## Despair & Hope

*Phillips is 1st speaker of Institute spring lecture series*

David Phillips, a long time advocate for human rights, is the first speaker in the Institute for the Humanities at Salado spring lecture/seminar series **DESPAIR AND HOPE: CULTURAL AND ETHNIC SURVIVAL**. He will address the Institute on March 12-13.

Mr. Phillips is the president of the Congressional Human Rights Foundation (CHRF). The CHRF is a private organization in Washington, D.C., that was established to further the protection of human rights. This organization aims to strengthen democratic in-

stitutions around the world.

As president of the CHRF, Mr. Phillips has been involved in a variety of human rights activities from organizing human rights conferences in Russia and Slovenia to monitoring elections in Haiti and Yugoslavia. He has also served as a liaison between the CHRF and Congress, the White House, and various federal agencies.

He is the founder of both the International Institute on the Rule of Law and the worldwide Interparliamentary Human Rights Network. Mr. Phillips is also a

member of the board of several organizations including Interlegal Moscow, the International Rescue Committee and the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations.

Mr. Phillips will give a seminar 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. March 12 at the Inn on the Creek. The seminar will be on "Multilateralists and Promotions of Human Rights and Democracy."

Phillips will give a lecture 4 p.m. March 13 at the Mill Creek Dining Room. The lecture is "International Peacekeeping and the Breakdown of Diplomacy in Bosnia-Herzegovina."

# Aftermath of "The Joke"

The aftermath of the emotional so-called "joke" concerning an after hours night club on Main Street in Salado may have more far reaching results than imagined. Incorporation has been resurrected by an as-yet unorganized group of villagers who fear the coming of unwanted businesses to the community. perhaps through an invasion of out-of-towners who see a greedy future here with no respect or love for a quiet historic town.

"What about next time?" is the question used to secure support in a thrice failed movement to incorporate the required two square miles of what would probably take in the Main Street merchants and all of Mill Creek. The latter to secure enough ad valorem taxes and the former to protect through zoning and future detractors to the quality of what is now a bright tourist and residential area.

While it may be true that certain sales, motel and hotel taxes could feed the city coffers - these revenues would be a drop in the bucket when compared to what it takes to operate a full fledged city-even a small one, the size of Salado, should it approve articles of incorporation. It takes property taxes and plenty

of them to get a town rolling. One thing for sure - County officials would be happy to see Salado go its own way. That would give them our county taxes to spend someplace else and then turn around and contract back some of the heretofore free services for road

work and other amenities.

The move towards incorporation was shot down in flames at least three times according to several village watchers primarily because of the added tax burden and the worry about who would be elected Mayor and city-council-persons. This last problem is one faced by nearly all governmental entities since the electorate many times puts folks in office who lack the mental and emotional stability to operate a peanut stand much less a full blown city.

Time will certainly tell the tale on all this. Those who became worried and rightly upset over the ruse on Main Street are good citizens who want what is best for the village. The question then being - "Is incorporation at this time the 'right thing'?"

No doubt there will be a

gathering up of information and formal committees formed. Later a town hall meeting and no doubt the County Judge will happily call the election - perhaps as early as August as is currently rumored. Always a good idea to let democratic methods be followed on this or any community question - thus letting voters within the boundaries of the village - make the final decision, by ballot especially since it will be their pocket book that will be picked if a city is formed.

### Chamber Takes It On the Chin

The Salado Chamber of Commerce took a couple of uncalled for shots this past week. One accused the volunteer group of spending too much time, effort and money on old folks and merchants and not enough on the younger generation. The other knocked the recently held "Candidates Forum" sponsored by the chamber.

Both of these divisive blasts did little to encourage folks to freely give of their time and talents. What detractors need to do is get involved with the Chamber or other civic groups and help from the

## An IRA is an effective way to save for retirement

With last year's tax increases, finding new ways to defer or reduce current taxes is more valuable than ever. Many investors overlook perhaps the most convenient, cost-effective method: contributing systematically to an IRA.

