Mayor, aldermen races contested

Salado races will be contested with the filing deadline just a day away.

The last day to file for a place on the ballot of the three local races is Feb. 14 at the close of business.

Applications for the Village of Salado are available at the municipal office, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. Applications for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees are available at the SISD Administration office in the Salado Civic Center, 601 N. Main St. Applications for the Library Board of Directors are available at the library, 1151 North Main.

The Village of Salado, unless something changes in the last days of filing, will have a new Mayor and two new Aldermen in May.

Frank Coachman and Michael Coggin have both filed for a place on the ballot in the Mayor's race. Since they are running for Mayor, they cannot run for re-election as Alderman.

Two two-year terms on the board of aldermen will also be decided in May. Three candidates have filed for those terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen: Paul Cox, Jason Howard and Don Krause.

Mayor Skip Blancett announced that he will not seek election to a fourth term as Mayor.

So far, only the Village of cations to serve on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen are as follows:

> Mayor: Residence -- 1 year in state prior to the filing deadline; 1 year in city prior to election day; Age -- 18; Must be a registered voter in territory elected from by the filing deadline

Alderman: Residence -- 1 year in state prior to filing deadline; 6 months in the city (or ward) prior to filing deadline; Age -- 18; Must be a registered voter in territory elected from by the filing deadline.

Three candidates have filed for three places on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees: incumbents Kim Bird and Troy Smith have both filed and Savannah Hennig has filed for the school board race. Three three-year terms will be chosen in the May election.

If no one files for a place on the ballot or files as a write-in candidate for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees, then the three candidates who have filed so far will be automatically elected to the board and the SISD election will be canceled.

An individual is eligible to be a candidate for, or elected or appointed to, a Texas school board if the individual:1. is a United States citizen; 2. is 18 years of age or older on the first day of SEE FILING, PAGE 4A

Bridge reopens to traffic

The Main Street bridge over Campbell's Branch opened to traffic again on Feb. 9. Capital Excavation reopened the bridge before the 40-day deadline. The bridge at Rock Creek closed on Jan. 5, reopening 35 days later. Work began May 6 on Main Street by placing debris barriers for the first phases of the year-long project. Capital Excavation, the contractor for the \$5.2 million project that replaces the Main Street bridge over Campbell Branch (near the intersection of Rock Creek Dr.) with a wider, longer, concrete bridge that meets current roadway safety and design specifications. The approaches to the structure will also be upgraded and replaced. Additionally, the project will include sidewalks, bike paths and street lighting and pavement upgrades at various locations within the project area of 0.98 mile on Main Street from Salado Plaza Dr. to the north end of College Hill Dr. Much of the project will fill the entire 100 foot right of way for Main Street in order to allow for sidewalks, parking, bike paths and drainage improvements. There are no plans for expansion of traffic lanes on Main Street. The project will rework parking throughout the right of way on Main Street. In some areas, parking will be back-in angled parking. Other areas will have parallel parking only and some areas will lose parking. A strong rebound from the coronavirus scare was evident in the markets for the week ending on February 7. On Wednesday, our old favorite indicator, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed at 3,334.69, both a memorable number and a new record while the Dow Jones Industrial Average (the Dow) crawled back above the 29,000 level to close at 29,280.85. Unfortunately, as Thursday and Friday passed, the Indexes ended the week at 3,327.66 for the SPX and 29,102.51 for the Dow. The culprit behind the end of week sag appeared to be a renewed concern over the potential for the viral epidemic to have a significant effect on the world's economy and ours as well. Still, the SPX was up 3.17% for the week, and that was nothing to sneeze at!

The yield on the ten-year U.S. Treasury note followed the same pattern having risen as high as 1.68% midweek but sagging to 1.58% by the end of the week. The rise for the week was sufficient to barely neutralize the inversion in the yield curve we saw at the end of last week; however, the one, three, and five year Treasuries all are yielding less than the 90-day T-bill creating a less than good forecast for near-term economic activity. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) failed to join the party as the price declined 2.38% for the week and is now down 17.66% year-to-date. There the reasoning was clear; China is using less petroleum and lower global demand has had its normal market impact, driving prices downward. The Economy

cade or so there has been a severe blizzard that impacted hiring in the northeast U.S. and the Labor Department factors assumed bad weather into January's jobs report. This year there was no blizzard, so the data may be inaccurate. The average hourly wage rose 3.1% year over year. The workforce participation rate, the percentage of working-age adults who are working or actively looking for work, rose to 63.4%, the highest since 2013. As a point of reference, the participation rate was as high as 67.3% in the year 2000 but has been declining since. Notably too, the coronavirus scare hit after the jobs survey, so next month may see a marked decline.

