## Drawing classes set in Feb.

Students are encouraged to register for the entire series of four lessons. Each lesson will cover a unique aspect of drawing, such as basic drawing, perspectives, shadow and technique.

## SISD Board extends sup's contract, gives raise

The Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees extended Superintendent Steven Ervin's employment contract one-year and implemented a two-percent increase in pay for the administrator.

After an executive session in which the board evaluated itself and the superintendent, the board voted 4-1 for the contract extension, which will keep Ervin employed here through the 1996-97 school year. Grant Critchfield was the single board member to vote against the contract extension.

The board also voted to increase Ervin's salary of \$60,000 per year to \$61,200, a two-percent increase. Ervin also has a \$3,000

travel allocation. Tom Berrier made the motion for the pay raise, followed by Rita Brown's second. Critchfield and Jerry Adams voted against the increase.

Cindy Fisher and Carol Renfro were absent from the meeting.

The board also adopted a local policy amendment concerning transfer students. In addition to TASB approved policies, Salado I.S.D. will maintain a committee of the building principal, counselor and a teacher to review transfer requests. Salado I.S.D. will not allow emergency transfers from other districts.

Also transfer students will be reviewed annually before the transfer is granted again.

This year, 35 students at Salado I.S.D. are transfer students. The total school

population is 667 students, up from 603 last year.

"We want controlled, quality growth in our schools," said Nancy Goodnight, who sits on the Site-Based Decision Management Committee, which recommended the policy amendments.

The board voted unanimously on the motion from Tom Berrier.

The board also adopted a policy to handle use of the "Ag Pickup." The pickup truck was purchased with money from the ag department, according to Bill Hall, who sat on the committee which recommended the policy.

Basically, those who would like to use the Ag Pickup must have permission from Brit Owen, the Ag Teacher and FFA sponsor.

During community input

session, Tessa Schreiner and Bobby Powell addressed the board.

Schreiner, a fifth grader at Thomas Arnold Elementary, discussed three items: teacher pay, communication and school grounds.

"My first and major concern is the pay scale of our teachers and staff. We are losing our teachers and some of the best," Schreiner told the board. "It's a shame we lose our best friends and teachers because of a few dollars."

The fifth grade student recommends that Salado I.S.D. raise the base for teacher pay "to be one of the highest-if not the highest in the area, to match or surpass Temple and Killeen."

"If you say, 'There is not enough money without raising taxes,' I say, 'There is enough if you shift money

from other areas,'" Schreiner.

Schreiner's second concern is "that the board never gets to hear directly from the students. We are the ones who experience the school and teachers on a daily basis."

Schreiner recommends an elementary student council with representatives to attend the monthly board meeting to voice their concerns.

Schreiner's third concern is "the school grounds need to be cared for more. In my opinion, the grounds are not kept very well and

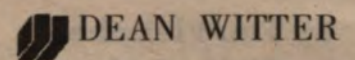

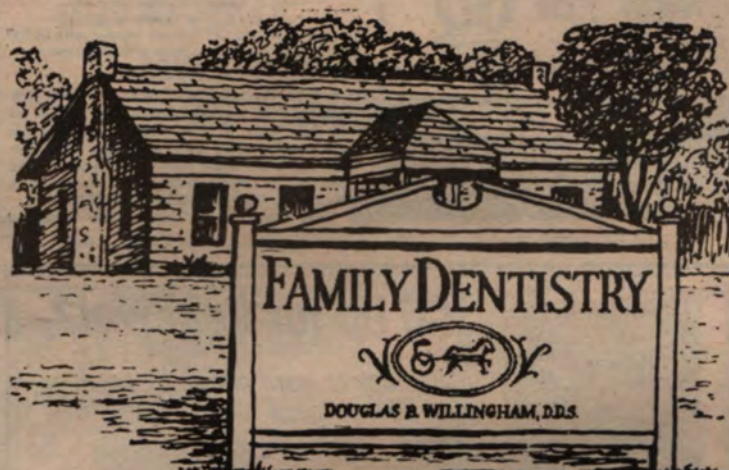

## Terry's Texas Rangers gather here

A regimental meeting of the Terry's Texas Rangers, a Civil War period reenactment group will be held for unit members in Salado on Jan 29. The gathering will center at the historic Halley House.