By regularly contributing to an IRA, you can build a sizable nest egg for your retirement. There are several benefits to consider, including these:

- Tax deferral:** All contributions you make--whether you can deduct them or not-- grow without current taxes. Tax-deferral alone can save you hundreds of dollars each year. For example, \$10,000 earning 6 percent annually in an IRA means that you keep \$600 growing for your retirement. In a taxable account, at the 36 percent rate, you would keep only \$384 of that \$600 for yourself. Obviously, this is just an illustration, but with an IRA, you can watch your retirement savings grow, and you, rather than the IRS, can enjoy your retirement money.

- Investment Options:** generally, you can design your investment to meet your future needs and investment objectives. IRAs are self-directed, which means you choose how the money is invested -- in CDs, stocks, bonds or mutual funds, for example. For instance, if your principal, you may want to invest your IRA money in conservative vehicles, such as CDs or

U.S. Treasury bonds. But if you're willing to accept a higher degree of risk in hopes of greater return, you might want to consider corporate bonds, common stocks or mutual funds. Your investment broker can help you choose the investment alternatives that make sense for you.

Above all, remember that the purpose of an IRA is to assist you in saving money for your retirement. To encourage you to leave your account intact, certain limitations apply. In general, any withdrawals made before age 59-1/2 will be subject to a 10 percent IRS penalty. When you reach age 70-1/2, you must begin taking payments from your IRA, whether you are retired or still working. Once you start taking money out of your IRA, you will have to pay taxes on the amount withdrawn.

If you plan to start saving for retirement in 1994, keep in mind that an IRA may be the best way to help provide the life-style you want throughout your retirement years. And, keep in mind, that if you find your 1993 contributions will be tribute before April 15, 1994, can be deducted from your 1993 taxes.

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# Ruth Berry Brown remembers old time Salado

This is the second in a series of articles honoring Texas Women in History Month.

Ruth Berry Brown, a 94-year-old native of Salado, has been an important participant in the Main Street Salado Oral History Project.

With her phenomenal memory and her keen sense of recollection she has helped us to understand what it was like growing up in historic Salado during the first quarter of the 20th Century.

Ruth Berry Brown is charming, gracious, witty, positive, and just a wee bit flirtatious. During her interviews, Ruth was very careful not to "gossip" or speak negatively about anyone. In fact, she steered clear of any discussion of

scandal in early Salado.

Ruth Berry was born on December 23, 1899 in the old Wheaton House, now known as the Norwood House, on north Main Street. The Berrys later moved next door to the Barber House, then, in 1908 moved to the Halley House where the Berrys and Ruth's grandparents, the Blalocks, lived until the house was sold to the Paul Pirtle family in the late 1920's.

Ruth and Stephen Arthur Brown, a native of McMinnville, TN, married in 1919 and left Salado. When Stephen left for the battlefront in France, Ruth returned and stayed with her family until after his return and discharge from the army. Ruth and Stephen then moved to Houston and engaged in the

real estate business until 1957 when they returned to Salado. After her husband's death in 1973, Ruth moved to Temple, and then in 1993 she moved to Waco where she now resides near her daughter.

While living in Houston, Ruth Brown, a room mother at her daughter's school, met another room mother, Thelma Fletcher.

The Browns and the Fletchers became friends and it was through this friendship that the Fletchers learned about Salado and eventually decided to move here.

Ruth's father and her Grandfather Blalock were prominent business owners in Salado. They owned the general mercantile store that was located where the Royal Emporium is now located, a bank where Grace Jones' Dress

Shop is now located, a gin behind the bank and a lumber yard across the side street from the gin.

Ruth's Grandfather Berry also lived on north Main Street in the Berry-Vickrey house, recently owned by Don Legge. Berry built the carriage house in back of the house to store his hearse. Ruth recalls one of the few times she "got in trouble" was for hiding in the back of the hearse while playing hide-and-seek with her sister.

Ruth also recalls many games of hide-and-seek played on the second floor of her father's store where the caskets were stored. The boxes in which the caskets were shipped made perfect hiding places.

Items available in the store included groceries, clothing, saddles and other

tack, tools of all kinds, feed, seed, furniture, school supplies, buggies, and, yes, caskets. Supplies were shipped to Belton by train and then were transported to Salado by day and later by truck.

One item Ruth does not recall being sold in the store was fabric. In fact, Ruth refutes the rumors of bolts of gingham being found in the tree tops up and down Salado Creek following the flood of 1921. She states she never heard that story until recent years. She does recall, however, picking up shoes on the banks the creek after the flood.

