Peaceable Kingdom Retreat open for ill children

"Yes, dear."

Two words which, repeated over and over, has brought the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat for Children from a day-long fishing camp to a beautiful retreat for critically ill children near the banks of the Lampasas River.

"At first, we would take groups of children from the hospital to what we thought was the best fishing hole in the County," Jim Bowmer told the Salado Lions Club gathered for a luncheon meeting at the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat.

"One day Daurice told me we should build something simple for overnight camping stays. 'Yes dear,' I said. 'It will need a foundation.' 'yes, dear.' 'And protection from the weather.' 'Yes dear.' A thousand, 'yes dears' later we have the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat," Bowmer said.

While the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat sits on 120 or so acres of property from the Bowmer Ranch, he deflects credit for the project.

"Those who deserve the real credit for the Retreat are the individuals and businesses which donate so freely to us. We are completely supported by dona-

tions," Bowmer said.

Bowmer said the goal for Peaceable Kingdom was not to look or feel like a hospital or a camp, "but like home."

In addition to housing for the children, the Retreat features a swimming pool, nature trails, a restored log cabin and gazebos looking over the valley.

Peaceable Kingdom Retreat provides the facilities while Scott & White hospital provides the required nurses and other staff for the children.

"We are open for use by any hospital, but Scott & White is the only hospital so far to use our facilities," Bowmer said.

During the summer, the Retreat is used full-time with several retreats. During the retreats, the family is able to join the children during the day, while the children stay overnight.

The Retreat also serves the siblings of critically ill children. "We have a special time for them, as well," Bowmer said, "without their brothers or sisters or parents."

"Daurice and I lay awake at night talking about what we can do next for the camp. Last night, she said we needed something simple for overnight camping," Bowmer said.

"Yes dear."

The old fashioned political barbecue, round-up and rally season got off to an early start last week at the Goodnight Ranch out near Stillhouse Hollow Lake. Nearly 300 top-of-the-line Democrats and their guests gathered to meet Senator Bill Sims, eat, talk politics and in general have a great time, thanks to hosts Gene and Jackie Goodnight. The gathering was pure politics with special emphasis on beating Hugh Shine, the Republican from Temple who is running against Sims for the state Senate slot in District 26.

Bell County, you will recall, was kicked around several years back when the most outlandish gerrymandering yet devised threw this county in with San Antonio. This was a GOP move to give the right wingers more clout in the upper state house. It worked for a time as Jeff Wentworth (R-San Antonio) was elected. Wentworth was alleged to have had a big hand in the crazy quilt boundaries. A federal judge with GOP leanings helped take Bell County away from Temple Dickson, a Democrat from Sweetwater and force him into a confrontation with

Sims (D-San Angelo). Sims won the battle and shortly thereafter the redistricting came before the U.S. Supreme Court on appeal. Those learned folks took one look at what the judge did in Texas and threw the screwed up mess out the window - telling Texas to return to the Legislatively drawn lines. They also gave the federal judge a swift

kick for his part in the skullduggery and once again Bell was back where it belonged. Wentworth will finish his representation of Bell County in Dec. 31, 1994 and the winner of the Sims-Shine dog-fight will take over the next day.

Getting back to the Goodnight shindig, it was like a scene from the pre-McGovern Days of 1972, to see so many Bell County moderate-to-conservative Democrats all in one place. These, for the most part, were supporters of Governor Dolph Briscoe and before him, Preston Smith and Ben Barnes.

When Briscoe deep-sixed the Smith and Barnes juggernauts, Bell County

Demos joined with Briscoe first-teamers and helped the Uvalde rancher-banker beat Sissy Farenthold in the -72 runoff primary and later hold off the strong GOP attempt by Houstonian Hank Grover. Briscoe is remembered to this day as this state's last moderate-conservative Democratic Governor.

Those were the days when Democrats ran Bell County politics as they did in most other Texas counties. They were strong conservatives and had a big hand in keeping the Texas GOP from growing. All that came to a screeching halt when George McGovern entered the national scene along with his liberal "McGovern Rules" that tore the moderate heart out of the Democratic Party. Leading Demos silently, for the most part, folded their tents and became independent leaning

GOPers. From that point on the two party system in Texas was in full bloom. You will also remember that when liberal John Hill defeated Briscoe in 1978, it was Republican Bill Clements who sent Hill packing- thanks in large measure to the Briscoe

Foundation says dedication soon for College Hill

It was over 20 years ago when the charitable and educational ROBERTSON COLONY - SALADO COLLEGE FOUNDATION was founded to promote the Robertson Colony throughout Texas, and to preserve the ruins of Salado College and College Hill.