The men will muster at this point and ride through town for a tactical-drill exercise to be held outside the downtown area. The ladies, also in period dress, will have a coffee in the morning and gather for an informal walking tour of Salado. A round table discussion on period dress and accessories will be provided for the ladies at 3:30 p.m. The evening will follow with a Regimental meeting dinner and period dance.

The historical side of this event reflects the Terry's Texas Rangers, known in official records as the 8th

Texas Cavalry, which was reactivated in 1956, making it one of the oldest reenactment units in existence.

Currently the regiment has five companies in Texas, one each in Massachusetts, Illinois, California, North Carolina and even one in Canada. The local unit is headquartered in Bell County with Co. E, Terry's Texas Rangers.

The primary goal is the accurate portrayal of Cavalry branch of the Army. Both the Union and the Confederate sides are depicted with the highest degree of authenticity as possible. Although originally formed in preparation for the Centennial observance of the Civil War, its scope has broadened to include most of the military events from 1812 to WWII. The main call however contin-

ues to be for Civil War, followed by Texas Revolution (1836).

# Bill Boyd chosen for Young Leaders conference Jan. 18-23

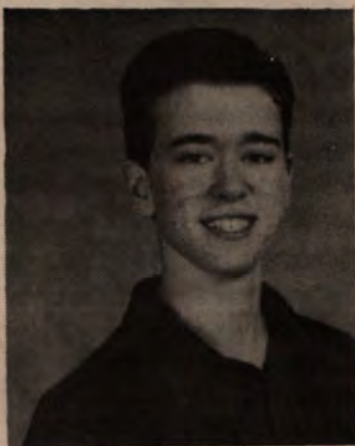
Bill Boyd of Salado was selected to attend The National Young Leaders Conference Jan. 18-23, in Washington, D.C. The National Young Leaders Conference is a unique leadership development program for outstanding high school students who have demonstrated leadership potential and scholastic merit. Bill, a junior at Salado High School, was among 350 students attending the conference from across America.

The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference is The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today. Throughout the six-day conference, Bill interacted with key leaders and news makers from the three branches of government, the media and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of the program included welcoming remarks from The Honorable Rahm Emanuel, White House Political Affairs Director, and a panel discussion with prominent journalists at the National Press Club. Students visited foreign embassies and received policy briefings from senior government officials. Bill also met with Senator Phil Gramm, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison and Representative Chet Edwards or designated members of their staffs to discuss important issues facing Salado and the nation.

To complement these special meetings and briefings, Bill participated in a number of leadership skill building activities. In one activity, Foreign Policy and the President, students role-play the President and members of the Cabinet who must respond to an international crisis in the Balkans. Culminating the conference was the Mock Congress on National Service, in which students assume the roles of United States Representatives by debating, amending and voting on proposed service legislation.

The National Young Leaders Conference is sponsored by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council, a nonprofit, non-partisan educational organization. Founded in 1985, the Council is committed to "fostering and inspiring

young people to achieve their full leadership potential." Over 300 Members of the United States Congress join this commitment as members of the Council's Honorary Congressional Board of Advisors. Each year, more than 7,000 outstanding youth nationwide participate in one of 20 sessions of the National Young Leaders Conference.

"The conference provides the opportunity for students, like Bill, to distinguish themselves as tomorrow's leaders," said John Hines, Council Executive Director. "Students not only gain knowledge and experience in the nation's capital, they leave with a sense of accomplishment and an increased ability to face the challenges of the future."

