## Dr. Feld is final speaker of Institute lecture series

The final speaker in the Institute for the Humanities' spring seminar and lecture series "Despair and Hope: Cultural and Ethnic Survival" will be anthropologist Dr. Steven Feld. On April 23 and 24 Dr. Feld will speak on the environment and people of the Papua New Guinea rain forest.

"The Poetics and Politics of Survival" is the topic of Dr. Feld's seminar on 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. April 23 at the Allen Meeting Hall behind the Inn at Salado.

Dr. Feld will give a lecture 4 p.m. April 24 on "Voices of the Rain Forest" at the Mill Creek Dining Room. The lecture will be followed by a discussion session and buffet dinner.

Dr. Steven Feld is an an-

thropologist who has spent fifteen years trying to capture the interaction of the Kaluli people of the Papua New Guinea rain forest with their environment. In his study of the relation of music and mythology to the environment, he has recorded everything from the sounds of frogs and crickets to a woman singing a duet with a waterfall.

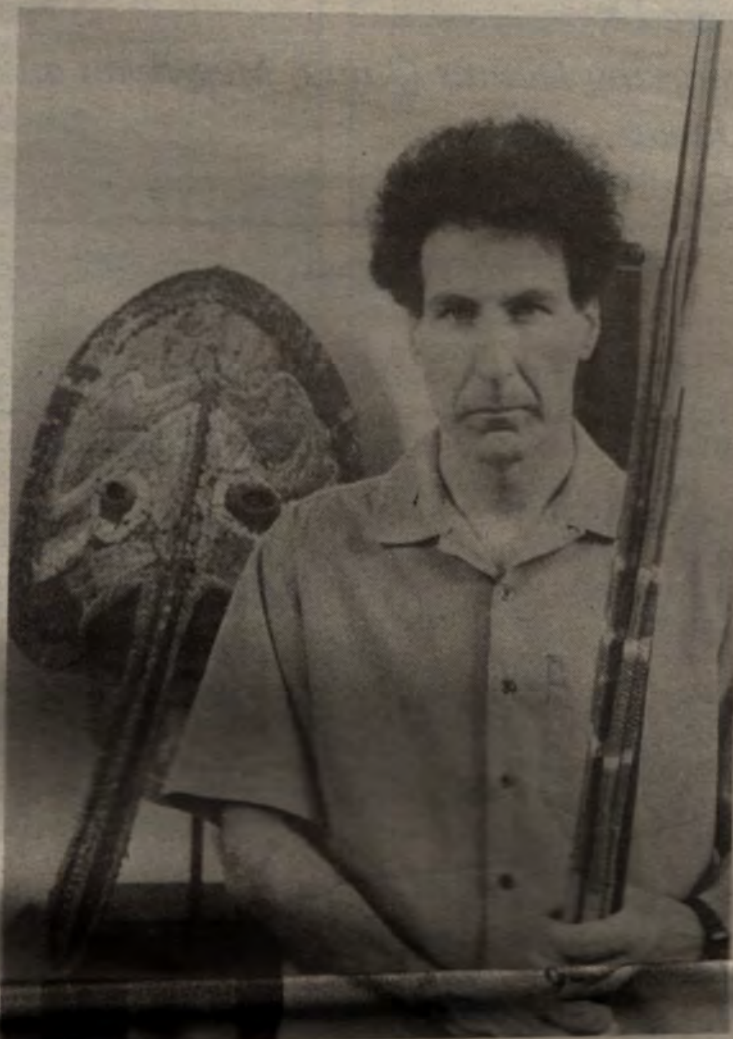
Dr. Feld earned his doctorate in anthropology and linguistics from Indiana University. Since 1985 he has been teaching anthropology and music at The University of Texas (UT), Austin. He is also the director of UT's Center for Intercultural Studies in Folklore and Ethnomusicology.

In 1990 Dr. Feld collabo-

rated with Grateful Dead drummer Mickey Hart to make an hour-long recording of songs and sounds called "Voices of the Rain Forest." His research and recordings have also been produced as radio programs by National Public Radio.

Dr. Feld is the author of several books including *Sound and Sentiment: Birds, Weeping, Poetics, and Song in Kaluli Expression*, which won the 1991 J.I. Staley Award for outstanding books of anthropology.

