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S.O.R.E members discuss strategy

During a strategy session Jan. 7 members of Save Our Resources and Environment (SORE) learned that Bell County is conducting traffic counts along county roads which may be used to haul crushed stone from a proposed rock crusher north of Salado.

County Commissioner Richard Cortese, who was present at the meeting, informed the group that the county is presently conducting traffic counts along county roads which may be used by Shallow Ford Construction to haul stone from the rock crushing plant. The information will be gathered and turned over to Dynatech of San Antonio, which will analyze the numbers in its safety study.

"The county is collecting this information, so that we will have it ready for them when we hire them, rather than paying them to

do something which we can do ourselves," Cortese said.

Dynatech will also take into consideration information from the Camp Tahuaya on the numbers of scouts which gather there, at which times of year and how many during the camp-outs and jamborees.

Members of SORE, a group formed to oppose the proposed rock crushing plant off Tahuaya Road, also learned that the Army Corps of Engineers will further study the possible effects that the rock crusher may have on the stability of the dam.

Larry Gumpert, President of SORE, told the members that he received a letter from the Corps of Engineers informing him of the Corps intent to examine the safety of the Dam.

SORE has hired the law firm of Henry, Lowery, Hess and Faulkner, which specializes in environmen-

tal law. The firm, in a recent letter to Shallow Ford Construction, informed the construction company that any indication of non-compliance with federal state and county regulations will be met with lawsuit, Gumpert told the members of SORE.

"Maybe he will come to understand that there is a more opportune area than in our neighborhood to put a rock crusher," Gumpert said.

Shallow Ford Construction has proposed to put the rock crusher north of Salado, within a mile of Stillhouse Hollow Dam, the Outdoor Learning Center, Camp Tahuaya and over 100 homes.

SORE is planning a fundraiser to pay the expected \$6,000-8,000 in legal fees over the next half-year in its effort to stop the rock crushing plant.

A benefit account for the SORE legal fund has been established at First State Bank, Salado branch.

SAR awards ... Silver Good Citizen Medal

Of notable interest to the citizens of this community and Bell County was the recent award given by the Sons of the American Revolution to Robert H. Cottle. The citation presented by Lt. Col. (ret) John M. Pinson, president of the Heart of Texas Chapter read as follows:

For many people in Bell County, the name Bob Cottle is synonymous with quality, steadfastness, public service and a giving spirit. It is a great honor for the Heart of Texas SAR Chapter to recognize one of its own members, Compatriot Bob Cottle.

Bob retired several years ago after completing a highly successful career with Premark International. His high corporate positions brought him into contact with Bell County's leading businessmen as well as those in other parts of the nation. He earned the respect of those with whom he worked.

After his retirement, he became very active with the Bell County Historical Commission's restoration of the Bell County Museum in Belton. He and his wife, Doris, donated their own money in the fund-raising necessary to restore the museum, and Bob was successful in securing significant financial contributions

from some of his former business associates.

Following the fund-raising, Bob guided the highly successful and acclaimed restoration project in Belton which made possible the use of the Bell County Museum.

Most recently, Bob led the restoration of Salado's Red School building, now known as the Salado Civic Center. This careful, thoughtful project has produced a spectacularly useful structure while maintaining its historic integrity.

The restoration of the Bell County Museum and the Red School Building in Salado represent projects which spent the better part of \$1,000,000, and Bob provided expert guidance in both instances.

The Heart of Texas SAR Chapter takes pride in presenting to Compatriot Bob Cottle the Silver Good Citizenship Medal in recognition and appreciation for the self-less and magnanimous acts of public spirited service which he has performed for his fellow citizens.

Off to the Local Political Races

The political silly season got off to a predictably early start this month shortly after the slate of hopefuls and incumbents was completed so everyone knows who to specifically knock and mudmouth. First primary is in March with the runoff a month later. Finals come in November.

Early on, the GOPers were squabbling among themselves with Butch Cleveland trying to dropkick his primary opponent Perry Dalby out of the County Judge race before it actually began. The Republican executive group turned down the maneuver so the two will have to go head-to-head in order to take a full swing at incumbent John Garth who has no adversary in the Demo primary.