Bill is the son of Jon and Donna Boyd, of Salado. He is the President of the Junior Class, and Vice President of Salado FFA. He is a member of the National Honor Society and Who's Who Among American High School Students.

# New Tax Laws for 1993

IRS urges everyone to pay attention to new laws passed by Congress affecting tax returns for 1993.

Some changes include two new, higher tax rates in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993. These rates apply retroactively to 1-1-93, however, less than 2 percent of all taxpayers are affected. IRS welcomes the new procedure allowing married filing jointly couples with tax-

able income under \$50,000 and with no dependents, to file using Form 1040EZ, their simplest form.

Other changes include: earned Income Credit amounts were increased; the self-employed health insurance deduction was retroactively extended through 12-31-93; certain business travel expenses are no longer deductible; standard deduction amounts

were increased; and the personal/dependent exemption amount was also increased.

## Hurry, get your flu shots before it's too late

Even though the full brunt of the flu season is here, the un-vaccinated elderly and others at high risk for flu complications may still want to consider getting flu shots.

"The best time to have gotten a flu shot was well in advance of the flu season," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, "but people in the high-risk groups, and that includes the elderly, should still consider vaccination and consult their physicians."

Glezen warns that unvaccinated elderly people are more susceptible to the flu's life-threatening complications, chief among them pneumonia. This is

because they tend to have more underlying health problems, he said.

Because the flu vaccine does not provide full protection for two weeks, it is possible to contract influenza even after getting a shot, Glezen said. But protection during that two-week period can be provided by taking a prescription anti viral drug, either amantadine or rimantadine.

The elderly are not the only ones who should guard against flu complications. Other high-risk groups are:

— People with heart and lung disease, including asthma and chronic bronchitis.

— People with diabetes, chronic kidney disease and

chronic anemia, including sickle-cell disease.

— People, such as health-care workers and home care-givers, likely to come into contact with people in any of the other high risk groups.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly and produces symptoms such as fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough. The prescription drugs amantadine and rimantadine can be used for treatment of influenza A if they are taken within 48 hours of the onset of symptoms.

Victims of the flu should get plenty of rest and drink lots of liquids.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain.

## Grace period extended on long distance

Sprint/Centel-Texas recently announced the "grace period" for the dialing change involving long-distance calls within the 817 area code has been extended. Phone users in the 817 area code now have

until March 30, 1994, to change their dialing procedure when placing a long-distance call within the 817 area.

Back in September 1993, customers were notified of the upcoming dialing

change which would require callers to dial "1+" 817 or "0+" 817 when placing a long-distance call within the 817 area code. At that time a three-month "grace period" was established from October 10, 1993, to January 19, 1994. The Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) has since extended the "grace period" to March 30.

During the "grace periods" callers could still complete a long distance call within the 817 area without dialing the area code.

Beginning April 1, 1994, it will be mandatory for all phone users in the 817 area code to dial "1+" 817 or "0+" 817 and then the seven digit phone number to complete a long-distance call within the 817 area code. Anyone not dialing accordingly will receive a recording instructing them to dial the call again using the 817 area code.

The new dialing procedures will allow phone companies the capability to create new phone numbers by adding more phone number prefixes. "Due to population and technological growth, we're nearing the point where we will run out of phone numbers in the 817 area," said Robert Burns, customer relations manager for Sprint/United Telephone. "In addition to developing new prefixes, the dialing change will also open the possibility of creating new area codes if the need arises."

over a three year period to the renovation of the old red school building. Last Year the first payment was received on schedule and last week the second \$13,000 arrived and together with some brick sales money - a debt reduction payment of \$15,000 was made on the building at Peoples National Bank. Coupled with the \$30,000 paid in December, the

\$100,000 loan now stands at \$55,000.

Additional pledges this year amount to some \$8,000 and if it is felt that by this time next year, when the final Meyer Foundation gift arrives - the debt will be wiped out.