Flesh and Bone is a stylish, dark thriller set in rural Texas. It has much the same style and look as **In Cold Blood**, the movie based upon Truman Capote's novel.

Dennis Quaid turns in his best performance since **Great Balls of Fire**, as Arlis Sweeney, small-time game operator who travels from town to town. It is easy to see in Sweeney's face that he is running from a tortured past, one which he wants to forget.

That past comes to the forefront when Kay (Ryan) literally "pops" into his life. When she pops out of a bachelor party cake into Arlis' arms and life, Arlis' past snowballs on him.

James Caan turns in an eerie performance as Sweeney's father, a thug who turns up only to renew the wounds of Arlis' tortured past.

All three key actors turn in great performances. But be forewarned, **Flesh and Bone** is no fairy tale.

## Youth Association announces fundraising plan for 94

Heavy equipment started recently on the land of the Salado Youth Association. This organization was formed to purchase 21 acres on Salado Park Road just off Rose Way. The land will be used for additional baseball and soccer fields, tennis courts, basketball courts, a swimming pool, walking paths and exercise and aerobic rooms.

The SYA was organized a year ago with board members Tom Berrier, Randy Blodgett, Ed Buchanan, Steven Ervin, Glenn Hodge, Darlene Kirk, Floyd Lee, Larry McGregor, Billy Pipes, Rick Preston, Stewart Smith and Mike Tubbs. Six of these individuals will be leaving the board this April. The annual meeting of this organization and its members will be April 27, 1994 in the school cafeteria at 8:00 P.M. All parents with children are especially invited to attend this very important meeting.

Last year this organization sold memberships and had several fund raisers/auctions to pay for the 21 acres of land. July 9, 1994 will be the next major auction to help retire the debt owed on the land. The board members of this organiza-

tion have tickets to sell. Please contact a member and purchase your tax deductible donation (ticket) for \$100.00. Cash prizes will again range from \$25 to \$5,000 the night of the auction.

The purpose of this tax exempt organization is to provide facilities in Salado for the youth but eventually for adults. Current SYA members will be asked to renew their memberships for another year at this annual meeting.

Since the beginning one year ago the SYA has raised \$31,122.23. Expenses for the organization including the partial payment of the land total \$25,842.27. The organization currently has in the bank \$6,437.29 which will help pay for the auction and the additional land purchase.

"We need the help of everyone in Salado to make this dream come true," said SYA director Steven Ervin. "Our single largest expense this last year was a payment of \$21,300 toward the land purchase."

IRS Financial Data will be available at the annual meeting. The next payment the land is due October 13. To pay off the note, the group needs \$37,000.

