Chamber sets goals

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors adopted goals for 1994 during its regular meeting Feb. 14 at the Salado Civic Center. The Board set goals in 13 areas for 1994.

The following are the goals set by the Chamber Board:

1. Support the Salado Civic Center. The Board will examine ways to improve usage of the Center, work jointly with the Old Salado School Foundation (OSSF) to hold fund raisers for capitol improvements and operating expenses and work with the OSSF to promote the sale of bricks.

2. Support the historic district in Salado and increase the awareness of the district in the village.

3. Beautification: complete the beautification of

the two I-35 interchanges, put more trash cans downtown for visitors use and identify areas for civic organization to adopt for litter control.

4. Membership: work with various homeowners groups, seek ways to involve newcomers, improve ties with merchants and work through Council of Presidents to strengthen ties to Chamber.

5. Pace Park: Improve security and improve appearance with landscaping.

6. Security of village: be alert to security problems and bring focus to security situations. Develop action plan for security situations and examine traffic flow during the weekends.

7. Recognition: recognize key people at the annual banquet, use the newspaper to highlight service to the community and establish a trophy case in the Civic Center for youth or-

ganization to display their awards.

8. Salado Creek: support monitoring of creek; be alert to changes in flow patterns and remove vegetation that detracts from flow and appearance of creek.

9. Emergency Medical Service: evaluate the EMS from Belton and determine ways to improve response time from Belton.

10. Fire protection: support the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, have a fire prevention week to make citizens more aware of fire prevention measures.

11. Plan an indoor art display at the Salado Civic Center in February or March 1995.

12. Be sensitive to the concerns of the community by interviewing the various civic organizations.

It's the last visit to Castle Rock for fans of Stephen King. And the best. **Needful Things** is a wonderfully mean-spirited tale about human nature. And human needs.

The small town of Castle Rock is a-buzz with talk when Leland Gaunt (Von Sydow) opens his shop **Needful Things** in the quiet little Maine town, which has never been very quiet at all in the mind of Stephen King.

Sydow was a perfect choice for the role of Gaunt, part shopkeeper, part demon. Gaunt offers something for everybody, an autographed baseball card, a cherished collectable, but everything has its price.

Its the price paid that makes **Needful Things** such a witty, sardonic tale. While the filmmakers have gone a long way to capture King's novel, the fall just short of the mark.

Of course, there has been no movie to truly capture King's essence, but **Needful Things** comes closer than most other film efforts, including the recent **The Dark Half** and **Tommyknockers**.

If you are a King fan, **Needful Things** is a must-see.

TSTC students set-up computer network at Salado school

Texas State Technical College in Waco and the Salado Independent School District teamed up to form a unique partnership. Students in TSTC's Computer Networking & Systems Administration (CNS) helped connect the computer systems for the Salado elementary school and high school. The exercise served a dual purpose—the college students gained on-the-job training, and the Salado schools now have computer network capabilities.

This connection resulted when Betty Gregurek, Salado elementary's Computer and Gifted and Talented teacher contacted Lance Zimmerman, TSTC's CNS department chair.

Gregurek, a former TSTC instructor, said, "I know the high quality of TSTC students. I thought it would be a good match. I am extremely pleased with

the knowledge and professionalism the TSTC students displayed while on our campus. They did a superb job and were great role models for our students."

The CNS department received Gregurek's request in mid-December. Carol Parsons, Dora Garcia, Pauline Mena Elenner Starr, Ted Bosworth, Joyce Wilkerson, Jack Alberts, Laura Baucum, Gwenn Kelly and CNS instructor Ron Pursley quickly began work on the project. Pursley said he was pleased with the response. "The students worked evenings, weekends and over the Christmas break. That's a tremendous effort considering they are in class approximately 35 hours a week. These college students volunteered time normally set aside for fun in order to learn more and help out."

