Directors also discuss fax-on-demand, by-laws

Chamber elects 1996 President

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors elected Lloyd Parks as its 1996 Board President at its Nov. 13 meeting. Other officers elected by the board were Vernon Holt, Vice President; Bea Stewart, Secretary and Carolyn Dachs, Treasurer.

The officer election followed approval of the election results for new directors to serve three year terms ending in 1998. Those new board members are Darrell Street, Vernon Holt, Bea Stewart and Sue Carter.

Those directors serving in 1996 elected the slate of officers, including 1996 Merchants Committee Chair Elinor Tope and 1996 Auxiliary president Cathy Sands. Outgoing board members did not vote. The vote carried nine for, one against and one abstaining.

Lynn Epps presented a proposal to the Chamber of Commerce for Voice Mail/Fax on Demand services utilizing an older 386 personal computer for the data base.

"The fax-on-demand

could answer the telephone 24 hours a day," Epps said, adding that information could be received through a menu of options the caller would utilize.

The total cost to set-up the computer system would be approximately \$1,000. Epps volunteered his time to work on the system to get it up and running.

After discussing this, the board directed the budget and goals committee to consider it in the 1996 budget.

Cindy Dale reported that a 10 foot Afghan Pine will be planted on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center as a tribute to the late Thelma Fletcher.

The tree will be decorated for Christmas after 5 p.m. Nov. 30 with a "Christmas party" for the volunteers of the village to follow in the auditorium of the Salado Civic Center.

The Merchants Committee will provide refreshments for the Christmas Party while cast members of A Christmas Carol will perform a short skit from their play scheduled at Tablerock Dec. 1-2 and 8-9. Other entertainment will also be provided.

A later issue of the *Salado Village Voice* will

carry all the information about the Village Christmas Party.

Board President Jap Barrett addressed issues arising from the by-laws, saying that the by-laws should be rewritten in 1996.

In the meantime, the Chamber Board should adopt membership rules which allow one vote per person to take effect for 1996.

"Dr Baden and I visited with the Texas Director of the Chamber of Commerce in Austin. He suggested we declare the existing by-laws null and void and at the same time, adopt new by laws patterned on an example he gave us, plus we add features peculiar to our situation," Barrett said.

Areas of concern according to Barrett, include the election of directors, membership and voting, term of the president, proposing amendments to the by-laws and dissolution of the Chamber.

No action was taken on the by-laws.

Director Tim Fleischer suggested that budget and goals workshops be held before the budget for 1996 is adopted.

Cleland is final fall Institute lecturer

Max Cleland, Georgia statesman and public official, is the last speaker in the Institute for the Humanities fall series of seminars and lectures. Cleland will give a seminar entitled "Strong at the Broken Places" from 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Nov. 18, at the Allen Hall. His lecture, "Vietnam: Sorry About That" is 4-6 p.m., Nov. 19, at Mill Creek, a dinner follows.

Cleland is a 1964 graduate of Stetson University where he took a second lieutenant's commission in the U.S. Army through ROTC. He earned a master's degree in American history for Emory Uni-

versity before volunteering for Vietnam in 1967. Both institutions have conferred him with Honorary Doctorate degrees.

In 1968, Cleland, who had been promoted to the rank of Captain in the U.S. Army, was fighting to lift the siege of Khe Sanh when he was severely wounded in a grenade explosion, losing his legs and right arm. He was awarded the Bronze Star for Meritorious Service and the Silver Star for Gallantry in Action.

In 1970, Cleland pursued his interest in politics and public service by serving in the state senate of

Georgia until his appointment by President Carter to head the U.S. Veterans Administration in 1977. Cleland served at this post until 1981 at which time he returned to Georgia and was elected secretary of state in 1982. He has been reelected ever since.

Cleland has written his autobiography entitled "Strong at the Broken Places" which shares important moments of his life and outlines his personal philosophy. David Broder of The Washington Post has described Cleland as one of America's future leaders. Broder says, "He

is an authentic hero, an inspiration to people everywhere; a living, breathing testament to the power of the human spirit."

The fall series of seminars and lectures was funded by the Harris Foundation, Chicago; Potts and Sibley Foundation, Midland; RGK Foundation, Austin; Trull Foundation, Palacios, Rockwell Fund, Inc., Houston; and the Texas Committee for the Humanities.

Eagles get past Bees, face Blanco in play-offs

The Salado Eagles will face the Blanco Panthers Nov. 17 in the opening round of the UIL AA State Play-offs. Kick off is scheduled for 7:30 in Lampasas. Salado will be the home team. Tickets will be \$5 per person, \$2 for students.