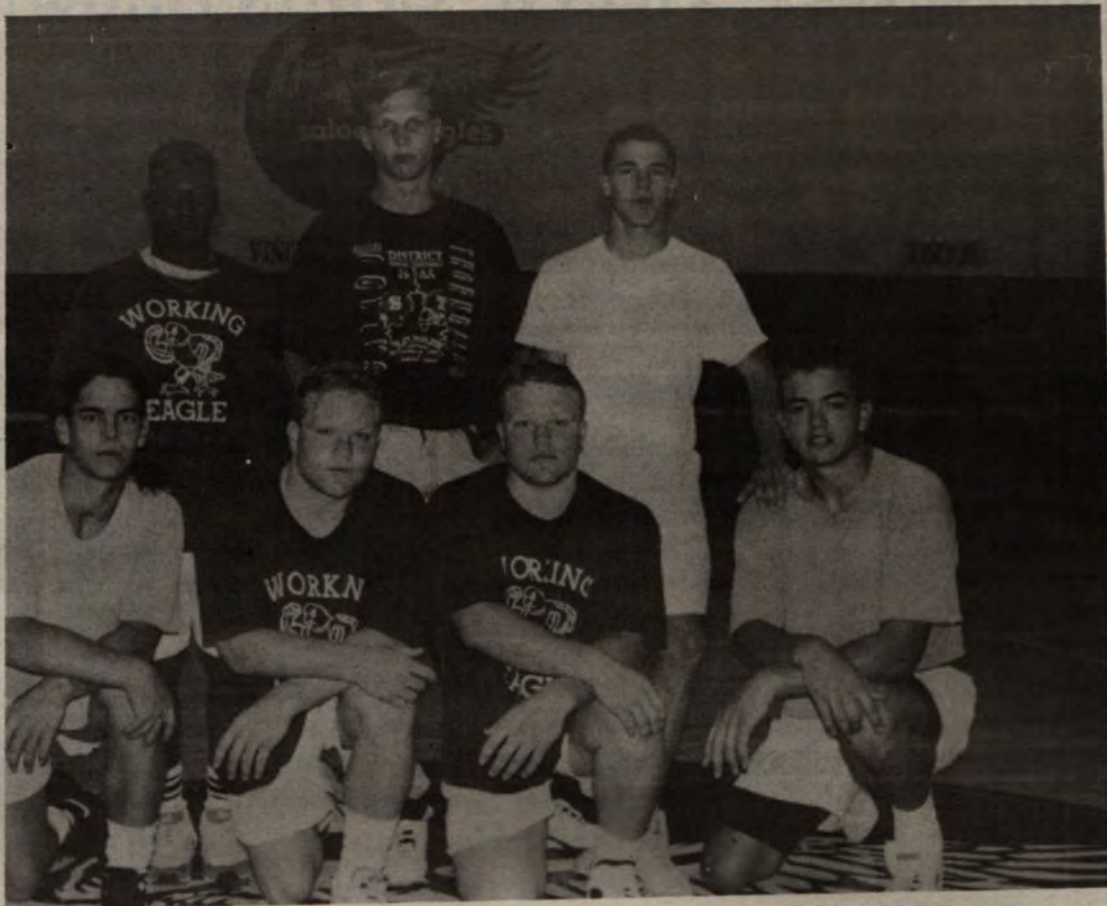

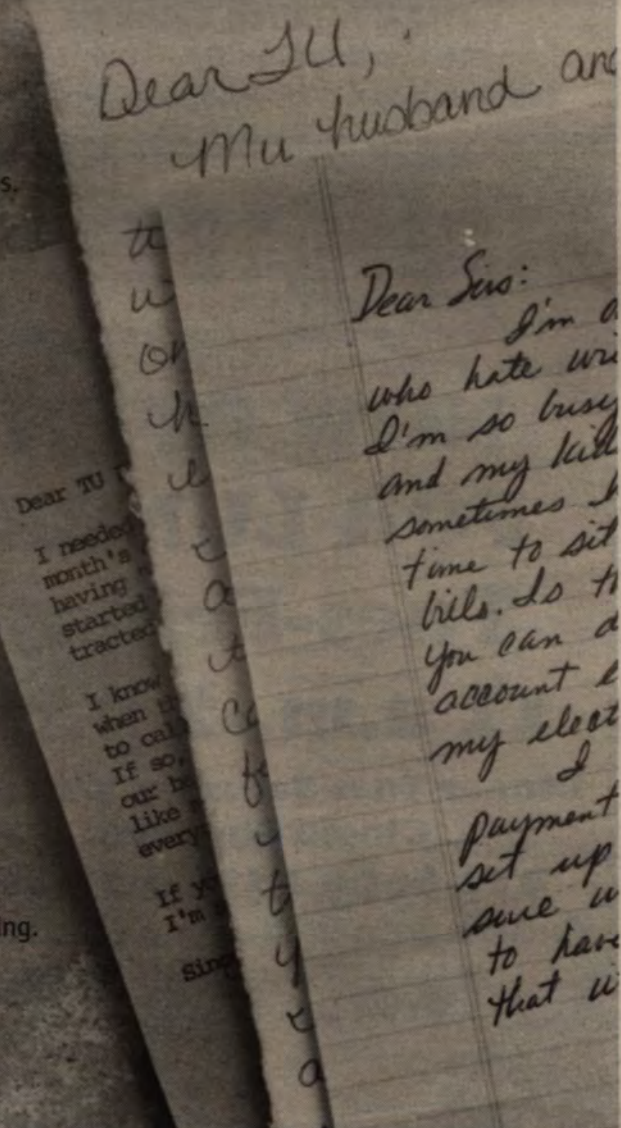

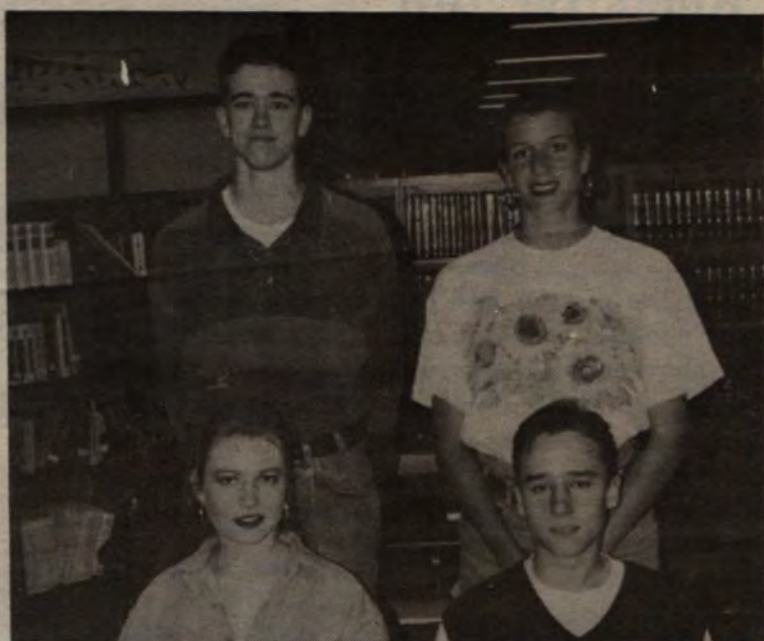


# SHS 1-act play named alternate

## What to do with your maturing annuity?

If you have an annuity that is going to mature soon, you have a lot to think about. Since the time you decided that an annuity was the best place for your money, some important factors have changed. Interest rates have fallen to levels not seen in 15 years. The insurance industry has experienced unprecedented changes. Your financial goals may have changed, too.

Now that your annuity is about to mature, you should contact the current issuer and fully consider the options available from the current issuer as well as other choices. For instance, to meet your changing needs, you may find the most appropriate move is to transfer to another issuer or liquidate the annuity altogether. Consider the following when making your decision.

### Evaluate your Financial Goals

Ask yourself if your needs have changed since you bought the annuity. Is your tax situation still the same, or is tax control more or less important to you now? Are you more or less concerned with the safety of principal or is growth now more important? If your current annuity still meets your objectives, you may want to renew it as is. If your financial situation has changed

dramatically, you may decide instead to find another issuer or another investment that better suits your needs.

### Consider the Age of the Annuitant

Annuity issuers have age limitations for renewing existing annuity contracts and establishing new ones. If your age exceeds these limits, or options may be restricted. In general, issuers set the maximum age range for an annuitant between 75 and 80. Check with the issuer of your annuity contract for its maximum age limit.

