature to increase the dollar amount of exemption that is tied directly to the degree of disability assigned by the government to the veteran.

Those who favor this amendment note the sacrifices made by our veterans who were hurt or killed while on active duty. This is a small token of appreciation that we can show these men and women and their families.

Opponents to the measure craft an "Artful-Dodger" type scenario noting how poorly the amendment was drafted and how much in the way of taxes would be lost along with the shifting of the tax burden from one class of citizen to another.

**Recommendation:** Many counties in Texas already give an exemption of some sort to disabled veterans. This amendment would make this help available to all veterans in all counties and certainly is a proper recognition and regard for sacrifice made by these citizens who fought in our wars, police actions and other less appreciated duties over the past many years.

**Amendment Fourteen should be proudly passed!**

**Time to Vote**

Readers have patiently

worked their way through two weeks of "Off-The-Record" columns devoted to the pros and cons of the 14 proposed amendments to our often amended constitution.

The recommendations are only one person's opinion, given in high hopes that they will encourage thoughtful consideration and further study with an end result of going to the polls next Tuesday, November 7, and taking an active hand in our government.

Voting is scheduled to begin at 7 a.m. in the Foster Room of the Civic Center.

One short word on the six amendments that \$500 limit to something higher?

**Recommendation:** This amendment needs to be defeated strongly so it does not reappear next time around again dressed like sheep in wolves raiment!

**Amendment Thirteen**

Amendment Thirteen is yet another tax break, this time for those involved in the taking or production of fish, shellfish and other marine life. It would give a local-option to exempt from taxes - boats (under 100 feet) and other equipment used in commercial fishing.

There is not much difference in harvesting marine life and harvesting crops on a farm or raising cattle on a ranch when you get right down to it. Farmers and ranchers are given an exemption from taxes on their implements and this should be extended to fish-

ermen or fisher-persons.

This would be a local-option deal so the home town tax officials can decide who gets what tax break - thus defusing the opponents argument that local tax payers would have to pick up the difference would, if passed, give some sort of tax relief to certain selected groups, industries or individuals.

The current total tax on land is about to sink owners under a load they cannot sustain. We must find an alternative, or at least some relief, to the ad valorem tax bite or we will ruin one of the basic strengths of our nation - the ownership of homes and land.

Governor George Bush is working on this problem as we speak, and he and his blue ribbon committee of lawmakers and just plain citizens are hoping to come up with a better way to raise taxes other than keep socking it to land and homeowners.

Next week we return to our normal task of observing and commenting on things political, thus shifting our attention from the serious to the **Land of Obfuscation** as we try to keep up with our elected and appointed regulators who make up the political class in our society.

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**Dear Editor,**  
The law enforcement community is sometimes victimized by fraud as easily as other segments of our society. From time to time, individuals claiming to be associated with local, state, or national law enforcement organizations and associations will call you or write you seeking a contribution to that particular organization. You should be very cautious when dealing with these solicitations.

I am writing this letter to the editor to let you know that the Texas Sheriff's Association will soon be mailing an invitation to Bell County residents offering an associate membership program. This is a legitimate letter authorized by me as Bell County Sheriff. Thousands of Texas residents all over the state are currently member of this association. The 7th grade Eagles will face Lexington on the road 5 p.m. Nov. 2, followed by the 8th grade and JV teams.



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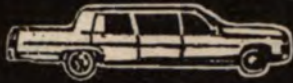

## Willingham looks back on past 15 years, forward to next 15 years

"It's scary how little I knew then about managing a dental practice," recalls Dr. Douglas B. Willingham about opening Family Dentistry in Salado 15 years ago. "Perhaps it's just as well. The risks involved in beginning a dental practice in a village of 900 people are perhaps best taken by the young and the ignorant."

But the return proved worth the risk for Dr. Willingham, who is celebrating the 15th anniversary of Family Dentistry in the Armstrong-Adams House on Main St. at Thomas Arnold Rd.

Dr Willingham remembered the first day of business for the dental office: "If I had been naive up to that point, I was certainly in for a chock had certain people not called right away for dental appointments."

"I remember sitting at the front desk ... I had no employees those first few weeks ... and wondering what could have possessed me to think Salado could support a dentist," Dr Willingham said. "In walked Norma Bentley, who proceeded to make appointments for here entire family. I'll never forget that."