A life-size bronze statue of Col. E.S.C. Robertson, who donated the land for Salado College and for the town of Salado, will be formally dedicated soon.

A Robertson wrote the Texas Declaration of Independence; and a Robertson helped write the Constitution of Texas, etc. Washington on the Brazos is part of the Robertson Colony; as is the entire area.

The original founders of the Foundation were: Alice Sneed Robertson West of Houston, who was born on the Robertson Homestead in Salado; Judge Byron G. Skelton, of Salado and Temple, first president; Attorney Jim Bowmer of Temple, 2nd president; Attorney Kenneth H. Burns, of Houston, first vice president; and Mrs. Sterling C. Robertson, first secretary-treasurer.

The original founding Trustees of the Foundation, in addition to the aforesaid, were: Mrs. Lucile Robertson Ambrose of Salado and Nashville, Tennessee; Mrs. Liz Carpenter of Austin, who was also born on the Robertson Homestead in Salado; Hon. R.D. Chanslor, of Killeen; Attorney Davis Grant of Austin;

Mrs. E.P. Haltom of Waco; Attorney Sterling C. Robertson of Salado and Dallas; Judge W.A. Messer, of Belton; Judge Harold Harris of Temple and Judge Paine L. Bush of Belton and Dallas. Present County judge John Garth is also a long-time member of the board.

The foundation has made great progress to achieve the Foundation's charitable, educational, and historical goals and to benefit the Salado area and Texas. At a recent meeting of the Foundation, Jim Bowmer chose to step down as president, and the gavel was passed to Houston attorney and vice president Kenneth H. Burns, as the new president. Mr. Bowmer was elected President-Emeritus. Mrs. Sterling C. (Lucile) Robertson, of Salado, was elected Honorary Chairman of the Board and was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer. Mrs. Lucile Robertson Ambrose of Salado and Nashville Tennessee was elected vice-president.

Funds for the statue of Colonel E.S.C. Robertson were furnished by Alice Sneed West Foundation, of which Mr. Burns is president. Mrs. West was a descendant of Colonel Robertson.

The Foundation will announce plans shortly for the formal dedication of the statue by Texas sculptor Clay Dahlberg of Hunt, Texas; and the entrance and other recent improvements and restorations.

Fair Boosters hold appreciation dinner as final activity

The Salado Youth Fair Booster Club had its final activity for the 1993-94 year with an Appreciation and Recognition Dinner March 26 in the Salado cafetorium with approximately 200 guest attending.