Dean Elliot, owner of The

Parallel Port, coordinated the needed networking supplies. Pleased with the outcome, Elliot is recommending similar projects to other area high schools. Also resulting from the partnership is the possibility of additional cooperative educational programs for TSTC students with The Parallel Port and Salado

ISD. The Computer Networking & Systems Administration program offers a comprehensive, hands-on computer network curriculum. Courses include local operating systems (DOS5, UNIX, OS/2 Windows), application software, network operating systems (Novell Network, UNIX, Lantastic,

LAN Manager), data communications, the Internet and accessing information services. Students also learn planning, design, integration, implementation and management of computer networks. The faculty have industry experience and assist in career planning with a real-world insight.

Tablerock begins '94 membership drive

Tablerock Festival of Salado began in January 1979 by a handful of public-spirited people from Salado, Belton, Temple and vicinity. Their aim was to promote the arts in Central Texas. But more than that was the desire to recognize and give exposure to the many talented professional and semi-professional artists, actors and musicians who live and work here. It is with this goal in mind that Tablerock Festival of Salado designed its 1994 season.

Tablerock Festival of Salado is named for a large limestone monolith by Salado Creek. Tablerock once level, was first a meeting place for American Indians. In the 1800's it attracted young Salado College Students. A flood in 1921 undermined the college students trysting spot causing it to tilt. Today Tablerock amphitheater continues to serve as a Salado meeting place.

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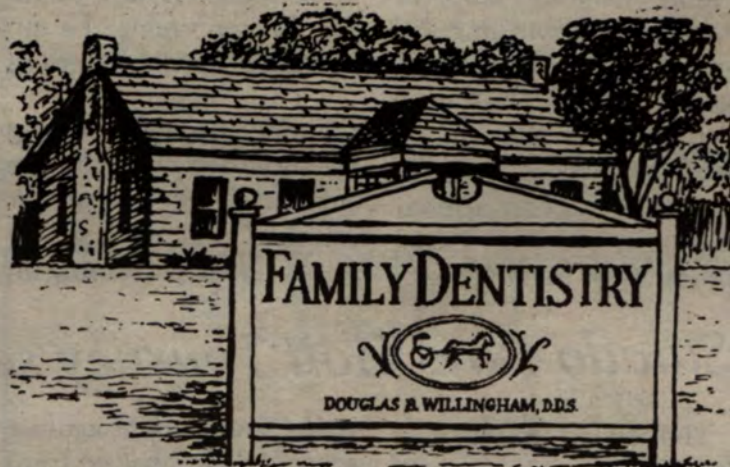

Austin fire captain teaches Monday Club about fire prevention

The Salado Monday Club met Feb. 7, with guest speaker Captain Greg Nye of the Austin Fire Department presenting an informative program on achieving safety in the home and community.

Captain Nye began with a brief history of the fire department and the role of Benjamin Franklin who tamed lightning by inventing the lightning rod.

According to Nye, "Of utmost importance is prevention of fire by the use of a sprinkler system, particularly in historic buildings as well as homes." For protection, in case of fire, Captain Nye urged everyone to have smoke alarms and fire extinguishers, and to keep this equipment operable with the necessary maintenance.

He also discussed the safe use, storage and disposal of hazardous chemicals. He brought to the attention of the group, the vulnerability of Salado due to the

proximity of the Interstate Highway that allows for the traffic of explosive and hazardous materials through the area.

Captain Nye joined the Austin Fire Department in 1981 after completing his bachelor degree at the University of Texas at Austin. After rising through the ranks of fire fighter, Specialist and Lieutenant, he was appointed the department's youngest captain in 1990.

In addition to regular duties he heads the department's 220 man Technical Rescue team which handles more difficult situations such as cliff, cave and high-

rise rescues. He is a member of the National Fire Protection Association, the International Fire Code Institute, and is an advisor to the Texas State Fire Commission. Greg and his wife Diana are the parents of three children: Blair, Miles and Emily. The family resides in Salado.