Next up was the arctic blast from Oliver Kelley, an attorney from Harker Heights, who announced his judicial candidacy with a presentation of a bar-poll he commissioned that reportedly placed incumbent Demo 169th District Judge Stan Pemberton down on the level of Attila-The-Hun and others of lesser esteem. Kelley allowed as how Pemberton was a learned judge but not a very nice person to get along with on

a daily basis. Pemberton's rejoinder noted that he had been elected for his ability to apply the law and that was what folks expected and apparently what the bar results showed. The 100-plus lawyer poll was handed out at a Kelley press conference on Friday. The GOP hopeful also accused Pemberton of being a glad-hander when it came time to run for office and that he was seen at all functions being extra nice while seeking votes! Wow! Now there is an unusual charge directed at a politician beating the bushes for votes - a glad-hander! Come on, Kelley, get serious!

At the highest level of government in Texas there is a donnybrook brewing between incumbent Governor Ann Richards and GOPer George Bush. Both are hanging their campaign start-ups with the same perceived "issues" they feel are on the minds of most citizens namely the Texas criminal justice system - including too many early paroles handed out to the truly bad folks who will never be

reformed; too many lenient judges (spelled liberal by conservatives) dealing out strangely weak punishments especially, according to Bush, to youthful offenders and of course - too few prisons. Crime and punishment will be the main items for debate this year as the gubernatorial candidates square off although other issues expected to arrive soon include: shortcomings in the public education system; tax and spend Democrats versus the no-new-taxes" Republicans while both at the same time urging more funds for schools and prisons. How they manage to sell "spend and save" at the same time is a mystery to all but the party faithful who are actually more interested in the power that goes with party control of major offices than in solving the problems "du-jour".

The Bill Sims versus Hugh Shine race for District 24 in the Texas Senate will raise the heat level a bit after the primaries but the most fun will be the match between Kay Hutchison and Jim Mattox. Too bad the Democrats could only find Big Jim as the standard bearer to re-

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Letter to the Editor Creek Accessed by Monitors

Dear Editors:

Salado Creek monitors are very pleased that for the past 3 months laboratory results show a dramatic drop in coliform counts. These organisms are a significant indicator of serious water contamination.

Within the past year and a half, our samples showed a rise in these counts at some sites (we test at 5 locations).

The Brazos River Authority, with the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission oversees our work. The Authority has been doing tests in several areas to try to solve the problem, and has discussed the issues with both Stagecoach Inn personnel and Baptist Church officials. Both groups have been most cooperative.

The Stagecoach Inn staff has spent considerable time and money in having very comprehensive tests of

wastewater conveyance lines and its treatment plant. All conveyance lines and the wastewater treatment plant are intact and functioning properly. The small pond just south of Salado Creek is not in any way connected to the Inn's wastewater treatment system.

Although the tests results are now very good, the source of the problem has not been defined, so the search continues. Mr. Wayne Shumacher and the Stagecoach Inn owner, Mr. Bratton, are to be commended for their cooperation in this effort. Brazos River Authority personnel are most appreciative, and so are all of us who are Salado residents.

David Phillips

David Phillips is the president of the Congressional Human Rights Foundation (CHRF). The CHRF is a private organization in Washington, D.C., that was established to further the protection of human rights through the strengthening of democratic institutions. Mr. Phillips has served as a liaison between the CHRF and Congress, the White House, and various federal agencies.

From organizing international human rights conferences in Russia and Slovenia to monitoring elec-

tions in Haiti and Yugoslavia, Mr. Phillips has been very involved with human rights on an international scale. He is the founder of both the International Institute on the Rule of Law and the worldwide Interparliamentary Human Rights Network.

Mr. Phillips is a member of the board of several organizations including, Interlegal Moscow, the International Rescue Committee, and the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations.

Ian Hancock

Ian Hancock is a professor at the University of Texas who teaches courses on a most unusual topic; Gypsy language and culture. Dr. Hancock is an ethnic Gypsy and world renowned scholar on the history and language of Roma (Gypsies).