The village of Salado was relatively self-sufficient during these years with two, three, and sometimes four doctors, three drug stores, two dry good stores, two or three grocery stores, a candy store, a barber shop, a blacksmith and wheel-wright, a lumber yard, a gin, a grist mill, a post office, and a hotel.

Life seemed easy and there were no "scandals" among the young people. Young children attended a three-room frame school building located on the site of the present parsonage of the First Baptist Church. Older children attended school "on the hill" in the building which housed Salado College, Thomas Arnold High School, and later Salado Public Schools. Ruth recalls that while she was a younger student on the hill, there was only one high school student in attendance.

The young children would run down to the creek, cross over the bridge, and run to the "big spring", where Sirena, the Mermaid now sits, to get drinks of water during recess.

Babies were delivered at home by the family doctor assisted by neighbor women. Ruth recalls watching the doctor arrive at a house in his buggy and enter the house carrying his black bag. Later it would become news that a new baby had arrived to live in the house. For years, Ruth and her sister believed that the doctor brought the baby in his black bag!

When a death occurred, Grandfather Berry might drive the hearse to the mercantile store, load a casket into it, then drive to the home of the deceased where

# Eagles up record, 3-0

In a make up game on March 3 the Eagles Baseball team won their second game of the young season against Granger. Salado started slowly, falling behind 1-0 after two and a half innings.

In the bottom of the third after an out was recorded the Eagle bats came alive and broke the game wide open. Jason Hosch started things with a double to left. After a walk Richard Berumen drove in a run with a single. A wild pitch scored another run; consecutive walks loaded the bases. An infield single by Jereme Hosch scored a run. Granger committed a few errors for four Salado runs. Billy Wilson contributed a two run double in the inning. Jason Hosch and Brandon McGregor also had rbi hits in the inning.

Granger was able to add single runs in the fourth and fifth innings. This was way too little though.

Salado finished their scoring in the fourth inning. Richard Jackson had a two run double for the scoring.

The final score was 15-3. The game was called in the fifth inning because of the 10 run rule. The Eagles were led offensively by Richard Berumen who was 2 for 2. Jason Hosch and Jereme Hosch also contributed two hits apiece.

Jereme Hosch pitched the first four innings and was credited with the win. He allowed 2 hits, struck out six and walked two. Shawn Easley pitched the last inning.

March 4, Salado upped

their record to 3-0 with a lopsided win over the Moody Bearcats. Things started terribly for the Eagles. After being shut-out in the top of the first, Salado pitcher Richard Jackson had trouble finding the strike zone and lasted only two-thirds of an inning. Five walks and four Salado errors led to a 6-0 lead for Moody.

Shawn Easley came on in relief of Jackson and shut the Bearcats out for 3-1/3 innings. This allowed the Salado bats to get untracked and put the Eagles back in the game.

Salado scored one run in the second inning and took the lead with six runs in the third. Chris Jackson got the Eagles going with a tremendous blast over the left field fence to lead off the third. Then it was the Eagles turn to receive some free passes. Five walks, a Moody error and a Jereme Hosch single accounted for the other five Salado runs.

The Eagles then pulled away over the last four innings. They scored three in the fourth, six in the fifth and six more in the seventh. Most of the runs were due to the wildness of the Moody pitcher but there were several timely hits by various Eagles batters.

Moody was able to score three runs in the fifth inning due to a couple of Salado errors. The final score was 22-9.

Easley picked up the victory for Salado. He did not allow a hit over three innings and struck out three. Freshman Chris Frazier pitched the final three in-

nings and did an outstanding job. He struck-out six and walked only one.

Richard Berumen led the Eagles at the plate. He was 3 of 4 with 3 rbi's. Jason Hosch, Chris Jackson and Chris Frazier all added two hits apiece.

The J.V. team also improved to 3-0 on the season in an exiting 4-1 victory over Moody. David Berumen, Eric Lopez, and Josh Goodnight earned the only hits for Salado, but all were big. Berumen had two rbi's, Eric Lopez drove in a run and Jason Goodnight hit a homerun. Goodnight also earned the victory on the mound, striking out nine in four innings.

The Eagles next games will be March 10-11 as they host the Salado Tournament. The first game will be at 4 p.m. each day.