The Salado Athletic Boosters support the Eagles in the play-offs. Eagles fans wearing red and white to the game Nov. 17 will receive Big Red Gum "Spirit Sticks," at the gate. The Booster Club encourages everyone to come and support the Eagles.

The Eagles are coming off an ugly 21-14 win over Academy, which finishes its season at 1-8-1, 0-5 in district.

Salado is 7-3 for the year, 5-0 in district play. They are the district champions for 26AA with Rogers as the runner-up. Rogers will face Mason Punchers in the first round of the play-offs.

The Blanco Panthers are 9-1 for the year, suffering their only loss to Mason.

Penalties and missed opportunities marked the night for Salado, when they faced the Academy Bees in the Bees last home stand of the year.

Tim Powers caught a Joshua Goodnight pass for a 12 yard touchdown in the second period of play. Chris Frazier kicked the extra point.

Goodnight scored later in the second period on a 10 yard keeper. Frazier added the extra point.

Academy scored two touchdowns to even the score at halftime 14-14.

Salado could not capitalize in the third period, even though they drove to the Bees 6 yard line. Penalties and a sack forced a 37 yard field goal which went wide right.

Early in the fourth quarter, William Culp returned a punt 65 yards for a touchdown, which was called back on an illegal block penalty.

David Berumen scored the winning touchdown for the Eagles on a 30 yard run up the middle. Frazier's extra point gave Salado its final lead of 21-14.

Berumen carried the ball 15 times for 158 yards, followed by Goodnight with 25 yards on 7 carries.

Goodnight threw 13 times for 4 completions and 33 yards.

Rusty Wasik led the defense with 16 tackles, Berumen had 12 tackles, and Culp had 9 tackles.

Salado was penalized 7 times for 75 yards on the night. The Eagles punted four times for a 39 yard average.

The Eagles scored on a pass from Rory Oldham to Troy Smith. Randy Moore scored the 2 point conversion to bring the score to 16-8.

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
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Nov. is National Diabetes Month

November is National Diabetes Month. It is estimated that over 12 million Americans have diabetes, and that 5 million of these people have not yet been diagnosed.

What is diabetes and why should people be aware whether or not they are at risk?

Diabetes is a disease in which there is a problem with the way the body regulates sugar in the blood. Food is broken down into sugar which supplies energy for the body.

Normally, the body responds to elevated blood sugar levels after a meal by producing a hormone called insulin. Insulin acts as a key for getting sugar into the muscles.

In a person who has diabetes, however, the body is unable to make enough

insulin or doesn't use it well. Since the sugar cannot be used properly, it builds up in the blood.

If left untreated, high blood sugar may lead to serious health complications.

Diabetes is the fourth leading cause of death from disease in the U.S.A. People with diabetes are twice as likely to have heart disease and two to six times more likely to have a stroke than people without diabetes.

Diabetes is also the main cause of new cases of blindness in adults ages 25-74.

Other complications of uncontrolled diabetes are kidney disease and increased risks for birth defects.

While there is no cure for diabetes, it can be controlled. Healthy eating and regular exercise are important parts of treatment.

A physician may also prescribe medications to help control the amount of sugar in the blood.

How can someone tell if they have diabetes? The only way to know for sure

is to see a doctor. However, there are warning signs of diabetes. The Texas Diabetes Council suggests that people examine the following statements to help determine whether or not they are at risk for diabetes.

The more statements that are "true," the more likely the risk.

- *I am overweight.
 - *I have a brother, sister, or parent with diabetes.
 - *I am Hispanic, African-American, or Native American or have one parent who is.
 - *My feet often feel numb or tingly.
 - *My weight has changed a lot recently for no reason.
 - *I am often very thirsty or very hungry.
 - *I am tired a lot of the time.
 - *Sometimes my vision is blurry.
 - *I have to urinate more often than usual.
- These questions can only tell if someone might have diabetes. For more information, call Reavis HomeCARE at 947-0844. Remember, diabetes can be controlled, and the sooner it is treated, the better.