Dr. Hancock earned his Ph.D. degree from London University. He teaches English and linguistics as well as Gypsy culture. In 1993 he received a President's Associates Teaching Excellence Award. He is also the recipient of a Merit Award from Yeshiva University for his work to foster the languages of America.

In addition to teaching, Dr. Hancock is very involved in working to stop human rights violations against Roma. He is head of the United Nations Praesidium of the International Romani Union (IRU) and is IRU's main UNICEF representative.

Dr. Hancock is a founding member of the National League Against Antigypsyism and a member of the Institute of Race Relations. He is the author of more than a dozen books including **The Pariah Syndrome: An Account of Gypsy Slavery and Persecution** (1990).

John Roth

John Roth is the Russell K. Pitzer Professor of Philosophy at Claremont McKenna College (CMC) in Claremont, California. In 1988 he was named the National Professor of the Year by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. In 1966 Dr. Roth joined the CMC faculty after receiving his M.A. and Ph.D. in philosophy from Yale. Three times since then he has been presented CMC's Roy P. Crocker Award for Excellence.

American studies, Holocaust studies, philosophy, and religion are Dr. Roth's area of expertise. In addition to lecturing widely on these topics, he has authored, coauthored, or edited over twenty books. They include **American Ground: Vista, Visions, and Flevisions** (1988) and **Different Voices: Women and the Holocaust** (1993).

Dr. Roth chairs the California Council for the Humanities and serves on the executive board of the Center for the Study of Religion and American Culture

Purdue University, Indianapolis.

Steven Feld

Steven Feld is an anthropologist who has spent 15 years trying to capture the interaction of the Kaluli people of the Papua New Guinea rain forest with the environment. In his study of the relation of music and mythology to the environment, he has recorded everything from the sounds of frogs, crickets, and water to the songs, whoops, and yodels of the Kaluli people.

Dr. Feld is currently a professor of anthropology and music at the University of Texas (UT), Austin. He is also the director of UT's Center for Intercultural Studies in Folklore and Ethnomusicology. Dr. Feld was recently honored with a MacArthur Fellowship to encourage and support his research.

In 1990 Dr. Feld collaborated with Grateful Dead drummer Mickey Hart to make an hour-long recording of songs and sounds called "Voices of the Rain Forest." He is also author of a book titled **Sound and Sentiment: Birds, Weeping, Poetics, and Song in Kaluli Expression**, which won the 1991 Staley Award for outstanding books of anthropology.