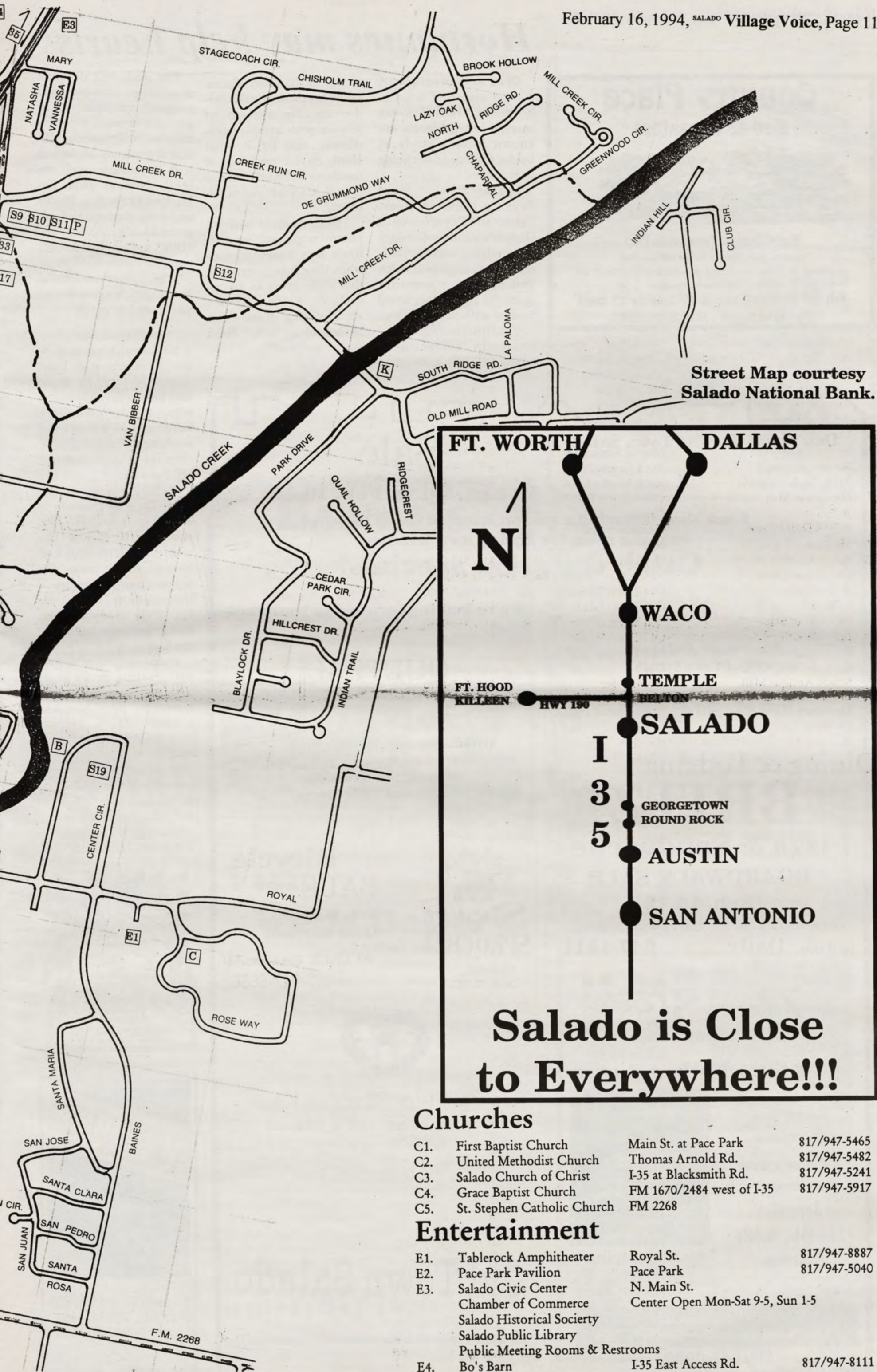

Older women with heart disease may find hope in hormone replacement therapy when results are known from a study at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Researchers from Baylor's DeBakey Heart Center and Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology are studying whether hormones will improve health and prevent premature death for post menopausal women with heart disease.

The Heart and Estrogen/progestin Replacement Study (HERS) is the first

to look at the effect of combined hormones on the cardiovascular system of women with known heart disease, said Dr. J. Alan Herd, Baylor professor of medicine and leader of the Heart Center research team.

"While we know healthy, postmenopausal women have less heart disease when they take hormones, this study gives us an opportunity to see if women with existing disease can be helped as well," Herd said.