Dr. Willingham's record for that first week of business include such well-known Salado names as Lonnie Edwards, Jason Vancil, Tyler Fletcher, Patsy Hinsley, Betty Critchfield, Pat Barton, Bell Smith, and the family of Rev. Joe Bentley.

This support began with a handful of people from Salado who corresponded with Dr. Willingham while he was still at Baylor dental school. "My earliest friend in Salado was Thelma Fletcher, who, along with C.B. and Mary Hodge, Jack Jones and Lloyd Treadwell, encour-

aged me to take a chance on Salado's future growth."

Soon afterward, he met Bill and Pat Ashe and their son Billy, who were just beginning restoration of the Armstrong-Adams House. "I would have to say that more than any other single factor, the beauty and the history of this house and the cooperation and friendship of the Ashe family finalized my decision to take that chance," Dr. Willingham said.

One of Dr. Willingham's earliest employees, who will soon celebrate her 15th anniversary with him, is Maria Jimenez. She has helped Dr. Willingham maintain his home and office since 1981 and has also been an important person in his daughter Sofia's life.

"Maria speaks very little English and I speak very little Spanish, but we manage to communicate," Willingham said. "She is a very special person to us."

Willingham has established a long record of civic involvement in Salado, notable in its emphasis on historic preservation. A past president of the Salado Historical Society, Willingham directed the preservation of the ruins of Salado College. He is the author of two Texas Historical Commission marker applications. The narrative he wrote for the Armstrong-Adams House marker currently serves as the statewide sample application for building markers.

History is a natural to this undergraduate history major and sixth-generation descendant of Salado's first settler Archibald Willingham, who is credited with establishing the first permanent home at Salado Springs in 1850.

Willingham, in addition to his historical pursuits and the responsibilities of his weekday dental prac-

tice, has served on the board of directors of several professional organizations, including the Texas Dental Association and the Baylor Dental Alumni Association. He is currently a member of the board of directors of the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

He served seven years as editor of the *Texas Dental Journal*, the monthly publication of the 6,500 member Texas Dental Association and currently serves as that group's historian.

In 1988, he was elected the Central Texas Dental Society's Dentist of the Year. Subsequently, he was that group's nominee for Texas Dentist of the Year, the youngest nominee in that award's history.

In continuing his service as Salado's family dentist, Willingham remains enthusiastic about Salado.

His office staff consists of Rebecca Byerley, C.D.A., dental assistant for almost five years and Debra Keith, his new office manager, an honors graduate of Baylor University who fills the position left vacant by Merle Martin on her retirement. "Merle will be missed very much," Willingham said.

"I look forward to the next 15 years in Salado with computerization of the office and the upcoming installation of new equipment in the treatment areas," Dr. Willingham said.

"This community has supported me since the day I opened my practice," Dr. Willingham said. "Both historically and professionally, Salado is how I define myself, and I am grateful to the people of this community for allowing me to be a part of it and for helping make my dream of a successful small town practice come true."

## Algae on Salado Creek

Algae on Salado Creek are an almost constant source of concern for Salado Residents. In this fall of 1995 it seems to have been on the creek and increasing for many months.

Algae play a role in providing oxygen for some water animals. Too many blooms can distort this role; so it seems what we need are some algae, but not an overabundance.

We know that it goes away when the water runs rapidly after a hard rain and reappears when water flow is slow. There is more algae when the sun is hot. Some old timers speak of the days when Salado Creek was surrounded with trees and other vegetation, to the point that from a distance, it was hard to be sure exactly where Salado Creek was.

Scientists and professional water agency personnel inform us that conditions in Salado Creek are perfect for algae bloom. The limestone creek bottom is very near the surface in much of the creek bed; the sun is hot; the water is slow moving. Add to that the fact that there is a great deal of fertilizer runoff from sources all the way downstream from where Salado Creek becomes a constant stream to beyond Salado, toward the confluence of our creek and the Lampasas River.

Phosphates and Nitrates encourage algae bloom; both are in the fertilizers which run off land as nonpoint source pollution (nonpoint means the point of contamination to the water is not identified).

What can citizens do about excess algae? We can clean it out—but it will come again. It is a condition that will not improve until the cause goes away.