In another breath of good news, the January 2020 Manufacturing Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) published by the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) rose to 50.9 on an index scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth and below 50, contraction. January's number was 3.1 points above December's 47.6. If this trend continues, it well may indicate that the economy has turned a corner and may miss the traditional zero-year recession. Still, it is good to remember that in the year 2000, the first three months of the year also had numbers that strongly suggested the risk of a recession were receding but what followed was certainly not a pleasant time in the markets



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The end of 2016

And so 2016 finally draws to a close.

It's been the longest election year in American history. It ran from Feb. 1, 2016, the date of the Iowa caucuses, to the Senate vote to acquit President Donald Trump in early February 2020.

It's true that Nov. 6, 2016, was a signal event in this long election year, but it didn't really conclude anything, even though the result wasn't in doubt. Usually, contested elections are ties or near-ties. This is the first time an election has gone into overtime, with repeated attempts at what were in effect recounts, despite the winner comfortably prevailing (Donald Trump won handily in electoral votes, the measure that determines the outcome, 304-227).

Immediately Democrats concluded that they'd been robbed, and Hillary Clinton did indeed get some bad breaks during the campaign, most consequently at the hands of then-FBI director James Comey. Such is life in the arena. But no one on the left was in a mood to move on.

Rather taking stock and recalibrating as warranted, Democrats remained fixated on 2016. Rather than simply mobilizing opposition to Trump's agenda and reelection, as any opposition always does, they



mused about how to reverse the 2016 result. Rather than acknowledging the near-impossibility of removing a duly elected president, they indulged in fantasies about how to do exactly that.

Above all, they obsessed about Russia as the cause of their undoing in 2016. With enough investigation, all would be made plain, the Trump-Russia conspiracy would be unraveled, the walls would close in, and the world would be restored to its axis. The rightful winner of 2016 wouldn't take office, but the wrongful winner would be vanquished. What voters in Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin failed to do, the grinding machinery of investigation would achieve.

When the Mueller probe didn't produce the impeachment that the Democrats had expected with such fervent certainty, it seemed briefly they'd finally have to accept the outcome of 2016, however grudgingly. Then, Ukraine emerged, and impeachment was, thankfully and gloriously, back on.

Russia was a proximate cause of the impeachment over Ukraine. The Democrats charged that Trump

sought Ukrainian interference in our elections, just as he had sought Russian interference (for all their interest in the Mueller investigation, Democrats have never absorbed its conclusion that there is no evidence that Trump colluded with the Russians). Absent their conviction that Trump is an illegitimate president, Democrats would have been, understandably. outraged by Ukraine and determined to investigate it, but they wouldn't have impeached over it.

In this sense, the Senate trial is the last act in the 2016 election. It establishes, once and for all, that he won't leave office prior to the end of his first term. It makes it clear that another election, not some other mechanism, will be necessary to remove him. It represents the final failure of the investigatory apparatus around Trump's alleged Russia collusion to deliver Democrats from the consequences of their 2016 defeat.

Trump, obviously, isn't blameless in any of this. But he is not a Russian agent. He won the presidency in a free and fair election, and despite his attempted removal, will have a chance to do so again. THERE'S NO 'GREAT AMERICAN COMEBACK'

TRUMP IS COUNTING ON THE WORKING CLASS HE'S BETRAYING MOST AGGRESSIVELY. CAN THE LEFT GET OUT OF AFFLUENT SUBURBIA AND BACK TO ITS ROOTS?

There's an image burned into my brain from childhood: the graffitied train tracks along the intersection of Fifth and Patterson in downtown Dayton, Ohio.

It's a slightly shabby landscape dotted by warehouses, churches, fast food restaurants, and – at the margins – an old arthouse theater. If you look closely, you can see the building where I went to kindergarten, and maybe even the dive bar where my wife and I had our first date.

A photo of this familiar landscape greeted me recently in an unfamiliar place: at the top of a New York Times feature headlined, "How the G.O.P. Became the Party of the Left Behind."