The study will also look at whether estrogen plus progestin works as well as estrogen alone in reducing risks for cardiovascular disease and osteoporosis, but with less risk for endometrial cancer, said Dr. Michael C. Snabes, Baylor assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology and HERS co-principal investigator.

If HERS is successful, investigators agree the impact could be great.

"Not only would we have a hormonal treatment to give to women with heart disease history, we would also have a much stronger argument for prescribing hormones as a heart disease preventive for all postmenopausal women," Snabes said.

HERS is a national study involving 2,340 women in 18 research centers. The study will follow the women, half taking hormones and half taking placebos (non-active pills) through June 1998, checking their cardiovascular and gynecologic health every four months.

Postmenopausal women participating in the study must not have had a hysterectomy, must have had a heart attack, balloon angioplasty or heart bypass surgery and must be less than 80 years old. Salado High School and Junior High School students (7-12) will attend a program entitled "It Won't Happen to Me." 8 a.m. - noon Feb. 17.

The speakers included in this program are the following:

Dr. Fasolino from Scott and White Belton Clinic will speak to the students about abstinence, sexually transmitted diseases, AIDS, how to make their life a priority, and setting goals for the future. Gerri Briggs from the Aids Foundation Houston will speak to the students on a personal basis about the "risky business" and how it could affect their future. A film entitled *It Won't Happen to Me* will accompany this session.

Vicki Moose, executive director of the Bluebonnet Health and Human Services, will present a film, *A Letter from Brian*. She will also speak to the students about the service provided to persons with HIV/

AIDS, about the screenings available to the community and the misconceptions about condoms. She speaks strongly about "there is no safe sex."

Presentation of each of the sessions will be divided into segments allowing the students to rotate to each area.

All parents are welcome

and encouraged to attend the assembly. A permission form is required before the student may attend. All students with incomplete permission forms will be assigned a study hall.

How to teach your kids to handle money

One of the most important tasks parents face is teaching kids the skills they'll need to manage money effectively.

Count yourself fortunate if your children attend a school where they have an opportunity to learn basic money management. But that is not always the case.

Parents worry if their children will make it financially in the decades ahead. The economy may be unpredictable, but youngsters who know how to make good financial decisions and exercise discipline will be leagues ahead of those who don't.

A study conducted by Dr. Jerry Mason, associate professor of financial planning at Texas Tech University and Extension family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service found that high school students know less today about financial topics than did high schoolers 30 years ago.

Money Magazine recently interviewed financial experts for their ideas

on age appropriate rules parents can follow in developing kids' financial management skills. These are the recommendations:

Grade School and Younger. Become a model money manager; set an example worth following. Give your child a regular allowance; allowances are tools for learning to budget and save; allowances are not prizes for star performance or punishment for inappropriate behavior. Encourage the habit of saving money; by age eight or nine, children should be saving a part of their allowance. Find opportunities to describe how money works; talk about cost comparisons and how a desired item may cost as much as a family's food bill.

Teens. Gradually give your teen a larger allowance and freer rein on spending; a monthly instead of a weekly allowance is recommended because it requires more careful planning. Teach basic investing concepts; buying a share in a company whose product or service is well known can promote interest in learning how the stock

market works. Help kids to broaden their experience base and work habits through summer jobs, travel and part-time after-school work. Discuss how the family will pay college bills; by the junior year, the whole family should be planning together.

College Age. Arrange for your child to receive money from you; discuss expectations for handling finances, especially if a credit card is part of the deal. Be aware that kids are most likely to drop out of school during the freshman year, so requiring kids to work long hours that first year may not be wise. Encourage kids to explore career possibilities during college through internship or cooperative programs and other arrangements.

Boomerangs. Boomerangs are the ones who come back. This is a growing phenomenon, with about 43 percent of 20 to 24 year olds still living at home. It is important to set ground rules; decide who pays for what and what the adult child's financial contribution to the maintenance of the household will be.

Rep. Edwards opposes making EPA cabinet level

U.S. Representative Chet Edwards (D-Waco) concerned about expensive environmental regulation, helped lead a successful House fight to defeat a bid to elevate the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to the Cabinet level.