### Determine how much time you have to make your decision

Review your annuity contract for its specific surrender charge schedule or maturing window (the time period when you are free to exchange your liquidate without contract penalties), or call the issuer and ask for this information.

Some issuers contracts provide only one day for the owner to decide what to do with the matured contract. Others allow decision periods extending from 30 to 60 days.

You should set a deadline to make a decision in time to complete the necessary paperwork and transfers. If you miss the deadline specified in the contract, the contract may be automatically renewed depending on the specific company's provisions.

### Do you Want Access to the Money Now?

If you want access to any portion of the money in the annuity, you have several options available to you. Each option has its own tax consequences. Your tax advisor can provide you with a full explanation of your options.

If you want completely unrestricted access to your funds, liquidation of the existing annuity contracts may be your best option. Before making this decision, consider alternatives such as systematic withdrawals or partial withdrawals so the remaining account balance can continue to grow tax-deferred. Withdrawals before age 59-1/2 may be subject to a 10 percent IRS penalty as well as applicable surrender charges. These guidelines are, at best, a starting place for you to evaluate how to handle your maturing annuity. If you're uncertain how to proceed or have questions about your options, you should consult with your investment or tax advisors.

## Mentoring program begins

Mentoring can be an important tool in the effort to raise self-esteem, increase academic achievement, foster good work habits and explore career options. The match between a student in need and one caring person who wants to fill that need, can prove beneficial for all.