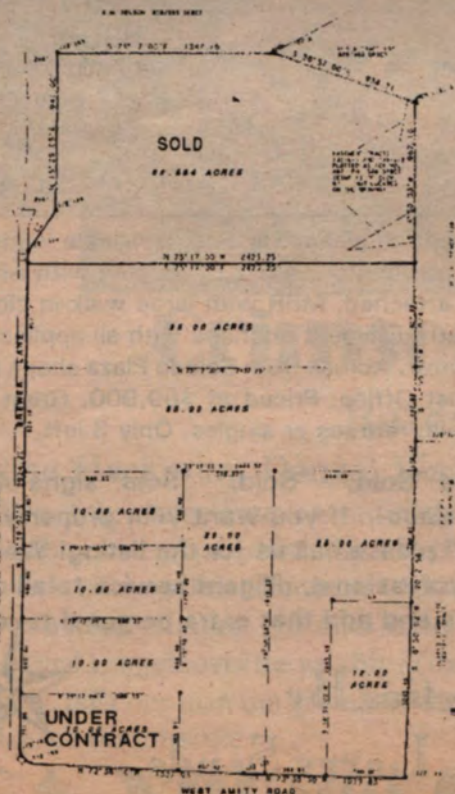

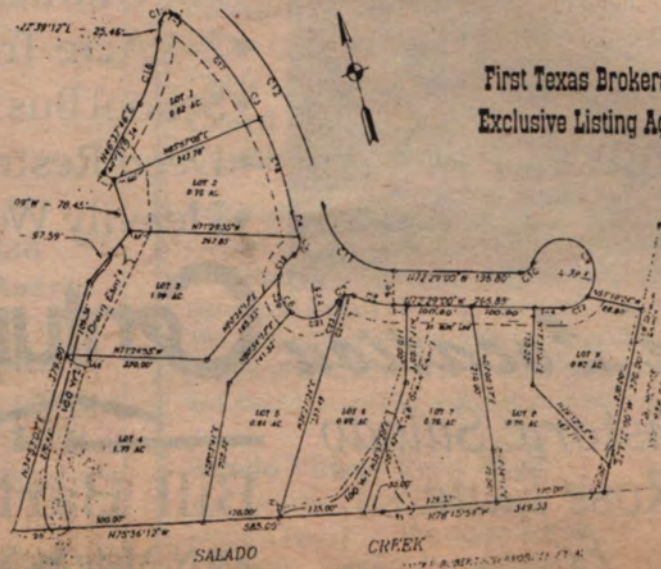

NAFTA milestone Dec. 18

The future of Texas' highways is at a crossroads. Because of NAFTA, our state has been presented with an historic opportunity for economic growth. Yet that same opportunity carries with it significant risks.

Because most NAFTA trade with Mexico goes through Texas, our state could soon become the testing ground for a dangerous experiment - the massive influx of oversized, unsafe Mexican trucks on our roads and highways. This experiment will use our roadways, our cars, and our citizens as guinea pigs, with potentially devastating consequences. A single accident between an overweight Mexican truck and a Texas school bus or family car would be as tragic as it is unnecessary.

While the full implementation of NAFTA will not be completed until early in the next century, the first milestone comes on December 18, 1995. The treaty stipulates that on that date, trucks from Mexico will have complete access to Texas roadways. In other words, they will soon begin to travel through our largest cities on some of our most congested highways.

Mexican trucks routinely carry up to twice the lawful U.S. weight. Maximum weight on U.S. trucks is 80,000 lbs. Mexican trucks weigh as much as 170,000 lbs.

These trucks pose risks to Texas citizens through accidents due simply to their larger size. But, they also pose significant risks because they are allowed to operate at maintenance and safety standards far below those required in the

United States.

Additionally, Mexican truck drivers receive less training, and operate under lower safety standards. For example, U.S. drivers are limited to 10 hours a day behind the wheel. Canadian drivers are limited to 13 hours. Mexican drivers are not limited at all.

Texas Department of Public Safety officers stop and inspect approximately 150 trucks a day. But there are about 5,000 truck crossings every day along our 11,200 mile border. The DPS finds that less than 5 percent of those Mexican trucks have adequate brakes, shocks, tires, wheels and other equipment necessary to operate the vehicle safely. Soon there will be 10,000 truck crossings a day.

These trucks carry more than televisions, stereos and computers. They carry corrosives, chemicals, explosives, jet fuel, poisons, toxic waste, pesticides and illegal drugs.

Today the Mexican drug cartels are producing a large supply of very potent heroin, and this so-called "black tar" Mexican heroin is vastly more profitable to export than Colombian cocaine. The additional border truck crossings will present more opportunities for the Mexican cartels to put heroin and other illegal drugs on our streets.

Without thorough inspection of Mexican trucks, the cartels will feel like NAFTA means the North American Free Trafficking Agreement.