We have no laws that will effectively correct the problem.

Only when people who use fertilizers do so correctly, and control livestock runoff (there are agricultural procedures for this) will we see improvement in the problem.

I believe we would see less algae with the conscientious help of fertilizer users and livestock owners.

From THE FRESHWATER FOUNDATION, Navarre, Minnesota: "Water pollution begins on land. Land management is an integral part of water management. THE WORST PLACE TO MANAGE A LAKE IS IN THE LAKE ITSELF. — Stable watersheds help protect water quality, and stable watersheds depend on sound land management practices. (A watershed is the area which drains water to a central basin).

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# Annual deer population survey completed for Bell County area



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Wildlife personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed annual deer population surveys here in Bell County. The counts resulted in an estimate of 139 deer per 1000 acres or about 30,700 deer county wide.

This year in Bell County the deer season opens Nov. 4 and runs through Jan. 7. Hunters are limited to 3 deer, with no more than 1 deer with hardened antlers and no more than 2 antlerless deer in the bag for the entire hunting season. Special attention must be given to using the proper tag off the hunting license on any deer harvested in Bell County this year. Doe

permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer throughout the Edwards Plateau District. Hunters will need only the appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer in Bell County.

Information gathered from local deer processing plants in Bell County gave some interesting insight to last year's harvest. Bell ranked highest among the counties in the Edwards Plateau for body weights in all age classes. The mature deer (3 1/2 +) harvested in Bell County were in the top ranks for antler spread, main beam length and antler points. The problem remains though that 67 percent of the Buck harvest is made up of 2 1/2 years old or younger.

Dale Schmidt, of Florence says, "The mature deer I check all are excellent specimens. They are in the minority though. I see large numbers of young bucks with excellent potential sometimes having 8 or more points as 1 1/2 year old deer. These are the kind of deer we need to let grow up. If these deer reached maturity they would be some of the best deer coming from the Hill Country and surrounding area."

After reviewing recent deer population surveys, Schmidt is recommending that Bell County landowners located west of IH 35 try for a harvest of 1 doe or antlerless deer for every 150 acres and 1 buck for every 300 acres. East of IH 35, does should be harvested in limited numbers and only in those pockets where deer populations are

well established or where deer are causing serious crop depredation problems. The recommended rates result from the need to better balance the sex ratio observed in the herd and from a desire to produce a healthier deer population that is properly matched to the existing population of deer foods in the county.

These harvest rates are based upon compartment averages derived from survey lines located in this and several surrounding counties. Therefore, the recommended rates may not be completely suitable for each individual ranch in the county. In general, if

of overpopulation (a lack of brush and weeds available at and just above ground level, less than optimum deer weights and poor quality buck antler development with in each age class, low fawn survival, etc.), then you probably need to harvest your deer population at a higher rate and/or reduce livestock grazing pressure, by reducing numbers or rotating your stock. On the other hand, if you have good deer habitat and an adequate supply of deer foods available, but seem to be short on deer numbers, then possibly you should harvest at a lighter rate than that recommended for the county.

Landowners interested in closely managing their local deer herd need to conduct their own on-site fall population surveys, with resulting harvest recommendations that meet their specific management objectives. TPWD personnel are available to assist with more specific wildlife management recommendations for individual tracts of land.

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

### EXPANDED TOLL-FREE LOCAL CALLING

The Moffat exchange has petitioned for Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling to the Belton, Gatesville\*, Killeen and Troy exchanges.

Within the next 15 days, Sprint/Centel-Texas will mail ballots to all customers in the Moffat exchange. After marking the ballot, customers should sign their name and return the ballot to the Public Utility Commission of Texas. A stamped, self-addressed envelope will be provided with the ballot.

Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling will allow customers in the Moffat exchange to make and receive local calls from Belton, Gatesville\*, Killeen and Troy exchanges. All exchanges that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area for a maximum, monthly per line charge as follows:

One to five exchanges: \$3.50 maximum fee for residence customers; \$7 maximum fee for business customers.

(Please note: The first five exchanges will cost a maximum total of \$3.50 for residence and \$7 for business customers regardless of the number of exchanges that pass the ballot. The \$3.50 and the \$7 fees will not be charged on a per exchange basis.)