Students experience improved morale, better student-teacher relations, increased school attendance, decrease in discipline problems, improved coping skills and many more advantages. 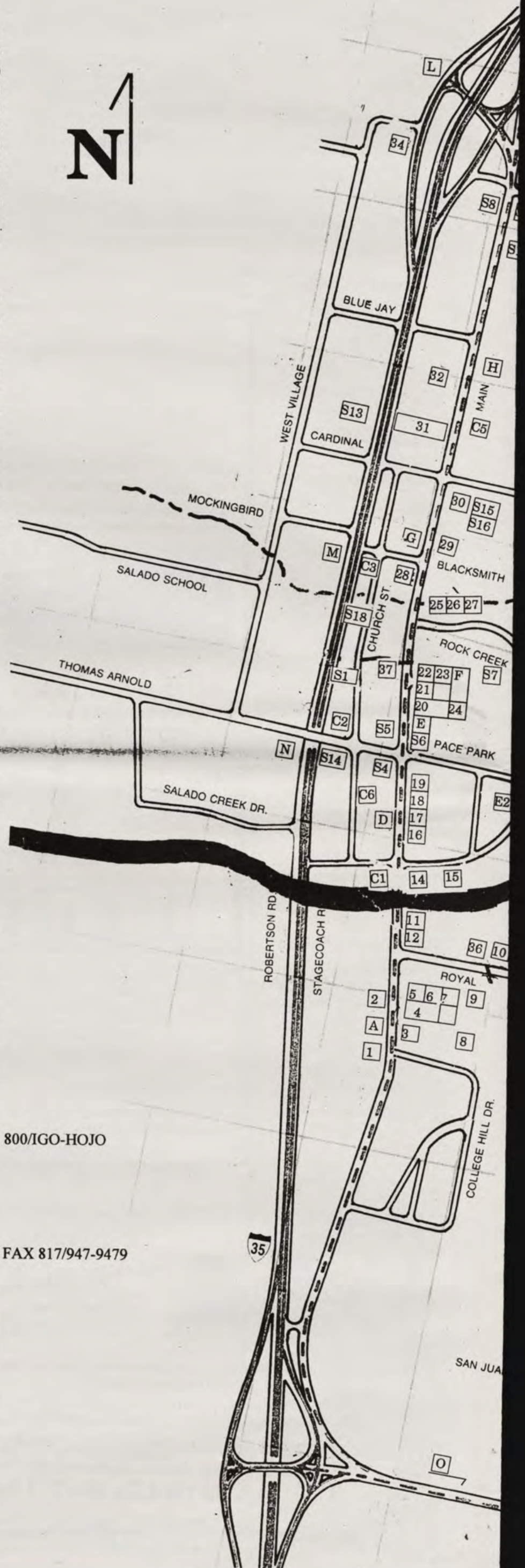

