Bell Youth Fair honors Salado couple

The Bell County Youth fair added the names of two Saladoans to its Plaza of Honor during dedication ceremonies Feb. 5 at the Bell County Expo Center.

Louis and Fannie Hill were inducted into the Plaza of Honor as was Ralph Doshier for their volunteer work on the Bell County Youth Fair.

Louis and Fannie Hill have been active with the Bell County Youth Fair and the 4-H organizations for over 30 years. They helped organize the Salado 4-H Club in 1963 and worked as active club leaders until 1973.

Both serve as members of the Bell County Adult Leaders Association, holding various offices over three decades.

The Hills helped organize the concession stand at the old barn in Temple and worked many long hours during the fair each year, fighting the cold

SISD Trustees to consider Kinsey agreement

The Salado ISD Board of Trustees will consider a settlement agreement with former Superintendent Nolan Kinsey 8:30 p.m. Feb. 15 in the high school computer room. The board will also consider the contracts of Principals Richard Brown and Rod Stockstill during its regular monthly meeting.

Supt. Steven Ervin could release no details of a possible settlement agreement with Nolan Kinsey, who sued the district when his contract was terminated.

The board will also consider one-year extensions on the contracts of principals Richard Brown and Rod Stockstill. High School

principal Brown is contracted through June 30, 1994 at \$44,400 per year. Stockstill is contracted with the district through June 30, 1995 at \$44,400.

The board will also consider the athletic directors for 1994-95. Dan Wasik is the boys' athletic director and Larry Salisbury is the girls' athletic director.

UIL realignment puts SISD in tough new district 26AA

The University Interscholastic League has realigned school districts across the state for competition in sports and other extra curricular events.

Salado High School will compete in 26AA against five other school districts. Those are Academy, Hutto, Lexington, Rogers and Somerville.

Somerville is the longest distance Salado will travel in sporting and academic events, approximately 2-1/2 hours away.

Liberty Hill has moved back up to 3A status while Thorndale has moved down to 1A status again.

Florence, which remains in 2A, will compete in the 15AA District with Bangs, Early, Goldthwaite, Hamilton and San Saba.

Schools have until Feb. 20 to argue their placement in the districts, at which

time the alignments will be completed for the next two years.

Coach Dan Wasik has already developed a football schedule for 1994.

Somerville, Rogers and Academy are all new to the district. Rogers won its district in football while Somerville lost three games to top 10 teams last year.

"This will be one of the toughest schedules we've faced," said Coach Wasik.

question that looms large especially since county roads could be used with a high cost to taxpayers. The county should be able to control that end of the deal. In fact they paid for a study on that very subject. We might want to ask about the results of that study.

At any rate we salute the Chamber for setting up this candidate's forum for us. It is also one more example of the many uses our civic center has. The meeting, by the way, will be held in the second floor auditorium. There is an elevator available. The sound and cli-

mate controls are working well so there is really no excuse for missing this important event.

Artists plan move to old school

After enjoying 11 years of regular meetings at Tablerock Amphitheater the Salado Village Artists now have new vision in their future.

With the Civic Center's approval, an opportunity has arisen to renovate the old bus barn located behind the Salado Civic Center. The artist group is looking forward to a more permanent home.

Upon investigation the building was found to be the Old Union Grove school house with the metal bus barn attached. The school was moved to Salado in 1948 when Salado ISD consolidated. It served as an Ag classroom and after the new school was built in 1967 and it was used as a maintenance headquarters until around 1990, when the new bus barn was built on



the present campus. Repairs that are anticipated include electrical, plumbing, carpentry, new doors, window glass, heat and air. Letters applying for various grants and solicitation for funding has already begun.

The Civic Center's plans to landscape the grounds included the destruction and removal of the bus barn and school house. These plans have since been revised to accommodate the Village Artists in their requests to make the build-

ing a functional meeting place for their group.

It should be noted that the building is located between the Civic Center and the Boles-Aiken cabin, which was also a pioneer school house (circa 1850).

The fact that the building completes a triangle of historical educational structures certainly adds some interests.

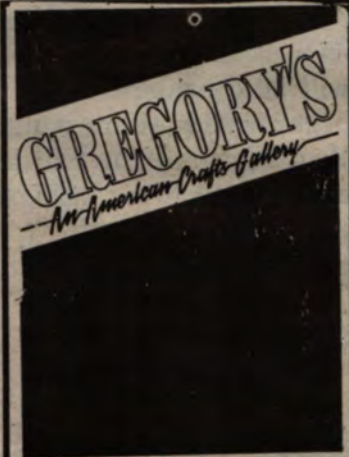

Trampas Wilson was recently named a member of the 1993 NAIA Division II Football All-America team. Wilson, the son of John and Peggy Wilson, was named to the honorable mention team as placekicker.

Wilson had a great year kicking for the Tarleton State University Texans, making 22 of 23 extra points and 12 of 15 field goals. Wilson scored 58 points during the season.

He had a long field goal of 47 yards and set school records for field goals made in a game (five) and fields goals in a season (12).

Wilson claims he didn't do anything differently in 1993 than in 1992, but the results were much better.

The junior placekicker holds the record for the most field goals in a single season, 12, while he kicked only three of seven.

"The difference is last year I was nervous and got off to a bad start," Wilson said. "It's more of a confidence factor than anything else."

Wilson says his soccer-style form comes from playing that sport until the age of 13. "My freshman year in high school, the coach asked me if I could kick a football that way. I put the first

attempt through the uprights." Wilson was quarterback and placekicker for the Salado High School Eagles. His personal best field goal at SHS was 46 yards.

Wilson prefers to kick barefooted, taping his big toe and admitting a dislike for cold weather.

On game days, Wilson says he starts warming up on the sidelines as soon as

the Texan offense crosses the 50-yard line. "You have to be ready to go in at any time after that," he says.

When called upon, Wilson checks the wind, gets his spot and tells the holder where to place the ball. "When the ball is snapped, I try to stay focused," Wilson said. "I can't worry about the rush because I have to get the job done."

Which he did many times for the TSU Texans.

The Eagles shot under 20 percent in the paint to lose to Lexington in overtime, 63-67.

Culp led the scoring with 17 points, Cabaniss followed with 16 points and Daniel and McKinney each had 10 points. Also scoring were Gidley, 6 points, Jackson and Jereme Hosch, 2 points each and Wilson, 1 point.

While the Eagles lost to Liberty Hill, they were able to keep the state-ranked Panthers under 100 points, losing 42-99.

McKinney led the Eagles, shooting 13 points, followed by 10 point efforts from Cabaniss and Daniel.