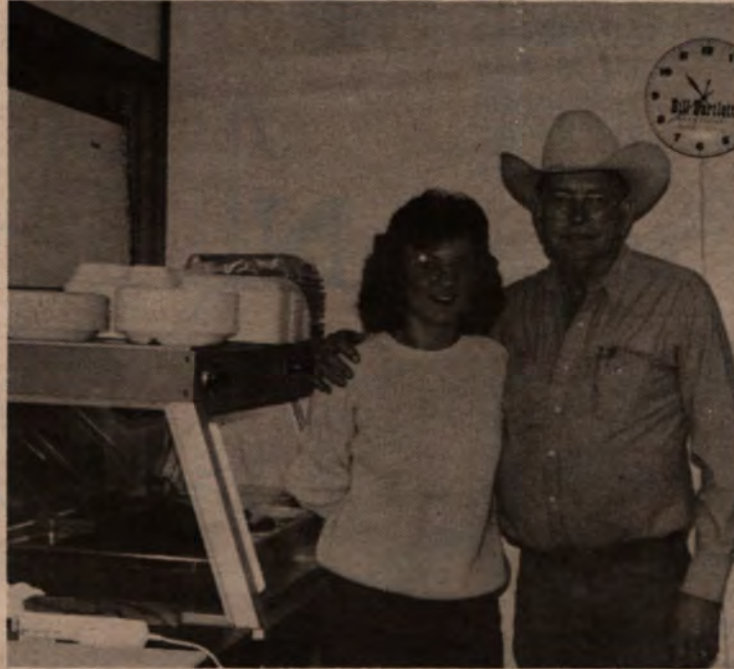

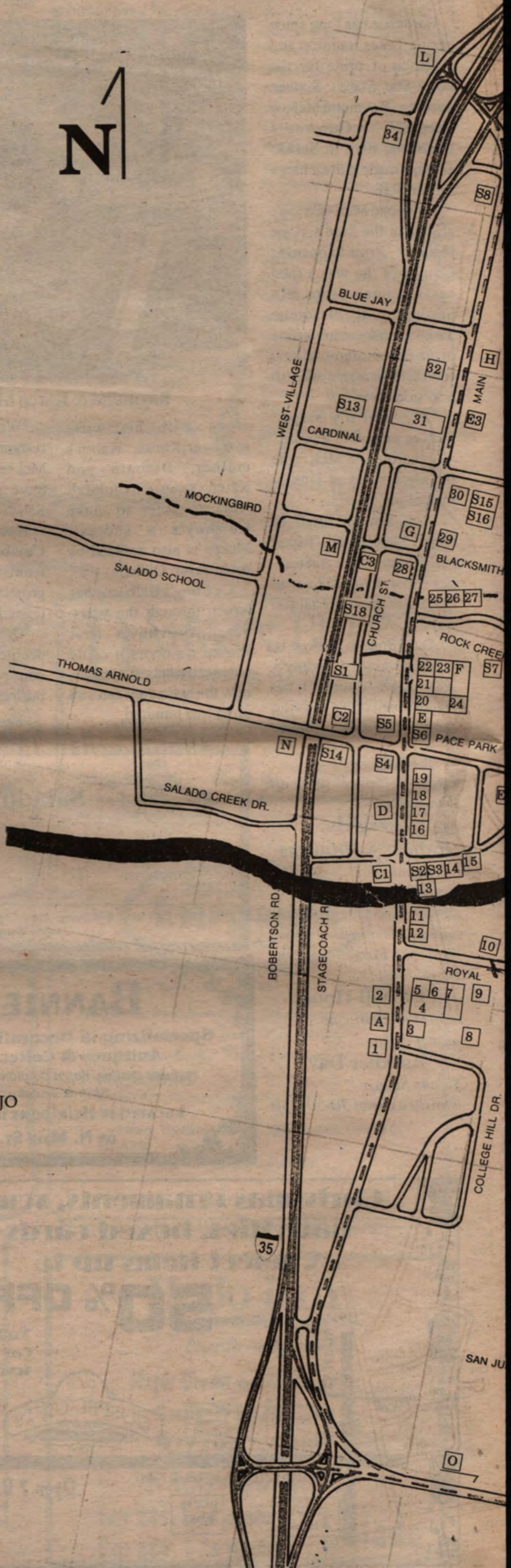

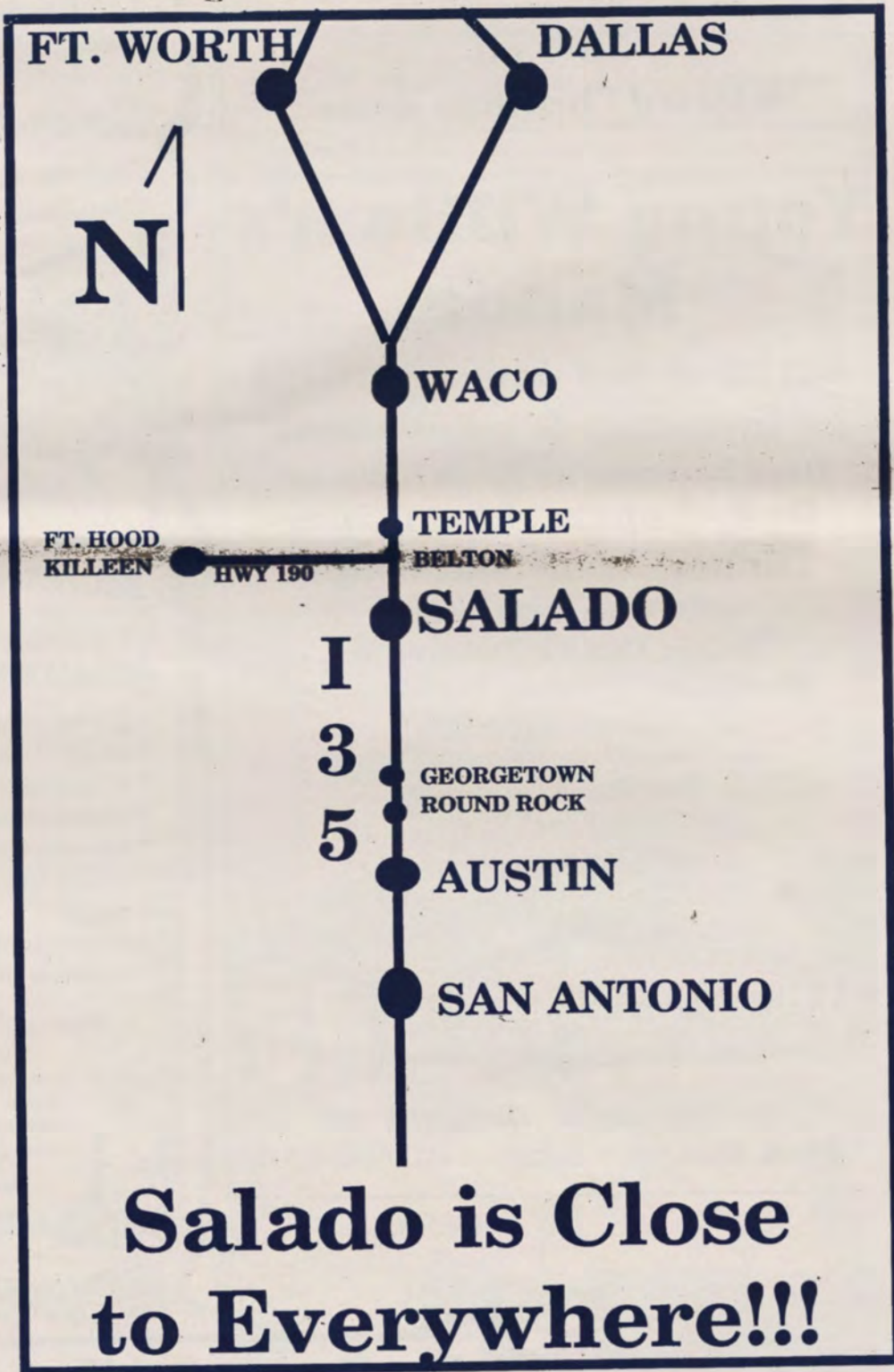

Fred Bandas, winner of the 1992 Mayborn Humanitarian Award will be featured speaker for the fifth annual Holland Area Chamber of Commerce banquet at the Holland Kuhlmann Civic Center.

After World War II duty as an Air Corps flying instructor Fred Bandas came to Bell County in 1948 where he founded Bandas Industries, a heavy construction company which still operates today.

Long before it became fashionable to care about our homeless people, Fred Bandas founded Martha's Kitchen and Home of Hope in Temple. On Thanksgiving Day 1985, Bandas working with the congregation of St. Mary's Catholic Church opened Martha's Kitchen to provide meals for those who would have otherwise gone hungry.

Bandas, an ordained deacon in the Roman Catholic Church, says this about the homeless: "Feeding and sheltering them, and offering them spiritual outreach is the easy part. It's trying to motivate people that don't know what life offers ... trying to dispel this hopelessness is the hard part. The greatest poverty is the poverty of hope."

Mike Roasa, Superintendent of Holland schools, will act as Master of Ceremonies for the banquet. Tickets are \$7.50 and are available from any C of C member and at-the-door.

Deadline nears for Senior Legislature

Filing deadline nears for Senior Legislature candidates. The Texas Silver-Haired Legislature candidacy forms are currently available from the Area Agency on Aging of Central Texas (AAACT) for persons interested in running for the Silver-Haired Legislature, which is an elected group of advocates for the states elderly. Completed candidacy forms are due in the AACT office no later than 5 pm. Feb. 28.