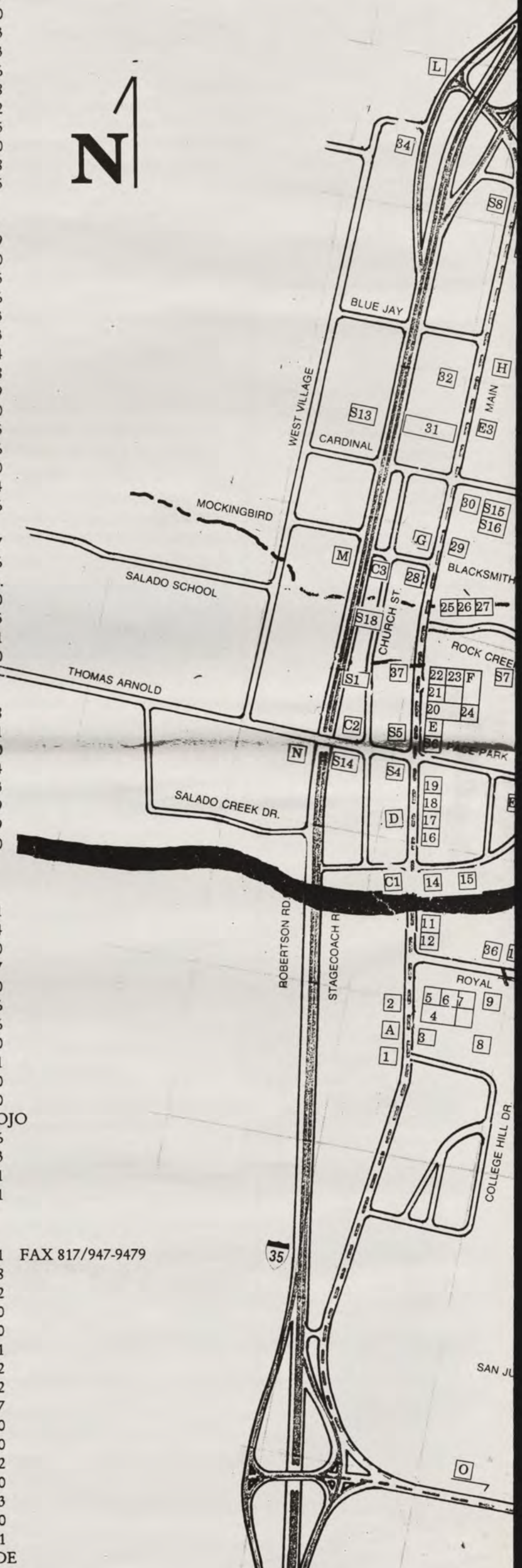

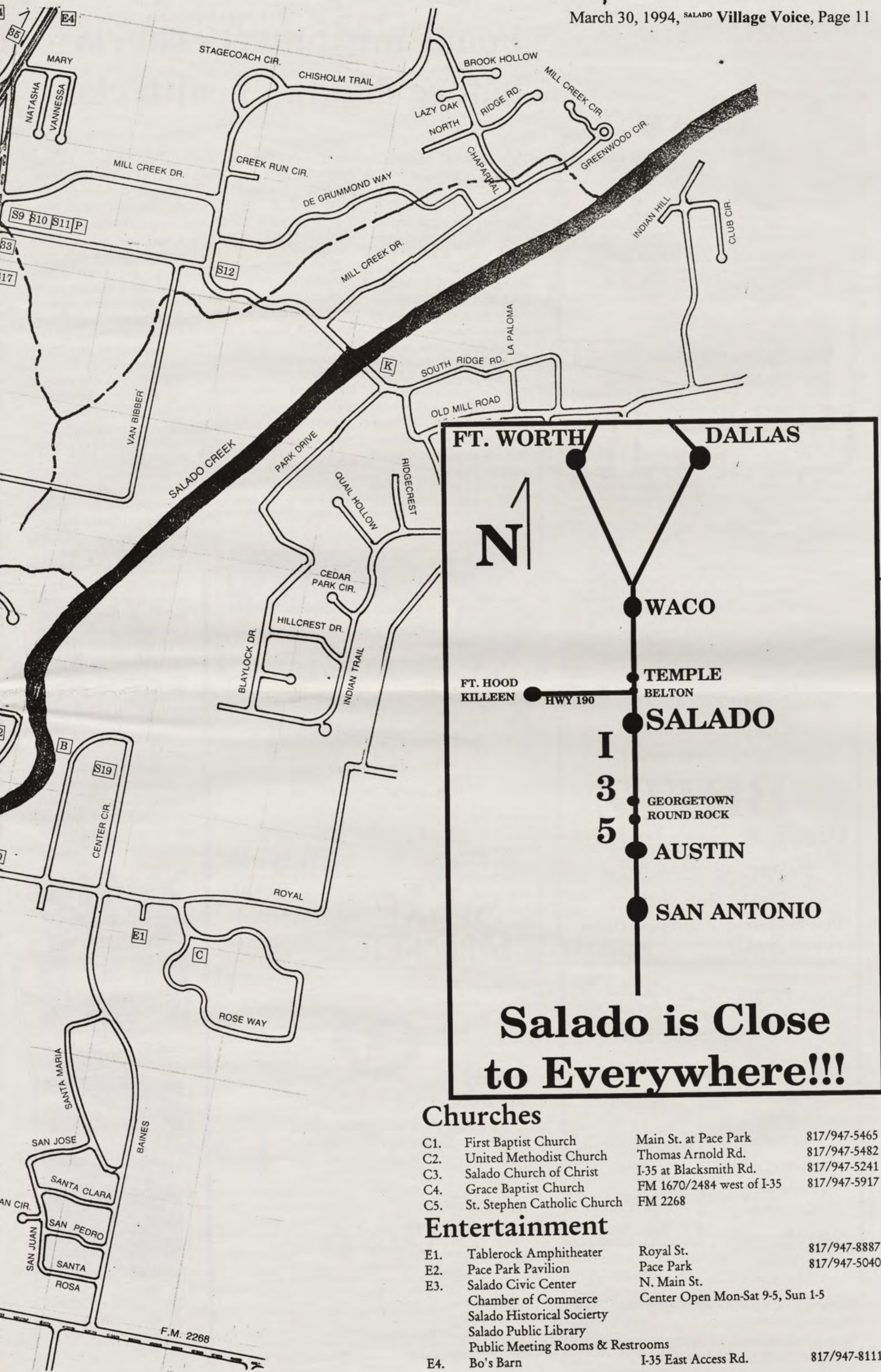

Foods must meet criteria before making health claim

A health claim is any claim on the food label that describes a relationship between a food or food component and a disease or health-related condition. To make a health claim, a food must meet specific nutrient levels that are set by the government.

A health claim is only allowed if it is approved for regulation. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has authorized health claims for seven diet and health relationships that are supported by sound science. Foods that qualify may make more than one of these health claims. The seven areas in which health

claims are allowed are the following:

Calcium and Osteoporosis

Fiber-containing grain products, fruits, vegetables and cancer

Fruits and vegetables and cancer

Fruits, vegetables and grain products that contain fiber and coronary heart disease

Fat and cancer

Saturated fat and cholesterol and coronary heart-disease

Sodium and hypertension

Diet is only one of the factors that can reduce the risk of certain diseases. The relationship between diet and disease is complex and

must be viewed in the context of an overall life-style.

A food must satisfy three nutrient criteria categories to qualify for a health claim.

A food must not exceed set nutrient levels to qualify for a health claim. A food must meet specific nutrient requirements for each of the seven health claims. A food must contain at least 10 percent of the Daily Value per Reference Amount of one or more of the following nutrients: protein, dietary fiber, vitamin A, vitamin C, calcium or iron, prior to any nutrient addition.

Manufacturers may use a model health claim provided by the government or choose similar wording so the claim is complete, truthful and not misleading. These new labeling regulations mean that consumers can now trust health claims made by manufacturers.

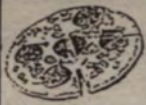

The Story... Daylight Savings Time