Six or more exchanges: a \$1.50 fee will be charged for each additional exchange.

This charge is in addition to your local exchange service rates and will apply until Sprint/Centel-Texas' next general rate case, at which time all service rates are subject to change.

Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling will be granted to each exchange with a "Yes" vote from 70 percent of the people who actually return their ballots. Exchanges that fail to receive a 70 percent "Yes" vote will not be added to the local calling scope. If all exchanges fail to meet the requirements of the ballot, service will not change, and customers will not be billed an additional monthly fee.

Please note: The exchange that is indicated by an asterisk (\*) is located in a different Local Access Transport Area (LATA) than the Moffat exchange and will be subject to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) approval before local service can be provided. A LATA is a geographic boundary between Regional Bell Operating Companies and long-distance companies. Because the exchanges are in different LATAs, this will require a federal waiver, which may or may not be approved by the FCC. Fees for interLATA exchanges will not be charged until they are approved, and service has been provided. However, all other approved exchanges will be billed according to the PUC rule.

The Public Utility Commission has assigned this matter Project Number 14502. 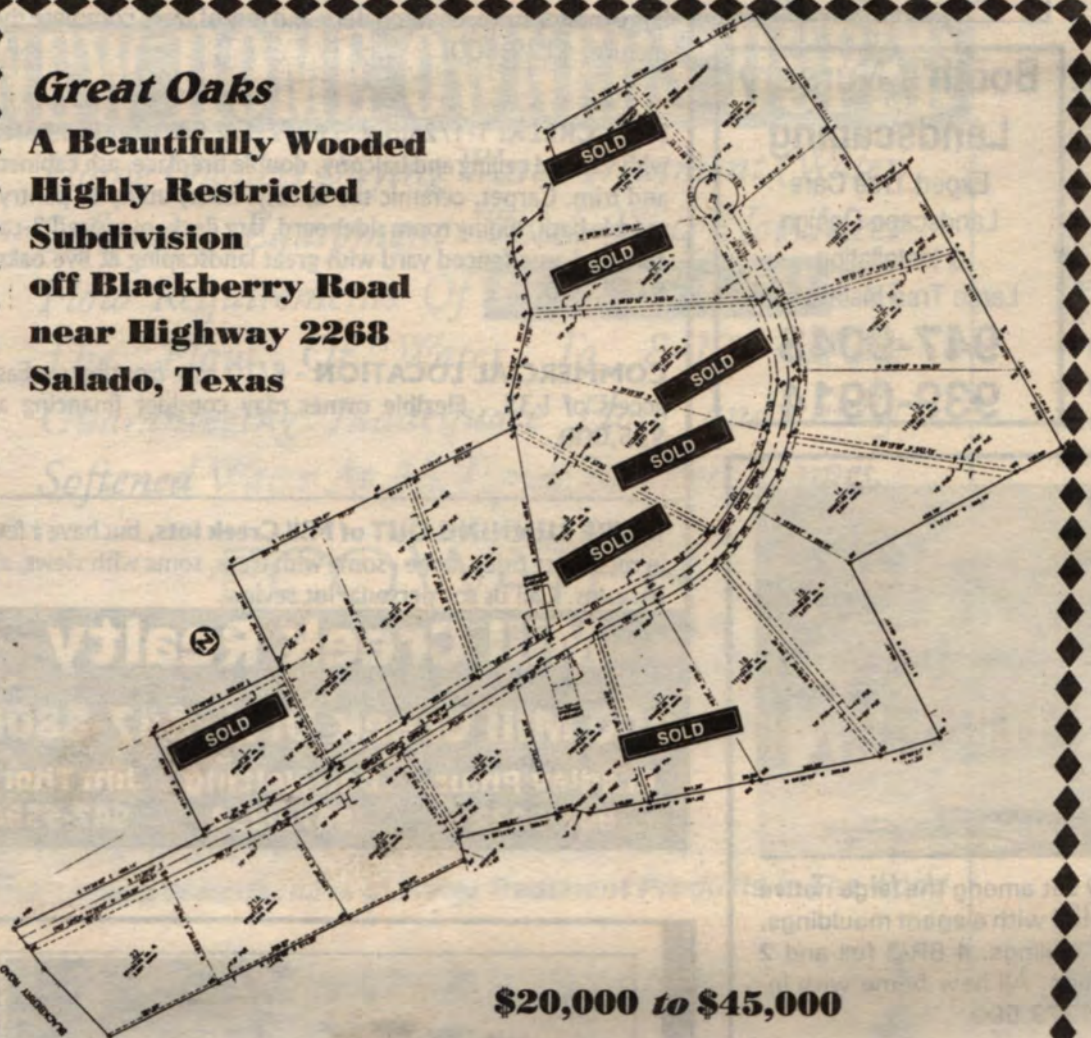