Not only do these trucks pose risks to Texas citizens through accidents, illegal drugs, hazardous waste spills and inadequate insurance, but they also threaten to seriously damage our highways. Engi-

We also are seeking a somewhat longer term solution. We have requested

neers have shown that it takes 9,600 cars to equal the road wear of one 80,000 pound truck. Highways built to last 40 years could be worn out in 12 years or less. Large trucks will do more than shorten the life span of our highways. They will damage them. At a minimum of \$350,000 a mile for repairs, such trucks are an expensive proposition.

The simplest and most direct way to reduce the threat is for Texas elected leaders to demand that Mexican trucks comply with all Texas and U.S. laws and standards. I recently traveled to Washington D.C. in an effort to gain the cooperation of the federal government in maintaining these safety standards.

We asked the President to issue an Executive Order that would allow Texas law enforcement entities access to all border-crossing facilities, so that they can work with U.S. Customs officials to keep unsafe Mexican trucks off Texas highways. We think this is a necessary step that must be taken between now and December 18.

federal funds to build prototype "one-stop facilities" near our border wherein trucks can be inspected for drivers licenses, registration, weight, narcotics, hazardous waste and valid insurance.

By working together, we can enjoy the benefits of NAFTA without sacrificing the health and safety of Texas citizens or the multi-billion dollar investment in our roadways. We must ensure that the worthy goals of trade expansion under NAFTA and continued concern for citizen safety are not mutually exclusive.



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
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Salado Junior Brian Bell places 4th at State meet

Medicaid Reform Shapes Up

Several weeks ago this column focused on how Congress' efforts to reform the Medicaid program would affect the State of Texas. Now, some of the smoke having cleared from that process, I can report to you that Texas is being treated more fairly in the compromise that emerged from our deliberations than it was when they began.

It wasn't all smooth sailing. Medicaid, the federal-state program that provides health care benefits to the poor, is being converted from a Washington-directed effort to one run by and for the states. Federal support for the program is to be provided to the states through block grants, so the formula for allocating those grants became a crucial element in achieving equity. I was taken aback to learn that the original Medicaid formula approved by the Senate Finance Committee would have short-changed Texas to the amount of about \$5 billion.

To me this was totally unacceptable because it failed

to take into consideration two elements: 1) that Texas is growing much faster than a majority of the other states, and 2) Texas, unlike many other states, is responsible for providing health-care benefits for its large population of dependents of illegal aliens.

In addition, the first Senate formula subjected Texas to the most drastic reduction in funding proposed for any state.

There was an up side to this situation, however. The House Finance Committee version of the Medicaid funding formula contained an additional \$5 billion to address Texas' needs. If I could persuade my Senate colleagues to adopt the more equitable House formula, Texas wouldn't lose. After many hours of consultation and negotiation, the Senate formula was revised to restore that \$5 billion to Texas (as well as to restore allocations to other states that were to receive significantly less under the Senate formula than under the House formula.)

What we settled on is a formula under which Texas is to receive \$54.2 billion in Medicaid block-grant funding—enough to do the job and allow our state to sustain an effective Medicaid program.

This will become increasingly important to Texans over the long haul, because 25-cents of every state tax dollar in Texas goes to fund the state's portion of its Medicaid costs. A shortfall in the federal portion of Medicaid funding could have unfortunate consequences for our state, and leave the state Legislature in a financial pinch.

We wouldn't be accomplishing much on behalf of taxpayers if we reformed Medicaid on the federal level and left Texas and other states in the position of having to raise their taxes in order to accommodate the change and still live up to their responsibilities. I believe we have avoided such a non-solution and put Medicaid on a trajectory toward sound financial health.

Cameron will celebrate 150th year March 29-30

The City of Cameron was founded in 1846. It wears the name of Scotsman Ewen Cameron. The city's name is a memorial to a hero of Texas who died for the state's independence in 1843. Cameron is a lively, pretty town of nearly 6,000 people in Central Texas.

In 1996, it will celebrate its 150th birthday. The official celebration will be held March 29-30, 1996. It promises to be the greatest show in Cameron's history. Two fun packed days are planned which are expected to draw thousands of people from across the state.

The celebration will kick off March 29 with a heart stopping rodeo performance and a three day carnival. Events will begin at

9 a.m. March 30 with a parade through downtown Cameron.

Governor George Bush, Jr. has been invited to attend as parade marshal. After the parade and speeches on the downtown plaza, a day of activities will begin.