The Silver-Haired Legislature is a non-partisan body, composed of 116 members elected from 28 regions in Texas, that holds sessions even-numbered years to discuss issues affecting Texas senior citizens. Based on these discussions, they draft proposed legislation to address the issues identified as most important.

The legislation proposed by TSHL members is then presented to sponsors in the regular Texas Legislature. The first four TSHL session have been judged very successful, with state lawmakers responding positively to a majority of the senior group's proposals.

Prospective candidates for the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature form the AACT region must be at least 60 years old, registered to vote in Texas, and live within the even county AACT region. The AACT region includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills and San Saba Counties.

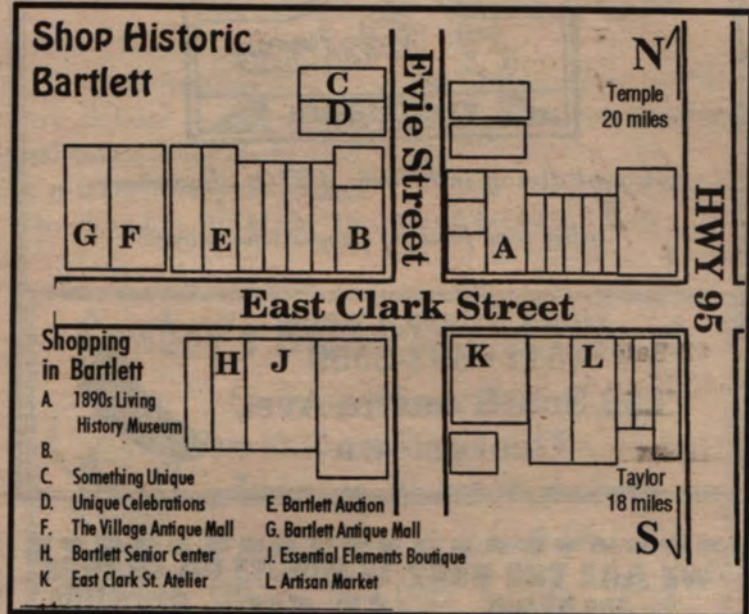

Dent is Artist-in-Residence/Assistant Professor of Voice at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene, Texas.

Texas Trash enough to fill Astrodome every two weeks

Did you know that Texans dump trash every two weeks to fill the Astrodome? Figures indicate the country's estimated 3 billion stockpiled tires are enough to circle the earth about 74 times! If you are concerned about the environment, now is the time to do something about it.

You can learn how to create a better environment for yourself and future generations through a program known as the EnviroSmart Master Volunteers Program, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) and the City of Temple.

EnviroSmart Master Volunteers will be trained to help others learn how to

compost, reduce yard waste, reduce the amount of trash they produce, how to recycle what they do have and how to handle hazardous household waste. Master Volunteers will provide educational information to individuals, community groups, schools and businesses.

"You don't have to be an expert," Sara Koeninger, CTCOG, and one of the workshop trainers, says. "We will train you and also provide you with materials so that you can pass the information on to others. Volunteer community outreach can include one-on-one contacts, response to telephone requests for information, presentations to groups, activities in schools, assisting with demonstrations, site visits or tours or

any other type of work. It all depends on the volunteer's skills or interests."

The Bell County EnviroSmart Master Volunteer™ program will be one of the first waste management programs of its kind in the state, but Extension has used master volunteers successfully for a number of years. The training program is also open to interested volunteers from other counties in the Central Texas area regardless of socioeconomic level, color, sex, religion, disability or national origin.

The three-day, twenty-five hour training is scheduled for January 25-27 at the Bell County Extension Office in Belton. Cost of the three-day workshop is

\$75.00 for registration and meals. Central Texas Council of Governments is providing a limited number of scholarships to cover part of the registration fee.

According to Lisa Sebek, Recycling Coordinator for the City of Temple and one of the EnviroSmart trainers, as part of Senate Bill 1340, Texas has set a goal of 40% recycling rate by 1994 making it imperative that we in Bell County do our part. Education can be a powerful tool for changing attitudes and habits, and ultimately helping us reach that goal. That's where the EnviroSmart Master Volunteers program comes into play.