Prior to being elected as District Attorney, Eads was Bell County Attorney for two years.

He also served as an assistant district attorney (1972-75) and as an investigator with the D.A.s office 1968-69.

Eads earned his degree in law from Baylor Law School in 1970. He has a BBA from Southern Methodist University, which he earned in 1965 while serving in the U.S. Marines 1959-67.

During his years of service as the District Attorney, Eads has received appointments from President Ronald Reagan, as well as Texas Governors Mark White, Bill Clements and Ann Richards.

He was appointed to the President Child Safety Partnership. He served on the Criminal Justice Advisory Board and the Criminal Justice Police Council under Gov. White. Eads served as Vice Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Drug Abuse under Gov. Clements. He was Chairman of the Governor's Drug Policy Advisory Board and was a member of the Governor's Advisory Committee of the Texas Punishments Standards Commission during Gov. Richards term.

He was awarded the Advocate for Justice Award from the State Victim Coalition as outstanding prosecutor for victims rights in Texas in 1993. He also received the Governor's Distinguished Service Award in 1995 and was named Prosecutor of the Year by the State Bar of Texas in 1987.

Eads has appeared on the McNeil-Lehrer News Hour twice, the Today Show, Good Morning America, the Phil Donahue Show, National Public Radio, Nightline, ABC Evening News, Night talk, and the Jerry Falwell Show.