Scheduled activities include an antique car show, hundreds of arts and crafts and food booths, and a Bar-B-Q cookoff

Musically, there will be Scottish dancers and game demonstrations, mariachis strolling through the crowds, gospel singing groups, polka and country western music being played throughout the day.

There will also be games and events for the entire family such as a talent show, a kite making contest, easter bonnet parade,

a bed race, a rocking chair race, egg decorating contest, and many others too numerous to name.

The Aero Modelers will

also hold an airshow throughout the day.

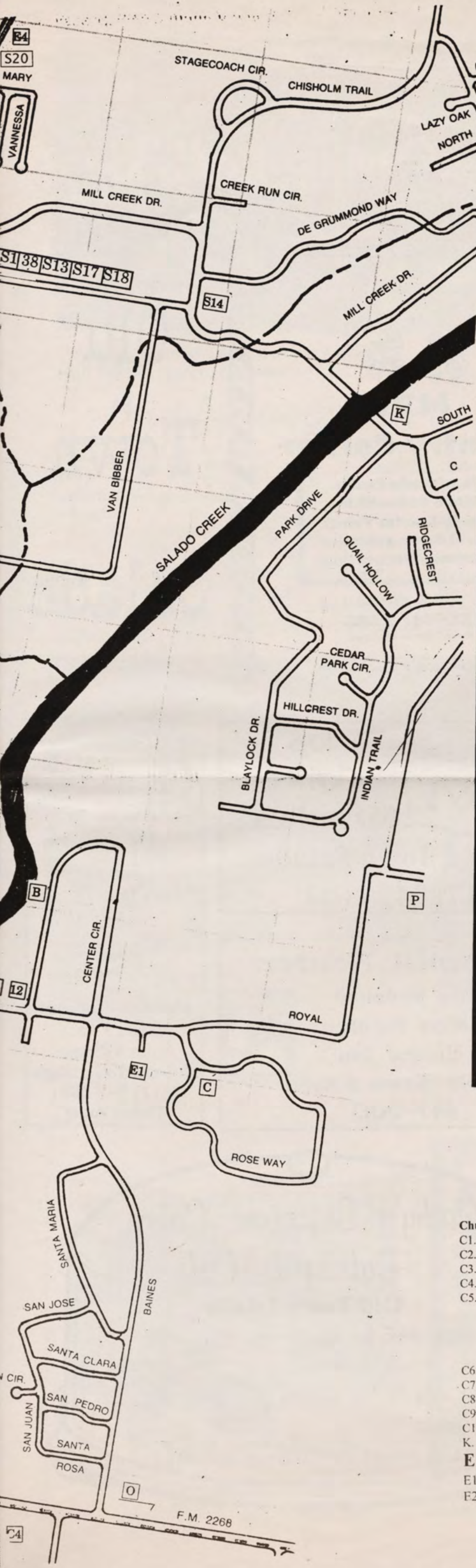

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Time to talk turkey

With Thanksgiving right around the corner, let's talk turkey! Here are some tips on thawing and preparing a turkey for the holidays.

THAWING A TURKEY: Most traditional roast turkey holiday dinners start with a frozen bird. They should also start with a safe procedure for thawing the turkey. You can safely thaw a frozen turkey in one of three ways:

1. The simplest method also takes the longest time. Leave the turkey in its original plastic wrapper and place it on a tray in the refrigerator. It will take about 24 hours for each 5 pounds of turkey to thaw. That's 3 days for a 15 pound bird.

2. With the second method, you leave the turkey in its original plastic wrapper, cover it with cold water and change the water frequently. It will take about 30 minutes per pound to thaw, or 8 hours for a 15 pound turkey.

3. Using your microwave oven will be the quickest method of thawing. Follow the directions that come with your appliance for times. You may need to turn the turkey and/or shield some parts with strips of foil so that it will defrost evenly and not start to cook.

STUFFING THE TURKEY: If you are going to stuff the bird, do so immediately before roasting. Allow 3/4 cup of stuffing per pound of turkey. For example, if you have a 16 pound bird, you'll need 12 cups of stuffing. Place the stuffing loosely in the neck and body cavities since it

will expand as the turkey roasts.

For safety sake, do not stuff the bird the day before cooking. To save time, you could prepare the dry ingredients the day before, then add the liquid just before placing the stuffing in the bird. Never freeze an uncooked, stuffed turkey or a roasted, stuffed turkey. You should remove any leftover stuffing from the carcass and refrigerate immediately after the meal.