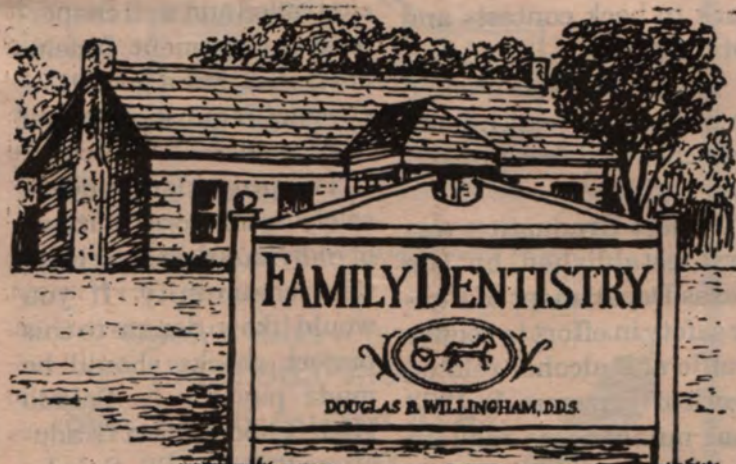

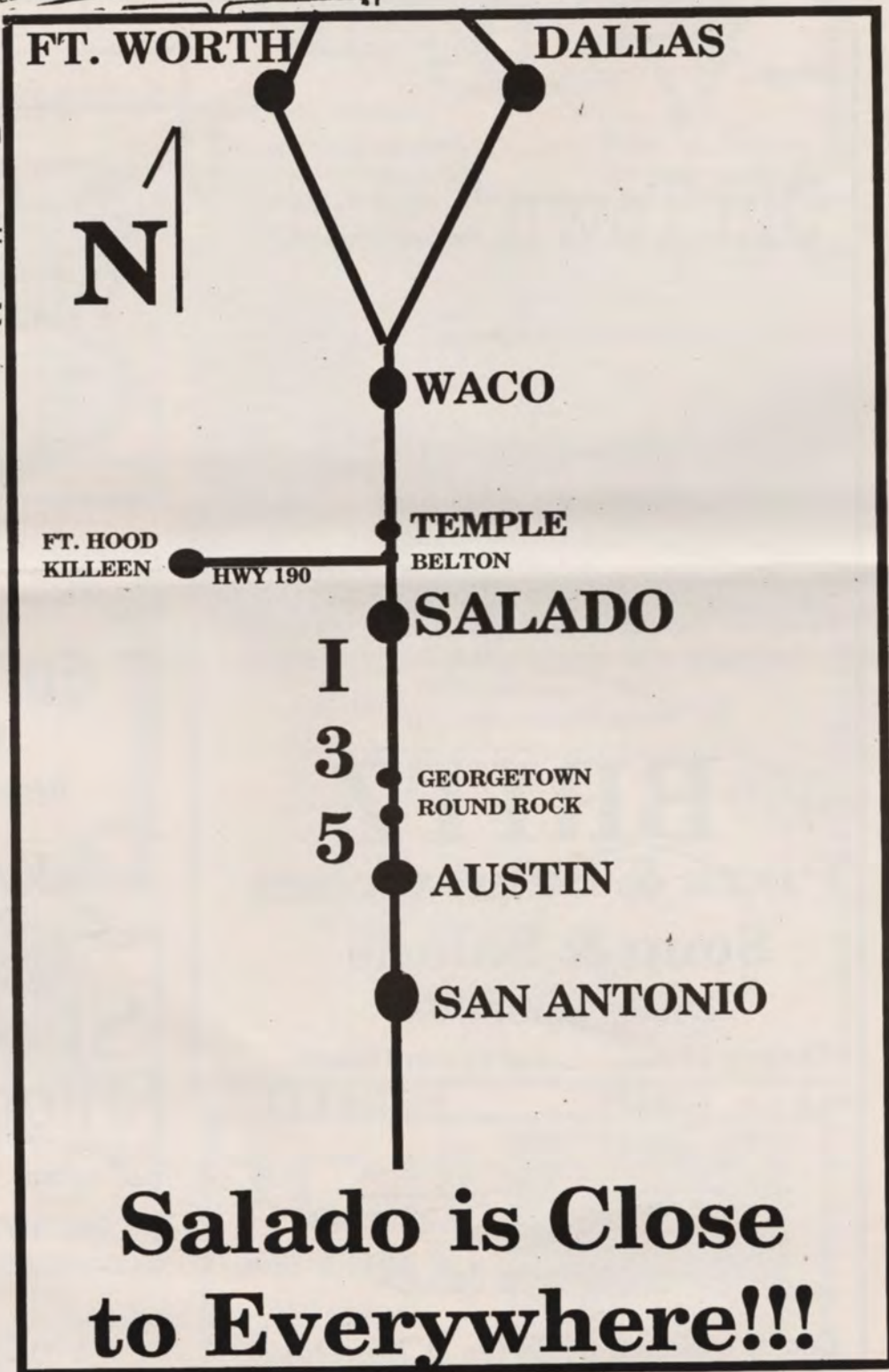

## Clapp is head coach at Paris High School

David Clapp, son of Ken and Melba Clapp of Salado was named Athletic Director and head football coach at Paris High School on March 1.

He was selected from a field of 57 candidates by the school trustees in a unanimous vote.

Clapp has been with the Paris school system for the past 12 years, the last two of which as assistant high school principal. The previous 10 years he served as teacher and first assistant varsity coach including the 1988 season that saw the

Paris Wildcats win the district 4-A state championship.

The new athletic director graduated from Killeen High School in 1967 where he lettered in football and baseball. He attended Texas Christian University on a full athletic scholarship graduating in 1971 and has been in the teaching profession for the past 23 years. Clapp is married to the former Becky Dellis, also a 1967 Killeen High graduate. She is an elementary school principal in the Paris school system.

the body would be placed in the casket after having been "laid out" by family and neighbors. The body would be kept in the home until time for the burial. Funeral services would be conducted in the home or in the cemetery.

Ruth remembers that climate conditions were different back then. Winter brought lots of snow and prolonged rains in spring and fall resulted in flooding with much erosion. She recalls seeing wagons being drawn up and down Main Street with mud reaching to the hubs of the wagon wheels.

The Salado Bath House, a hexagon-shaped building owned by Dr. Randolph, located on what is now known as the Village Green, drew folks from miles around to take the "baths".

A hot mineral spring bubbled up from the ground where the Stagecoach Lake is now located. People coming to use the bath house stayed at the hotel next door, now known as the Stagecoach Inn.

There were some in the village who wished to promote the baths as an industry to attract more people, saying, "We can become another Marlin." The opposition would respond, "Marlin? Marlin? Who wants to be another Marlin?" Marlin, a town located in nearby Falls County, had its beginning because of mineral wells and bath houses.