After considerable urging by supporters of a daylight savings plan, the United States Congress passed a bill in 1917 to authorize moving clocks ahead one hour between the last Sunday in March and the last Sunday in October. Because farmers strongly objected to this readjustment of their work schedules, the bill was repealed in August 1919. Interest in the system regained popularity after 1945, and 36 states had some sort of daylight savings plan by 1946. To avoid confusion, Congress passed the Uniform Time Act in an effort to get all states on daylight savings time. And the rest is history!

Did You Know...

Easter is a day of rejoicing for Christians. It honors the day on which Christ rose from the grave. Easter falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25. The early Christians determined this date from the Jewish calendar.

Before the time of Christ, some people worshiped gods and goddesses. One goddess was the Goddess of Spring, named Easte. Since Easter comes in the spring, we have named it for this goddess.

We celebrate Easter with brightly colored eggs because eggs represent a birth or beginning. Early Christians celebrated Easter as the New Year, and they often gave gifts, had a feast and wore new clothes during this holiday.

Facts About The World Around Us: The Sea

- Almost three-fourths of the earth's surface is covered by sea. Beneath the water there are mountains, valleys and plains much like those on dry land.
- A sloping underwater platform called a continental shelf runs around each of the great continents. The shallow water on this shelf is home to a wide variety of plants and animals.
- Every wave in the ocean is made up of tiny water particles moving in a circle. The wind pushes the wave upward, and then gravity pulls it down again. The ocean tides are caused by the moon's gravity tugging at the earth and its seas. Every 24 hours there are two high tides and two low tides. When the gravitational pull of the sun and the moon join, there is a much higher tide called a spring tide.