COOKING THE TURKEY: First decide how you want to prepare the bird. Turkeys can be roasted in an open pan, baked in a cooking bag, cooked in a covered roasting pan, barbecued, or cooked in a foil wrap.

If you choose to roast the turkey in an open pan follow these steps: (1) Place the thawed turkey, breast side up, on rack in shallow open roasting pan. If a meat thermometer is used, insert it into center of thigh next to body not touching the bone. (2) Place a "tent" of light-weight foil, shiny side down, loosely over the bird to prevent over browning. The turkey may be basted, if desired, but surface basting during roasting results only in enhancing the appearance of the skin. The foil may be removed during the last half hour for a final browning. (3) Your cooking time will vary with the size of the turkey and degree of thawing. Roast the bird at 325° for best results.

TESTING FOR DONENESS: If a meat thermometer is used to determine doneness, the

temperature in the inner thigh should reach 185°F. when the turkey is done.

Another test for doneness is to press the fleshy part of the thigh with fingers protected with paper or cloth. If the meat feels soft, the bird is done. Also check to see if the leg moves up and down easily and the top joint gives readily or breaks.

When the thick skin is pricked the juices will run clear.

Allow 30 minutes of standing time after roasting before carving and serving. This rest period helps the juices to set and the turkey will be easier to carve.

Planting season is here!

The fall planting season has arrived! The weather is becoming cooler and the time has come to think about adding a new tree, or a grouping of shrubs to your landscape. Or, perhaps you have an area in the landscape that needs "remodeling" or rejuvenating. Well, fall is an excellent time to get to work!

Many people prefer January through March for planting, but the fall months of November and December have distinct advantages. There are some exceptions to fall planting. All bare root plants, including roses, pecan and fruit trees should not be planted now. Bare root plants need to be set out between December 15 and March 31 here in Central Texas.

The root systems of the ball planted specimens develop and become established as long as soil tem-

perature is at least 40 degrees. When spring arrives this new root system makes it possible for the plant to take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

All plants have growing requirements. If you are not familiar with trees and shrubs which are well adapted for our area and their growth requirements, contact the Extension office for assistance. We have a free list detailing recommended plants for this area.

Plan before you plant! Whether you are planting a single plant or an entire landscape, plan first, then plant. Good planting will pay off in greater enjoyment through a more attractive and useful home grounds. Good landscape planning also increases the value of your home. It's much easier to move plants on paper than to dig them after planting in the wrong place. A plan saves many

planting mistakes.

Plants properly planted should serve a purpose. Ask yourself, Do I want this plant for screening, for privacy, for shade, etc. How large will it be five years from now?

Plants, like people, grow up. Remember, that small one gallon size plants will look entirely different after a few years of growth in your landscape. Be sure to provide your plants with the space they require.

Our landscape plant list does include the actual size the plants will achieve and suggestions on where to place them in the landscape. Call the Extension office here in Belton for your free copy.

Where's the juice in juice drinks?

The variety of fruit-flavored drinks available at the grocery store leave many parents asking — where's the juice?

With clever advertising and packaging, parents can be easily misled into buying "juices" for their children that have no real nutritional value, said Janice Stuff, a nutritionist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center and a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Stuff encourages parents to purchase 100 percent pure fruit juice. Fruit punches or 10 percent juice products may be fortified with vitamin C, but are low in potassium and high in sugar.

"As a general rule, any juice containing more than 22 grams of sugar prob-

ably means sugar has been added," she said.

Stuff offers more "juicy" tips:

Despite the appeal of exotic blends like mango, guava or peach, orange juice still sets the "gold standard" by providing the greatest amount of vitamin C and potassium per 6-ounce serving. Grapefruit juice is second, followed by apple juice.

Pure fruit juice is an excellent source of vitamin C and potassium. Vitamin C keeps gums, skin, tissue and bones healthy. Potassium is a mineral important for maintaining normal bodily functions.

Though some juice products are calcium-fortified, don't serve them in place of milk, since there is no strong evidence on how well the body retains and uses

this supplemental form of calcium.

Serve juice in moderation, so that children do not fill up on juice before mealtimes.

Parents should not serve juice combinations to infants unless they have been introduced to each individual juice previously to avoid allergic reaction.

Stuff also encourages parents to set a good example for their children by drinking juice or water instead of soda or other non-nutritional drinks.

"Children tend to imitate what their parents do," she said. "Make 100 percent juice a sensible addition to your diet."



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
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The Santa's Village will be displayed Dec. 2-3 at the Salado Civic Center during the annual Christmas Stroll.