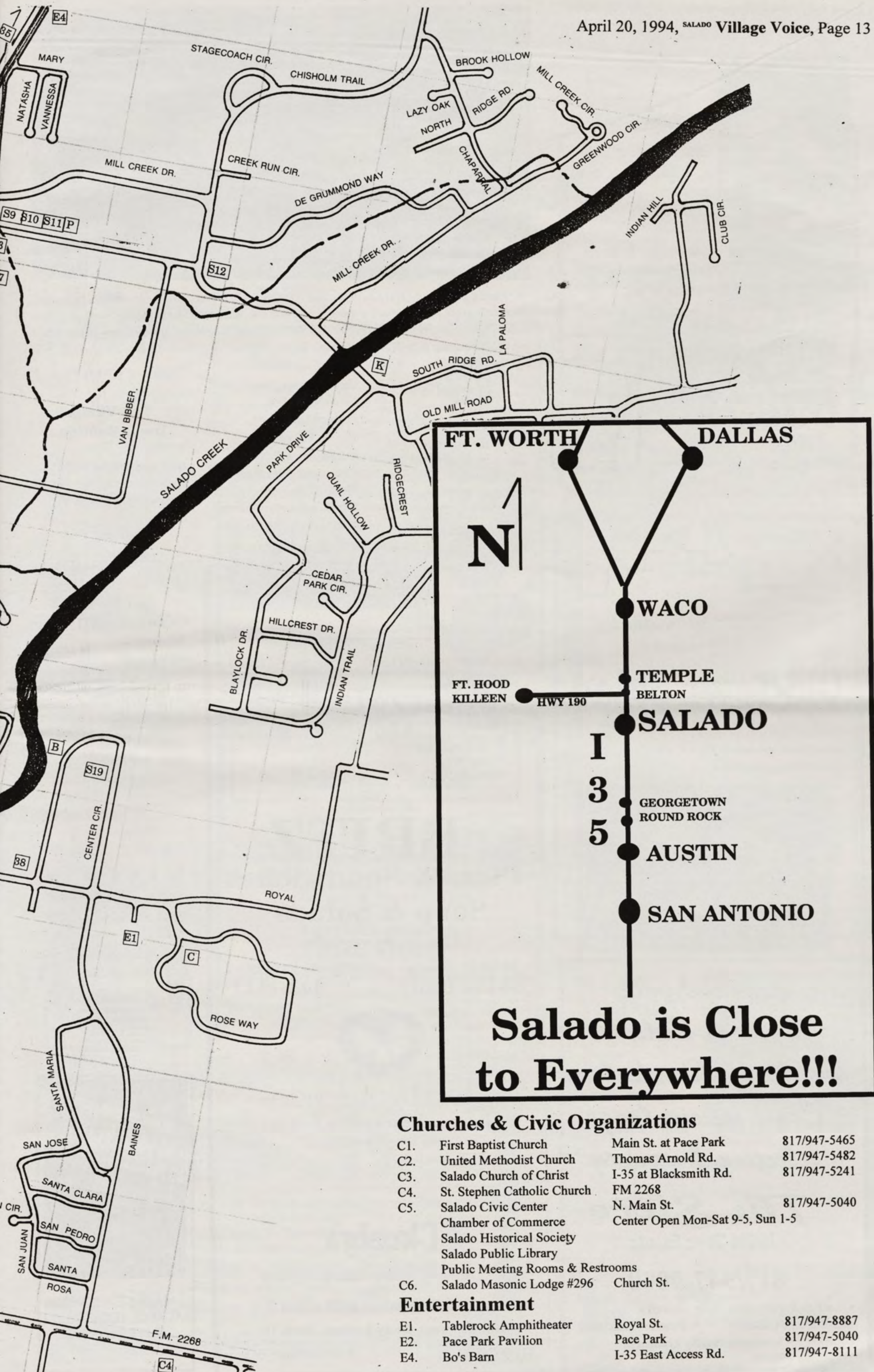

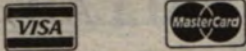

### Below Knee And Above Eye Level Good Rule Of Thumb In Spring Cleaning

(NU)—Spring cleaning should include areas that may be missed during regular day-to-day cleaning activities.

These areas include ceiling light fixtures, draperies, the tops of door and window frames, and underneath furniture, according to ServiceMaster, a recognized leader in heavy-duty residential and commercial cleaning services.

Dr. William Bond, vice president for Technical Development for ServiceMaster, advises that "a good rule of thumb for front-line cleaning troops is to concentrate on cleaning everything that's below knee level and above eye level, as those areas are more likely to get missed during regular cleaning."

Aside from cleaning areas that may typically be overlooked, a good, once-a-year cleaning in the spring is necessary to remove the mold and mildew that tend to build up during cooler winter months. Closed-up, heated homes cause musty odors within a home and add to problems many people have with allergies.

Below eye level, ServiceMaster urges homeowners to vacuum underneath furniture, as well as dust in corners and around the bottom areas of furniture. With hard-surface floors, vacuum or mop regularly, and apply floor finish two or three times a year. During the spring, clean baseboards by wiping them with a rag dipped in a mild detergent.

Above eye level, Bond recommends dusting light fixtures and window and door frames. Draperies also require spring-cleaning attention.

"A drapery's close proximity to a window causes it to collect as much or more dirt as other furnishings and also leads to deterioration of the fabric," Bond says. "To avoid this, vacuum the header or remove dust and cobwebs, and professionally dry-clean the rest of the drapes every two years."