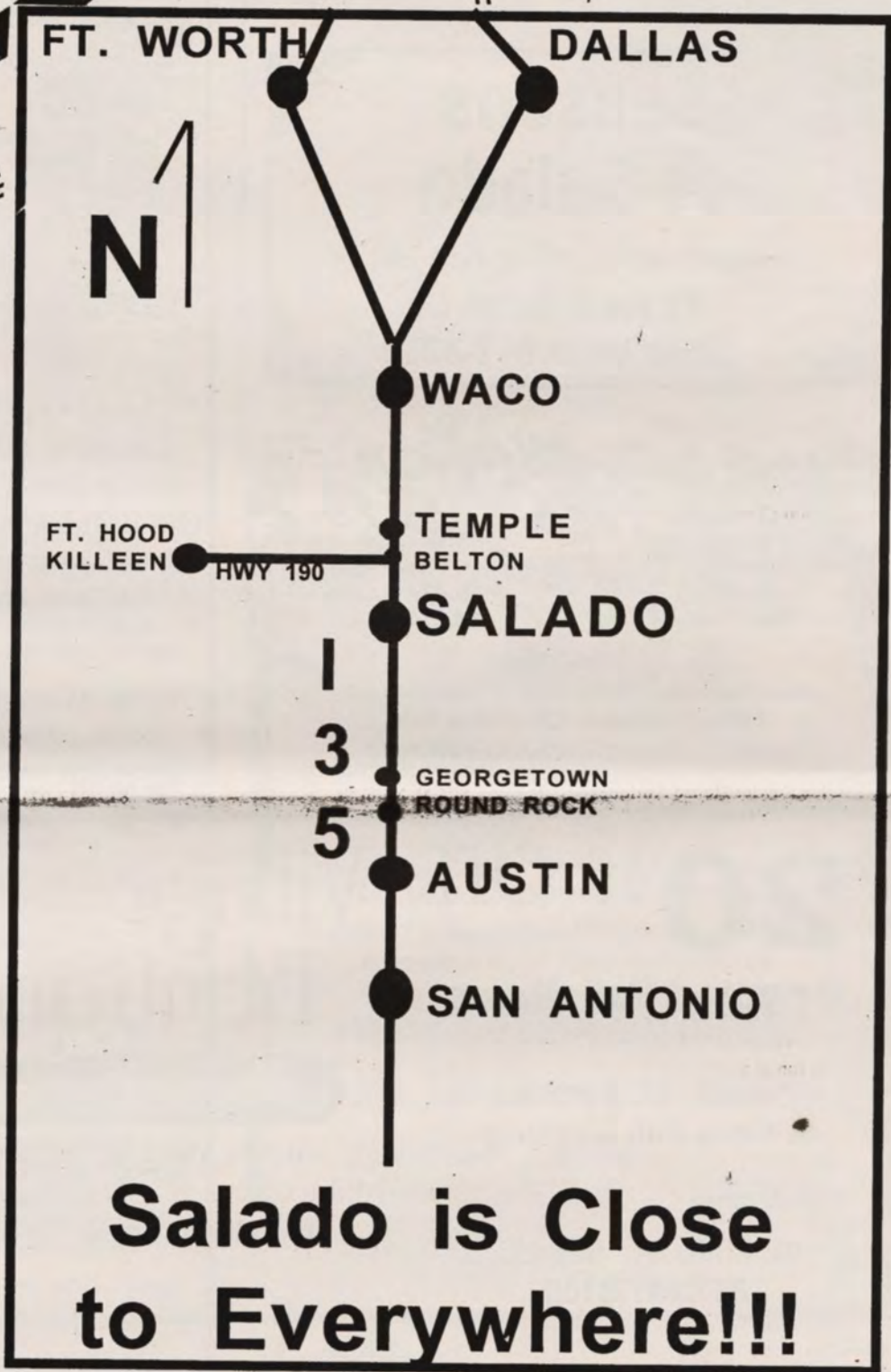
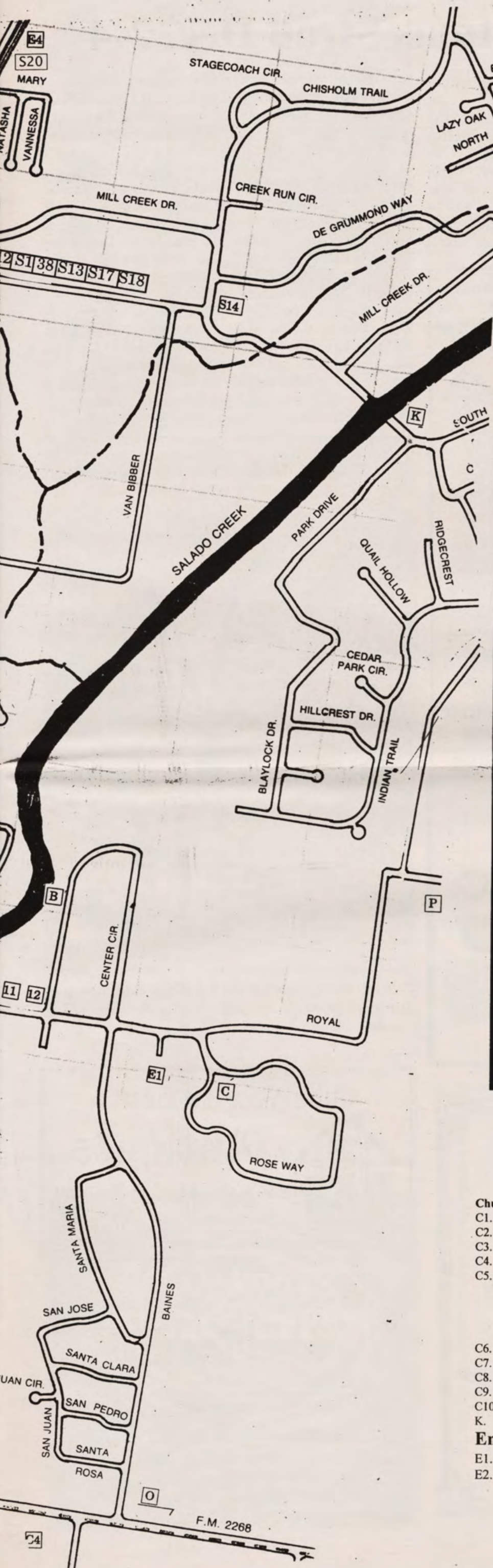