"Members of Congress have demonstrated that they will not support promoting the EPA without changes in its policies," Edwards said. "The EPA must five more consideration to the cost of its regulations. The EPA must balance the costs against the benefit to businesses, individuals, and state and local governments."

Edwards was one of 227 members of Congress who voted against a rule to allow debate of the EPA bill on the House floor. The legislation would have elevated the EPA to cabinet level status.

"Debate was killed because a majority of Members believe the EPA should be required to conduct cost-benefit studies before implementing and enforcing regulations," Edwards said.

"What sounds good in Washington may not be good for Central Texas," Edwards said. "We want the EPA to show a little more common sense when they write rules and regulations that cost people time and money."

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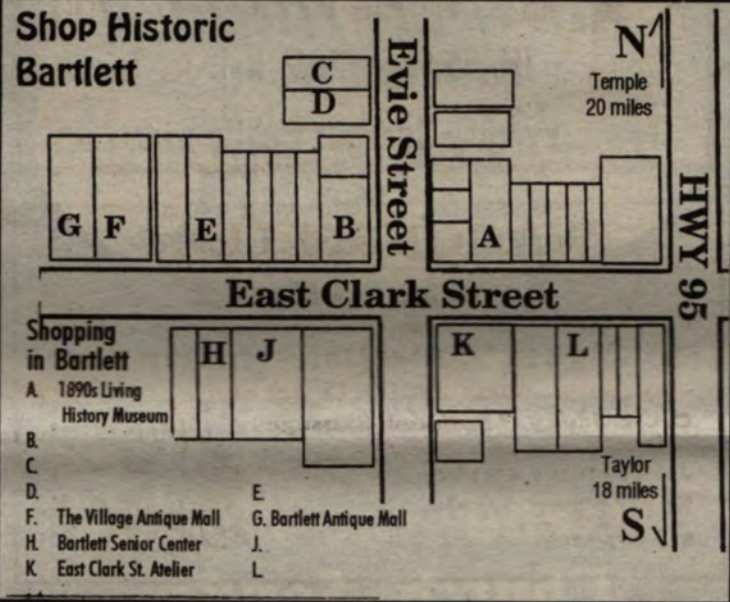

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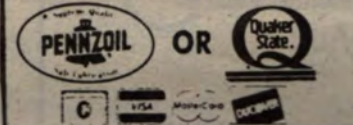

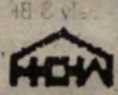

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Can your kitchen pass health inspection?

With increasing emphasis on the importance of handling food safely to prevent food borne illness, consumers may want to ask themselves "would my kitchen pass a health inspection?" To answer this question, check for these standards in your kitchen:

Does your refrigerator maintain a temperature of 40°F. or below and the freezer 0°F. or below? The only way to verify this is to use an appliance thermometer.

Are the contents of the refrigerator arranged so that cold air can circulate freely throughout? Are most perishable foods such as eggs, milk, meats, poultry, fish and other protein foods stored in the coldest areas of the refrigerator, never on the door? Eggs

should be stored in the original carton.

Are foods covered or wrapped securely? Bacteria in the air and from uncooked meats or their juices can settle and grow on foods.

Is the refrigerator reasonably clean? Bacteria from bits of food on shelves can contaminate other foods.

In the pantry, are foods stored in tightly closed containers and is the pantry area clean and preferably in a cool, dry, dark location? Foods that are stored in dampness, such as under the sink or close to heat, such as over the range, deteriorate much more rapidly.

Are cleaning supplies stored out of reach of children?

Are work surfaces, the skin, utensils and appli-

ances kept clean? Do you have separate cutting boards for raw meats and foods that are not to be cooked such as vegetables? Bacteria from juices of raw meat can collect in cutting

boards and contaminate other foods. Are these boards clean and do you sanitize them? Other appliances or equipment to check for cleanliness are the can opener, the blender and any others that can hold food particles in tiny cracks or crevices.

Is hand washing convenient and do you have paper towels to dry hands on? Cloth towels can harbor bacteria. They need to be washed frequently.

Is the oven reasonably clean and is there an oven thermometer to check for accurate oven temperatures?