Bond cautions homeowners against vacuuming the entire drapery, as the suction pulls dirt from the far side into the center of the fabric, where it could get caught in the weave.

In some areas of the country, spring cleaning is further challenged by salt and water that are tracked into the home following snows.

"Salt tracked into your home during the winter attracts water and the water-salt mixture attracts soil which sticks to carpet fibers," Bond says. "If it is left in the carpet, it will attract and retain dirt, leading to dark traffic lanes. Vacuuming removes loose debris, but leaves sticky substances intact. Thorough extraction with a hot water rinse is really the only way to thoroughly clean your carpet."

Carrying out a comprehensive cleaning effort will remove damaging residues left behind during the cooler winter months and prepare the home for warm weather.

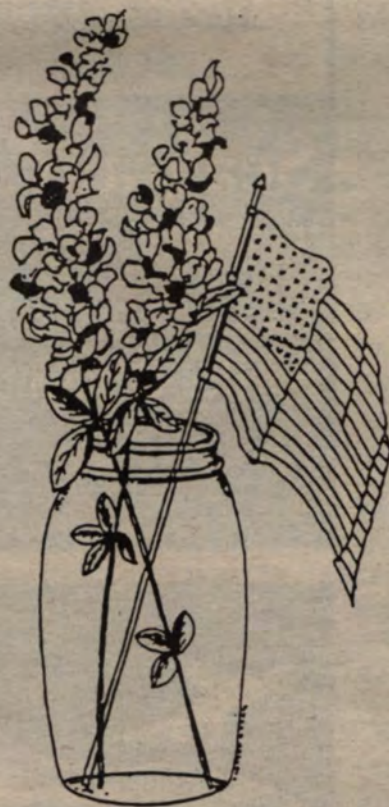

# Add Value By Doing Your Own Wallcovering

(NAPS)—Homeowners can add value to any room and save hundreds of dollars by doing their own wallcovering. But, where does a "wallcovering wannabee" begin? First, get walls in shape by doing minor repairs and patching. You want your wallcovering to stay put once you hang it and the following tips should help.

Remove all switch plates, fixtures, and if possible, moldings. Begin by doing a preliminary dry layout of the paper, to see how many full-width sheets will be needed. Papers that are pre-pasted require submersion in a water tray. When paste is needed, it may be purchased as a powder to be mixed with water or premixed. "Plan on about one gallon per five rolls of paper," says Larry Alexander, wallcovering specialist, Red Devil Inc.

The right wallcovering can be a perfect coverup. "When selecting wallpaper for problem walls, use a heavier vinyl wallcovering with fabric backing to minimize show-through," advises Dave Hughson, president of Hughson Painting Co., Succasunna, New Jersey, which provides full-service wallcovering. "And, avoid patterns with stripes or plaids, which draw attention to uneven walls."

A plumb line is a good tool to determine a true vertical line for your starting point, so the pattern doesn't go up or downhill.

Here are the recommended tools to do the job: pencils; sponge; pasting brush; wide blade taping knife; seam roller; razor knife with breakaway blades; casing knife (optional); wallpapering shears; water tray (for pre-pasted wallpaper); roller (may be used as alternative to pasting brush); plumb line; drop cloths; protective eyewear; gloves.

Evenly apply paste to pre-cut strips with the paste brush or roller. Do not allow paste to touch the pattern side of the paper. You may fold over the pasted area to meet another pasted area to make it easier to manage.

Start by laying paper where wall meets ceiling; the rest will unfold itself down the wall. Position the strip according to your plumb line marks and remember to leave some overhang at top and bottom. Beginning at the top, smooth wallcovering out from the center in both directions with a smoothing brush. Check for bubbles and be certain seams are properly butted. A seam roller may be used to flatten paper into corners and crevices. Remove excess paste or marks with a dampened sponge.

For a professionally trimmed look, Alexander advises using a wide blade taping knife to press paper into the crevice where wall meets ceiling and around trim. Then, run a break-away razor knife along the crease, using the edge of the taping knife as a guide. Peel away excess wallpaper. He also recommends a casing knife (which looks like a pizza cutter) to trim hard to reach areas around windows and door jams.

For the next section of paper, but it against the first strip to match patterns, without gapping or overlapping and proceed as previously mentioned.