It followed an out of work union teamster in nearby Moraine who'd voted Democratic for years, only to shift to Republicans in the wake of plant closures that left him adrift. In 2016, the story goes, Dayton's Montgomery County – population 530,000 – swung narrowly for Trump. It was the first time the county had gone red in nearly 30 years. We've met these voters in countless articles since 2016. And they're exactly who President Trump was pitching in his recent State of the Union address, where he boasted of "a great American comeback" and a "blue collar boom," crediting himself generously.

are spiraling, and union membership just hit an all-time low. Even as 140 million Americans are poor or low-income, the administration is working relentlessly to shred Medicaid, Social Security, and the food stamp system.

Trump has little to offer this class but half-truths about the economy and hateful lies about immigrants. Still, he's only accelerated a partisan realignment along class lines for white voters.

In the 1990s, the Times story observed, Republicans "received roughly the same share of the vote in richer and poorer counties." Yet by 2016, the GOP "won almost twice the share of votes in the nation's most destitute counties... than it won in the richest."

And the Democrats? After their sweeping midterm victories, GoBankingRates.com reported, they found themselves in control of each of the 10 wealthiest U.S. congressional districts — and 41 of the top 50.

Democrats still outperform Republicans among voters making under \$50,000 a year, while Republicans still dominate the \$100,000-plus crowd. Yet the gaps have narrowed since 2012, as Democrats have seemingly traded many white working class voters for more affluent ones. It speaks to the power of Trump's nativist scapegoating that he's accomplished this working class coup even as the GOP has embraced its most overtly plutocratic agenda ever. Thanks to Trump and the GOP, those blue collar Moraine workers now pay higher tax rates than Trump and his fellow billionaires. Republican lawmakers made millions off the corporate tax cuts they passed, while companies like GM took their tax cuts and laid off tens of thousands of workers anyway.

These are huge vulnerabilities. Yet to date, the most visible Democratic case against Trump has focused on comparatively arcane subjects like abusing aid packages to Ukraine — an issue that plays better in affluent suburbia than in lagging Montgomery County.

As Trump made clear in his speech, he will almost certainly try to get the Democrats' left on trade and jobs — and cover his tracks with nativist nonsense — if they let him. They shouldn't. With the Ukraine mess ignobly disposed of in a sham Senate trial, what progressives need is a multiracial, working class-led case against the administration's policies.

That would be a "blue collar boom" to be proud of.





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

the term to be filled at the election or on the date of appointment, as applicable; 3. has not been determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be totally mentally incapacitated or partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote; 4. has not been finally convicted of a felony from which the individual has not been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disabilities1 (but see below regarding eligibility to serve); 5. has resided continuously in the state for 12 months and in the territory from which the office is elected for six months immediately preceding filing, election or appointment; 6. is registered to vote in the territory from

which the office is elected on the date described at 5. above; and 7. satisfies any other eligibility requirements prescribed by law for the office.

Two two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District Board will also be decided in May. Bill Kinnison has filed for re-election to the Library Board. Nancy Mills Mackey is an incumbent but has not yet filed for re-election.

The last day to file as a write-in candidate in any of the three local races will be February 18.

The last day to register to vote before the May election is April 2. Early voting will begin April 20 and end April 28. Election day will be May 2. Elections will be held jointly.




any type of plant and had a talent for designing attractive bouquets and floral arrangements.

Assume you're in four spades and West leads the jack of diamonds, which wins, and then the ten of diamonds, on which East plays the king. How would you play the hand?

There seems to be nothing to the play, so let's say that you ruff the diamond and start drawing trump. You get a rude jolt when East shows out on

the second round, and you now realize that the contract is irretrievably lost.

At this point, West has one trump more than you have — which he is bound to score — and you also have to lose two heart tricks, so you're sure to go down at least one whatever you do.


This is very unlucky, you might think to yourself — after all, a 5-1 division occurs only 15 percent of the time. Nevertheless, you must assume a full portion of the blame.

There was a simple and uncomplicated way to make the contract, and it was virtually certain to succeed. Instead of ruffing the diamond lead at trick two, it would have been wiser to discard a heart, which is a loser in any case.

If diamonds were then continued at trick three, you'd once more discard a heart in order to guard against a possible 5-1 trump division. While such a division is certainly not what you'd ordinarily expect, it costs you nothing to try to protect against it. It can't be right to run even a small risk when the risk can be avoided altogether.

By adopting the suggested method of play — which means deliberately conceding the first three tricks to the opponents — you raise your chances of winning the next 10 to nearly 99%.