The Salado Bath House washed away in the terrible flood of '21. In fact, folks claim the bath house was the cause of the iron bridge washing away. The bath house hit the bridge

with tremendous force and the bridge then broke loose and was washed away. This happening was witnessed by Earl and Ballard Guest.

The hotel, now known as Stagecoach Inn, was known by various names in the past, and usually bore the name of the current owner at the time. It was a free-standing white frame two-story building with a long front porch. The kitchen and dining room were in separate buildings and the livery stable was located behind the hotel. Ruth remembers walking with girl friends to the hotel and standing or sitting on the porch watching people and activities up and down the street. This was a favorite pastime of Saladoans. The post office was located in a store just north of the hotel, so there was lots of traffic in the vicinity.

A favorite trysting for young people was Salado Park, an area on the south bank of Salado Creek from the bridge extending to Tablerock. Walking in the park, visiting, games, and picnics were popular with the young people even though such activities were always chaperoned by mothers.

The Peach Tree is another of Ruth's vivid memories. It was just an ordinary peach tree but was very large and was very beautiful in the springtime. It was growing on a vacant lot between the Grange Building (now Central Texas Area Museum) and a row of businesses to the north, and right across from the hotel. It was a sort of community tree and people from all over town would walk down to the tree and help themselves to a fresh, juicy peach.

In the 1930's Salado became a virtual ghost town and remained so until the 1960's. The Van Bibbers purchased the hotel and popularized the dining room. The De Grummonds bought the McKie House. And a visionary named Mack Sherrill, who people called "crazy", bought the Caldwell farm for \$260.00 an acre and started the Mill Creek Development. Ruth was an investor in this project and helped in the sales of building sites.

And, then, like Topsy, Salado "just grewed".