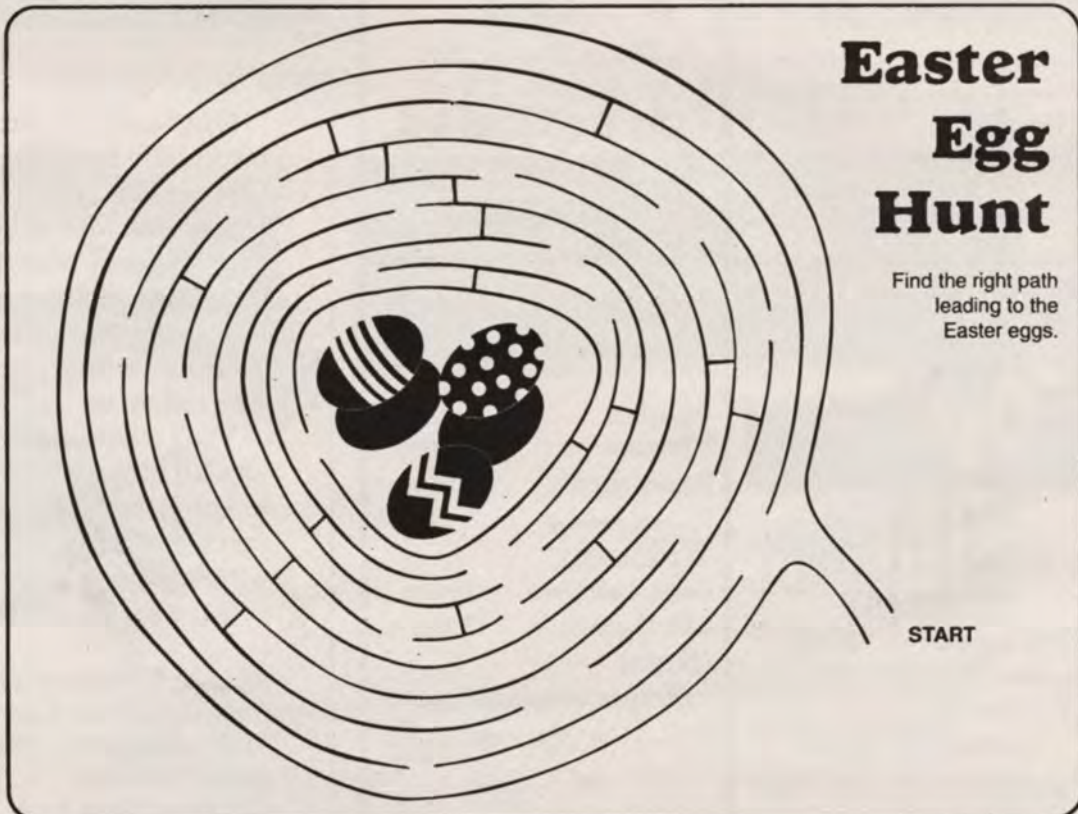

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Rules change for long distance dialing

As of April 1, 1994, phone users in the 817 area code must now dial the area code when placing long-distance calls within the 817 area. The new dialing scheme, known as 10-digit dialing, requires callers to dial "1+817" or "0+817" and the seven-digit telephone number to complete a long-distance call within the 817 area.

Sprint/United Telephone, along with all other phone companies providing

local phone service in the 817 area code have adhered to the dialing change mandated by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The majority of telephone customers in Texas already use the 10-digit dialing scheme and the entire nation will use 10-digit dialing by January 1995.

Customers were first notified of the impending dialing change in September 1993, when a six-month "grace periods" was announced beginning in October. Customers had until March 30, 1994, to adjust to the dialing change which became mandatory April 1. Now, anyone not dialing "1+" or "0+" followed by the area code when placing a long-distance call to the 817 area will receive a recording instructing them to dial the call again using the area code.

The change will allow

local phone companies the opportunity to create new phone numbers by adding more prefixes or area codes. "A shortage of available telephone numbers has prompted the dialing change," said Bruce Vasbinder, public relations administrator for Sprint/Centel-Texas. "Advances in technology, the extensive use of fax machines, computers and cellular phones along with the population growth has nearly exhausted the supply of phone numbers. At the current growth rate phone companies will be out phone numbers by the year 2010."

The 10-digit dialing plan will create 640 new possible area code combinations and ultimately provide 5.1 billion phone numbers nationwide.

The change in long-distance dialing will not affect local calls or rates.
